Thursday, July 5
VOLKSWAGEN GENERAL MANAGER Toni Schmuecker told a group of shareholders that VW and Chrysler Corporation might venture into a joint effort to build engines in the United States. Mr. Schmuecker, however, firmly denied any intention to buy Chrysler, referring to a recent "Automotive News" article that stated VW is trying to purchase the financially-troubled automaker. A Chrysler vice-president confirmed plans with VW on the joint engine production. At present, VW supplies Chrysler with 300,000 engines a year for its Omnis and Horizons.

Friday, July 6
VICE-PRESIDENT WALTER F. Mondale was suddenly summoned to Camp David by President Jimmy Carter where the two discussed the controversy over Mr. Carter's decision to cancel a major energy speech Thursday evening. There is still speculation as to why the President called off the speech, but one White House aide said Mr. Carter "was up there at Camp David angry as hell and kicking trash cans over" because he wasn't satisfied with the speech. Meanwhile, other aides indicated that the advice given to the President differed so much that it kept them wadding with one set of advisors.

Saturday, July 7
STATE SENATORS PASSED a bill that would assess points against drivers who break the 55 mph speed limit. The bill also applies to those speed limits expressly set to conserve gasoline. Specifically, one point would be levied on a driving record if a motorist is caught exceeding the 55 mph limit. The bill now faces the House where it is expected to run into some difficulty because legislators there have traditionally opposed energy speed violations.

Sunday, July 8
SEVERAL GOVERNORS WHO met with President Jimmy Carter at Camp David have indicated that the President is drafting legislation that would free the U.S. from the "stranglehold" of foreign oil producers. Vice-President Walter Mondale said Mr. Carter's "short-term solution" to the energy crisis is increased oil production and a standby rationing plan. Mr. Mondale further stated that when the President presents his program to the nation it will unify the American people.

Monday, July 9
THE FEDERAL AVIATION Administration (FAA), is expected to lift a ban on 138 DC10's that would mean air travel for the planes by next week. The jetliners were banned from U.S. air travel when a DC10 enroute to Los Angeles crashed May 25 after take-off from Chicago's O'Hare International Airport killing 273 persons. The crash was later cited as the worst U.S. air tragedy. Investigators grounded the DC10's after discovering cracks in pylons securing the jetliner's engines.

Tuesday, July 10
MOTORISTS CAN EXPECT gasoline to increase to about \$1.10 a gallon at the pumps if President Jimmy Carter accepts the advice of Energy Secretary James Schlesinger who is proposing to end gasoline controls. The new figure would only be temporary and probably will settle back to \$1 a gallon if the new plan is implemented. The energy chief also advised Mr. Carter to abandon the fuel rationing system which has reportedly been blamed for the recent gasoline shortage.

Project in GPW Hits Snag Again

Beset by Delays, Northeast Relief Storm Sewer Work Scheduled to Begin Next Spring

The northeast relief storm sewer project in the Grosse Pointe Woods, which officials had hoped would begin around two years ago, will not commence until next spring.

Slowed for a variety of reasons, the project is geared toward alleviating problems, such as flooded basements, which occurred several years ago in the area due to heavy storms.

Now, with the delay in the start of construction this year, costs for the work will increase next year.

Reluctance Seen
The council at its regular meeting Monday, July 2, explored the status of the project before unanimously concurring with the recommendation of John F. DeBusscher of Pate, Hirm and Bogue, Inc., city engineers.

Mr. DeBusscher reported, "Under the conditions of the (University Liggett) School easement and the absence of individual easements, (from residents), we believe it most prudent at this time to advertise the work late this winter, for construction in (Continued on Page 2)

TAG Program Will Focus Upon Gifted Children In Pointe Public Schools

New Project Will Replace the Popular Skills/Talent When Kids Return to School Next September

The most neglected children in public education these days may not be the "problem kids" who are handicapped, learning disabled or disadvantaged. Instead, they may be just the children who could contribute the most — the gifted.

While a bevy of state and national laws demand and fund programs for kids with problems, few districts have yet approached the thorny task of offering suitable challenges for the small group who excel in ability, motivation and creativity.

It's an issue the Grosse Pointe school system began to approach, in a general way, five years ago with its model Skills/Talent program. Next fall, the system plans to step up its effort with a new project called TAG, (program for Talented and Gifted), that will replace Skills/Talent.

A Favorite
The former program has undoubtedly been a favorite among students and their parents. Surveys of middle school Skills/Talent veterans indicate the kids find it an interesting and challenging addition to elementary life. Parents' requests to include their children in the program regularly exceed its ability to accommodate them.

However, as its name implies, Skills/Talent was

aimed at a broad group of students who demonstrated special talents in specific subjects or in overall academic performance. Almost one-third of the elementary students participated during each school year.

But Schools/Talent offered nothing specifically for the genuinely "gifted" child — which is exactly what the school administration hopes to accomplish with TAG. The new program will include much of the old and go further with an effort to locate and teach the gifted in at least one session a year in each of the 10 elementary schools.

Stirs Debate
But how do educators define "gifted" and how do they go about locating that select few among the hundreds of bright, highly motivated elementary students in the district?

Those questions have been the subject of years of debate among educators. The fact is, there is no known set of criteria that can be used to dependably identify such children. IQ scores and achievement tests have obvious environmental disadvantages and teachers' subjective judgments may reflect more about their own personalities than their students' intellect.

To circumvent that problem, Grosse Pointe plans to use a varied approach to identify gifted children, according to director of elementary education Dr. Alfreda Frost. Test scores and classroom achievement levels will be considered along with teachers' observations of (Continued on Page 10)

Three Mile Park to Get New Track

Joggers' Addition Is One of Several New Facilities Planned for Park

Jogging enthusiasts in The Park will soon have another place to test their endurance without "running" the risk of being hit by motorists on city streets.

A proposed jogging track at Three Mile Drive Park has been approved by the Park Planning Commission.

The track is part of an overall plan to redevelop Three Mile Drive Park.

City Manager John R. Crawford said the track will be funded by city monies and will be erected by city employees for \$1,000.

Residents can expect to run their first mile on the track by the end of August or early fall. Public Service Director James Ellison indicated, however, that plans are not firm as to whether the track will measure a mile.

"It could be one mile or reduced to a half mile. We're in the preliminary stages yet, and it's hard to say," Mr. Ellison said.

It is certain, however, that the track will not be paved. After the sod is removed, gravel may be laid around the track or may be left as is, according to Mr. Ellison.

Additional facilities proposed for the Three Mile Drive Park include a magic square where volleyball and basketball may be played, a five-hole pitch and putt golf course, a small boat launch ramp and tennis court lighting.

If approved by the Planning Commission, all new facilities would be funded by the city.

At present, Park residents can enjoy tennis, a nature trail, a wading pool and picnic facilities.

Refuse Authority Averts Closing Of Incinerator

Circuit Court Judge Extends Deadline for Compliance to State Pollution Standards for Grosse Pointe-Clinton Facility

August 7 is the next date of concern for the Grosse Pointe-Clinton Refuse Disposal Authority, which a court allowed to continue operating its troubled incinerator beyond state and federal emissions compliance deadlines.

Although Macomb County Circuit Judge Kenneth N. Sanborn last month granted the authority an extension of state pollution deadlines until September 15, the threat of mandatory federal non-compliance penalties still looms over the plant. August 7 is the expected date for the penalties to begin.

July 1 was the deadline for compliance to federal emissions standards imposed by the Clean Air Act Amendment of 1977, and was the date a shutdown order issued by the Michigan Air Pollution Control Commission was to take effect. Judge Sanborn, however, issued his order, allowing the resumption of a case now pending before a state hearing officer.

Disappoint DNR
No one seems to know for sure what action the federal EPA will take. Under law, they are required to assess penalties against polluters designed to make it not to the polluter's economic benefit to operate without compliance. But such penalties have no precedent, and thus are new to everyone.

As authority attorney Charles Towner puts it, "There are a lot of nebulous areas with respect to the federal laws."

In any case, he maintains, "There's really no financial benefit to the authority" by their non-compliance. Mr. Towner claims that if the authority were to shut down its plant, it would exacerbate the current shortage of landfill sites in the area. He says that one of the pollution problems at the plant — "downwash" from the stack which causes odor problems in nearby residents' homes — should be solved in time for the September state deadline extension. A new, higher stack is expected to be completed by that time.

Tough Penalties
Robert Miller, chief of enforcement for the Air Quality Division, DNR, said he was (Continued on Page 2)

Harwood Selected As President

Jon Gandelot, Ronald Dalby and Ann Arducci Also Named to Leadership Positions

The Board of Education re-elected its president Laurence Harwood to lead the schools through the coming year of labor negotiations and millage elections at its annual organizational meeting Monday, July 9.

It will be the retired Michigan Bell Telephone executive's second consecutive term as president of the Board. He was elected unanimously to the post after an unheated nomination by trustee Joan Hanpeter.

But Mrs. Hanpeter, twice Board president, fared less well Monday in her bid for an officer's job. She lost out to second-year trustee Jon Gandelot in a roll-call vote for the vice-president spot, receiving endorsements from only Ann Arducci and Ronald Dalby.

Easy Year
Mr. Gandelot, who won his seat on the Board last year in a lopsided victory over then president John Bruce, received votes from Mr. Harwood, William Fleming and Dorothy Kenneil for the vice-president job.

Mr. Dalby and Mrs. Arducci were elected treasurer and secretary, respectively, by unanimous votes. After the election Monday, Mr. Harwood noted that the schools are facing a big year ahead with the expiration of contracts with all employee groups and scheduled millage elections next spring.

Name Bank
Also at the annual meeting, the School Board voted on a number of yearly business items including designation of \$30 to hold funds for the \$80 million budget and the borrowing of \$6.5 million on tax anticipation notes.

A low bid of 5.6 percent interest rate was received from Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith for the notes. Last year the schools paid a 4.82 percent rate.

The bank deposits went to the lowest bank bidder, in accordance with a new Board policy. That was National Bank of Detroit which offered 5.83 percent on the notes.

Reject Request
The trustees also re-appointed the law firm Hill, Lewis, Adams, Goodrich and Tait as its legal counsel, turning down a request from Superintendent Dr. William Coets that they authorize him to seek and select legal counsel as the need arises. (Continued on Page 6)

Park Youth Is Sentenced

A Park youth who pled guilty to manslaughter in the shooting death of his father has received a sentence of eight to 15 years for the charge.

Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Joseph B. Sullivan sentenced James M. Schorn, 18, of Devonshire road, on Tuesday, July 3.

The maximum sentence for manslaughter is 15 years.

The youth was arraigned on second degree murder of his father, Dr. Ralph N. Schorn, by Park Municipal Judge Beverly C. Orbbel and was later ordered to stand trial in circuit court after he waived a preliminary examination.

Schorn reported to Park police on April 10 that his father was holding a shotgun when he went ready to commit suicide. When officers arrived at the scene, they discovered the elder Schorn sprawled across a bed after a fatal gunshot to the chest. Evidence later linked the Schorn to the homicide. The Park since 1967, according to Police Chief Henry O. Coonce.

(Continued from Page 1) "disappointed" with the judge's decision.

"We lost out on the relief we thought we'd get for the area citizens this summer," he said.

Beyond that, however, Mr. Miller says the court action "ensures" the authority will be in violation of federal statute, simply by operating

the plant past the federal deadline.

The EPA, he noted, has indicated it would take action against the authority.

"It's not like this court decision gets them off the hook," he said. "The federal penalties could be a lot stiffer than the state's. The red light will be going on in Chicago," (where the EPA regional office is located).

Mr. Miller believes there is "no chance" the authority could strike a deal with the EPA or stop the penalties in federal court. Besides the non-discretionary fines, which do not require court action to be levied, the authority could face criminal fines, if convicted, of up to \$25,000 per day for each day it operates in non-compliance.

The maximum state penalty is \$1,000 per day, Mr. Miller said.

Proceed With Plans

But Mr. Towner doubts a criminal action could be brought against the authority when it has a court-granted extension. He is concerned, however, about how the non-discretionary penalties will be applied, and acknowledges he'll be "taking a real hard look at the federal regulations" before August 7.

The authority's hope is that it can get the state to amend its compliance implementation plan, and that the feds will then approve the state's action.

The authority is still proceeding with its timetable that calls for the installation of \$4.5 million worth of electrostatic precipitators designed to make the incinerator comply with the current federal standards for particulate emissions. The devices are expected to be installed in 1981.

"We feel we've acted diligently in complying," Mr. Towner said. "Nobody's expected to comply overnight."

Mr. Miller, however, maintains the authority has spent its time fighting the federal regulations, instead of working to comply with them. He has said the authority knew of the impending deadline since it was imposed in 1977.

(Continued from Page 1) the early spring of 1980 for all areas other than the school site and through the summer months for both the school site and single family areas."

Liggett officials in early June indicated their willingness to cooperate on the easement and saw no problem with work transpiring during the summer. However, they requested no construction begin to disrupt campus activity in the fall.

Meanwhile, City Attorney George Catlin is in the process of obtaining some 36 easement agreements, the great majority from affected area citizens.

On this, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen told the council they have encountered some resistance from residents who want to discuss the matter with their neighbors and/or attorneys. However, officials remain hopeful all agreements will become a reality.

Can Be Aggravating

In further exploring the situation, Mr. DeBusscher said, "We believe there was concurrence that completion of the work across the Liggett School property might not be finished as of the date stipulated in the easement agreement between the city and Liggett School.

"This conclusion was based on reasonable periods of time to advertise the work, recommend (an) award, have contract documents prepared and executed, material ordered and the work completed, including all clean-up, by September 1, 1979."

Such a deadline, he continued, would allow around 30 calendar days, i.e., the month of August, to fulfill the intent of the contract documents.

"We further considered the surface condition of single family lots on Briarcliff and Van K drives and the contractor's ability to restore all surface features in this calendar year since the acquisition of easements has only started," said Mr. DeBusscher.

"Unnecessary disruption of drive ways and/or walks through the winter months can be most aggravating to the residents."

Faced with this situation in 1979, the council agreed it would be best to hold off until next year. Councilman George S. Freeman asked Mr. Petersen to keep the solons informed on a monthly basis of progress.

Other Causes

Councilman George Cueter also wanted Mr. Petersen to investigate the difference in cost in relation to easements on city property and private property.

Prior to this postponement of work, the cost was placed at around \$420,000 in capital improvement monies. However, Mr. Petersen, in noting monies set aside are drawing interest, indicated the entire project could now run over \$500,000.

Besides the funds and ensuing interest, next year's capital improvements budget would offer monies.

Earlier causes for the delay of the project, according to Mr. Petersen, included an unsuccessful effort by the city to obtain utilization of the balance of funds, (around \$200,000), from the Wayne County Drain Commissioner's office to be applied to the project, along with an "out of the way" easement in St. Clair Shores.

On the latter, the city was unable to obtain an easement between two houses to go in a straight line to the Milk River. So it had to obtain permission from St. Clair Shores to use its right-of-way. Mr. Petersen estimated this alone added about \$60,000 to the tab.

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Thief Nets \$840 from Woods Garage

About \$840 worth of items were taken from a Woods garage early Tuesday morning, July 3, according to a report received by Woods police.

Two girls' bicycles, a snow-blower, a set of golf clubs, (including shoes, bag and cart), an electric lawn edger and a lawn trimmer were removed from the garage on Lancaster road.

A large car or van is suspected of being involved in the theft because of the size and bulk of the items taken, police said.

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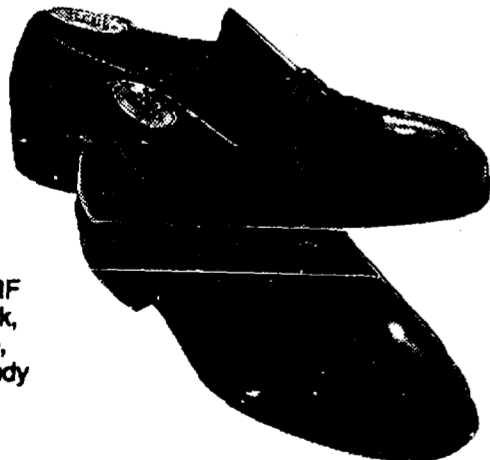
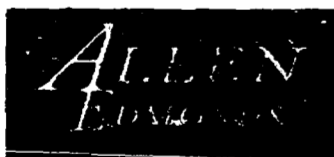


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Park Celebrates July 4th with Parade and Games

The Bell-UH1 helicopter, once used as an ambulance in Vietnam, is one of 10 units of the Detroit Police Aviation Operation Section, which works closely with Detroit General Hospital in transporting accident victims from all over southeastern Michigan to some 90 area hospitals.

The service is unique in the country in that the helicopter always carries a licensed doctor and nurse from Detroit General Hospital who are experienced in emergency medical treatment.

Equipment on board the aircraft is similar to any well-equipped hospital emergency room.

While many families picnicked at the park, many others played in a volleyball tournament organized by Peg Lintvedt. The winning team was led by Jean and Jim Bieri.

Woods Okays Rehab Project

A recommendation of the Community Development Block Grant Advisory Commission on a housing rehabilitation project at a cost of \$5,000 was approved by the Woods Council via a 5-1 vote. This action was taken by the solons at their regular meeting Monday, July 2.

The advisory group recommended that one project be permitted provided the difference between the grant amount and the rehabilitation costs be paid by the applicant, that the difference in cost be used as first payment to the contractor and that the county share be held until the work is satisfactorily completed.

The motion was made based upon the knowledge that the first applicant for such a grant provided the city with a written release and that the county had set aside \$5,000 which could now be used for the rehabilitation of one home, with the city having a qualified applicant.

Indicating the money would go to the affected individuals, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen said the city must make certain the funds are for the grant only.

The tower will not be open during this recital. All carillon recitals are presented in spite of inclement weather.

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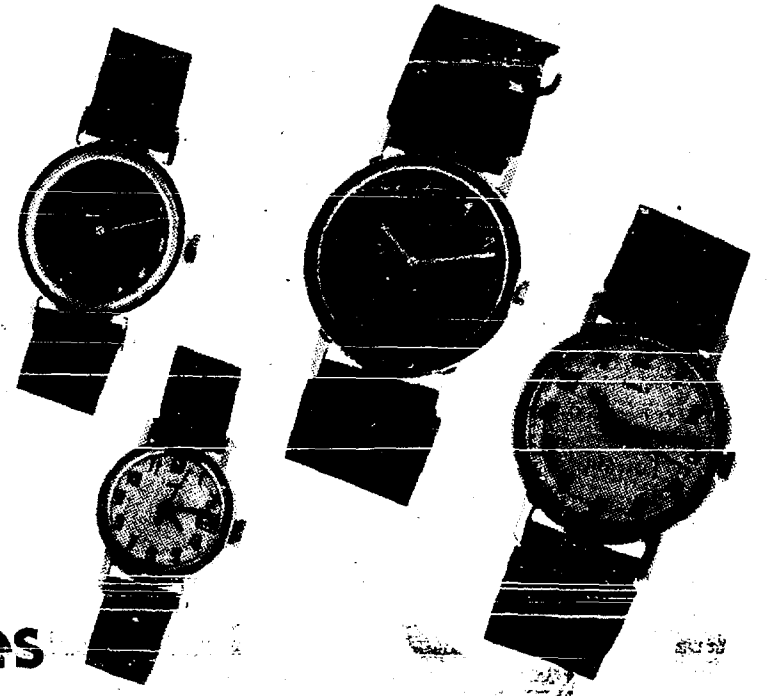
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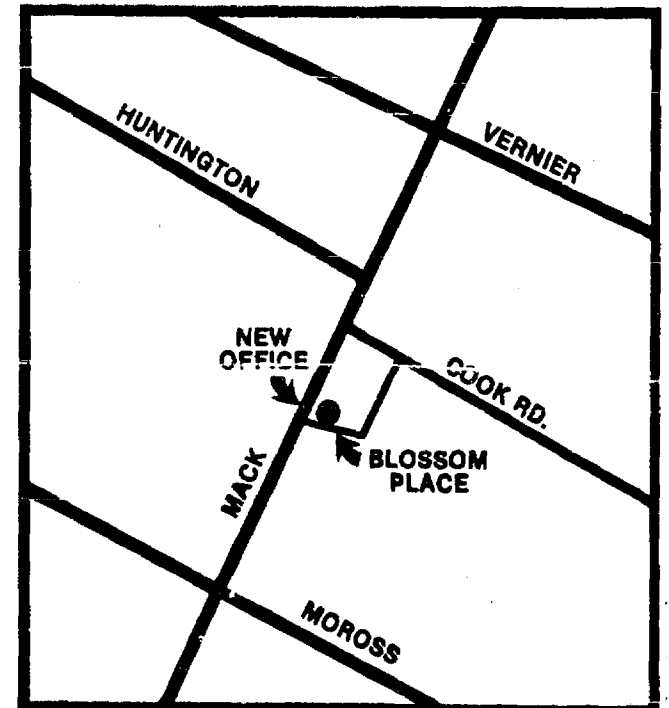
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GPW Accepts Janitorial Bid

A bid in the amount of \$10,800 a year for janitorial services, Department of General Government was unanimously accepted by the Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, June 18.

The bid of Hospital Housekeepers of America, Inc., of Harper Woods, which was accepted, was one of eight companies submitting bids, which ranged from the next lowest of \$14,364 a year up to the high of \$23,160 a year.

According to the agreement, which runs from Sunday, July 1, to June 30, 1980, the municipal building area will be serviced.

Cooperation Falls Short, Bid for Variance Denied

Despite his efforts to seek the cooperation of immediate neighbors in his bid for a variance, Ahmed V. Ismail of Hunt Club drive met some stiff resistance from a few citizens and the Woods Council on Monday, July 2.

As a result, the council, sitting as a Board of Appeals, denied his request to construct a breezeway between the rear of his home and the garage via a 5-1 vote.

The variance was needed because, with the construction of the breezeway, a deficiency in the minimum rear yard requirements of 35 feet would ensue.

Building Inspector Earl J. Wakely pointed out when garages are attached to a home by a connecting breezeway, they become part of the home and rear yards are then computed from the extreme rear portion of the structure.

However, the breezeway alone apparently wasn't the only problem as Mr. Ismail indicated he proposed to have a three-car garage.

Mr. Wakely said whether a two-car garage remains or a three-car garage is built, the breezeway would be in violation of the ordinance.

Mr. Ismail explained he sent a letter to affected area property owners explaining his request, while asking citizens, if they had any questions, to contact him. He said he heard from no one.

Saying he wanted to improve his property, which he purchased in May, Mr. Ismail

indicated the old garage was in bad shape, the home looked like a "pigsty" now and that he was planning to spend thousands of dollars to refurbish the grounds.

Although responses to his request were nil prior to the meeting, three citizens spoke in opposition to the bid before the board.

Michael Stanley said green space on area lots was small enough without reducing it further, while stating the home was vacant last year and the garage was allegedly being used for storage of Studio Camera supplies. (Mr. Ismail is owner of the business.)

W. Taylor said he was against the three-car structure, while Milton Zuehlke questioned the intended use of the "big garage."

In response, Mr. Ismail said he has two cars, a motorcycle and a bicycle, all of which are difficult to fit inside a two-car garage. He also stated he planned on making a workshop inside the garage.

Councilman Thomas Fahrner moved that the variance request be granted but his motion died for lack of support. With that, Councilman John Sabol asked Mr. Ismail if he planned to build a three-car garage if his request was denied, with the petitioner replying in the affirmative.

Mr. Sabol responded by moving that the bid be denied, with Mr. Fahrner casting the only "no" vote. Councilman Dan Grady was excused from the meeting.

its use. A proposal by the city to provide for incentive pay not to use sick leave time was turned down in favor of the association's request to maintain the old wording providing for an accumulation of up to 180 unused days in a "bank," with 50 percent of those days being paid out at retirement, and the other half going to the officer's beneficiary at the time of death.
"The City's proposal for use officers to work an extra half hour per day on regular time was turned down, and the association won an increased uniform maintenance allowance, (from \$50 to \$100 per year)."

Officers got \$5,000 more in life insurance benefits, (up to \$20,000), but lost in their bid for longevity pay calculated on a percentage basis, instead getting the city's offer of \$50 more per five-year increment, as well as the addition of another step, 25 years, at \$650.
Will Start Again
The number of holidays remained the same at 10 per year, while shift premium also stayed unchanged. The association had asked for an additional holiday, plus an additional \$100 in payment for holidays not worked, (currently \$250).
The city and the union will shortly begin negotiations to-

ward a contract for the present fiscal year. Both parties have stated they are willing to work toward a two-year contract, although the pact just approved was for just one year.
Not Impressed
City Manager Andrew Bremer told the council the award "far exceeds the presidential guidelines," but did not indicate what the total percentage increase would be. Contacted later, Mr. Bremer said it was "somewhat greater" than past awards, but didn't know what the total cost would be to the city.
"If we get many more awards of this nature, we're going to have to look seriously at cutting services," Mr. Bremer said.

Councilman W. James Mast said he was "very unimpressed with Mr. Gullen," because he failed to address some problems.
Mr. Cudlip added there appeared to be no cost-benefit relationship in the award.

But Ptm. Gordon Evans, the association's chief bargainer, said there were "no victories" for the policemen, and the union was simply playing a catch-up game with inflation.

Stating the men haven't received a pay increase in two years — with the exception of the old COLA provision that generated about \$85 a year — he noted Farms officers are still behind in some areas relative to other area departments.

scape along the route. Questions were then raised about whether bushes could be planted in front of the rail to mask its appearance. In the end the council voted to have City Clerk Richard Solak send the road commission a letter asking them to consider such a move.
Completion of the guardrail is expected by the middle of this month. Since January, 1975, four cars have gone into the lake at that location, Chief Ferber said. One of those was a murder-suicide.
City Attorney Larry Campbell, meanwhile, advised the council not to join in Wayne County Commissioner Ervin A. Steiner's class action lawsuit aimed at forcing the county to resurface the Farms portion of the street completely at county expense.
"This does not look like the kind of litigation the city would be advantageous in joining," he said. "There's no way to get into this as a city to help the suit. We're, (the city), not an injured party."
Mr. Campbell said it would be possible to give financial support to a citizen who might wish to bring a class action suit, but that such a move might set a precedent.
The Farms council and administration once again affirmed their opposition to "giving in" to county demands for a share of the resurfacing costs, although the city's requested share is now only about nine percent.
"I'd rather get phone calls from residents complaining about Lakeshore than I would from residents complaining about the roads in front of their homes," Mr. Bremer said. "Lakeshore is the tip of the iceberg, (of county roads in The Farms)."
Mr. Bremer stated the county had originally asked the city for a one-third share of the costs of the guardrail, but now will build it entirely at its expense.
"They're, (road commission), trying to buy us off; that's what this means to me," said Councilman Joseph Fromm, referring to the drop in the city's requested resurfacing share from the original one-third.
"They're a tough group," added Mr. Cudlip.

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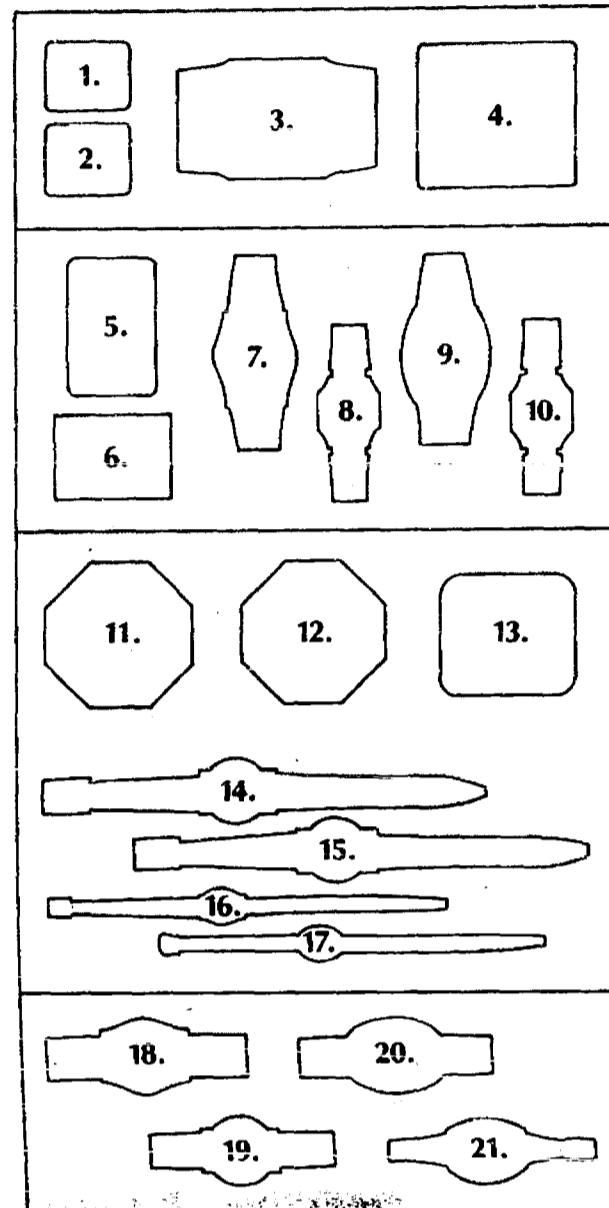
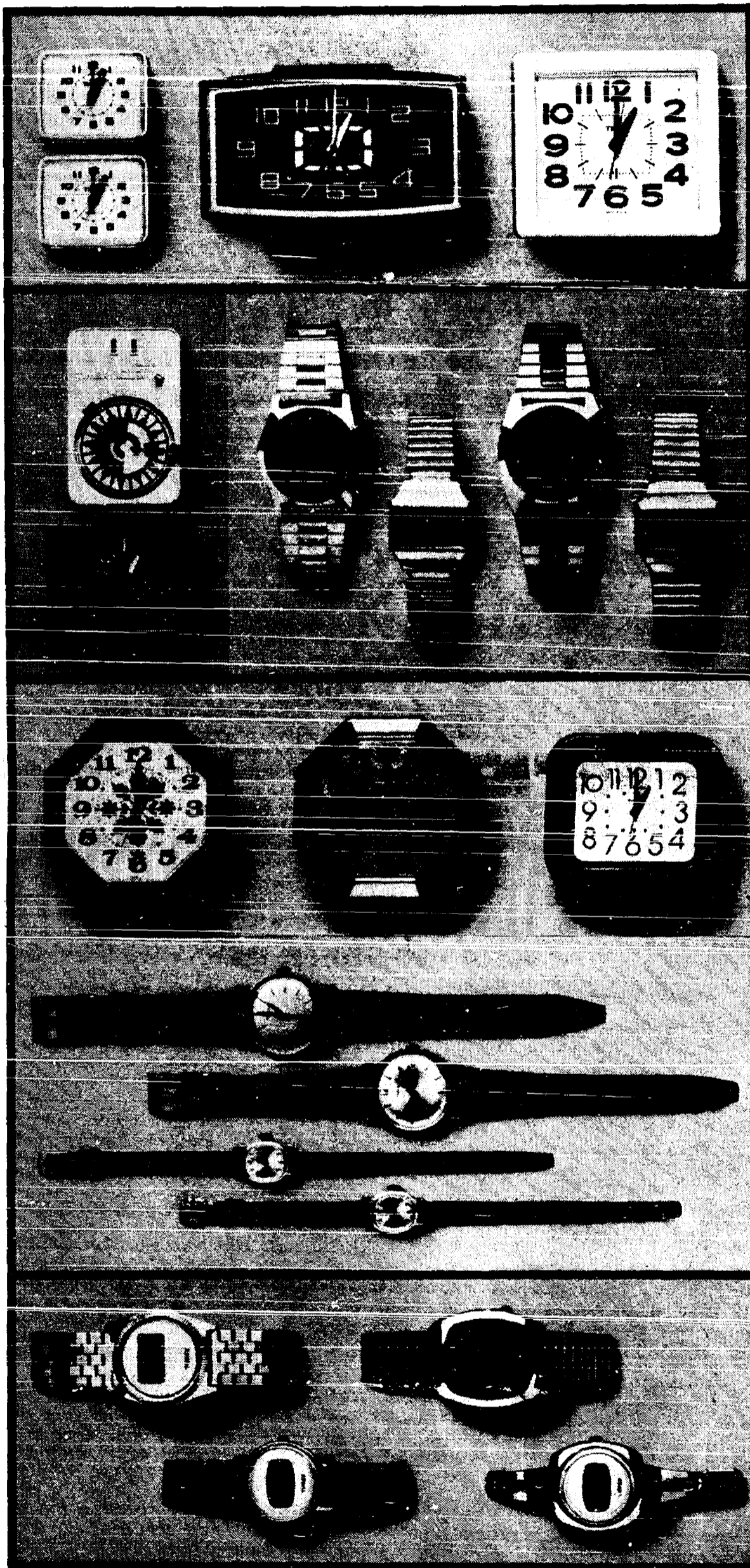

Foster Parents Needed for Boys

 TAG teachers, regular classroom teachers and principals will meet in team planning conferences each fall to make the selections. They'll be looking for 10 to 15 fifth and sixth grade students in each elementary school who show outstanding ability, task commitment and creativity, according to Dr. Frost.
 Educators' group should what sort of program should be offered for the gifted as well. Many argue the students should be given advanced instruction while completely removed from regular classrooms. Others maintain such isolation may be harmful.
 Grosse Pointe administrators take the latter view and chose to keep the gifted involved in the "mainstream" of school activity as much as possible.
 "Kids must learn to participate in a heterogeneous group," she said.
 The actual content of the units offered for gifted children may vary from school to school depending upon the interests there. Some may offer a "thinking skills" course emphasizing such cognitive areas as comprehension, application, analysis, synthesis and evaluation, according to Dr. Frost.
 The format for TAG will be almost identical to Skills/Talent for both gifted and talented sessions. Selected students will be taken out of class for two 45-minute periods each week. Annual enrollment will remain at about a third of the school population and many of the old favorites, such as "On Stage," "Flying," the "Big Dig," and "Numbers Plus" will return.
 Still Voluntary
 There will be some subtle changes as well. Art and music teachers will work more closely with TAG teachers and may even conduct some TAG courses in their fields.
 Individual schools will have a bit more flexibility and will be allowed to offer one original unit each session to take advantage of special skills of their teaching staff. Many of the regular units will be supplemented by activities that emphasize thinking skills, according to Dr. Frost.
 Also next year, teachers will be asked to provide more direction to students entering the program rather than giving them free choice of which units to enter. Of course the program will remain voluntary.
 The new program was developed after a year-long study of Skills/Talent conducted by several central office administrators, teachers and principals.
 The study included visits to Roeper and Bloomfield Hills, a review of current literature and research studies about student attitudes and achievement, among others. In addition, seven of the 10 elementary schools tried out pilot programs last year to test variations.

The Articles of Incorporation are signed and acknowledged in duplicate by the incorporators for the purpose of forming a public economic development corporation pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 338 of the Public Acts of 1974, as amended.

Section 3. Salary. Directors shall serve without salary, but may be reimbursed their actual expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties, and may receive a per diem of not more than \$50.00.

Section 4. Public Meetings. The meetings of the Board of Directors shall be public.

Section 5. Reappointment; Vacancy. A Director whose term of office has expired shall continue to hold office until his or her successor has been appointed with the advice and consent of the City Council. A Director may be reappointed with the advice and consent of the City Council to serve an additional term. If a vacancy is created by death or resignation or removal by operation of law, a successor shall be appointed with the advice and consent of the City Council within thirty (30) days to hold office for the remainder of the term of office so vacated.

Section 6. Removal. A Director may be removed from office for cause by a majority vote of the City Council.

ARTICLE IX
NET EARNINGS; DISSOLUTION

No part of the net earnings of the Corporation, beyond that necessary for the retirement of indebtedness or to implement the public purposes or program of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, shall inure to the benefit of any person, firm or Corporation, other than the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, except that reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the Corporation affecting one or more of its purposes. No member, officer or director of the Corporation nor any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the corporate assets on dissolution of the Corporation. No substantial part of the assets of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting, to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publication or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Upon the termination or dissolution of the Corporation, after adequate provision has been made for all obligations of the Corporation, surplus earnings and all property and assets of the Corporation shall belong to and be paid only to the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan, or its successor.

ARTICLE I
NAME

The name of the economic development corporation is the ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ("Corporation").

ARTICLE II
PURPOSE

The Corporation is organized and incorporated as authorized by and pursuant to Act No. 338 of the Public Acts of 1974, as amended ("Act"). The purpose for which the Corporation is created to perform essential public purposes as an economic development corporation in accordance with the Act, as the Act may be amended from time to time, including particularly: to alleviate and prevent conditions of unemployment; to assist and retain local industries and commercial enterprises to strengthen and revitalize the economy of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms and of the State of Michigan; to provide means and methods for the encouragement and assistance of industrial and commercial enterprises in locating, purchasing, constructing, reconstructing, modernizing, improving, maintaining, repairing, furnishing, equipping, and expanding in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms; to encourage the location and expansion of commercial enterprises to provide needed services and facilities of the commercial enterprises more conveniently to the City of Grosse Pointe Farms and the residents thereof.

ARTICLE V
OFFICERS

Section 1. The Board of Directors of the Corporation, by an affirmative vote of a majority of its members shall elect as the officers of the Corporation, a Chairperson, a Vice Chairperson, a Secretary and a Treasurer. Any two officers other than the office of Chairperson and Secretary or Chairperson and Treasurer may be held by the same person, but no officer shall not execute, acknowledge or verify an instrument in more than one capacity if the instrument is required to be executed by more than one officer. The officers shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors at its annual meeting and shall hold office for a term of one (1) year and thereafter until his or her successor is elected and qualified, or until death, resignation or removal, provided that the first officers shall be elected at the first meeting of the Board of Directors. The officers shall be sworn to the faithful discharge of their duties.

Section 2. Chairperson. The Chairperson shall be the chief executive officer of the Corporation. The Chairperson shall preside at all meetings of the Directors, shall have general and active management of the business of the Corporation, and shall see that all orders and resolutions of the Board are carried into effect. The Chairperson may execute with the Secretary or any other proper officer authorized by the Board of Directors, all bonds, notes, mortgages, conveyances and other instruments which the Board of Directors has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the Board of Directors, by these Articles, by the Bylaws of the Corporation or by statute to some other officer or agent of the Corporation. He or she shall have and exercise such other authority as is specifically granted from time to time by the Board.

Section 3. Vice Chairperson. The Vice Chairperson shall perform such duties as are delegated to him or her or by the Chairperson and shall, in the absence or in the event of the disability of the Chairperson, perform the duties and exercise the powers of the Chairperson. The Vice Chairperson shall perform such other duties as the Board of Directors shall prescribe.

Section 4. Secretary. The Secretary shall be the recording officer of the Corporation, and shall attend all meetings of the board, record all votes and the minutes of all proceedings in a book to be kept for that purpose and shall perform like duties for the standing committees when required. The Secretary shall give, or cause to be given, notice of all meetings of the Board of Directors, and shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors. The Secretary shall keep in safe custody the seal of the Corporation, and when authorized by the Board, affix the same to any instrument requiring it and when so affixed it shall be attested by his or her signature or by the signature of the Treasurer.

Section 5. Treasurer. The Treasurer shall have custody of the corporate funds and securities and shall keep full and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the Corporation and shall deposit all and other valuable effects in the name and to the credit of the Corporation in such depositories as may be designated by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer shall disburse the funds of the Corporation as may be ordered by the Board, taking proper vouchers for such disbursements, and shall render to the Chairperson and Directors, at the regular meetings of the Board, or whenever they may require an account of his or her actions as Treasurer and of the financial condition of the Corporation. The Treasurer shall execute the Corporation's bond, if required by the Board, for the faithful performance of the duties of his or her office and for the restoration to the Corporation, in case of death, resignation, retirement or removal from office, of all books, papers, vouchers, money and other property of whatever kind in his or her possession or under his or her control belonging to the Corporation.

Section 6. Removal. An officer may be removed by an affirmative vote of a majority of the Directors, with or without cause, whenever in the judgment of the Board of Directors the best interests of the Corporation would be served.

Section 7. Vacancy. A vacancy in any office because of death, resignation, removal or otherwise, may be filled by the Board of Directors at any meeting for the unexpired portion of the term of the office.

ARTICLE X
TERM

The term of existence of the Corporation is perpetual or until dissolved in accordance with the Act.

ARTICLE XI
EFFECTIVE DATE OF CORPORATION

The Corporation shall become effective immediately upon approval of these Articles of Incorporation by resolution of the City Council, duly adopted.

ARTICLE XII
PUBLICATION OF ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

These Articles of Incorporation shall be published in the Grosse Pointe News, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms.

ARTICLE XIV
BYLAWS

The Board of Directors, by an affirmative vote of a majority of its members shall approve Bylaws for the operation of the affairs of the Corporation which Bylaws shall be adopted by resolution of the City Council.

ARTICLE XV
AMENDMENT OF ARTICLES & BYLAWS

The Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Corporation may be amended by resolution of the City Council which resolution shall be filed with the secretary of state. The effect of an amendment may include the alteration or changing of the structure, organization, programs, or activities of the Corporation including the power to terminate the existence of the Corporation. However, an amendment shall not impair the obligation of any bond or contract.

ARTICLE III
POWERS

The Corporation shall be a body corporate with powers to sue and be sued in any court of the State of Michigan. In furtherance of its purpose the Corporation shall have all of the powers which are now or may hereafter be conferred on corporations organized pursuant to the Act and future amendments to the Act, including all powers necessary to carry out the purpose of its incorporation and all powers incident thereto, and including but not limited to the following powers to:

- construct, acquire by gift or purchase, reconstruct, improve, maintain, or repair projects (as the word "project" is defined in the Act) and acquire the necessary lands for the site therefor;
- acquire by gift or purchase the necessary machinery, furnishings, and equipment for a project;
- borrow money and issue its revenue bonds or revenue notes to finance part or all of the cost of the acquisition, purchase, construction, reconstruction, or improvement of a project or any part thereof; the cost of the acquisition and improvement of the necessary sites therefor, the acquisition of machinery, furnishings, and equipment therefor, and the costs necessary or incidental to the borrowing of money and issuing of bonds or notes for such purposes;
- enter into leases, lease purchase agreements, or installment sales contracts with any person, firm or corporation for the use or sale of a project;
- mortgage a project in favor of any lender of money to the Corporation;
- sell and convey a project or any part thereof for a price and at a time as the Corporation determines; and
- lend, grant, transfer, or convey funds as permitted by law, but subject to applicable restrictions affecting the use of such funds.

ARTICLE IV
BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Directors. The Board of Directors of the Corporation shall consist of not less than nine (9) persons, not more than three (3) of whom shall be an officer or employee of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms. The Mayor and any member of the City Council may serve on the Board of Directors. The Directors shall be appointed by the Mayor, with the advice and consent of the City Council, as provided in the Act. The Directors shall be appointed for terms of (4) years, one (1) for the first appointed; four (4) years, one (1) for four (4) years, one (1) for five (5) years, one (1) for four (4) years, one (1) for three (3) years, one (1) for two (2) years and one (1) for one (1) year.

Section 2. Additional Directors. Promptly after the Corporation notifies the Mayor in writing, the Mayor with the advice and consent of the City Council shall appoint two (2) additional Directors to the Board of Directors of the Corporation who shall serve only in respect to that project and shall be representative of neighborhood, business and home ownership interests likely to be affected by the project proposed by the Corporation. Each of said additional Directors shall serve as Directors of the Corporation until the project for

LOCATION

ARTICLE VII
REGISTERED AGENT

ARTICLE VIII
NON-STOCK; ASSETS

The Corporation is organized upon a non-stock basis. The amount of assets which said Corporation possess is:



The number of teenage girls who smoke is climbing. Only two-thirds of young women smokers realize smoking can harm an unborn baby.
Pregnancy is a perfect time for women to kick the cigaret habit for good, says the American Lung Association. A recent survey showed that 35 percent of women quit smoking during pregnancy and 32 percent cut back.
Another study at Stanford University Medical Center, which featured special techniques to aid behavior changes, found that one-third of pregnant smokers in the experiment quit smoking and were still nonsmokers when they were contacted nearly a year later.
An American Lung Association booklet for pregnant women, "Smoking and the Two of You," presents some sobering statistics to young mothers-to-be.
Women who smoke during pregnancy have more stillbirths, spontaneous abortions and premature deliveries than women who don't smoke. The Christmas Seal people advise all pregnant women to stop smoking to create a life-enhancing environment for their unborn children.
"Your unborn baby doesn't breathe before the moment of birth, but it practices some motions of breathing by exercising certain chest muscles," says the Christmas Seal publication.

Bicentennial Plates on Sale

For one dollar, you can purchase a piece of Michigan history.
That's the news from Secretary of State Richard H. Austin, who ordered all un-sold red, white and blue 1976 bicentennial plates placed on sale to the public.
He said normally any remaining unsold license plates are scrapped, but because of many requests from collectors, history buffs and others, all remaining 1976 plates will be placed on sale at 14 branch offices throughout the state.
The 1976 three-year bicentennial plate was replaced this year by black and white plates.
The cost of \$1 per plate is the statutory fee for non-registration plates. Proceeds from the plates will go into the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.
Sales of 1976 plates will continue until the supply is exhausted or demand stops, Mr. Austin said.

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Boat Safety Is Explored

"Ahoj, all weekend admirals and crews. To prevent scuttling your weekend fun this summer, don't forget the importance of boating maintenance," warns the Insurance Information Institute.

An unsafe boat can cause accidents which can result in death, injury and property damage.

The increasing popularity of boating was marred by 6,529 boating accidents in 1979, which resulted in 1,321 deaths, 1,761 injuries and more than \$123 million in property damage, according to the U.S. Coast Guard.

In Michigan, the Coast Guard reported 428 accidents, 73 deaths and 183 injuries. The property damages amounted to \$341,000. The Office of Boating Safety receives notification of 95 to 100 percent of all annual boating related fatalities, but only four to 10 percent of those accidents that involved injuries or property damages were reported.

All boaters are urged to make a list for checking the boat's fuel, electrical and steering systems before embarking on an excursion on the state's waterways, says the institute. Connections, fastenings, protective casings and other parts of the boat should be expertly checked. The hull and drain plugs also should be checked for leakage.

One of the essential parts of the boat to check is its flotation devices and life preservers. Materials used to construct boats insure that the boat will stay afloat in the event the vessel capsizes. Therefore, if a boat capsizes, its crew should stay with the vessel for quick rescue and to avoid drowning, the institute warns.

All boat owners should know the load capacity of their vessels and observe the limit. Some limits are measured in terms of weight and others in terms of the number of people aboard. One should also take into consideration the weight of the gear, (ice chests, picnic baskets, fishing tackle, skis, et al.), on board the boat.

Some of the newer boats have a plaque attached to indicate their capacity. When in doubt, contact the local retailer, the manufacturer or the local Coast Guard Auxiliary, (or comparable lake patrol authorities), for advice.

The institute suggests a boat owner determine the output speed and power expected under varying conditions. A load of four people in a motor boat will definitely make a difference in a boat's speed and operation in comparison with only one person aboard.

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One View from the Capitol

By William R. Bryant Jr.

An all-day meeting on the state's existing workers' compensation laws was recently held in Lansing. If there is unanimous agreement on any one subject in the Capitol Building this year, it is that there is a need to change Michigan's workers' compensation laws. Both employers and employees consider the existing laws unjust.

The discussion was a vehicle for allowing both labor and business to speak out about areas in the system that they consider inequitable.

I believe that the purpose of the conference — to inform citizens and legislators on where each side stands on the matter — was fulfilled. But before any changes can take place in the present system, leaders on both sides must recognize the complaints of the other side.

The workers' biggest complaint with the present system is that compensation for a disability is generally lower than in other nearby states. Businesses grumble that they are paying higher premiums than companies in other midwestern states.

Areas covered at the conference included the history of workers' compensation in the state, a step-by-step explanation of the present system, a mock trial, how premiums are determined and employers' insurance.

As you know, the House Republicans have set up a task force to study the workers' compensation situation in Michigan. The five-member panel has already held hearings in Grand Rapids, Muskegon, Battle Creek and Jackson and several more are scheduled for the Detroit area in July.

The task force released a report last month detailing 24 issues which they say must be addressed before any type of workers' compensation reform can be accomplished.

The day-long session was interesting and informative and helped me to better understand Michigan's business situation with our current laws.

For instance, a spokesman for the labor side pointed out that Michigan does not provide payment for loss of hearing, even though 47 other states do. He also pointed out that some injured workers have not received a cost of living increase in benefit pay since 1969, the last time the law underwent a major revision.

Management concerns voiced at the seminar included the following:

- The fact that minimum benefits sometimes total more than the worker's paycheck.
- Complaints that some retirees who draw both compensation and social security pay make more money than they did before retirement.

I am hopeful that the situation can be changed to benefit both sides in the near future. The conference was a step in the right direction because it allowed both sides to get their views out in the open for the other side to hear.

Every day the system stays as it is, the state is losing money because businesses shy away from locating here.

Annual Nedzi Poll Shows Energy, Inflation Big Concerns in District

The attitudes of residents of Michigan's 14th Congressional District are following national trends, according to the results of Congressman Lucien Nedzi's annual questionnaire.

The 14th District includes all of the Grosse Pointes, the southern half of Warren, East Detroit, Centerline, Harper Woods, Hamtramck and part of Detroit's east side.

Out of a total of 145,000 questionnaires sent out, one to each household, the responses received were 3,057, or 6.2 percent.

President Jimmy Carter continues in a deep slump, with only a 14 percent approval rate, and inflation and energy are the top concerns by an overwhelming margin.

"The Carter phenomenon is a curious one," Cong. Nedzi said. "Here he is with the lowest approval rating a president of either party has ever gotten in my polls, and yet there is virtually no hostility directed towards him.

"People are disappointed, true, and lack confidence in him, but as long as deep antagonism doesn't develop, he retains a chance to turn things around for himself."

Only 14 percent of those participating responded affirmatively to the question: "Do you approve of the overall record of the Carter Administration?" Seventy-five percent said no, and 11 percent were undecided. In 1978, the figures were 15 percent yes, 72 percent no and 13 percent undecided.

In 1977, after the first few months of the Carter Administration, it was 36 percent yes, 59 percent no and 5 percent undecided.

In his 1978 Poll, Cong. Nedzi cautioned, the Ford Administration received only 29.5 percent approval, yet on election day Ford edged Carter 50 percent to 46 percent. The district otherwise went heavily for Democratic candidates in other races.

For the second year in a row, inflation was identified as the principal problem facing the nation and energy was second, with both inter-related.

Mr. Carter's proposal for oil price deregulation and a windfall profits tax were soundly disapproved, 57 percent to 33 percent with 11 percent undecided. Only the residents in The City and Woods within the 14th District supported the proposal.

Reflecting perhaps a widespread unease about coping with inflation, the respondents favored, 59 percent to 33 percent, with eight percent undecided, giving the President standby authority to impose mandatory wage and price controls. The President recently said that he would not ask for such authority and would veto the measure if Congress passed.

Reaffirmation of the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty, (SALT II), recently signed in Vienna by Mr. Carter and Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev, is supported 48 percent to 29 percent, with 23 percent undecided. The support is consistent in all parts of the district.

In another defense related question, 64 percent favored legislation giving the President standby authority to re-establish the military draft, 31 percent were opposed and five percent were undecided. Cong. Nedzi does not favor the draft at the present time but believes registration to be a prudent measure in view of the worrisome shortfalls in volunteer army recruitment and the related inadequacy of the reserve forces.

"The mail I've been receiving on this subject has come almost entirely from 18- and 19-year-old young men, who are understandably bothered by the prospect of a draft. The general overall view of my constituency," Cong. Nedzi observed, "is obviously different."

Affirming a pattern which has remained constant for several years, 59 percent were opposed to a constitutional amendment to outlaw abortion, 35 percent were in favor and nine percent were undecided.

The issue of marijuana shows a similar consistency. A majority, 54 percent, continues to believe that possession for marijuana for personal use should continue to be subject to criminal penalty, 38 percent said no and eight percent were undecided.

Students and their host families receive support from nearly 1,000 volunteers in communities across the country. Families provide room and board; students, who come prepared with English language skills, handle their personal expenses.

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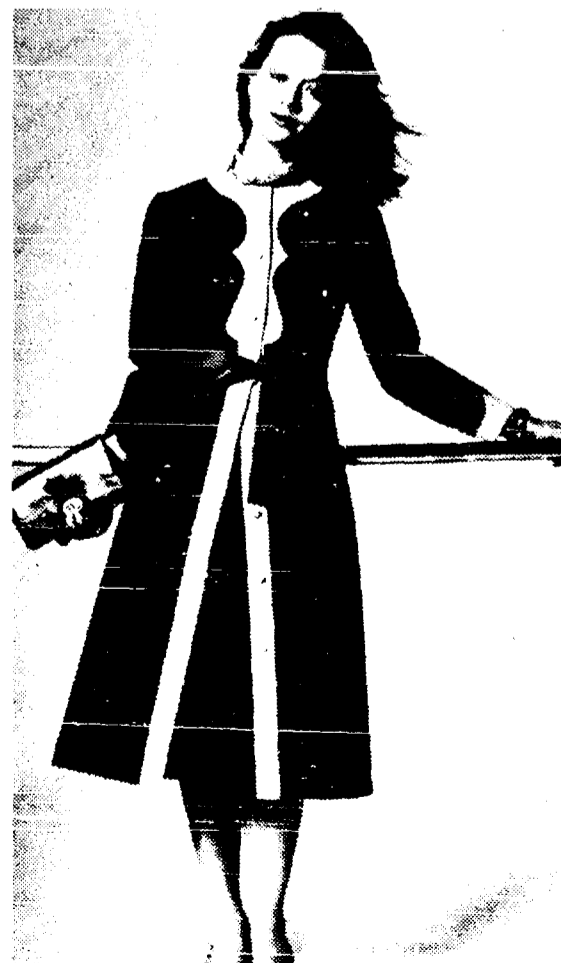

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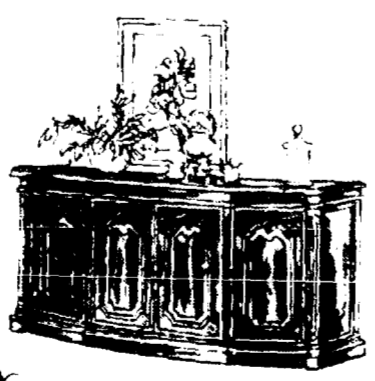

(Continued from Page 21) "At this point in time, it does not appear that worry over gasoline availability is having any adverse effect on sales. In fact, some people may be planning their entertainment close-in, which may account in part for the strong response we are experiencing," Murphy says.

"On the other hand, we have had some 35 phone calls and letters asking if we were planning a bus service this fall from the Birmingham area to Ford Auditorium. Although we're not sure of the usage such a bus service will receive we are scheduling it, starting with one bus accommodating 40 persons.

"If the need warrants, we will increase the number of busses."

Wayne S. Brown, assistant DSO manager for sales, reports an enthusiastic reception to the guaranteed, reserved, garage parking offered at extra charge this year to season ticket purchasers.

"We are using the new Renaissance Center garage which is about 100 feet from the lower lobby entrance to Ford Auditorium. On rainy evenings, we will also provide complimentary umbrella-escort service from the ga-

rage to the auditorium." Murphy speculates that additional factors affecting season ticket sales favorably include:

*Presence of Maestro Antal Dorati conducting the symphony for the first six weeks of the season before the orchestra leaves in late October for its European tour. (Dorati has not conducted the regular opening weeks during his two years with the DSO. These six weeks of concerts will be sell-outs.)

*While most other consumer items have gone up in price, prices for DSO season tickets are unchanged from last year.

*Sales and inquiries from the Windsor area are continuing an up-trend that began three years ago. "As we accept Canadian money at face value despite the exchange rate, Canadians in effect get a 15 percent price cut in addition to the series discounts that all season ticket purchasers receive."

*A number of new restaurants have opened in the downtown area to supplement those which have been catering to the orchestra's dinner crowd for years.

*Twenty-four of last year's concerts at Ford Auditorium were standing-room only. Another 18 were near sell-outs. This may be a factor in advance sales for the coming season.

"One of the most important ingredients of our Weekend College is the interaction of students with each other and with the faculty members," says Dr. Smydra.

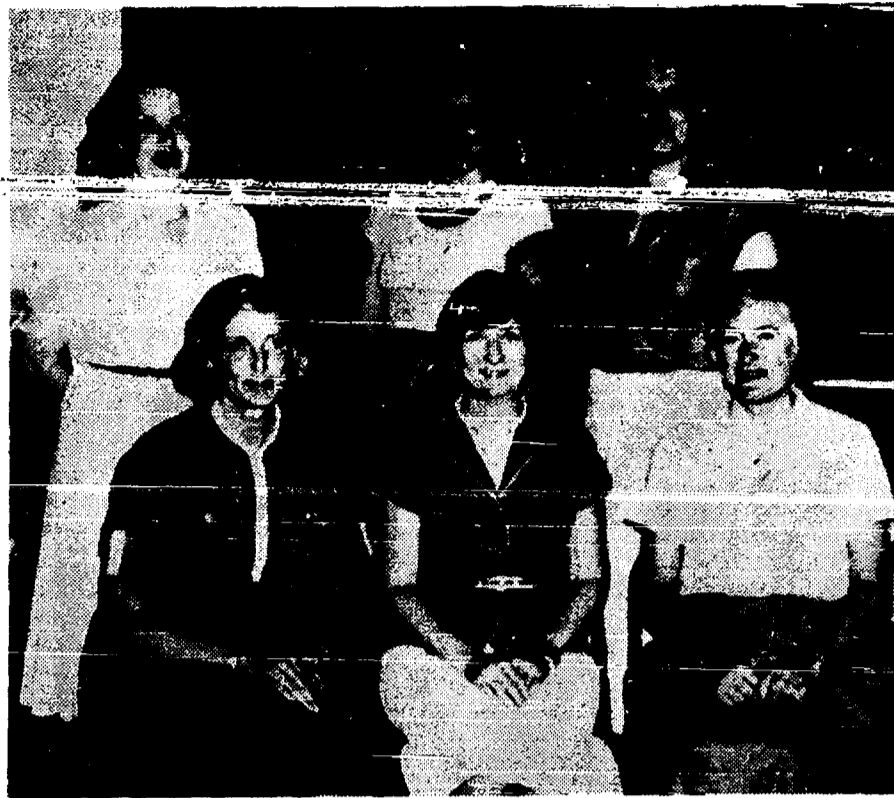
"This is accomplished by helping the students understand they have a valuable contribution to make to the educational process and by encouraging them to share their life and work experiences with their classmates.

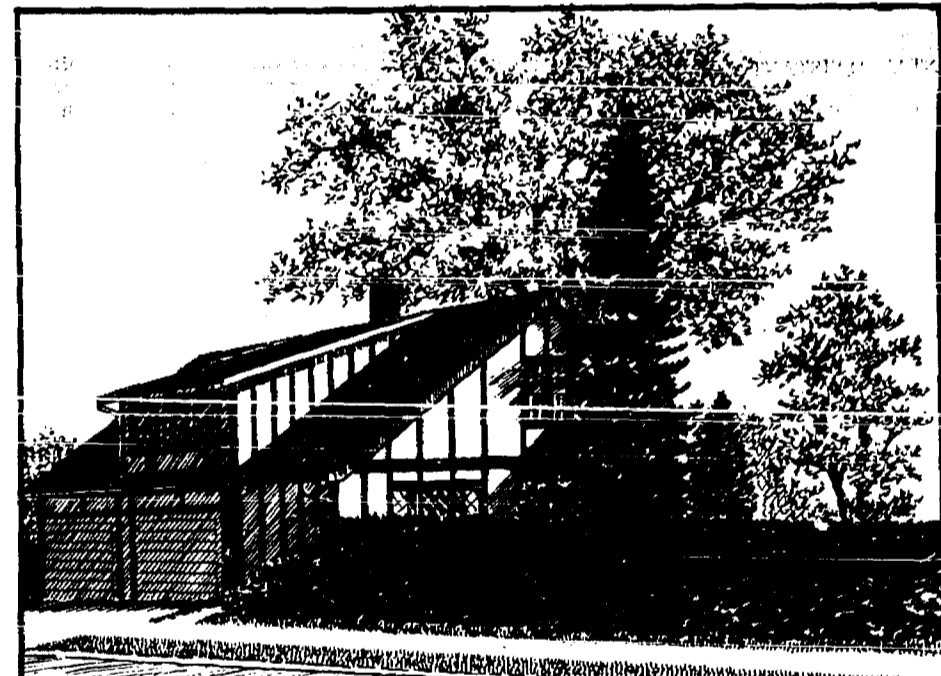

The Minutes of the Regular Meeting which was held on June 18, 1979 were approved as corrected. The Council, acting as the Zoning Board of Appeals, approved the application of the Amoco Oil Company, Great Lakes Region, thereby rendering a determination that the lapsed non-conforming use of the building known as the Kercheval-on-the-Hill Sunoco Service Station, located at 68 Kercheval Avenue, can be reinstated.

The Council, further acting as the Zoning Board of Appeals, approved the petition of the Cottage Hospital of Grosse Pointe, thereby rendering a determination that the proposed non-conforming use by the Hospital of the building known as the Nurses' Residence, located at 168 Ridge Road, as an office structure only, subject to certain specified conditions, will better serve the beneficial development of the district than its past legal non-conforming use as a multi-residence/office.

The Council adopted a resolution authorizing the Administration to request the firm of Villan-Leman & Associates to review the City's Zoning Ordinance criteria for required parking spaces for hospital facilities within the City relative to out-patient care facilities, pursuant to determining whether or not amendment to the Ordinance is advisable.

The Council adopted a resolution granting permission to the St. Paul Dads Club to utilize the Pier Park facilities on Tuesday, August 21, 1979 for the St. Paul Parish annual picnic.

The Council adopted a resolution granting permission to the Grosse Pointe Boys and Girls Fishing Rodeo to conduct their forthcoming annual Rodeo event at the Pier Park, and further authorized a donation of funds in the amount of \$200,000 to cover a portion of the cost of conducting the foregoing annual Rodeo event.

The Council adopted a resolution authorizing the Administration to implement the provisions of the Award of the Labor Arbitration Panel concerning the Grosse Pointe Farms Police Officers Association for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1978 and ending June 30, 1979.

The Council adopted a resolution confirming payment of the City's one-third share in the total amount of \$819,76, of the total statement in the amount of \$2,459,28, of the Arbitrator, Mr. George E. Gullen, Jr., for professional services rendered in the Labor Arbitration proceedings in the matter of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms and the Grosse Pointe Farms Police Officers Association.

The Council adopted a resolution approving the low bid of AFAC Paving, Incorporated, in the unit amount of \$9,56, for a total cost of \$10,986, for the necessary repairs to the parking area at the Pier Park.

The Council adopted a resolution confirming the appointment by The Honorable Robert H. Pytall of Mrs. Rosetta Kalajian to the position of Municipal Court Clerk. A motion was lost for lack of the required number of affirmative votes to erect a billboard sign on City property along Lake Shore Drive near the proposed guard rail location which would advise motorists that the guard rail was constructed and paid for by the Wayne County Road Commission for protection from having their vehicles propelled into the lake as a result of leaving the pavement due to the poor condition of the deteriorated road which is owned by Wayne County.

GROSSE POINTE NORTH HIGH SCHOOL RETIRING TEACHERS LAURA M. GREGORY AND EARL VEENENDAAL

When school bells ring out again in the fall for Grosse Pointe North High students, Laura Gregory and Earl Veenendaal may feel a pang of nostalgia—but only a small one. This pair of veteran North High teachers, both members of the school's faculty from the Year One (1969), have been graduated.

And while there are things that both will miss, and things that both will remember, neither regrets the rite of passage. It was time. Now it's time to move on.

For Earl Veenendaal — "That's with two a's, not an h, (ah rather than ah). I'm Belgian, not Dutch"—moving on will ultimately take him home to Wisconsin.

From Milwaukee He was born in Milwaukee, attended elementary and high school there and received his Bachelor's degree from Milwaukee State Teachers College in 1939. He began his teaching career at the high school in Burlington, Wis.

His subject was Math. It always has been.

Came World War II and went Earl Veenendaal into the United States Army, for four-and-a-half years. After a course in Meteorology at New York University, he served as a weather forecaster.

Post-war, it was back to Burlington, where he eventually became head of the high school's Mathematics and Physics students.

He'd been president of his senior class at Milwaukee State Teachers College. He received his Masters degree from the University of Wisconsin at Madison in 1954, the same year he began a year's chairmanship of the Wisconsin Statewide Mathematics Curriculum Committee.

He also served as chairman of the Mathematics Section of the Southern Wisconsin Education Association.
