THE HARRISBURG SEV EN JURY convicted the Rev. Philip F. Berrigan Sunday of smuggling a letter from federal prison, but remained deadlocked over a verdict on other charges against the anti-war priest and his six co-defendants. The jury of nine women and three men was ordered to resume deliberations Monday on the government's principal charge that Berrigan and the others plotted to kidnap presidential adviser Henry A. Kissinger, blow up federal heating systems and raid draft boards in nine states.

Monday, April 3 ADVANCING NORTH VIETNAMESE TROOPS seized the last two outlying South Vietnamese bases in the country's northernmost province Sunday and pushed government defenders into the provincial capital of Quang Tri, 18 miles south of the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ). Four U.S. Aircraft were lost in support actions, and eight American crewmen were reported missing. Camp Carroll and Mai Loc were the last holdouts among 12 bases along the DMZ to fall into communist hands.

Both cities requested that the services of Black and Veatch of Michigan, consulting engineers, conduct a study and prepare a feasibility report on the administration, engineering operation and maintenance require-ments of the Milk River Pumping Station, a large storm water pumping station and retention basin situated in the area of Vernier and Marter road.

The Woods unanimously passed a resolution by Councilman Rodger A. Graef for the study at the regular meeting Thursday, February 24. In an almost identically worded resolution, the Harper Woods council unanimously approved the study Monday, March 6. Both The Woods and Har-

per Woods pay approximate. ly 95 percent of the station's cost, while the cities of St. Clair Shores, East Detroit and Roseville pay the other five percent. The station primarily serves The Woods and Harper Woods and portions of the other cities. The resolution cites that

"the ever spiraling and increasing costs for administration, engineering, opera-tion and maintenance" of the station "is of great concern to the economic bases of the two cities." It's felt by The Woods that

any alternatives should be sought and considered which may result in a "primary overall reduction in the operation and maintenance costs" of the station, thus benefiting the taxpayers.

Included in the proposed feasibility report, according to the resolution, are an "investigation of electric rates charged to the storm water pumping facility for power and power transformer requirements;" the review of "personnel requirements and operation of the facility," and the development of "recommendations for a proposed possible lease agreement with the Milk River Drain Commission which would permit the city of Grosse Pointe Woods to operate and maintain the storm water facility,

The investigation of electric rates would include a review of various Detroit Edison rate schedules which may be applicable to service of the type needed for the operation of the station and to ascertain if other electric rate schedules and/or other power alternatives may be more appropriate than those now utilized, according to the resolution.
