Three Injured In LS Crash

Three men were injured when their van struck two parked vehicles on Lake Shore road Wednesday evening, June 6.

The men, Kenneth Michael Pierson, 20, of Mount Clemens, the driver, Harvey Schoenberg, 22, of Mount Clemens, and James Sutherland, 18, of Roseville, were taken to Bon Secours Hospital where they received emergency treatment and were then released. Shores police said no violation was issued in this case.

While on patrol, Sergeant Donald Jacob noticed where the van had smashed into the vehicles and turned over on its side, crossways, in the left hand lane of northbound Lake Shore.

The officer said Schoenberg was lying on top of the van's door with visible injuries to his head and face, while Pierson and Sutherland were sitting on the roadside with visible injuries.

A witness told police he was standing on the corner at Lake Shore and Fontana when the van, travelling an an estimated 50-60 m.p.h., missed the warning blinker light on a traffice control device located about one and one-half car lengths behind the first parked auto. The van then struck the auto and pushed it into the car in front.

The owner of one of the damaged cars was watching the sights along the waterfront near the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club, and heard the crash but didn't see it. The other car's owner, who was attending a Yacht Club affair, wasn't in the area of the crash.

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The petition of William Salvaggio, of South Renaud road, for a deviation and variance in rear yard requirements to permit the construction of an addition, (providing the side yard variance be maintained at 10-feet), received the green light.

On the other hand, the petition of Lochmoor Club on the request of Clarence E. Bessert, director of future planning, for a variance of a front yard setback line of 35-feet in order to extend its off-street parking lot in the northeast area adjacent to Sunningdale, was withdrawn. It was learned midway through the discussion, after a plat of the involved area was checked, the right-of-way approaching the Lochmoor property on Sunningdale dips from 100-feet to 40-feet in front of the property. As a result, the club's front property line was found to extend 30-feet towards Sunningdale, beyond a house next door. With the 30-foot extension, the variance fell from 35-feet to five-feet, so Lochmoor could pave up to about fivefeet of the existing fence. With this new information, the variance wasn't really needed, noted Councilman Kenneth W. Boerner. But a Lochmoor representative said if they withdrew the request and stayed fivefeet back of the fence, they would be one-foot short of their objective and could try to gain that extra foot in the total resurfacing plan. Historical Program July Bride For Antiques Show

University-Liggett Show Features Loan Exhibit of Detroit-Made Artifacts; Top Detroit Historians Contribute to Illustrated Catalogue

By Holly Angell

The University-Liggett Antiques Show, sched-uled for this weekend, has a particularly fascinating and noteworthy highlight this year-it's emphasis on Detroit history.

exhibit at the show, "A Collector Looks at Detroit," will feature some outstanding Detroit-made came under the jurisdiction antiques.

The catalogue, published Commission. in conjunction with the Another 30 acres were reshow, contains articles writ-ten by Detroiters. They provided a wealth of information about the antiques and are rich in Detroit lore.

Francis W. Robinson, Curator Emeritus of Medieval Art and Archivist at the Detroit Institute of Arts, has reviewed the early history of Detroit and included a list of books for those who wish to pursue the history in greater depth.

Reference is made to the Burton Historical Collection of the Detroit Public Library, whose books, maps and manuscripts are legacies from the city's early days and tell much of her story.

More recently, W. Hawkins Ferry's "The Buildings of Detroit" furnishes a rich architectural history of the city's structures, from the earliest log cabin to the industrial fascades of the past decade.

In addition to the written and illustrated history of the city, there are also pre-served those artifacts which illustrate its growth and development.

In his article on "Histori-cal Museums," Solan W. Weeks, director of the Detroit Historical Museum, reviews the story of the establishment of the museums. The best known, perhaps, is the Detroit Historical Museum, located in the city's expanding Cultural Center.

There is also an unusual marine museum, the gift of the Dossin family, and the outgrowth of a museum of Great Lakes History, originally housed in the J. T. Wing, the last commercial sailing vessel on the Great Lakes. Fittingly, the Dossin Museum is located on the share of Beile Isle. In 1949, with the transfer-

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



The flea market idea spread rapidly to other sections of the country. Mr. Carrell directs several of the flea market shows in the East and views his innovation as a means of attracting and informing many people who might be hesitant to attend more formal indoor antiques shows.

That Proper Balance

The most difficult part of directing an antiques show, in Mr. Carrell's opinion, is providing proper 'balance." He believes a show should reflect all the styles and types of antiques, should include newer as well as long-established dealers to avoid staleness and should feature dealers and articles from various geographical areas of the country.

The collector lives in a farmhouse (circa 1740) where patriot Ethan Allen once attended school. When he is not away directing a show, he may usually be found in a barn which he has transformed into his antiques shop.


