Thursday, September 14 A SOVIET SOURCE reported that an agreement in principle has been reached on Moscow's outstanding \$500 million World War II lend-lease debt, with payments to be made over 30 years, extending into the 21st Century. The first indi-cations of the agreement came yesterday during negotiations between Henry A. Kissinger and Russian leaders, indicating a break-through in previous dead-locked talks on expanded American-Soviet trade. The Nixon administration had demanded a settlement of the lend-lease debt, for supplies and services rendered to the USSR civilian economy during World War II.

Friday, September 15
THE U.S. SENATE approved a five-year Soviet-American agreement to slow the arms race, but served notice that the pact would be unacceptable as the basis for a permanent treaty. The agreement sets a limit, for the first time, on the number of offensive missiles deployed by the two superpowers. The approval was passed by an 87-2 vote. The new treaty, which was signed by President Nixon when he was in Moscow last May, would limit the number and size of land-based mis-sile launchers and submarine launched missiles.

Russia, without naming the United States, condemned the Israeli thrust, and charged America with "playing with fire" by encouraging Israel's strikes against the Arab nations.

Tuesday, September 19 PRESIDENT NIXON took steps Monday to increase by 35 percent the daily level of United States oil imports. The move was hailed by oil companies as a step toward avoiding what they believe could be an impending shortage of gasoline and fuel oil. The President issued a proclamation relaxing import quotas on oil in the districts east of the Rocky Mountains. This move will increase by 624,000 barrels the daily import allowance for all types of petroleum products for the last three months of 1972. able to determine the exact

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
(Continued from Page 1) type of property. If the damage is under \$100, it is a misdemeanor, conviction of which could bring a sentence 90 days in jail and a fine of \$100, or both, according to a local ordinance.

If the damage is \$100 or more then it becomes a felony, conviction which can bring up to four years in

prison under a State law.

In the case of the Sunday night incident, he pointed out, if the vandals were arrested and convicted, they would be charged and tried on 14 different courts, not on the sum total of damage inflicted.

"Just add that up," Dun-can said. "This means that if these vandals had been caught and convicted, they could be sentenced to 90 days on each count, which comes to more than three years in jail for each of these hoodlums. The fines could total \$1,400 apiece. Not only that, but they could be sued for recovery of damage payments by the insur-ance companies."

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

Center Point **Needs Helpers**

To fill the need for volunteers at Center Point, the Crisis Intervention Center at 7150 Maumee will conduct concentrated training course which started Monday, September 18.

Six sessions will be held during a two-week period. Sessions will be conducted by leading figures in law, law enforcement, psychiatry and medicine. They will cover such subjects as bow to counsel people with drug related problems, social and personal disturbances, runaways, VD, pregnancy and other subjects confronting our youth. Center Point maintains

an open line almost around the clock, "The phones are manned by staff and volunteers," said Tom Geisz, Cen-ter Pointe Coordinator. "Last year we handled approximately 80 calls a week. And ve encountered everything from bad trips to potential suicides. But we desperately need volunteers if we are to continue." Anyone of high school age or older is wel-

YSD Handles 55 Complaints

The Youth Service Division (YSD) of the five Pointes handled some 55 complaints during the month of August, a decrease of seven compared to the month of July.

The two leading categories of complaints were runaways and violations of the controlled substance act. Eleven runaways were reported, including eight girls. At this writing 10 of the 11 have re-

Eighteen boys and two girls were involved in the 11 violations of the controlled substance act. (A complaint not reflected in these figures is the raid conducted by the United States Customs Department, two Youth Service Division officers and a Grosse Pointe City Officer. This raid resulted in the arrest of two Park residents and the confiscation of about one-half pound of marijuana and miscellaneous pills).

Eighteen applications for petition were filed with the Wayne County Juvenile Court during the month of August: two runaways, nine larcenies, three breaking and entries, two violations of controlled substance act, one disorderly person and one for posses-

sion of stolen property.
Of these applications, two vere authorized for Juvenile Court action, three were placed on probation, and four were referred to Macomb County Juvenile Court for lisposition.

Here is a breakdown of he total cases handled by YSD in August: 11 violations of the controlled substance act, 11 runaways, nine larcenies, four stolen property laws, our non-criminal contacts, three malicious destruction of property, three other criminal contacts, two assaults, two burglaries, and one each of auto theft, violation of weapons law, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, curfew and loitering and family couble.

Whole families riding their bicycles along our streets in pleasant weather, all obeying the safety laws, make a heart-warming picture. Coming suddenly upon a group, usually riding abreast, on bikes with no lights, no reflectors, in the darkness of night, is a frightening experience.
