Thursday, October 2 PRESIDENT FORD revealed Wednesday that he plans to propose another tax cut program shortly. At a news conference with Ne-braska and Iowa reporters, Mr. Ford said, "Hopefully, in a week or so I will be able to make a specific recommendation for a potential tax reduction program with a rigid restriction on Federal expenditures." He also stated he wants to "give our taxpayers a better opportunity to spend their own money." The current tax reduction expires at the end of this year.

Friday, October 3 HAILING THE full restoration of Japanese-American friendship after the "tragic interlude" of World War II, Japan's Emperor Hirohito began a state visit here Thursday amid elaborate ceremonial trappings. He also commented upon residential complaints over teenagers and younger groups using the park as a location for drinking. "One has to merely walk any day throughout the grounds at Ghesquiere to see evidence that this complaint is indeed valid," he said.

Parks and Recreation Committee chairman, Councilman Ronald R. Kefgen, said both groups are currently considering these problems. He said the basis of the poor lighting complaints stems from citizens and their feelings that the illumination is inadequate. As for the problems in re-

lation to the playing area, Mr. Hallmann said, "The magic square area, which provides half the courts at Ghesquiere, (two of the four courts), is flooded with water each time it rains and cannot be used for several days afterwards.

"In addition, the dampness due to this water condition constantly erodes the tennis court surface causing it to peel away in large areas."



"After a rainfall, it is necessary to de-water the settling tank by emptying the contents into the Detroit interceptor sewer for treatment by the Detroit system. The Wayne County Drain Commissioner's office is, and has been, cooperating with the Air Pollution Control Commission of Wayne County.

"Procedures have been authorized and are in effect he added. that direct that the de-watering and cleaning of the settling tank be accomplished as soon as possible when conditions require such procedures.'

Seeking Grants

Looking ahead, he stated the long range proposed solution involves major construction of additional settling tank capacity in order to reduce the number and amount of overflow into Lake St. Clair.



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
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

Almost no preventive action on homicide prevention is being taken nationally, Dr. Tanay noted in his letter to President Ford. "The prestige of your office and your well deserved image as a man of good will inspire researchers and the general public to focus attention upon this social cancer," wrote Dr. Tanay.

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What Goes On Your Library

By Arthur M. Woodford Chief of Central Library

Six months or so ago wrote a column which called "odds and ends." would like to try it again. Here are six totally unrelated books covering six totally unrelated topics.

I selected these titles at random to illustrate the wide variety of subject material to be found on our shelves. The only thing these books have in common is that they available at your Grosse Pointe Public Libraries. A book that many may find

to be "disturbing" is Midge Decter's LIBERAL PAR-ENTS, RADICAL CHIL-DREN (Coward, McCann). Ms. Decter sees the rebel youth of the 1960's as the new lost generation and blames their parents for their children's failures. She provides some answers to fathers and mothers who wonder where they "went wrong." These youngsters, These youngsters, usually bright and gifted, were virtually idolized at home. The author sees the 1960's rebels as unusually self-regarding, (what they don't dig is "boring, irrelevant"). They are incapable of tolerating any difficulties; even while renouncing their families and their values, they are losers dependent on parents and/or society.

Norman Longmate's THE WORKHORSE (St. Martin's) is a comprehensively researched, deftly written study of that dread institution, the English workhouse. Workhouses sprang up like mushrooms in the mid-19th century, monuments to the ear's faith in the "reformative powers of bare brick, simple diet and harsh discipline.' As well as following the tortuous twists of the ways that affected the workhouse, Longmate presents a selective case history of the abominable treatment meted out there to all manner of poor. This book is an interesting and instructive lesson



Silver Anniversary For Woman's Club

Quarter-Century of Service, Commitment And Enjoyment to Be Celebrated at Tea and Program at War Memorial Next Wednesday

Twenty-five years ago, in September, 1950, the NEWS reported that a Neighbors' Group had been set up for new residents of the community. "Its members," the article noted, "are primarily women who have lived in Grosse Pointe for less than a year, and want to get acquainted."

The Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association, sponsor of the Group, described it as "a Grosse Pointe club for women

. . an organization to further the interest of its members in community activities at our War Memorial, to welcome the new women in Grosse Pointe, and to keep older residents (involved) in the Center's social, cultural, educational and recreational activities."

Thus was the Grosse Pointe Woman's Club born. ginated with the late Mrs. Frederick C. Ford, who in 1950, headed the War Memorial Association's program committee.

Mrs. Ford sought the assistance of Mrs. Frank Lister in setting up a New Neighbors' Group, and in Septemalize plans already set in motion by the Center's program committee

Of those original seven, three continue to live in the community. They are Mrs. Lawrence Ruby, the Club's first president, Mrs. John G. edited the Club's newsletter.

Names of new residents were obtained from local realtors, invitations sent out, and, in response to those invitations, 25 women gathered on October 2, 1950, in the Veterans' Room of the War Memorial's Alger House, to make plans for monthly meetings.

By January, 1951, the women had elected officers and submitted by-laws. A Service Group was soon formed; it became the first to be granted permission by Children's Hospital to make surgical dressings and bandages In actuality, the idea for the new organization had originated with the late Mrs. for Children's Hospital, now a separate, Center-sponsored activity.

The American Red Cross Bloodmobile Unit has the longest service record of any Woman's Club-sponsored activity, for it began its work ber, 1950, seven women met in 1952 and for 23 years has at Mrs. Lister's home to fin-provided its vital volunteer provided its vital volunteer service wherever and whenever needed.
