WARRING CHRISTIAN and Moslem factions agreed to a cease-fire Saturday in a bid to end Lebanon's escalating civil strife. All battletorn districts were reported quiet minutes after it was announced, Radio and television broadcasts quoted heads of political parties and religious factions instructing their followers to immediately abide by the cease-fire. The week-long fighting had paralyzed life in Beirut. The fighting was mainly over the Palestinian guerillas' presence in Lebanon.
