Thursday, October 30 A FEDERAL GRAND jury in Sacramaento, Calif., indicted Steven Soliah, Patricia Hearst's lover, on a charge of killing a woman customer during a suburban Sacra-mento bank robbery last April. The one-count murder indictment accused Soliah, 27, a reclusive former football player and track star, of killing the woman with a shotgun blast during the April 21 robbery at the Carmichael branch of the Crocker National Bank. The FBI earlier confirmed that Miss Hearst was identified as the woman who rented a Sacramento garage in April to store the car used in the getaway.

Spray Paint Damage Done to Churches, Ice Cream Parlor by Inevitable Vandals

"Devil's Night," the evening before Halloween, was reasonably calm on the destruction front, according to reports from Pointe police departments and the school system. Of all the municipalities, The Farms appeared to suffer the worst damage.

"Spray paint damage was the most serious problem we had," said Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber, "The Friendly Ice Cream Parlor was the hardest hit as it was splattered with paint," (on the building's west, north and east sides).

"Overall in the last two years, we've seen a downward trend in damages, but would still ask parents to wonder where their children were on 'Devil's Night,' " he stated.

The ice cream parlor wasn't the only recipient of spray paint. Vandals also struck the Grosse Pointe Congregational Church, 240 Chalfonte, by spraying green and gold paint on windows and the garage, (including obscenities on the latter). Two broken windows also were reported,

Church Sign Sprayed At the same time, Saint Paul Evangelical Lutheran Church, 375 Lothrop road, told police that green and gold paint was sprayed on its front sign. Four homes and three cars also received paint

damage. The department said four homes received broken windows, two fire hydrants were opened, one truck had its wiper blades bent and mirrors damaged and eight leaf fires transpired over "Devil's

In The City, a Washington road resident said someone removed her American flag from a pole and burned it sometime between 6:30 p.m. on "Devil's Night" and 12:30

Police Chief Andrew Teetaert said, "We put all the cars on the road on 'Devil's Night.' The leaf fires, (of which there were 11 that evening), I suspect, were all started by the same group of youngsters going around. Damage All Minor

"All of the damage was minor. There was no serious damage of any kind."

Police added Halloween morning was spent scraping eggs from scout cars. Meanwhile in The Woods

combined total of around 27 reports were handled on "Devil's Night" and Hallow een night. The majority of these were egg throwing incidents. As for leaf fires, seven

were reported on "Devil's Night" and five on Halloween but, overall, damage was minimal.

"It was just beautiful," said Public Safety Director Henry Marchand. "There was nothing of an earth-shaking consequence. A great job was done by our troops and by the youths, themselves,"

It was comparatively quiet in The Park, police said, with few leaf burning incidents being reported.

Parent volunteers took turns patrolling school grounds to prevent possible vandalism. This apparently worked out very well.

Officers added very few children were out "trick or treating," the first time this has ever happened in the city.

The Shores Department of Public Safety said everything was extremely quiet with only one egg throwing incident taking place. "Trick or treating" was down this Hal loween in comparison to pre vious years, the department noted
