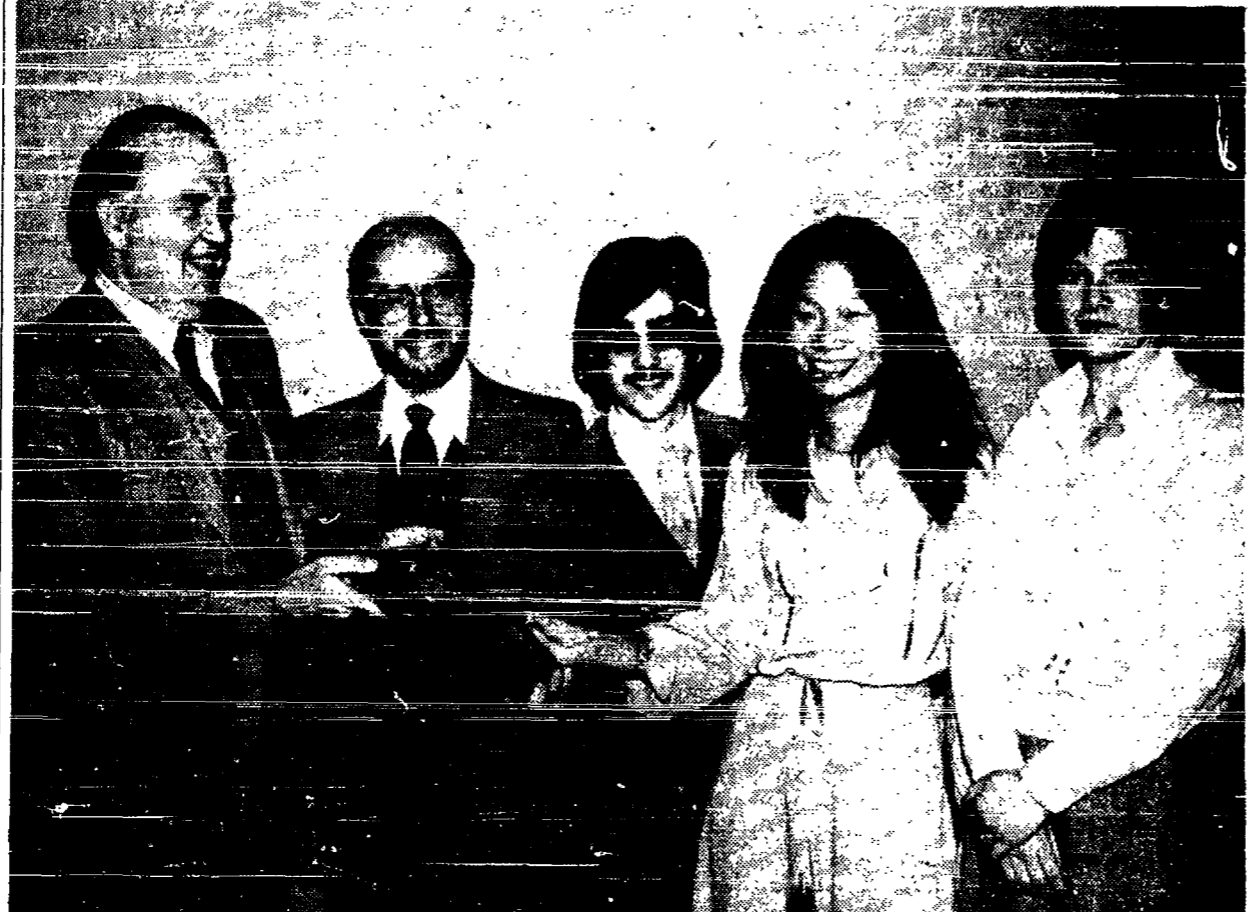

SH's 'Tower' Top High School Weekly in U.S.



It began as South High School "Tower Day"—so declared by councils in three Grosse Pointes—and as the afternoon wore on Thursday, January 4, more and more South students were spotted wearing Bob Button buttons, to honor the student newspaper's advisor. When evening came it was students' time in the spotlight as the "Tower" staff was honored by a dinner at the Detroit Press Club for capturing, for the second consecutive year, the Facemaker Award as the best weekly high school paper in the U.S. Presenting the award is NEAL SHINE, Detroit Free Press managing editor, (far left), flanked by (from left to right), MR. Thursday, January 4
HOPING TO END months of political violence, the Iranian parliament approved formation of a civilian government headed by Shahpour Bakhtiar, who immediately pledged to dismantle the nation's military government. He also promised to free political prisoners, abolish the political arm of the secret police and end oil sales to Israel and South Africa. Meanwhile, Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi is expected to leave the country for at least a few months, ostensibly for a vacation.

Friday, January 5
THE AUTO INDUSTRY had its second straight record year in 1978, with the total number of cars and trucks sold throughout the year estimated at 15.45 million units. While domestic car sales were up 2.3 percent over 1977, imports dropped off 3.5 percent. Meanwhile, truck sales soared 12.8 percent over 1977, setting sales records for the third straight year. Dealers, selling U.S. cars finished up the year with a strong December sales, up 3.9 percent over December 1977.

Saturday, January 6
EGYPTIAN PRESIDENT Anwar Sadat hinted at a breakthrough towards resuming the stalled Egyptian-Israeli peace talks. Speaking to reporters, Mr. Sadat said there may be "a certain matter" on which the two countries and the U.S. might agree upon next week. In other news, the federal government accused nine major oil companies of overcharges totalling more than \$1 billion for natural gas liquids, source of such products as propane, butane and heating oil. In a suit, the government asks that the companies be ordered to refund the excess charges plus interest.

Sunday, January 7
SCHOLARS FROM the U.S., Japan and West Germany have concluded that the capitalist countries will eventually have to ask Communist nations to help them solve the world's energy problems. The report of the Trilateral Commission, a five-year-old policy study group of leading citizens from Japan, North America and Western Europe, recommends the West provide technical help to the Soviets in developing offshore oil production. It also calls for national leaders to do more to drive home the seriousness of the energy problem.

Monday, January 8
VIETNAMESE-BACKED Cambodian rebels claimed they marched into the country's capital city of Phnom Penh, overthrow Premier Pol Pot and gained control over almost all of Cambodia. Vietnam radio and the Soviet news agency Tass both said Phnom Penh had fallen. Those reports could not be independently confirmed. While there was no immediate word on the fate of the defeated Khmer Rouge regime or of foreigners, Thai aviation sources said a Chinese jetliner made a successful flight in and out of Phnom Penh hours before the city fell.

Tuesday, January 9
EXPLOSIONS RIPPED through a big French tanker unloading at a terminal in Ireland, killing 50 as the ship was cut in two and bodies were hurled into a sea of flaming oil. The death toll was believed to be one of the highest recorded for a disaster of its type. Gulf Oil officials gave no immediate cause, but experts in London speculated the blast may have been caused by volatile gases in the ship's partly emptied storage tanks.

The Woods Council via a unanimously passed resolution took to task three public acts, which provide "extensive state regulation of ambulance services, including the establishment of certain minimum equipment and personnel requirements," while seeking an exemption to the acts for certain communities.

This action, taken at a regular meeting last month, was an outgrowth of a discussion on a Senior Citizens Commission recommendation to the council that every effort be made to keep the city's emergency ambulance service for its residents.

Rotarians Hear Address On Community Conditions As Explored in Report

Dr. Robert Linthicum Discusses GP Ministerial Ass'n. Study Which Strives to Eye Community As It Is; Several Areas Viewed Including Lack of Land, Youth, Senior Citizens

A Grosse Pointe Ministerial Ass'n. study of the community, started in March 1977 and completed last summer, was explored by Dr. Robert Linthicum, senior pastor at Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church, 19950 Mack avenue, in an address before the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club Monday afternoon, January 8, at the War Memorial.

The purpose of the study, which involved 15 churches and 139 volunteer workers, was to discover the kind of community The Pointe really is—as against various conceptions citizens may have of the area, he stated. An initial thrust viewed seven areas including physical setting, population factors, power structure and environmental factors.

Then it was decided early last year that a second study should be conducted toward obtaining information in such areas as youth and family problems and divorce. Both reports were subsequently combined last summer with plans then being made toward implementing the study.

"Point of Their Hurts"
In his talk, Dr. Linthicum outlined five conditions of the community, some of which can be addressed while others could not.

Contractor Picked for SHS Project

Board Selects Low Bidder for Industrial Arts Building Renovation, with Labor to Begin in Late February

Actual construction of South High School's new industrial arts building is expected to get underway within 45 days, following the selection Monday, January 8, of a general contractor for the \$1.7 million job.

The firm, Andries Storen Reynaert of Troy, was appointed by a unanimous vote of the Board of Education. The firm's base bid of \$1,749,700 was the lowest of five received on December 6, and the contractors estimate the job will be completed in one year.

Director of Support Services for the school system, Benjamin Zenn, said he expects work to begin within 45 days, by late February.

Funded by Bonds

The project includes a renovation of a South High wing which currently houses the industrial arts program, as well as construction of a new underground facility for the automotive, wood, metal and engine shops.

The total project cost, including architects' fees and construction, was estimated at \$1,967,750, by William Kessler and Associates, who designed the facility. Kessler estimated construction costs to be just over \$1.8 million. Three of the five bids received were below that estimate.

The project will be funded by a \$2.15 million bond issue which was approved by the School Board in July. The bonds went on sale in November.

Excess bond issue funds will be used to make improvements and repairs at schools throughout the district.

Problems Cited
The School Board began to study possible renovations of the industrial arts building after it was issued several building and electrical code violations from state and local.

Block Grant Hearings Held In GP Woods

Council Approves Projects As Part of 1978 Program But Wants Review of Contract Prior to Signing; City to Seek Comments on 1979 Work on January 22

Two Community Development Block Grant program hearings were held by the Woods Council at its rescheduled regular meeting Monday, January 8. The first hearing was to solicit comments from citizens on proposed 1978 projects, while the second was to receive suggestions from the community on 1979 projects.

No citizens spoke at either hearing, although the council raised several questions in relation to the 1978 program before unanimously approving Councilman E. D. Grady's motion.

He moved that the proposed application for projects as presented in Administrative Aide Gerard E. McNamara's memo be approved and that prior to the signing of the contract, it be reviewed by City Administrator Chester E. Petersen and City Attorney George Catlin with a report back to the council.

Funding of Main Projects submitted to Wayne County, which officials have received assurance for approval, according to Mr. McNamara, include the following:

Funds for Seniors Onward for Change, (SOC), to conduct a minor home repair program for senior citizens, \$8,325. (Coupled with \$8,675 in already approved special needs monies of the city, The Woods' share of the home maintenance program is \$15,000 to be used to benefit its residents.)

Enlarge sewer which runs between East Eight Mile road and Roslyn and from the west city limits to Helen, \$30,000.

Loop one-half of dead end water mains in northwest area of the city. The estimate for looping all such mains is placed at \$162,165 with the cost being \$81,975 (Continued on Page 6)

Board Asks Early Start On Contract

Union President Lange Pessimistic about Moving Up Date for Negotiations to Begin

Public school officials plan to meet with teacher union leaders this week in hopes of setting a January date for the start of the next round of contract negotiations.

In line with a Board of Education resolution approved last month, the administration named a seven-person bargaining team and developed a timetable for negotiating a contract before the current agreement expires on June 30.

Union president Curtis Lange would not comment on the likelihood of the association agreeing to starting negotiations this month. Mr. Lange, did, however, point out several problems the union may have with the request.

Local I Eyed
One problem is the schools' refusal to recognize the teachers' affiliation with the umbrella Local I unit of the Michigan Education Ass'n., Mr. Lange said.

Local 1, which includes teachers in 14 Macomb County school districts, has been viewed as a threat to local control by school officials.

While teachers contend they legally approved affiliation with Local I with a secret ballot last spring, Superintendent Dr. William Coats accused the union of taking a "backdoor approach" which "ignores the law" and refused to recognize or deal with the regional group.

"I don't really see how we can begin negotiating until we figure out who is representing the teachers," Mr. Lange said.

The union president also noted that his group's bylaws specify that negotiations begin in May and call for a lengthy process of surveying teachers and review of the contract, which the union has only just begun.

Last Round Bitter
The Board approved a resolution Monday, December 11, saying it "would like to negotiate a new collective bargaining agreement prior to June 30, and definitely prior to the commencement of the 1979-80 school year so

Seniors' Health Clinic to Open

A free health screening clinic for senior citizens 60 and over, sponsored by the Wayne County Health Department and supported by a contract with the Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging, will begin Tuesday, January 16, and continue through March 1 on Mondays through Thursdays.

It will be held at the Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church, 19950 Mack avenue, between 8:45 a.m. and 2 p.m. by appointment only.

The program's objective is to assist seniors in acquiring necessary medical care with officials noting it may uncover ailments which citizens are unaware of. At the same time, it was pointed out that some seniors may not have their own doctors, with the program providing an opportunity for a check-up.

A health department spokeswoman said nurses will conduct the clinic, with a doctor, who's on call, participating one day a week.

The check-up, which runs around two hours, includes a blood pressure and anemia check, a urine analysis, a TB skin test, hearing and vision checks, (including one for glaucoma), and a pap smear for women.

the community can be assured of the continuity and stability of educational services."
The last round of negotiations between teachers and the School Board was a bitter one which lasted 10 months and was settled on the basis of a state-appointed fact-

finder's recommendations. Negotiations began in May 1976 and were concluded in March 1977 when a three-year settlement was reached. Although a strike vote was taken and approved by teachers, union members worked throughout the school year without interruption.
Named to the School Board's negotiating team at the Monday, January 8, meeting were Ron Tonks, director of personnel; Dr. James Hoeh, assistant superintendent for administration; Dave King, personnel assistant; Bob Welch, director of secondary education; Dr. Al-frieda Frost, director of elementary education; Morris Hanzek, principal of Parcels Middle School; and Eric Pollo, principal of Trombly Elementary School.

16, factfinding on July 9, review of the factfinder's recommendations on August 1 and resumption of bargaining on August 9.
Mr. Lange said he feels the timetable presents a somewhat pessimistic, defeatist view of negotiations. "They say they want a contract at the end of June, but then they assume we're going to end up in fact finding. I have problems with that," he said.

(making changes," he stated, while eying the lack of lan-use options.
"There's a slow but steady deterioration of services needed to deal with people at the point of their hurts right now. There's a good number of services but they aren't equipped to deal with the growth in family and marital problems and senior citizens problems which face us today."

Most Obvious

The five conditions focused upon included the lack of flexibility in land use, the lack of educational and economic balance between the Pointes and Harper Woods with its contiguous communities, e.g., Detroit, an increase in the alienation of youth, the increase in family-oriented problems and concerns revolving around senior citizens.

A most obvious condition, according to Dr. Linticum, is the lack of flexibility in land use, with an estimated 99 percent of Pointe property already developed.

Of this total, he said 54.3 percent of the land is residential and related to this, there's a low turnover of homes, between four and five percent in the community, in comparison to the national average of 12 to 15 percent.

He then viewed the defeat of The Woods referendum question for seniors' housing at Ghesquiere Park in last August's primary election and the steady growth of the senior citizen population in The Woods.

It became clear that the only location that could be considered for such housing was in a public park because of the lack of available land, he said. On this "question of priority," i.e., to maintain the park as it is or have seniors' housing, the citizens voted for the former.

This situation, he felt, was an example of the lack of flexibility in land use.

Some Estrangement

On the second condition, he cited the great imbalance, both economically and from the standpoint of education, between the Pointes and Harper Woods and its contiguous communities.

Saying the study revealed the community was mainly white collar in comparison to the blue collar communities surrounding it, Dr. Linticum noted this allowed for the possibility of an ultimate unstable situation.

On the alienation of youth, he discussed various statistics which showed that youthful crimes increased by an estimated 25 percent overall between 1971 and 1977, while the entire young peoples' population in the community has been decreasing.

While there has been a "marked increase" in alcohol abuse in the Pointes and Harper Woods, there has been a "profound drop" in drug abuse and a stabilization in runaway and sexual-oriented problem reports, said Dr. Linticum.
On alienation, he cited a feeling of estrangement be-

between a minority of young people and their parents, their school situation and the community while viewing heightened counseling in these areas.

More Seek Help

In eying the fourth condition, he said there has been a growth in family counseling and mental and emotional health services over the last nine years. Besides this growth in problem areas, he also felt more citizens are now seeking help than in the past.

Noting many agencies are loaded down, with an ensuing increase in waiting time, Dr. Linticum reported an estimated 35 to 45 percent increase occurred in the divorce rate in the community since 1970.

As for the status of seniors in the community, he said the elderly population has increased, while there has been a decline in the population of youth.

In 1970, for example, the seniors' population in the Pointes and Harper Woods was 12.5 percent, while it jumped to 14 percent in 1976. However, in 1977, it increased in one year alone to 18.5 percent.

With the escalating seniors' population, he expressed concern over the gradual growth of poverty among the elderly with once adequate pensions, for instance, now being swallowed up by increasing inflation.

Lack of Awareness

Pointe seniors are in a terrible bind, he said. Many purchased homes 25 to 30 years ago to raise their family, with such property having good value today. But some seniors find it hard to maintain their homes, both from financial and physical aspects.

In other communities, he said, they could sell their homes and enter a condominium, move into a seniors' apartment or into a retirement home. But, stated Dr. Linticum, there are no such alternatives in the community with a senior either having to stick it out or move elsewhere.

He also termed the lack of community awareness of seniors' needs "frightening," with many problems affecting seniors being hidden ones. At the Out-Wayne County Nutrition Site, housed in the GPW Presbyterian, a few seniors were discovered to live only on peanut butter and bread, with their only decent meal coming at the site.

After concluding his address, which ran about 30

minutes, Dr. Linticum received a warm hand from the Rotarians, one of whom called his talk "sobering."

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Blood Donor Month Cited

President Jimmy Carter has officially proclaimed January as National Volunteer Blood Donor Month, according to the Southeastern Michigan Chapter of the American Red Cross.

The month has traditionally been set aside as a time to salute those persons who, by giving blood, have helped save many lives.

President Carter noted that "in the five years since the nation adopted as a goal an all-voluntary supply of blood for everyone in need, millions of Americans have donated blood."

In Michigan, thousands of blood donors have helped the Southeastern Michigan Chapter of Red Cross supply approximately 85 area hospitals with critically needed blood.

"In keeping with this annual observance, I urge every American to adopt blood donation as a special responsibility to his or her family, neighbor, community and country," President Carter said.

The Southeastern Michigan Red Cross Blood Services suggests that community residents may support this program by becoming volunteer blood donors.

about \$100, too much for the small rooms and communal bath facilities provided.

The hospital has no intention of setting up a clinic of any type there, Mr. Wilgarde said, noting when the idea of an alcoholism clinic was suggested as a use years ago, area residents raised such a fuss the idea was quickly dropped.

In the event the state approved the renovation project, the hospital would still have to get approval from the Farms Council, acting as zoning board of appeals, since the building is now zoned for single family residential use.

John DeFoe, Farms director of public service, said the land would either have to be zoned community services, as the remainder of the hospital property is, or a variance would have to be granted by the council.

(Though zoned single family, the nurses residence was allowed to operate under a non-conforming use clause.)

The residence was built and donated to the hospital by Mrs. John Newberry so nurses could live near their jobs and in an area where little was available for rent.

Woman in Woods Saved From Her Burning Home

Woods firefighters rescued a 31-year-old woman and battled a blaze at 880 Hollywood avenue for almost three hours in below freezing temperatures Saturday evening, January 6, according to departmental reports.

The woman, Nancy Fiorello, was rushed to Saint John Hospital by Shores ambulance suffering from smoke inhalation. She was reported in fair condition as of Monday afternoon, January 8.

In the incident, two Woods firefighters escaped injury after falling. Officer Michael VanDeGinste was atop a ladder passing equipment through a second floor window when the ladder slipped

due to the icy conditions and he fell to the ground, while Sgt. William Lentz slid off the roof and fell into some shrubbery.

Public Safety Director John Dankel cited the work of all the firefighters, while praising the rescue of the woman by Sgt. Lentz and Officers Robert Rabe and John Harwood. "They saved the life of the woman and did a fine job in getting her outside quickly," he stated.

The woman and her mother were alerted to the blaze by a first floor smoke detector with the daughter running upstairs with a bucket of water, said Lt. Allan Selby. Overcome by smoke, she collapsed in a bedroom and was rescued by the officers, who preceded the fire apparatus in their scout cars.

Severe fire, smoke and water damage occurred throughout the second floor and the roof, the lieutenant said, with a pair of rooms and the attic particularly hard hit.

"We fought the fire from the inside until it was knocked down but in the attic, we had to open the roof," he stated. Meanwhile, the main floor received minor water damage, plus smoke damage.

The fire, which originated in a storage space adjoining a second floor bedroom, was blamed on faulty wiring in the outlet, with the investigation still continuing, said Director Dankel.

Nine firefighters fought the blaze, noted Lt. Selby, with several auxiliary officers also assisting in the clean-up.

"I'm very pleased with the outcome and rescue. The men did a terrific job in spite of near zero weather and icy conditions," said the lieutenant. "It took a little luck and a lot of hard work."

Gabby's Closes for Renovation

In keeping with his commitment made prior to the Woods Council's action last November in citing Gabby's Restaurant, 19299 Mack avenue, as the most preferred applicant for an additional Class C liquor license, owner Alex Bardy said the business closed Monday, January 8, for interior renovation work.

Mr. Bardy, who conducted a successful initiatory petition drive to have the question placed on the August 8 primary ballot, with the voters subsequently approving it by a 3,037 to 1,830 margin, indicated prior to the council's action that if he were the recipient of the document, a renovation would transpire.

He said last week that the establishment would be closed for an estimated five to six weeks and, if all went well, it would reopen in late

February. "We are going to totally redo the inside with new painting, carpeting and lighting fixtures. It will be a nice place and in keeping with the family idea," he said in reiterating his effort to keep Gabby's a family-oriented restaurant.

Noting the interior will maintain its contemporary look, Mr. Bardy said the estimated \$100,000 renovation will aesthetically keep "all the charm and openness the restaurant presently has" with lots of live plants and an airy atmosphere.

Besides the work in the main dining area, Mr. Bardy said the banquet room downstairs and the lavatories also will be refurbished.

The banquet room, which will accommodate some 125 people, will receive new paneling and carpeting, plus a small service bar.

I don't think any other restaurant in The Pointe has such a private facility to accommodate that number of people, he noted.

As a result, the council requested that the legislature give consideration to amending the acts to provide an exemption from the "stringent requirements imposed upon municipal governments who supply ambulance service when emergency hospital room service is available within five miles of the area being serviced by the municipal ambulance operation."

A copy of the resolution was sent to Gov. William G. Milliken, Sens. John Hertel and Gilbert DiNello, State Rep. William Bryant, the Michigan Municipal League and cities within Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen told the council the law mandates trained paramedics to operate ambulance services, while citing the concern of Pointe and Harper Woods officials over the content.

Mr. Petersen also noted that some interest has transpired between local officials and Saint John Hospital regarding the possibility of providing emergency ambulance service with interns serving as paramedics.

Indicating that The Park, City, (via an agreement with The Park), and Harper Woods currently charge for ambulance service, and in considering the yet unforeseen ramifications of the recently passed Headlee tax limitation proposal, he felt some seniors were fearful that the city would begin charging for its ambulance service.

Officials viewed the overall spectrum of new standards for ambulances and equipment, with City Attorney George Catlin saying the objective of the legislation is to establish uniform minimum emergency medical service across the state.

Six officers have already been trained as emergency

medical technicians as a first step and officials expressed concern over cost factors in relation to the next step i.e., paramedics.

"It could force a community out of the service or force it into a high cost service," said Mr. Petersen.

As a result of the discussion, Councilman E. D. Grady moved that the resolution be drafted, citing the exemption for communities in close proximity to emergency hospital room service.

At the meeting last month, officials, based upon information received, understood that implementation of the law had been extended until this summer because sufficient funds were lacking to implement the full program.

However, after the first of the year, officials, to their surprise, learned that the effective date was still, in fact, this January 1. As a result, the city applied for a one year extension as provided under the law.

The department currently has the six technicians and Public Safety Director John Dankel said applications were sent to the state for written and practical exams toward obtaining their licenses. "The men applied and have never been given their testing date. It's not our fault that the state didn't test them," he said.

The director added that the law was to be implemented this July 1 but that the Attorney General's Office had overruled the extension.

For his part, Mr. Petersen said, "The state wasn't able to give our men, who completed EMT training, the examination for their licenses as required by law," while noting the council was informed of these latest developments at its rescheduled regular meeting Monday, January 8.

Last year, the Public Safety Department had 425 ambulance runs in which 373 citizens were transported to the hospital.

Since the city doesn't have an area in which a majority of its residents have low to moderate income, "we are required to provide a direct benefit, (i.e., the minor home repair program), or provide projects in areas which have the greatest number of low and moderate income persons," said Mr. McNamara.

"Through our demographic survey we were able to determine that the northwest area of the city has 42 percent low to moderate income households. By locating our capital improvement projects in that area and by providing the direct benefit minor home repair program, we have met grant requirements.

Responding to such concerns, Mr. Grady made his motion, wanting to make certain that the contract, before any signatures are affixed, is thoroughly reviewed by both Mr. Petersen and Mr. Catlin.

Proposals Cited

Home Repairs Eyed
The City also tried to sound residents out about their preferences and needs for community improvement with a telephone survey conducted in December. Results of the survey, which reached about 650 homes, will be released on January 15, according to Administrative Assistant Lee Birmingham.

The projects that may be proposed for 1979 funding are arranged in three categories — residential, commercial and public service.

In the residential category, officials hope to continue funding for a housing rehabilitation program, which is currently being developed with funds received during 1978. Officials propose making outright grants available to qualifying citizens for major home repairs of about \$3,500.

In residential areas, The City also proposes using federal funds for tree replacement and preservation as well as installation of outside or remote reading water meters.

In the commercial category, The City proposes a variety of projects in The Village shopping area along Kercheval avenue.

Educate Public
Officials hope to get funds to widen Notre Dame for one block between Kercheval and Waterloo to relieve the traffic congestion there, to install more lights in parking lots and to work on a retaining wall behind Kroger's, where there are occasional rat problems, according to City Manager Thomas Kressbach.

Work proposed in the public facilities category includes proposal for a water main extension, repaving of St. Paul between Notre Dame and Cadieux, replacement of traffic signs and insulation of public buildings.

Mr. Kressbach and Mr. Birmingham agreed that educating the public about one

aspect of the federal program — the housing rehabilitation plan — will be an important factor in determining its success or failure next year.

Louise Tewart, a City resident and member of Seniors Onward for Change, who attended the first hearing on the grant, noted that "people are horribly afraid of strings that may be attached to federal money."

Opening New Book
"Education is very important," she said. "We're opening a new book here and we must make people understand how to use it. This housing program will help the community as a whole by improving the standard of upkeep and providing funds to keep that standard high."

Mr. Birmingham noted that many of the "strings" associated with federal housing programs do not apply to The City because "we just don't have land available to build seniors' housing or low income units."

The City has participated in the Community Development Block Grant program for five years and has received almost \$225,000 during that time.

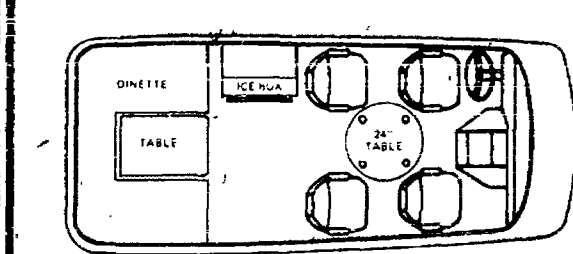

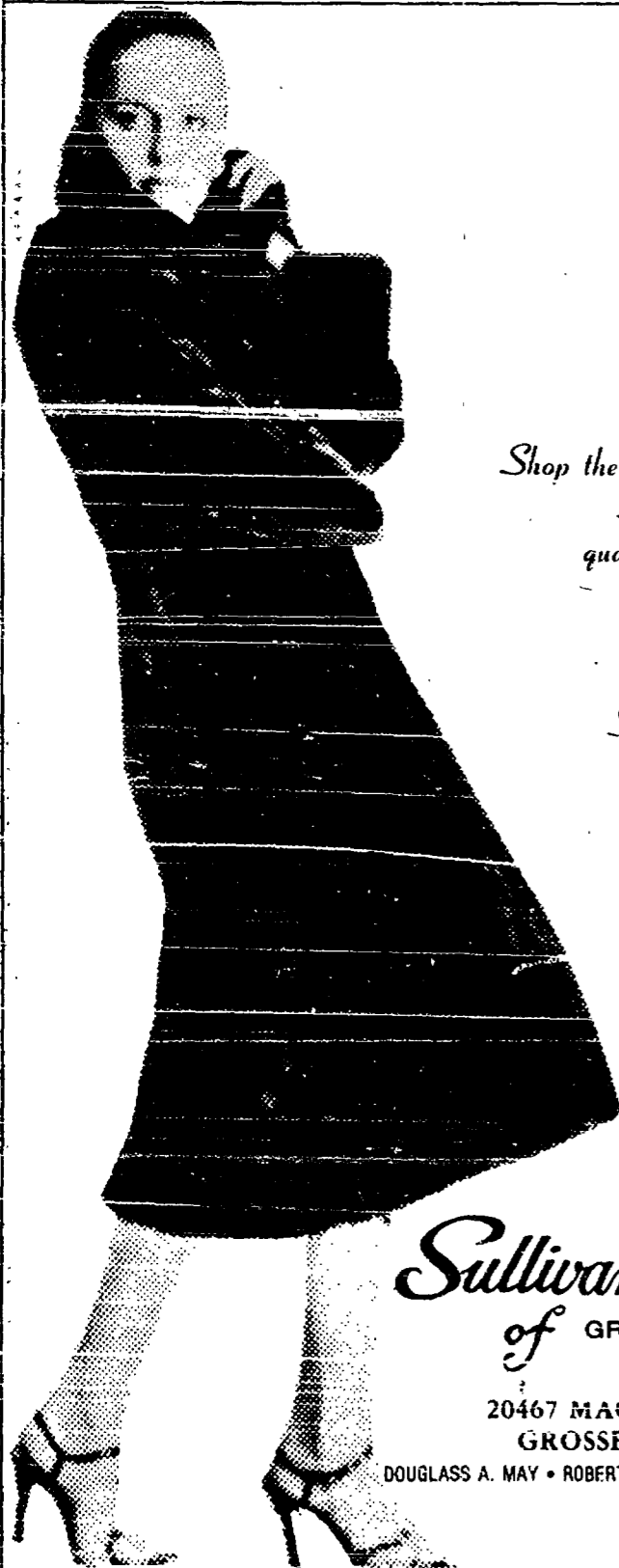

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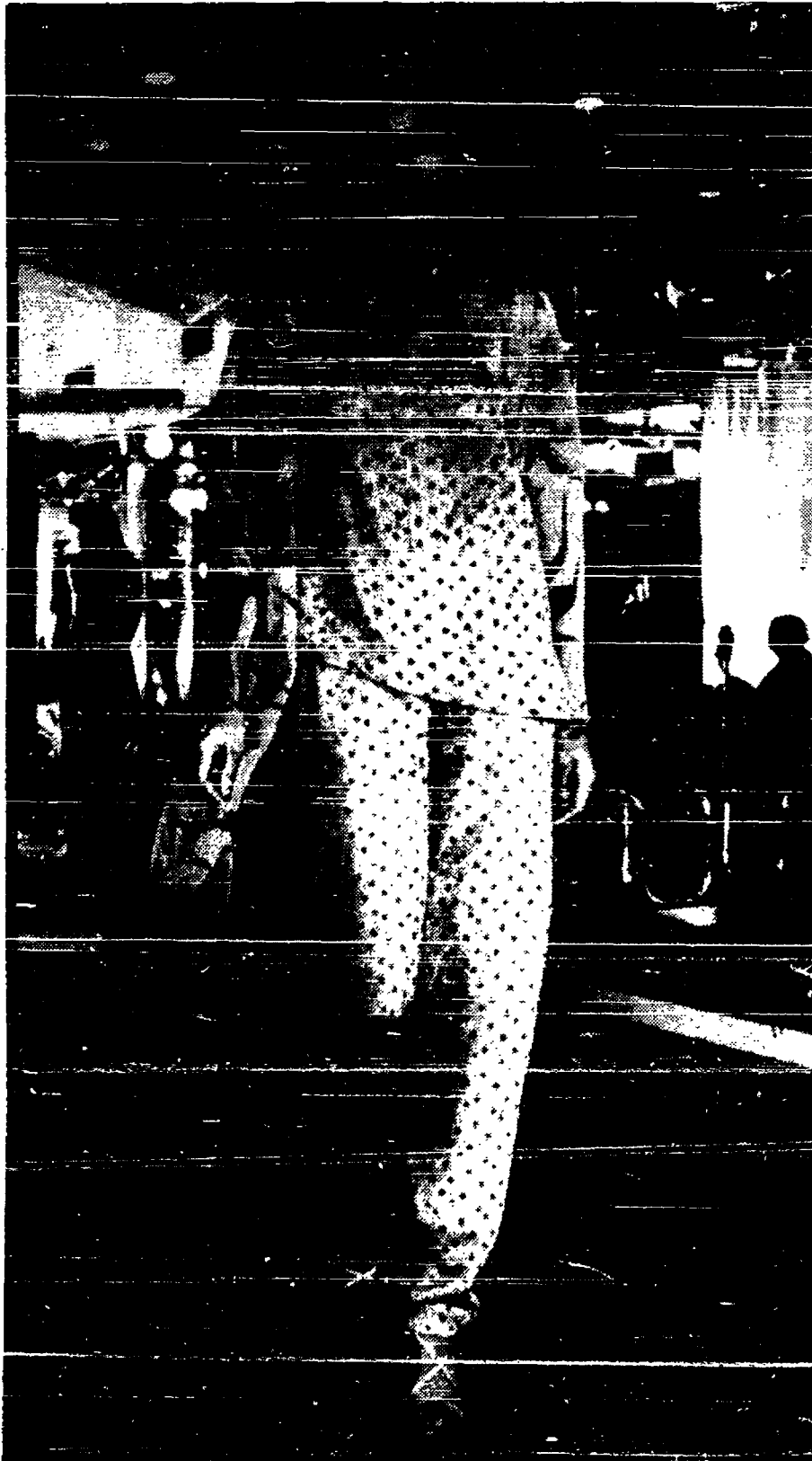

Train Women To Be Adults

A first for the eastern Detroit area will begin Thursday, February 1, at Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church in Mack avenue. It is Effectiveness Training for Women—a unique course designed by the organization which has sponsored the popular Parent Effectiveness Training.

The new program is a response to women's increasing struggles to meet their own needs while remaining responsive to the needs of others.

"Many people—many women, in particular—believe that they do not have control of their own lives," observes the instructor, Dorothy Mongoven, a Woods resident and marriage counselor, "and worse: that they can never have control.

"Many women have been trained not to take responsibility for themselves, to allow others to make decisions for them, waiting for another person or an outside influence to come along and make their life better."

Effectiveness Training for Women is designed to counter this view of outside control by reinforcing a sense of internal control and personal responsibility and providing skills to expand individual freedom and ability to meet important personal life needs.

"Unlike a number of approaches," Ms. Mongoven notes, "Effectiveness Training for Women is not a political model. It does not advocate what role a woman should choose, (homemaker, career person, etc.)

"The core values of the course are personal freedom and responsibility. How these values get defined and acted upon is what the course is all about."

It is a 30-hour course, involving lectures, role plays, discussions and exercises.
