Thursday, March 29 RADIATION WAS DE-TECTED 16 miles away from the site of a nuclear reactor leak near Harrisburg, Pa. Government investigators termed the leak "a serious contamination problem," as radioactive readings inside the plant jumped to eight times the lethal level. A malfunction in the cooling system caused contaminated steam to escape into the atmosphere, spreading over an area populated by about 13,000 people. Officials had not determined the problem serious enough to evacuate the residents.

Friday, March 30 REPORTS THAT THE CARTER administration would relax its anti-inflation guidelines brightened hopes for a settlement of contract negotiations between the Teamsters and the trucking industry. Mr. Carter's infla-tion fighters apparently have found it hard to stick to the guidelines in the face of the latest figures that show inflation jumping at a 15 precent annual rate, administra-tion sources say. In others news, the federal government ordered an investigation into whether Americans are being subjected to dangerous amounts of cancercausing asbestos from handhold electric hair dryers.

Saturday, March 31 THE NUCLEAR REGULA-TORY commission officials said the damaged Three Mile Island power plant still faced the ultimate threat of a meltdown of its core --- the worst possible catastrophe at a commercial facility - three days after the original accident

Instead of agreeing to pay a set amount to the municipalities, school officials would prefer an open contract that simply states the system will cover any expenses incurred by the city. Like agreements have already been approved by The City, Park, Farms and Shores. "Matter of Principle"

"What the schools are trying to do is effectuate a considerable savings at the city's expense," charged Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen. "If the other cities want to roll over and play dead, that's their business, but we're not going along with it."
