Thursday, August 2 THE HOUSE OF Representatives approved a bill that gives President Jimmy Carter the authority to order standby rationing if fuel allocation supplies fall 20 percent below the previous year. However, either house in Congress could stop Mr. Carter's rationing plan within 15 days after he orders it. Congressional leaders indi-cated that there is "little chance" of putting the bill into effect that would be acceptable to the President until September. Congressmen will take a month-long congressional recess beginning next week.

Matthew Patterson Leads in Mayoral Race, While Anthony Spada Tops Council Hopefuls

Unofficial results from The Park primary election Tuesday, August 7, spelled a close victory for the present city administration with citizens supporting the three council incumbents and Mayor Matthew C. Patterson, who narrowly defeated Councilman George Ver-donckt by 22 votes,

Although Mr. Patterson received 1,338 votes over Mr. Verdonckt's 1,316, two precincts in the setern end-of. The Park gave Mr. Verdonckt

an edge over the mayor. The two will now face each other in November for the two-year mayoral post.

Six Eye Three Seats

Mayoral candidate William Faber received only 432 votes. About one-third of The Park's 9,248 registered voters showed up at the polls. Tuesday's turncut was about equal to voter turnout in the gen-eral election of 1977, but was cited by officials as one of the largest turnouts for a

primary. While the three council incumbents are in the final running, council candidate Anthony Spada finished on top, receiving 1,212 votes. In-

The contract, according to Administrative Aide Gerard E. McNamara, is for "a comprehensive program to prevent the occurrence of blight on Mack avenue, to eliminate detrimental conditions and to contribute to an adjacent sound housing inventory."

A multi-jurisdictional approach will be taken with the grant, under the execution of Luedtke and Associates. The contract, administered by The Woods, also involves The Park, City, Farms and Detroit

Upon approval of the contract, Mr. McNamara said he will notify all of the participating cities and then the community will enter into an agreement with the planner. In its application, The Woods originally requested \$99,000, with \$84,000 for a contract with Luedtke to prepare the innovative study and \$15,000 for the cost of administration and supporting work by the participating communities


TAX TIP IF YOU SELL FOR A PROFIT

Normally, taxpayers who ell their home for a substantial profit face a heavy tax load, but this burden can be avoided. If you buy another home that costs as much or more than the sales price of the old one, within a specified time, the profit from the sale is not included in your taxable income.

The second home must be bought and occupied within a period ending 18 months after the sale, A 2-year period is permitted when building a home. This tax defer ment applies only to the sale of a home which is the family's main residence.

When figuring the amount of gain for which tax may be postponed you may deduct for "fix-up" expenses if they





When we left for college he counselled, "These are the golden years and yours is the privilege to make them what you will. If we have helped you walk across the threshold with confidence, we are grateful. If we have failed you, forgive us

His philosophy, too, is a matter of record, as printed in editorials over the years: ". . . Never think of yourselves as something you have created single-handedly. Physically and emotionally you have reaped the harvest of the thought and ability cf all who went before you. Set your sights high Don't shoot at the nearest and easiest target. Select a goal that will test your capabilities, not one that will satisfy your immediate requirements. The rut is ever too close. Stagnation's beckoning is always within the limits of sight and sound. "The acquisition of an understanding and tol-

erance for fellow human beings will stand you in good stead. Let us be grateful to them for giving us a lift to a higher plane of aspiration. Never be small. Reach high and, even if your grasp fails to clutch the highest star, you will be clothed in glorious dust, shaken from the garments of all who have gone before you striving for perfection." His pride in the Grosse Pointe community was
