(Continued from Page 1) recommendations for the solons' consideration.

The letter will be received before the December 8 meeting. At that time, the council will meet in committee before the regular meeting to make a recommendation for action at the public session, according to Mr. Pinkos.

Director Marchand said on Tuesday morning, November 25, he has some ideas regarding possible recommendations but at this point in time he hasn't got down to putting them on paper. He wants to do further "homework," e.g., viewing and considering laws, before anything is done.

May Seek Change Both he and Mr. Pinkos did indicate no extensive or major overall changes will probably take place on this question.

The mayor said the city might ask St. Clair Shores if they would change the name of the street, i.e., Eight Mile road, in their city to Brys drive so the entire street would be called Brys. Mr. Pinkos felt this may discourage some large trucks from penetrating the immediate area while looking for Eight Mile road.

At the C-W meeting on November 24, the council viewed public safety department reports on turning movements, traffic counts and accidents in the area.

The "turning movements" report said counts were taken Monday, November 10, between 7-9 a.m. at Brys and Mack. "A total of 37 vehicles, southbound on Mack avenue, made right turns onto westbound Brys drive.

Various Counts "Of this number, three vehicles came from the Shorepointe Condominiums and 18 vehicles entered Mack avenue from Aline drive.

"During the same two-hour period 50 vehicles, westbound on Brys drive, east of Mack avenue, crossed Mack and

continued westbound on Brys drive, west of Mack." In the "traffic counts" report, which cited "daily averages," some of the figures show: Brys drive, Mack-Helen, 2,103 vehicles; Brys drive, Helen-East Eight Mile, 2,104 vehicles; Helen avenue, Roslyn-Brys drive, 408 vehicles; East Eight Mile, Helen, St. Clair Shores-Canton, Harper Woods, 2,640 vehicles; Marter road, Brys-Aline, 4,977 vehicles; and Marter road, Vernier-Anita, 6,077 vehicles. The "vehicle accidents" report covered the time span of January 1, 1971, through

this November 21. One accident was reported in 1971, three in 1972, two in 1973 and one in 1974.

Minor Mishaps In 1971, at Brys drive west of Mack, the lone accident found a Brys resident backing out of his driveway into a parked car. The 1972 mishaps included two autos passing each other, (head-on) alongside a parked car and, sideswiping each other, a driver going west on Brys making a right turn into the alley and hitting a utility pole and a vehicle going east on Brys sideswiping a parked car.

Then in 1973, an auto pulled out of the alley and hit an eastbound vehicle. The department said all accidents were of a minor nature, with no injuries, and noted there were no reported accidents during the past 25 months.

During the same period, there were two reported mishaps on East Eight Mile road in the city. In 1973, a motorcycle struck a parked vehicle with minor injuries being sustained by a passenger and in 1974, a motorist, unfamiliar with the area, stopped to look at the street sign at Helen, (St. Clair Shores), and was hit in the rear by another vehicle.

Reads Memo

In a final note, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen in a memo to the department dated Friday, October 31, requested traffic count data on Brys, Mack to Helen; Eight Mile road, Helen to Canton; Helen, Roslyn to Brys; and four-six high volume residential street traffic counts.

Mr. Petersen also urged the department to intensify enforcement of speeding on Eight mile road and Brys, prohibited "through" commercial vehicles and failure to stop at traffic signs.

"In addition to the above, your office is also requested to cooperate with the Michigan AAA, City of Harper Woods and City of St. Clair Shores in the erection of any traffic signs which would tend to alleviate some of the conditions affecting the residents of all three communities who live in the aforesaid immediate area."

He read this memo to citizens at the November 17 meeting.

Career Education Class

(Continued from Page 1) positively about their own interests and abilities and to explore the many possibilities of putting them to work. Last week the exploration was highlighted when 17 professionals in everything from child psychology to the trucking industry came in to speak with the students.

They met with the kids in small groups where they were grilled on every aspect of their work, from salary to life styles.

The class has no textbook, but rather depends on handouts, reference books, interviews with working people and general class discussion.

A most valuable tool, according to all involved, has been a test called "The Self Directed Search," published by Consulting Psychologists Press, Inc. Rather than gauge ability, the test attempts to narrow down a student's interests and areas of most confidence into six general occupational groups: investigative, artistic, social, enterprising, conventional or realistic.

From there a key leads students to hundreds of specific careers in each area that can be researched through reference books and microfilms, as to training, salaries and functions.

For a student such as 13-year-old Robert Roddewieg, such research can be invaluable.

"I know that some day I'd like to own a hobby shop, but that takes a lot of money to start," Robert said.

"I've figured out now that I'd better study accounting and work in that field until I can save up the money. I know just how much college I'll need and just what high school classes to take next year," he explains.

Besides such research, the course teachers rely on some special activities to spur the students' career interests. Eugene Miszczak, owner of North Side Tool and Die Industries, for example, has planned to take a group of students into his shop for a day.

For Susan Cardosi, 13, the opportunity to spend a day in a special education class at Mason School will be the highlight of the course.

"I like kids, but I just want to see for myself what it's really like to be a teacher," she said.

These kinds of events are the things that really get the kids going, according to teacher Lynn Spilos.

"The possibilities here are incredible," she said, "and only limited by the extent to which we can get the community involved."

(Continued from Page 1) part, the local community is responsible for providing operating subsidies after the first year demonstration program."

In noting that SEMTA is currently sponsoring 13 projects funded by the Small Bus Program, Mr. Generette went on to say, "Due to the interest expressed by your community, the City of Grosse Pointe Woods has been included in SEMTA's FY, (fiscal year), '77 application for Small Bus Program funds."

"The 34 applicants have been ranked ordered into three priority groups. It is our belief that the provision of a regionally comprehensive elderly and handicapped service is the most important improvement that can be funded by this State program."

According to information supplied by SEMTA, The Woods and Park are classified in the "priority three" category with a round 20 other communities.

The contingency program in "priority three" includes all jurisdictions who have expressed an interest in exploring the feasibility of establishing a small vehicle program, reports the authority, which added, "No commitments have been made by their communities for long-range funding or operating of any local services."

"The programs are budgeted at an average capital cost of \$85,000 and operating deficit of \$100,000."

The municipal judge position now pays \$2,400. By 1979 the position will pay \$2,800.

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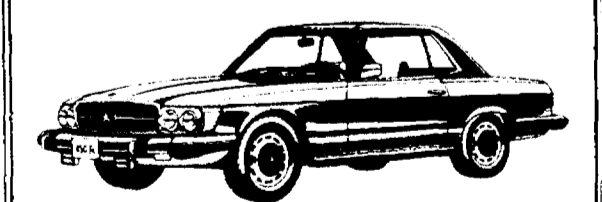
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Woods, Agency on Aging Hold Arbitration Hearing

An arbitration hearing between representatives of The Woods and the Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging was held Tuesday, November 17, in downtown Detroit after the city appealed the agency's denial of its application for funds, which would have been used to initiate self-supporting programs for senior citizens. The arbitrator now has up to 45 days to report his findings to the agency's board of directors.

Administrative Aide Gerard McNamara, who presented the community's case with City Attorney George Catlin, said he expected nothing to result from the hearing towards benefitting the city because all funds received by the agency have been dispersed.

"Even if we're successful, there's no way we can receive any funds," he stated as around \$2.4 million in requests were earlier received by the agency which was able to disperse only an estimated \$791,000.

In its application, which was submitted in June, the city requested a total amount of \$99,949. The amount was broken down into such categories as home maintenance, home nursing component, homemaker service, the buddy system and information and referral.

Despite the dim monetary prospects even if the city wins its case, The Woods at least had an opportunity to present its side to the agency regarding the need for such monies in the community.

Mr. McNamara said the city based its argument on two points: (1) in selecting successful applicants, the committee didn't follow its own guidelines, and (2) the committee made errors in judgment, i.e., failing to judge the community's population as being deserving.

"We show 282 (seniors) households with an income of less than \$6,000 per year," he said. While saying he didn't know how much less, Mr. McNamara noted the agency's view regarding people living at the poverty level was \$2,955 for a single individual and \$3,725 for two people.

He also said over 100 people 65 years and older are living at the poverty level in the city based upon the 1970 census.

At the same time, Mr. McNamara had solid words of praise for the agency's board of directors. "It's very clear and understood by all that the agency's board of directors are senior citizens who work for no pay. They are highly qualified people who have a terrible burden," (regarding the dispersal of funds based upon requests received).

Their defense was that there was only so much money available and they had triple that amount in requests, he stated. "They had to disperse the monies where they felt it would do the most good."

He felt if the city benefits from its application, appeal and arbitration effort it would be in the area of making known the fact that The Woods has a senior citizen population where in some members live at or close to the poverty level.

"Those individuals were deprived of money which they could have had because of the affluent status of the remainder of the community," stressed Mr. McNamara.

"In a sense, the board is telling us we could take care of our own."

He indicated one defender of the board said they, (the board), have to look at people who are "bruised and broken" and have lived in the poverty zone all their lives.

Another point of concern to Mr. McNamara was expressed earlier when he said the city receives very little in services from Wayne County. "Money is made available to the county in property taxes but we get very little in return."

One method of indicating that the city is serious in its intentions was its appeal on the agency's refusal to accept the application.

Mr. McNamara had said its refusal was based upon the agency's view that the income level of eligible recipients was set too high, i.e., at \$6,000 a year.

Mr. Randazzo said the house had over \$5,000 worth of repairs done to it in 1974. He also said the contractors would fix the sewer, lay new tiles in the basement of the home, build a new fence and repair and re-finish the garage.

Councilman James Mast threw out a general question to the council when he asked "who would pay the \$940 billing The Farms has run up so far for the cost of hearings, inspections and public notifications?"

City Attorney George Mc. Kean said that an "audit will be given and a lien would be put on the property if the owners of the home refused to pay the billing."

It was decided by a 7-0 vote that the council would postpone the decision on the home until Mr. Randazzo and city inspectors, John DeFoe and Don Navarro, give more factual information on the state of repairs to the home by Monday, December 1.

Mr. Randazzo was also told he must present to the council, at that time, his future plans for the home, either selling or renting it.

If repairs have been made and the Randazzo's satisfactorily explain future plans for the house, the council said it would ultimately consider whether the home should be spared or demolished at their Monday, December 15, meeting.

Farms Weighs Fate of House


In their Monday, November 17 council meeting, The Farms Council held a public hearing on whether or not the home of Mrs. Marie Randazzo should be demolished. Declared to be a "dangerous building," the unoccupied property at 452 Madison has been a problem for the council since at least 1969.

At the Monday night hearing, Mrs. Randazzo was represented by her son Anthony Randazzo. He declared that the house is currently under major repairs and that he hopes to have his contractors finish all repairs before the first of the year.

Addressing the council, Mr. Randazzo said, "We intend to sell the house as soon as repairs are made. The house should be repaired by the end of the year."

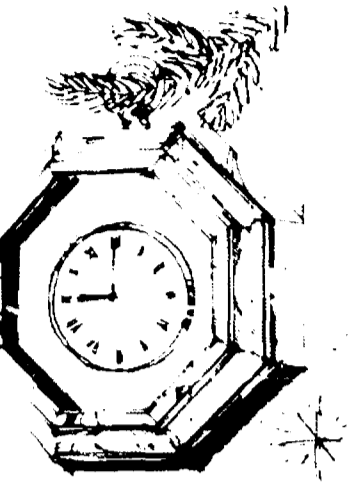

 He cited rulings of the Michigan Supreme Court which interpreted certain matters that were allowed to be discussed in executive sessions, in regard to a suit filed against the city of Flint.
 Mayor Patterson said that it has been the custom of the council members, for many years including the 16 years he has been serving the city, to hold executive sessions before regular meetings. If at any time, he said, he felt that by doing so, he has been

doing wrong and that this was hurting, in any way, the citizens of the community, he would resign his post.
 Councilwoman Camille Peterson pointed out that under the Park City Charter, the council sessions should start at 5 p.m. sharp on regular meeting nights, (second and fourth Mondays of each month), but on many occasions meetings have started any time from a few minutes to a half an hour or more after that time because of executive sessions. This

prompted the mayor to declare that regular council sessions will start at 5 p.m.
 The discussion lengthened and at times appeared to be almost explosive, but eventually calm settled in the council chambers.
 A motion to hold no executive sessions for 60 days, on a trial basis, was defeated by a 4-2 vote. Opposing the motion were the mayor and Councilmen Clayton Alandt, Dr. Roger McNeill, George Verdonck and Charles Tompkins. In favor were Councilman Graham and Councilwoman Peterson.

A motion was then made that the matter be tabled for an indefinite period, which according to a ruling by City Attorney Richard Rohr means subject can be brought up for a vote at any time at the discretion of the council. This, too, passed by a 4-2 vote, with the same lineup as the previous motion.
 Councilman Graham then proposed that the council meetings be changed from the present time of 5 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. so that residents will have an opportunity to attend the sessions to see how their city government is being conducted and to let them know what issues are being discussed. A compromise was reached to get the meetings started at 5:30 p.m.

Under further business of the council, it was unanimously approved that the Monday December 8, meeting be held at 7:30 p.m., for the Annual Service Awards Presentation to honor municipal employes for their number years of service to the city, and to honor those who retired during the year.

 When Mr. Barry said written reports should be available, Mr. Pinkos responded by noting, "We're not doing this for a free ride or we wouldn't be on the council. Our pay, including such conventions, doesn't amount to much."
 The council's total budget, including salaries and provisions for such gatherings, is "less than one person earns in one year," the mayor stated. He also felt what is learned at such meetings is important, while noting some council members feel these gatherings are worthwhile while others do not.

During fiscal year 1975-76, the council's budget appropriation, including salaries, (\$600 for the mayor and \$400 for each council member), and meeting provisions, is \$17,662. From July 1-November 1, a total of \$2,980.52 has been spent.
 In fiscal year 1974-75, the appropriation was \$12,713. Of that amount, \$8,673 was used. And in fiscal year 1973-74, a total of \$11,850 was appropriated with \$7,661 being spent.

Monies not utilized in the appropriation during any fiscal year go back into the surplus, which is carried forward to the next fiscal year, said City Comptroller-Assessor Frederick G. Hornfisher, who added, "This action helps keep our tax rate down."
 Councilman Ronald R. Kefgen told Mr. Barry this matter is continually discussed by the council, which isn't in complete agreement over attendance at such gatherings.

For himself, Mr. Kefgen stated, "I personally agree with you, (i.e., Mr. Barry), for the most part."
 According to an information sheet on the congress, sessions will view such topics as housing and community development, criminal justice, public finance, how to do urban conservation, equity and "policy leaders." Exhibits and special events also will take place.

Council Okays Appointments

At its regular meeting held on Monday, November 24, The Park council approved recommendations of Mayor Matthew Patterson for re-appointments to the Board of Review and to the Board of Canvassers. The terms of the appointees will expire on December 31, and each expressed willingness to continue in the respective posts for another tenure.

Confirmed for a three-year term on the Board of Review was Earl R. Perkins of 760 Grand Marais.

The council consented to the re-appointment of two members to the Board of Canvassers, for a four-year term. They are Mrs. Aileen Nord Kurtz of 1230 Bishop, a Republican; and Michael J. O'Neill of 812 Barrington, a Democrat. Under Michigan voting laws, members of the Board of Canvassers must be picked from each of the political parties.

Under other business, the council approved the recommendation of the firm of Cooper and Lyrand, city auditors, that The Park restrict \$35,000 from fund balance for liability to cover the unused sick leave credit accumulated by city employees.

Further, the solons granted permission to the Grosse Pointe Lions Club to hold its annual Goodfellow Newspaper Sale on Monday, December 15, and to use the garage and facilities of the Municipal Building for the distribution of newspapers on that date, and the Fire Station two or three days prior to Christmas for the distribution of Christmas baskets to the Pointe needy.

ACLU Could Defend Group

The American Civil Liberties Union's, (ACLU), committee of lawyers recommended intervention in the case of The Wood's lawsuit, recently filed in Wayne County Circuit Court, against the "Forever Family," a religious fellowship group.

This recommendation transpired Thursday, November 20. It was scheduled to be considered by the Detroit branch board of directors Tuesday, November 25, with a final decision regarding participation, i.e., defending the "Forever Family, being made at that time, according to Kathleen Smith, associate director of the ACLU.

The city's lawsuit seeks a temporary and permanent injunction to prevent the use of the premises at 1785 Roslyn road, (by the "Forever Family"), for religious meetings.

A Circuit Court hearing date is set for Friday, December 12, before Judge Joseph Rashid to show cause why a permanent injunction should not be issued, based upon the city's complaint, in this matter.

Approval Given To Bible Week

The Woods Council unanimously authorized Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos to sign a proclamation citing National Bible Week, which is held from November 23-30.

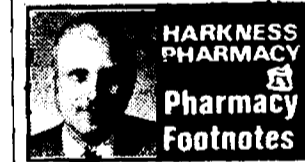
Winners of the contest will spend the summer of 1976 with families in 25 countries and will be encouraged to speak to groups in their host countries about the Bicentennial.

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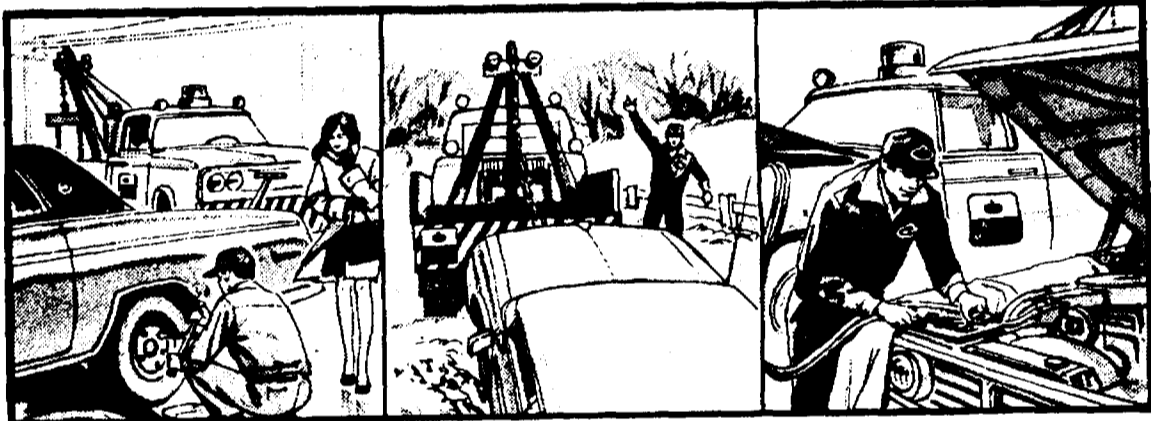
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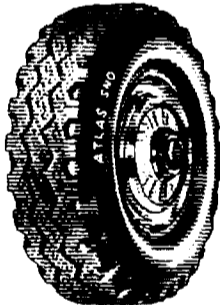

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Parade Recommendations Being Studied in Woods

A list of recommendations regarding the North High School parade, held October 11, from the public safety department was unanimously referred to the Committee of the Whole by The Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, November 17.

According to a departmental general incident report, traffic congestion problems seemed the order of the day during the parade. As a result, five recommendations were suggested in the report from Public Safety Director Henry Marchand.

The "rees" include the following:
● That any agreement made between the city and the parade committee be made in writing and be properly carried out.

● That the parade group assemble within the Monteith School grounds away from an already busy intersection and not move onto the roadway until the parade is ready to move out.

● That the old route be reinstated using either the rear drive of the school or the wide sidewalk between Morningside and the school parking lot. Completely blocking Vernier is a poor alternative and causes unnecessary disruption of police, fire and ambulance service.

● That additional public safety officers be assigned for that day to assist as the parade drains most available manpower of the normal shift strength.

● That the city consider adopting some type of ordinance that deals directly with specific problems generated by public events such as this. In the report, Lt. Jack Patterson said he met with the senior class president on October 4 and it was agreed that the parade route would remain the same as in past years. The Monteith School yard was to be the assembly area for all parade members. Then on October 10, the lieutenant was informed by

Director Marchand that the parade route had been changed to allow the parade to use Vernier road as the route to the school drive instead of the previous method of using the rear drive directly onto the field. On parade day, Lt. Patterson arrived at the scene and was unable to approach the assembly area due to traffic congestion on Cook road.

Upon reaching the area, he observed that the parade chairperson had not used the school yard, but instead, was assembling the parade on Cook road causing roadway blockage in all directions that completely shut off the use of Chalfonte, Cook and Holiday.

Lt. Patterson asked why the plans had been changed,

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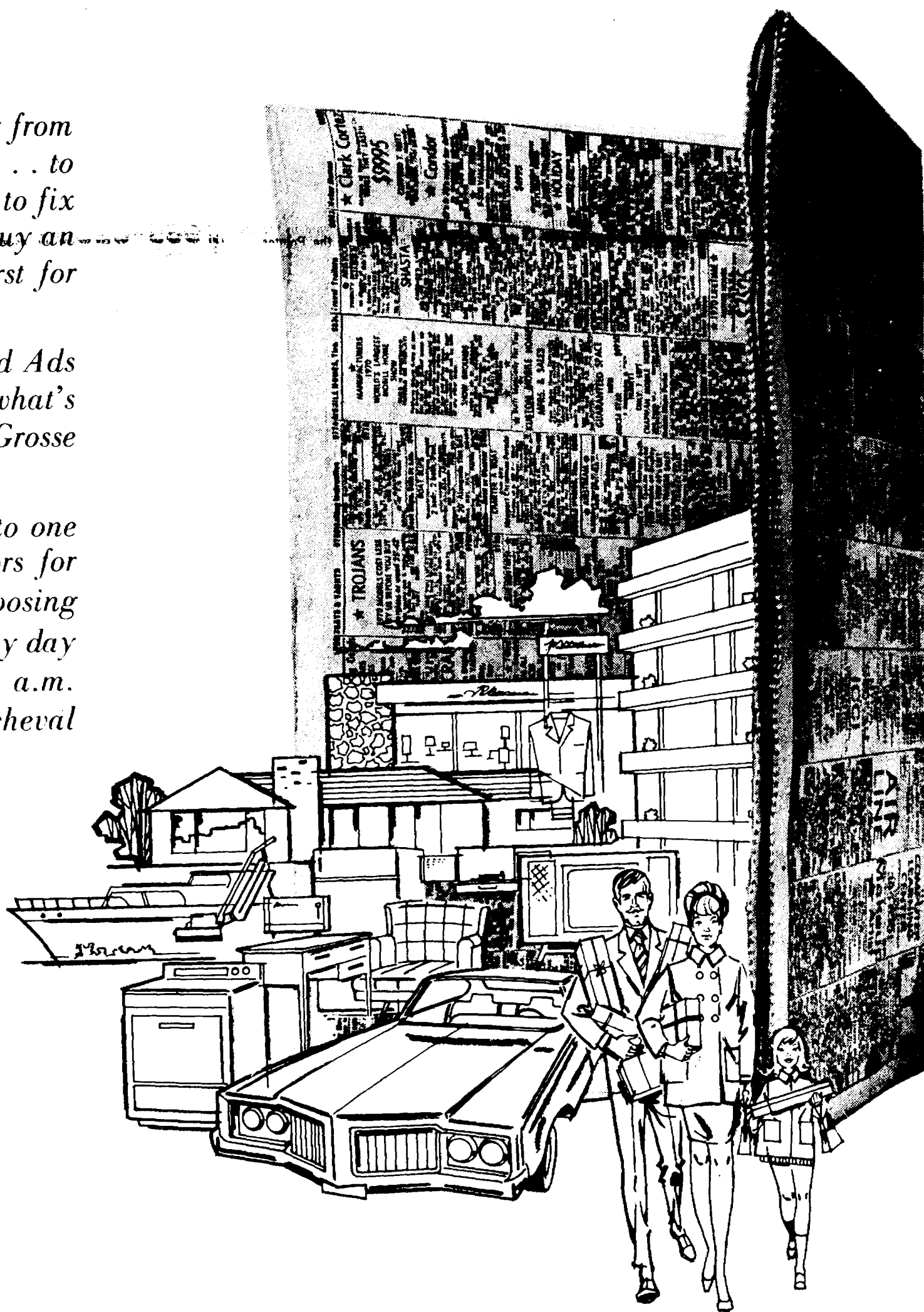

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One View from the Capitol

Business, the provider of jobs, scored at least a temporary victory last week by forcing a labor-sponsored proposal to be returned from House debate back to the committee that had drafted the bill.

The bill attempts to define who is a "voluntary quit" in order to determine if an unemployed person must wait 13 weeks for unemployment benefits as a "quit" or if the person is entitled to immediate benefits. It is a \$200 million question.

The bill made it so easy for a person to claim he was justified in leaving his job, because it wasn't "suitable" for him, that nearly anyone could have gotten immediate benefits by showing that, under the law, he was not a "voluntary quit."

This concept of the suitability of work is already in the law in determining if an unemployed person must accept a job offer. He must if it is "suitable" or lose his benefits.

Can our nation, with millions of unemployed persons, afford to let thousands of people remain idle when there are jobs available, just because those jobs are not consistent with their training, experience and prior earnings?

It is a tough question. In a real way it seems to me that if an accountant gets laid off and the only job available is on an assembly line that he should grab that job, keep looking for another accounting job and switch when he finds one.

The problem with that idea is said to be that he may get stuck in the lower level skills job, lose his expertise into accounting. That is a problem, so some balance is needed in the law of unemployment compensation.

But, from the standpoint of what may be the best for his self respect and for the nation, I would like to see less waiting around for suitable jobs and more willingness to take the best job that is available, no matter what it is, even if it means getting dirty or working in a drudgery kind of job.

On the other hand, I have not had the experience of being unemployed, yet I do appreciate the trauma it causes and the complexity of the feelings, fears and problems it raises.

Dogs in Need of Winterizing

As you change your screens to storm windows and raise the temperature on your thermostat, give a thought to your dog. Is his house winterized, also?

The Michigan Humane Society reminds pet owners to make certain that the dog and his house, if he is to be left outdoors, are prepared for the cold weather ahead.

In most cases, it is perfectly all right for a dog to be kept outdoors during the winter months—if he is used to it. The average dog is able to acclimate himself to the weather, but on a gradual basis.

Naturally, a dog that is indoors most of the time shouldn't be put out for too long on a cold winter day. And, conversely, a dog with a heavy, thick coat would be most uncomfortable if made to stay indoors all day.

When a dog is left outdoors there is one requirement that must not be overlooked. It is most important that the animal has shelter available at all times. Clean straw serves as an excellent bedding and insulation for a dog house. The straw should be changed frequently, as once it becomes wet, it loses its insulation qualities. The dog house should face south, as prevailing winds are from the west and north. A piece of old carpeting makes a good flap for the doorway to prevent drafts.

Other cold weather reminders from the Michigan Humane Society are:

1. Feed your pets more often to provide extra energy during winter months. Such items as beef suet, meat or bacon dripping are also good additions to his winter diet.
2. Frequently check the food and water you put outside to make certain it doesn't freeze.
3. Be alert for toxic snow melting substances which could make him sick and sting his paws.
4. Put a sweater on your dog when you walk him. It's not a silly idea; it'll help keep him warm.

The Michigan Humane Society is offering a free pamphlet on "The Care of the Outdoor Dog." Included in the pamphlet are plans for constructing a dog house. 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What Goes On at Your Library

The story of the Pilgrim Fathers is known to every American schoolboy from an early age. The voyage of the "Mayflower," the settlement of Plymouth, and the first Thanksgiving are all a part of our national heritage.

Two fine new books have been added to our library collection that retell once again this well-known narrative: THE PILGRIMS (Doubleday) by Francis Dillon and THE MAYFLOWER (Stein & Day) by Kate Caffrey. It is a tribute to both authors that they tell this story with such freshness, wit, and elegance of style as to make it an entirely new and vivid adventure.

Unfortunately, we do not know what the Pilgrims looked like, and, outside of some legal documents and William Bradford's "Of Plymouth Plantation" written between 1630 and 1648, know little of their characters and behavior. So Francis Dillon tries to fill in the gaps in his delightfully different and informed study. Dillon begins with a survey of Elizabethan England, contrasting the bustling energy of London with the bucolic life of the country. Then he outlines the history of the Reformation and the various offshoots of Protestantism in England. For the story of the Pilgrims' settlement in Massachusetts, he relies heavily on Bradford's account, but fills out that early document with details gathered from extensive research. Dillon neither debunks nor eulogizes, but he does brush away some of the old mythology in an assessment that makes these people more human than those heroes in the tall black hats we met in our early history books.

In her book THE MAYFLOWER, Kate Caffrey individualizes the Pilgrims, places them in the context of their times, shows them in all their strengths and paradoxical frailties. The author tells us that not all the company were saints; sinners too, make their appearance. This is a book of real people.

The "Mayflower" was a small obscure ship valued at a mere 128 pounds, eight shillings, and fourpence. It was about 90 feet long, (only 12 feet longer than a tennis court), just over 26 feet at its widest, and 180 tons in weight. Each passenger had a total area the size of a single mattress under a five foot ceiling in which to cook, eat, sleep, dress and all the rest of living. During the months-long journey, one Pilgrim died. Another, washed overboard, was miraculously washed back on deck. A crew member, not so fortunate, perished. The landing at Plymouth was on the morning of Monday, December 11, 1620. Ahead of this brave band lay a harsh winter, which robbed more than half the settlers of their lives. When spring came at last, 54 persons were left, 21 of them under sixteen. But when the "Mayflower" sailed back to England, not one survivor asked to return.

It is difficult to grasp today exactly how basic were the supplies loaded on board the "Mayflower." Every contingency had to be provided for: it was no good depending on anything being sent quickly after the Pilgrims, nor upon finding anything at all when they landed. They literally had to take everything with them.

One of the things they took were books, principally, of course, the Bible, English, Dutch, French and Latin and Greek Testaments. In addition there were psalm books, doctrinal tracts, volumes from William Brewster's persecuted press; horn books and Bible stories for the children, for even the education was in their plans for the future; calendars and almanacs; and agricultural handbooks. William Bradford carried with him Rev. Robinson's "Justification of Separation," published in 1810, with his own name signed on the fly-leaf. Dr. Samuel Fuller took a few medical books and several religious ones, perhaps anticipating that the power of prayer would be more required than medical knowledge in the New World. Captain Standish carried with him Caesar's "Commentaries," Bariff's "Artillery," a history of the world, and, for some unknown reason, a history of Turkey.

The men and women of the "Mayflower" did not come seeking fame or profit. They sought—and found—peace. The agreement they drew up before landing was described by John Quincy Adams as "the first example in modern times of a social compact or system of government instituted by voluntary agreement conformable to the laws of nature, by men of equal rights and about to establish their community in a new country."

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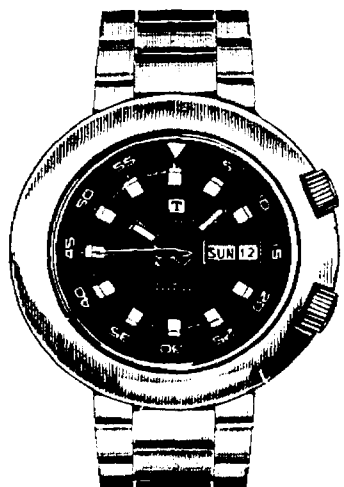

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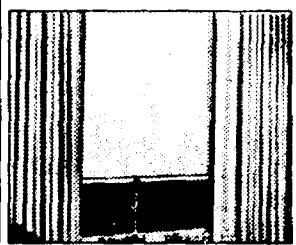

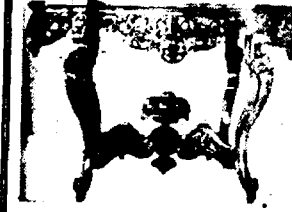

It's a question of maintaining the balance. "My family," says Phil Meathe, "is very important to me. I enjoy my profession immensely." Two separate sentences, two statements of fact: and don't ask the president of Smith, Hinchman & Grylls, Inc., seventh largest architectural/engineering firm in the United States, to go ANYWHERE on a Sunday.

Sundays are family days. House days. Sundays. "The Worst-Dressed Gardener in Grosse Pointe," (the title is courtesy of a friend), comes into his own.

"You can't," says Phil, "make a good garden in a hurry." First comes the matrix, the base work on which the garden's goodness will depend. Last come the "goodies"—a statue of Saint Francis, a sculpture made out of 10 gears welded together. ("Just what," said Leo Marx, arriving at the Meathe house with 10 greasy gears, in the sizes his friend had requested, "do you want THESE for?")

In between, and after, and always, comes the maintenance.

So Sundays, and Saturdays, from about the first of April to mid-November, Phil Meathe is outside, making his garden.

There are several thousand bricks in his bricks-in-sand patios, all laid by hand.

Salvages Heirlooms Winters, when the weather's too rough to work outdoors, he refinishes furniture. He's salvaged more than one heirloom quality piece from a Goodwill Industries throwaway.

Mondays, brief-cased and business-suited—can this be yesterday's Worst-Dressed Gardener in Grosse Pointe?—Philip J. Meathe, Fellow of the American Institute of Architects, only architect in Michigan to have been awarded the Detroit Chapter AIA's Gold Medal, the Michigan Society of Architects Gold Medal and the Kemper Award of the American Institute of Architects, is back in business.

He always wanted to be an architect. He's a native Pointer, alumnus of Saint Paul's Parochial School, elementary through high. He received his Bachelor of Archi-

lecture from the University of Michigan, spent five years as Job Captain and Associate of the firm of Leinweber, Yamasaki & Hellmuth and came to Smith, Hinchman & Grylls in 1969 as executive vice-president, after heading his own firm, Meathe-Kessler & Associates, for 13 years.

He's been Detroit-based throughout his career, by accident rather than design: the professional opportunities just happened to present themselves here, so he's been able to stay where he was born AND run one of the largest architectural firms in the country.

Collects Many Honors He is a past-president of the Detroit Chapter of AIA, a past member of the national AIA board of directors and a past member of the state board of directors.

He's currently vice-chancellor and chancellor-elect of the AIA's College of Fellows, made up of architects who have been singled out by their peers for distinguished contributions to the profession.

He married Jeanne Marie Munger in 1950. The Living Wall in the foyer of their home was her idea, one that Phil enthusiastically approved.

"We wanted to capture three key events in our children's lives: their first birthday, their graduation from high school, and their marriage."

The bottom row of portraits records the four Meathe children as toddlers, the second row as young adults. "It's amazing," says Phil, "how each year the wall becomes more and more of a talking point in this house."

First to Finish Christie, 24, is Mrs. Timothy Mertz now, the only one who has completed all three

stages. Twenty-three-year-old Larry works for a construction company. Jim, 18, is a freshman at John Carroll University. Carol, 15, is a sophomore at University Liggett.

Carol's second row picture is perforce interim, for she won't be graduated from high school for a few years, and the third row hasn't been started yet. The Mertz's portrait is ready, but they'd be a little lonely up there all alone.

When the boys were growing up, Phil did 10 years' service as manager of Grosse Pointe Little League teams.

He is a director of both the Detroit Urban League and the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce and has, since 1973, been one of the nine men who donate their services to the City of Grosse Pointe Farms as members of the Farms Planning Committee.

He considers Grosse Pointe Farms and Grosse Pointe City both very fortunate for, buffered on one side by Lake St. Clair, on two sides by stable residential communities, they have only one "weak edge." That's the north edge, the Mack avenue edge, and Phil Meathe can see no reason why it has to remain weak.

Proposes a Fund Suppose, he says, Grosse Pointe Farms set aside a certain amount of dollars over a 10-year-period specifically for up-grading and maintenance of its north edge, and Detroit set aside an equal amount for its side of Mack, and the Federal Government matched the Farms' and Detroit's contributions, dollar for dollar... and pretty soon the homeowners and commercial property owners on both sides of Mack looked around and said, "Hey, this is neat: we're living in a really great neighborhood," and they can see the dollar value of their homes/businesses increasing...

You think they're not going to paint a house that needs painting, or spruce up a storefront?

"You can never subsidize integrity," Phil Meathe be-

lieves. But you can give people something to hope for. "The key is the private person."

So Urban Renewal is a flop when it by-passes the private person, kicks him out and tries to clean up massive areas via a bulldozer approach. Why not, instead, protect and strengthen the good things already there? Why not take a city's strong pockets, use them as nuclei for renewal, and built out?

Produced Ad Series Way back in 1957, when Phil Meathe was chairman of the AIA's public relations committee, he produced a series of Why/Why Not? ads that ran in all the major magazines, photos of areas as they were with accompanying pictures showing them as they might be. He remembers driving an out-of-town friend around Grosse Pointe at roughly the same time. The Hill had just started its tree planting program. The Village was pretty much as it always had been.

The Hill's trees are tall now, and instead of an alley behind Jacobson's in the Village, there's a landscaped mall. No great massive changes—but each area is just that much nicer.

Phil Meathe believes in Urban Renewal. "The nation cannot chew up its open land at the pace it's been doing since World War II," he maintains, and he forses Federal Legislation against urban sprawl, coupled with increased concern for the Quality of Life which demands that the natural aspects of the land be protected and preserved, coupled with an Energy Crisis impetus toward the creation of better, more efficient public transportation systems, will result in living, liveable cities.

There's No Alternative

There's simply no alternative, and since there isn't, people are going to have to live in cities, and since they're going to have to live in them, they're going to insist that their cities be safe, that crime be eliminated, and they're going to insist that their cities be beautiful.

Mr. Meathe considers the Energy Crisis a challenge rather than a Gotterdammerung. "As long as man has a brain, he will develop technological breakthroughs. We've known for years that we have only a 30 to 50-year supply of oil and gas reserves if we continue to use oil and gas at the rate we have been using them. But it's not critical."

"We know there's enough solar energy falling on the surface of Lake Erie in one day to heat every home and run every appliance in America for a year. And that's just solar energy. We have other energy sources—geo-thermal, tidal... and those are just secondary sources. The real energy source of the future will be nuclear."

Solar Experiment Solar energy is Smith, Hinchman & Grylls' prime concern right now, however, for the firm is experimenting with its own Solar Collector, occupying 1,000 square feet of space on its own roof. The theory of Solar Collec-
