## Sunday, June 3

A LOADED oil tanker was rammed by a freighter in New York Harbor Saturday, setting off fires and explosions and killing at least seven crewmen, including the captain of the freighter. The Belgian tanker Esso Brussels. anchored in the harbor and loaded with more than 9 million gallons of crude oil, was struck by the outward bound American cargo container ship Seawitch. The boats locked together, and drifted under the Verrazano Bridge.


## Monday, June 4

# **Order Circuit Court Trial** For Man Accused in B-E

by Park Municipal Judge William E. Speer following an examination held on Wednesday, May 30. Emery is accused in a warrant of breaking and entering an occupied dwelling and larceny from a building.

Park Lt. Gordon Duncan said that as a result of Emery's arrest, seven burglaries of Park homes were cleared. One of the homes burglarized was that of Howard Easterman, 1071 Balfour, of which Emery is formally accused in the warrant.

Emery was arrested with Harvey K. Sampson, 18, of the Newport address, last March 12, by Park Det. Sgt. James LaPratt and Detroit police officers. Sampson was diamond rings stolen from arraigned in Detroit Record- the Easterman resid er's Court before Judge Henry Heading, on a charge of receiving and concealing stolen property, in a warrant obtained by Detroit authorities.

Park police were able to obtain a warrant against Emery based on evidence tying him in with the break-in.

Taken from the Easterman residence were about \$35 in wrapped coins, three diamond rings and an assortment of loose change, Also taken was the Easterman family car which was in the garage, with the key still in the ignition.

In searching areas in the Park and in Detroit, Park policemen found the Easterman vehicle, a 1969 Chevrolet station wagon, parked in front of 4214 Newport.

Sgt. LaPratt waited pa tiently from 1 a.m. to noon on the March 12 date, in hopes that someone would arrive to claim !t.

At about noon, LaPratt saw a man come out of the house and get into the station wagon and drive off. Detroit authorities were noti fied, and LaPratt followed the vehicle, and with Detroit officers stopped the station wagon, with Sampson behind the wheel, at Chaimers and Warren in Detroit.

Leaving Sampson in the custody of the Detroit policemen, LaPratt returned to the scene of the original stakeout, in time to see Emery and two juveniles emerging from the house carrying a paper bag, which, it was

Armed with a search warrant, Lt. Duncan and Park Dets. Robert Saifyrd and William Furtaw, accom-panied by two Detroit policemen, search the apartment of the accused pair, and found a small, gray combination safe, burglarized from the home of James A. Addy, 1317 Kensington, on March 9.

It is believed that both Emery and Sampson were involved in the break-in of the Addy home, where, besides the safe, a 12-gauge shotgun and other items were taken.

Duncan said that the three were found in the apartment occupied by Emery and Sampson.

Emery appeared before Judge Speer with a court appointed attorney on May 30. He stood mute to the burglary charge and an innocent plea was entered for him and he was bound over for trial in Circuit Court, scheduled for June 14. His bond of \$10,000 was continued until his hearing in the higher court.







(1) Public safety (including law enforcement, fire

- disposal, sanitation and pollution abatement), Public transportation (including transit sys-
- tems and streets),

PROHIBITED EXPENDITURES. Funds allocated to local governments may NOT be used, directly or indirectly, "as a contribution for the purpose of obtaining Federal funds under any Federal program which requires a local contribution.

ish of the Diocese of Quebec. As the number of Catholics increased along the shores of ael Levadoux, a pastor at St. Anne's, asked Bishop John Carroll, then head of the Church of America for assistance. He sent two priests to him, one being Father Gabice, the old timber church years. him, one being Father Gabriel Richard.

of St. Anne's in 1802. His career was one of achievement which included the founding of Michigan's first newspaper and co-founding, along with Rev. John Monteith, of the University of Michigan.

Father Richard's assistant, Father Francis Badin, built the first St. Paul's in Grosse Pointe in 1825 on the lake shore property of the Reno farm, just beyond Vernier road. Mass was held once a month but residents would gather each Sunday for prayers.

The first Bishop of Detroit, Rev. Frederick Rese, in 1833, appointed Rev. Ghilenus J. Boheme as the first permanent pastor of the St. Paul

chapel. He served until 1842. The register of the church, beginning in 1846, shows the next pastor to be Father Peter Kindekens, from Church Committee voted to Ghent, Belgium. It was during Father Kindekens' time that the Reno chapel was abandoned and a new site chosen.

The property was pur-chased for \$200. It belonged to Francois J. Fresare and is approximately the site occupied by the present church, rectory and parking lot.

In 1848, Father Kindekens first church on the site. It Spindler, recreation director. talents of Mr. Mecke. was a plain timber building, bearing the cornerstone inscription of 1848. This stone has been preserved in the present structure.

The Convent of the Sacred Heart, bordering St. Paul's opened a free school for the children of St. Paul's parish in 1887, the beginning of St. Paul's parochial education. The church, as it stands to-

day was begun by Father John F. Elsen of Waamel, Holland. He received assist-ance from Father Joseph Kraemer, who was the chaplain at the Convent of the Sacred Heart.

The architect of the church was H. J. Rill, who designed the Gothic structure of red brick and field stone with a scating capacity of 640. At the time of construction there were fewer than 300 families in the parish. Now there are over 1500.

The total cost of the church was \$23,329.71, including heating and electrical instal; lations. Construction was begun in 1895. Father Elsen died in 1899, before the church was completed. His funeral, on January 7, 1899; was however the first service held in the nearly completed structure.

Rev. Alonzo H. B. Nacy followed Father Elsen at St. Paul's, and founded the "St. Paul's Monthly Visitor" in

The personnel of the Farms | Police Department are striving for peak efficiency, in every way they can, even to the extent of paying their own tuition, if necessary, to learn all about their jobs for the betterment of the community, it was disclosed by Police Chief Robert Ferber on Friday, June 1.

Late in March, Det, Joseph Miller completed a grueling three-month course at the FBI Police Training Academy in Quantico, Va.

On April 18, Det. Earl Field completed a two-year course offered by the Institute of Applied Science, a Chicago, Ill., based correspondence school, in 18 months, learning all phaces of police work. The school is accredited, and Field received eight college credits with his diploma. He paid for the course out of his own

The latest graduate of the IAS, who also completed the two-year course in 18 months, and, at his own expense, is Cpl. Ronald B. Wooten. He also received eight college credits along with his diploma.

The IAS courses embrace the study of fingerprints, developing latent fingerprints and preparing evidence for court; pattern interrogation; and classification and searching for fingerprint records according to modifications and extensions to the Henry System as used by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The course also includes training in the fundamenials of police photography, identi fication; modus operandi, (criminal's pattern of operation), and the fundamentals of criminal and civil investigation.

Wooten and Cpl. Otto Glanert have recently completed a Police Administration course at Wayne State University, both receiving an "A", and earning four college credits.

Sgts. Marvin Krebs and Alfred (Pete) Martin are presently taking a course at the university, studying Advanced Administration in Police Management. They attend class every Wednesday, and are expected to complete their their studies this month. Before they receive their diplomas, they are required to submit term papers and each must submit a thesis.







# Parents, Runaway Girl Reunited after 25 Months

By Roger A. Waha The waiting and anxiety are over for a Grosse Pointe Park family thanks to a sustaining faith, loyal friendship and the persistent work of Youth Service Division Agent John Kendall.

After 25 months, the fate and whereabouts of an 18year-old Park girl, who voluntarily left home in April 1971, has reached a happy ending. Through the efforts of Agent Kendall and outstate police departments, the girl was traced to New York City's East Village early last

The agent, who ran various types of checks with 15 states during the two-year span, said he didn't know if the girl was alive or dead on Friday, May 4. 9, the girl's parents and Agent Kendall flew to New York where the mother said a "joyous reunion" was held at her daughter's apartment. A week after the reunion, the daughter flew to Detroit, spent a week with her family, which includes a brother and sister, and returned to New York, where she works at a government-supported medical clinic. (The mother said since she was eight, her daughter always wanted to become a medical doctor). She has since talked with her parents and her mother said, 'She's happy and likes New York City. Justifiably so perhaps, because I like New

York City." The investigative efforts on the parts of Agent Kendall and the girl's family are only part of this story. # Cooperation Spells Safety loss set by insurance agents

Motorists and bicyclists carry on a delicately balanced relationship. Those on bikes are certainly more vulnerable to the ways of the roads than those behind an engine. Yet, in order to maintain peaceful co-existence, the two divergent groups must acknowledge each other.

Although some bikers may think themselves a breed apart, they are, however, subject to the same traffic regulations as automobiles.

Unfortunately, judging from the number of safety violations cited recently, bikers are either not aware of these rules or feel they are above them. Whatever the reason, ignoring the rules still leads to hazardous and sometimes frightening driving for biker and motorist alike.

Perhaps the most serious infraction is riding at night without lights. A child pedaling home at dusk after a late baseball game or from a friend's house can be excused occasionally.

But older students and adults who make a habit of riding after dark on bikes without headlights, rear reflectors and/or a leg light are not only presenting a menace to motorists but also endangering themselves.

Furthermore, there have been many instances of bicyclists not observing stop signs and red lights, riding onto a through street thick with traffic. So far no serious accidents have occurred. Yet it is only a matter of time until luck runs out.

And it is usually the case in a bike and car accident, that even though the bike rider may be at fault, the motorist is blamed.

A final offense is bikers riding two and three abreast. Cycling in groups is more enjoyable than alone and companionship should be encouraged, but only on less traveled roads. On busy avenues, such as Jefferson and Kercheval, single file should be

Motorists are not outside blame in obeying safety regulations. However, when they violate traffic rules, they are generally ticketed.

# NEWS Aids in Recovery Of Stolen Valuable Rug

A Detroit man, accused by Federal authorities of bank on Wednesday, May 30, on a also on November 19. warrant accusing him of the burglary of a Park home last November 19.

Accused in the break-in is Thomas E. Doyle, 23, of 14787 Novara, whose \$5,000 personal bond was continued until his June 14 trial date in known. Circuit Court.

Doyle's bond was imposed as a technicality, according to Park Lt. Gordon Duncan, who disclosed that the man is still in the custody of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and is being held in default of \$10,000 bond on the robbery charge,

Doyle is accused of breaking into the home of Dr. Robert C. Dickman, 1014 Bishop road, from which were taken an original oil painting and ink pen drawings by famous artists, Oriental rugs and other items of was \$80,000.

Lt. Dunean said that following a six-month long investigation by Det. Sgt. James LaPratt, and agents of the FBI, who became involved because of the magnitude of the loot and the possibility that some of the loot might be transported over to Doyle as the suspect in the burglary.

Approximately \$8,000 worth of the loot, plus the doctor's auto, were recovered by officers of the Park Detective Bureau, from friends of Doyle. The friends were unaware that the items they man, were stolen property.

The rest of the loot, it is believed, has been fenced to dealers of stolen goods, making it harder to track down, according to the lieutenant.

Dr. Dickenman, a pathologist at Cottage Hospital, had accumulated the art objects over a period of years and personally set his loss at \$120,000, stating their value had increased with time.

Dr. Dickenman and Dan Clancy, a J. L. Hudson dec-orator, who shares the residence with the doctor, had just returned from a visit to Rome, and apparently sur-prised Doyle and two other men in the house.
