Thursday, September 20 HAYWARD BROWN, acquitted three times on charges of shooting at police officers, was arraigned Wednesday on charges of carrying a con-cealed weapon and possession of narcotics. At the time of his arraignment in Detroit Recorder's Court, Brown, 19, was hospitalized at Detroit General Hospital from injuries received at the time of his arrest. Three plainclothes STRESS officers said that they found heroin and marijuana and a loaded blue steel automatic on his person. Examination was set for Monday, October 1.

Friday, September 21 BILLIE JEAN KING de-

cisively beat tennis challenger Bobby Riggs Thursday night in a match watched by 30,472 persons in Houston's Astrodome and an estimated 40,000,000 persons world-wide on television. After three sets of unexpectedly good tennis Ms. King won (6-4), (6-3) and (6-3) and accepted the \$100,000 prize. The match attracted more spectators than any other tennis competition in history; courtside seats went for \$100. It was the second tennis "battle of the sexes," the first was the Mother's Day Massacre when Riggs beat Margaret Court (6-2), (6-1).

Sunday, September 23

HENRY A. KISSINGER took the constitutional oath as the 56th secretary of state Saturday and was praised by President Nixon as the first naturalized citizen to gain the office. The new secretary's first major assignment comes this week when he will address the United Nations General Assembly in New York. Besides working for a settlement of Middle East difficulties, Kissinger has promised to carry out a more open foreign policy in which Congress, the department and private citizens will have a stronger voice . Vice-President Spiro T. Agnew was not present at the ceremony.

Monday, September 24 UAW CHRYSLER EM PLOYES voted Sunday to ratify the new three-year national contract negotiated last week. Production was scheduled to begin today at Chrv-sier plants. UAW Persident Leonard Woodcock and Vice-President Douglas Fraser head of the union's Chrysler department, announced that the settlement received a heavy vote for ratification by union members. Approval of the new contract formally. ends the nine-day strike by the 127,500 Chrysler-UAW employes. The contract limits mandatory overtime and provides a company-paid dental plan beginning the second year of the contract, among other benefits, and a salary increase,



This is considerably less than the September total for last year which was 3.33 inches. In fact, the tally so far, for June, July, August and September, 11.51 inches, shows a drop from the 12.56 total of the four corresponding months of last year.

Pointers may have felt slightly waterlogged when June came and went leaving 5.64 inches of precipitation behind it, but July and August measurements were below those recorded for 1972. The total for those two months is 5.25 inches, as opposed to last year's total of ,22 inches.

Woods Attorney Reports On Street Lighting Case By Roger A. Waha

Woods City Attorney George Catlin received praise from the council stemming from his involvement in representing the city in fighting Detroit Edison's proposed street lighting increase. A report on this subject was presented by Mr. Catlin at the regular meeting Monday, September 17.

Around 35 communities have banded together to share the cost towards fighting the proposed increase with the monies being administered by the Michigan Municipal League.

Edison an interim rate in-

crease of \$26.84 million Wednesday, September 12, no interim increase was provided in the street lighting category. This, he felt, was attributed to the efforts of the concerned communities.

Edison's proposal for a street lighting increase is 14 percent. This was the biggest increase percentage-wise in the overall breakdown, stated Mr. Catlin, who has been actively involved in the crossexamination of witnesses during hearings.
"This is the first time since

Parents of children who will be four years old on or before December 1, 1973 will be invited by the Department of Public Personnel to participate in the voluntary preschool screening clinic to be conducted in the neighborhood public elementary schools from Tuesday, October 9 through Friday, November 16.

Parents will be notified of their child's appointment by mail. School census lists will be used for the mailing. Therefore, those moving into the school district after May of 1973 should call the Department of Pupil Personnel, 885-2000, for an appointment.

The testing program, initiated in 1970, was designed to identify children with potential learning disorders or those who may have diffi-culty adjusting to the regular school program despite normal intelligence.





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

The chief will subsequently receive a report from Detroit on how his firefighters performed. "Most personnel have been through the Detroit training program which runs from six to eight

weeks." he added. Viviano has been with The Park for over a year, while Smith and Nemens, who have worked for about six months,



Exchange Program Helps Students Broaden Views

A unique facet of modern education is the American Field Service exchange pro-gram which can enrich that cometimes troubled period between graduation from high school and entry into college.

AFS provides a solution to those students who want to enhance and broaden their world view. The AFS experience is not simply traveling to a new country, recording the differences in culture and returning essentially in the same state of mind.

The AFS experience means living with a family, as part of that family, and sharing lives. It is learning a country through personal relationships and, equally important, learning about oneself.

ful documentary, employing dramatic eyewitness accounts and many human interest sidelights. It is one of the most complete histories of major sea catastrophes ever written. The book's scope ranges from the plight of the Titanic, (which went down after striking an iceberg with a loss of 1,501 lives), through the sinking of the sidewheeler Sultana, which went down in the Mississippi in 1865 after its boilers blew up, carrying 1,238 paroled Union prisoners and a few Confederates to their death. There was the whaler Essex, the Andrea Doria's collision with the Stockholm, the Lusitania, the Empress of Ireland and the Yarmouth Castle. Eyewitness accounts only add to the horror of the whole grisly business. Another new book is THE

Braille Course Begins Oct. 3

Members of the teaching committee of the Grosse Pointe Braille Club recently velcomed William T. Peters, acting director of the Grosse Pointe Public Library, to heir classroom in the Library's Fisher Road Main Branch, to demonstrate their work and the equipment they use in preparing Braille Books.

The Club begins its eighth year of classes as usual Wednesday, October 3. Classes start at 10 o'clock and are over in time for motherstudents to be home to meet school children when they arrive for lunch.

The Braille class year runs into May, with all weeks off when school vacations or holidays occur.

Mrs. A. Lawson Potter, who will be teaching again this year, is taking reservations by phone; because she limits her classes to be able to give individual help to each student, she urges anyone interested in learning Braille Transcription to contact her as soon as possible at 886-3226.

Learning to Braille is a fascinating process. While the work is technical and exacting, it is something that can be done at one's own pace and within one's own limitations of time.

There is no age limit. One woman waited until she had retired from her job; another learned while she was awaiting her first child.

Class members are taught to use the slate and stylus when they first begin Braille, but as they progress are introduced to the Perkins Brailler. a "sort of " typewriter, with six keys.

The Club owns Perkins Braillers, so students can learn to operate them in

Students are accepted into the Club on a temporary basis while taking the course. Upon satisfactory completion of a year's work and the grading of a manuscript by the Library of Congress, they become full members. Last year Grosse Pointe Club brailled 31 volumes,







2. Above all, remember, don't give fire a place to start. Don't wait for fire to strike before you check your home for fire hazards.

If you need help in checking your home for these fire hazards, Chief Costa said, call on your respective fire departments and ask for assistance in inspecting your homes. Inspections are available on request, no inspector will force his way into your homes and will only enter with your permission, the chief emphasized.

Between midnight and daylight, when nearly everyone at home is asleep, is the time when most fatal residential fires break out. Many of these fire deaths could be prevented by pre-planning. The NFPA offers the following rules to help every
