Thursday, January 9 IN A SURPRISE MOVE. Judge John J. Sirica ordered the release from prison of John Dean III, Jeb Stuart Magruder and Herbert Kalmbach, men who confessed Watergate crimes and their then helped convict others. The order was signed seven days after four other top aides of former President Nixon were found guilty of the Watergate cover-up. The order reduced the men's sen. tences to the time already served. Judge Sirica's action was believed to be a response to the full co-operation of the three men in aiding government prosecutors after plead. ing guilty to their own involvement.

Friday, January 10 A PANEL OF THREE Wayne County Circuit judges ruled yesterday that the Crestwood school board acted illegally when it fired 184 striking teachers who defied a back-to-work ultimatum last month. The court said the fired teachers are to go back to work Monday and ordered all unresolved con-tract issues to be submitted to binding arbitration. Judges Thomas Roumell and George Bowles were in the majority and Judge Joseph Rashid dissented. The school board said it would appeal the de-

Meanwhile, ambulance runs climbed from 362 two years ago to 437 in 1974. Part I Offenses At the same time Part I offenses, which are consid-

ered more serious crimes by the FBI, rose from 625 in 1973 to 723 last year, (690 such incidents were reported in 1972).

Part I crimes include criminal homicide and forcible rape, (no such offenses were recorded in either year), robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larcenytheft, (except auto), and auto theft. While these offenses climbed in number, total clearances of these cases also

Monday, January 13 TWO MEN fired a bazooka today at an Israeli El Al airliner with 139 passengers aboard at Paris' Orly Airport but it missed their target and struck a Yugoslav plane instead. A steward aboard that plane and a po-liceman were wounded in the incident. Airport officials said the men fired two bazooka rounds. Witnesses said the men drove off at a high speed in a white automobile which was later found abandoned by police..

Tuesday, January 14 PRESIDENT FORD intro duced a sweeping economic plan in a televised address last night designed to reverse the recession affecting the country. The president called for individual tax rebates that could reach up to \$1,000 per family to put more money back into the economy. He also called for a \$3 per barrel import fee on foreign oil to help meet the energy crisis. This would raise prices for retroleum users. The president's proposals appear to be headed for some opposition in the Congress as several key members of the House Ways and Means Committee said a rebate plan should go only to low and moderate income persons.



Burglaries Fluctuate Burglary incidents have fluctuated over the past three vears. In 1972, 105 cases were reported while 78 incidents took place in 1973. Last year, 126 cases were recorded. "We merely had more offenses in 1974 than 1973 but reported. this doesn't indicate Grosse Pointe Woods is the target of burglars," said Sgt. Kelly, while noting the fluctuation

in such cases over the years, Meanwhile, clearances of break-in cases accelerated from 21 percent in 1973 to 29 percent last year. At least eight burglaries in The Woods were cleared with the arrest, on the parts of Woods and Farms police, of a 24-year-old Woods man in 1974. Larceny-theft, (except auto), incidents totaled 556 in 1972, 521 in 1973 and 550 last year, while auto thefts also fluctuated with 20 incidents in 1972, 16 in 1973 and 31 in 1974. Sgt. Kelly said one person was responsible for two or three of the auto thefts and he's currently un-der indictment by Federal
