

TER accepted the resignations of three of his cabinet members and immediately named replacements making it the biggest personnel change in the Carter administration since the President took office two and a half years ago. Those handing in their resignations were Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Joseph A. Califano, Treasury Secretary W. Michael Blumenthal and Attorney General Griffin B. Bell. All three had offered to resign voluntarily at an earlier cabinet meeting.

Saturday, July 21 THE CONTINUED SHAKE-UP of the Carter cabinet ended when President Jimmy Carter accepted the resignations of Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger and Transportation Secretary Brock Adams. The President said later that he was well pleased with the changes he made and felt that the "administration will now be bet-Secretary Charles W. Duncan Jr. will replace Mr. Schlesinger. Mr. Carter indicated that Navy Secretary W. Graham Clayton will serve as transportation secretary for 30 days.



The result of the runoff election held on Monday, July 16, was 7-0, FOP. Police officers who were aligned with the Teamsters apparently boycotted the second election because, as one said, 'We knew we weren't going to win.'

Former president of the police bargaining unit, Patrolman David Teolis said he was hopeful the men could form a good working relationship with the FOP despite the split votes.

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





City Manager Thomas Kressbach said the parking ban approved by the council on the 16th should not in convenience citizens to a great extent.



A unique association of classic boat owners has been formed that is dedicated to the preservation and use of the famous Gar Wood boats.

This group of 50 charter members from several states formally established the Gar Wood Society this month in Syracuse, N.Y., after two years of planning.

Gar Wood boats were built in Marysville, Mich., from the mid-1920's until 1947 and are considered by many experts to be the finest mahogany production speed boats ever built. The original company was founded by Garfield A. Wood, one of the world's best known speed boat racers and industrial inventors.

"Gar Woods" are among the most valuable classic boats in the world and sought after by collectors. However, most Gar Wood boats are still in active use throughout the United States, Canada and Europe.

The Gar Wood Society has a reference library of original literature, brochures, books and memorabilia to assist Gar Wood owners in their quest for information. The society also has identi-

fied a number of members who serve as consultants on particular models and specific years to further assist members on technical advice on restoration or mainte-

nance. Membership in the Gar Wood Society already extends from the northeast to the midwest and California. The society publishes a newsletter, an owners directory, old brochure reprints and a reference of commercial suppliers of replacement parts.




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Energy prices are defvind gravity and soaring up and away. The effects may alter many aspects of our lives, as well as reshape our skylines. With current energy requirements, it takes 13.5 mil-lion barrels of oil to light, heat or cool commercial and

residential buildings in the United States every single day. That is one-third the nation's total energy consumption.

To curb this gargantuan appetite for fuel, the United States Department of Energy is developing "building energy performance standards" which will be proposed this summer.

If adopted, the standards would cause a dramatic drop in energy use in buildings yet to be constructed, and also affect architectural styles.

To determine how best to curb energy use in buildings, he Department of Energy asked designers of more than 100 buildings constructed during the last few years to draw up re-designed plans for the same buildings-but to put energy reduction as the top priority.

The striking findings point the way for significant energy cuts in future construction and may result in proposed energy budgets for new buildings measured in specific thermal units.

Included in the re-designs were high efficiency lights with special reflectors that cut conventional wattage use; automatic motion sensitive systems that turn on lights when someone enters a room and turn them off when the person leaves; heat recovery plans that suck in excess warmth from lights and peo-ple and re-direct the warmth to cooler areas; lower ceil-ings; reshaped walls that minimize southern and northern exposures; and doubleglazed windows which can be opened in summer.
