





Those in supporting roles are Lindsay Morris, Amy Quarters, Jency York, Jill McCormick, Marie Guest and Wendy Flynn.







the estate of Mrs. Phillip H. McMillan helped to provide for the construction of a hospital building in 1927. A large piece of land was donated by Burns Henry and the hospital was incorporated

that year. Thirteen babies and their mothers were transferred from Oak street and a surgeon had to perform an emergency appendectomy before the moving of patients to the new building was complete. The new hospital had a capacity of 58 beds and 13 bassinettes.

The nurses residence was donated so that the women could be near their jobs in an area where there were no boarding houses, and rentals were difficult to find. It is currently being refurbished for planned use as business offices.

During World War II the hospital was used as a local distribution center for penicillin and provided hometown care for the war-wounded after the battles.

In the 1960's Cottage was designated by Civil Defense as a hospital equipped for disaster relief.

The last major expansion saw a multi-million dollar addition that hiked the hospital to its present capacity of 191 beds

"Regressive" means poorer people pay a higher portion of their income than higher income taxpayars. The opposite would be "progressive." Michigan ranks second in

each of two separate studies of state tax structure pro-gressivity, so it already has a progressive tax structure. It does not matter if one tax in the structure is progressive or regressive. To judge your version or my version of equity one must look at the impact of the total mix of taxes imposed.

We have competing philosophies at work. Many say we must replace property with the more progressive income tax and others say leave it alone, we already have a relatively progressive tax structure and it need not, should not, be more progressive.

I believe we must seek ways to alleviate this pressure against the property tax for only one reason. That reason is to protect the right of our community to tax itself to pursue excelsystem.

A Gift to the Future

When she bought the land, 15 acres in Livingston County, valley and streamside country stretched beside a third mile of Woodruff Creek, Dr. E. Rae Hudspeth, of Hollywood avenue, thought of it as an investment . . . perhaps a place to settle after retirement.

But lately she'd been having second thoughts. And so, last July, the Pointe gynecologist decided to donate her half-acre bog and woods to the Michigan Nature Association.

She wanted to preserve it in its natural state for all naturalists' enjoyment, "The stream and its valley with hills that surround it constitute an interesting natural spot. The land has many unusual botanical features, and I did not want to see it developed."

She chose to give it to the MNA because, "in my many years as a member, I've followed the MNA very closely and been impressed with its purposes,"

She contributed it as a living memorial to her father and mother, Ernest and Minnie Hudspeth, formerly of Cleburne, Tex.

It's now the Woodruff Creek Plant Preserve. 56th project of the citizens' organization, headquartered in Mount Clemens, dedicated to establishing nature sanctuaries and plant preserves for the native flora and fauna of Michigan.

Rich spring flora on steep hillsides on both sides of the valley are an outstanding feature of the property, located near the I-96, US 23 junction, with access from Van Amberg road.

The upland area contains the unusual alum root and bird's foot violet. Grasses, sedges and flowering shrubs line the banks of a crystal clear creek.

The most unique part of the preserve is its halfacre, spring-fed quicksand bog, surrounded by tamaracks and poison sumac, where the prairie dock, pitcher plant, fringed gentian, sundew, bladderwort and yellow star grass can be found.

Oak-hickory forest and other trees, including sugar maple, big-toothed aspen, chokecherry and basswood cover the hillsides. Dwarf birch is also present, and among the plants in the open valley are shrubby cinquefoil, false asphodel and vanilla

Bertha Daubendiek, executive secretary of the MNA, describes her organization as thrilled to receive the property. "We don't receive any government funds," she explains, "and with the present high price of land it is becoming increasingly difficult for us to acquire land.

"Thanks to Dr. Hudspeth, this beautiful place will be enjoyed untouched by development." (Continued on Page 30)

Brochure Mailed In a fund raising brochure recently mailed to hundreds of Grosse Pointe homes, the club points out that more than 18 percent of the population in The Pointe is 60 years or older, but there are few daytime activities offered for the group in the community.

The proposed addition to the club, located at 17150 Waterloo avenue, will contain 9,500 square feet of space and be connected to the main building by a covered runway. It'll include a large multi purpose room, kitchen, lobby, offices and rooms for meetings, classes and crafts. Land for the project has already been purchased and cleared, and the estimated cost of the building is \$500,000.

Major donations have been granted by the Kresge Foundation, McGregor Foundation and Grosse Pointe Rotary Club.

The claim of school officials that the Grosse Pointe district is number one in the state is ridiculous. (Front page story in February 15 issue.)

Instead of demonstrating that Grosse Pointe is first in an area that can be validly measured, this hollow boast simply shows how far a testhappy school district will go in an effort to prove to the community that its testing system is a smashing success. In spite of an admonition

by the Michigan Department of Education against using state assessment scores to rank school systems, Grosse Pointe has not only developed a ranking system, it uses unsanctioned combinations of scores to arrive at an overall "achievement" rank.

To arrive at its mythical number one status, Grosse Pointe takes the 3.1 margin it achieved over the school district with the next highest score in the seventh grade math assessment and uses these "points" to bolster its "rankings" in the other three assessment areas where its scores were at the third or fourth level below the highest-scoring district.

Since the leading scores in these three assessments were much more tightly clustered. the 3.1 point spread, when distributed across the other math score and the two reading scores, enabled the doughty Pointers to eke out

a narrow win. The director of Research and Development calls it "unofficial."

A Gift to the Future

When she bought the land, 15 acres in Living-ston County, valley and streamside country stretched beside a third mile of Woodruff Creek, Dr. E. Rae Hudspeth, of Hollywood avenue, thought of it as an investment . . . perhaps a place to settle after retirement.

But lately she'd been having second thoughts. And so, last July, the Printe gynecologist decided to donate her half-acre bog and woods to the Michigan Nature Association.

She wanted to preserve it in its natural state for all naturalists' enjoyment. "The stream and its valley with hills that surround it constitute an interesting natural spot. The land has many unusual botanical features, and I did not want to see it developed.'

She chose to give it to the MNA because, "in my many years as a member, I've followed the MNA very closely and been impressed with its purposes."

She contributed it as a living memorial to her father and mother, Ernest and Minnie Hudspeth, formerly of Cleburne, Tex.

It's now the Woodruff Creek Plant Preserve. 56th project of the citizens' organization, headquartered in Mount Clemens, dedicated to establishing nature sanctuaries and plant preserves for the native flora and fauna of Michigan.

Rich spring flora on steep hillsides on both sides of the valley are an outstanding feature of the property, located near the I-96, US 23 junction, with access from Van Amberg road.

The upland area contains the unusual alum root and bird's foot violet. Grasses, sedges and flowering shrubs line the banks of a crystal clear creek.

The most unique part of the preserve is its halfacre, spring-fed quicksand bog, surrounded by tamaracks and poison sumac, where the prairie dock, pitcher plant, fringed gentian, sundew, bladderwort and yellow star grass can be found.

Oak-hickory forest and other trees, including sugar maple, big-toothed aspen, chokecherry and basswood cover the hillsides. Dwarf birch is also present, and among the plants in the open valley are shrubby cinquefoil, false asphodel and vanilla grass.

Bertha Daubendiek, executive secretary of the MNA, describes her organization as thrilled to re-ceive the property. "We don't receive any govern-ment funds," she explains, "and with the present high price of land it is becoming increasingly difficult for us to acquire land.

"Thanks to Dr. Hudspeth, this beautiful place will be enjoyed untouched by development." (Continued on Page 30)
