
Thursday, December 16 PAKISTANI COMMANDERS in East Pakistan asked India for a cease-fire Wednesday as Indian troops and tanks drove to within a mile of the besieged eastern capital of Dacca. India halted the bombing and gave the Pakistanis 16 hours to surrender, but no reply had come from the Pakistanis at 10:30 Detroit time, when the offer expired. India had set up "hot line" radio link with the East Pakistani commander, Lt. Gen. A. A. K. Niazi, to facilitate his reply to Indian terms.

### Friday, December 17

PRESIDENT NIXON DE-MANDED Thursday the release of Captain Jose Villa, a naturalized U.S. citizen and skipper of the 235-foot Johnny Express, an unarmed Panamanian cargo vessel which had been attacked and captured by a Cuban gunboat on Wednesday. The Castro rugime admitted the seizure of the boat in the international waters near the Bahamian islands, but claimed that the vessel was a "pirate ship" in the service of America's Central Intelligence Agency. They said that the wounded members of the 14-man crew have been flown to Cuba for medical treatment.

Saturday, December 18 COLONEL ORAN K. HENDERSON was acquitted Friday of the charge that he tried to cover up the murder of unarmed South Vietnamese civilians at My Lai four years ago. It was the sixth and final court martial growing out of the incident. Lt. William L. Calley Jr. was the only soldier convicted in connection with the massacre, receiving a life sentence which was later reduced to 20 years. May Be Arrested

The Farms council, in its regular meeting on Monday night, December 20, passed a new ordi-nance which defines general offenses against the public, making it unlawful to use indecent language, engage in any gambling activities, throw a snow-ball in public, or, in gen-eral, disturb the peace and quiet of the community in any way.

Police Chief Robert Fer ber pointed out in the control meeting Monday night that the Farms has needed a code to define general offenses for several years.


"It's not as if we are going to arrest every boy who throws a snowball, but you wouldn't believe the complaints we had last night when it snowed," Chief Ferber informed the council.

The police chief was responding to councilman Mark Stevens' query, "Is this new ordinance enforcible?"

County Court Loaded The breaking and entry oc-Chief Ferber explained that the Farms police have had to go to Wayne County to process many general offense arrests since the Farms did not clearly define general offenses in its own ordinances.

Since the Wayne County court system is overburdened with more serious offenses, the Farms arrests received insufficient attention, Chief Ferber pointed out.

The new ordinance, which also defines the more serious offenses such as arson, assault, sale of firearms to minors, and prostitution, to name a few, is the product of the combined efforts of Farms attorney George McKean, Farms Judge Robert Pytell, and Chief

THE U.S. DOLLAR was officially devalued Saturday, by the finance chiefs of the 10 richest non-communist nations agreeing on a new system of money-exchange rates featuring a dollar devaluation of 8.57 percent. President Nixon called the settlement, reached after two days of negotiation, "the most significant monetary agreement in the history of the world," and praised Treasury Secretary John B. "The need for this kind of protection for teachers is as real in Grosse Pointe as it is anywhere, and is my answer to those opponents of Tenure who note that teaching is the only profession offering virtual job security. "I further stated at the

GPEA meeting that the Tenure Act needs modification so that ineffective teaching is clear grounds for dismissal.

Burden Too Heavy

"Under the Act as pre sently written and interpreted, the burden falls all too heav ily upon the employer in the case of both tenure teachers and probationers. Increasingly constructive evaluation by administrators is only a par-tial solution. "Outright repeal of Tenure is not what I heard advocated by my colleagues, nor is it what I advocated myself. Perhaps board members were so startlingly candid that their reasoned approach and a varie ty of

interesting suggestions were lost in Miss Carey's reporting. I would suggest that listening to a tape of the meeting would be helpful to any teacher whether present at the meeting or not.

# Salesman Turns Self in As Accomplice in Holdup

Detroit Police Hold-Up Major Crime Bureau in the apprehension of a 29 year-old man involved in an armed hold-up and kidnapping incident in Detroit on Saturday, December 11.
