THE ENTIRE WORLD
EXPRESSED SHOCK and outrage for the Munich, Germany, massacre in which 11 Israeli Olympic athletes were murdered by fanatical Palestinian Arabs. West German police circulated photographs and descriptions of 15 Arabs wanted on suspicion of planning new violence. The Arab terrorists killed two Israelis and took nine others hostage after raiding the Olympic Village Israeli quarters earlier. The hostages were killed by a grenade and gunfire by the guerrillas during a shootout with German police, at an airport where the Arabs sought to escape. Five of the raiders and a police officer were killed in the battle. Following memorial services for the slain Israelis, the Olympic games continued.

Friday, September 8
JEWS IN WEST GER-MANY were warned by the authorities that terrorists may try to kill them this weekend with bomb packages disguised as Jewish New Year's gifts. Chancellor Willy Brandt's government informed the 32,000 Jews in the country that it had received a tip-off they may be the target of bombs during Rosh Hashana. In the mean-time, Egypt threatened "de-cisive action" after Bonn accused Cairo officials of being partly responsible for the horror deaths in Munich, in which 11 Israeli Olympic athletes, five Arabs and one police officer died in a shoot-


Saturday, September 9 LE XUAN THUY, 22, a North Vietnamese Army defector, told a Saigon news conference yesterday that he and his fellow soldiers were responsible for the slaughter massacred hundreds and hundreds of troops and civis lions, including pregnant women and children.

Sunday, September 10 THE SECURITY COUN-CIL of the United Nations was called today following yesterday's battle by Israeli and Syrian war planes over the Israeli-occupied Golan Heights, Israel claimed that three Syrian planes were downed. A UN official said that Syria requested the emergency council session of Chinese Ambassador Huang Hua, council president for September. It will be the first time in the world body's history that the People's Republic of China has presided over the Security Council.

First Met in 1952

The first effort was a meeting in 1952 of authorities and Harper Woods to see what could be done to dispose of the growing mountain of household trash.

The Authority-actually a separate unit of local government—was incorporated on August 16, 1962. In the years that followed, the eight communities committed themselves to revenue bonds to finance the building of the incinerator. Construction began in 1971.

Built on a 74 acre landfill area, purchased in 1963, the plant is centrally located to the communities it serves.

Being surrounded by a cemetery, a Detroit Edison sub-station and other land planned for light industrial zoning, the location is ideally suited for the quiet, odorfree incinerator.

Financing Varies Operations of the facilitythe first of its kind to be built since the strict Michigan Air Control Act was adopted in 1969 - will be financed by the communities it serves. In some of the cities that will take the form of a tax assessment, while in other communities there will be a quarterly charge per house

Operation costs for the first year are estimated to be \$780,000.

The plant, built by the Barton-Malow Company/Affilated Incinerator Corporation, is equipped with the lat-

an intake fan which creates a vacuum that draws the air of the five Grosse Pointes the odors permeate the atmosphere. Special water spray scrubbers actually wash the odors from the gases before release through the stack.

Will Emit Steam

Stack emissions noticeable at the top of the stack will be largely steam vapor result-ing from the large quantity of water processing in the spray chambers.

The building is designed and insulated so that operating noises will be absorbed within the building itself.

A planned giant wood chipper attachment will permit the facility in 90 seconds to convert a 20-inch diameter tree into shreds, which the furnace can readily consume. Studies are also under way to use the shreds in the manufacture of paper, chipboard and other industries, which would result in great-

er economies of operation. The 600-ton-per-day capacity plant, twice as much as is currently needed by the communities, has been planned to accommodate the projected population of the area 25 years from now.

Will Sell Excess Plans are under way to sell the excess capacity until it is needed by the eight communities themselves.

Process Described The following is a step-bystep process, designed to provide maximum refuse burnout with minimal pollution side effects:

At the plant entrance, each truck is weighed on a 50-ton scale; the tonnage, date and origin of the load is tabuulated and electronically recorded on a weigh-slip. The truck enters the "tipping" room and dumps its contents into storage pits, which has a 1,200-ton, or two-day capaci-

The refuse is taken from the pit by a high speed overhead crane and dumped into one of two continuous feed hoppers. Back-and-forth action of hydraulic furnace grates carry the refuse slow-ly and steadily through the primary combustion chamber. Combustion is controlled by automatic dampers regulated by an electric eye, which detects flame color and allows the proper amount of air to enter the combustion chamber.

Mr. West said that if the court ultimately decided that mid-year implementation is essential, the cluster selected for first priority should be solely identified on a random basis unless the Panel can provide objective reasons to the contrary.

tention relates to the Panel's recommendation that the kindergarten desegregation take place for the first full year ('73-'74) in only one speci-fied cluster, Cluster B, which includes Pointe Schools. One other cluster would be selected under the Panel's proposal, to share in the distinction of having first year kindergarten desegration, but only for one semester of the first year. This other cluster, however, would be designated by the State Superintendent of Public Instruc-

Mr. West said that the Panel itself, by not proposing kindergarten desegregation in '73-'74, except on an experimentation basis in one cluster full-time and one cluster half-time, acknow-ledged the many problems inherent in the transportation of kindergarten children

from their neighborhoods. "That only Cluster B should be specifically and intentionally identified for special treatment, without explanation of the reasons for the choice, smacks of bias and punitive treatment with respect to the kindergarten children who live within Cluster B," he added.

Time To End Experiment

Grosse Pointe City appears to have been given the short end of the stick in a pilot program of mu-tual aid which has been participated in by the fire departments of the City, Farms and Park since mid-

Under the program all first alarms, except for fires of ϵ minor nature, have the following response under a directive—if the blaze is in The City, The Park would respond to all locations from Cadieux road to and including Lakeland avenue; and The Farms would respond to all locations from Fisher road to University place. If the blaze occurs in either The Farms or Park, The City responds to any location within the entire boundaries of either of those municipalities. The first alarm response consists of one engine or ladder company with a minimum of three firefighters by the assisting city.

It doesn't take an Einstein to figure out what an eminently unfair arrangement this is for The City. Talk about being "Caught in the middle!"

The NEWS has been keeping a running score on the results of the agreement since its inception. The latest tabulation shows that up to date the City firemen have made 43 runs to respond to alarms from the Park and Farms, while only six runs have been made to the City by the fire-fighters of those two municipalities. During the same period the City has also made 15 additional runs under the mutual aid pact which exists between all the Pointes and Harper Woods.

It is small wonder that the members of the City Fire Department are a bit disgruntled. They have certainly been the fall guys in this strange distri-bution of responsibility. Residents of The City are (or should be), equally concerned, for every time their firemen make a run out of their own municipality, it means less protection for their own homes. | *

It would seem that five months is a sufficiently long period in which to conduct this experiment in sharing. The box score would appear to dictate that it is high time to call off... "the whole thing!"
