

Thursday, October 5 BASEBALL FEVER has struck all of Michigan because of the rousing 3 to 1 victory by the Tigers Tuesday night over the Boston Red Sox. The victory gave the Bengals the American League Eastern title. They now face the Cakland A's in a series of playoff games for the American League championship.

Friday, October 6 THE FREIGHTER NAVI-SHIPPER, under Greek registration, collided head on with the ore carrier Arthur B. Homer after 11 a.m. yesterday in open water near Grosse Ile. The U. S. Coast Guard said the Greek ship was plying the Detroit River without a Great Lakes pilot aboard as required by law. The 437-foot long Navishipper literally climbed the prow of the larger carrier. The Hom-er's bridge was damaged about 50 feet above the waterline. Both vessels suffered extensive damage from deckline to below the waterline but neither was in danger of sinking. No one was hurt. Coast Guard officials said the Navishipper skipper faces a penalty of up to \$500 for the no-pilot offense.

Saturday, October 7 MARY GRIBBS, a heroic young school teacher, kicked her way out of a bread van, thwarting a million-dollar kidnapping of herself and six of her pupils, all girls, ranging in age from 5 to 11 years old. 

Mr. Lipscomb told the NEWS the council was presented with an expected deficit of \$83,000 for 1973 if bus fares remain the same. "This could be decreased if fares could be raised," he said.

He also noted as part of a program for improvement equipment the proposed purchase of the buses which would cost \$295,000. About two-thirds of the cost would be federally financed (\$197,-000), with the other third, (\$98,000), being billed to local communities via their

percentage breakdown. The five Pointes and St. Clair Shores pay a percentage of the \$5,000 per month needed for the quarter of April, May and June in the deficit amount of \$15,162. The Woods pay 27 percent; St. Clair Shores, 25; The Park, 20; The Farms, 16; The City, eight, and The Shores,





To Crack Down On Probationers

Park Municipal Judge William E. Speer, who has charged that services of the Wayne County Circuit Court Probation Department has been denied to the municipal courts in The Pointe area. tolerate this denial.

In a letter to the NEWS, dated October 6, Judge Speer said he will initiate a procedure, which, it is hoped, will enable his court to keep a closer scrutiny upon de-fendants who have been placed on probation.

"Today (October 6), I am sending a list of 54 names to the police departments of all of the Pointes, as well as Harper Woods," he stated. 'The list contains the names of persons who have been placed on probation to this court since May 1, 1972, and the date upon which the probation period terminates."

The judge stated further, that the list will be supple-mented from time to time.

Other communities, as Royal Oak, Oak Park, Huntington Woods, also have similar laws.

He pointed out that the ordinance is not as strict as Dearborn's and other north-Woodward cities, nor does it compare with FHA, which takes a hard line, or should, under the wording of the Federal Law, whereby a stringent inspection is made before the government will approve an application for a loan to buy a house.

It appeared that the people in the audience feared that the Park ordinance was an invasion of private property, whereby government steps in and dictates to the owner to whom and when to sell or

All parents will be informed by letter of the results of the examination. The victims leg was scraped and bruised but did not require medical attention. Before leaving, Officer Pilon checked the manhole cover to be sure that it was ifirmly in place.

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
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

Howes posted a \$150 bond and is scheduled to appear in court November 13.


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



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One View From The Capitol

The present Michigan statute says abortion is legal only to save the life of the mother. Normal medical practice, however, has also included D and C procedures in case of rape. Recent court decisions, though not by our Supreme Court, ruled the present statute unconstitutional. The law is now in limbo.

Proposal B would allow abortion, at the choice of the woman, up to 20 weeks, by a physician in a licensed facility.

Arguments for change include (1) present law may be unconstitutionally restrictive, (2) abortion is available in other states to those with funds to enable them to pay the travel costs, and this is economic discrimination, (3) abortion is a personal matter and should not be the subject

Arguments against Proposal B include (1) human life begins at conception and abortion is a taking of human life, (2) such taking cheapens life and is therefore a major threat to a society based on the worth of the individual, (3) abortion is an unacceptable answer to an unwanted pregnancy which should not have occurred and (4) adoption for well and handicapped babies is available and a better answer for all,

There are many more arguments pro and con on this emotional and critical issue. But the central issue is the question - is an unborn embryo, or fetus a human being and, if so, with what rights?

I do not support Proposal B though I do support major change in the law. I have supported allowing abortion up to 12 weeks, but I would also support granting full constitutional rights to unborn and judging whether they are "alive" by the same criteria we now use to establish whether "death" has occurred, including especially, brain waves.

One major problem, other than the basic moral questions, with Proposal B is that it was presented by initiative petition. This means that if it is adopted, the legislature cannot repeal or even amend the law except by a threefourth vote in both houses of the legislature, an almost impossible requirement.

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

In September, he rendered judgements on 125 cases. Total fines collected came to a total of \$2,920.

During this month, the judge ordered 43 persons to pay fines and costs; found two persons guilty of charges made against them and sentenced each to 10 days in the Detroit House of Correction: and found 16 persons not guilty as charged. When 38 accused persons failed to appear before him in response to summones,

Judge Speer ordered their bonds forfeited. He allowed 17 citizens who were a day late in paying fines to pay them the following day at the Violation Bureau. Seven persons were placed on probation, ranging from six months to one year; five others had their operator's licenses suspended from a

minimum of 30 days to a maximum of 90 days. Two of the accused found guilty were allowed to appeal their sentences to the Circuit Court after posting bonds. Six motorists, who were found guilty of traffic violations, were given suspended sentences because of past

excellent records. Another accused person was freed for lack of a complainant. Judge Speer signed bench warrants for the arrest of 71

persons who failed to appear on their court dates. Two State matters were heard by the judge, resulting in one of the accused receiving a suspended sentence, and the other being placed on probation for six months.


