

# GP's AWAIT FEDERAL FUNDING

## HEADLINES of the WEEK

Thursday, July 12

**THE LONG-AWAITED** return of Skylab to the earth ended when tons of the space station's debris fell along a 3,700-mile path over the Indian Ocean. Much of the debris from the 77½-ton space station was scattered over southwestern Australia with no reports of property damage or injury from the falling pieces. The heaviest debris fell six miles above Kalgoorlie, a town in southwestern Australia. One resident in Kalgoorlie described the falling Skylab "like several explosions... a mixture of heavy guns and mortar fire."

Friday, July 13

**THE WHITE HOUSE** forecast a recession this year indicating that Americans may lose up to one million jobs through December and face a 10 percent inflation rate. If the outlook holds true, it will mark the end of four years of economic growth and the first gloomy appraisal of the nation's economy since President Jimmy Carter took office. Rising oil prices were blamed for the deteriorating economy. Officials say, however, that the recession should be "relatively mild and short-lived."

Saturday, July 14

**AN AMERICAN DC-10** took off from Chicago to Baltimore with 100 passengers aboard making it the first time since the jetliner has been in the air since the Chicago May 25 crash of a DC-10 that killed 273 persons. The Federal Aviation Administration, (FAA), in lifting the ban ordered more frequent inspections of the wide-bodied jets in the future. The DC-10's were banned from air travel after cracks were found in the engine mounts, later believed to be the cause of the Chicago crash.

Sunday, July 15

**PALESTINIAN GUNMEN** agreed to release three women hostages as they continued their siege of the Egyptian embassy. The Turkish government called the release a "goodwill" gesture on the part of the guerrillas, who are demanding that two jailed Palestinian sympathizers charged with terrorist attacks in Egypt be set free. The guerrillas also are demanding that Turkey sever relations between Egypt and Israel and recognize the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Monday, July 16

**VOWING TO SET** a "clear goal" for the nation, President Jimmy Carter told the American people in a long-awaited speech that the United States will never use more foreign oil than it did in 1977. Mr. Carter indicated that it will be up to this country to provide its own energy resources "for dependence on foreign oil must be stopped dead in its tracks right now..." The President appeared very optimistic that the nation could supply its own energy needs reminding the American people that they must begin to conserve energy.

Tuesday, July 17

**PREVILED JIMMY CARTER** unveiled his energy program of \$142 billion to the National Association of County officials in Kansas City. Mr. Carter warned Americans that they must stop wasting energy and stressed further that the oil companies must cooperate if this nation is to cut its use of oil 50 percent by 1990. The President also urged Congress to pass the windfall profits tax on the oil industry. "It's time for us to take hold action," Mr. Carter declared, "and we will."

## Benefits Of YSD Reviewed

**Bureau's Final Monthly Report Also Eyes Cases Referred During First Half of Year**

The Youth Service Division, (YSD), last monthly report was completed last week and it reviewed the bureau's accomplishments since it became fully operational in August 1970, along with cases referred to it by local police departments for the first six months of the year.

As a result of the School Board's action on June 18, at which time it voted to no longer participate in the service and withdraw its financial support, the YSD was terminated on Saturday, June 30.

"During its nine years of operation the division has been thoughtfully studied by other law enforcement agencies as a prototype of needed specialized service to assist the juvenile into responsible adulthood and of its concept of multiple community service" according to the June report.

**Free to Turn**  
(The division was financed by the public school system and the five Pointe communities, which it served.)

## Grosse Pointe Theater Announces New Season, Gives 'Clarence' Awards

**Cole Porter Musical Kicks Off 1979-80 Year, Which Also Features Different Concept of Performance For Group; More Than 20 Artists Receive Honors**

"Anything Goes!", the delightful 1934 Cole Porter musical, will kick off Grosse Pointe Theater's, (GPT), 1979-80 season. The tune-filled show, which features such Porter classics like "I Get A Kick Out of You," "You're The Top" and "Blow, Gabriel, Blow!", will open GPT's 32nd consecutive season.

The Porter musical will run for nine performances October 24 to 28, 30, 31 and November 1 to 3—all in the Fries Auditorium of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore road. It will be directed by Pat Villegas of Lincoln road.

Auditions, (open to anyone), for the cast of 39 actors, dancers and singers will be held at the GPT rehearsal studio, 1833 Vernier road, (near Mack avenue), August 18 and 19 from 1 to 5 p.m.

**Touch of Gold**  
GPT's new season was announced by its recently-elected president, Tom Gallagher of Hampton road, at its 23rd annual "Clarence" awards dinner-dance Saturday evening, July 14, in the Columbus Ballroom of the Detroit Plaza Hotel. About 225 members and guests attended.

"Clarence," a comedy by Booth Tarkington, was GPT's very first presentation in 1948.

Last year's president, Dale Pegg of Fairholme road, was host for the event. Gold "Clarence" statuettes were presented by last year's winners, who were introduced by Judge George Bashara of Sunningdale drive, and Lillian Hicks of St. Clair avenue.

The awards covered 23 acting, directing and technical categories for shows in the 1978-79 season.

Nine acting and directing winners were chosen by members, (who must see all shows to qualify), with the results tabulated by Park Mayor Matthew C. Patterson. The 14 technical awards were determined by a committee composed of the board of directors, and the director, producer, stage manager and technical director of each show.

**Some Shows Tie**  
"Clarence" award winners included best director, Joyce Schultheiss of Lincoln road; for "Two by Two"; best actress, Lois Bendler of St. Clair Shores, for her role as Anna in "The King and I"; and Dennis Wickline of St. Clair Shores, who played Nosh in "Two by Two."

## Kercheval Program Underway

**Revitalization Project in Park Moving Forward As Council Seeks Bids for Work**

The ball is beginning to roll on revitalization plans for Kercheval avenue in The Park.

Park City Manager John R. Crawford said the city is currently receiving bids for work on Kercheval and that a "good portion" of the work should be completed by the end of the year.

So far, about the only thing that has begun on the revitalization project is the resurfacing of Kercheval avenue.

**Distinct Look**  
The Kercheval revitalization project is being funded through 1978 and 1979 Community Development Block Grants, (CDBG), of \$39,000 each. The project is expected to use at least \$275,000 in federal funds over the next three years.

The Park Council approved the revitalization project in January. It was designed by architects John Stevens and Associates to give Kercheval a physical appearance distinct from businesses that lined the street across Alter road in Detroit.

The Stevens plan basically calls for widened curbs, decorative lighting, street furniture and landscaping.

At the moment, the three and a half block commercial strip, beginning at Westburn road and ending just east of Beaconsfield avenue, is marked with rundown buildings, and an overall deteriorating look. One of these rundown buildings, the former Dump Bar which has been vacant for about four years, was purchased by the city for \$32,000 over the next 10 years at five percent interest.

## City to Be Site Of 'Space Age' Experiments

**Computer Communications Firm Gets Approval to Test Remote Reading System on Utilities of Municipality**

Several dozen homes in The City will participate in an experiment this fall that may—or will, if you listen to some—revolutionize the way we communicate with one another through a maze of computer systems.

The City Council gave its approval this week to the firm, Datavision, Inc., to install a network of small computers on telephone poles and 30 to 50 houses in the community. The microcomputers have the ability to transmit just about any kind of information you can think of from the home to a central office.

Datavision will be testing, at its own cost, the system's ability to accurately read water meters from a remote location—without going to the trouble of sending a man out to do the job. If applied throughout the city, the system could save thousands of dollars and hundreds of man hours a year.

**A Bit Seary**  
The test will cost the firm between \$30,000 and \$50,000 according to president Maurice Hogan, a resident of The Farms. The hundreds of possible applications of the new technology make that cost well worthwhile, he said.

"If we're successful with this test, we're off and running," Mr. Hogan told the council at its Monday, July 16, meeting.

"Edison will be looking at us, Bell telephone will be looking at us. The possibilities are endless."

By adding more computers in the homes, the system could be used for emergency, fire and burglary signals, or tax and court reporting systems and even voting. Mr. Hogan said.

City council members were fascinated with Mr. Hogan's presentation Monday, and seemed a little awestruck by its possibilities.

"Why does all this sound like 1984?" asked Councilman Arthur Fetters. "You're scaring me a bit."

**Goes Piggyback**

## Four Cities Set to Share In Program

**County Announces That Farms, Park, City And Woods to Receive Combined Total of Around \$400,000 in Community Development Block Grant Monies for 1979**

Wayne County announced last week four Grosse Pointe cities will share close to \$400,000 in 1979 Community Development Block Grants for projects ranging from underground water main repair in The Woods to new roofs for homes in The City.

The funds are part of a \$6.1 million grant received by Wayne County from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The county sought the funds on behalf of 31 cities which earlier this year submitted projects for consideration. The communities expect official approval in writing shortly.

The basic grant is split between cities according to population. The Farms and Park will each get \$99,000, The City, \$80,000 and The Woods, \$120,000. The Shores does not participate.

**Number of Projects**  
The projects are developed by individual cities and reflect their varying needs. Wayne County considers them in light of its own program goals—to help low and moderate income residents, to rehabilitate neighborhoods and facilitate economic development, among others.

Farms City Clerk Richard Solak said his community will use the grant to repave Mapleton and Muir roads, to plant trees on the hill, and to link water mains underneath Kercheval and Meadow lane.

The Park's entire grant will be used to continue a massive, three-year project to spruce up the Kercheval in The Park commercial district with new sidewalks, parking lots, landscaping and lighting.

The City's funds will be spent on a number of small projects, some new and some continuing. Part of the grant will be used for housing revitalization grants and loans to citizens, a program now entering its second year.

The grant also will buy The City new street lights for the Village shopping district and several hundred smoke alarms for installation in the homes of low and moderate income residents and senior citizens.

**Contribute to SOC**  
It will fund the widening of Notre Dame avenue from Waterloo to the alley north of Kercheval and a program to promote tree preservation and replacement, according to Community Development Coordinator Lee Birmingham. Woods City Administrator (Continued on Page 9)

## Pointe Rains Not So Bad

You'd think we'd gotten as much rain last week as anybody possibly could.

Not so. Although the U. S. Weather Service station at Detroit Metropolitan Airport didn't get quite as much rain on Monday, July 9, as did The Farms' Moross road filtration plant, (1.06 inches as compared to 1.44 inches), it more than made up for the difference during the rains on Wednesday, July 11.

That day saw 3.0 inches fall on the airport, while the Pointes received a relative sprinkling of only .47 of an inch.

If it weren't for that Wednesday, though, the two weather stations would be running pretty close. The airport station has reported a total of 20.49 inches so far this year. (as of Friday, July 13), while The Farms reports about 18 inches for the same period.

For a change of pace, the Grosse Pointe Summer Music Festival's fourth concert of the season will feature the New England Conservatory Ragtime Ensemble in an outdoor performance.

It will be held on Wednesday, July 25, and staged on the War Memorial Terrace, 32 Lakeshore road, overlooking Lake St. Clair at 8 p.m. In case of rain the concert will be held in the Memorial's Fries Auditorium.

There'll be plenty of rollicking to rags like Joplin's "The Maple Leaf Rag," which started the whole ragtime craze way back in 1899, (the ragtime era), and other classics such as Jelly Roll Morton's "Smokehouse Blues," Joseph Lamb's "Sen- (Continued on Page 2)

sation Rag," James Scott's "Grace And Beauty" and Eubie Blake's "Charleston Rag."

The New England Conservatory Ragtime Ensemble made its world debut in 1972 at the Romantic Music Festival held in the New England Conservatory's Jordan Hall, Boston, Mass.

Performing the now-famous "Red Back Book" collection of composer Scott Joplin, the group's premier proved an instant success and has since become known internationally, earning it much acclaim wherever it plays.

The Ensemble was founded by Conservatory president Gunther Schumier who is the Ensemble's official conductor. For its Grosse Pointe (Continued on Page 2)

(Continued from Page 1) debut on July 25, the Ensemble's clarinetist Bruce Creditor will be the musical director.

The Ensemble of 16 members includes string and wind sections as well as brass, piano and guitar. Its repertoire includes the music of such composers as Eubie Blake, James Scott, Tom Turpin and Jelly Roll Morton, as well as that of Joplin, the king of ragtime.

Director Creditor's colleagues include Mark Belair, drums; Phoebe Carrai, cello; Robert Carraker, tuba; Leonard Matyzanski, violin; Paul Meyers, guitar and banjo; and Iva Milch, flute.

More are Mary O'Reilly and Pattison Story, violins; Christopher O'Riley, piano; Lawrence Ragant, French horn; Donald Sanders, trombone; Richard Sarpolo, bass; Richard Sharp, bassoon; Claudia Wann, oboe; and Robert Winkler, trumpet.

In December 1972, the group recorded its first and now all-time best-selling recording, "Scott Joplin: The Red Back Book." The album earned the Grammy Award from the National Academy of Recording Arts for the Best Chamber Music Performance of 1973.

A year later, the group recorded "More Scott Joplin Rags" of which several of the Joplin works were orchestrated by Mr. Schuller himself, and of these, many were included in the musical score for the motion picture "The Sting."

Little known is the fact that the young Conservatory Ragtimers, (seniors and post-graduates), were invited to record the music for the score, but couldn't because of school commitments.

Sparking a ragtime revival in the United States, the Ragtime Ensemble made numerous television and concert appearances.

Among them were performances at Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall in New York, the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C., and at the White House during a state dinner for Italian President Giovanni Leone in 1974.

In January 1977, the young instrumentalists participated in the Inaugural Concert Series, a part of the official festivities surrounding President Jimmy Carter's inauguration.

In September 1974, the Ragtime Ensemble made its European debut in Rotterdam, the Netherlands. Other European appearances followed in Groningen, Haarlem, and at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam. A second European tour took it to the Bergen Festival in Norway and a concert in Lisbon, Portugal.

At the request of the Soviet Union Government, the Ensemble recently made a tour of 19 Russian cities, playing to huge audiences.

For years most people considered ragtime as corny music played in beer halls and pizza parlors. But it was happy music and people loved to sing along with it.

Almost totally forgotten by

the general public, and after some 70 years, ragtime emerges again with an impact on both the classical and popular scene—moving from the saloon to the concert hall.

It is now considered America's first and most unique contribution to music literature.

Adding to the evening's ragtime mood there also will be a "motor city" attraction of antique Packard cars which will drive in, (on their own steam), for the festivities.

About 15 models ranging from 1925 to 1958, including sedans, convertibles, coupes, limousines, custom-made super eights and the Patrician will be parked for viewing during picnic-time.

The cars hold values from

\$3,000 to \$75,000 each. The Packard's life span was from 1899 to 1958. Ward E. Collins of Hazel Park is supervisor of the Packard Automobile Classics show.

Two musical displays are being shown in behalf of the Music Festival. One is held in the Central Library, 10 Kercheval avenue, which devotes one complete case to Staffordshire pottery toby jugs of Gilbert and Sullivan Operetta characters.

The operettas were written for the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company and the jugs were designed in collaboration with the company to exactly duplicate their costumes. The handsome collection is shown by courtesy of Painter Philip Leon.

It was made possible through the efforts of William T. Peters, director of the Grosse Pointe Public Library, and Mrs. Francis M. Huxley, professional assistant at the Central branch and display supervisor.

The St. Clair street side of Jacobson's store of Grosse Pointe shows a window theme of "A Musical Transition." Display artist Judy Vince did the designing under the supervision of David Murray, display director. Store manager Clarence F. Wascher continues in the festival's support of many years.

The festival, sponsored by the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association, closes on Wednesday, August 1, with a Cabaret Potpourri of music from Bach to pops.

Featured will be the Golden Rain Percussion Ensemble, Pastiche Wind Quintet and Detroit Civic Brass Quintet. The groups are in residence of the Detroit Community Music School to which the evening pays a salute. They will perform in the Memorial's Crystal Ballroom of the Fries Auditorium.

The Memorial grounds will open at 6 p.m., for pre-concert picnic enjoyment, (concert time is 8 p.m.) Concertgoers may bring their own picnic fixin's or order box suppers from the Memorial kitchen. In case of rain picnickers will move indoors.

Single admission is \$8.50 and single student admission is \$4.25. Supper boxes are \$4.50 each by reservation three days in advance.

Lawn admission for the July 25 concert only is \$4.50. Advance ticket orders may be obtained by mailing checks payable to the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore road, Grosse Pointe Farms 48236.

## Pennario's Pointe Piano Recital Debut Pleasing

It was another triumphant evening for the Grosse Pointe Summer Music Festival at its second concert held on Wednesday, July 11, when pianist Leonard Pennario brought the full house down with an instant standing ovation of "bravos."

He was heard in the Fries Auditorium of the War Memorial. Maria Ewing, Metropolitan Opera star, opened the 1979 season on Wednesday, June 20.

Mr. Pennario, a frequent soloist with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, has performed under symphony conductors Sixten Ehrling, Sir Alexander Gibson, Eugene Jochum, Andre Kostelanetz and Paul Paray.

He took to the piano at a very early age. Even in kindergarten he was already a proficient player. His professional debut was made with

the Dallas Symphony at the age of 12.

As to preference of recital work to symphonic performances, he said, "I like both — they're exciting and necessary," while adding, "I also enjoy chamber playing."

An avid bridge-player, he travels to Grosse Pointe almost every year to participate in the War Memorial's bridge tournaments.

When asked how he felt about his Grosse Pointe piano recital debut, he said, "I was delighted. Grosse Pointe is one of my favorite places and I enjoy the beautiful ambience of the War Memorial."

The audience, finally at ease with the rains diminishing and Skylab's landing, listened to an attractive program. Mr. Pennario played magnificently and unaffectionately, earmarking true musicianship.

In the first half of the program he played Debussy's Images, Book I and Schubert's Sonata in B flat, Op. Posth.

He continued with Prokofiev's Visions Fugitives, a Mazurk and The Banjo by Gottschalk, Pavane pour une Infante defunte by Ravel and Liszt's Fantasia quasi Sonata. Very generous with his encores, Mr. Pennario chose Debussy's Reverie, five Chopin preludes and the Ritual Fire Dance by De Falla, after which the stage lights dimmed, ending the exciting evening.

Mrs. Sterling S. Sanford, festival chairman, was delighted with the evening's success. During intermission she said what she already knew when she invited Leonard Pennario, "We've got a top pianist!"

## Man Drowns Off GP Farms

A Southgate man drowned while swimming off of a 36-foot cruiser about 100 feet off Lakeshore road in The Farms on Thursday, July 12. Kenneth Eugene Forte, 45, was on board with nine co-workers on a late afternoon cruise when they decided to go swimming off the boat. The accident occurred at 6:30 p.m. right off Provincial road.

The boat's owner, Charles P. Lutz of Sterling Heights, told Farms police that he saw Mr. Forte begin swimming toward shore while other men aboard lowered a dinghy to paddle around in. Mr. Forte was gone when he looked again.

He said the group, all Ford executives, have been having similar outings for several years, and that Mr. Forte had had only two beers at the most before going swimming.

The body was recovered just over two hours after the drowning by the Detroit Police Harbormaster Division. It was taken to the Farms Pier Park boathouse and transferred to the Wayne County Medical Examiner, which officially ruled the cause of death accidental drowning.

Five civilian divers, as well as Officer Michael Kenyon of The Shores, helped in the search for the body.

Relatives of Mr. Forte told police they were unaware of any health problems he may have had.

Woods resident Robert Gillard, one of the men aboard the boat, told police he saw Mr. Forte go under and not come up, after which several of the men on board went in to look for him. The Coast Guard was contacted, and they, in turn, called the Harbormaster.

Police said there were two wounds on the victim's face, a puncture wound to the eye and a slight cut to the face, but they were apparently caused by the dragging hooks.

## Class of 1974 Slates Reunion

### Report Reviews YSD's Accomplishments

(Continued from Page 1) the Senate Congressional Record, June 15, 1973.

The report cites several long-term benefits up over the years including the following:

- An established, by word of mouth, reputation of comfortable communication and trust that make the juvenile and his family feel free to turn to the agency for assistance. Such assistance was a combination of authority, discipline and sympathetic, professional understanding, to which most youngsters and their parents responded positively.
- A working police/school liaison.
- Innovative Approach

- Knowledge of drug abuse, its control or lack of, and continuing updated scientific knowledge regarding the effects of drugs on the drug abuser and his offspring.
- Continued development of expertise and acumen in juvenile law and the juvenile code, the operation of the juvenile court and extended community resources on the tri-county level.
- Consolidated reference files for the local police departments, with such files also being utilized by authorities in St. Clair Shores, Harper Woods, Detroit and Macomb County Juvenile Court personnel.

In saying he has received few comments from members of the community on the YSD's demise, Woods City

Administrator Chester E. Petersen, who was the division's coordinator since its inception, (as The Woods was the managing municipality), said the YSD was an innovative approach in fighting a serious drug problem which existed in the schools and community in the early 1970s.

"We take pride in the contributions the YSD made in resolving some of the serious and apparent drug problems, plus the need for counseling for the young people," he stated.

But, he continued, it apparently has outlived its need and time, with each community now having to provide for its own juvenile service.

**Schedule Meeting**  
"The division has received acclamations from all over the United States and has now apparently run its course, and the people feel it's no longer necessary."

Mr. Petersen added members who comprised the YSD's board of managers were scheduled to meet Tuesday morning, July 17, (after press time), to officially close the books on the division. The members include all Pointe city managers and a School Board representative.

A total of 72 cases were referred to the YSD, two of which proved to be unfounded, last month, making the total for the year, 469, a decline from last year's six month total of 489. (The division set a case load record of 1,028 reports in 1978.)

Malicious destruction of property reports, 19, one of which was unfounded, was the category of highest incidence. Identified as involved were five juvenile males, one juvenile female, one adult male and two adult females. Nine cases were suspended. Larceny, 16 cases, burglary, four, robbery unarmed, two, involved 25 juvenile males, accompanied by three adult males. Five cases were suspended.

**Arson Reports**  
Six violations of controlled substances reports were received, with five being marijuana or hashish cases, along with one violation of liquor laws report, i.e., minors in possession. The other drug case was for synthetic drugs.

Meanwhile, five runaway reports involved 10 girls and one boy. Seven girls and the boy were apprehended and turned over to their parent or guardian, while two girls were found by their parents. One girl voluntarily turned herself in at a police station.

Three attempt abduction reports also occurred, with one being unfounded. Another proved to be a misrepresentation or misunderstanding by a young boy, while the last is suspended pending the receipt of new information.

In other cases, three arson reports also were handled, two in schools and one at a place of business. The two school incidents were deliberately set, with one being suspended and the other remaining under investigation. The incident at the busi-

ness establishment was thought possibly to have been the work, (accidental or deliberate), of an eight-year-old boy. However, his mother stated he had been at home with her that day.

Eighteen applications for petition were submitted to the Wayne County Juvenile Court, one of which has received court action. One application for petition submitted in May received court action in June.

**City Shows Hike**  
With the close of the YSD, a total of 15 cases was returned to originating departments for their continuing investigation.

For the first half of 1979, four of the communities showed a decline in cases referred to the division in comparison to last year, with only The City having an increase, (from 42 to 53).

The Woods' total dropped from 255 to 241, while The Park's amount fell from 93 to 83. The Farms' total decreased slightly from 92 to 89, while The Shores' amount dropped from seven to three.

(Continued from Page 1) could have raised more money if I had concentrated more on solicitations."

**Getting Name Around**  
Dorothy Kennel won a seat on the Board by coming in second place on June 11. She was next in line in expenditures, too, spending about half of what Mr. Dalby did.

Her campaign cost about \$2,560, with a round \$100 from her own pocket. The rest of her contributions came in \$5 to \$40 amounts with one \$150 donation from Delta Kappa Gamma, an honorary society for women in education. Mrs. Kennel is a retired Grosse Pointe teacher.

Former North High School teacher Brian Killian spent about \$1,170 on his campaign and George Fitzgerald spent about \$1,200, all out of his own pocket. They came in fourth and eighth place, respectively.

Where does all the money go to? Mrs. Kennel said postage and newspaper ads were some of her biggest expenditures. Mr. Fitzgerald's money went to printing more than 13,000 bumper stickers, billboards and pamphlets. Mrs. Kennel, who ran for the Board unsuccessfully

once before, said she figures \$2,500 is about "rock bottom" for running a school board campaign. "You've got to get your name around and that costs money. My postage bill alone was more than \$600."

The Campaign Finance Act is still causing some confusion among candidates, especially those running for local offices.

Out of about 250 school board candidates in Wayne County last month, 26 missed the Wednesday, July 11, filing date. An automatic \$10 a day fine is levied for late reports.

Only one of the Grosse Pointe candidates, Leonard Witulski, had not filed by Monday, July 16.

 Chester E. Petersen said a big chunk of that city's grant, \$82,000, will finance completion of a water main loop in the northwest area of the community. In that neighborhood, a traffic study, curb ramps and a contemplated, permanent cul-de-sac in Brys drive also will be paid for by the grant.

In addition, The Woods and Farms will contribute \$10,000 and \$5,000 respectively, from the basic grants to the Seniors Onward for Change, (SOC), minor home repair program.

Besides the basic, per capita grants, cities can apply for Community Development funds under three other county programs — housing rehabilitation, special needs and innovative projects.

Both The City and Park have made 1979 applications for housing rehabilitation funds to continue programs each already has underway to restore and renovate older homes in the communities.

The City has requested \$40,000 and The Park, \$100,000. Decisions on funding have not yet been made.

**Growing Program**  
 All four Pointe communities will work together on a single, ambitious program that may be funded under the innovative projects classification.

That program is aimed at studying ways to prevent the spread of blight from Detroit onto Mack avenue, which runs through the northern parts of all four cities.

County officials are scheduled to decide on funding for that project at a meeting Wednesday, June 18.  
 The City and Park have received annual grants from the Community Development program since 1975 and The Woods since 1978.  
 This is the first year The Farms has been successful in winning funds.  
 Wayne County began compiling grants from small, out-county communities in 1975, when it won just over \$800,000 for 17 participating cities.  
 The program has grown tremendously since then to include 31 cities and the combined grant of \$6.1 million for 1979.

(Continued from Page 1) strange now, but predicted, "in five years everyone will have a computer at home. And it will seem as natural as having a telephone."

The council gave its endorsement by a unanimous vote. Councilman Lorenzo Browning abstained from the vote, saying he may have a conflict of interest. Councilman George Henry was not present.

The proposed system will piggyback on the Michigan Bell telephone lines already in existence. It will use audio signals that can travel on Bell's lines. Small computers will be stationed on poles throughout the testing site and lines will be run from them to the homes, Mr. Hogan said.

Eventually, Datavision plans to replace those lines to the home with small transmitters on the poles, he added.

If it works, the system will be able to read the meters in 20 seconds. It will print accounting records and bills within 30 minutes.

The microcomputers will be installed on a voluntary basis on City homes. They may be located outside, next to the existing water meters, or inside the home.

The tests will run through October, November and December of this year. Mr. Hogan said it's the first time such equipment has been field tested in the U.S.

Window breakings at the Kercheval location were reported on April 2 and May 6, with the latter occurring only six days after two black solicitors were arrested in The Park for selling magazines without a permit. The Inter-Faith Center later came forward and said that the two solicitors received "harsh" fines only because they were black.

Mr. Egnatios indicated that a building kitty-corner to the center also has been recently riddled with B-B gun pellets.

"We are not a threat to anyone and I don't understand why this is happening," Mr. Egnatios said.

Chief Counce said the center requested that surveillance of its office be stepped up during the evening.

(Continued from Page 1) The agreement between the city and the present owners spelled out that the owners must pay \$8,000 in outstanding taxes on the property over a three year period.

**Block at A Time**

"The purchase of the bar would be in keeping with the overall redevelopment of Kercheval avenue," Mr. Crawford told the Park Council before it approved the bar purchase at its regular meeting Monday, July 9.

Mr. Crawford said the city is planning to eventually tear down the bar and resurface it to provide a 22-space off-street parking lot.

The overall intent of the revitalization project is to make Kercheval avenue a "service center" of interior decorators, printing services, doctors, animal clinics, et al., as opposed to a retail shopping center evident in The Village.

The Stevens plan doesn't call for any specific architectural mode such as the Colonial theme in The Woods.

Mr. Crawford stated that plans are to begin work at Wayburn and then move east a block at a time.

Although the Community Development Block Grant program for Kercheval avenue does not allocate funds to businessmen to spruce up their property, a federally funded 312 Rehabilitation program providing low-interest loans to businessmen is supplementing city plans for Kercheval.

**Can Borrow Money**


The 312 loan program was approved by the Park Council in April and allows businessmen on Kercheval as well as on Mack, Charlevoix and Jefferson avenue, to borrow up to \$100,000 to improve their buildings and repair code violations.

Mr. Crawford indicated that about 17 businessmen have applied for loans already, but at least four of them did not meet the loan's requirement of owning the property for which the loan was being made.

The revitalization program and the 312 loan program have been met with much opposition, especially from POP, (Prud of The Park), who vehemently opposed any federal funding because of certain "strings" that may be attached to CDBG programs.

POP's main objection is using federal monies to rehabilitate housing. However, they are basically in favor of the Kercheval revitalization project because it involves commercial property.

### Mackinac Race Starts Saturday

Over 270 yachts are registered to sail in the 85th annual Port Huron to Mackinac race sponsored by the Bayview Yacht Club.

The event, which begins Saturday, July 21, is the highlight of the racing sailors' season. The course, 259 nautical miles long, usually takes three to four days to complete, but can last much longer, depending on the fickle winds of summer.

Just over 100 of the boats will sail under the International Offshore Rule, (IOR), which is for newer yachts incorporating the latest in racing design.

The remainder compete with each other under performance handicap ratings, (PRF), so that, theoretically, each boat has an equal chance of winning, no matter what its size or how old. IOR and PRF boats do not race against each other, however.

Every boat competing is required to have dozens of safety devices, including safety flares, harnesses, life rings with attached strobe light, radio transmitter, and a life raft capable of carrying the entire crew, just to name a few. Other requirements are for navigation

equipment and the crew's accommodations.

Each yacht is being inspected for the equipment this year prior to the race. Keeping Bayview's 30-man inspection committee quite busy. All yachts are subject to reinspection, and boats which place will be mandatorily re-inspected at the island.

One of the biggest collections of Grosse Pointers away from Grosse Pointe can be seen tomorrow night, July 20, around the Black River in Port Huron, where the fleet moors the night before the race.

Those sailors who wish to get a good night's sleep either spend the night in a motel or tie up in Sarnia, Ont., away from the crowds and parties which last late into the night.

Then it's up early next morning for the cruise to the starting line, miles out in Lake Huron. Smaller boats are started first, so that the large boats pass them along the way to the Cove Island Light, located just off the entrance to Georgian Bay.

After rounding the buoy, the boats turn west until the finish off Mackinac Island, more parties and the long-awaited, uninterrupted sleep.

### WSU Athletic Director Retires

Joel G. Mason, Wayne State University's men's athletic coordinator and former basketball coach, recently announced his retirement after 32 years of service, effective immediately.

Mason, a native of Iron River, Mich., and a Pointe resident, has become a legend at Wayne State. The list of his achievements and con-

tributions to Wayne State and athletics in general is endless, according to a university news release.

A 1936 graduate of Western Michigan University, Mason excelled in sports and earned two varsity letters in football for the Broncos. Following his collegiate career, he played seven years of professional football with the Chicago Cardinals and the Green Bay Packers.

He was always known as the "other end" for Green Bay, as he played opposite football Hall-of-Famer, Don Hutson.

Mason also played professional basketball during the off seasons for the Sheboygan Redskins, then one of the top pro teams, which has since become the Atlanta Hawks. He then left the professional ranks to become an assistant football coach for Wayne State in 1946.

After coaching football for two years, Mason took over the reins of the Wayne State basketball team following the

resignation of Newman Ertell in 1948. Mason was only the third man to coach basketball in Wayne State University history.

In the early 1950's, Mason brought Wayne State into midwest contention. The Tartars won 17 consecutive games in the 1955-56 season and made it as far as the NCAA Basketball finals in Iowa City, Iowa.

They were tough, defeating DePaul, 72-63, before falling in the second half to Kentucky, 84-64. That was the only time Wayne State has ever participated in the NCAA basketball tournament.

Mason coached such basketball greats as Noah Brown, Ernie Wagner, Johnny Kline and Charlie Primas. It was Primas who dubbed him "The Count," a name which only hints at the amount of respect Mason commanded from his players.

In his 18 years of coaching basketball at Wayne State, Mason compiled a 186-

173 record and is still cited as the winningest basketball coach in WSU history. He posted his best season mark, 18-3, in 1955-56, the year of the NCAA basketball tournament.

Mason stepped down as head basketball coach in 1966 and continued as a physical education professor until 1970 when he became the Wayne State golf coach. In 1974, Mason was appointed men's athletic coordinator along with his duties as golf coach.

The 68-year-old "Count" is not sure just how he'll spend his retirement. He plans to coach golf at Oakland University during the golf season and "just freelance around."

One thing is for sure though, "Count" Mason will always be counted among the very best at Wayne State University.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 10.4 OF CHAPTER 126 OF TITLE X OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE BY AMENDING SECTION 9.3 OF THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE FOR CITIES, TOWNSHIPS, AND VILLAGES.

Section 9.3 of Section 10.4 of Chapter 126 of Title X of the Grosse Pointe City Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### Section 9.3

"Penalty. Any provision of this ordinance which describes an act or omission which constitutes a civil infraction under the terms of the Michigan Vehicle Code, being 1949 P.A. 300 as amended, shall be processed as a civil infraction and any person found to have committed a civil infraction may be ordered to pay a civil fine of not more than \$100 and costs in accordance with section 907 of the Michigan Vehicle Code.

Violation of any other provision of this ordinance not constituting a civil infraction, as herein provided, shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment for not more than 90 days or by both such fine and imprisonment."

# Lochmoor Club Faces Hearing

A complaint from an unknown source that the Lochmoor Club, 1018 Sunningdale drive, was allegedly permitting minors to serve alcoholic beverages led to a Woods Public Safety Department investigation and a charge that the club violated a section of the Michigan Liquor Control Act and Rules.

Det. Thomas Podeszwik said the affected section governs minors and indicates that a licensee shall not allow any person under 18 years of age to work or

entertain on a paid or voluntary basis on a licensed premises where alcoholic liquor is being served.

The section also says the rule does not apply if the person is under the direct supervision or control of a parent or guardian.

A hearing before the Liquor Control Commission could transpire within four to six weeks, he said.

The incident unfolded when Det. Podeszwik received a call on Tuesday afternoon, July 10, from a male who refused to identify himself or meet with an officer. The complainant said minors were serving alcoholic beverages at the club, adding that he knew one waitress was 17.

A short time later the detective and Public Safety Director John Dankel took seats at the bar section of the dining area.

Det. Podeszwik said both ordered a drink and were served by the bartender. They remained at the bar for around 45 minutes and said they did not see anyone being served who appeared to be under age, nor did they observe any of the younger waitresses or waiters serving drinks to persons at occupied tables.

However, late the following morning they visited the club again to continue the investigation, with their waitress being the girl identified by the complainant.

The detective said she inquired if they would like a cocktail before lunch and both were served. While serving the meal, she made further inquiries regarding additional cocktails.

Afterward, Det. Podeszwik said club manager F. Eugene Rawlins was informed of the incident, with the waitress saying she wouldn't be 18 until this September.

In commenting upon the case, Mr. Rawlins said there is no provision on employment applications for a prospective employee's age because of federal law and provisions governing discrimination.

Indicating the difficult position it puts an employer in, he added if an employee is hired in the future, (in relation to the serving of alcoholic beverages), he hoped that the individual would share his or her age because club officials would find it out eventually.

A Wayne County Circuit Court hearing for a 39-year-old Detroit man who's charged with robbery armed, (R/A), and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony was postponed from Thursday, July 12, to today, July 19, reported Woods Exec. Lt. Jack Patterson.

The suspect, James Lynn Thomas of Marlborough street, is allegedly involved in holding up the Steak and Eggs Restaurant, 20195 Mack avenue, on June 16.

Besides the charge in The Woods, Thomas also is facing two R/A charges in Detroit, police said.

In the Steak and Eggs incident, which occurred around 4:40 a.m., a total of around \$275 was taken by the suspect, who carried a revolver in his belt which he didn't remove.

Thomas was arrested a day later around 3:10 a.m. for a traffic violation in the city. At the time he was stopped, police observed that he fit the description of the robbery suspect, including physical build and checked trousers.

**Know Your Schools**  
By Dr. William Coats,

Although the regular schedule of classes has concluded for the year, during the summer there are many programs conducted by the school system. In a series of columns between now and September 1 will use this space to summarize those activities.

Our Department of Community Services has initiated a new summer track program this year that has over 130 students of all age levels and even some adults participating in two four-week sessions of track and field events under the direction of Steve Zaranek, a former runner at North High School and presently the assistant track coach at South High.

The first session of three morning practices a week for students 14 and under and four evenings a week for high school students and adults concluded last week with a meet between the participants in which they showed their running, hurdling, high and long jumping and shot-putting skills.

Although no one ran a four-minute mile, many good performances were turned in and everyone had a great time showing how much they had benefited from the practices.

Students from the first session who are continuing with the practices and new students in the second session which started this week also have the opportunity to participate in a Track and Field Open Meet which is co-sponsored by the Department of Community Services and the Grosse Pointe Track Club on Saturday, July 21, at North High School.

The all-day meet is expected to draw many competitors from the metropolitan area and is an attraction some residents may wish to see.

Two other new summer-time activities offered by the department are wrestling and gymnastics programs. The wrestling program is a continuation of one started during the school year, and is under the direction of North High wrestling coach Larry Aceto.

A dozen boys have been working hard this summer at learning wrestling fundamentals and participating in practice matches. The instruction provided by coach Aceto is individualized for the wrestlers so that each boy receives maximum benefit from the two-afternoon-a-week practice sessions.

Those participating in the program show a wide range of ability ranging from absolute beginners to North High ninth grader Pat Marlow, who recently returned from Japan where he was on tour as a member of the Michigan AAU Cultural Exchange Wrestling Team representing the United States.

Students in the gymnastics program are coached by Colleen Bown and Jan Mason, the respective coaches of North and South High teams during the school year. In this program, 170 girls and boys are receiving instruction and supervised practice in vaulting, uneven parallel bars, balance beam, floor exercise and tumbling skills.

From the way they practice, many of these young gymnasts undoubtedly picture themselves in some future Olympics.

In addition to these new offerings, the summer basketball program which has been conducted at both high schools for several years was offered again this summer.

One hundred and twenty-five girls and boys from sixth grade through high school learned basic fundamentals and increased their skill level by participating in various drills and scrimmages under the coaching of Ray Ritter at North High and Chuck Hollosy at South High.

One of the high points of the program was a presentation on basketball skills by Bob Sherwood of the Pro-Keds Company.

Although some of these activities have concluded, second sessions of track and gymnastics are starting this week. Persons interested in further information about the programs may call the Department of Community Services at 343-2160.

**Report Shows GPS Leads Way in New Construction**

The number of permits for residential construction in southeast Michigan continued to rise during 1978, according to a recent report from the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, (SEMCOG).

According to the report, "Residential Construction in Southeast Michigan - 1978, the number of new housing units authorized increased from 27,252 in 1977 to 27,849 in 1978, a hike of 2.2 percent.

This total includes an increase in single family housing units from 19,463 to 19,779, and 253 more housing units in multi-family housing.

In The Pointe, The Shores led the way with a net total of 20 permits issued, followed by The Park with 13, The Woods and Farms with 10 each and The City with three. Harper Woods, meanwhile, had a net total of one.

All of The Shores' permits were for detached single family units, while The Park had 12 for single family units, a pair for two-family units and one demolition for its net total of 13.

Both The Woods and Farms had 11 permits issued for single family units in addition to one demolition for their net total of 10. The City had six permits for single family units plus three demolitions, for its net total of three. Finally, Harper Woods had two permits for single family units, less one demolition, for its net total of one.

"I'm comfortable with the leveling off in housing construction during 1978 shown by the report," said Justine Barnes, SEMCOG Housing Subcommittee chairperson.

"Although there was only a small increase in housing construction over 1977, there was healthy activity in southeast Michigan's housing industry. Looking ahead to the next six months, we want to see how interest rates, cost of materials, inflation and energy will affect housing construction in the seven-county area."

The City of Detroit showed a 56.3 percent increase in the number of new housing units authorized, the largest percentage increase in the region during 1978.

Macomb County recorded the largest numerical increase in housing permits with 1,117 more permits issued in 1978 than in 1977. Washtenaw and Livingston Counties also showed overall increases in housing permits issued while Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair and Wayne Counties issued somewhat fewer permits in 1978.

The following 10 communities in southeast Michigan issued the largest number of permits for residential construction during 1978:

Canton Township, (1,813), Sterling Heights, (1,700), Clinton Township, (1,554), Farmington Hills, (1,552), Avon Township, (1,383), Troy, (1,057), Southfield, (842), West Bloomfield, (836), Ann Arbor, (732), and Waterford Township (695).

To the Editor,

In response to the article of July 5, "Park Fights Elm Disaster with Big Injection Plan," I would like to point out that the City of Grosse Pointe Park has no big injection plan.

The Park is relying on the U.S. Forestry Service to inject 52 research elms and several confirmed diseased trees on city property. This is a very small number out of the 5,000 trees in Grosse Pointe Park.

The Park and all of Grosse Pointe need an injection program desperately for all elms if we are to retain any trees at all. City-wide injection programs must include privately owned trees, otherwise the program is in vain.

Critical to an injection program is the amount of chemical utilized. If Lignasan BLP is used, the dose must exceed EPA guidelines to be effective. The arborist supervising such a project should have an EPA license to exceed the recommended dose. Lignasan is apparently absorbed into the tree more quickly and is less expensive than Arboret ZOS. Both are effective with arbor-ect possessing a more residual effect.

What can citizens do to save trees?

1. Inspect your elms daily in the summer. Look for yellow leaves or leafing, particularly on the crown.
2. Keep dead wood trimmed out but restrict trimming to early spring and after frost. The Elm Research Institute recommends that all equipment be cleaned between each use with chlorox to kill fungus spores. You expect your doctor to scrub before surgery—expect your tree trimmers to clean their equipment.
3. Have your tree injected; discuss the type of chemical and dosage with the arborist so that you know your tree is getting an effective treatment. At this time yearly injections are indicated. Again, equipment must be clean.
4. Trees infected via root grafts should be removed at once. This type of disease spread is very rapid; whole tree segments die at once often from bottom to top.
5. Trees infected on the crown with minimal disease should be injected at once, perhaps several times during the summer if the disease is not arrested. Dead portions of the tree should be removed to the point where the disease is no longer present in the branch.
6. Call your council members, mayor, public service director and candidates for office to voice your concerns. Immediate action is of utmost importance. Injection programs do work and they are less costly than the expense of cutting down 5,000 elm trees.

**One View from the Capitol**

The House of Representatives unanimously passed a bill recently to limit strip and body cavity searches by law enforcement agencies in Michigan to certain controlled situations.

The bill will now be studied and debated by the Senate where it was expected to be taken up last week.

The legislation was sponsored by my Republican colleague, Rep. Gary Randall of Elwell.

The unanimity of the House on the bill demonstrates, I think, that many representatives realized the need for legislation to protect the most basic of private rights.

There is every indication the Senate is receptive to this bill and I am hopeful we will see final action before the Legislature recesses for the summer, or if not then, by the end of the year.

The measure makes a distinction between strip searches and body cavity searches and sets different monitors for each.

The bill would accomplish the following:

- Exempt persons suspected of misdemeanor offenses from being strip searched unless there was probable cause to believe that they are carrying drugs or weapons.
- Require that a strip search be performed on a suspect by a person of the same sex in a location where it could not be observed by others.
- Require the officer performing the strip or body cavity search to prepare a written report.
- Require a warrant for a body cavity search.
- Require that a body cavity search be conducted by a licensed medical professional who is the same sex as the suspect.

Law enforcement officials violating the provisions of the bill would be charged with a misdemeanor penalty.

The State Police and the County Sheriff's Association both had substantial impact on the legislation as it emerged from the House. Their support is reflected, I believe, in the unanimous House vote to send the bill to the Senate.

College students often are concerned about how their education will help them get a job after graduation. In many cases, they are reacting to an uncertain job market and changing economic patterns.

But, says Dr. Frank Newman, president of the University of Rhode Island, these students are missing the point of an undergraduate education.

At a recent conference on education and work sponsored by the Institute for International Education, Newman offered some guidance to college students.

"My suggestion would be: don't focus nearly so much on a specific career and don't focus nearly so much on trying to get an education that will guarantee you your first job," he said. "What you ought to focus on is your whole life."

Newman pointed out that many people do not continue in the same job field in which they start.

"The plain facts are that every survey has shown that the average graduate of college does two-and-a-half different kinds of things compared to what he or she does immediately following graduation," he said.

Students are much better off to pick a subject they enjoy and study it fully without being afraid of being prevented from ever doing anything else, Newman said.

Students should concentrate on broad skills that will prepare them for a number of situations.
