Thursday, January 18 RONALD L. ZIEGLER, President Nixon's press secretary, told newsmen that Henry A. Kissinger and North Vietnam's Le Duc Tho and Xuan Thuy would meet on Tuesday, January 23, for the purpose of "completing the text of an agree-ment." Ziegler's terse announcement, issued jointly by the United States and Hanoi, also indicated that tentative agreement had been reached on such points as a cease-fire, the return of prisoners, and the reshaping of Saigon's government. U.S. ofrefused to predict when the text of an agree-ment would be completed.

Friday, January 19 JUAN V. CORONA, a Mexican nationalist and farm-labor contractor, was convicted yesterday in Fairfield, Calif., of the murders of 25 migrant farm workers. It was the largest mass-murder conviction in United States history. One woman jurist said afterwards that she was "uncon-vinced" of Corona's guilt but decided to make the jury vote unanimous. # Commission Will Study Judge's Pay

Park Council Orders Drafting of New Ordinance to Create Body for That Purpose

ordinance which would create a five-member commission to study and determine the amount of communities paying the same compensation to be re- percentage of the \$5,000 per by the city's nicipal judge, was authorized by The Park Council on Monday, January 22.

City Attorney Richard Rohr was directed to draft the proposed ordinance and present it to the council at its next regular scheduled meeting on Monday, Febru-

arv 12. Rohr said that the establishment of such a commission was approved by the Michigan Legislature, under Public Act No. 8, adopted in February 1972. The statute permits the creation of a five-member commission for any community having a population of under 20,000, and a seven-member commission for cities of 20,000 or over.

The population of The Park, according to the 1970 Federal census, is 15,640.

\$6,000 Present Pay The city attorney informed the council that under the present City Charter, the municipal judge's annual compensation cannot exceed \$6,000, the maximum now paid to Municipal Judge William E. Speer,

Judge Speer, who was elected to a four-year term in 1969, was granted a \$400 raise, shortly after he assumed office, succeeding the late C. Joseph Belanger, who at the time was prohibited from seeking re-election under a State Statute, which forced all local judiciaries to retire on reaching age 70. Rohr told the city council

SEMTA Supporters The City has been a strong supporter of the bus line throughout 1972, as it passed a supportive resolution in November stating the municipality would continue to back SEMTA in whatever way financially possible.

Farms City Manager Andrew Bremer, Jr., said he concurred with the council's action and added that SEMTA provided a "necessary service for some of our residents."

Like the 1972 agreement, the extension finds the six SEMTA, if needed. The Woods pays 27 percent, St. The Clair Shores, 25, The Park, 20, The Farms, 16, The City, eight, (and upon the trustees' approval of the extension), The Shores, four.





Total complaints in The Woods fell from 338 in 1971 to 309 in 1972. Part I offense complaints dropped from 99 to 70, (1972), Larceny-theft, (except auto), also fell from 94 to 61, (last year). Part II offense complaints went from 212 in 1971 to 217 in 1972. Narcotic drug law complaints jumped from 70 in 1971 to 105 last year. Miscellaneous complaints declined from 27 to 22, (last year).

A Detroit Edison power loss occurred Friday night, January 12, when Neff road and St. Clair avenue, along with surrounding streets, went black due to a power failure. City police received about 200 calls, according to police records, from residents upset over all lights, stereo systems, electric clocks and refrigerators going dead. The power failure occurred around midnight and it took two hours to restore complete electrical services.

#### Gasoline Sets Fire to Pump

A water pumping appara-tus, owned by the Michigan Bell Telephone company, and used to pump out water from underground tunnels, ignited and destroyed parts of the Fire Chief Phillip Costa.

The chief said that fire-fighters were called to the Kercheval-Bedford area on Saturday, January 20, when a telephone alarm was re-ceived that the pump, valued at \$200, was ablaze. Fire-fighters put out the flames with a hand extinguisher containing CO2 (carbon diox-

ide). According to an official fire report, a worker at the scene poured gasoline into the pump's tank, and did not replace the tank cap, When the motor was started, fuel was sloshed over the engine, Chief Costa said. The fire started by either the gasoline spilling over the hot engine, or perhaps by sparks hitting the flammable liquid, The pump was damaged

considerably, it was said, but not to the extent that it was not repairable.

(Continued from Page 1) | young athletes, adventurers east persons on the basis of race, sex or social position, thereby limiting a person to a certain social role. The committee is searching for material which shows persons in varying roles in society according to personality types and personal preferences. Educators have discovered that social typecasting not only breeds cultural prejudices but serves to suppress a minority student's, (be it on the basis of race, sex, or social status), natural ambition to assume a responsible adult role.

Once sensitive to this criteria, the researchers are often amazed how inbred stereotyping has become. Racial awareness came first, with text books rewritten to include black people's role in establishing the United States and assuming responsible roles in contemporary society. Elementary school readers include black children in short stories and have them named Leroy or Jake for example, and not a more elitist white name such as Paul, William, or George.

The latest group to feel discriminated against is women, and textbooks and teaching methods have come under fire recently for showing men in all the active and responsible roles in society, while women remain in passive and domestic roles.

#### MUNICIPAL PARKING LOT ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO CONTROL THE USE OF MUNICIPAL PARKING LOTS

ORDINANCE NO. 191

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Any persons using a municipal parking lot shall park between the striped lines where provided and in such a manner as to accommodate the maximum number of vehicles in such lot. No person shall park, stand or stop a vehicle in any place or in any manner where prohibited by official signs in a municipal parkng lot.

SECTION 2. The City Manager is hereby authorized to negotiate leases of space in the City's municipal parking lot, which leases shall be subject to the approval of the City Council. In the instance that the City has entered into a lease of all or a portion of a municipal lot, no person other than the lessee shall be permitted to park in the leased spaces during the period such lease is effective. The City Manager will provide posted notices indicating the parking spaces which have been leased and the periods during which such lease is effective.

SECTION 3. Vehicles properly using such leased spaces shall display a valid and permanently affixed identifying emblem in a location as established by the Chief of Police or his designated representative, which emblem shall be issued by the City Manager or his designated representative. designated representative.

SECTION 4. Vehicles using municipal parking lots shall at all times properly comply with the traffic control signs, signals, lane markings, and other devices installed under the authority of the Chief of Police or his designated representative.

SECTION 5. No person shall park a motor vehicle in a public lot for a continuous, uninterrupted period of more than 24 hours, without prior approval of the Chief of Police or his designated representative, nor may any person park a motor vehicle not displaying valid registration plates in a public lot at any time, nor may any person park a trailer or mobile home in a public lot without the permission of the Chief of Police or his designated representa-

SECTION 6. Persons using a municipal parking lot shall at all times observe all of the provisions of the City's Ordinance No. 190 which is "An Ordinance to Control the Normal Use of Parking Lots."

SECTION 7. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be sentenced to not more than 90 days in jail and/or a fine of not exceeding \$500. The municipal judge for the City is hereby authorized to establish a schedule of fines for violations of this Ordinance, which fines shall be payable at the City's Violation Bureau. Also, the Chief of Police or his designated representative is hereby authorized to tow away and impound any vehicles violating the provisions of this Ordinance and all costs incurred by the Police Department will be the

expense of the registered owner of the vehicle. SECTION 8. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby expressly repealed only to the extent necessary to give effect to



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# A Dangerous Situation Three 13-year-old juveniles trod on dangerous

ground Saturday, January 13, when a resident told. The Woods Department of Public Safety the boys were shooting a .22 caliber rifle on Marter road.

Upon his arrival at the residence, Public Safety Officer Thomas Hunke discovered the boy's

parents were not home. The lad and his friends had been shooting his rifle out an upstairs bedroom window at an old tennis shoe and a rifle stock. The boys apparently felt they were not doing anything

wrong.
The officer told them of the impending danger, e.g., a ricocheting bullet could injure someone or cause damage to property. Two of the boys agreed. However, one still felt the bullets were doing no harm because they were going into the ground, police said. The officer left the scene only after receiving assurance the boys would discontinue shooting.

On the following day, Public Safety Officer Robert Kwiatkowski contacted the boy's mother who said she was unaware of the incident. She was told of the hazards involved, and of the city ordinance prohibiting the outdoor use of firearms. The mother told police she would take the rifle from her son and only let him use it at a rifle range.

One need not elaborate upon the tragic possi--bilities which might have happened in this case. Thanks to the concerned resident who notified the department, plus the quick response of Officer Hunke, (and Officer Kwiatkowski's follow up), this incident was stopped. Now it is up to the lad's parents to make certain he uses his rifle only at the appropriate location and with a sensible adult, who knows and practices firearm safety, by his side.

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





#### **Electric Toy** Causes Fire

An overheated light bulb in an electric toy, which had apparently been forgotten by one of the children, is believed to have been the cause of a fire that damaged a second floor bedroom in the home of Mr. and Mrs. George J. Wills, 1441 Nottingham road, on Wednesday, January 17, at 1:25

According to information released by Park Fire Chief Phillip Costa, the heat from the toy, which was underneath a window, ignited the window curtain. The toy was plugged into a wall electrical outlet.

The blaze not only destroyed the curtains, but also the bed coverings and the mattress, and scorched the wall of the bedroom, near where it is assumed that the toy had been forgotten. No one was harmed by the fire, the chief said.

"Parents who buy their children electrical toys, especially the plug-in type, should constantly supervise their children's playing with these toys," Chief Costa said. "Such toys come with directions, either on the box, or on a paper placed in the box. These directions should be followed very carefully.

"In cases where electric bulbs are used, make sure that the proper size bulb, as recommended by the manufacturers, is used. Never allow your children to use and over-size bulb, on the assumption that it might give better lighting. 
