Thursday, August 14 GENERAL MOTORS CORPORATION announced Wednesday that it will in-crease retail prices on its 1976 passenger cars by an average of \$206 this fall. Price changes will range from a decrease of \$211 on the Chevrolet Monza Towne Coupe to an increase of \$608 on the Chevrolet Corvette. While across the line price increases will average 4.4 percent, the price of optional equipment will rise an average of six percent.

A RADIO BROADCAST monitored in India announced the overthrow of Bangladesh President Mujibur Rahman in a pre-dawn coup Friday. The president was killed and was replaced by one of his closest associates, Kjondakar Mushtaque Ahmed, Ahmed, who was ousted from the Bangladesh Army last year because of political differences with some of the country's leaders, urged his countrymen to "do your duty and cooperate with the new government."

Sunday, August 17

FEDERAL JUDGE Robert E. Spokes-men for the plaintiff NAACP said they already are working on an appeal of what they call Judge DeMascio's "nonplan." The decision, rather than capping the five-year civil rights case, promises to be an interim step in a complex, emotionally charged legal battle.

Monday, August 18

A FIRE in a Gulf Oil refinery burned out of control Sunday, killing six firemen and injuring 13 other persons. Three other firemen were reported as missing. The fire broke out shortly after dawn in a 80,000 barrel storage tank as a tanker was unloading. The refinery, one of the largest in the country, was used for containing crude oil, jet fuel and naptha.

Tuesday, August 19

THE MICHIGAN BOARD of Education announced Monday that Michigan teachers are the sixth highest paid in the nation, but that the State ranks 14 in per-pupil spending. The board also said Michigan ranks 43 among the 50 states in terms of manageable teacher-pupil ratio. Michigan's more than 100,000 teachers were paid an average annual salary of \$13,364 for the 1975 school year. States with higher averages were Alaska, California, Hawaii, Illinois and New York.

Political Reform State Board Bill Criticized by HW Bid Pointes'Officials Required Financial Disclosure by Candidates

Would Discourage Many from Running for Office, Some Incumbents Believe

The recently passed Senate political reform bill has been met with mostly unfavorable reactions from the five Pointe city councils. The bill, introduced by Common Cause, a consumer protection lobbyist group, calls for far reaching legislation in the areas of campaign contributions and financial disclosure of candidates and office holders. Sections 131 and 132 directly affect the local councils and are the reason for the controversy.

Transfer Would Have involved 1,119 Students Living in Portion of Pointe District

By Susan McDonald The State Board of Education voted Wednes-

day, August 13, to deny the proposed transfer of a portion of the Grosse Pointe school district to the Harper Woods school district.

The transfer would have involved 1,119 students who live in that portion of the Grosse Pointe school district which is located in Harper Woods. This includes students from Poupard Elemen-tary, Parcells Middle and North High Schools and about \$1 million of annual tax revenues.

The board upheld an October 1974 decision on the transfer by the Wayne County Intermediate Board of Education with a 4-2 vote. Board members Barbara J. Roberts of Lansing and Annette Miller of Huntington Woods dissented and Norman O. Stockmeyer Sr., of Livonia, abstained from

"I'm not upset about it," he said, "It's not as far reaching as they all think. It doesn't specify that the amount of your assets must be disclosed, just the sources of funds other than the salary you receive as a public servant.

"I have basically no objection in stating the sources of my funds," he continued. "I think it prevents anything that could be a possible conflict of interest. For instance, if a city council member has some investment in a building contractor's firm, a real conflict of interest could arrive if that firm bids for a city contract.

"Certainly some people know where he stands fi-nancially. Why not the pub-

A total of 78 complaints venile. were received by the Youth Service Division, (YSD), last month. This is an increase of 25 cases over the July 1974 total but a decrease of two under the June 1975 amount.

The overall incident total is still running ahead of last year's with 472 cases being processed through July, a jump of 41 over the total for the same period in 1974.

Larceny/theft was once again the category of highest incidence with 18 such cases being handled. These involved 20 male juveniles.

In related categories, there were five possession of stolen property incidents, four breakings and enterings, two auto thefts and two robbery cases, involving 16 male juveniles. In addition, there were two cases of prowling with intent to steal, involving three boys.

Violation of the Controlled Substances Act was the next category of highest incidence with nine such cases being reported. When considered with alcohol abuse, the breakdown shows:

Six marijuana or hashish cases involving three male adults and two male juveniles; one synthetic drug case involving one male adult and one male juvenile; one all other, (sale), case involving two male adults.

More are two controlled substances and alcohol cases involving one male adult, one female adult and one female juvenile; one alcohol, (sale), case involving two male adults and four male juveniles; and one drunkenness case involving one male ju-

Schools Change Rating System

The Grosse Pointe school system will be reviewed this year by a new planning and evaluation component, established by the Board at its Monday, August 11, meeting.

The new department will take over the evaluation of various programs and testing systems that was previously handled by the schools' department of instruction.

"People who plan and implement a program should not be the ones to evaluate it," said Superintendent Dr. James A. Adams.

This year's goals, according to Dr. Adams, will be an evaluation of the language, arts and math programs, along with the coordination of the system's standardized and state testing pograms.

Curriculum programs will include the Initial Teaching Alphabet, (ITA); Science Curriculum Improvement Studies, (SCIS), and Skills/Talent. An in-depth study of the middle school also will be conducted.

Housing Plea to Go on Ballot

(Continued from Page 1) said Tuesday morning, August 19, it's up to the council to decide on the precise wording. At press time, Mr. Petersen was waiting to learn of the council's intent on the approved motion.

Could Rezone

When the proposed ballot wording is finalized and inasmuch as this proposal has nothing to do with a charter amendment, (as did previous proposals), all Mr. Petersen has to do is certify the proposal with Wayne County to be printed on the ballot. Mr. Catlin said as far as

he was concerned, the wording would be the same as that contained in the motion. He said if the proposal passes by three-fifths or more, the council could create a building authority and, more importantly, officially consider rezoning the land from single family residential, (its current classification), to multiple dwelling.

If the proposal doesn't pass by three-fifths or more, noted Mr. Catlin, the council is still prevented from transferring park property by the

charter provision. After their petitions to place cials on Friday, August 8, the seniors gathered at the Monday night meeting to urge the council to place the matter before the voters.

Had No Time A point of confusion was first cleared up by Mr. Catlin, a point which was reported in last week's NEWS. The city attorney felt that State Statutes regarding initiatory charter amendment petitions could be filed with the city clerk 60 days prior to the general election. This wasn't the case.

Mr. Catlin said he confused the fact that a city council, by three-fifths vote, may place a proposed charter amendment on the ballot not less than 60 days prior to the election, whereas 90 days is required for initiatory petitions. So, the Heritage Group actually had no time to conduct another initiatory petition drive.

The city attorney added on several earlier occasions the seniors were properly advised of the 90-day requirement prior to their filing of petitions on Friday, August

Options Available.

With that cleared up; Mr.

Catlin said two options were still available to have this question placed on the ballot: (1), the council could do so or (2), correct petitions could be circulated to force a special election. Those would require 20 percent of the signatures of registered

At the meeting, Mrs. Robert Boyd presented proposed ballot wording for a charter amendment, plus a proposal for an advisory vote, for the solons' consideration based on the guidance of the group's attorney.

Mrs. Boyd said she just wanted to make certain that a "yes" vote meant one was in favor of the proposal and a "no" vote meant one was against the proposal. Her concern was over the confusing aspects of ballot propositions in general. She said such proposed

housing would benefit all Woods citizens, and oited the fact that people wanted to stay in The Woods and not move from the community to obtain housing. "Some people have been forced to move to other communities because we have no facilities in this area," she said. Mayor Agrees

Mrs. Boyd stated this drive started in 1973 and felt seniors had been getting the "run around" in their efforts. She said this wasn't meant to be a criticism of the council but was a "statement of fact" as the seniors saw it.







Pipe Smokers Have Much in Common

Give up? They're all ardent pipe

The world of pipes is as diverse as the people who smoke them. They can be cheap or expensive, big or little, friendly or rude.

Jim Simon, of Hill and Hill Tobacconist Ltd., 19529 Mack avenue, explained what to look for in a good pipe, "Always check the graining in a briar pipe, along with the weight, the thickness of the bowl, (the thicker the bowl, the cooler the smoke), and the number of 'bird's eyes.' "They are the knotholes in

the wood and the more, the better," he said. "A good, dependable briar can be bought buried in sand for three for about \$20." Briars have a distinctive background, and are not

noted for their hardness. What do President Ford, The best briar comes from briars, the older the wood Greece, followed by Corsica and Algeria. The shrubs are cut down

to the roots and then divided into blocks from which the pipe will be carved. The blocks are boiled in water for 12 hours to kill all insects and parasites.

After this, the wood is sea-soned with herbs and spices. Just "what" herbs and spices, are jealously guardcompany. A nylon or lucite stop is applied and the pipe is buffed and shined with carnuba wax.

An average briar shrub will produce 30 pipes. Sometimes the process doesn't stop there. The Camminetto briar, made in Cantu, Italy, advertises itself as the driest pipe in the world.

When it comes to pricing used, the higher the price a smoker must pay. The wood used in a top-of-the-line briar is 400-years old. The price is also top of the line-\$5,000.

The other type of pipe available is the meershaum. Meershaum means "sea foam" in Turkish, where the pipes originated. The pipes are made of solidified calcium deposits from decayed fish. These deposits are cened trade secrets of each pipe turies old and have no taste of their own,

While a briar will add its own wood flavor to tobacco, the meershaum lets the full taste of the leaf come through.

Years ago, when meer-shaums were first available, they had a tendency to change colors from constant handling. The dirt and oils on a person's fingers would turn After carving, the pipe is the pipe a dirty gray. For that reason all smokers were given an white glove to wear while smoking to keep their pipe clean.

> That problem has been eliminated today with the application of beeswax to stop the discoloration .

While age is a deciding factor in the cost of a briar craftsmanship is what determines the price of a meershaum. They start at about \$20, but can go considerably higher. The most costly meer-

shaum today is about the size of a coffee table, measuring

two feet by two feet by four feet. The pipe weighs about 10 pounds and is carved into a city complete with streets, buildings and people. You can't walk in off the venue and just pick one u either. They must be ordered

special and take four months to make. Ideally not the sort of pipe you'd take to a football game, it is a conversation piece.

This piece of conversation costs \$10,000. While it takes prolonged

smoking to build up a good mantle, (crust), inside the bowl of a pipe, it takes only seconds to destroy it. Serious smokers clean their pipes with delicate, painstaking care.

So don't clean dad's pipe with soap and water. He may not appreciate it.

Another enemy of the pipe smoker is tobacco that is 'cased." This is tobacco that is laced with sugar, saltpeter or other chemicals. This can cause a tobacco to bite.

By the way, the most expensive tobacco costs \$1.50 an ounce, or \$24 for a Persian slipperful.

Though pipe smokers are numerically inferior to devotees of cigarets and cigars, they consider themselves a cut above them in all other

"Being that we don't inhale, pipe smokers don't smoke out of habit, but rather for enjoyment and relaxation," said Mr. Simon, himself an owner of 300 pipes



He answered with sincerity it was certainly better than a shooting. No argument bere.

For several years we have been working toward the development of a greater range of career preparation pro-grams in our schools and an increased number of cooperative programs. Did you know that this

summer 12 students were graduated in the Co-op Nurses Aide Program which is sponsored by the Board of Education in cooperation with Cottage Hospital? The program provides young people with a taste of hospital life, and on-the-job training I have been able to learn and for the ever-expanding and all-important health services field. After this experience they may set their sights on medical school - or they make an intermediate career

What happens in our more "traditional" coop offering-office education? Following classroom instruction in the necessary skills, the system attempts to arrange actual on-the-job training as a general office worker, clerical worker, typist, receptionist, stenographer, file clerk, bookkeeper, or switchboard operator. A student is dismissed early from school to work on a job located in the Grosse Pointe-Detroit area. The teacher-coordinator both instructs the student and supervises him or her during on-the-job training.
