2-Mill Levy Defeated by 986 Margin

Only 14,596 of Over 40,000 Registered Electors Bothered to Go to Polls Monday

Some 14,596 out of the over 40,000 registered voters cast their ballots at the school millage election on Monday, September 13. The 2 mill levy, a partial renewal of a 2.7 mill levy that expired with the December tax collection, was soundly defeated by 986 votes.

The election was to raise funds for the 1971-72 proposed operating budget of the school system's public schools and

system's public schools and libraries.

Raps Literature

"Over the weekend literature was delivered to the homes of some of the school district residents advocating a no vote in the September 13, 1971 millage election. The authors of that literature were identified as Edith Wilson, John Lauve and Louis DePerro. They allege confusion resulting from flicting stories, fuzzy financial explanations, distorted com-parisons and figures that did not add up." They decided to dig out some facts for themselves and to share them with the community.

"At least some of those so called facts are false and thus may have served to distort, and to mislead the community regarding the needs of public education in Grosse Pointe. For example:

This literature states as fact that the 2 mill increase means \$872,784 more taxes than last year, despite the expiration of 2.7 mills. This is false, Taxes levied in 1970 were \$12,748,322.96 as compared to \$13,315,077.24 in 1971 if the 2 mills are included. Currently collectible taxes budgeted in 1970 were \$12,397,747.04 and the comparable amount for 1971 is \$12,915,624.92. This represents either 566,754.28 or 517,877.88 more taxes than last year.

The literature states as a fact that the Wage/Price Freeze will produce a cushion of \$175,000 or \$350,000 if the Freeze is extended another 90 days. This is false. The system was authorized on Saptember 7, 1971, to currently pay nego-



"Efforts such as these are counterproductive to the objectives of quality education under local control in Grosse Pointe. They are an imposition upon the hundreds of citizens who have sought out the facts and together with whatever degree of faith is necessary, independently made their individual judgments. And, lastly, they are an injustice to the efforts of a school system, which has to contend with a greater multitude of unknowns than most businesses, and still in the face of declining revenues operate a program of quality education for the benefit of our children and the credit of the community.' Lee H. Allen, treasurer, in

an out-of-character statement lambasted anonymous ads which appeared in the Detroit News and Free Press. He said he found them abhorrent and added that this type of "poison pen" literature was what first prompted him to run for the board. He said, "this type of activity stems from not only a cowardly individual but an irresponsible one because anonymous ads carry no accountability . . . mis-state-ments cannot be corrected and innuendoes cannot be clarified."

He continued, "I feel this represents a core feeling in the community that deliberately erodes local support that inevitably leads to loss of local control. By destroying public support for political purposes and creating mistrust they hope to pick up the pieces. They will not. The State will pick up the pieces. Open To Scrutiny

"I don't know of any unit of government that is more open to public scrutiny than our public school system nor one that responds as readily to the public will. The board has responded, changed its mind, many times due to reactions from the community on many issues.

"The Board has responsibilities for the education of our children and in general these responsibilities are carried out in accordance with the philosophy expressed to the electorate and taxpayers who chose to elect them. It has to live with its decisions. poison pen writers do not.

"This Board submits to the electorate what they believe to be financial requirements to conservatively finance the type of school system it believes the community wants. I do accept a decision to spend less if the voters make that decision. However, if some of the more blatani charges and innuendoes are true, the board and the staff are unbelievably irresponsible





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Farms Council Approves Parking Ban Compromise

It is the only commercial building there, and is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Linville (Gene) Stover, who reside at 375 Kercheval, at Lakeview, opposite their store. They built their home there last year.

Opposing the removal of the 'No Parking" signs, are Mr. and Mrs. George Champine at 394 Kercheval, in front of whose property the signs were recently erected.

Mrs. Stover, who also was at Monday night's meeting, said that she and her husband are willing to do everything possible to create harmony in the neighborhood, aithough the restriction on parking has created a problem in the making of deliveries by truck drivers, who sometimes come to the store at the same time. Occassionally, there are three or four trucks parked on Kercheval, and on Lakeview.

Because of the no parking opposite the store, she pointed out, truckers are sometimes forced to make "U" turns to get in front of the building, and this creates a traffic haz-Lakeview area, complained of ard. She, too, said she is willthe parking congestion created ing to cooperate with the

> Chief Farber told the council that it would take at least three weeks to have the "No Truck Parking" signs made and installed. The council decreed that the 30-day trial will begin from the day the new signs are erected. In the meantime, parking will still be prohibited to all types of vehicles. The new signs will not ban automobile parking, only trucks, it was stressed.

In a related incident, residents living in Lakeview avenue, protested to the council that there is a lack of enforcement of the ordinance which prohibits passage of commercial traffic on their street. Truck drivers are ignoring the "No Through Truck Traffic" signs posted the length of the

The party store owners contend that this is creating a hardship, since trucks cannot park on Kercheval to make deliveries, and the drivers are forced to park on Lakeview, or drive to the rear of their building to drop off merchandize.

The residents charge that these drivers, after completing their work, drive down Lakeview. Other drivers of commercial vehicles also use the street, it was charged.

Ferber said that there are only three thoroughfares in the Farms on which "No Truck Traffic" signs are posted, and these are, Chalfonte, from Moross to the northerly city limits; Belanger, from Webster to the alley east of Mack; and Lakeview, from Kercheval to Country Club

These streets are banned to all commercial vehicles, except delivery trucks, taking merchandize and taxicabs. Every effort will be made to enforce this law, he added.

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Simple 'Ice Water' Test Detects Hardening Arteries

Dr. Ignatios J. Voudoukis, of Lakepointe avenue, a Wayne State University heart specialist says that a simple 'ice water" test can be used to detect hardening of the

The test is most useful. oudoulds said, to distinguish between people who have high blood pressure and are also suffering from hardening of the arteries and those who are

Voudoukis, chief of hypertension section at the WSU-affiliated Hutzel Hospital. said that some 20 million Americans have high blood pressure.

Voudoukis explained in an interview that merely by not-ing the rise in blood pressure while the patient's hand is briefly immersed in ice water, he can determine whether the patient suffers from hardening of the arteries.

After five years of evaluating the responses of more than 1,000 patients to the "cold pressor" test, Voudoukis is convinced of its reliability, The cold pressor test is the best single indicator of whether a patient has hardening of the arteries" he said. "And besides its diagnostic

value, it has important therapeutic implications." For example, artherios. clerosis, (future hardening of the arteries), in a person with high blood pressure alone can be treated, according to Vou-

doukis, by reducing his blood pressure to normal through medication. However, high blood pres-sure patients already suffer-

With citizens across the entitled "Costs per Pupil country becoming more and Based on Total Membership more interested in the finan- for Current Expense Items" cial aspects of public education, they find it useful to compare rankings and expenditures in various budget categories with similar outlays in other districts. When this is done, of course, it is always necessary to derive information from the same source cov-

ering the same year. Data gathered by the Metropolitan Bureau of School Studies covering 112 local districts appear in a January, 1971 publication (the latest available) entitled "Public School Membership, Financial Data, and Costs per Pupil in the Metropolitan Detroit Six-County Area." Most of the fig-ures contained therein reflect the 1969-70 year, although as much informtaion as possible on 1970-71 was included.

The book shows that among the 37 districts in Wayne County, for example, Grosse Pointe ranked 11th in property valuation per membership pupil. Among the residential suburbs ranking higher than Grosse Pointe in this comparison are Dearborn, Fairlane, Harper Woods, and South Redford.

Where does Grosse Pointe rank among the 37 districts in terms of indebtedness?

The study shows our district to be 19th. The percent of debt compared to the total equalized valuation is 3.12. Compare this with Cherry Hill at 12.94 percent, Flat Rock at 11.79 percent, Huron Town-ship at 16.64 percent, Inkster at 14.48 percent or Northville at 10.18. Our ranking is low because most of our school buildings are paid for.

How does Grosse Pointe's total school tax rate of 33.4 mills compare to that of the other 37 districts in Wayne County?

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
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
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

The truly wise man is the one who continues to learn every day of his life, who is always honest enough to admit he does not know the answer, but then makes a point of finding out.

Your education has to do not only with classrooms and textbooks and lecture halls, but with mixing with your fellow students and faculty members, both socially and intellectually. Understanding is an attitude to be devoutly cultivated.

Let religion be a large part of your lives and be thankful that there is a noticeable surge today in the movement back to the Greatest Teacher. There will be many times when you find yourselves in need of His instruction and you will find it helpful to be on close terms with Him.
