



House Democrats voted against President Jimmy Carter's plan to deregulate American crude oil, Mr. Carter's proposal was turned down by a 138-69 vote, and it doesn't mean that he will have to curb his plans to let oil prices rise. The White House termed the action taken by the Democrats "clearly contrary to the best interests of this country." White House press secretary Jody Powell stated that 'Mr. Car-ter's plan should not meet with too much difficulty in Congress as many GOP and Democratic senators approve the President's proposal.

Dorothy Kennel, Ronald Dalby Appear to Be Front Runners in June II Race for Two Seats

By Susan McDonald With less than two weeks of campaigning left, Dorothy Kennel and Ronald Dalby appear to be stepping out ahead of the crowd in the race to

fill two seats on the Board of Education, The election, set for Mon-day, June 11, attracted 11 hopefuls but no hot issues so

far. Most of the candidates are trying to sell voters on their background and qualifications for the job as they work the crowds at the tradi-tional spring round of ice cream socials, PTO meetings and school functions.

The two front runners, Mr. Dalby and Mrs. Kennel, have one thing in common-organization.

Even though this is his first crack at political office in The Pointe, the head of Dalby Corporation is ap-proaching the race like an old pro with a well-financed organization that reaches into

all 10 elementary precincts. "I think Grosse Pointe voters appreciate a well-pre-pared, thoughtful approach to a campaign," said Mr. Dal-by, 39. He presents himself as an analytical former attorney turned independent businessman who has been extensive-ly involved in Grosse Pointe Memorial Church for several vears.

His goal as a School Board member would be to reconcile the concerns of teachers, parents, administrators and taxpayers, while restoring confidence in the quality of

Woods Council Raises Board Appeals Fees

The Woods have been raised "Sketches mean nothing to as the council unanimously me.' concurred in a recommendation of the Planning Commission in action at its regular meeting Monday, May 21.

At its April meeting, the commission voted to increase fees from \$25 to \$75 for the R-1, (single family residential), district and from \$25 to \$150 for all other classifications. In a related action, the

council also approved regulations for filing Board of Appeal requests with an additional provision that the board may require an appropriate topographical survey in a given instance prior to ruling on an appeal. Officials felt the new fees

were needed in order to at least break even with ensuing costs, such as placing

appropriate legal notices in the NEWS, for paper and postage regarding mailing notices to affected property owners and for clerical work to get them out.

In fact, the council first recommended the fee of \$100 to the commission, with that figure being felt to be a break even one.

At the same time, City Attorney George Catlin had pointed out to the commission that the \$25 amount had been on the books without

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE VI OF THE CITY CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS OF 1975, CHAPTER 12, PROHIBITING THE PARKING OF MOTOR VEHICLES BE-TWEEN THE CURB AND THE FRONT SET BACK LINE OF RESIDENTIAL PROPERTIES AND TO PROVIDE EX-CEPTIONS THEREFOR, BY AMEND-ING SECTION 6-12-3 TO LIMIT A PARK-ING AREA OF A RESIDENTIAL LOT OF A FRONTAGE OF FORTY-FIVE FEET OR LESS.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS ORDAINS;

Section 1: That Title VI of the City Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods of 1975, Section 6-12-3, be amended by deleting said Section and substituting the following Section in its stead:

8-12-3 PARKING AREA PROHIBITIONS: It shall be unlawful for any owner, tenant, or occupant of any residential lot to allow the use of a paved parking area for parking of motor vehicles as herein before defined, which exceeds thirty (30) feet in width or which exceeds thirty (30) per cent in coverage of the required front yard area for any residential lot, whichever is the lesser; except residential lots of forty-five (45) feet or less in width, and as to such lots, such parking area shall not exceed twelve (12) feet in width. And, further, that parallel parking of motor vehicles side-by-side shall be prohibited.

Section 2: This Ordinance shall become effective twenty (20) days after the date of its enactment.

leaf maple that shades a raised redwood deck in the back garden, surrounded by flowering shrubs. Six to seven hundred begonias, in three beds bordered by boxwood, are featured in the Beacon Hill garden of Mr. and Mrs. Karl G. Behr.

Pink is the predominant hue in the beds of geraniums and roses in this garden that focuses on a large Scotch elm, its trunk covered in ivy.

The second garden in Barclay road, that of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Scott, Jr., is only four years old. But a majestic 150-year-old maple tree remains from earlier landscaping.

Mr. Scott has espaliered pyracantha and fruit trees. They are trained to grow flat against the many walls and fences, which also feature clematis.

Be sure to visit the informal garden of Mr. and Mrs. Warren F. Jones, of Vendome road. It is based on the English landscape tradition.

Color from spring to fall can be seen with Korean lilacs, purple leaf plum trees, yellow twig dogwood, forsythia, flowering cherry, mock orange, azaleas and star magnolia. Don't forget to tour the Trial Garden behind

the Grosse Pointe War Memorial in Lakeshore road. It resembles a wheel, its "spokes" planted with annuals attended by garden club members.

Its focal point is a historical stone that ground grist in the Windmill Pointe mill long ago when Indian canoes stopped to trade.
