NORTH VIETNAMESE TROOPS captured three more military bases Saturday, one 40 miles from Saigon and the other two in the Central Highlands. Thousands of South Vietnamese soldiers were shifted into the capital area to shore up government defenses against possible communist attack. U.S. B52s continued to pound the area around embattled An Loc, 60 miles north of Saigon. Troops of both sides continue to fight in streets of the capital.

DUKE JR. rocketed off the moon Sunday night and rejoined their Apollo 16 companion. Thomas K. Mattingly, ending a record surface expedition that will bring fresh discoveries to the history of the lunar highlands. The astronauts stowed a record 245 pounds of rocks and soil samples aboard the lunar lander Orion before they blasted off the surface at 8:26 p.m. in the eighth day of the moon mission.

Tuesday, April 25 A TEAM OF SURGEONS at Sinai Hospital successfully implanted a partly mechani

cal heart in a 45-year-old man from Albany, Ore., on Monday. The team, headed by heart surgeon Dr. Adrian Kantrowitz, began the opera-tion at 5:45 p.m. on Vincenzo Orsi, city engineer for Albany, who has been disabled for more than a year because of congestive heart failure. It is the second such opera tion in history.

PONTIAC VOTERS turned down a school tax increase of 5.5 mills Monday, leaving school officials with the prospect of an expected deficit for this year of more than \$3 million. The proposal was decisively beaten, 7,883 to 3,467. High anti-busing sentiment was given as the reason for the defeat. In Farmington, 5,980 a school tax increase of 3.5 mills for one year.

Finally, the Radiant Crab-Finally, the Radiant Crab-apple grows from 18 to 25 Of Drug Charge feet. Its deep red buds open to a deep pink, and its early foliage is reddish and its mature leaves are green. It sparkles with a half-inch red fruit which perists into the winter. At The Shores Jail, Stevenson agreed to talk with authorities after being informed of his Constitutional rights,

In an interview with the Farms detectives, Stevenson spilled a career of crime which included armed robbery, breakings and enterings of both businesses and residences, stolen cars, and ar-

It was learned that he worked primarily in The Pointe, particularly in The Farms, yet his criminal activities include several armed robberies in Harper Woods, East Detroit, Roseville and Detroit.


In The Farms alone, Sevenson's arrest helped clear up many cases the Farms detectives have been working on the past year. Through an exhaustive effort on the part of Farms detectives, Sergeant George Van Tiem, Joseph Miller and Earl Field, over 19 cases have been closed. Foremost is the recent armed robbery of the Briggs Pharmacy, 18544 Mack, on Friday night, March 31.

Or that night, witnesses said that a white male, about 23-years-old, five feet and 10 inches tall, entered the store, bared a blue steel revolver beneath his coat, and demanded the money in the cash register. He escaped with \$25.

Talking with Farms authorities, the suspect revealed several crimes which had never been reported to the police. Most were breakings and enterings not reported by the homeowners.

One fact which came to light was that a mid-December fire in a McKinley road residence was not an accidental fire, it was arson committed by Stevenson, The suspect said that he had broken into the house, had discovered nothing worth

On Monday, the day before his arrest, Stevenson was seen parking a maroon Buick Riviera in the Brownell Middle School parking lot and then jumping the fence which encloses the school grounds. Farms police, running a check on the suspicious abandoned car, discovered that it had been stolen from a parking lot in East Warren at 8 a.m. that morning. Farms detectives, investi-

gating the stolen property. discovered two fingerprints on the left window of the vehicle. At The Farms station, they traced the fingerprints to Stevenson's which were on file due to his extensive juvenile record.

Stevension was a base-ball player at South High School before dropping out to join the service when he became 18-years-old. He was in the service for only a short time before receiving a discharge.







For further information call 886-2820 or County. Following a comprehensive study of manpower needs, the Advisory Committee developed a master plan, and presented a recommendation for financing it. The Grosse Pointe Board of Education considered a resolution in support of the proposed county vocational education program at the annual meeting, held last July 6, but tabled the motion until the regular meeting of August 9. At the time of the reconsideration, the issue was discussed again, and the trus-tees acknowledged the need for improving and extending vocational educational programs, both within its own district and throughout Wayne County. However, in their opinion, the proposal presented at that time did not appear totally satisfactory.

Four area vocational-technical centers will be constructed and ultimately put into operation if Wayne County citizens approve a one mill property tax levy. Because they do not hold annual school elections of

June 12, four of the county's local school districts must hold special elections on that date for the area vocational-technical centers.



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

What Goes On at Your Library By Virginia Leonard A current issue of the WRITER has an article

by Elizabeth Janeway entitled "The Battle of Fic-tion and Non-Fiction." This article is adapted from a talk given at the Radcliffe Course in Publishing Procedures, published in the RADCLIFFE QUAR-TERLY and the Boston Herald-Traveler BOOK GUIDE.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION GROSSE POINTE BUILDING AUTHORITY

These Articles of Incorporation are adopted, signed and acknowledged by the incorporating unit for the purpose of forming a non-profit municipal Building Authority under the provisions of Act 31, Public Acts of Michigan, 1948 (First Extra Session). as amended, the Articles being as follows:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation and authority is the GROSSE POINTE BUILDING AUTHORITY.

ARTICLE II.

The incorporation unit is the City of Grosse Pointe, located in Wayne County, Michigan, a munici-pal corporation of the State of Michigan.

ARTICLE III.

This authority is incorporated for the purpose of acquiring, furnishing, equipping, owning, improving, enlarging, operating and maintaining a building or buildings, automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities, and the necessary site or sites therefor together with appurtenant properties and facilities necessary or convenient for the effective use thereof, for use for any legitimate public purpose of the City of Grosse Pointe.

Section 6. When all bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the enabling act under which the Authority is incorporated shall have been retired, the Authority may convey title to the property acquired hereunder to the incorporating unit in accordance with any agreement adopted by the governing body of the incorporating unit,

Section 7. All property owned by the Authority shall be exempt from taxation by the State or any taxing unit therein.

Section 8. The Authority shall possess all the powers necessary to carry out the purpose of its incorporation, including the incidental powers necessary thereto. The powers herein granted shall be in addition to those granted by any statute or charter and the enumeration of any power either in these Articles of Incorporation or in the enabling act, shall not be construed as a limitation upon such general powers.

Section 9. The term of this corporation and Authority shall be perpetual, or until terminated in accordance with law.

ARTICLE V. GOVERNING BODY-OFFICERS:


Section 1. The Authority shall be directed and

No commissioner who holds any paid public office of public employment shall receive any salary as such Commissioner.

Section 10. Vacancies occurring in the office of the Commission shall be filled by the City Council of the City of Grosse Pointe for the unexpired term.

Section 11. A Commissioner may be removed from office for cause by an affirmative majority vote of the City Council of the City of Grosse Pointe.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND DUTIES:

Section 1. The Authority shall be a body corporate with power to sue and be sued in any court of the State of Michigan.

Section 2. The Authority and the incorporating unit shall have the power to enter into a contract or contracts whereby the Authority will acquire property necessary to accomplish the purposes of this incor-poration and contemplated by the terms of the enabling act, and lease said property to the incorporating unit for a period of not to exceed fifty (50) years.

Section 3. The Authority shall have power to increase the consideration specified in any contract of lease with the incorporating unit whenever during the term of the lease or leases an increase of rent is necessary to provide funds to meet its obligations.

Section 4. For the purpose of accomplishing the objects of its incorporation, the Authority may acquire property by purchase, construction, lease, gift, devise or condemnation, and for the purpose of condemnation it may proceed under the provisions of Act No. 149 of the Public Acts of 1911, as now or hereafter amended, or any other appropriate statute.

Section 5. For the purpose of acquiring, improving and enlarging any such building or buildings, automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities, and the necessary site or sites therefor together with appurtenant properties and facilities necessary or convenient for the effective use thereof, and furnishing and equipping the same, the Authority may issue self-liquidating revenue bonds in accord ance with and subject to the provisions of Act No. 94 of the Public Acts of 1933, as now or hereafter amended, except that the bonds may be either serial bonds or term bonds or any combination thereof, as shall be determined by the Authority. Such bonds shall be payable solely from the revenues of such property, which revenues shall be deemed to include payments made under any lease or other contract for the use of such property. No such bonds shall be issued unless the property whose revenues are pledged has been leased by the Authority for a period extending beyond the last maturity of the bonds. Where and to the extent that the bonds are payable from revenues derived from payments to be made pursuant to any lease or other contract obligations, the bonds shall be deemed to be issued in anticipation of contract obligations and such obligations shall be deemed to be contract obligations in anticipation of which bonds are issued, within the meaning of Section 6, Article 9, of the Constitution of the State. For the purpose of Section 33 of said Act, the limits of the Authority shall be deemed to coincide with those of the City of Grosse Pointe. If a sufficient referendum petition shall be filed as provided in said section requesting a referendum upon the question of the issuance of revenue bonds by the Authority, then such question may be submitted by the Commission of the Authority at any general or special election to be held in the City.

governed by a Board of Commissioners of three (3 members known as the "Commission," each to be elected by the City Council of the City of Grosse Pointe. No member of the legislative body of the incorporating unit shall be eligible for membership or appointment to this Authority.

Section 2. The terms of the three (3) Commissioners constituting the first Commission shall be for a term of years as follows: one Commissioner for a term ending on June 30, 1975, one Commissioner for a term ending on June 30, 1974 and one Commissioner for a term ending on June 30, 1973, respectively. Thereafter, succeeding Commissioner shall serve for three (3) years terms.

Section 3. The Commission shall designate one of its members as Chairman, one of its members as Secretary and a Treasurer who shall be the Treasurer of the City of Grosse Pointe, each to be designated for such term in office as may be fixed by the by-laws.

Section 4. The Commission shall adopt and may amend by-laws and rules of procedure consonant with the provisions of the enabling act and provide therein for regular meetings of the Commission.

Section 5. The Commission shall adopt a corporate seal.

Section 6. The Chairman shall preside at meet ings of the Commission and may sign and execute all authorized bonds, contracts, checks and other obligations and execute interest coupons with his facsimile signature in the name of the Authority when so authorized by the Commission. He shall do and perform such other duties as may be fixed by the by-laws and from time to time assigned to him by the Commission

Section 7. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Commission, and of all committees thereof, in books provided for that purpose; he shall attend to the giving, serving and receiving of all notices or process of or against the Authority; he may sign with the Chairman in the name of the Authority all bonds, contracts and other obligations authorized by the Commission, and when so ordered he shall affix the seal of the Authority thereto, he shall have charge of all books and records, which shall at all reasonable times be open to inspection and examination of the Commission, or any member thereof, and in general perform all the duties incident to his office. The Secretary shall preside at meetings of the Commission in the absence of the Chairman,

Section 8. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Authority which may come into his hands or possession; when neces sary or proper, he shall endorse in behalf of the Authority for collection, checks, notes, and other colligations, and shall deposit them to the credit of the Authority in a designated bank or depositary; he shall sign all receipts and vouchers for payment made to the Authority; he shall jointly with such other officer as may be designated by the Commis-

Section 12. The books and records of the Authority and of the Commission, officers and agents thereof, shall be open to inspection and audit by the City of Grosse Pointe at all reasonable times. The Authority shall submit an annual report to the City of Grosse Pointe.

ARTICLE VI.

The County Clerk for the County of Wayne shall cause a copy of these Articles of Incorporation to be published once in the Grosse Pointe News, being a newspaper circulated within the County of Wayne, as provided in the enabling act.

ARTICLE VII.

AMENDMENTS:

Amendments may be made to these Articles of Incorporation as provided in Section 10 of Act 31 of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1948 (First Extra Session) as amended.



In action taken at a recent regular meeting, the council unanimously passed a resolution by Councilman Benjamin W. Pinkos on the bill and copies were sent to Governor Milliken and Senator Youngblood.

This bill amends the General Property Tax Act to exclude from the cash value of real property the following: amount paid as realtor's fees; amounts paid by the owner for obtaining financing; amounts attributable to personal property included in the purchase price; amounts paid as closing costs, and amounts paid for surveying the property.

As reported in the March 30 edition of the NEWS, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen noted that if the bill passes, there will be a seven to 10 percent reduction in assessed valuation.

Governor Milliken, in his April 3 letter to Mr. Petersen said, "in principle, I believe that the basic provisions of this bill are necessary and equitable. Its purpose is to improve the equitability of the means of property taxation. However, the overall impact of this bill is not completely clear. It is believed that it could have a devastating effect on the revenues of local governments."

The governor continues by saying that the bill has presently been recalled by the House of Representatives and is currently being reconsidered. "Hopefully meas-ures will be taken which will lessen the impact on the revenues of local governments. I am confident that when all the facts are known, appropriate action will be taken," adds Governor Milliken. In his letter to Mr. Petersen, Senator Youngblood thanked him for sending a copy of the resolution.
