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POINTERS WIN CANADA CUP

Thursday, September 14
A SOVIET SOURCE reported that an agreement in principle has been reached on Moscow's outstanding \$500 million World War II lend-lease debt, with payments to be made over 30 years, extending into the 21st Century. The first indications of the agreement came yesterday during negotiations between Henry A. Kissinger and Russian leaders, indicating a breakthrough in previous deadlocked talks on expanded American-Soviet trade. The Nixon administration had demanded a settlement of the lend-lease debt, for supplies and services rendered to the USSR civilian economy during World War II.

Friday, September 15
THE U.S. SENATE approved a five-year Soviet-American agreement to slow the arms race, but served notice that the pact would be unacceptable as the basis for a permanent treaty. The agreement sets a limit, for the first time, on the number of offensive missiles deployed by the two superpowers. The approval was passed by an 87-2 vote. The new treaty, which was signed by President Nixon when he was in Moscow last May, would limit the number and size of land-based missile launchers and submarine launched missiles.

Saturday, September 16
SWEDEN, UNDER threats by three Croatian hijackers who said they would blow up a jetliner with 87 passengers aboard, freed seven Croatian separatists from prison. The hijackers had threatened a Munich-style massacre if the prisoners were not released. The authorities begin exchanging the passengers for the prisoners at the airport in Malmö following hours of negotiations.

Sunday, September 17
ISRAELI ARMED forces invaded tiny Lebanon yesterday, sweeping across a large part of the southern section of the country. The Israelis, reported to have been in brigade strength, 3,000 troops and armored units backed by air support, were met with resistance by Lebanese military and Palestinian commandos. Lebanon's stand came as a surprise to the Israelis because in previous raids, allegedly against guerrillas using Lebanese bases as headquarters, Lebanon stood aside to permit the raids.

Monday, September 18
ISRAELI TROOPS pulled out of southern Lebanon, leaving a trail of destruction in raids that encompassed an area of 130 miles. The Israelis said they had accomplished their massive search and destroy mission against Palestinian commandos they charged were based in Lebanon. The Israeli command claimed that 60 Lebanese soldiers were killed or wounded, and that an undetermined number of Palestinian guerrillas were killed or captured and homes and automobiles destroyed in many villages. Russia, without naming the United States, condemned the Israeli thrust, and charged America with "playing with fire" by encouraging Israel's strikes against the Arab nations.

Tuesday, September 19
PRESIDENT NIXON took steps Monday to increase by 35 percent the daily level of United States oil imports. The move was hailed by oil companies as a step toward avoiding what they believe could be an impending shortage of gasoline and fuel oil. The President issued a proclamation relaxing import quotas on oil in the districts east of the Rocky Mountains. This move will increase by 624,000 barrels the daily import allowance for all types of petroleum products for the last three months of 1972.

Set Up Meetings To Air Problems Faced by Schools

Thursday Afternoon Sessions Scheduled with Students, Teachers, Residents Sharing Views With Superintendent

Dr. Theos I. Anderson, Superintendent of Schools, has announced a series of informal Thursday afternoon meetings to discuss concerns about Grosse Pointe's public schools and public libraries.

Dr. Anderson said that he is initiating the series of meetings with those most affected by the day-to-day operation of the public schools and public libraries in an attempt to improve communications between the system and its many publics. Special dates are reserved for community residents, teachers and other staff members, and students.

The first of the meetings, for students at the middle and high school level, has been scheduled for 3:45 p.m. on Thursday, September 21. The informal series of discussions will be held in the Board Room of the school system's Administration Building, 389 St. Clair avenue, or at other pre-determined locations in the community.

Second for Residents
The second question-and-answer session in the series, slated for Thursday, September 28, will be open to residents of the school district. It will begin at 3:45 p.m. and will last until 5 p.m.—or later if attendance and interest warrant.

The third group to have an opportunity for a series of meetings with Dr. Anderson are teachers and other staff members in the system. The first of the times designated for them is 3:45 p.m. on Thursday, October 12.

The year's schedule of monthly meetings for students includes discussions on the following Thursdays: October 19, November 16, December 14, January 18, February 15, March 22, April 12, May 24, and June 14.

Times set aside for community residents are October 26, November 30, December 21, January 25, February 22, March 29, April 19, May 31, and June 21.

Dates for the Superintendent's meeting with teachers and other staff members are November 9, December 7, January 11, February 8, March 15, April 5, May 17, and June 7.

Request Late Students to Enroll Now

Registration Prior to September 29 Necessary to Get Financial Aid from State

Officials of The Grosse Pointe Public School System are making a community-wide appeal to alert students intending to enroll for the 1972-73 year, but who may not have yet done so, to complete their registration prior to Friday, September 29. Enrollment on that date, the fourth Friday after Labor Day, is used by the State of Michigan in computing financial aid to public schools.

Unofficial enrollment figures for Friday, September 15, after five full days of school, place the district's total at 12,318 students, a decrease of 1,082 from the last day of school in June.

The decline in enrollment amounts to 669 pupils among the district's 10 elementary buildings, 253 in the three middle schools and 160 in the senior high schools.

The unofficial mid-September enrollment figure represents a decrease of 151 students from the total of 13,469 at the same time a year ago.

Ecclestone Sloop Takes Tight Series

Dynamite Defeats Mirage in Tie-breaking Fourth Race on Lake Ontario Off Toronto

The Canada Cup has come home.

For Pointer Llywd Ecclestone Jr.'s 39-foot custom sloop Dynamite defeated Gordon Fisher's Mirage by a minute Saturday, September 16, in the fourth and tie-breaking race of the cup series, to bring the coveted trophy to Detroit.

The Canada Cup is THE cup in Great Lakes sailing and the win for Mr. Ecclestone and his largely Pointe crew was a dream come true. Toronto's Royal Canadian Yacht Club held the trophy since 1954. Now the cup moves to Detroit's Bayview Yacht Club for three years.

This victory was the third for Dynamite in light to medium air over five legs of a 21-mile triangular course on Lake Ontario. Although leading by one minute and 35 seconds starting the last leg, Dynamite had to withstand the late challenge of the Canadian defender.

Successful Trials
Mr. Ecclestone's boat successfully completed the final trial races Friday, August 25, to reach the top when it ended its selection series with Frank Piku's Aggressive with a win in a 21-mile short-course race.

That triumph highlighted an outstanding comeback by Dynamite and its crew. In its first race against Aggressive Thursday, August 10, Dynamite broke her spar while holding a 30-second lead.

"The crew's spirits were right around their shoelaces," said Mike Tapert, Mr. Ecclestone's navigator and right hand man. "We never thought we'd get back soon enough to be a contender." But they did.

The first job was to repair the spar. Ron Pollen, an expert spar repairman, and Warren Jones, who supplied parts, flew in from Detroit. Ted Hood, Dynamite's designer, flew to Toronto from Marblehead, Mass., with a crew of three.

Comes from Behind
Around the clock work got Dynamite in shape, and a short time later she was ready to sail, although not in top condition. "We didn't have time to get her tuned just right," Mr. Tapert explained.

Aggressive won the second race for a 2-0 lead, and needed just three points to win the final selection trial. But from then on, the series was ruled by Dynamite. She won two short-course races and evened the series at 2-2. In the next race, Dynamite sailed to victory by 7:35 in the 140-mile contest.

Woods Divulges Factors Behind Decision to Stop Support of SEMTA

City Administrator's Letter to Manager Thomas Lipscomb Cites Reasons; Lines Up Meetings to Straighten Things Out

Five paramount factors were cited by Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen regarding his city's "Notice of Intent" to discontinue participation and subsidization of the Lake Shore Coach Lines after the present operational contract's termination on December 31, 1972. He presented these factors in a letter to Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority, (SEMTA), General Manager Thomas H. Lipscomb.

Mr. Petersen's letter, along with a reply from Mr. Lipscomb, were items on the council agenda at the regular meeting Monday, September 11. The council unanimously agreed to meet with a SEMTA representative in the near future as Mr. Lipscomb requested in a letter to Mayor Kenneth McLeod. The vote was 5-0 with Mayor McLeod and Councilman Kenneth W. Boerner absent.

The council unanimously voted discontinuance of participation at the August 21 regular meeting.

Reasons for Decision
In his letter, Mr. Petersen said many factors prompted the council's action but the following items "were paramount to their decision":

• Probable requirement for the purchase of a minimum of at least six new buses, (6 x \$45,000 x 27 percent = \$72,900, The Woods' share), within the next year and without state or federal aid. (The five Pointes and St. Clair Shores pay a percent-

age of the \$5,000 per month operating subsidy to SEMTA, if needed, which it has been. The Woods pays 27 percent; St. Clair Shores, 25; The Park, 20; The Farms, 16; The City, eight, and The Shores, four. Thus The Woods' share of any new purchase would be 27 percent.

• Estimated 100 percent increase in annual operational deficit if vehicle depreciation and/or amortization plan is effectuated without state or federal aid.

• Failure of Lake Shore Division to supply the city with accurate and verified ridership statistics.

• Failure of the Division to review certain bus routes within the city as per agreement.

• Failure of the Division to seek recommendations from the Lake Shore Advisory Committee on the establishment of new services (Continued on Page 4)

type of property. If the damage is under \$100, it is a misdemeanor, conviction of which could bring a sentence of 90 days in jail and a fine of \$100, or both, according to a local ordinance.
If the damage is \$100 or more then it becomes a felony, conviction which can bring up to four years in prison under a State law.
In the case of the Sunday night incident, he pointed out, if the vandals were arrested and convicted, they would be charged and tried on 14 different counts, not on the sum total of damage inflicted.
"Just add that up," Duncan said. "This means that if these vandals had been caught and convicted, they could be sentenced to 90 days on each count, which comes to more than three years in jail for each of these hoodlums. The fines could total \$1,400 apiece. Not only that, but they could be sued for recovery of damage payments by the insurance companies."

Mr. Ecclestone has called the Canada Cup challenge "the greatest fresh water sailing event they have. I've been planning on this since the Bermuda race two years ago."
Dynamite, which was christened at Bayview on June 1, was built by Frans Maas Yacht Works, Jachtwerf, Breskens, Holland. Its statistics include beam, 11 1/2 feet; draft, 3 1/2 feet; displacement, 16,500 pounds; ballast, 8,500 pounds; sail area, 800 square feet, and length water line, 32 feet.
The crew and back-ups include Robert R. Coddens, Bruce Davenport, Daniel P. Dyer, Kurt Lietz, Hazen Pingree, Fred Schroeder, Thomas C. Schumaker, Clune Walsh, Jr., Tim Woodhouse, and Mr. Tapert.
Dynamite was berthed at the Grosse Pointe Club marina all summer before going to Toronto for the Cup Series against Mirage. Her owner and his family were at the Jefferson Apartments, which Mr. Ecclestone built.

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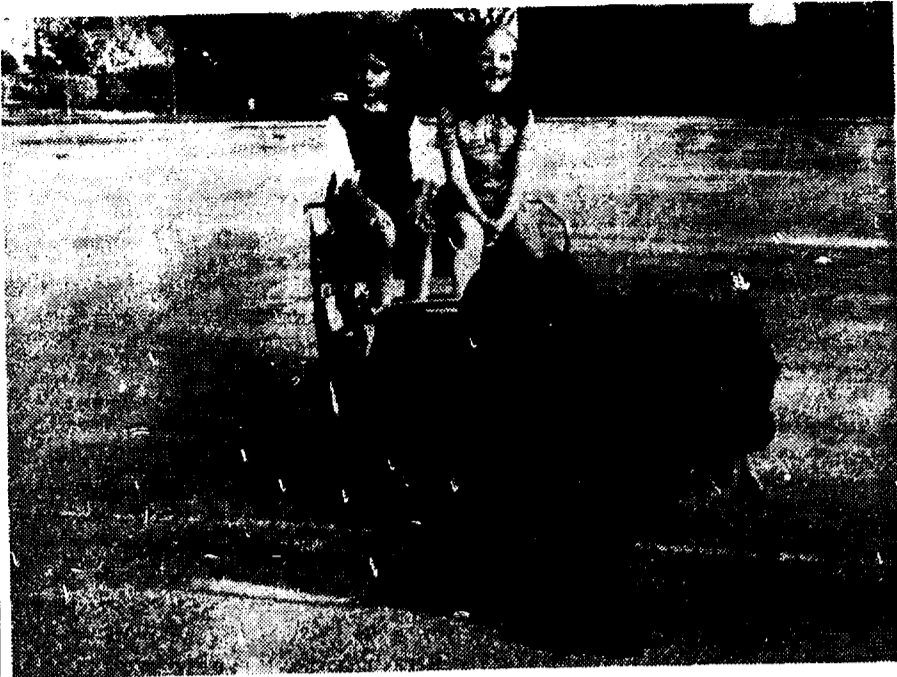

Center Point Needs Helpers

To fill the need for volunteers at Center Point, the Crisis Intervention Center at 17150 Maumee will conduct a concentrated training course which started Monday, September 18.

Six sessions will be held during a two-week period. Sessions will be conducted by leading figures in law, law enforcement, psychiatry and medicine. They will cover such subjects as how to counsel people with drug related problems, social and personal disturbances, runaways, VD, pregnancy and other subjects confronting our youth.

Center Point maintains an open line almost around the clock. "The phones are manned by staff and volunteers," said Tom Geisz, Center Pointe Coordinator. "Last year we handled approximately 80 calls a week. And we encountered everything from bad trips to potential suicides. But we desperately need volunteers if we are to continue." Anyone of high school age or older is welcome.

Center Point also provides a free medical clinic every Tuesday and Friday from 7 until 9 p.m. The clinic is staffed by 15 doctors and nurses who volunteer their time and share the work. Anyone needing these clinical services should call 881-8576.

Center Point is sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Family Life Education Council (FLEC).

An old problem resurfaced, although with less intensity, when the Woods Council considered bids for an ornamental masonry wall at the city parking lot east of Mack avenue and south of Hampton road. In action taken at the regular meeting Monday, September 11, consideration of bids was tabled for a future date.

The problem was one raised by numerous residents at a May meeting. At that time they expressed concern over noise, littering and obscene language at the Hampton and Mack parking lot. A nearby beauty salon's loud speaker was an added irritation, along with the "coming and going" of Lochmoor Lounge patrons during the evening.

In an effort to soothe resident nerves, the city administration considered erecting a masonry wall to cut down on blowing debris, flashing car lights, et al. However, Mr. and Mrs. Michael Sarmy affected by the "area action" told the council they're happy with a chain-link fence, with a green barrier, which they have now, although they expressed a need for six to 12 more trees along the fence line.

While they said the overall noise in the area is some better, the parking lot remained a sore spot. They came in hopes of obtaining council action to close the lot during late hours. They added they were speaking only for themselves, not other area residents.

As a result, the council unanimously agreed to table action on the bids, consider heavier police surveillance between 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. at the lot and more shrubs along the fence line. The vote was 6-0 with Mayor Kenneth McLeod absent. City Administrator Chester E. Petersen is scheduled to follow up on this.

(Continued from Page 1) for which the participating communities may have to assume a pro-rata share of any operational deficiencies. SEMTA's Reply In his reply on the requirement for purchase of new equipment and the estimated increase in the operational deficit, Mr. Lipscomb said SEMTA will make a presentation to the next Advisory Board meeting including an estimate of capital and operational requirements for 1973. "The funding of these

requirements will depend to a large extent on the status of the Governor's Transportation Package," he noted. Daniel D. Morrill, assistant operations manager, has previously told the NEWS if the package is passed by the state legislature and signed by Governor William G. Milliken, SEMTA would receive between eight million and thirteen and a half million dollars annually. The bill is currently bogged down in the five member Senate Highway Committee. If and when the bill is released from the committee, who have held a series of public hearings on it, is difficult to say.

Judge Speer Has Busiest Month Since Taking Oath

Park Municipal Judge William E. Speer heard more cases in his court during August than in any month since he assumed office in July 1970, according to official records. He rendered judgment on 166 traffic matters and collected fines totaling \$2,910.

In addition to the local cases, the judge heard four state matters and two civil suits.

Representing The Park on all the court dates, were Assistant City Attorneys Herold M. Deason and Michael Stefani. The records for August

showed that 49 persons were found guilty and ordered to pay fines; 18 were found not guilty; eight persons accused were found guilty, but given suspended sentences; and five others were given jail terms ranging from three to 30 days.

Sixteen motorists had their operator's licenses suspended from a minimum of 30 days to a maximum of 90 days; 29 persons forfeited bonds when they failed to appear in answer to summonses; and 19 others convicted of charges were placed on probation for from six months to one year.

Eighteen individuals who failed to keep their scheduled court dates, were permitted to pay their fines the following day at the Violation Bureau and 17 others who failed to come to court, had their records sent to the Secretary of State's office in Lansing.

Judge Speer signed bench warrants for the arrest of 53 traffic violators who did not show up for hearings on their scheduled dates.

Two persons appealed their sentences to the Circuit Court and posted bonds for their appearances at that court. Three others accused, who were found guilty, were ordered to attend the Grosse Pointe Driver and Safety School.

In the four State cases heard by Judge Speer, one person was sent to jail for 30 days; two were bound over to Circuit Court for further proceedings; and one case was dismissed.

In the civil suits, judgment was rendered in one, and the second was dismissed.

The knowledge gained from this training will be passed on to the Department personnel, Chief Costa said, as well as any other future associated courses. This is to keep the Park firemen up to date on all first aid techniques for better service to the community's citizens, the chief added.

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**Community College Tax
Raises Hackles in Woods**

By Roger A. Waha
Three resolutions regarding tax rates and levy were on the Woods' council agenda at the regular meeting Monday, September 11. Two were unanimously received and placed on file. But the other resolution raised the council's temperature above normal, and was unanimously referred to the Committee of the Whole for further study. The votes were 5-0 with Mayor Kenneth McLeod and Councilman Kenneth W. Boerner absent, respectively.

That resolution was one adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Wayne County Community College District August 23, authorizing monies to be raised by taxation for the district in 1972.

The board levied the rate of .25 mills on the district's taxable property for a total tax of \$2,592,755.64. The tax is apportioned among the several cities, townships and fractions of cities and townships of the district, with the state equalized value of this district being \$10,371,022,277.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen said this was the levy that the voters turned down twice before. If the millage proposal was defeated for a third time, the college would dissolve, noted City Attorney George Catlin. The state legislature put a rider on another bill permitting the tax levy without voter approval, Mr. Catlin added.

A sizzling Mayor Pro Tem Marvin R. Boutin felt the council should oppose the "tactics" used to require funding and added, "What's to prevent them from coming back with another increase in the future?" He was concerned because voters had earlier disapproved the millage proposals and, at it turned out, the district received the tax levy anyway. Mr. Boutin was angered by this type of legislative action.

The resolution shows the Woods' tax total as \$36,108.64; The Park, \$21,273.02; The Farms, \$26,147.85; The City, \$1,418.71 and

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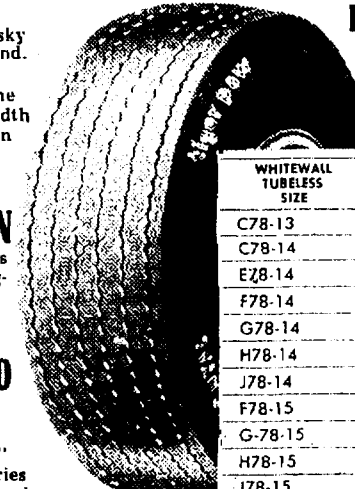

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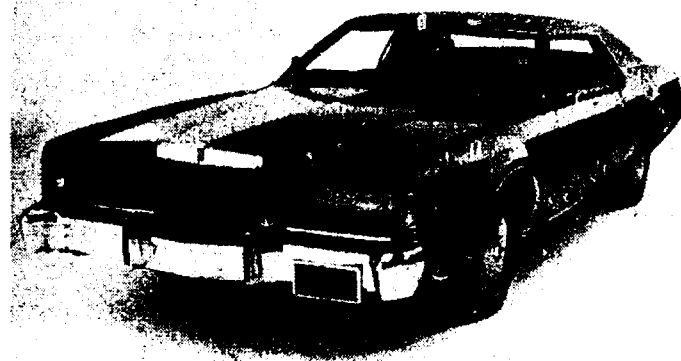
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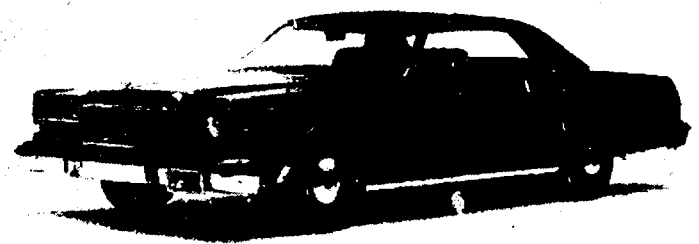
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Radio Burglar Caught in Act

Two Board of Appeals hearings were wrapped up at the Woods regular council meeting Monday, September 11. Both petitioners received unanimous council approval on their requests. The vote was 5-0 with Mayor Kenneth McLeod and Councilman Kenneth W. Boerner absent.

The first hearing was reconvened from the regular meeting Monday, August 21. This was on a request from the Concord Circle Company, 869 Lake Shore road, to use the rear of lot seven, east of 1952 Hawthorne avenue and adjacent to the north-south alley at the rear of 20825 Mack avenue, for off-street parking.

Concord's Norman E. Kleinert wished to improve the lot's rear portion with paved asphalt for the parking of six cars. The company also desired to improve lot eight with a single family residence of Cape Cod or Colonial design. Both lots are part of the Beaufait, Koch, Tessmar subdivision.

At the August 21 meeting, some residents expressed concern about litter and lot maintenance, and wished specific proposals to be made. In the meantime, Mr. Kleinert and City Attorney

George Catlin worked on the matter.

An agreement was ultimately reached, plus a proposed "declaration of use restrictions" and proposed performance bond. It was reported for instance, that the home and parking lot would be constructed simultaneously. And with the specifics reached, the neighbors voiced no objection to Concord's proposals.

In the second half of the hearings "double-header," the request of Bessert Builders, Inc., 555 Saddle lane, was quickly approved.

Bessert had asked for a variance in rear yard requirements to permit an addition to a residence at 903 Crescent lane. The owner proposes to construct a summer, unheated enclosed addition, (12'x16'), off his kitchen in the rear of the garage.

Mr. Bessert told the council that both neighbors, (on each side of the residence), had no objection to the addition.

Following luncheon at her home, Grosse Pointe South High School Mothers Club President Mrs. Albert Dickson, Jr., opened the September 11 meeting of her executive board on an optimistic note, suggesting that "we dwell on what is good in our school system."

Mrs. Dickson thanked Social Chairman Mrs. William Kennedy and her co-chairmen, Mrs. Richard Rohr, for preparing the salad buffet. She also expressed appreciation to all who helped mail literature concerning the millage election, as well as to Mailing Chairman Mrs. Richard Hinks. On August 22, Mrs. Hinks and her committee stuffed, addressed and sealed 2,409 packets, which were mailed to the families of each student.

Scholarships Awarded
Scholarship Chairman Mrs. Donald Briggs announced that 20 students, originally, were awarded grants totaling \$8,600 during the 1971-72 year.

Of this amount, \$6,200 was administered by the Mothers Club including awards from the Optimist Club and Alpha Kappa Delta, each for \$500. The remaining \$1,900 was in the form of awards based on Mothers Club recommendations, but administered by the Grosse Pointe Women's Club, which donated \$300 to a student, and Grosse Pointe Rotary, which donated two scholarships of \$800 each.

Eight young people have already received the first half of their grants. Others will follow as college registrations continue.

Mrs. Benson McClure, Faculty Representative, reported that school seems to be starting well, that calm prevailed, and that all attitudes were superb—in spite of the difficulty in scheduling.

Prior to the opening of school, students went at specified hours to receive their schedules. Those of all ninth and tenth graders had been revised to restore gym periods and lunch hours.

Eleventh and twelfth graders who wish to add subjects, (up to six), will be

doing so during the first week of school.

Mrs. McClure reported there are approximately 2,400 students enrolled at Grosse Pointe South this fall, with a staff of 110 professionals. Parking is still at a premium, due to construction work.

Stricter Attendance Requirements

According to Principal Jerry Gerich, attendance requirements will be more strictly enforced this year. As noted in the student handbook, no doctor or dental appointments should be planned during school hours, because of the shortened school day.

Only three time periods of excused absence can be accepted during a marking quarter — these "periods" may vary, however, from one hour to several days.

Only illness, death, illness in the family or family emergencies will be classified as excused.

Family trips should be pre-arranged with a counselor at least two full days in advance. Teachers will not facilitate make-up of work missed during these absences, however.
