BOARD TO PULL OUT OF YSD

Thursday, June 14
CITING THE NATION at "critical crossroads," President Jimmy Carter's Council on Wage and Price Stability warned that excessive wage demands may push the economy to a permanent inflationary level. The council stated that inflation is hitting a dangerous stage with food, housing and energy to blame for the current 14 percent inflation rate. The 14 percent figure has caused real wages to fall, and attempts to recover such losses through wage gains "will only make matters worse," according to the council report.

Friday, June 15
PRESIDENT JIMMY CARTER arrived in Vienna where he will later meet with Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev to discuss the SALT II strategic arms limitation treaty. Mr. Carter said he arrived "on a mission of peace" adding that he is guarding against expecting too much. "We have no illusions that this agreement will rid the world of danger or end all differences between our two nations," he said. The treaty would run through 1985.

Saturday, June 16
AT THE SALT II talks in Vienna President Jimmy Carter was prepared to complain to Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev about the Soviet buildup of nuclear and conventional forces in Europe. Top-level U.S. officials also cited that "Soviet-supported Cubans in Africa threaten continued turmoil that could endanger the future of American-Soviet relations." The SALT II treaty requires ratification by the Senate and would limit the amount of missiles and bombs each superpower may have.

Sunday, June 17
IRANIAN GUNMEN HAVE been ordered by a revolutionary court in Tehran to carry out assassination orders on Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi who has taken refuge 50 miles south of Mexico City. The former leader was condemned to death after he left his throne in January for acting as a traitor on behalf of the Iranian nation. A spokesman for the court said assassination attempts in the Bahamas, the Shah's previous exile trip, proved unsuccessful.

Monday, June 18
MICHIGAN CONSUMERS may feel the effect of the truckers' strike sometime this week when they discover low stock on supermarket shelves. Head of the Michigan Independent Truckers Association, Harland Wilcox, said Michigan truckers will pull their rigs off the roads and picket fuel stops. The truckers are bitter about rising fuel costs, the 55 mph speed limit and truck weight limits.

Tuesday, June 19
WHILE WARNING THAT "the threat of nuclear holocaust still hangs over us," President Jimmy Carter and Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev signed the historic SALT II treaty which will limit the amount of missiles and bombers each nation may have. The treaty, however, must be approved by the Senate and is expected to run into some difficulty. Mr. Carter addressed a joint session of the Congress after returning from Vienna and stressed to the lawmakers that the U.S. and Russia "must live in peace — or we may not live at all."

Two Firemen Injured in Park Blaze

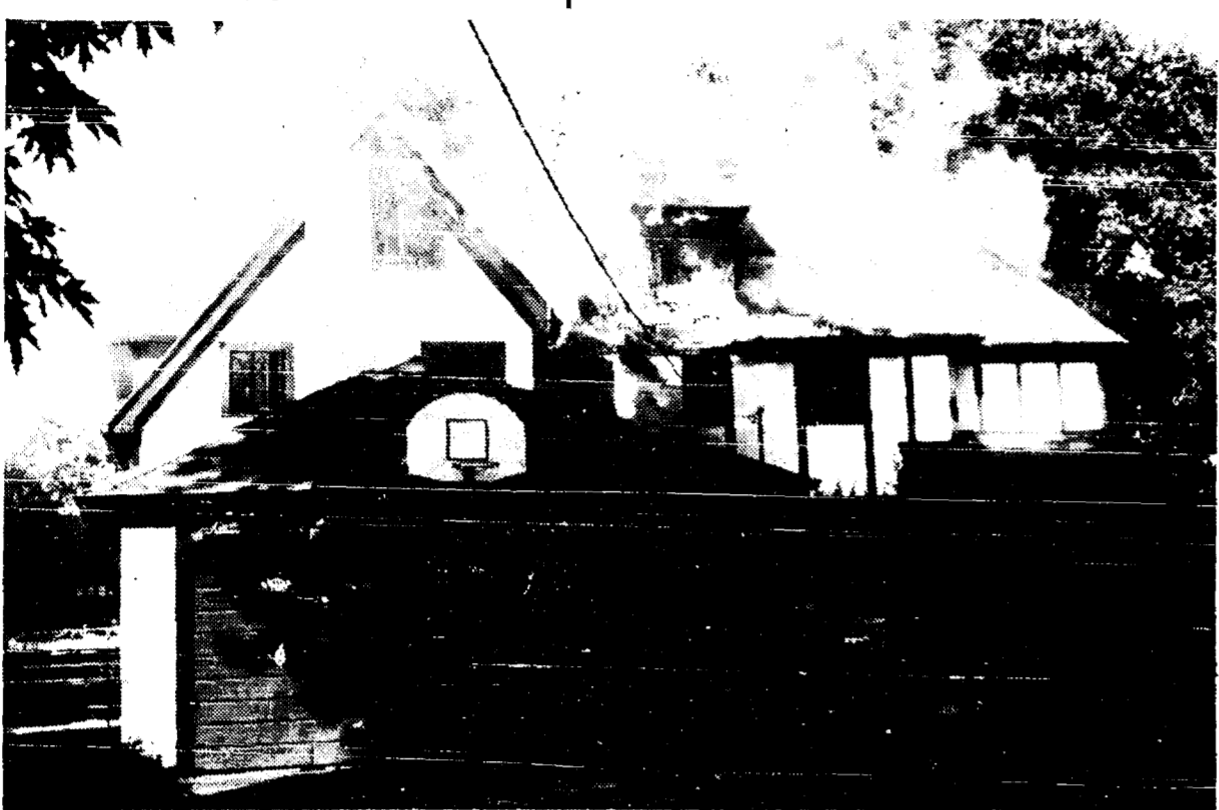

Park Home Destroyed By Blaze

Roof Area of Tudor Structure Receives Extensive Damage; Two Firefighters Hurt in Incident

Carol Fuchs didn't think much of the smoke coming from her frying pan on Wednesday, June 13, but after a neighbor rushed into her house and told her that smoke was coming from the roof, it was too much to believe.

Park firefighters responded to 743 Berkshire road just after 6 p.m. to discover that the three and a half story English Tudor had flames and heavy black smoke billowing out of the roof. Off-duty personnel, as well as firemen from The Farms and The City, responded to the three-alarm blaze that took well over 45 minutes to bring under control.

Roofing Attack
Fire Chief Phillip M. Costa said firefighters remained at the scene for about three hours to make sure that the fire was completely extinguished.

The cause of the fire is undetermined at this point and is still under investigation, Chief Costa stated. The amount of damage also is unknown. To get at the blaze, firemen had to axe their way through the roof. Farms Sgt. James Mauck seriously injured his eyes from dirt and soot and is recovering at home, while

Neighborhoods, Positive Real Estate Explored At I-F Center Seminar

Executive Director Egnatios Says There Are 'Early Warning Signals' on Processes of Deterioration; Realtor Peter Johnstone Also Speaks to Group of About 20 People

Neighborhoods are not destroyed by blacks moving in; they're destroyed by whites moving out. That, in an oversimplified way, was the gist of a seminar sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Inter-Faith Center for Racial Justice.

Speaking at the session, the center's executive director Ed Egnatios said there are "early warning signals" that the processes of deterioration that have brought down much of Detroit may be becoming evident in the Pointes.

About 20 people, half of them Pointe realtors, attended the seminar, entitled "Neighborhood Revitalization And The Power of Positive Real Estate," on Wednesday, June 13, in the War Memorial.

Systematic Forces
Other speakers included Peter Johnstone, of Johnstone and Johnstone, realtors; Harold Meininger, a member of the South Oakland Real Estate Board; Lillian Benbow, a housing consultant with the Michigan Department of Civil Rights; and Larry Goldsmith, director of the home information center, Southfield.

Mr. Egnatios, who holds a Masters of Social Work from the University of Michigan, said the forces of neighborhood deterioration become evident 10 to 15 years before the eventual collapse of the area. The forces are systematic and institutionalized, and include redlining by banks and insurance companies,

Planners in GPW View Code Again

Much of Property Maintenance Proposal Approved, While Action on Remaining Portions Tabled

A proposed property maintenance code for The Woods, thoroughly explored the last time by the Planning Commission in October, was discussed by the commissioners at a special meeting Tuesday, June 12, at which time much of the document was adopted with action on the remaining portions being tabled until July.

The proposal, incorporating an inspection check list, has been under further study by a commission subcommittee, including George Rinaldi, Paul Rothenburg and John Kennedy, who incorporated a series of minimum standards into the code.

Enforcement Eyed
These include a structural and maintenance, (interior and exterior), check list encompassing such areas as the chimney, roof, gutters and porches, plus electrical wiring and equipment and heating considerations.

"We followed other cities' check lists and revised it and changed it," said Mr. Rinaldi, who also cited the contributions of City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, City Attorney George Catlin, Building Inspector Earl Wakely and officials of other city departments, e.g., electrical.

Local Officials Surprised by Board's Action

Disappointment Also Expressed by Some As Woods Strives to Regroup Its Forces As Managing Municipality of Youth Service Division

Surprise, permeated with disappointment, was the main reaction to the School Board's unanimous decision on Monday, June 18, to pull out of the Youth Service Division, (YSD), this June 30 on the part of local officials. With this action, officials in The Woods, the managing municipality, are meeting this week, (after press time), to explore the area of services and potential personnel adjustments.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, division coordinator, is planning to call a meeting of the YSD's board of managers, (including all Pointe city managers and a School Board representative), but when, specifically, he didn't know.

He said he would meet with Public Safety Director John Dankel and Exec. Lt. Jack Patterson to review the entire situation and "do a little brainstorming" to pinpoint a course of action for his community. (The four YSD officers, two in the North High School district and two in the South district, are Woods officers.)

Main Concerns
Mr. Petersen also indicated City Attorney George Catlin is reviewing the legality of the School Board's action in relation to the YSD contract affecting all participants.

For his part, Director Dankel cited two main concerns. "I want to make sure our city continues to receive an appropriate level of service, and I want to avoid layoffs of our own staff," he stressed.

At this time, there is one officer vacancy in the department, along with two clerk-dispatcher positions, he continued, while noting The Woods pays around 33 percent of the municipalities' share of the YSD budget, (excluding the schools' 25 percent of the total cost).

While The Woods is striving to regroup its forces, the "ripple" effect of the School Board's action was reflected in some comments from local city managers.

"I'm shocked. I really am," said Park City Manager John Crawford.

Removal of Bureau Detective from North 'Final Straw' Says Superintendent Coats

An angry Board of Education voted Monday, June 18, to pull out of the Youth Service Division, (YSD), this June 30, putting an end to a year of bickering over the financing of the community-wide juvenile crime unit.

The "final straw," according to Superintendent Dr. William Coats, was the removal of a YSD detective from North High School on Monday, June 4, two weeks before the end of the semester.

The action was "taken during one of the most critical times of the school year," Dr. Coats said. "It was done without notifying the school administration and points up a concern we have had about depending upon service over which we have no authority."

Looking for Excuse
The decision to transfer the detective from North High to The Woods detective bureau was made by Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, YSD coordinator. Normally two officers each are assigned to the North and South High districts.

Mr. Petersen admitted his timing "probably wasn't the best," but defended the move as in the best interest of both parties. It eliminated a \$6,000 deficit in the YSD budget and relieved a manpower shortage in The Woods police department, he said.

"We assured them that our entire police department would respond if there was any problem (at North)," Mr. Petersen continued. "It's apparent that the school administration is looking for an excuse to get out of the YSD. If they want to take this occasion — so be it."

The vote of the Board of Education was unanimous, (Trustees Robert Warner and Ann Arducci were absent), with support even from Trustee William Huet.

Pleads Guilty In Shooting

A 18-year-old Park youth, who was bouncer for trial in Wayne County Circuit Court in the shooting death of his father, pled guilty to a charge of manslaughter at his arraignment before Circuit Court Judge Joseph B. Sullivan on Thursday, June 7.

James M. Schorn of Devonshire road, who is awaiting sentencing on the charge, is currently being held in the Wayne County Jail. The maximum sentence for manslaughter is 15 years.

Schorn was arraigned on second degree murder of his father, Dr. Ralph M. Schorn, by Park Municipal Judge Beverly C. Grobbel and was found competent to stand trial after undergoing psychiatric evaluation.

Judge Grobbel ordered Schorn to stand trial in circuit court after he waived his right to a preliminary examination. Schorn called police on April 19 and reported that his father was holding a shotgun to his chest and was ready to commit suicide. When police arrived at the house they found Schorn holding his father, who was sprawled across a bed after a fatal gunshot to the chest. Schorn was later arrested after investigators gathered enough evidence to indicate the elder Schorn's death was not accidental. The Schorn death was the first reported homicide since 1967, according to Police Chief Henry O. Coonce.

"Chester Petersen is not wearing a black hat in this, and neither are we," Mr. Huetteman said. "I think Mr. Peterson saw a way to absorb the deficit that has been created by the other municipalities' refusal to increase their contributions to the budget — and he took it."

"If anyone's responsible for killing the YSD it's those municipalities," he added.

The Board vote on Monday culminated more than a year of arguing between the cities and the school system over financing of the division, which became fully operational in August 1970.

The School Board in May flatly refused a request by the cities that it increase its share of the \$175,000 budget to 30 percent — what would have amounted to a 75 percent increase in the schools' contribution over the last three years.

The YSD board of managers, (including all Pointe city managers and a School Board representative), agreed to allow the school system to maintain a 25 percent contribution, but because the cities refused to increase their allocations over last year's dollar figures, a \$6,000 deficit was created.

While the removal of the detective from North created great political furor, it apparently did not cause a major problem at the school during the two weeks before graduation.

North Principal G. Bruce Feighner said he compensated for the lack of an officer by assigning extra teachers and counselors to supervise hallways and the cafeteria.

He said the school experienced the "normal" amount of problems that accompany graduation hysteria.

But Dr. Coats said the action to remove the officer "could have had serious consequences" and created a "dangerous and intolerable precedent" at North.

(Continued from Page 1) a reason for which the YSD was created apparently no longer exists, he indicated.

"It's hard to believe the School Board would ignore a responsibility of the safety and well being of the children," continued Mr. Crawford, who added in viewing the Board's action in this light, he would feel optimistic, i.e., that certain problems which led to the division's birth no longer are that apparent.

On the other hand, increases in total youth-oriented crime as reported to the YSD indicates a need for the bureau, Mr. Crawford feels.

With an objective of reducing city governmental costs, the concept of the consolidation of services to provide a single service, e.g., local participation in the Grosse Pointes-Clinton Refuse Disposal Authority, also is an important factor to him.

"I feel the YSD falls into that category. It's one agency providing good service to an entire geographical area," he said, while adding, "I'm disappointed the concept will be eliminated."

Valuable Function
City Manager Thomas Kressbach of Grosse Pointe City echoed a prevalent theme by saying, "We'll have to totally reevaluate the situation."

"Youth services has been a very valuable function. I hope the action won't be a precipitous thing and that further evaluation will continue. It's valuable to the schools as well as to the communities."

Saying he wasn't totally clear on the reasons for the School Board's action at this time, Mr. Kressbach, in expressing his disappointment, added, "If the schools don't feel it's necessary to justify its value and benefits, it appears difficult to sell (the concept) to our city officials."

For his part, Shores Village Superintendent Thomas K. Jefferis said, "I'm very surprised. It seems to me the primary benefits of the YSD goes to the schools. After all, that's what it's for."

He added the demise of the division would have less effect on the Village than the other Pointes because it has the smallest school population.

Meanwhile, Farms City Manager Andrew Bremer, who has been a strong supporter of the YSD, said he prefers not to comment on the School Board's action until a meeting of the board of managers transpires.

"I'm surprised but not totally surprised," commented South High Principal William Mogk, in eving the increased cost of operating the YSD on the schools' part.

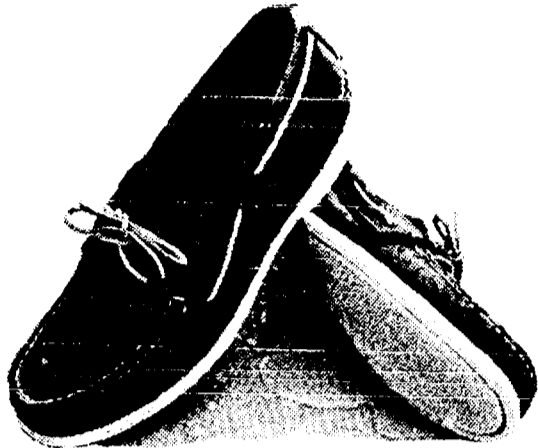

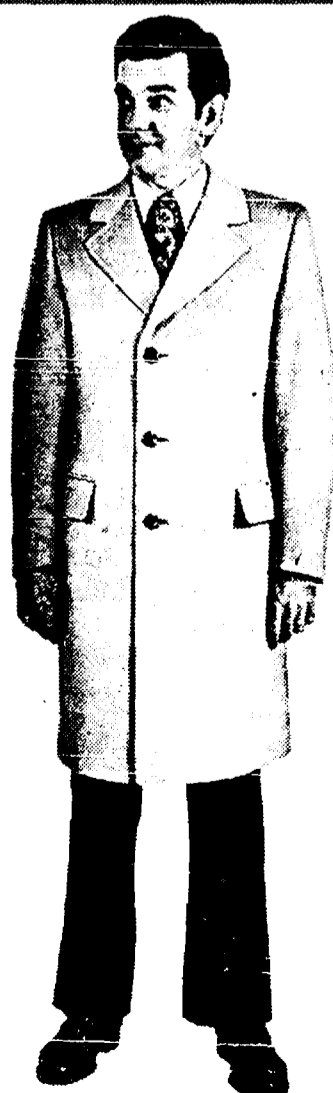

Park Police Nab Burglars

Two Detroit men convicted of armed robbery for burglarizing a Park home six years ago were arraigned on charges of the breaking and entering of an occupied dwelling on Wednesday, June 13.

Walter Childress, 23, and Terry Holt, 24, were arraigned before Park Municipal Judge Beverly C. Grobel and were later remanded to the Wayne County Jail in lieu of \$15,000 bond.

The preliminary examination for Childress and Holt is scheduled for Thursday, June 21.

Park police received burglary reports of homes in Somerset and Westchester roads about two hours within each other on Tuesday, June 12.

A third attempted breaking and entering in Windmill Pointe drive also was reported that same day with the owner telling police that while he was mowing his lawn in his backyard he heard a loud pounding at the front door.

When he arrived at the front door, he discovered that his window was broken and saw a black man escape into a black 1972 Mercury.

He got the license number of the car and reported it to the police.

According to Police Chief Henry O. Counce, the license number was traced to Childress with fingerprints later linking Childress and Holt to the burglaries on Somerset and Westchester.

Childress and Holt were two out of four individuals who were convicted six years ago for armed robbery of a home in Somerset road.

Holt was out on parole for that conviction when he was arrested, Chief Counce said.

It is not known if Childress was discharged from prison or was on parole.

An unknown amount of coins was taken from the Somerset home, while about \$150 in cash was missing from the Westchester residence.

GPW Establishments Facing LCC Hearing

An initial complaint of one Class C liquor establishment allegedly serving alcoholic beverages to minors led to the visit of Woods police to four of the city's five Class C operations Wednesday evening, June 13.

The result found three of the four businesses being charged under Section 33 of the Michigan Control Act and Rules, which says that alcoholic beverages must not be sold to a person unless the individual is 21.

Businesses charged include Grosse Pointe Woods Recreation, 20422 Mack avenue, Nightingale Lounge, 20791 Mack, and Gabby's Restaurant, 19299 Mack, while

Lounge in The Woods, 20513 Mack, was found not to be in violation. The other Class C establishment, Anton's, 20934 Mack, isn't open for business as yet.

After receiving a communication from Roger Rosendale, director, licensing and enforcement, LCC, that minors were allegedly being served alcoholic beverages at GPW Recreation, the investigation was initiated on Thursday, June 7, with Public Safety Director John Dankel authorizing the use of a 20-year-old area youth to act as an agent as part of an overall check of all establishments.

"We conducted inspections of all the licensed operations, with the exception of Anton's," said Det. Thomas Podszwik, who, along with Det. John Albrecht and Exec. Lt. Jack Patterson, were involved, with GPW Recreation being visited at around 7:15 p.m., Nightingale at 7:33 p.m., Lounge in The Woods at 7:40 p.m. and Gabby's at 7:50 p.m.

With the exception of Lounge in The Woods, the agent was allegedly served beer without anyone asking for proof of his age, police said.

Det. Podszwik stated an LCC hearing for the three cited establishments could transpire within four to six weeks.

Indicating employees at GPW Recreation have checked the identification of customers with consistency in the past, owner Jack Degriek said, "There was one apple in the bushel that wasn't checked at all and it rots on you."

For his part, Alex Bardy, Gabby's owner, in expressing disappointment over what occurred, stressed his employees will be more careful on the procedure.

More visibly concerned over the incident was Frank Losh of Nightingale, who felt the planting of the agent on the part of the Public Safety Department was a "shady operation."

Saying he wasn't on duty at the time, while indicating those involved took it for granted the agent was of age, Mr. Losh said he hasn't called the department for assistance in some nine years, while being able to handle any problems which have occurred.

"I'm a taxpayer, and I didn't think it was just," he added.

Fire Losses Up in Park

Total fire losses in The Park were up 37 percent in 1978 with a figure of \$287,795.27 or \$18.39 per capita based on a population of 15,641, according to the department's annual report. The fire loss in 1977 was recorded at \$209,265.99.

The highest loss, (\$91,000), was reflected last March when fire destroyed the Charles Helin mansion in Windmill Pointe drive.

According to Fire Chief Phillip M. Costa, the Helin mansion was only insured for \$75,000 when actually the true loss of the mansion was estimated over \$3 million.

The most tragic incident in 1978 was the death of City

Firefighter Richard Tucker who was fatally injured when a wall of the Helin mansion collapsed on him.

The City Fire Department assisted Park firefighters in that blaze as well as the Farms and Harper Woods.

The department responded to 133 more alarms in 1978, (912), than in the previous year, (779). Of those 912 alarms, 32 were reported as false, a decrease of nine, under the previous year.

Total ambulance runs were recorded as 534 out of which 156 were runs for unknown causes, 100 for falls and 57 for automobile and bike accidents.

In door-to-door inspections of Park homes last year, the fire department reported 29 cases of where the fuse box was overloaded, 28 cases of where flammable liquids were not properly stored and 28 cases of combustibles too close to the furnace.

The department also inspected schools, churches and other places of public assembly.

Park firefighters responded to mutual assistance in The City 13 times and in The Farms on 12 occasions.

The department's manpower in 1978 remained at 21. Firefighters were active in classroom discussion and field trips for training of fire prevention and detection.

One of this year's goals is "to establish a training center in the fire station for any group of residents who wish to learn the proper techniques of cardiopulmonary resuscitation, (CPR), and basic and advanced American Red Cross first aid."

Woods' Northeast Storm Sewer Project Delayed

Proposed construction of the northeast relief storm sewer, a project which Woods officials have hoped would start well over a year ago, may not get started this year.

The council earlier this month explored the status of the situation, and gave its authorization, for the advertisement of bids while directing City Attorney George Catlin to proceed to obtain necessary easement agreements for the construction.

At this time, the cost of the proposed work is placed at around \$420,000 in capital improvement monies, with the rest being planned for budgeting in 1980-81.

Geared toward alleviating problems, e.g., flooded basements, which occurred several years ago due to the effect of heavy storms, the project has suffered some delays in becoming a reality.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen cited several reasons including an unsuccessful effort by the city to obtain utilization of the balance of funds, (around \$200,000), from the Wayne County Drain Commissioner's Office to be applied to the project.

Now, time is needed to obtain some 36 easement agreements, the great majority from affected citizens. A plea from University Liggett School that no work transpire when classes open in the fall also could delay the program until next year.

Liggett officials indicated their willingness to cooperate on the easement front and saw no problem with necessary work transpiring during the summer. However, they requested no construction begin to disrupt campus activity in the fall.

Another problem, according to Mr. Petersen, was that the city was unable to obtain an easement between two houses to go in a straight line to the Milk River. As a result, it had to obtain permission from St. Clair Shores

to use its right-of-way for such an objective, thus going out of its way.

Yet another concern affecting the whole program on the cost front, (it could cost an estimated 12 to 15 percent more next year, said Mr. Petersen), is a concrete shortage, which means bids would be high, officials pointed out.

It also was stressed that no construction contracts would be awarded until all easement agreements had been executed.

A prevailing feeling among officials, as Mr. Catlin begins to obtain easement agreements, is that the construction is going to benefit northeast area citizens and, as a result, they should be cooperative in relation to the facts.

Mr. Catlin said he will prepare a letter on the project and send it to affected citizens, indicating that in informational meeting will be scheduled with officials and the city engineers at which time residents will have an opportunity to ask questions. Easements will be requested and a report will be given to the council.

This subject is scheduled to be reviewed by the solons on Monday, July 2, said Mr. Petersen, while Mr. Catlin said he hopes such an informational session will transpire in about two weeks.

After a short business meeting, John C. Krause of Michigan Bell will speak on "Light Wave Communications."

At its last meeting in May, AARP members enjoyed a musical kit, "Bring on The Clowns," presented by Toni McClure and Trudy Shimon. Planning and arrangements were handled by Mrs. Emma Hutchinson and her committee.

Fumes Affect 4 at Neff Park

Four City lifeguards were rushed to Bon Secours Hospital Saturday, June 16, after they were exposed to noxious fumes that poured from the pool filter when the wrong chemical was accidentally mixed into the system.

Three of the four pool attendants were treated and released, according to police. The fourth, David Kienle, 19, of Washington road, was retained for several hours for observation. None of the men suffered permanent lung damage, police said.

The accident occurred just before closing time at about 9:50 p.m. when a pool attendant was refilling the chemical tank in the pool filter. He inadvertently dumped a small container of chlorine into a tank that was to be filled with water and an acid, police said.

A gas reaction resulted when the acid and chlorine were mixed, sending chlorine fumes into the filter room and outside to the pool area.

Police and firemen were called to Neff Park and helped clear the pool and bath house of the few citizens remaining.

None of them were exposed to the fumes, police added.

Proposed Property Maintenance Code Explored

(Continued from Page 1) on the measure with an attempt being made to have a "sensible economic" way of enforcing it.

On Needed Repairs
The proposal, which requires a certificate of occupancy before any previously vacated premises can be occupied, with such a certificate being good for two years, also provides that a conditional certificate of occupancy may be issued by the Division of Safety Inspections.

It may be obtained upon request prior to the complete conformance with the chapter's provisions and if the absence of such conformance doesn't constitute material health or safety hazards. One may be issued for 90 days, with the possibility of an extension of an additional 90 days being granted for good cause.

On the subject of who should make needed repairs, the proposal says prior to the consummation of the sale and transfer of the premises, the owner must deliver a copy of the certificate of occupancy to the prospective purchaser and then must file an affidavit with the Division of Safety Inspections.

This sets forth that the owner has delivered a copy of the certificate to the prospective purchaser, transferee, leasee or tenant.

If the purchaser agrees to assume the duty of repairing or correcting any defects, the purchaser, on a form provided by the Division of Safety Inspections, must indicate the agreement by his signature. Upon the delivery of the agreement to the division, the owner will no longer be responsible.

Raises Question
Commissioner Raymond Lynch raised the question of short-term rentals regarding a temporary occupancy of two or three months and its application under the proposal. Mr. Rinaldi indicated the intent was to include such time spans, for short-term rentals "could be worse than long-term" regarding damage to property in relation to turnover.

In noting there are very few rental dwellings in The Woods, commission chairman Charles Van Hove asked Mr. Wakely about this, with the latter saying very few complaints have been received by his department with most of these being owner-tenant disputes.

Mr. Lynch suggested that the proposal be amended to not apply to a tenancy of less than three months, while Mr. Van Hove felt it might be better to incorporate a provision for variances on an individual basis.

However, while seeing Mr. Lynch's point, Mr. Rinaldi felt very few citizens would be affected by such a provision, although he would go along with it.

Mr. Parthum also indicated his support, while Commissioner Philip Patanis said, if an amendment was drafted, it would have to clarify that such a three-month period be restricted to any one given year.

For his part, Mr. Van Hove, in noting it's difficult to write in all potential exceptions, said he would like to see the proposal adopted the way it stands.

On Closing of Sale
On the effective date of

the measure, (20 day since its enactment date), Mr. Patanis suggested for any property in the offering stage, accepted by the seller, that the particular sale be allowed to close without coming under the law's provisions.

He ultimately made a motion to this effect but inadvertently eliminated the 20-day stipulation, (a point mentioned by Councilman John Sabol who was in attendance along with Councilmen Thomas Fahrner and Robert E. Novitke.)

His amended motion included the 20-day limit, provided, that any sale or offer to purchase which has been executed with the seller's signed acceptance, prior to the date the ordinance becomes effective, will not come under the certificate of occupancy requirement.

On the subject of repairs, Mr. Lynch felt the responsibility for making them wasn't specifically fixed, implying that the owner would be the party. Mr. Van Hove said if the buyer doesn't take charge, it's up to the seller, while Mr. Kennedy said both can work it out via the purchase agreement.

But Mr. Lynch questioned what would happen if no real estate broker was involved? Who would be legitimately responsible for making repairs?

Important Aspect
Saying he understood Mr. Lynch's point, Mr. Novitke stated the proposal indicated it's the owner's responsibility unless such is negotiated between both parties. He felt it should be pinpointed more, while expressing some concern over cost factors to the city in relation to the need for follow-up inspections over the two provided in the proposal — an initial inspection, plus a re-inspection to make certain all repairs are made.

(In relation to the latter point, Mr. Wakely, in eyeing overall enforcement, said the problem hasn't really been dealt with as yet, indicating a housing inspector and additional files would be needed.)

For his part, Mr. Kennedy

said the important aspect was that the buyer knew repairs are required by the city before occupancy and it wasn't necessary that the owner had to make such repairs. "It's up to the two parties to figure it out for themselves," he stressed, while eyeing the flexibility of the proposal.

As part of the check list, Mr. Wakely pointed out that the provision governing "structural and basement," i.e., check basement walls for evidence of foundation failure, note on report, (repair not required), was a "ticklish situation."

Seeking some guidance from the commission, he said some basements have bad cracks, while others have small cracks following mortar joints. In the former instance, repairs could be costly, he said, while questioning what should the building department do? Mr. Rinaldi indicated it should be drawn to the seller's attention.

Offers Appeal
"I don't see how we can enforce it," said Mr. Parthum, in viewing the prospective cost of repairs, "and leave it in the hands of someone to make a judgment." He felt some citizens could be "socked" with heavy expenditures, while saying this entire subject should be further explored.

Adding to the commission's "food for thought," Mr. Rinaldi suggested that smoke detectors also should be included in the code.

With the tabling of the subject, the commission still has to consider electrical wiring and equipment, plus heating, provisions as part of the overall check list in the code, which does provide an appeal procedure for any individual who "feels aggrieved by any notice of defect or with any determination made by the Division of Safety Inspection."

Cable TV

(Continued from Page 1) revealed that the War Memorial, through its profit-making subsidiary, Grosse Pointe Cable Inc., will seek industrial revenue bonds through his organization.

Although The Farms wouldn't back the bonds, the council would have to set public hearings and approve site plans if the cable facility were located in The Farms. Councilman Jack Cudlip, The Farms' delegate to the War Memorial's cable TV committee, said it wasn't certain yet where the facility might be located.

In other developments on the cable TV front, the Harper Woods Council appointed one of its members, Ted Penszynski, to the committee, while The City appointed newly-appointed Councilman William Montgomery as its representative.

Advantages Eyed
John Rickel, chairman of the War Memorial's cable TV committee, gave a presentation to the Harper Woods Council at its June 18 meeting, which City Manager Ronald Bultman said was received receptively.

All the councils approving the resolution were assured their move did not obligate them to choose the War Memorial's plan, nor did it authorize expenditure of any city money.

The Center's cable TV proposal has been heralded by Pointe councils for the advantages inherent in a system that is locally controlled. Commercial firms, it is argued, are programmed over a large area, some nationwide, with little regard for local standards.

(Continued from Page 1) Park Firefighter Casper Alor injured a tendon on his left hand and will be out of work for at least a month with his hand in a cast.

An immediate neighbor Mrs. Noel Van Assche, said her husband was mowing the front lawn when he looked up and noticed smoke coming from the roof of the Fuchs home.

Mrs. Van Assche said her husband rushed over to Mrs. Fuchs and told her that smoke was coming from the roof.

At first Mrs. Fuchs thought her neighbor had meant the smoke coming from the frying pan but then soon realized something was wrong.

Even More Upset
"We were in the living room and kitchen getting dinner ready when my neighbors

rushed over and told me the house was on fire," Mrs. Fuchs said.

She indicated that she and her husband had just signed a purchase agreement on the house the day before. The Fuchs family is moving to New York because of a job transfer.

"I imagine the couple who bought the house are even more upset than we are," Mrs. Fuchs stated.

Mrs. Fuchs and one of her sons were the only members of the family home at the time of the fire. The family has been staying with neighbors since the blaze.

Starts in Bedroom
The fire started in an upstairs bedroom and was primarily confined to the roof, rafters and walls, Chief Costa said.

The lower level of the house suffered some water damage, but smoke damage was evident in the upper level of the home.

A construction company is estimating that it will take up to 10 or 12 weeks before the house will be restored, according to Hanno Fuchs.

Chief Costa commended The City and The Farms for their assistance.

(Continued from Page 1) seen other neighborhoods in Detroit from declining in value. These forces, he said are presently "fighting it out like two armies."

He noted he himself was the victim of racial steering while looking for a home earlier this year. Presently living in Yorkshire road, Detroit, Mr. Egnatios said he was told by a realtor not to buy west of Three Mile drive in Detroit because there were black families in the neighborhoods.

"What people sometimes don't realize is that a black family can't move in unless a white family moves out," he said. "While ethnic and racial transition is the law, economic transition need not take place. Nobody can prove that a person can't maintain his property because of the color of his skin. But it is probable that a black man is less likely to be able to afford to."

Mr. Egnatios said the problems with Jefferson-Chalmers began as early as 1959, when financial institutions, making long-range forecasts, decided to redline, or "disinvest,"

the area as a bad risk location.

Blacks who were economically able to move into the area, decided to do so. While few people objected to black neighbors, as long as they maintained their property, after a while, it seemed only blacks were moving in. Realtors, meanwhile, began to steer whites away from the area.

Making Investment
The area's churches usually play a critical role, Mr. Egnatios said. The priest or minister may realize he hasn't said enough about harmony between the races, and his sudden interest in the topic may act as a "danger signal" to residents.

Residents then flocked out of the neighborhood, and the housing market was flooded, causing prices to sink. The poor, including a disproportionate number of blacks, moved into the declining neighborhood. The churches moved out with the parishioners.

Things have happened since the decline of Jefferson-Chalmers to aid the situation in other areas of Detroit, including laws prohibiting both redlining and steering.

Attitudes toward the future of Detroit have also improved, Mr. Egnatios said. Neighborhood associations — racially integrated problem-solving organizations — replaced the often racist, exclusionary homeowner groups.

Along with revitalization in Detroit neighborhoods has come a commercial rejuvenation, Mr. Egnatios noted. Residents are making an investment in their neighborhoods when they buy at their local stores, even though they may have to pay a little more.

Mr. Egnatios said he was

pleased to see the Pointes begin to address the deterioration problem at its early stages. Such programs initiated in the Pointes include an innovative grants project — a cooperative venture between four Pointes and Detroit to study Mack avenue blight — and the various community development block grant programs approved by the Park Council earlier this year.

Set a good example by square dealing — not by shouting.

Woods Gives Approval For Demographic Survey

A Community Development Block Grant, (CDBG), Citizens Advisory Commission recommendation for a demographic survey, similar to the one conducted last year of the northwest area of the city, was unanimously approved by the Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, June 4.

The commission at its Tuesday, May 22, session unanimously approved a motion that the council authorize the expenditures of funds to conduct a demographic survey in the area north of Vernier, east of Mack and west of Marter.

A major objective of such a survey is to expand the

neighborhood strategy area and thereby qualify a larger segment of the city for eligibility in the CDBG program.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen said the cost of the proposed survey will be based upon taking competitive proposals from various research groups, as was done for the northwest area.

At that time, Nordhaus Research, Inc., of Farmington conducted the survey. Its main goals were to aid the municipality in determining if it qualified for funds under the program, and how the funds should be utilized.

Mr. Petersen also pointed out that no survey would even begin until the 1979 CDBG program receives approval, with the city scheduled to receive news on its application in early July. Survey monies would be paid from such funds.

If all goes well, a study would then be made to see if the planned survey area qualifies in 1980-81.

Meanwhile, an application for a CDBG Housing Rehabilitation Program, which is due by Friday, June 15, didn't fare as well. The commission as its Tuesday, May 29, meeting, voted 4-4 on a motion to recommend to the council that the city submit such an application.

However, despite the tie vote, (indicating the motion fails), the commission unanimously agreed to have the matter placed before the council on the 4th.

At that time, Councilman Thomas Fahrner, chairman of the Citizens Advisory Commission, moved that a legal opinion on this type of program, involving a loan made in cooperation with a lending institution, be prepared by City Attorney George Catlin so officials know specifically where they stand.

Group Strives to Introduce Italian

The "La Gazzetta" in Windsor, have given them ample publicity.

To substantiate their backing even more, the ISC is passing a petition around asking the schools to offer Italian as an elective course.

The group's research in the Pointe, culled from church rosters and other cultural organizations, indicates there are at least 5,000 Italian-Americans living in the five Pointes.

It is, of course, primarily to those 5,000 that the ISC directs its plea, asking for support "so that this generation will be able to enjoy the language of its heritage, which has been denied to the young generations of the past years."

They're hoping to attract not only new immigrants to this country from Italy, but American citizens of Italian heritage who have been here for decades — or generations for that matter.

"The world is smaller now than it was years ago. Most of those Italians who came here 50 or 60 years ago knew

there was no chance of going back, so they forgot their language," Mrs. Bee said.

"But now, the opportunities for travel and study in Europe are much greater. There's more chance for them to return to Italy and for their children to experience that background. The language is now more important."

Mrs. Bee, who has taught language privately and at the War Memorial, Italian Cultural Center in St. Clair Shores and in the Warren Youth Enrichment program, feels the study of Italian may help other students as well.

With the sharp decline in study of Latin in the schools, she feels Italian may serve as an important substitute link to the classical languages.

"It's the only romance language to be derived almost entirely from the Latin — it could almost be considered a classical language itself," she said.

Language should be only part of the Italian studies

program, she says.

"We hope to establish a study of Italian culture — especially of the Renaissance period, which has contributed most to the development of Western civilizations.

"I think Americans are maturing, they're more open minded now than they used to be. More people who I meet appreciate what America does not have in terms of culture — what it just hasn't had time to develop. They appreciate the ancient roots of our culture."

At the public schools, the question of Italian studies has been referred to Robert Welch, director of secondary education.

He said the schools will include Italian on a survey of students' language interests next fall. The schools currently offer German, Latin, French and Spanish, and Mr. Welch noted there has been a resurgence of interest in the latter language.

During the summer, the ISC intends to sustain its petition campaign, to inform as many parents of high school students as possible that Italian may be offered in the future.

The group meets regularly on the third Wednesday of the month at the Italian Cultural Center, 19800 Frazho road, St. Clair Shores.

School Board Approves Maintenance Program

The Board of Education recently approved the allocation of \$525,000 for building and site projects, completing Phase III of a long-range program to improve the maintenance of school buildings and grounds.

The largest chunk of Phase III funds, about \$250,000, will be used for renovation projects at South High School, one of the system's oldest facilities. Ten other school buildings will be improved in Phase III.

The money comes from the schools' Building and Site Fund, created last year with \$2 million in "equity" or excess funds from the budget's general fund. The School Board allocated \$532,000 as Phase I last summer for urgent projects and okayed another \$606,500 last fall as Phase II.

Total allocations now reach about \$1.7 million. While many of the projects have been started, and a few completed, most of the Building and Site Fund has not yet been spent. The projects will be completed as weather and time permit, according to school officials.

Under all three phases approved so far by the Board, 19 school system buildings will be repaired or renovated. Total allocations break down roughly as follows:

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES

June 4, 1979

The Regular Meeting of the City Council of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms was held in the City Hall on Monday, June 4, 1979, at 8:00 P.M.

Present on Roll Call:

Mayor James H. Dingeman, Councilmen Harry J. Fruehauf, Jr., Jack M. Cudlip, Nancy J. Waugaman, Joseph L. Fromm, W. James Mast and Lloyd A. Semple.

Those Absent Were: None

Mayor James H. Dingeman presided at the meeting.

The Minutes of the Regular Meeting which was held on May 21, 1979 were approved as corrected. The Minutes of the Closed Session which was held on May 17, 1979 were approved as corrected.

The Council, acting as a Zoning Board of Appeals, denied the appeal of Mr. Michael R. Moore from the denial of the Building Department to issue a Permit for the proposed conversion of the existing garage on his property into a family room and the construction of a new attached garage on his property located at 339 Grosse Pointe Boulevard.

The Council adopted a resolution approving the recommendation of the Chief of Police to proceed with the updating of the traffic signal at Ridge Road and McKinley Avenue to conform with the requirements of the Michigan Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices, such updating to be completed by the Fall of 1979.

The Council scheduled a Public Hearing before the Zoning Board of Appeals on July 2, 1979 at 8:00 P.M. for the purpose of hearing the request of Amoco Oil Company for a determination that the lapsed non-conforming use of the building formerly known as the Kercheval-On-The-Hill Sunoco Service Station and located at 66 Kercheval Avenue, may be reinstated to its former use as an automobile service station.

The Council scheduled a Public Hearing before the Zoning Board of Appeals at 9:00 P.M. on Monday, July 2, 1979, for the purpose of hearing the request of the Cottage Hospital of Grosse Pointe for a determination that the building non-conforming use by the Hospital of the present known as the Nurses' Residence and located at 158 Ridge Road as "multi-residential/office", may be exchanged for a use solely as "office".

The Council adopted a resolution that the problems occurring as a result of bus patrons utilizing City streets for automobile parking during their absence should be received by the Mayor's Advisory Planning Committee for their recommendations as to how the City might proceed to alleviate this growing problem.

The Council adopted a resolution that the City Attorney is directed to prepare the necessary and proper resolution to approve the Articles of Incorporation of the Economic Development Corporation of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms.

The Council adopted a resolution that the Council favors the franchise of a Grosse Pointe Community-wide cable TV system, and hereby directs Councilman Jack M. Cudlip of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, to coordinate with the four (4) other Grosse Pointe communities and the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association submit a proposal for such a system, which proposal will then be evaluated along with any other proposals received.

The Council adopted a resolution accepting designation of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms as a Management Agency under the Water Quality Management Plan for Southeast Michigan.

The Council approved the quotation received from the firm of Hubbell, Roth & Clark, Incorporated, Consulting Engineers, in an amount not to exceed \$2,700.00 for anticipated engineering services pertaining to the Fisher Road Water Main-Kercheval Avenue to Grosse Pointe Boulevard.

The Council approved the corrected bid received for furnishing the City with Public Officials Errors and Omissions Liability Insurance with a \$2,000,000 limit of coverage from the firm of Bosquett and Company, in the total amount of \$4,054.00 for a one-year period.

The following Report was received and ordered placed on file:

Fire Department Report for the month of April, 1979.

The Council adopted a resolution to hold a Closed Session for the purpose of consulting with the City Attorney concerning possible settlement strategy.

Upon proper motion made, supported and carried, the meeting adjourned at 11:15 P.M.

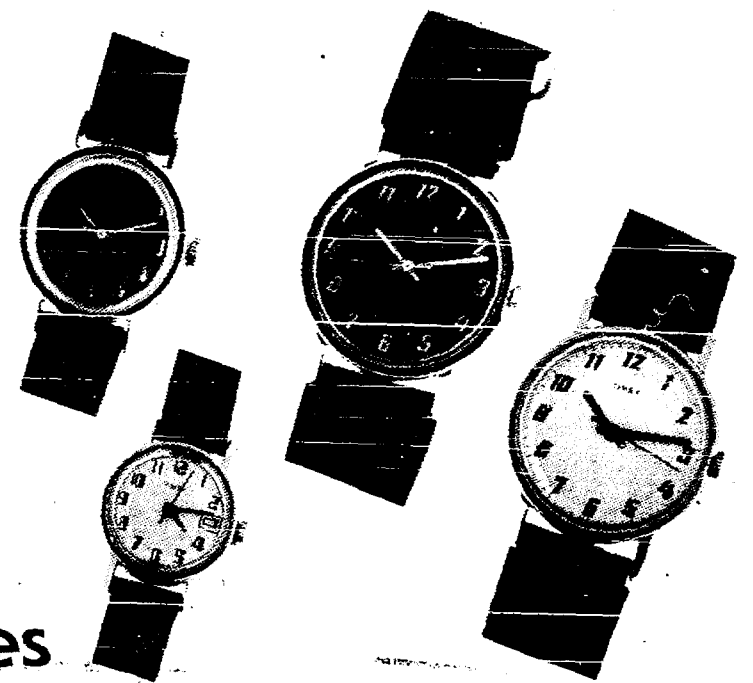

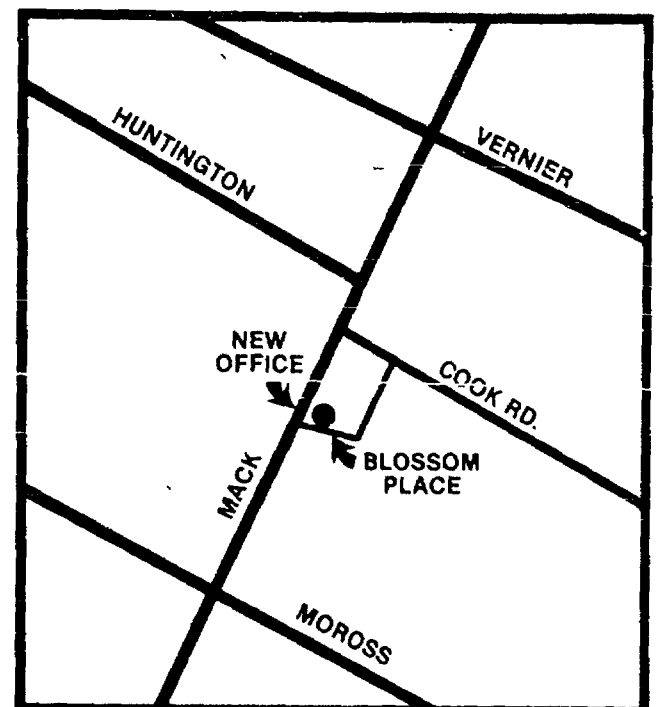

Thousands Pay Tribute to Monsignor Hickey

His multi-faceted genius has earned him the sobriquet, "Universal Man," but Grosse Pointe claims him as its own.

The Rev. Monsignor Edward J. Hickey, at 85, is marking his 60th year as a priest of God. Scion of an illustrious Grosse Pointe family, he is Michigan's top-ranking monsignor and its oldest active priest.

How many who serve Christ are so privileged as to celebrate Mass at their Diamond Jubilee?

Monsignor Hickey, robed in his formal red vestments and accompanied by a magnificent choir, was principal celebrant at his jubilant Anniversary Mass Sunday, June 10, at Saint Mary of Redford Church — the parish where he served 18 years as pastor and another 10 years as pastor emeritus.

Tributes from his congregation were climaxed by presentation of a plaque dedicating Saint Mary's beautiful Bell Tower as the "Monsignor Edward J. Hickey Memorial Tower."

On receiving the plaque, the keen-witted Monsignor quipped, "History has shown that those who were given their own special tower seldom lived to go out from it. Now that Saint Mary's tower is being dedicated especially to me, I am not sure I am wise to accept the honor."

The congregation, who had applauded repeatedly, rose spontaneously to give him a standing ovation.

Other celebrations honoring Monsignor Hickey's Diamond Jubilee included a Friday, June 15, Outdoor Mass at the McNamara residence in Plymouth, a Jubilee dinner was held afterward for relatives and friends.

The list of invited guests included former City Mayor John King, (nephew-in-law of the monsignor), Henry Ford II, Mrs. Hildegard DeGrimme, the W. C. Roney family and many others, among them the Cardinal, Governor, mayors, and civic leaders, Sculptor Marshall Fredericks and such longtime friends as Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen and Father Charles Coughlin.

Climax of the Jubilee events will come Sunday, June 24. Cardinal John Dearden will officiate, and Monsignor Hickey will speak at a 3:30 p.m. Archdiocesan-wide Mass at Saint Aloysius Church in downtown Detroit. The mass will be celebrated in the lower church, at the altar where Monsignor Hickey had his first solemn High Mass 60 years before.

A festive reception will follow.

The celebration at Saint Aloysius was scheduled for the afternoon so that priests from throughout the Archdiocese would be able to attend, as well as the general public. More than 1,000 already have indicated they will be present.

The church honors Monsignor Hickey as one of its own because, for 13 years during his brilliant leadership as Chancellor of the Archdiocese under Cardinal Mooney, he also was the beloved pastor of Saint Aloysius.

Monsignor Hickey is known as a man of comprehensive thought and universal philosophy. He has been acclaimed as scholar, educator, historian, theologian, preserver of the arts, administrator, philanthropist and humanitarian.

Son of the late Edward J. and Mary Louise (Mehling) Hickey of Grosse Pointe, he was born December 13, 1893, in Detroit. He spent his boyhood in Grosse Pointe, and after graduating from the University of Detroit, went on to earn a Master's degree in business administration at Harvard University.

He studied for the priesthood at Saint Paul Seminary, Minnesota, and was ordained on June 15, 1919, by Bishop Gallagher. Later, he studied at the Sorbonne in Paris and Catholic University of America, where he earned his PhD and he and his friend, Fulton J. Sheen, vied for top honors of their class.

Although he has a Doctor of Philosophy Degree from Catholic University and two honorary doctorates — one from Wayne State and one from University of Detroit — the modest monsignor keeps these academic achievements rather a secret.

While studying in Paris, he became interested in Old World art, an interest which he maintains to this day. The proceeds from his famous non-profit Art Cloister of Saint Mary's, which displays art from throughout the world, benefit numerous charities, as well as Saint Mary's of Redford where he continues to say the 6 a.m. Mass each day.

As Chancellor of the Detroit Archdiocese from 1938 to 1951, his Harvard business education proved useful. His administration pulled the Archdiocese out of the red when it was on the verge of bankruptcy during those Depression years. He acquired refinancing of a 17½-million-dollar debt, and saw the church out of debt and on a sound financial basis.

Besides his demanding duties as Chancellor, he was called to be a member, and then chairman, of the Mayor's Unemployment Committee. He willingly served the City of Detroit and its people in a serious attempt to cope with poverty and the unrest of that period.

Earlier, he served on the faculty of Sacred Heart Seminary from 1922 to 1932 and as pastor of Sacred Heart Church, Grosse Ile, from 1932 to 1938.

He left his position as Chancellor in 1951 to become pastor of Saint Mary of Redford Church until his "retirement" in 1969. Since then he has continued as Pastor Emeritus, saying the daily Mass, and spending the major part of his busy days with his Art Cloister and the many charities it benefits.

In 1941 he was raised to the stature of Domestic Prelate, and in 1946 to Protonotary Apostolic by the Holy Father, Pope Pius XII.

A brilliant historian on Detroit and Michigan, as well as a history writer, he was named Official Historiographer of the City of Detroit in 1967, a title he still retains. He is regarded as the foremost authority on the life of the Detroit pioneer, Father Gabriel Richard.

Honored many times by Church dignitaries and the laity, by presidents, governors, mayors and others, what does the future hold for one who has lived four-score-and-five?

Hearing on Land Use Plan Should Draw GPW Citizens

An important public hearing will be held in The Woods on Tuesday, June 26, when the Planning Commission considers a revised, proposed land use plan for the city in the council chambers, 20025 Mack Avenue, at 7:30 p.m.

It has been a long haul for the dedicated commissioners, who have labored almost two years on the subject, with the first land use plan draft being completed by planning consultant Brandon M. Rogers, (who also has proven to be a tireless worker), in January 1978.

The proposal, which envisions what the city will be like in the Year 2000, was revamped, based upon the thoughts of officials in February, at which time several new views regarding its content were expressed, and action taken by the commission at two April meetings when a combined, estimated total of over 30 motions were made and approved necessitating the redrafting.

About half of the entire 49-page document, covering the residential, office, commercial, public, semi-public and parking sectors, had to be rewritten from scratch, which the land use plan map had to be totally redrawn, Mr. Rogers reported.

One of the major changes in the redrafted plan is that residential districts are now proposed in a density of dwelling units classification versus the former plan of categorical housing types, i.e., single, family, two family and multiple dwelling residential. For example, low density is defined as from 1 to 5 dwelling units per acre, while low medium is from 5.1 to 7 units, with both classifications focusing upon single family residential.

Medium density, (7.1 to 12 units), and high density, (12.1 and up), areas encompass two-family duplexes, terrace and garden apartments, with the high density category also covering high rises. Single family residential also would be viewed in both medium and high density areas.

At the hearing the commission will consider adopting the document. The NEWS feels all Woods citizens, who are interested in the future of the community, should take the time to review the proposal at city hall and attend the hearing to express their views and ask any questions.

The land use plan has been on the commission's agenda many times in past meetings and the turnout of the citizenry during these developmental discussions has been anemic to say the least. Only two residents have attended such sessions with regularity.

With the public hearing, it would be reassuring to see the citizens respond — and the council chambers snugly packed.

SEMCOG Eyes Carpool Plan

Computerized carpooling may be in the future for southeast Michigan residents.

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, (SEMCOG), has been recommended as the agency best suited to develop a region-wide carpool matching program.

The recommendation comes from the Southeast Michigan Vanpooling Task Force, (SEMVAN), which was created by SEMCOG last fall to solve energy consumption, traffic congestion, air pollution and parking problems — all associated with high-cost single-car travel.

SEMCOG members include transportation experts, environmental planners and employee-service representatives from the public and private sectors. Among the private members are representatives from Chrysler Corporation, Detroit Edison and Michigan Bell, which currently operate employer-sponsored vanpool programs.

"Although we will continue to strongly urge major employers to set up self-supporting vanpools for their employees, this task force recognizes the urgency and seriousness of the energy situation, including the fact that bus lines may become overcrowded if the gas situation worsens," said James P. Grannan, a businessman and chairman of the Southeast Michigan Vanpooling Task Force, in a news release.

"We are, therefore, going to recommend to the various SEMCOG committees that SEMCOG consider accepting primary responsibility for developing a carpool matching program that could be implemented regionwide," Mr. Grannan added.

He said that SEMCOG already develops regional transportation plans, has been a leader in the vanpool field and has the most up-to-date research on carpooling and ridesharing activities in other cities across the nation.

Some cities are using computers to match carpools, he noted, while pointing out computerized regional carpooling is especially helpful to employees of smaller companies that don't have either the necessary riders or in-house capability to match those who want to get involved in a ridesharing program of some type.

Mr. Grannan also stated that SEMVAN is supporting Governor William Milliken's proposal to spend \$500,000 statewide on ridesharing promotion.

"If SEMCOG decides to accept primary responsibility for a regional carpool program, state or federal funding will be needed," he said.

Pointer Michael M. Glusac, executive director of SEMCOG, said the SEMVAN recommendation and further SEMVAN proposals would go before SEMCOG's Transportation Systems Committee and its Council on Regional Development.

After that, it would be considered by SEMCOG's executive committee which is composed of local elected officials from around the region.

SEMCOG is a voluntary association of governmental units in Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne Counties. Its principal function is long-range planning for transportation, housing, land use, recreation and open space, water quality, criminal justice and the environment

Through the years many histories of the automobile have been published and each one adds something new to the continuing saga of the automobile.

Stephen W. Sears, a lifetime old-car buff, is author-editor of *THE AUTOMOBILE IN AMERICA*, (American Heritage Publishing Co., 1977). The book, a part of the American Heritage History Series, is a detailed chronicle in text and picture of the development of the automobile industry during the 20th century.

The main emphasis of the book is on the cultural changes that have resulted from America's love affair with the car. Toys, music, clothing and advertising all reflect to a much greater degree than one would expect the omnipresence of "the machine we cannot do without."

THE PICTORIAL PICTURE OF THE CAR, (Octopus Books Ltd., 1978), by Peter Roberts is by a British author and was published in London. The author's treatment naturally enough is primarily on the automobile industry in Europe. He doesn't ignore America's contributions but doesn't go into much detail.

The superbly illustrated book tells the story of the birth and development of the automobile up to the present day. Beginning with Daimler and Benz, the author goes on to describe the age of Henry Ford and the mass marketing of cars throughout the western world.

Chapters on racing and speed records are especially interesting. I was surprised to learn that in 1904 the land speed record exceeded 103 mph.

Lots of facts and beautiful color photographs make this a fascinating book.

John Bentley was extolling the virtues of steam driven automobile when he wrote *OLDTIME STEAM CARS*, (Fawcett Book, 1954). Today the steam engine is still being suggested as a viable alternative to the internal combustion engine.

Bentley catalogues 84 separate manufacturers of steam cars starting with the American built 1922 and working back to the Roper built in 1860. His book will tell you all you ever wanted to know about the steam car and why it didn't work out. The Stanley Steamer is perhaps the best known of the cars. It was in production from 1897 until 1925.

I think the best book for most old car buffs is not a book at all, but the hard bound periodical *AUTOMOBILE QUARTERLY*. It is published by Automobile Quarterly, Inc., in association with the Princeton Institute for Historical Research.

The latest edition, (First Quarter, 1979), has an article by Stan Grayson about the Dodge brothers, John and Horace, as well as a tongue-in-cheek picture story entitled *GAS GUZZLERS*.

Vandalism Cases Top YSD Heavy Case Load for May

A total of 96 reports of offenses were referred to the Youth Service Division, (YSD), by Pointe police departments last month, two of which proved to be unfounded.

In other incidents, five assault reports involved four boys and four girls, while four violation of controlled substances cases included two marijuana reports, an LSD incident, (ambulance run, overdose), and a forged prescription case.

Two incidents of attempted abduction also were reported, with one involving two white males approximately 20 to 21 years of age and the other involving a white male between 25 and 30 years. In both cases, the juvenile properly ignored the accoster, proceeded immediately to safety and reported the incident.

Nine applications for petition were filed with the Wayne County Juvenile Court, one of which has been denied (an assault and battery case in The Woods).

Besides their investigative work, division detectives also were involved in either classroom presentations or special class services last month.

They visited Ferry, Brownell, Pierce, Saint Paul, North and South High Schools and viewed such subjects as "Substance Abuse," "Police Career," "Juvenile Delinquency," "Search and Seizure" and "Criminal Justice System."

MHS Facing Harder Times

Detroit's unwanted, sick and injured animals face the prospects of harder times ahead as the Michigan Humane Society, (MHS), is forced to layoff animal caretakers and cutback on services at its central shelter in the city, according to an MHS news release.

The employe layoffs, the second since January, and the resultant reduction in shelter services are required as a result of a sharp decline in public support and the impact of inflation.

In announcing the latest action to reduce operating expenses, the society's president, Mrs. Irving Rose, said, "These are very difficult times for the Michigan Humane Society."

"We are fast running out of money to underwrite the deficits we have each year in the operation of shelters, animal rescue services and cruelty investigation work."

"In the past, the society's yearly deficits, some as much as \$290,000, were taken care of with reserve funds received from wills and bequests. We have almost depleted these funds."

"There are no new bequests expected in the near future so we have to make drastic cuts now in our operating expenses or be faced very soon with the possibility of having to close the central shelter entirely. This would be tragic for the homeless animals of Detroit."

The lack of funds has affected all three full-service shelters operated by the non-profit organization, but the greatest impact is at the Detroit shelter, according to Herbert N. Martin, society executive director.

"The funding problem ironically has come when there is an overall increase in the number of animals being brought to the society's shelters," he said.

"Last year the society's Detroit shelter alone provided care for over 30,000 animals. With the funding situation rapidly growing more critical each day it is impossible to provide the same level of service to the public that we have in the past."

"The cutbacks in staff forces us to have to reduce the number of hours the central shelter is open to the general public."

Mr. Martin emphasized that "the proper care of the animals is our most important function, and the reduction in shelter hours will better allow us to provide the high quality care needed for these animals."

"The bottom line is that we simply cannot care for as many animals that need our help. Unless concerned citizens of Detroit come forward soon with more financial support we will be forced to cut out more services entirely."

The public may call the society's Detroit shelter for information on shelter hours for accepting animals and for looking at the animals up for adoption.

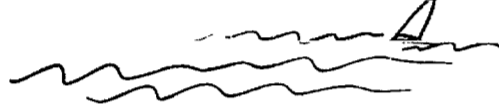

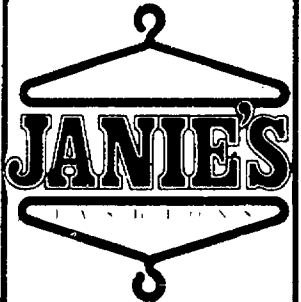

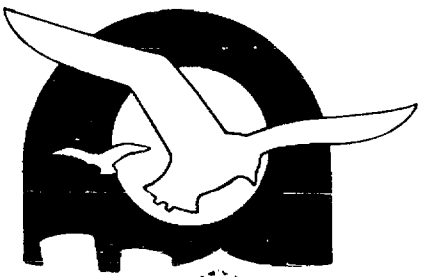
"To some extent, this commitment is an affirmation of our faith in the willingness of the people of metropolitan Detroit to partake in the restoration of the hall.

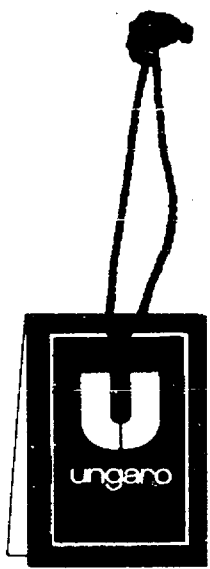

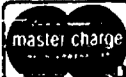

Commission Guidelines Eyed

Guidelines for advisory commissions in The Woods were briefly viewed by the council at its regular meeting Monday, June 4, with the council unanimously approving a motion that members be given two weeks to review the material.

The material includes proposed guidelines as prepared by Administrative Aide Gerard E. McNamara and City Attorney George Catlin, a legal opinion prepared by Mr. Catlin in November 1975 and an excerpt from the city charter affecting such groups.

Based upon eight observations, e.g., an advisory commission may be formed by council resolution, 14 guidelines are recommended by Mr. McNamara and Mr. Catlin for council adoption.

These include members shall be appointed for a period of three years, commissions shall adopt by-laws

MRS. H. A. POWELL, OF CLOVERLY ROAD

Lakeshore road, that gorgeous boulevard outlining our community that borders Lake Saint Clair, has taken on the appearance of more beauty than ever, particularly between Moross and Moran roads. More than 40 flowering fruit trees have recently been planted there by the Grosse Pointe Garden Council, its objective being to beautify The Pointe.

Florence Powell, this year's Garden Council president, explains that disease, age, severe winter weather and the use of road salt have taken a terrific toll on the existing trees throughout the area.

Just about \$4,000 has been spent this year by the Council for about 40 trees, all planted in the Moross and Moran roads area.

A Big Job "It has been a big job, as we have had to work with Wayne County in meeting their specifications for the plantings: 50 feet from the end of the islands, and at least nine feet inside the running curbstone," explains Mrs. Powell.

Mrs. H. James Gram, the planting chairman, Mrs. Powell continues, has worked many hours with county officials. With Erv Steiner's assistance, (he is a member of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners), final approval for the plantings was given.

The funds to implement this project, in its second year, are raised through the Garden Club Council Garden Tour, which this year encompasses seven gardens in the Pointe area, set for Friday and Saturday, June 22 and 23.

The gardens on the tour, now in its sixth year, each feature personalities of their own in variety of plantings, age, and focus of interest.

The William J. Scotts, Jr., at 440 Barclay road, have accomplished much in just four years in their garden, which features a majestic 150-year-old maple tree, many impatiens, geraniums, pine trees, a rock garden and many walks. It is a two-level garden.

Two hundred-year-old galleries from North Carolina enhance the front and back of the house.

Still on Barclay Just a few steps away is another garden on the tour, that of Dr. and Mrs. James O'Berksi, of 439 Barclay road.

A lighted pagoda, dogwood tree and trimmed Bonsai-style pines and evergreens emphasize its Japanese characteristics.

Areas of interest are separated by walkways and edged with wax begonias and impatiens. Huge, many-hued lava rocks are highlighted with flowers and plants, all accomplished under the watchful eye of Mrs. O'Berksi and son David.

The Warren F. Jones garden, at 249 Vendome road, is essentially an informal garden, based on the English landscape tradition. Its lawn, bordered with flowering shrubs, trees, evergreens and abundant ground cover, is interspersed with perennial flower beds.

All the garden areas, planted by Mrs. Jones and son Michael, were designed

tended by members of local garden clubs and financed by the Grosse Pointe Garden Center through membership dues and gifts.

Perennial beds with bleeding heart, columbine, coral bells, peonies and other flowers share the spotlight with the Hemerocallis lilies that bloom under purple plum trees. Hosta, ferns and wild flowers enhance a flowering crab tree.

Mrs. Powell also invites tour members to visit the Rock Garden and Columbarium at Grosse Pointe United Methodist Church, 211 Moross road, the Virginia Brush Ford Rose Garden and Columbarium Wall at Christ Episcopal Church, 61 Grosse Pointe boulevard, (Friday only), and the Columbarium Garden Area at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, 16 Lakeshore road.

The Grosse Pointe Garden Council was founded 30 years ago as a civic improvement group. Its membership is composed of appointed representatives from 17 local garden clubs and interested citizens.

Focus Changes "In the early years, the emphasis was on 'clean-up' in the community and conservation, such as recycling of newspapers and aluminum, etc.," notes Mrs. Powell.

The council meets four times a year in the community room of the Grosse Pointe Library's main branch in Kercheval avenue, where projects are discussed and problems resolved.

There were many difficulties this year with the planting project, "due mainly to problems of communication with the right people," Florence explains.

"Difficulties arose because the road commission, in its concerns for road safety, makes no distinction between a scenic drive and a highway."

The rules regarding tree plantings are designed so that in the event of a car accident no injuries would occur, hopefully, due to hitting a tree.

Some of the islands dividing the road are no more than 100 feet long, making it impossible to plant trees there.

First Failure Some past tree-planting along Lakeshore has not been successful because of the small size of the trees, adds Mrs. Powell. "Small trees are less able to cope with the stresses of the winds from the lake and the wear and tear due to heavy traffic."

The first year it tackled the project, last year, the Council budgeted \$3,000 for 28 trees. This year's budget has been increased to \$4,000 which was used for the purchase of some 40 larger trees from the Vidosh Nurseries in Warren.

"The larger trees should have a better chance of survival," says Florence. "We certainly hope so."

Dutch elm disease has already taken a serious toll of the trees in the area, "even though Grosse Pointe has managed to keep many of its

trees through a consistent spraying program," Mrs. Powell continues.

"It is a continuing problem as the disease is progressive and, so far, relentless . . . but slowed down."

Tour Veteran This is Mrs. Powell's sixth year on the Council and she is a member of the Grosse Pointe Farm and Garden Club. She was tour chairman when she served as vice-president of the Council.

"Much of Grosse Pointe has deep shade and clay soil," notes Florence, "so our tour gardens specifically demonstrate what can be accomplished in these difficult conditions."

Tour tickets, at \$3 each, may be purchased from any garden club member in advance or during the 1 to 5 o'clock tour hours at individual gardens, or at the War Memorial by calling 831-7511. Other numbers to call for information are 884-6068, 822-0641, 886-4692, 832-3609 and 865-2056.

Brochures will be available, detailing the gardens and addresses. Maps, for winding your way through the area from one garden to another, are included. The tour may begin at any of the gardens.
