Thursday, November 20 GENERALISSIMO FRAN-CISCO FRANCO, dictator of Spain for 36 years, died Wednesday in Madrid, the news agency Europa Press announced. He was 82. Aided by a score of doctors, Franco held on to life tenaciously since he was first stricken October 17. His heart, lungs and kidneys began failing in quick succession, but his staying power astounded even his own medical team. He struggled back from three major operations to remove ulcers and stop massive internal bleeding. Prince Juan Carlos de Bourbon, Franco's hand-picked heir, has indicated he will be open to orderly political change. He become Spain's first king in 44 years.

Entrance was made through unlocked French doors on the ground floor. Policemen at the scene found the doors slightly ajar, with foot prints leading into the living room. The thieves were in their stocking feet while committing the crime.

The foot prints were a result of lime spread across the grounds that day. The lime had been wet down before the groundskeeper had gone

home.
The foot prints went from the living room, across a wooden floor and onto a light blue carpet. The prints then led down the wall line, as the thieves took selected paintings from the wall. They removed small brass lamps affixed to the paintings and placed them on the floor.

After removing four oil paintings from the hall wall, the thieves then walked into a small sitting room and removed two more oil paintings. They next went to a main hall and took down three more paintings, once again leaving the brass lamps on the floor. Two other paintings also were reported miss-

# Seek Relief

Woods Council Holds Discussion at Executive Session; May Have Decision by December 8

What specific action will take place regarding the possible alleviation of the traffic problem of Brys drive and Old Eight Mile road, between Harper and Mack, awaits the action of The Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, December 8.

The council, meeting as the Committee of the Whole, (C-W) in executive session on Monday, November 24, further discussed this problem which area residents brought to their attention at the October 20 session.

At the meeting last month, citizens sought relief from the heavy vehicular traffic on their streets. They claimed motorists used the streets, especially Brys drive, as short cuts to Mack avenue.

They cited the existence of blind angle curves at the intersections of Helen and Brys which they said were not wide enough to accommodate parking and the passage of two vehicles.

The letter will be received before the December 8 meeting. At that time, the council will meet in committee before the regular meeting to make a recommendation for action at the public session, according to Mr. Pinkos.

Director Marchand said on Tuesday morning, November 25 he has some ideas regarding possible recommendations but at this point in time he hasn't got down to putting them on paper. He wants to do further "homework," e.g., viewing and considering laws, before anything is done.

Last week the exploration was highlighted when 17 professionals in everything from child psychology to the trucking industry came in to speak with the students.

They met with the kids in small groups where they were grilled on every aspect of their work, from salary to life styles. The class has no textbook,

but rather depends on wantads, reference books, interviews with working people and general class discussion. A most valuable tool, according to all involved, has been a test called "The Self report said counts were taken Directed Search," published by Consulting Psychologists Press, Inc. Rather than gauge ability, the test attempts to narrow down a student's interests and areas of most confidence into six general occupational groups: investigative, artistic, social, enterprising, conventional or

realistic. From there a key leads students to hundreds of specific careers in each area that can be researched through reference books and microfilms, as to training, salaries and functions.

For a student such as 13year-old Robert Roddewieg, such research can be invaluable.

"I know that some day I'd like to own a hobby shop, but that takes a lot of money to start," Robert said.

"I've figured out now that I'd better study accounting and work in that field until can save up the money. I know just how much college I'll need and just what high school classes to take next year," he explains.

Addressing the council, Mr. Randazzo said, "We intend to sell the house as soon as repairs are made. The house should be repaired by the end of the year."

The bill attempts to define who is a "voluntary quit" in order to determine if an unemployed person must wait 13 weeks for unemployment benefits as a "quit" or if the person is entitled to immedi-ate benefits. It is a \$200 million question.

The bill made it so easy for a person to claim he was justified in leaving his job, because it wasn't "suitable" for him, that nearly anyone could have gotten immediate benefits by showing that, under the law, he was not a "voluntary quit."

This concept of the suitability of work is already in the law in determining if an unemployed person must ac-

It is a tough question. In a real way it seems to me that if an accountant gets laid off and the only job available is on an assembly line that he should grab that job, keep looking for another accounting job and switch when he finds one.

The problem with that idea is said to be that he may get stuck in the lower level skills job, lose his expertise into accounting. That is a problem, so some balance is needed in the law of unemployment compensation,

But, from the standpoint of what may be the best for his self respect and for the nation, I would like to see less waiting around for suitable jobs and more willingness to take the best job that is available, no matter what it is, even if it means getting dirty or working in a drudgery kind of job.

On the other hand, I have not had the experience of being unemployed, yet, I do appreciate the trauma it causes and the complexity of the feelings, fears and problems it raises.

It is both a tough economic and a tough social problem.
