Thursday, June 19 THE ANGLICAN CHURCH of Canada has authorized the ordination of women as priests, it was learned today. The move was taken late last night at the Church's

General Synod in Quebec City. The Canadian Church, with about 1,5 million members, became the first Western body in that tradition to authorize ordaining women. The step is expected to have worldwide implications for the Anglican communion at large, which has branches around the globe involving 45 million members, including the Episcopal Church in the

DEFENSE SECRETARY James R. Schlesinger said today the Soviet Union has deployed a new series of nuclear missiles with multiple warheads — so a single rocket could carry atomic bombs aimed at more than one target. Soviet deploy-ment of MIRVs, short for multiple independently - targetable re-entry vehicles, had been anticipated for some time. 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

Had Notified City

The old City Police Officers' Association and the Sergeants and Corporals' Association first notified The City of their intent to unionize when a resolution confirming the move was read into the record at a regular meeting of The City Council April 21.

Prior to that time a vote of the associations' member-ship had been taken, and Mr. Teolis said the vote was 100 percent in favor of joining. Approval of the associations' petition to join the Teamsters by the Michigan Labor Relations Board was necessary before last Thursday's final membership vote


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

### Pointer Leads U-M Women In Gaining Letter Awards

By Teri Mageau

It was bound to happen. Everyone knew it would. The alumni of the M Club slept restless nights dreaming about it. Bo Schembechler crawled into a football locker and cried bitter tears over it. John Orr nearly hung himself from a basketball net, but it happened anyway.

Women athletes at the University of Michigan got their varsity letter. The traditional Block M award that previously went only to the most outstanding male athletes will now be awarded to outstanding female athletes, since a 17-1 vote was taken by the Board in Control of Intercollegiate Athletics Tuesday, June 10.

"I think it's a great victory for women and a leadership step for the University," declared Sheryl Szady, of Leunon avenue in The Woods. Sheryl was one of the main sponsors of this proposal.

"Michigan has always been a leader of progressive athletics, but they've been a little slow with women's intercollegiate. Now they are up where they should be with this new ruling, and hopefully the same thing will happen at other universities throughout the country."

Sheryl, a 1970 North High School alumna, is a graduate student at the university, just finishing her masters thesis. She stands to receive letter in basketball and field hockey for her participation in her undergraduate years. She has been active in the fight for women's athletics since her sophomore year, four years ago, and she went before the Regents in April 1973 with a plea for university recognition.

"We demand nothing," she explained, "We simply stated our case before the Regents and asked them to look into it. Official recognition is es-sential to any athletic pro-gram because that is the only way you can get funds for coaching, equipment, insurance and things like that."

Upon their request, the Regents established the Committee to Study Intercollegiate Athletics for Women at the end of the 1973 academic year. This committee in turn established the President's Advisory Committee for Women's Intercollegiate Athletics for the 1974-75 year. Sheryl was a member of both committees. She is also the only female student member on the Board of Control.

"It was the President's committee that gave the needed recognition to womens' sports," said Sheryl,
"and laid the groundwork for the Block M award pro-

"I think they may get more money from women alumnae. The same type of thing happened back in 1968 when they were starting to let more minority students into the university. Everyone thought that the alumni funds would stop coming in, but they haven't."

Sheryl feels that it is only the graduates of the M Club who are opposed to the granting of Block M's to wo-

"Every undergrad athlete that I talked to was in favor of it. As a matter of fact, they were surprised we didn't already have it," Sheryl said.

There will be two styles of jackets and two sizes of Block M's ordered. Whichever will be selected is up to the individual athlete.

The second style jacket was designed for those women who didn't like the leather sleeves on the original although men are also allowed to purchase the newer style. The emblem will be identical, except a little smaller, if so chosen. Sheryl admits that the second jacket proposal was a minor compromise.

"Many people were pushing for equal but different awards. But, though the jacket is different, the Block M is not, and that is the true symbol of Michigan athletics.

"I think there is a fresh enthusiasm for Michigan sports on the part of women. I've seen many male athletes of present taking a more internal attitude toward their athletics. They say, 'I've set my own record, never mind about a Michigan record.'

"But now that the women are allowed equal award recognition, we feel enthusiastic about Michigan athletics and we are proud to represent Michigan."

### Blackout Hits **Shores Area**

Other suggestions include placing park benches at bus stops and on the City Hall

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

Along with these there was Ian Fleming, making his second appearance on the yearly list with his last fulllength James Bond advennard effort.

In GAMES PEOPLE PLAY, Eric Berne explained his theories about the roles people assume, usually to conceal the real facts about themselves from others. His book sold 205,000 copies. One of the few religious

books to make a best seller list reached fourth place in 1965 with a sale of 198,000 copies. This was evangelist Billy Graham's WORLD AFLAME. MARKINGS by the late Secretary General of the UN, Dag Hammarskjold, could be called his spiritual autobiography, containing his poems, thoughts, and short essays. ### Cannons End 1812 Overture

The serene, verdant hillside at Meadow Brook Music Festival will be transformed into a mock Napoleonic battlefield this Sunday afternoon, June 29, in prepara-tion for the five-hour Tchaikovsky Marathon - first of its kind for the Festival.

Sixteen cannon will be positioned in readiness for a spectacular version of the "1812 Overture" to be performed by the Detroit Symphony Orchestra under the baton of music director Aldo Ceccato as a Marathon cli-The cannon, a valuable

collection of original Lyle type life-saving guns, are being supplied by South Bend Replicas, Inc., a unique firm which deals in building cannon to serve the needs of modelmakers, restorers and other serious students of antique firearms and ordnance. A strategically-refined system of electric ignition permits accurate timing of 16 shots from the Lyle guns in accordance with Tchaikovsky's own specifications for

cannon shot. Lyle cannon statistics are 42 inches overall length, 32 inches barrel length and 170 pounds weight.

Designed in 1879 by Lieu-tenant David A. Lyle as a practical, effective and standardizable method of throwing lines, primarily for the purpose of rescuing persons stranded by shipwreck, the Lyle guns remained in service until they were replaced by rocket carriers in 1952. In this country alone, Lyle guns are credited with sav-ing 4,500 lives.


