David Perreault, 20, the store owner's son, Florence Klein-ow, 50, and Carlos DelaPena, 15, who worked as a window washer at the store, were killed during the holdup. Cathy Prato, 17, a part-time clerk at the store, died Sunday in Outer Drive Hospital. It was the first multiple slaying in River Rouge in 25 years, . . .

A NEW YORK TIMES story quotes two former aides to the late Senator Robert Kennedy as saying Kennedy told them he stopped a CIA plan to use the Mafia to assassinate Cuban Premier Fidel Castro. According to the Times, Kennedy had learned of a CIA-Mafia link when he was a Senate committee investigator, before his brother, John, became President. The Times said the alleged CIA-Mafia plot was first disclosed to the newspaper off the record in 1973. Both the Washington Post and columnist Jack Anderson had previously connected the CIA with assassination plots against Castro.





Woods Council Approves **Dock Facility Additions**

While military cryptographers were trying to break Japanese codes during the early 1940s in order to predict enemy movements in the Pacific, a young plant breeder named Charles Weddle was trying to unlock another of Japan's best kept secrets.

When finally successful he didn't change the course of World War II, but he did add a splash of color and a bit of beauty to what followed. Weddle discovered how the Japanese produced the dou

ble perunia. Previously, the hybrid flower had been bred only in Japan, and the Jap anese had a monopoly on seed production. By introducing the hybrid to this country, Weddle was instrumental in making the

petunia the most popular American flowering ornamen tal. It is now a \$5 million a year industry. According to John Carew,

chairman of the Michigan State University Department of Horticulture, Weddle is considered "one of the most creative and productive flow.

er plant breeders in the United States." He has developed 61 different varieties of flowers, and has won 21 medals for his plant breeding accomplishments. Weddle is now serving as a

visiting professor in the horticulture department, doing research where he first became interested in hybrid flowers as an MSU graduate student in 1937-38.

While examining flowers last week in the horticulture greenhouse complex, he re called a fundamentalist preacher friend once accusing him of believing in evo lution.

"I am an evolutionist," he smiled. "That's what I do.' Weddle claims responsibility for many of the most popular varieties of flowers now


"The approach in developing a new plant variety to-day is like that used in build-ing a new machine," he says. "A new variety can be built to specifications."

It is the consumer who determines what varieties will be successful commercially, he points out, and the suc-cessful "plant engineer" is one who can predict consumer preferences far enough in advance to cater to them. Today's consumers use more plants indoors than those of previous years, so the industry must produce

attractive plants that can grow in the shade and be adapted to hanging planters, he says.

The environmental con-cerns of young people, Wed-dle says, have added impetus to the ornamental plant in-dustry. "They seem to like having green things around,' he says.

Like his work itself, Weddle says his interest in flowers is based on heredity: an artistic sense inherited from his mother. "Weddle himself is a hy-
