In calling the end of the YSD a "major loss" to the community, Chief Ferber said he hoped some way could be found to keep the service going on a geographical basis, "perhaps not the YSD as we know it staffed in the schools but through the communities. We should take a look at how this might be done."

(When asked about this multi-jurisdictional concept involving the communities alone, Mr. Petersen said it could be a possibility.) Least Affected

Echoing the sentiments of Chief Ferber in relation to the School Board's action, Park Police Chief Henry Coonce said he saw the YSD function as "very desirable." He felt such a concept was beneficial in handling youthoriented cases in his city.

"We really haven't had an opportunity to evaluate how (the division's termination) will affect us," the chief said, while indicating his department has handled juvenile .cases before in fashion" through its detective bureau. It will now have to focus upon some specialized training in this area.

For his part, City Public Safety Director Bruce Kennedy stated, "We'll miss the service but we intend to continue providing professional service in this area. The YSD was a fine, professional out fit. They'll be missed."

At this time, he added he wants to give any potential adjustments in relation to his department further thought.

Perhaps the least affected department is The Shores, which, on an annual basis, didn't refer many cases to the YSD.

"I don't envision a big problem for our department. said Public Safety Director Joseph Vitale, "We have referred few cases to the YSD and we could have handled them ourselves."

Saying his department has several highly qualified officers to handle juvenile cases, the director indicated Officer Michael Kenyon would be responsible for this area

Closer to home, Lt. Pat-terson, the YSD's four detectives and clerk reacted with disappointment and a sense of loss over the bureau's closing.

Ruling Upheld In Park Case

A Wayne County Circuit Court has upheld the lower court ruling that a youth was in violation of The Park's anti-soliciting ordinance.

Circuit Court Judge John Wise ruled at a resentencing earlier this month that Jacques Pierre Walker, 18, of Detroit was in violation of soliciting magazines door-to-door without a permit.

Jessie McCoy, 23, of Balti-

more, Md., who was also charged in the incident, did not appear for resentencing and so a capius was issued for his arrest.

Judge Wise further ruled that the time Walker served in the Park jail and the Wayne County Jail was adequate time served for the offense.

Park police arrested Mcand walker two months ago after a Lakepointe road resident called police and told them that the pair were soliciting magazines

McCoy and Walker were salesmen of Free Enterprises, Inc., at the time of their arrest.

Unable to post a \$25 bond, McCoy and Walker were arraigned before Park Municipal Judge Beverly C. Grobbel where the two pled guilty and were fined \$100 or five

days in jail.

Again unable to meet bond, the two were remanded to The Park jail before being transferred to the Wayne


County Jail. Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Victor Baum later ruled that McCoy and Walker's sentence was illegal after the petition of Park attorneys John Urso and Joseph Grano, who felt that the \$100 fine levied against

GROSSE POINTE PARK, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 86

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 5.10 AND REPEAL SECTION 5.11 OF CHAPTER 20, ZONING, OF TITLE V, ZON-ING AND PLANNING, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSÉ POINTE PARK.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 5.11 of Chapter 20, Title V, of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park is hereby repealed.

Section 2. Section 5.10 of Chapter 20 of Title V of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park is hereby amended to read in its entirety as

5.10 RESIDENCE DISTRICT; AC-CESSORY USES; LIMITATIONS. None of the following activities shall be deemed to be an accessory use incidental to a private dwelling and none of such uses shall be so carried on in a residence

(1) The storage or maintenance of equipment, supplies, or merchandise for commercial use of sale.

(2) The practice of any business, trade, profession, or occupation.

(3) The furnishing, for compensation, of meals or lodging or both to any person who is not a member of the family as defined in this chapter.

No person shall, as an incident to visiting any place of business park a motor vehicle on any private vacant lot in a residence district unless such vacant lot be a parking lot duly licensed by the City under 5.14(5). Any person owning a vacant lot in a residence district surfaced or maintained in a manner which invites parking thereon shall, unless the same be so licensed by the City, post a notice on such lot that parking thereon incidental to visiting a place of business is a violation of the City ordinances.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect on July 15, 1979







YSD's Demise Is Big Loss to Community

The end of the Youth Service Division, (YSD), which became fully operational in August 1970, on Saturday, June 30, was described by one Woods officer, who had been affiliated with the division, as a "community tragedy." (See story, Page 1.)

There's no doubt that the YSD will be missed and, as some have already indicated, more so as time goes on — not only because of its main objective of investigating and attacking juvenile-oriented crime but also because, as a natural outgrowth of its creation, of its strength as a preventive and educational force in the community.

Originally created to combat a growing drug abuse problem among Pointe youth, its multi-jurisdictional concept proved over the years to be a viable one, based as it was on the financial support and interest of the five Pointes and the public school system. However, in the end and for a number of reasons, both foundations, with a financial emphasis, appeared to crack.

Actions on the part of The Woods, the division's managing municipality, and the School Board, played major roles in the bureau's demise. School officials reacted strongly to a \$6,000 deficit budget for the YSD in 1979-80, feeling the municipality of the PSD in 1979-80, feeling the municipality. palities should have absorbed the amount, while responding angerly to the temporary transfer of a division detective from North High School to The GP Baptist Sets Woods detective bureau without prior notification in an attempt to eliminate the deficit. The timing of the move, prior to the end of the school year, also was questioned.

While such reasons for the YSD's termination have to be cited, (and passed arguments between members of the board of managers on who benefits more from the service, the school system or the municipalities, now prove to be academic), the key point remains — a viable, active and productive unit will no longer exist.

What the future holds regarding a YSD in some form of a multi-jurisdictional approach, e.g., the five municipalities alone banding together, remains to be seen. The question of whether the division itself, as Pointers now know it, will ever be resurrected again also is an unknown factor.

In a final comment, while feeling the YSD's loss could well turn out to be immeasurable, one official, in particular, deserves special recognition, not only for the role he played in the division's birth, but also for the headaches he has endured over the years as the bureau's key man - Mr.

Poor weather and unfounded fears over gasoline availability have caused the drop in vacation activity in much of Michigan during the first five months of 1979. Hardest hit have been businesses dependent on tourism north of a line from Petoskey to Bay City.

South of that line, many businesses are benefiting from an increase in nearhome travel, with South-east Michigan tourism up two percent through May as compared with the first five months of last year. Attractions near major southern Michigan cities re-

porting larger business vol-

umes than last year include

Dearborn's Greenfield Vil-

lage, the Detroit Zoo and the Kalamazoo Nature Center. Tourism is down about five percent in West Michigan, 10 to 15 in East Michigan and about 20 percent below 1978 in the Upper Peninsula.

Auto Club points out that during the recently completed Memorial Day weekend may have been the main factor in motorists driving only 635 million miles, the lowest total for a four-day heliday since 1971 and nearly 12 percent below the same 1978 holiday
