Thursday, April 27 IN STATE PRIMARY AC-TION, Senator George Mc-Govern swept to a one-sided triumph in Massachusetts Tuesday and Senator Hubert Humphrey captured Pennsylvania for the first presidential primary victory of his long political career. The results were a double setback to Senator Edmund Muskie's battered presidential campaign. Governor George Wallace placed third in Massachusetts and fourth in Pennsylvania.

The New York Times of April 23, 1972 said that the President's legislation to concentrate more funds in poor schools rather than bus the students to better schools has received little support in Congress, partly because of the wide-spread skepticism among educators about the effectiveness of compensatory education.

A further problem has been that, in submitting the legisthe Administration lation, shifted its policy on what could be done by putting more resources in schools where a majority of the students have a peor educational background.

The Times article quotes Mr. Nixon as saying in 1970 that, "The best available evidence indicates that most of the compensatory education programs have not measurably helped poor children catch up.'

On the other hand, we have Elliot L. Richardson, Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare reportedly stating (in the Detroit News of April 23) that with "effective management and enough money," President Nixon's proposed heavier use of special education funds for needy children can help them learn better, even in segregated schools. The newspaper re-port says that the "study concludes that although special education for needy admits pupils without descrichildren generally has not worked, it can be made to mination as to race, color or work along the lines proposed national origin.
