(Continued from Page 1) at least 275 cars. The City Stadium. will operate the parking lot for public parking purposes for not less than 20 years.

The exits and entrances will be on Notre Dame or St. Clair depending on the advice of the City's Public Safety Department and Reid, Cool and Michalski, traffic engineer consultants.

Jacobson's in turn will pay the City \$10,000 annually be ginning September 1, 1973, and for the next succeeding nine years. Jacobson's also agrees to present parking validation practices for not less than 20 years from July

Will Share Costs The agreement also provides that Jacobson's will pay not less than \$75,000 and more than \$100,000 toward the cost of building the ramp over the next 10 years. The exact amount of payments will be based on parking income earned from the ramp.

In order to finance the parking structure, the City formed The Grosse Pointe Building Authority on April 17, 1972. This permits the City to enter into a lease whereby the Authority will sell bonds for building the parking structure, then lease the structure to the City. The City would then pay annual leasing payments sufficient to meet the bond principal and interest costs.

On June 19 of this year John Hammond was named chairman of the Authority, David Robb, secretary and Dennis Foran, treasurer.





"We have a policy of not issuing a violation unless a resident complains," Mr. Bremer explained. Once the city hears of a complaint, the offender is sent a notice that the mobile unit must be moved in 10 days, or the offender will receive a violation.

At present, there are two Farms residents who have refused to conform to The Farms ordinance and face court dates this month. The Farms ruling is part of the city's Schedule of Regulations, adopted in 1963, which requires that any large mobie unit be sheltered in a fully-enclosed structure.

However, The Farms is in a bind as any resident can get around the ordinance by playing a bit of mobile home hopscotch. A neighbor can complain, the offender can be sent a notice, yet the offender can move his trailer on the weekend (thus he has moved the trailer within the 10-day grace period.) ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 12, GARBAGE AND RUBBISH, OF TITLE II, UTILITIES AND SERVICES, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINT PARK ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 12 entitled "Garbage and Rubbish" of Title II, Utilities and Services, of the Grosse Pointe Park Ordinance Code is hereby amended by adding thereto the following Section:
"Section 2.15 Disposal of Household

Articles

(a) "Household article" means any appliance, furniture or other personal property used in or on residential premises, excluding furnaces and components thereof, motor vehicles of any kind, boats, trailers, and the like. "Major household article" means any household article which weighs more than twenty-five (25) pounds.

(b) Household articles other than major household articles shall be disposed of by residents in the same manner as they dispose of other trash.

(c) Major household articles shall be disposed of according to the following procedures:
(1) The resident shall call the Department of Public Service to request pick-up of the

major household article. (2) The Department of Public Service shall schedule a date for pick-up, treating requests on a first come-first served basis.

(3) The resident shall place such major household article at the curb in front of his resident or on his property abutting the alley either on the date scheduled for pick-up by the Department of Public Service or after six o'clock P.M. of the day preceding such pick-up

(4) No major household article should be set out for City pick-up except in accordance with the foregoing procedure.

Section 2. The effective date of this Ordinance is October 16, 1972.




