#### Monday, April 10

AN AMATEUR SKYDIVER and law enforcement student was arrested by the FBI Sunday for the hijacking of United Airlines cross-country Flight 727 on Saturday, April 8. So far the FBI has failed to find the \$500,000 paid to ransom 91 persons aboard the plane. The suspect, Richard F. Mc Coy Jr., who escaped from the jet by parachute, was a combat helicopter pilot in Vietnam and once taught Sunday school for the Mormon Church. He was seized at his modest home in Provo, Utah, 30 miles south of Salt Lake City.

Tuesday, April 11 AN EARTHQUAKE leveled up to 30 villages Monday in southern Iran in the country's worst quake since 1968. # Legislature's **Decision Will** Set Boundary

Avenue Property Split, According to Assistant Corporation Counsel

By Roger A. Waha

The latest news on the Wayburn avenue boundary dispute was reported by Park City Attorney Richard D. Rohr at the regular council meeting Monday, April 10. The matter was presented to the Detroit Common Council Friday, April 7, by the Detroit Corporation Counsel. It's now been referred to the Detroit city assessor and revenue department who will estimate income tax losses and property tax losses if the annexation is approved. A report will then be presented to Common Council Tuesday, April 18.

Use Park Facilities

The mayor also noted that Wayburn residents go to The Park's schools, have Park street lighting, use Park recreation areas and that around 95 per cent of the residents vote in The Park. The only services which Detroit provides is sewer maintenance and rubbish pickup.

In a letter to the Common Council regarding the petition of Wayburn residents on the west side of the avenue requesting the annexation by The Park of the portion of the lots now lying in Detroit, Raymond F. Stachura, assistant corporation counsel, gives a background on the area, and reports on what can be

The City of Detroit under the Public Acts of 1907, (effective October 24, 1907) annexed the land involved from the then Village of Fairview. "The land comprises upwards of six Detroit city blocks situated south of Mack avenue to Jefferson avenue and lying between Alter road and Wayburn avenue on the east," the letter says. The Park "desires to annex as part of their corporate limits approximately the east one

half of this land." Refers to Statutes After referring to two sta tutes, Mr. Stachura states that the statutes "provide that annexation may be accomplished by the affirmative majority vote of the legislative body of such city and the approval of the legislative body of such adjoining city, village or township. That is, whenever boundaries between cities divide platted lots, boundaries can only be

#### Call Special Session for **Discussions**

Possible Staff Cuts and the Student Code of Behavior Will Be on Agenda

The regular meeting of the Board of Education held Monday night, April 10, was unusually short since the more controversial issues were post-poned until tonight's meeting, Thursday, April 13, in the Board Room of the School's Administrative Building, 389 St. Clair avenue.

Slated for discussion in tonight's 8 o'clock meeting are possible staff cuts and a reduction of the academic and extracurricular program currently offered by the Pointe public schools.

The Board is expected to act at this meeting on recommendations for a possible reduction of staff of the public schools and public libraries for the 1972-1973 year in light of diminished financial re-

sources. Code of Behavior

students and school administrations. One problem currently facing the school system which will not be discussed in the meeting is the question of when to hold the upcoming

school millage election.

The majority of the board members favor a September election; however several members are still hoping for an earlier election date. This issue will not be discussed in tonight's meeting due to time limitations, but it will form the focal point of future discussions.

Highlights of the Monday night regular meeting were: a report on summer school offerings given by Dr. Joseph Spagnoli; and installment of the latest events in the Detroit Desegregation case analyzed by Attorney Douglas West; and a discussion of the millage election date triggered by a prepared statement of Trustee Lee H. Allen.

Dr. Joseph Spagnoli, assistant superintendent of instruction, announced in the meeting that this year's summer school program would be, byand-large, "a continuation of the program we have had in the past."

Tuition Increased He did note, however, that tuition shows a slight increase. The increase in cost of sending a student to summer school is attributed to a recent five and a half percent increase in teachers' salaries and a two and a half percent increase in books

and materials. A larger enrollment in the summer school program is cause of anticipated program reductions in the 1972-1973

#### PLUMBING CODE ORDINANCE

**ORDINANCE NO. 188** 

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING ALL MATTERS CONCERNING OR PERTAINING TO THE IN-STALLATION, ALTERATION, MAINTENANCE AND INSPECTION OF THE PLUMBING, DRAIN-AGE AND WATER SUPPLY SYSTEMS IN ALL STRUCTURES AND PREMISES IN THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS, MICHIGAN, EX-CEPT PUBLIC SEWERS AND CITY WATER SUPPLY MAINS AND SERVICE CONNECTIONS; DEFINING THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF BUILDING INSPEC-TION & STORM WATER PUMPING IN RELA-TION TO THE INSPECTION OF INSTALLA-TIONS, ALTERATIONS OR MAINTENANCE OF PLUMBING AND DRAINAGE; AUTHORIZING THE COLLECTION OF FEES FOR PERMITS, LICENSES, TESTS AND/OR INSPECTIONS: TO PROVIDE FOR THE LICENSING AND REGIS-TRATION OF PLUMBERS AND OTHER TRADESMEN WHO INSTALL, ALTER, MAIN-TAIN OR SERVICE PLUMBING, DRAINAGE, OR WATER SUPPLY SYSTEMS IN ANY BUILD-ING, STRUCTURE OR PREMISES IN THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLA-TION THEREOF.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ORDAINS:

Section 1. As permitted under the provisions of Act 345 of the Public Acts of the State of Michigan for the year of 1947, as amended, the City of Grosse Pointe Farms does hereby adopt BY REFERENCE the Official Plumbing Code of the City of Detroit, Michigan, (officially identified as Chapter 44 of the Code of the City of Detroit, Michigan, of 1964, being Ordinance 849E, as amended), dated August 21, 1968, and all Amendments thereto dated prior to the date of this Ordinance, (all of which are hereafter re-ferred to as the "Code"), which Code is approved except as otherwise provided hereinafter, and no plumbing work or plumbing installation shall be performed within the City of Grosse Pointe Farms unless it complies with the terms of this Code as amended by this Ordinance.

Section 2. The administration and enforcement of this Ordinance shall be under the Public Service Department of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, and all duties required to be performed by persons designated as officials of the City of Detroit shall be performed by persons in the Public Service Depart-

Section 3. Licenses granted by the State of Michigan shall be recognized in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms upon registration with the City Clerk and the payment of an annual Registration Fee in an amount to be established by the Public Service Department and after approval by resolution of the City Council. The license issued by the State of Michigan must be presented at the time of registration with the City of Grosse Pointe Farms.

Section 4. All installations regulated by the provisions of this Ordinance shall be made in strict accordance therewith.

Section 5. A copy of the Code shall be on file in the office of the Public Service Department for public

Section 6. Any person, firm or corporation, its, his, her or their agents or employees who shall violate the previsions of this Ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500.00 or by imprisonment in the City or County Jail for a term not exceeding ninety (90) days or both such fine and imprisonment may be imposed in the discretion of the Court. For each day that any such violaation shall be permitted to exist, the same shall constitute a separate and distinct offense and shall be so punishable.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the date of its enactment, or upon publication, which ever occurs later.




