Thursday, November 2
PEACE CONDITIONS laid down by South Vietnam President Nguyen Van Thieu, were rejected by the North Vietnamese Government and the Vietcong, who charged that Thieu wanted to prolong the war. The Reds called on the United States to dismiss Thieu. Hanoi also accused the Nixon administration of a "deceitful attitude" in failing to sign a peace agreement October 31, the deadline set by Hanoi. Hanoi also warned the U.S. that any attempt to alter the text of the peace accord would endanger any cease-fire in Vietnam.

Friday, November 3
THE FOUR-STORY Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) building was taken over by approximately 300 Indians, men, women and children, who were protesting life in white America. In a telephone interview, a South Dakota Indian, Bob Wolf, said that his people intend to stay in the building until their problems are solved, although they have been threatened to be forcibly evicted by federal security guards. Within an hour after taking over, the Indians hung American flags upside down and had broken several windows. Inside the building, demonstrators turned over desks, ripped tapes from computers, smashed doors and dumped contents of offices into the hallways. One Indian man was reported injured in a scuffle with guards.

Saturday, November 4
THE UNITED STATES, while preparing to withdraw its military forces from South Vietnam under a peace agreement with North Vietnam, plans to substitute civilian advisers for American troops, according to Pentagon sources. Pentagon officials also announced that they are rounding up warplanes and rushing them to Indochina to beef up Saigon's air force. The peace pact, still unsigned by Washington and Hanoi, calls for the withdrawal of all American and allied forces from Vietnam within 60 days of a cease-fire.

Sunday, November 5
VETERANS OF ALL WARS fought by America, are sticking to the traditional Veterans Day, contending that Armistice Day, November 11, and not the fourth Monday in October, set by Congress, is the true Veterans Day. They plan to hold the annual parade down Woodward avenue on Saturday. All the major veterans' organizations, with thousands of veterans in Michigan and millions across the nation, are fighting mad, and want to change the new observance which went into effect last year. The observance of November 11 was proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson as Armistice Day, commemorating that day as a reminder to all Americans of the tragedies of the Great War from 1914 to 1918.

Monday, November 6
AN ARMED HIJACKER, said to be a Japanese, commandeered a Japan Air Lines Boeing 727 with 126 persons aboard, and won a pledge from airline officials to give him \$2 million dollars and fly him to Guba via Vancouver and Mexico. The air pirate, wearing a mask, held the passengers and six crew members as hostages, while a long-range DC8 was prepared for the 13,000-mile flight and the ransom money was loaded aboard. The hijacker promised to release the passengers unharmed as soon as he transferred to the DC8. The flight engineer of the Boeing was listed as an American, and all the passengers as Japanese, except for a West German businessman. The hijacker demanded the money be in American currency.

Arrest of Burglar by Park Police Clears 41 Breakins Of Homes, Business Places

19-Year-Old Admits Breakings and Enterings, Implicates Eight Juveniles; NEWS Office One of Places Invited

Two months of hard and dogged investigation by a Park detective sergeant, who spent much of his own time running down clues, resulted in the arrest of Robert M. Higgins, 19, of 4329 Drexel, Detroit, and eight juveniles, on charges of burglary.

Park Lt. Gordon Duncan said that Det. Sgt. James LaPratt is to be commended for his dedication in cleaning the more than 41 "cat-type" burglaries in the Pointe area, including 30 in the Park.

Higgins, it was said, confessed to breaking into 25 Park homes and five Park business places, seven business places in the Farms, City and Woods, and four other residences in the Pointe area.

Robbed News Office
Among the business places Higgins admitted breaking into was the NEWS office on the weekend of May 20-21, from where he took \$552 worth of stereo, tape, radio and sound production equipment, and a Yashica camera.

LaPratt's investigation determined that Higgins worked with one or more of the juveniles involved, in most of his breakins, many of which were committed while residents were still in their houses, either asleep or busy elsewhere in the buildings.

LaPratt did not have to do any extensive searching for Higgins, since the youth was serving 75 days in the Detroit House of Correction (DeHoCo).

'Near Riot' Staged by 200 Teens

Rock, Egg and Bottle Tossers Defy Police; Bleachers Damaged at Barnes School

A group of approximately 200 teenagers gathered in the area of Barnes School, 20090 Morningside, and Our Lady Star of the Sea School, 467 Fairfield, in what Woods police described as a "near riot" situation. The incident occurred Monday, October 30, after 9 p.m. on the so-called "Devil's Night," the night before Halloween.

The youths, according to police, had blocked Fairfield east of Morningside and the intersection of both streets. Eggs and beer bottles were tossed at civilian vehicles and scout cars.

A large section of bleachers were torn up and rolled over on the Barnes School ground, causing some damage to the school fence. Obscenities were shouted at persons in the area.

Police report that fires were started on Morningside near Our Lady Star of the Sea Convent. Several traffic direction signs were pulled down and placed in the street.

The sound of firecrackers pierced the night air, while gasoline was dumped across streets and ignited creating a barricade of fire, said Lieutenant Allan Selby. He added some residents armed themselves with clubs, apparently to protect their property if necessary.

Attempts by scout cars to enter the area were met by shouts of obscenities at police and barrages of eggs, rocks and bottles. In his report, Lieutenant Selby felt that the near riot situation and destruction was getting worse at 9:45 p.m. so all available scout cars were called into the area.

As 12 additional units arrived, including a fire truck, with emergency lights and screaming sirens, the group retreated and the area was cleared within a few minutes, police said.

The lieutenant reported there were no serious injuries. Of the scout cars working in the area, two were so plastered with eggs that they had to be washed three times, he said.

He added most of the department's problems occur on "Devil's Night."

School Board Meets Nov. 13

The regular monthly meeting of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education will be held at 8 p.m. on Monday, November 13, in the auditorium of North High School, 707 Vernier road.

William F. Hueltman, president, will chair the meeting and Dr. Theos I. Anderson, Superintendent of Schools, will present his recommendations for the trustees' action.

The meeting is open to the public.

Clubs Offer to Finance Extra School Activities

The expansion of the extra-curricular activities program offered at both North and South High Schools is under consideration by the trustees of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education.

Funding to the extent of \$8,000 per school would be provided by the Parents Club and Boosters Club of North High School and the Mothers Club and Dad Clubs of South High School. The extra activities would be financed by the parent groups in the two high schools from money they have available. Leaders of the groups have indicated that there are no present plans for a fund-raiser for such activities this year.

The parent groups' efforts are an attempt to reinstate the extra-curricular program to its 1970-71 level. Most of the activities under consideration were in the regular program prior to cuts necessitated by millage defeats. Should they be reinstated through voluntary funding, it has been estimated that an additional 600 to 700 students would be served at each high school.

The expanded program under consideration at South High School would include the use of funds for an intramural coordinator, intramural activities, cross country, theatre guild, foreign language clubs, and an art club.

Farms Motorist Drowns as Car Sinks into Lake

Vehicle Goes Over Seawall at Foot of Provincial Road; Policeman Risks Life in Attempt to Rescue Victim

A young Farms resident drowned in Lake St. Clair on Friday, November 3, when his car went over the seawall and landed 100 feet beyond, into approximately 15 feet of icy water. A Farms police officer who swam out to the vehicle in a futile attempt to rescue the victim at the risk of his own life, was recommended for a Departmental Citation.

Dead is Terrence McPharlin Broderick, 23, of 164 Lakeview, whose death is being investigated by Farms authorities. The motorist was traveling south on Provincial road and continued across Lake Shore road without stopping, hit the curb and flew over the seawall and into the lake, at about 8:04 p.m.

Police Chief Robert Ferber said that the reason for Broderick's failure to stop, or to slow down for a turn is not known, but evidence, so far, points to the possibility that the victim might have blacked out. He was under a doctor's care for a blood ailment.

The chief said that within two minutes after a call was received from a witness that a car was in the lake, Patrolman Johannes Winter was at the scene. The policeman arrived in time to see the rear roof and trunk of the auto floating on the water and sinking slowly.

Braves Icy Water
Within seconds Winter removed his revolver and clothing, scripping to his underwear, and dove into the ice cold water. He swam to the car, which by this time had gone completely under.

The officer dove down to the driver's side of the auto and tried to open the doors, without success. He went over the roof of the vehicle, and tried the passenger side and tried to open the doors there, but the doors refused to budge.

Woods Votes To Get Rid Of SEMCOG

Council Unanimously Supports Bill to Repeal Act Providing for Its Creation

The Woods Council has put a "clog" on SEMCOG, (Southeast Michigan Council of Governments), in action taken at the regular meeting Monday, November 6, the council unanimously passed a resolution supporting the position of State Senator James D. Gray who recently co-introduced a bill, (Senate Bill No. 1482), to repeal the act which provided for regional planning and for the creation of regional planning commissions, such as SEMCOG.

Councilman Benjamin W. Pinkos' motion also stipulated that the Woods' resolution be sent to all communities in the SEMCOG area, (which includes seven counties, Wayne, Washtenaw, St. Clair, Oakland, Monroe, Macomb and Livingston), and to Governor William Milliken, Senator Robert Griffin and Representative William Bryant.

The vote was 6-0 with Councilman George S. Freeman, who's recovering from an apparent heart attack at his home, excused.

Home Rule Infringement
Mr. Pinkos, in giving his reasons for supporting Senator Gray's position, said SEMCOG is "definitely an infringement upon home rule" and "has served no real purpose to our community." Overall, he added, SEMCOG is a "cumbersome type of operation."

Senator Gray's communication was added to the agenda and preceded a letter from Robert E. Fitzpatrick, SEMCOG chairman, which was on the agenda.

Mr. Fitzpatrick's communication, discussing the role of SEMCOG, drew comments from Councilman Marvin R. Boutin.

"SEMCOG is a voluntary association of local governments," said Mr. Fitzpatrick. But Mr. Boutin objected to an area of government which he felt didn't answer and...

Woods Firm On Decision To Pull Out

St. Clair Shores Also Refuses to Continue Participation in Subsidizing SEMTA

The Woods put the final crunch on SEMTA, (Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority), by firming up its previous "intent to discontinue" participation upon expiration of the contract December 31, 1972, with a definite "will not" regarding contract renewal.

Councilman Roger A. Graef's resolution was unanimously approved by the council at the regular meeting Monday, November 6. The vote was 6-0 with Councilman George S. Freeman, who's recovering from an apparent heart attack at his home, excused.

This measure was patterned on a St. Clair Shores resolution which was on the council agenda. The St. Clair Shores Council at its regular meeting Monday, October 2, unanimously passed a resolution saying the city "will not renew the contract" upon expiration.

Two Biggest Shares

With both The Woods and St. Clair Shores, which pay the largest percentage of the \$5,000 per month operating subsidy to SEMTA, if needed, nixing further support, the SEMTA picture becomes cloudier particularly if the mass transportation package isn't "signed, sealed and delivered."

The Woods pays 27 percent and St. Clair Shores, 25 percent, which means at the end of this year's contract 52 percent of the SEMTA supportive pie will be devoured. The Park pays 20 percent; The Farms, 16; The City, eight; and The Shores, four. These Pointe communities have not taken similar action at this time.

Charge Driver Of Death Car

The Wayne County Prosecutor's Office issued a warrant Monday, October 30, alleging that Roger Dale Taylor, 17, of Detroit, had committed the crime of negligent homicide stemming from an auto accident Saturday, October 21, in which one person was killed and four others were injured.

Shores police arrested Taylor at his home Tuesday, October 31. He was arraigned before Municipal Judge Don J. Goodrow on that date and released on \$1,000 personal recognizance bond, police said. His examination date before Judge Goodrow is scheduled for this week.

The accident occurred on Lake Shore road when the car Taylor was driving apparently went out of control and struck a tree on an island. Police reported that the auto, a 1966 Chevrolet convertible, flipped on its top and came to rest on Colonial road.

Thomas McPhail, 18, of Detroit, was pronounced dead at the scene. Willard Allen, 19, of Detroit, remains in serious condition at St. John Hospital and Elizabeth Hawley, 17, of Detroit, remains in fair condition at St. John. Bonnie Hawley, 18, of Detroit, was released over a week ago from Bon Secours Hospital. Taylor was treated and discharged from St. John shortly after the accident.

The Farms Fire Department and several Woods officers assisted at the scene and received praise from Shores Chief Joseph Vitale. "The department appreciated the help from The Woods, who supplied manpower and equipment, and The Farms," he said.

Frustrated in his efforts, and because of the numbing affects of the icy water, the policeman was forced to swim back to the seawall, where he was assisted to land by Cpl. Otto Glanert and other policemen at the scene. Winter was taken to the station where he took a hot shower and donned his warmed uniform and returned to the scene, to further assist rescuing operations.

Coast Guard There

On his return he found a Coast Guard boat from the St. Clair Shores Station under the command of BM1 Tony J. Rodriguez, hovering over the sunken car, and two scuba divers, Leon Seyohan of 57 Colonial; and Theodore Beaupre of 22412 St. Gertrude, St. Clair Shores, already in the water.

Seyohan, who owns a Pointe hair dressing shop, and Beaupre, son of City Patrolman Virgil Beaupre, who is also a skin diver, were in the water approximately two hours, as the Coast Guard personnel attempted to raise the sunken automobile with its victim still inside.

Also at the scene were the Farms Fire Department aerial truck and ambulance, fully manned by firemen.

Get Cables Placed

When the Coast Guard personnel were unsuccessful in hooking onto the sunken car, Seyohan and Beaupre were able to encircle the cutter's cables around the vehicle, and attach pull chains from two tow trucks from Mack avenue service stations. Working together, the Coast Guard and the men with the two trucks were able to pull the car toward the seawall.

When the auto was against

the seawall and raised slightly, Fire Lt. Arthur Turner smashed the rear window with a pike pole, and Broderick's body floated out. The body and the auto were lifted to the shoreline. A witness to the tragedy, Patricia Carol Roberts of Detroit, told police that she saw Broderick traveling south on Provençal at a fair rate of speed, and watched in horror as the car went over the shoreline and into the lake.

Another Witness

Another person, Don Bologna of 12115 Wilshire, Detroit, in a written statement to the authorities, said that he was stopped at Lake Shore and Moross for a red light, going north, and when the light changed, he continued north and glanced out into the lake and saw what at first he thought was

a small boat. When he was informed it was a car, he drove his car over the curb and beamed his bright lights out into the vehicle.

Bologna said that he asked three other motorists, who had stopped, to beam their car lights out into the lake. He stated he did not actually see Broderick going over the wall.

Chief Ferber said that there was a lapse of about four minutes from the time the drowning victim left his home and the time he went into the water.

Wait Medical Report

A report from the Wayne County Medical Examiner's Office is being awaited to determine the actual cause of Broderick's death, the chief said.

The chief said that Winter will be awarded a Departmental Citation, although the

officer's efforts to save Broderick were in vain. Winter attempted a rescue at a great risk to his own life, which was "performed in the highest tradition of police service, above and beyond the call of duty."

Broderick is survived by his mother Mrs. Mae K., of the Lakeview address; and two brothers, William J. K., and Kevin P.

He was graduated from Austin Catholic Prep and was a student at Wayne

State University at the time of the tragedy.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday, November 7, in the DeSantis Funeral Home and St. Paul's Church. Interment was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

(Continued from Page 1) wasn't responsible to the voters. He added that SEMCOG "vastly violates home rule and the rights of the citizens."

In a release, Senator Gray said that the communities as well as the county of Macomb have been placed in an "impossible situation" because of SEMCOG's designation as the review agency for federal grant applications in the seven-county Detroit region.

The senator was quoted as saying in the release: "Local units of government have, in effect, been told that they cannot get federal grants, paid for by the people, unless they join SEMCOG." Senator Gray felt that was "black-mail."

On the other side, Mr. Fitzpatrick said, "In every metropolitan area, similar activity on a regional scale, (regarding regional councils in metropolitan areas throughout the country developing necessary regional plan elements, including a housing element, to conform with Congressional and Presidential directives), must be undertaken by a regional agency. Those regions which do not do so run the risk of losing millions of dollars in federal funding."

Mr. Fitzpatrick also stated, "We repeat our earlier statements that membership in SEMCOG is common sense for every community, and that through voluntary participation in this association, local governing bodies can insure that their residents will have a voice in the regional decisions of the future."

"To neglect such participation is to invite state and/or federal usurpation of this responsibility."

The only Pointe municipalities which are members of SEMCOG are The Farms and The City.




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Nab Shoplifters With Hot Items

Watercolor and ink provide the media for this sort of fantasy and surrealism."

Her other style, however, is very controlled and disciplined. In it, large areas are very hard-edged with colors brought about by many layers of acrylic and water-color glazes. This style achieves great brilliant depths and translucency, the qualities of sky.

Along with painting, flying is an integral part of Mrs. Chambers-McCarty's life.

In 1964 she placed first in the International Air Race.

At present, in addition to flying, she works as executive designer for the Women's Air and Space Museum, which is associated with the Smithsonian Institution. She teaches Art in her own studio, and also conducts classes at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, and the Flint Institute of Arts. 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Study Parking Changes

(Continued from Page 1) was said at the Monday night council meeting.

In a report to the council, Bremer said that the matter has been under discussion for several months by the city administration and the police department and the following is recommended, with the support of Shepard Norton, George Black and Clifton Ashton, representatives of the Hill merchants:

1. The installation of 40 four-hour parking meters in the municipally-owned lot at the rear of the District, with the meters to be installed in the third row from the alley. These will replace existing two-hour meters. The two-hour meters will be used as replacements, or as converted replacement meters.

This will permit an increase in the allowable maximum parking time for customers of business establishments requiring more than two hours for purchases or services. This change is not, nor is it intended to increase the amount of space available for all-day parking.

2. The conversion of all existing 10-hour meters in the lot, a total of 81 meters, to accept only 25-cent coins. This procedure is designed to eliminate short-term parking at 10-hour meters by removing the discounted time rate advantage for short-term parkers using these meters.

As a result of this change, it was stated, the deposit of one 25-cent coin will register five hours of parking time; two 25-cent coins will give the parker 10 hours time.

3. The establishment of the city-controlled free parking lot as a leased lot from Monday through Saturday, specified legal holidays excluded, during the hours of 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The adoption of this proposed recommendation will eliminate excessive use of the lot by any one merchant; by hospital workers and visitors; and by persons parking their cars and proceeding to Downtown Detroit by bus.

Bremer stated that a plan would be worked out with the Hill merchants in establishing an equitable allotment of the available parking spaces. A flat fee of \$10 a month will be charged for each space, which would assist in alleviating administrative, maintenance and development costs.

The city manager recommended, and the council approved, that City Attorney McKean examine existing ordinances to determine if they will permit the Police Department to enforce the following traffic regulations in the municipally-owned lot:

(Continued from Page 1) er administrators, and North High Principal Bruce Feighner.

Students at last could speak face-to-face with the adults who control the scholastic program at North High. And they used the two and a half hours to best advantage by addressing the officials with questions and challenges regarding the school's operation.

Discussion was broken into four main areas of student concern: Student Voice in Education, Physical Freedom, Humanistic or Human Relations in the Schools, and Classroom Climate. Each area was represented by a panel of students, teachers, trustees and administrators, who fielded questions at the close of a 15-minute analysis of the topic.

Sides Pick Ideals

The first discussion, on Classroom Climate, was the tamest, as profiles were drawn of the ideal teacher, (by the students), and of the ideal student, (by the teachers and administrators). Much of the discussion centered around progressive teaching methods such as relating the classroom material

to the outside world and letting the students contribute in the structuring of a course. Stressed was the necessity of the teacher communicating with the students and not just trying "to impress the students with how much he knows," as one student in the audience commented.

One Idea Dismissed

The possibility of student evaluation of the teachers was mentioned repeatedly. In response, Assistant Principal Robert Welch showed a course critique and analysis of teachers written by college students and suggested that the North students might move towards a similar publication. The idea of students participating in the hiring and firing process of teachers was dismissed.

Board Member Mrs. Joan Hanpeter was the star of the second panel discussion on Student Voice in Education as students were anxious to speak with an actual trustee of the Grosse Pointe school system. Of foremost concern was the possibility of having a student sit on the School Board to represent the students' views on education. "Our foremost responsibility is to represent the inter-

Hospitals Offer Diabetes Test

Free blood-screening tests to detect diabetes will be available again this year at Bon Secours, Cottage and Saint John hospitals the week of November 13 in the search for more than 102,000 "unknown" diabetics in Michigan during the national observance of Diabetes Week.

An "unknown" diabetic is a person who has the disease but is unaware of it. The presence of diabetes may be indicated by excessive thirst, excessive urination, loss of weight, itching, constant hunger, easy tiring, slow healing of cuts and scratches, and changes in vision. In Michigan, diabetes is ranked as the fourth leading cause of death by disease, the second leading cause of blindness, and a contributing factor in half of all heart attacks.

Of the 31,334 persons tested in last year, 465 new

cases of diabetes were discovered and another 222 persons were identified as potential diabetics. Once discovered, diabetes can be effectively controlled by a physician through diet and medication.

Testing is limited to persons who are not known to have diabetes.

The Michigan Diabetes Association, a United Fund agency, will provide the follow-up for "positives" and those tests outside the normal range with a letter to the person tested and one to his physician indicating that further evaluation is needed. Persons who do not hear from the association within eight weeks may assume that test results fell within the normal range.

Persons coming to one of the three hospitals to be tested should bring the name and address of their physician.

The Bon Secours Hospital laboratory will offer the test between 8 a.m. and 1 p.m. Monday through Friday. Report to the laboratory one hour and 45 minutes after eating. The minimum age is 12 and minors must be accompanied by a parent.

Wednesday through Friday the Cottage Hospital laboratory will accept persons for free diabetes detection between 9 a.m. and 12 noon. Report to the laboratory one hour and 45 minutes after eating. You must be 18 or older.

The Sister's dining room of Saint John Hospital will be set up to provide the test between 9 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. It is preferred that the test be taken one hour and 45 minutes after a heavy meal. Minors will be accepted with parental permission from age 5.

Saint John Hospital will hold a free forum on diabetes on Tuesday, November 14, at 7:30 p.m. Persons interested in attending must obtain free tickets in advance by calling 881-8200 ext. 474.

Senator Griffin Receives 'Bust Busing' Petitions

The "Freedom for Quality Education — Bust Busing" movement led by Shores resident Leon Sehoian is alive and VERT well in the Pointes.

Although the busing issue is in a doldrum, the "lull before the storm," said Mr. Sehoian in reference to the Detroit desegregation case currently before the Sixth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati, "Bust Busing" workhorses are far from being lulled into complacency.

For some 200 volunteers gathered over 10,000 signatures on petitions which call for a constitutional amendment against busing during a six-week period. The petitions, which contain signatures from Pointers and residents of the surrounding area, were presented to Senator Robert Griffin when he and Vice-President Spiro Agnew visited Warren Tuesday, October 31.

Senator Griffin told Mr. Sehoian he would "personally" take the petitions to Washington.

Warren Mayor Ted Bates and Councilman Howard Austin set up the meeting between them, with Mr. Sehoian saying that Senator Griffin held up his motorcade to discuss the busing issue.

"We were really going to give the petitions to President Richard Nixon but he didn't come in," he said.

Obviously pleased with the results of the petition drive, Mr. Sehoian cited the work of some of the volunteers.

For instance, he said David and Carol Ohlert collected over 1,000 signatures alone.

Involved

When discussing the pending desegregation case, Mr. Sehoian felt the Court of Appeals will vote in favor of busing because of past court decisions.

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
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Arrest Youths In Stolen Car


The Pointers won the Bi-County League harrier championship at the Lakepointe Country Club. Tom Hammer led the charge as he captured the individual title with a time of 15:25.

But the reported "Devil's Night" situation the evening before Halloween in The Woods is something else again. Around 200 teenagers in the area of Barnes and Our Lady Star of the Sea Schools created a "near riot" situation, according to police. (See the story on Page One of this edition).

Why should such action take place? Why should civilian and police cars be bombarded with eggs, rocks and other missiles? Why should fires be started? Why should traffic signs be pulled up? Why should a residential area, or any area for that matter, have to suffer such destructive shenanigans? Why did the rowdy participants act as they did? Didn't they have something more constructive to do? And where were the parents of these individuals? Did they know what was taking place?

These questions are worthy of some straight, thoughtful answers. Who can answer them? The teens involved, of course. Their parents, also. And all Pointe residents for that matter. But it seems the motivation, or if you will, the rationale, for such action basically lies with the participants on a subjective level. They were responsible for creating the situation. They must search their own hearts and minds and answer, WHY?

Do you know what's going on in the Best Seller territory? The October 29th issue of the NEW YORK TIMES BOOK REVIEW lists 10 fiction and 10 non-fiction, as you probably know. So now let's see how many of them you've read, how many you have heard of, and how many you might like to read. JONATHAN LIVINGSTON SEAGULL by Richard Bach is number 1 and has been on the fiction list for 26 weeks. Since I've written about this exquisite little book, which defies category, I shan't go into detail. I've read it, bought several copies, and find it comparable, in its uniqueness to THE LITTLE PRINCE of Saint Exupery's.

Alexander Solzhenitsyn is second with his new novel AUGUST 1914, which is an epic study of Russia before, during, and after the Revolution. It is also a Book-of-the-Month selection. It is an impressive book, if not quite as soul-shaking as THE CANTER WARD and THE FIRST CIRCLE.

THE WINDS OF WAR by Herman Wouk has been out quite a while and has been on the List for 49 weeks! The global conflict of World War II is the theme, and Wouk conveys a feeling of being an eyewitness to the evil days from Hitler's Germany in 1939 to 1941. A sequel to this is planned.

SEMI-TOUGH by Dan Jenkins, is a newcomer to the fiction listing. It is a cock-and-bull story about a Giants-Jet playoff in Los Angeles via the unofficial record book kept by a Texan quarterback.

What woman can resist a new Gothic by Victoria Holt? Her new one is ON THE NIGHT OF THE SEVENTH MOON. While number 5 on our list, I'm sure it will be read for a long time by a certain clientele.

Next we have a new Taylor Caldwell, CAPTAIN AND KINGS, which should be as popular as Caldwell's other books. The author's aficionados will stand in line for this one, probably. It's been one of the top ten (fiction) for 27 weeks. R. F. Delderfield is next. The title? TO SERVE THEM ALL MY DAYS and this is certainly a fat book! Kirkus calls it a "pleasant autumnal comforter." It is the story of a Welshman who joins a boys' public school in Exmoor.

Plan LaMaze Class Series

Several new series of classes for expectant parents in the Pointe are currently being offered and planned by the Childbirth Information Service, Inc., a non-profit organization serving the Eastern Suburban area.

Expectant couples will receive instruction in the Lamaze (Psychoprophylactic) Method, which includes thorough instruction in the physiology of pregnancy as well as training in breathing and relaxation techniques to be used in labor and delivery.

Classes are taught by Registered Nurses and Registered Physical Therapists who have used the Lamaze Method for their own birth experiences.

The Lamaze Method was devised by a French physician. It emphasizes the supportive nature of the father during pregnancy, labor and delivery.

Limbering and relaxation exercises are started in the 7th or 8th month of pregnancy. Breathing and relaxation exercises to be used in the delivery room also are emphasized.

Regulations of the various hospitals serving Pointe residents regarding this type of birth, (sometimes referred to as "natural childbirth"), are also discussed.

Childbirth Information Service requires permission of the attending physician before a couple may register.

Registration must be in advance, to allow for scheduling.

Cost of the seven-meeting course is \$25 per couple.

Classes will be held at Cottage Hospital beginning Wednesday, November 15, Tuesday, January 2, and Wednesday, January 10.

Combine chuck or steak beef, cut in 2-inch squares, with Burgundy, consommé, salt, pepper and onions. Mix bread crumbs and flour. Stir flour mix into meat mixture. Cover and bake at 300 degrees oven three hours or more. (For 4 lbs. meat, use 2 1/2 cans consommé. For 6 lbs. meat, use 3 cans consommé.)
Serves four or five persons.
