Icelandic patrol boats have been harassing British crafts in an effort to back up Iceland's claim to 50-mile fishing rights around the island. Britain has refused to recognize the claim and has sent Royal Navy ships to protect its fishing boats.

Monday, May 28 TORNADOS AND HEAVY RAINS hit six states over the weekend, leaving a death toll of at least 13 and three missing. Areas hit were Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, Alahama, Mississippi and Misscuri. The tornado that hit Jonesboro, Ark., about 60 miles northwest of Memphis, Tenn., injured 200 persons and caused millions of dollars of property damage.

Tuesday, May 29 THE INDIANAPOLIS 500 was called off Monday due to rain and a crash involving 10 of the 33 competitors. The cars were just 400 feet into the race when Salt Walther, driving the Dayton-Walther Special, hit the outside wall, His car exploded and bounced across the main stretch of the track, sending flaming debris into the grandstand, injuring about 18 persons. It also eliminated nine other cars from the race, three of them catching fire. Walther was burned over 40 percent of his body and was listed in satisfactory condition.








To Install New **Pump Starters**

The Grosse Pointe City Council approved a purchase order to Rotor Electric Company to install new starters on pumps four, five and six at the City Pump Station.

existing electrical The starter for the three small sanitary sewage pumps are original equipment and approximately 44 years old. It was recommended they be replaced due to their length of service, the difficulty in obtaining spare parts of this age and the need for relia-bility of service.

The estimated cost of the work, including equipment and labor, will not exceed \$3,100. The estimate had been reviewed and it was felt that the time and material basis represents a reasonable price for the proposed work.
