

City's Rate Cut Too

At its Monday, May 15, meeting, the Grosse Pointe City Council approved a \$1,-468,970 General Fund budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1972. The budget provides for a tax rate reduction of .30 mills (30 cents per \$1,000 equalized valua. tion) based on an operating rate of 18.46 mills, a demental services. crease of 21 cents per thousand, and a debt service rate of 2.72 mills, a decrease of nine cents per thousand.

The total General Fund budget shows an increase of \$95,520 over the current budget. The State equalized tax base of the City has increased from \$49,835,120 to \$53,674,820 due to reassessment this year and new construction. Local property tax revenues show an increase of \$63,265 and state shared revenues an increase of \$24,-200. The net result of the property tax rate reduction and the increased assessed valuation base would be a property tax increase of ap-
