

Ruling Will Not Affect Pointes

(Continued from Page 1) Because of these exceptions, various Grosse Pointe city managers feel the councils in their city are well within their rights to meet privately.

Chester Petersen, of The Woods, for instance, said "It doesn't sound like the Lincoln Park decision is going to have any effect on The Woods to me," although he added that he would have to check with legal council to be certain.

But he maintained that no action or votes have ever been taken in The Woods' private council sessions, known as Committee of the Whole meetings, and said that the only purpose of the private sessions is to make recommendations back to the general council.

Thomas Kressbach, city manager of The City, confirmed that The City council does meet privately, immediately before its monthly public council meetings. He also said that a recording secretary is not admitted to these meetings and that minutes are not kept.

He stressed, however, that The City council "has never taken a vote (in the private sessions) in all the time I've been here."

He described the private sessions of The City council as "study sessions," and said they are often devoted to "reviewing plans made by architects or persons making public improvements."

Mr. Kressbach said the lack of public forum often allows such people "to discuss things fully and frankly," whereas "they might just clam up at a public meeting."

Asked what effect Judge Kirwan's ruling might have on The City, Mr. Kressbach said "probably none."

"The judge set forth various areas of council discussion which may be held privately," Mr. Kressbach said, "and they're basically the ones we follow in The City."

Falling under those areas, he said, were such items as "labor matters, personnel matters, property transactions and litigation involving The City — those are four which come to mind."

No areas of private council

discussion came to the mind of Thomas Jefferis, village superintendent of The Shores. He simply said "We do not hold any private council meetings."

Mr. Jefferis said even matters such as personnel contracts and litigation were discussed publicly.

In The Park and Farms Judge Kirwan's ruling apparently will have little or no affect, as well. Neither the Park city manager, Robert Slone, nor the Farms city manager, Andrew Bremer, said they were familiar with the ruling, but when briefed of the decision said they thought their cities complied with all legal codes.

Both cities occasionally hold closed-door meetings of the council "when we're in labor negotiations or when we might be discussing a certain transaction," as Mr. Slone phrased it, or "to discuss personnel matters or matters of the budget or wage negotiations," according to Mr. Bremer.

But both city managers added that no actions or votes were ever taken in the private council sessions.

Regardless of any city's policy regarding the holding of private council sessions, a bill now before the Michigan Legislature may change some standards, or at least define them more clearly.

Known as the "Open Meeting Act," the bill was introduced by Rep. Perry Bullard last year and would make illegal private council meetings except under specific circumstances similar to those cited both by Judge Kirwan and Mr. Kressbach.

Furthermore, the bill would pave the way for the fining of officials who take part in illegal closed-door meetings and would allow for the invalidation of action taken illegally.

That bill is now in committee, and may be acted upon this legislative session.

Mr. Petersen stated if the city knows ahead of time of a scheduled activity, officials will cooperate with seniors regarding the utilization of city facilities. He also cited the fact, on the meeting place front, that Woods seniors have been meeting at city churches twice a month on a steady basis.

Councilwoman Joan M. Mullan asked if a bus for seniors to the Lake Front Park, which was discontinued because of a poor response last summer, would be continued. It was said if the seniors want such a service, it could be instituted once again.

While the letter was unsigned, the council felt its content was important enough so they approved a motion referring the subject matter to the Citizens Recreation Commission for its study and exploration.

So there's "hope" for the "young senior" and other interested citizens on this subject.


In a related matter, the council accepted "with regret" the resignation of Andrew J. Campbell from the city's Senior Citizens Commission.

Mr. Campbell said a change has come about in his employment causing a discontinuance of his outside activities, especially during the week, and he asked that his name be removed from the commission.

"It has been a rewarding experience to work with the other members of the committee and very satisfying to

see the formation of the Heritage group," (senior citizens organization), he concluded.

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Residents Cite Hazards of Lochmoor Boulevard

A request for action to alleviate what they consider dangerous traffic conditions on Lochmoor boulevard between Holiday road and Fairway avenue was brought before The Woods Council by two Lochmoor residents at the regular meeting Monday, June 2.

The main concern of Bob and Mary Jane Starnes, along with other nearby citizens, is the number of accidents which have occurred at the median on Lochmoor between the two intersections. The median begins at their home address, (1109 Lochmoor), and ends at Fairway.

"There is a very sharp curve in the road where the median begins. Many cars exceeding the speed limit cannot make the turn and hit the median which sends the cars careening across the curb and over the sidewalk where children play," they said.

Mrs. Starnes, who along with her husband organized a petition drive on this matter, painted a murky picture on the overall safety front. "It's hard for a family with children to say, 'Okay kids, you can't play in our front yard,'" she told the council regarding the dangers lurking in that immediate area.

After some 10-15 minutes of clarifying and reclarifying motions on the floor, the solons unanimously agreed to

refer this matter to Public Safety Director Henry Marchand for the department's thorough study and analysis, including the best possible corrective measures which might be taken, with a report back to the council.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen stressed that the public safety department has the authority and responsibility to take any necessary and appropriate actions immediately.

"If they feel signs and markings would help now, the department on its own initiative can request the Department of Public Works to put up necessary signs and pavement markings. If that's their immediate recommendation, that's what will be done."

The NEWS attempted to contact Director Marchand, who will be away until Monday, June 9. However, Traffic Safety Officer Stephen Petrik emphasized, in the meantime, he will study the situation and see what the danger is.

Officer Petrik stated he and the director, upon his return, will review the entire matter and then make recommendations to alleviate the situation, which Mr. and Mrs. Starnes discussed in their letter to the council. "We will see what action can be taken to help the people," he said. In their letter, the Starnes

said they have lived at their present address for seven years and "dozens of cars have hit the curb, driven over the median and hit trees."

On this point, Officer Petrik said this may very well be possible but the department received no reports on such incidents. He stated three accidents at the curve near 1109 Lochmoor have been reported in the past three years. No injuries resulted in two of them and minor injuries were sustained in the other.

"Over the years we have planted three trees, because each one has been mowed down by cars. On Memorial Day, our tree was knocked down again and a maple tree was severely skinned of its bark," continued the Starnes.

"Fortunately, there were no bicycle riders or children playing in front of our house. We don't want to wait until someone is hurt to take action."

"Last July 4, two cars were damaged and our neighbor's car was severely damaged by a car which missed the curve and rammed into the group of parked cars."

They concluded by saying, "Before a child or an adult is injured or killed, we wish to suggest the following" including removal of several feet off the median; horizontal warning strips to slow down speeders; a larger signpost indicating a sharp curve; and a stop sign at mid-block along with a children playing sign to slow speeders. On the stop sign, Officer Petrik said such a sign is not used for speed control and is placed at intersections. A citizen raised another point. In calling Lochmoor boulevard a "poorly engineered street" which should be thoroughly investigated, he said it's a crosstown thruway in The Woods.

He felt the segmented medians were hazardous, and said they were "like coming into the second turn at the Indianapolis Speedway." On this, Councilman John Sabol noted that daring drivers, along with better engineered cars, also played important roles in the overall traffic safety area.

On the comment that Lochmoor was a poorly engineered street, Officer Petrik responded by saying, "I couldn't say that. If a driver goes 25 mph he should be

able to negotiate a turn. It's possible that we may need different signing, (i.e. visual indicators), there."

Currently, a diamond-shaped sign saying, "divided highway," is posted. Possibly, a new diamond-shaped sign containing a picture of an island with an arrow wrapped around to the right might be helpful.

The officer said new standard signs, such as the latter, have to be installed in all cities by December 31, 1976. "All cities will come under this or the State could suspend gas tax monies from non-complying cities," he said, while noting the Federal Government makes the states comply and the states, in turn, make local municipalities comply.

In a final note, Councilwoman Joan M. Mullan, who lives in the immediate area, said this problem came to her attention in a dramatic way regarding the Memorial Day weekend accident.

"When the last incident occurred, the sound was unbelievable. My immediate reaction was that someone had to be killed," she said. Mrs. Mullan described the noise as being like three head-on collisions in rapid succession. As it turned out, it was only a matter of trees being knocked down.

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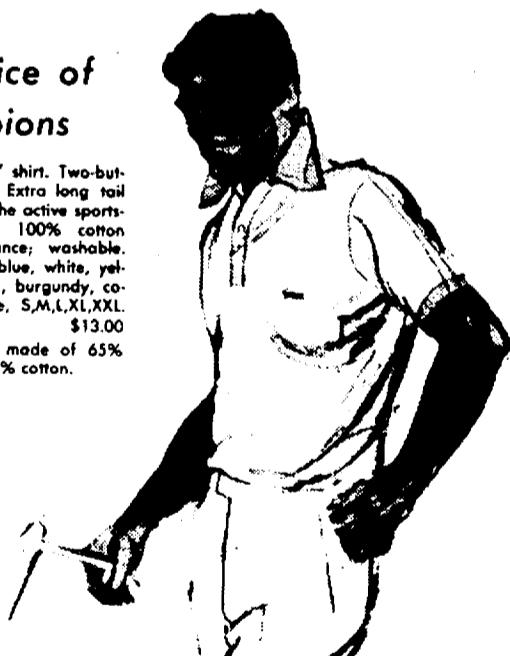

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No Difficulties Seen in Accepting HUD Funds

 Park City Manager Robert Stone said funds would go to provide off-street parking. Both city managers maintained their city's involvement in the program would not lead to long-range housing schemes, and said their city councils would not have approved the project under those conditions.
 Yet Title II of the 1974 act states that all-white communities funded under the act shall be required to take affirmative action to encourage blacks working in those communities to become permanent residents.

It goes on to spell out such conditions as three out of 10 families living in new housing units may not exceed \$6,058 in annual income.
 Yet, The Farms and Shores did not reject applying for HUD grants because of such extenuating conditions, said Farms City Manager Andrew Bremer and Shores Village Superintendent Thomas Jefferis.
 Mr. Bremer said The Farms Council "felt there were more needy communities" who could use the grant money. He referred to any one of about 20 municipalities in Wayne County that have applied for the grant.
 The Shores council, meanwhile, expressed the feeling that such projects simply were not in conformity with what is being done in that community, which is highly residential in character.
 The grants are first made to the counties which fall into the category of an "urban county." Wayne county, with its highly urbanized character, will likely be judged an urban community, and about \$800,000 will be made available for distribu-

tion within the county in the next several weeks.
 Amounts received by the various communities depend upon population, per capita income and other factors.
 Asked if The Farms rejected the application because of any fear it might entangle that city in a long-range housing scheme, Mr. Bremer said, "You'd really have to talk to a lawyer about that," but added that he did not think The Farms council feared any such complications.
 He reiterated that it was his understanding that council judged The Farms' money needs not as great as the needs of many other communities, and said it rejected the application mainly for that reason.
 Difficulties over the HUD grant have arisen in Warren, Mich., however, where Warren City Attorney Thomas Marrocco Jr. filed a report with the city council stating that Title II of the 1974 act had within its rules and regulations the ammunition to compel all-white suburbs receiving HUD funds to construct low cost housing, popu-

late those units on a quota system and recruit blacks to live in them.
 That's what could happen; not what has, or likely will, happen. As one Grosse Pointe official put it, "It's defeating to print this in a paper, but there are really no conditions to the acceptance of funds."
 "We use other federal funds," he said. "So what? We're all subject to Federal programs, anyway," he concluded.
 The Woods, because of its size, was not eligible for the same funds as were the other Pointes. But City Manager Chester Petersen has said that any measures which would reduce The Woods' right to "home rule" would be frowned upon.

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

 of destruction as we have in Grosse Pointe during the final weeks of school.
 "As all of you are well aware, the costs are not really borne anonymously by the school system or the Board of Education. They are paid by the people who tax themselves to provide our school facilities.
 "It is parents and other taxpayers who foot the bill for any destruction or damage to school property.
 "On a practical, realistic note: money to operate the schools and to provide qual-

ity education is increasingly hard to come by. People are unemployed; business conditions in the country are not good.
 "We should be spending our precious tax dollars for more useful purposes than repairing unnecessary damage.
 "I am convinced that 99 percent of the men and women in our graduating class are responsible, mature and ready to make a place in society. I hope that these responsible young adults will exercise leadership to control that unfortunate minority who may be foolhardy enough not only to risk their personal reputations through a possible confrontation with the police, but also to place their parents in a position of liability for any damages inflicted.
 "I have discussed this issue with the Board of Education. The trustees and I are unanimous in our desire to conduct an orderly closing of school this June.
 "Neither trustees nor staff members wish to see the personal record of any student marred with a police citation at the end of his or her high school career.
 "But all of us connected with the schools are firm in our resolve that perpetrators of destructive pranks who are apprehended will be prosecuted.
 "The Board of Education, the staff, the public and I shall appreciate the cooperation of all students and their parents."

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

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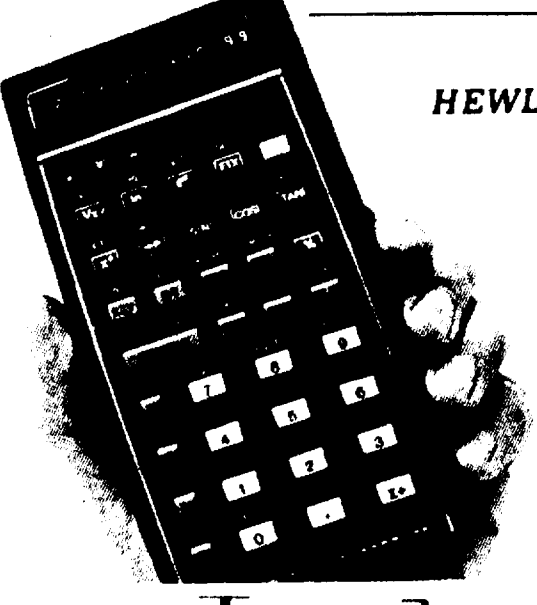

Presbyterians Purchase Land

The board of trustees of Presbyterian Village of Detroit Inc. announce the purchase of 37 acres of land on the 23 Mile road near Callens avenue, just west of New Baltimore, for the site of Presbyterian Village East, a new housing complex for the elderly.

Future residents will be drawn from members of the Presbyterian Churches in the geographical area served by the Detroit Presbytery including the Grosse Pointe area, the eastside of Detroit, Harper Woods, St. Clair Shores, East Detroit, Roseville, Warren, Sterling Heights, Mount Clemens and Port Huron.

The site plan now being prepared calls for one and two bedroom row apartments, efficiencies, single occupant rooms with private bath or shower in a community resident building, dining rooms, program areas, lounges and a reception building. The ultimate size of the Village has been temporarily set at 500 residents with 150 persons occupying the first units.

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Woods Pleased with New Administrative Assistant

A City man was selected for the full-time position of administrative assistant in The Woods via the federally-funded Comprehensive Employment and Training Act, (CETA).

He's Gerard McNamara, 42, who has a broad background in the architectural field with a main focus in the area of technical writing. Mr. McNamara, who began work Tuesday, May 27, said he's really enjoying all aspects of his job, particularly those which are recreation-related.

With his selection from the 11 who applied, some of the heavy work load will be lifted from City Administrator Chester E. Petersen.

"His main duty will be to inspect the Lake Front Park construction site every day to make certain all specifications are followed in the construction of the pool complex," said Mr. Petersen.

"He also will review and justify any request for change orders in construction, particularly those involving money."

But Mr. McNamara has many other responsibilities, too. He's currently working on a grant application to the Department of Natural Resources, (DNR), for a fishing pier at the Lake Front Park.

The council last month authorized its Parks and Recreation committee to investigate the possibility of applying for financial assistance from the Land and Water Conservation Fund, DNR, regarding a fishing pier in the area of boat dockage facilities.

In citing his efforts on the grant front so far, Mr. McNamara said this work also has thrust him into the area of Woods recreation facilities, "which I think are outstanding." He's also currently probing for funds for programs for the aged.

Among his other duties, Mr. Petersen stated he will work in a liaison capacity with the various new commissions created by the council, e.g., Beautification Commission and Bicentennial Commission, and "we hope to have him become involved in working up new contract proposals for this summer's sidewalk and concrete street replacement and curb recapping program."

Besides this, continued Mr. Petersen, he will prepare and work up specifications for

the purchase of new trucks and other heavy duty equipment which the city hopes to purchase this year.

"We also hope to utilize his ability in restoring the publication of a quarterly report to our citizens."

On his selection, Mr. Petersen said, "We felt his background and experience was more near the type of individual we were looking for and could utilize at this time, regarding his talents and experience being used to the best advantage of the city."

The city administrator added he's already impressed with Mr. McNamara. "He works with very little supervision and does what he's assigned on his own initiative. I'm impressed by the way he approaches each assignment given to him; he has a mature approach to each problem. I'm also amazed at his grasp of local governmental problems."

Mr. McNamara, who attended high school and Iona College in New Rochelle, N.Y., before going to the University of Detroit to study architecture, said he has prepared specifications for various construction projects, including writing the "specs" for North High School.

He also has done work on projects for the Ford Motor

Co., Michigan State University, American Motors, the Detroit Board of Education, (for several schools), and Schoolcraft Community College.

As for the CETA program, City Comptroller-Assessor Frederick G. Hornfisher said The Woods has hired 19 employees under the program.

Seventeen are under Title II and two are under Title VI, (in the latter, lesser monies are provided in comparison to Title II, he said).

Mr. Hornfisher stated most of the current employees were unemployed, laid off or college students trying to enter the job market. We'll know by the middle of this month what we'll be receiving monies-wise for next year, he said.

The amounts of funds available will dictate whether employees are retained or laid off. Mr. Hornfisher emphasized the city would like to keep all of them on their jobs, which vary from Department of Public Works duties to Public Safety cadets.

Youthful Purse Thieves Foiled

Three juveniles, all girls, were foiled in an attempt to snatch a Park woman's purse as she was walking on Maryland, Friday, May 16. The purse strap broke as the girls grabbed the purse and pushed the victim to the ground, according to information released by Lt. Gordon Duncan.

In falling to the ground, the woman's body covered the purse and the three girls ran from the area, however not before a male resident of Maryland road, on hearing the woman's screams, ran to her assistance. He pursued the girls and captured one of them. The other two were taken into custody by Park Officer Michael Kortas at Wayburn and Charlevoix.

The would-be young thieves were taken to the Park station and later released to detectives of the Grosse Pointe Youth Service Division for further investigation and questioning.

Lt. Duncan said that the victim, who also resides in Maryland avenue, was walking south on the east side of her street, when the three girls approached. Two of the girls separated and walked,

one on each side of their intended victim, and made a grab for the purse, breaking the strap as they pushed the woman to the ground.

It was not disclosed if the victim was hurt in the fall, but the fact that she fell on her purse foiled the theft, the lieutenant said.

One girl is 14-years-old and the others are 13-years-old.

William Waugaman, of 344 Ridge road, came before the council Monday, June 2, requesting permission to erect a six-foot fence along the side yard lot line of his property. The Waugaman home is the last one along that block of Ridge road and the side fence would go along the back lot lines of two Morross road homes.

Mr. Waugaman said the proposed fence would be about 80 feet in length.

The two Morross road property owners are Arthur Socia, at 233 Morross road, and Al Socia, his son, at 235 Morross road.

The Waugamans need council approval to construct a fence over six feet high and any fence that would extend in front of the front building line of the property which is in the proposal.

Mr. Waugaman said they seek the fence in order to effectively screen the backyard Socia property from their own view. He said since there is a lot of activity in the Socia rear yards conditions there are not as nice as in the front of the Socia property.

Mr. Waugaman said they have tried screening the property through the use of evergreens but that has not been successful.

Gerald Fitzgerald, Jr., representing Al Socia who also

attended the meeting, contended that the Socia lots are so small that a six-foot fence erected along the back lot lines would block out a considerable amount of light and air and would create a virtual cave-like atmosphere in the Socia backyards.

Mr. Fitzgerald said Mr. Socia is agreeable to a four-foot high fence. He added that the Socia property existed long before the Waugamans moved to the area and that the Socias maintain their rear properties in the best manner possible.

At present there are several types of fences and bushes separating the properties.

Some council members expressed a desire to view the property in question before making any decision on the matter.

Acting Mayor James Dingeman said that although the council could make a decision on the matter he felt it was the type of dispute that could be resolved on a personal basis between the property owners if they would meet with one another.

"I would feel terribly remiss if I didn't try to put pressure on you two to sensibly resolve this matter between yourselves," he said.

He asked Al Socia and Mr. Waugaman if they would meet and try to find a solution. Both men said they would like to pursue such a course of action.

The council said if an agreement cannot be reached within two weeks the matter would be placed on the council agenda for Monday, June 16.

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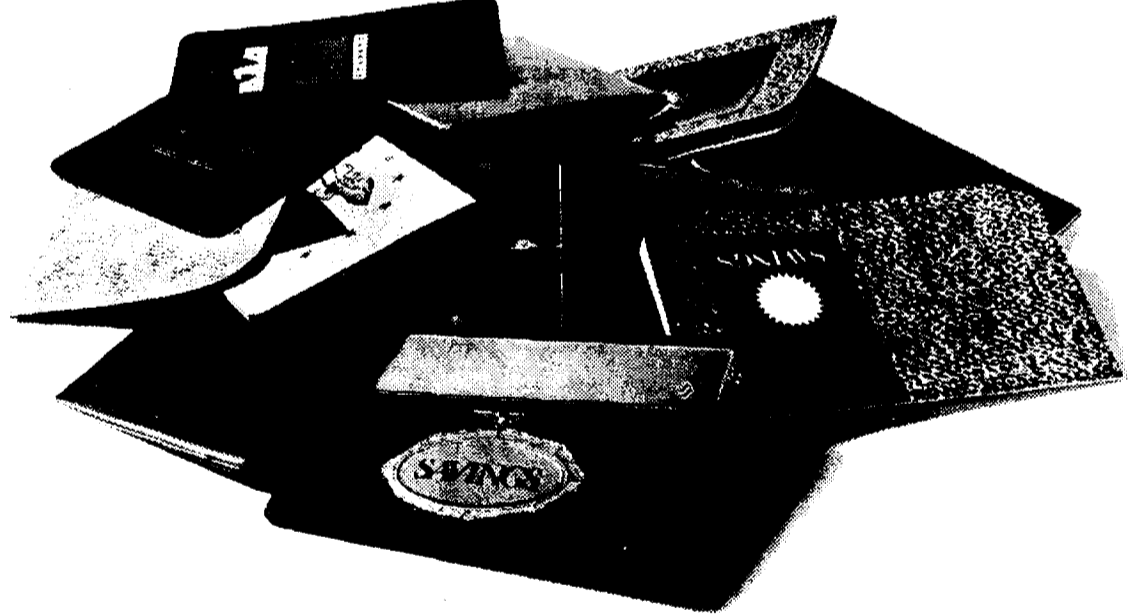

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
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North Holds Art Exhibit
