Thursday, June 8

SALVAGE WORKERS WEDNESDAY night began pumping 49,000 gallons of fuel oil out of the sunken Great Lakes freighter Sidney E. Smith, Jr., which is threatening to split in two in the St. Clair River. The Smith went down in 35 feet of water near the river channel after colliding early Monday morning with the Great Lakes grain carrier Parker Evans.

Friday, June 9

RICHARD G. KLEIN-DIENST, 48-year-old Phoenix lawyer, won easy Senate confirmation as attorney general Thursday by a vote of 64-19, ending a politically charged three month controversy over administration treatment of business interests.

Saturday, June 10

RAPID CITY, S.D., was declared a federal disaster area by President Nixon and a State disaster area by Gov. Richard Knelp, following a rain-swollen flash flood that killed more than 150 persons and left thousands homeless. More than 500 persons are reported missing and it is feared that the death toll will rise. Damage to homes and other property is estimated at about \$100 million dollars. The floods collapsed a dam and sent torrents of water sweeping through the city, touching off fires and explosions. Authorities pointed out that approximately 4,000 tourists, believed to be camping in the Black Hills, have yet to be heard from. Army troops and National guardsmen have been ordered to the area with orders to shoot looters on sight.

Sunday, June 11

AMERICAN B-52s bombed suspected Viet Cong and hours after Communist ground troops captured two government outposts south of the capital. The U.S. Command said the bombers struck near Duc Hoa, where VC guerillas are believed to be hiding and Trang Bang, which is 20 miles south of Saigon. The raids were the closest to the capital in three years it was said. Ten other B-52 missions were flown near Quang Tri, Hue and KonTum, and an additional nine against Red supply bunkers just north of the de-militarized zone (DMZ). South Vietnamese President Thieu predicted that Saigon and Hue might be the next targets of the Communist offensive which started March



THE FLASH FLOOD at Rapid City, S.D., has been ranked as the worst in the nation since 1937, when the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers took 520 lives. Authorities said that if estimates are correct, the Rapid City tragedy could even be worse than that. So far, 208 bodies have been recovered. Search 2,400 national guardsmen are large l crews of 2,000 volunteers and finding bodies under debris and mud. Early yesterday, officials said that 1,500 persons are still reported missing. Thousands of residents were left homeless. Aid from Federal and State services, the Red Cross and from all over the nation is pouring into the devastated resort

trary to the ordinance. It was pointed out by the Board of Appeals, that under the ordinance, one person can be considered as a family, and two other unrelated persons can be considered as bona fide residents of the city. However, the unrelated persons must petition for the

Section 16 of the ordinance reads: "A family is one or two or more persons interrelated by blood, adoption or marriage and living together in a room, or rooms comprising a single housekeeping A person's domestic employe, if living on the premises, is a part of the family of such person, Upon application to the Board of Appeals, not more than two persons other than those specified above may, in a given location, be included in a specific family if the Board of Appeals finds, from the nature of the association between all such persons and the duration and reasons therefor, that there will be no impairment in the zoned charter of the neighborhood.' On June 5, 1972, I attended a Grosse Pointe Woods Council meeting in City order to show my opposition to a city ordinance passed in March, 1972, which denies some Woods taxpayers access to Lakeshore Park. According to accepted parlimentary procedure, ALL discussion should be heard before a motion is called for, and minutes of the meeting will show that it was the councilmen and not those attending the meeting who sidetracked the discussion with questions about childrens' park passes, 30-yearold building permits and how address numbers are assign-

The 630 petitions signers (possibly ¼ of the active voters) and all Woods residents should be encouraged to take a closer look at the city council, particularly Mayor McLeod, to be sure this group is sympathetic to Woods residents' wishes.

Finally, the question on Ordinance 329 should be resolved on June 19 at 7:30 in the Woods city council room. All Woods residents are welcome to come and attempt to express their views! Sincerely,

ORDINANCE NO. 54

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 5.18 RESI-DENCE A DISTRICT USES, OF CHAPTER 20, ZON-ING, OF TITLE V, ZONING AND PLANNING OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE

THE CITY OF

ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 5.18 Residence A District Uses, of Chapter 20, Zoning, of Title V. Zoning and Planning, of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

"5,18 Residence A District Uses. In a Residence A District no building or premises, except as otherwise provided in this Chapter, shall be erected or used except for one or more of the following specified

- (1) Private dwellings.
- (2) Churches, public schools, and public libraries and museums
- Private schools, museums and educational institutions when permitted by the Board of Appeals as specified in Section 5.43 (6).
- (4) Accessory uses customarily incident to any of the above permitted uses, including not more than one (1) private garage, or stable, for each lot. Dwellings for the use of domestic employees of the owners, lessees or occupants of the principal dwelling on a lot shall be considered accessory buildings; but, if containing a complete housekeeping unit or units, shall conform to all the height and yard requirements for dwellings in the district in which they are located.
- (5) One sign pertaining to the sale, lease or use of a lot or building may be placed on such lot or building (but not elsewhere), if such sign does not exceed six (6) square feet in area. Any such sign shall be removed within seven (7) days after an agreement with respect to sale, lease or use of the lot of building has been entered into. No sign indicating the property has been "sold" shall remain more than seven (7) days.
- (6) Off-street parking facilities established and maintained in compliance with Sections 5.14 to 5.17."

The Council, acting as a Zoning Board of Appeals, suance of a Building Permit for the construction of a residence on Lot 309, Assessor's Grosse Pointe Farms Plat No. 6, located at 19300 Mack Avenue.

ORDINANCE NO. 53

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE VIII, BUILD-ING REGULATIONS OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK, TO ADD THERETO CHAPTER 39-A. CONDITION AND MAINTENANCE OF DWELLINGS.

THE CITY OF

Grosse Pointe Park

Section 1. Title VIII, Building Regulations, of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park is hereby amended by adding thereto Chapter 39-A, Condition and Maintenance of Dwellings, which shall read in its entirety as follows:

Chapter 39-A, Condition and Maintenance of Dwellings 8.50 Definitions

8.50.1 "Dwelling" shall mean any building which is wholly or partly used or intended to be used for living or sleeping by human accupants.

850.2 "Accessory building" shall mean any garage, shed or storage structure accessory to a dwelling.

8.50.3 "Inspector" shall mean the Director of Public Service or any person or persons to whom he shall delegate his functions or duties hereunder.

8.50.4 "Defect" shall mean any condition of a dwelling or dwelling unit set forth in 8.51 below.

8.51 Defects in Construction and Maintenance

8.51.1 Dwelling Exterior. The following defects in any dwelling exterior shall be subject to the remedial provisions of Section 8.52 hereof:

(a) Any chimney which has loose, cracked or missing bricks or blocks. (b) Any broken roof or roofing with sections missing.

(c) Any window with broken or missing glass, or rotted or broken rails, or sill. (d) Any exterior door which is broken or missing or has broken or missing glass.

(e) Any porch with rotted or broken floor joints, or rotted or broken or missing sections of decking, or broken or depressed concrete deck, or brick piers or supports out of plumb due to inadequate footings.

Any steps with rotten or broken treads or stringers or rotten, loose, broken or missing handrail.

(g) Any walls which are bulged or show evidence of leaks. (h) Any exterior trim which is loose, bro-

ken, rotted or missing. Defective or missing gutters or downspouts. An exterior wood surface which is not

properly sealed or painted so as to pro-

tect it from the elements. (k) The presence of debris, trash, litter, or waste materials which would constitute a fire hazard or harborage for rodents

8.51.2 Accessory Buildings. The following defects in any accessory building shall be subject to the remedial provisions of Section 8.52

hereof: (a) Broken roof or roofs with sections missing,

(b) Rotted, broken, loose or missing bricks or siding. (c) Rotted or broken stude or rafters.

8.51.3 Rodent or Vermin Infestation, If any dwelling or accessory building shows evidence of in-festation by rodents or vermin (such as cockroaches, lice, etc.) such defect will be subject to the remedial provisions of Sec-

tion 8.52 hereof. 8.51.4 Interior of Dwellings. The following defects in the interior of dwellings shall be subject to the remedial provision of Section 8.52

hereof: (a) Loose, missing, spalling or water damaged plaster in ceilings or wall.

(b) Rotted, broken or missing flooring. (c) Broken, cracked, rotted or missing columns, beams, joints, studs, or rafters. (d) Broken, cracked, loose or missing stair

treads or risers, or broken, cracked,

loose or missing handrails. (c) Leaking basement wall or floor. 8 51.5 Wiring and Electrical Equipment. The following defects will be subject to the re-

medial provisions of Section 8.52 hereof: (a) Overfusing of circuits, feeders or ser-

8.51.6 Heating Equipment. Any deviation from the

Water heaters shall be properly connected to a chimney flue and equipped with a pressure relief valve.

8.51.7 Plumbing and Piumbing Fixtures. The following conditions with respect to plumbing and plumbing fixtures shall be defects subject to the remedial provisions of Section 8.52 hereof:

(a) Leaking water or waste piping or faucets or plugged drains.

(b) Plumbing fixtures which provide a lodging place for filth and germs due to defective or damaged surfaces located below the water line.

(c) Cracked or broken fixtures.

(d) Missing floor drain strainers and cleanout plugs. (e) Inadequate scaling of the joint between a built-in bathtub with shower and the

wall around the tub and of sinks in tiled drain boards. (f) Any plumbing which has been installed without compliance with the requirements of the City Plumbing Code which were in effect at the date of such installation.

8.52 Certificate of Occupancy; Remedy of Defects

8.52.1 Certificate of Occupancy

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to hereafter occupy or for any owner or agent thereof, to permit the occupation of any dwelling or part thereof, for any purpose, unless a Certificate of Occupancy has been issued by the Department of Public Service with respect to such dwelling under a date which is not more than one year prior to the date of such occupation. The Certificate of Occupancy shall state that the Department of Public Service has inspected the dwelling and that said Department has determined that the dwelling may be occupied. The Certificate of Occupancy shall also hear this legend in capital letters or bold-face type:

STITUTE ANY REPRESENTATION OR WARRANTY AS TO THE CONDITION OF THE DWELLING DESCRIBED HEREIN (OR ANY ASPECT OF SUCH CONDI-TION), AND ANY INTERESTED PERSON IS ENCOURAGED TO MAKE HIS OWN INSPECTION OF THE PREMISES." This section shall not apply to any oc-

until such defects are corrected to the rea-

sonable satisfaction of the Inspector. 8.52.4 Conditional Certificate of Occupancy

In the event, for any reason, an owner requests that a Certificate of Occupancy be issued prior to correction of all defects noted by an Inspector and if such defects do not, in the judgment of the Inspector, constitute material health or safety hazards, a Conditional Certificate of Occupancy may be issued upon the condition that such defects be remedied within thirty days after the date of the Conditional Certificate of Occupancy and the owner's assurance that such defects will be remedied by deposit with the Department of Public Service of a cash bond in an amount not to exceed 150% of the estimated cost of remedying such defects. In the event of issuance of a Conditional Certificate of Occupancy, the owner shall notify the Inspector within thirty days after date of issuance that the defects have been remedied, and a Certificate of Occupancy shall be issued and the owner's bond returned if the Inspector is satisfied as to the owner's compliance. If the owner fails to remedy the defects as agreed, the Department of Public Service may use so much of the cash bond as is necessary to remedy the defects and will return any balance to the owner.

8.53 Inspection and Access to Dwellings

8.53.1 Inspection

Each Inspector is hereby authorized to enter, examine and survey any dwelling or accessory building, and any part thereof, at any time between the hours of 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. on the week days Monday through Friday for purposes of conducting inspection required for a Certificate of Occupancy or reviewing compliance with the provisions of a Conditional Certificate of Occupancy, and the owner or occupant of any dwelling shall give such Inspector free access for such purposes.

8.53.2 Access for Repairs

Every occupant of a dwelling shall give the the owner or his authorized agent (which may include the Department of Public Service or its designees effecting repairs or alterations pursuant to cash bond) access to the dwelling and any accessory building nt any reasonable time for purposes of making such repairs or alterations as are necessary to remedy any defects which preclude issuance of a Certificate of Occu-





He began his career in a one-room schoolhouse, in the Depression. He was paid \$60 month, but he got room, and board, and a place to put his car, for \$14 a month,

It Averaged Out "Our salaries then were very different from teachers' salaries now. But, looking

back, I suppose it all averaged out." He was born in Wisconsin and grew up in Elgin, Ill. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from Beloit Col-lege, his Master of Arts, in Creative Writing, from the State University of Iowa.

A growing interest in Art led him to concentrate in that field, branching out from his original teaching fields of English.
World War II found him in

the Army, stationed in the Southwest — "I fought the Battle of Texas" — and tak-ing advantage of USO-offered Art classes. He tried his hand at portrait painting. Later, separated from the service, he used the G.I. Bill to finance further studies in

Been Here 31 Years He taught in Riverside, Ill., before coming to The been sponsor of "Inklings," Pointe, where, this month, Pierce's literary magazine.

His wife, Charlotte, teaches at Denby. Her classroom days are ending this month, Charlotte Jorgensen's not retiring, just quitting, (Charlotte's much too young to retire): Denby is, after all, a long "commute" from Sedona, Ariz.

Sedona, in the beautiful red rock country not too far from the Grand Canyon, is where the Jorgensens are headed. They have a lot, and they plan to build.

Sedona began as an art colony, and Mr. Jorgensennaturally !--plans to do some painting there. Drawing and painting will, he expects, re-main his main hobby. He has revived his stamp collection, and "I intend to do writing I intended to do when I graduated from college .

Have Two Daughters The Jorgensens have two daughters, Gail (Mrs. Dennis) Snible, mother of Eddie

and Wendy, and Carla.

Back in 1959-60, the whole family lived in Babington, Cheshire, England, during Mr. Jorgensen's year as an exchange teacher at a Secondary Modern School in Liverpool. It was a wonderful year for them all.

"I taught in a terminal school for boys-they leave school in England at 15—while my daughters attended a grammar school (college prep.). We had some fascinating exchanges, comparing what went on in both types of schools, over our dinner

table. The Jorgensens had visions of living in a quaint thatchroofed cottage, but Henry Hutton, the British exchange teacher who took Mr. Jorgensen's place in The Pointe, arranged for more modern

rental accommodation.

Weekend Tourists They spent weekends touring the British Islands in their Hillman, crossing the Channel to meander through Europe in the long Easter

and Christmas breaks. English schools, Mr. Jorgensen found, are "much

more 'dictatorial' than ours Well, perhaps 'dictatorial' isn't precisely the right word: There was not so much familiarity, in England, between the staff and the students as there is

here. He was impressed by the emphasis the English placed on the basic subjects. "I had boys of all abilities, and there wasn't one who couldn't read."

He was impressed by the conscientiousness of his pupils, the fact that they didn't need to be driven. He found them generally better behaved than American students

It May Have Changed "But that was 12 years ago, remember. I don't know how things are in England now.

He's seen American students change. "When I started out, I could expect three or four problems in a class. Now, I would say about half of each class has problems." He's not sure why or how this change came about, but he has an uneasy feeling that rights may have been overemphasized, responsibilities

"Yes, I think Grosse Pointe has been a wonderful place to teach. My only regret is that, in the past few years, the pleasure has been lessened. We seem to have become so concerned with from behind-the-desk, into rights: The right to do what you want to, dress as you want to

Could Be Mistake "I think this business about throwing out the Dress Code is, perhaps, a mistake. It may not be cause and effect -but I've noticed that the students who dress the sloppiest, seem to work the sloppiest."
Mr. Jorgensen has studied

at Wayne State University the University of Michigan, the University of Colorado, Michigan State University and the Detroit Society of Arts and Crafts.

The British Ministry of Education attests to the fact that he attended a "short course" in Shakespeare at Stratford-on-Avon in 1960. Quite true, notes Mr. Jorgen-sen, with a laugh: The "short course" was very short indeed, accomplished in one long, albeit fascinating, week-

end. In the early '60's, he was selected to participate in a Summer Institute in Humanities at Bennington College, Vt., sponsored by the John Hay program.

He taught for a year at the High School and a year at Parcells when he first came to The Pointe. He was head of the Junior High English Department, later head of the Junior High Art Depart-

ment.

Through the years, he's he rounds out 31 years with the local public schools.

This is Inklings' last year, as well as Mr. Jorgensen's. School millage has been defeated repeatedly in The Pointe recently, and Inklings is a lack-of-funds casualty. Mr. Christensen's Turn

"I've enjoyed working with young people," says Harvey Christensen, counselor at North High School, who will have completed 36 years' service to Grosse Pointe when he retires this month, "It keeps you youngerfeeling younger, at any rate." Mr. Christensen still thinks

'most of our kids are pretty nice," still finds them pleasant to work with, still considers his work "most of the time, enjoyable." He doesn't say it's gotten easier.
"We have a bigger pupil
