Saturday, November 27 A DELEGATION of 11 top Soviet Union auto officials left Detroit this week after a secretive 10-day exchange of information with Ford Motor Company officials. Although the U.S. and the Soviet Union have had similar exchanges of technical information in other fields such as the space industry, the Detroit visit is believed to be the first exchange of automotive field information.

Sunday, November 28 THREE YOUNG BLACKS charged with murdering a New Mexico state trooper escaped an extensive manhunt Saturday by hijacking a Trans World Airlines jetliner to Havana. # Teacher Pay Hike Arbitrator Okays Trip Battle Has First To Saginaw Session In Court

Circuit Judge Neil Fitzgerald Denies GPEA's Motion, Claiming Lack of Jurisdiction to Enter Such an Order

Courtroom activities continue to capture the spotlight in the local education picture. As reported in the November 11 issue of the NEWS the Grosse Pointe Education Association (GPEA) has started legal action against the school district in Wayne County Circuit

GPEA asked that a court order be issued directing the board to pay GPEA members all wage increases provided for in the 1971-72 Collective Bargaining Agreement and the school system to set aside and hold in trust the wage increases which would have been paid during the freeze, according to Board attorney Thomas Coulter. Says It Will Pay

The Board publicly announced on Wednesday, November 24, two days before the scheduled court appearance, that it would pay full contracted teachers' salaries from the end of Phase I (November 13) through the remainder of the school year. This took care of the first

demand of the GPEA.

> The three-story brick building being turned over to the Keeweenaw Bay Community used as a chapel, a commercially equipped kitchen, dining room, tailor shop and full basement. There is also a smaller stone building on the property, which was formerly an orphanage. The agreement with the Indian Community allows for this building to be used for a church and living quarters for a priest for up to 20 years.

> The parcel of land being deeded over to the Diocese of Marquette includes an outdoor shrine to the late Bishop Frederic Baraga whose cause for sainthood is being considered because of his work among the Indian people. It also includes a small log school building, part of which was built by Bishop Baraga.

The Keeweenaw Bay Indian Community will use part of the facility for Tribal Headquarters, a cultural enrichment program and an alcoholic rehabilitation center. They are also investigating the possibility of using other parts of the building for a Commu-nity Center, Day Care Center, Public Health Service Center, Tribal Legal Service and a Vocational Training Center. Since it would not be feasible to house all of these programs, they are having a feasibility study to determine what pro-grams most beneficial to the people could be housed in one

The final link of Interstate 75 Freeway in southeastern Michigan will be opened to traffic Monday, December 6, the State Highway Commission has announced.

The 1.5-mile section, running from Nine Mile road to near Eleven Mile road in Royal Oak, Ferndale, Madison Heights and Hazel Park, is part of the big 1-75 and 1-696 interchange extending into all four cities.





By contributing \$16 a month through Foster Parents Plan, Inc., the members give the child and the family material and financial aid aimed at strengthening the family unit by helping each member. The child is symbolic of aid given to the entire family.

Before the members became Jong Min's Foster Parents, the family struggled to survive on about 67c a day, mother's earnings peddling rice cakes, for her family of four. Father had died leaving them destitute. To her credit two of the children are in school. Diet was very skimpy—only bar-ley or noodles. Rice, the staple food for most Koreans, was a treat. Home is a shabby room in a crude house in the slums. Furnishings are only the barest essentials of bedding and cooking utensils. Some friends were helping mother to pay the rent.

The member's contribution ily a monthly cash grant, distributions of goods such as vitamins, blankets, towels, soap and other useful items, medi-ical and dental care, the sustained guidance and counseling of social workers and the benefit of special programs. A strong emphasis is placed on education. All Foster Children, (and their brothers and sisters if possible), must attend school. Vocational training courses given or supported by PLAN in some countries are available to Foster Children, their brothers and sisters and in some cases their parents. The aim is to give each mem-ber of the family the tools to help themselves become independent and self-supporting. Special programs adapted to the needs of the country also meet these aims.

In Korea, for example, PLAN has started a credit union which makes money available on loan at low interest rates to members to pay off debts or start small businesses. The credit union is the largest in

#### Named Trustee Of Foundation

Thomas R. Peters of Mo-selle Place was recently ap-pointed a trustee of The Insight Foundation, Inc.

Just to show you how use-ful these Burns Mantle books are; I recently saw ROSEN CRANTZ AND GUILDEN-STERN ARE DEAD by Tom Stoppard—and this play, in excerpt form, is also contained in this same volume. The author was born in 1937 in Czechoslovakia, where his original family was Straussler. This play, his first to appear on the London and New York stages, began as a one-act verse burlesque called simply ROSENCRANTZ AND GUILDENSTERN, and the full-length version was produced in 1966. introduction will not be of much help, but since it is short, I quote it in entirety: "This is a play about Rosencrantz and Guildenstern: that much I'll allow.
