THE U.S. COMMAND apologized to the French Government and promised a full investigation in the alleged bombing of the French Diplomatic Mission in Hanoi. The Mission was badly damaged and its chief diplomat wounded during a U.S. air bombing raid on the North Vietnamese capital yesterday. The U.S. Command reported that Navy planes attacked military targets northeast of the French compound, but implied that the damage could have been caused by falling surface to air missiles fired by the enemy. Air Force officials confirmed that the air blitz was continuing despite the international furor of the damage not only to the French mission, but also to Algerian and Indian missions during the bombing raid last Wednes-

Saturday, October 14 REVENUE SHARING re-

ceived final congressional approval Friday as the Senate voted 59-19 to share federal tax dollars with state and local governments. The bill, which will distribute \$30.2 billion to state and local governments in the next five years, has been sent to the White House for President Nixon's signature. De-troit will receive \$57.1 million under the first installment, \$9.1 million more than money will be used, in part, to subsidize losses by the city's bus system and to improve Detroit's sanitation program.

Sunday, October 15

GM - UAW AGREEMENT was reached Sunday to end the two-day old UAW strike at the General Motors Assembly Division plant in St. Louis. Meanwhile, negotiators met in Ohio and Georgia in attempts to end the strikes at two other GM plants. All three strikes were begun by the UAW as part of its policy of limited, scattered strikes over alleged work-load increases in the plants.

ISRAELI WARPLANES struck Sunday in Syria and Lebanon in a new move to crush Palestinian guerillas at their bases. The 30-minute attack at five guerilla bases in Israel's two Arab neighbor states came during a lull in hostilities. Usually, the Israelis have made such strikes only after guerilla attacks. Village Superintendent Thomas K. Jefferis and attorney William Killebrew represented the Village at the October 6 meeting, plus the two earlier meetings August 9 and August 21.

A formal contract will be drawn up by the attorneys at a later date for council approval, with the formal signing to follow, Mr. Mazer added.

Mayor Butler asked the hospital administrator to appear at the next meeting of The Farms Council, Monday night, November 6, with plans drawn up by a land-scape architect.

Councilman E. Rust Muirhead summed up the attitude of the council: "We want to grant the expanded parking facilities, but just keep in mind the character of the neighborhood."

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

Four Injured

A Park mother and one of her three children were seriously injured on Wednesday, October 11, when the mother lost control of the vehicle she was driving and crashed head-on into a tree on Jefferson, near Notting-

According to an official Park accident report, Mrs. Patricia Zevallos of 895 Lakepointe, was traveling north on Jefferson, at about 5:55 a.m., with three of her children, Lynn, 6; Jody, 4, and John, who is three-yearsold. John was sitting in the front seat with his mother.

For some yet unknown reason, Mrs. Zevallos lost control of the auto, approximately 330 feet from Nottingham, and about 29 feet from the tree, her car left the roadway, leaped the curb and crashed into the tree. The entire front end of the vehicle, a 1972 Chevrolet, was crushed in.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 1.57 OF ORDINANCE NO. 4 entitled "AN ORDI-NANCE TO PROVIDE FOR AND REGULATE THE MAKING OF WATER SERVICE CONNEC-TIONS, THE USE OF WATER, THE RATES TO BE CHARGED THEREFOR, AND TO ESTAB-LISH THE DIVISION OF WATER SERVICE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS, TO FIX ITS DUTIES AND TO PROVIDE PEN-ALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEROF," as amended, adopted on January 17, 1928, being CHAPTER I of "THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS OF 1953," AND TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NO. 315.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Section 1.57 of Ordinance No. 4 entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR AND REGULATE THE MAKING OF WATER SERVICE CONNECTIONS, THE USE OF WATER, THE RATES TO BE CHARGED THEREFORE, AND TO ESTAB-LISH THE DIVISION OF WATER SERVICE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS. TO FIX ITS DUTIES AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF," as amended, adopted on January 17, 1928, being CHAPTER I of "THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS OF 1953" be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1.57. For water consumed, a rate of \$2.345 per thousand cubic feet shall be charged. Computation shall be made in units of 100 cubic feet; provided that fractions of 100 cubic feet shall be computed to the nearest 100 cubic foot unit.

There shall be added on the water bill, a charge of \$1.821/2 for each 1,000 cubic feet of water consumed, as established by said water bill, which charge is levied to cover the cost of sewage disposal and to maintain and improve the sewerage system. Computation shall be made in units of 100 cubic feet of water consumed, provided that fractions of 100 cubic feet shall be computed to the nearest 100 cubic foot unit.

A minimum combined water-sewer service charge for 1,500 cubic feet of water consumed per quarter

All water and sewage disposal bills shall be rendered quarterly by the Division of Water Service of the Department of Public Works and shall be due and payable on the fifteenth (15th) day of the month following the end of the quarter. A penalty of ten per cent (10%) of the amount of the bill shall be added in the event the bill is not paid on or before the due date.

The rates for water hereinbefore fixed shall become effective on November 1, 1972.

The Division of Water Service of the Department of Public Works shall have the right and power to shut off the supply of water to any property where the payment of the water bill, after rendered in manner above specified, is deliquent.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances, inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, and particularly Ordinance No. 315 are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect November 1, 1972.

Mixed Feelings

My own views on Proposal C are mixed. The arguments for and against are all somewhat valid so must be balanced very carefully.

We now have a prohibition against a state graduated income tax. Proposal D would allow a graduted income tax. Polls show it probably will not pass.

Thus proponents of Proposal C can say shift now and use a flat rate income tax to replace property tax revenues. Wait and the next choice will likely be to a graduated income tax. House Speaker Bill Ryan and the state AFL-CIO seem to be saying they don't want C to pass. They want a graduated income tax.

The main argument against Proposal C is loss of local control. It is a valid argument. However, my experience in Lansing is that the legislature is local control oriented and regularly opposed the State Board and Department of Education. If and other reasons people are local control is being eroded the legislature drive can put a proposal on the ballot to assure local control. Last summer the Senate passed such a proposal and the House had a proposal pending containing my local control guarantee

ianguage put on by amendment approved by the House. Further, I have secured written promises by the Governor and legislative leaders to oppose state control.
