Thursday, August 9
A NINE-YEAR-OLD Michigan girl was found unharmed 70 miles west of Chicago after she had been kidnapped from her western Michigan home two days ago. Police later arrested prison parolee Harold Sumpter, 67, of Benton Harbor. The girl, Kelley Martin, told police that she had spent the night in a cornfield with Sumpter. A citizen in Marengo, Ill., spotted Sumpter's car which matched a description given earlier on a Chicago radio station of the alleged kidnapper's vehicle. Sumpter had just served nine years of a 15-year sentence for kidnapping.

Friday, August 10
IN UNRELATED SHOOTINGS, three FBI agents were killed marking the worst day of violence in the 71-year existence of the FBI. Two agents, Charles W. Elmore and J. Robert Porter, were shot as they tried to apprehend a social worker in El Centro, Cal., who was under investigation involving "thousands of dollars." Another agent, Johnnie L. Oliver, was killed while trying to arrest a fugitive outside a Cleveland housing project. The social worker later killed himself but a massive manhunt for the fugitive was launched after he escaped agents.

Saturday, August 11
TO MAINTAIN ITS already dwindling cash flow, Chrysler Corporation announced that it is "imminent" 5,000 salaried employees will be laid off their jobs by as early as next week. The move by the nation's third auto maker will reportedly involve production related jobs. Chrysler employs about 35,000 salaried workers. Meanwhile, Gov. William Milliken announced that the state will purchase 600 "no frills" model cars from Chrysler for \$3 million. The cars will primarily be used by the state police and the departments of transportation and management and budget.

Sunday, August 12
A STUDY OF former priests who enter the work force indicates that they succeed quite well in their new professions after an initial period of adjustment. The finding is based on a 10-year study by a Chicago psychologist, a former priest himself, of 250 ex-priests. It is estimated that more than half of former priests drift into "people-oriented" professions of social work, education, psychology, sociology or health care. There are approximately 10,000 ex-priests in the U.S.

Monday, August 13
AN ESTIMATED 1,000 people were killed as dam waters flooded the town of Morvi in the Western Indian state of Gujarat. The 14-foot waters buried the town that had for weeks been hit with severe rains. Reports indicated that Morvi was overwhelmed "within minutes" after the dam cracked. After receding, the flood left "a blanket of mud in some places as high as the upper floors of buildings."

Tuesday, August 14
PRESIDENT JIMMY CARTER, faced with the political nightmare of rising unemployment combined with double-digit inflation, will seek re-election next year on the pledge that he has a long-term plan to bring about better times in his second term. Mr. Carter, according to close associates, believes he cannot do much to reduce either the 13 percent inflation rate or the unemployment rate—between five and six percent—to acceptable levels by next year's election. But he also believes that today's sophisticated voters resent political leaders who promise "short-term easy answers."

Woods-Shores Little League Team Nips Birmingham East, 8-7, to Take State Crown

Brian Meulebrouck singled home Larry Baetens in the last of the sixth inning to give the Grosse Pointe Woods-Shores Nationals an 8-7 win over Birmingham East for the State Little League championship Saturday, August 11, at Gladstone, Mich.

The Woods started the final inning behind, 7-5. Mike Walkowiak and Dave Waldeck singled. Baetens walked and John Matouk doubled to drive in two runs to tie the game at 7-7.

Meulebrouck then singled home Baetens to give The Woods the Michigan State championship.

Narrows Gap
The Woods scored twice in the first inning as Doug Stander was hit by a pitch, Walkowiak singled, Waldeck was hit by a pitch, Stander scored on a passed ball and Matouk drove in Walkowiak on a ground out.

Birmingham scored one run in the third inning and five more in the fifth to take a 6-2 lead.

Perry Drug Store to Replace Salem Square Market On-The-Hill

Building Owner Reaches Agreement with Chain to Grant Lease at End of Year; Hill Association President Expresses Concern over Action

Unless efforts by The Farms or the Hill Association can change some minds, a Perry Drug Store will replace Salem Square Foods, 107 Kercheval On-the-Hill, after the end of the year. Building owner A. Charles Mannino confirmed that he has decided to grant the lease to Perry after the current one expires on December 31.

Salem Square partners Fred Wolski and Mel Ferdinande were notified in a letter to their attorney received on Monday, August 13, of the decision.

The letter cited a profit and loss statement that wasn't strong enough to indicate to the owner an ability to meet the rent increase requested, Mr. Wolski said.

Had First Choice
"Salem Square had first choice on the property," Mr. Mannino said. "I really wanted them there. It's a nice store. But their bid was ridiculously low."

He added their bid was only slightly higher than the rent that had been paid on the current 20-year lease, and that the partners told him they had a chance to bid on some Great Scott markets.

Mr. Wolski has stated, however, that in discussions with Mr. Mannino, he felt he could afford the increase being asked.

Tree Plan Accelerates In Woods

Council Accepts Bids to Develop Big Program, Training Sessions for DPW Personnel

Efforts toward developing a comprehensive tree management plan in The Woods are beginning to accelerate as the council at its regular meeting Monday, August 6, unanimously accepted the bids of the Davey Environmental Services to explore such a plan and to coordinate a DPW training program.

The total amount, which came in under the previously anticipated cost by around half, reached \$2,240, with \$1,745 for the management plan and \$495 for the training sessions.

Respected Company
Around \$47,000 was available to municipalities on a 50-50 matching basis and the community was one of 17 receiving approval for the September 1978 to September 1979 fiscal year. (The Woods has received an extension to March 1, 1980.)

Beautification Commission chairman Jean Rice said the Community Tree Commission recommended to the council that it accept Davey's bid, (with three other bids reaching totals of \$4,120, \$4,700 and \$6,000.)

Davey Environmental Services is a new division of the Davey Tree Company, one of the oldest and most respected companies concerned with urban-suburban environment and conservation," she said.

Mrs. Rice also had high praise for Richard Abbott, vice-president of Davey Environmental Services, who will direct the city's program. Nationally known, "he has a fine reputation in urban forestry, having been in the business for 28 years."

As part of the tree management plan, Davey will identify planting sites along streets, provide a list of recommended trees for various site conditions, provide a written report via experienced foresters, arborists and horticulturists evaluating the city's street trees based upon (Continued on Page 2)

Officials Air Concerns over Traffic Flow

Woods' Actions to Alleviate Heavy Movement on Northwest Area Streets Draw Objections from St. Clair Shores, Harper Woods; New Proposal to Be Considered by Respective Councils

Objections on the parts of St. Clair Shores and Harper Woods officials to actions taken by The Woods in its effort to alleviate the heavy through traffic on northwest area streets led to a meeting Tuesday afternoon, August 7, in St. Clair Shores.

A main concern of officials in the neighboring cities is over what they believe is the transferring of the traffic problem to their communities, with the problem itself not really being solved. A main focus in the respect was the erection of the Roslyn road barricade in addition to the Brys drive barricade.

Eleven officials, including representatives from The Woods, Harper Woods, St. Clair Shores, the Michigan Department of Transportation and the Macomb County Road Commission, discussed the situation and ultimately agreed to a proposal offered by Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen.

One-Way Streets
The proposal is outlined in a letter sent to citizens living in Brys, Roslyn, Old Eight Mile road and Hampton road this week by the city administrator.

It will be up to The Woods, Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores Councils to agree to the proposal before it becomes a reality, with Woods officials scheduled to review it on Monday, August 20. If any of the councils disagree with its content, officials indicate it will fizzle out.

The proposal, mutually agreed to by officials attending the meeting for submission to the three councils, incorporates the following:

"No further streets will be closed for approximately the next 30 days so the state and Macomb County can conduct already scheduled traffic studies at the Baseline road exit ramp from I-94 and the intersection of Harper and Old Eight Mile roads. Turn-

Woods Explores Status Of Mack-Vernier Work

Actual construction work toward improving the Mack avenue-Vernier road intersection probably won't start until either the spring or summer of 1980, the Woods Council learned on Monday, August 6.

Some officials had hoped work could begin sometime this year and on Monday, July 16, the council authorized City Attorney George Catlin and Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos to contact state officials in an effort to expedite the project.

Mr. Catlin indicated he contacted James Grassman, secretary of the State Department of Transportation, relating to him the council's concerns over accomplishing the safety improvements at the earliest opportunity.

Surprise at SH Stuns Trustees

Footings at Industrial Arts Structure Will Not Bear Load from New Construction; Other Concerns Discussed

Construction workers at South High School's new industrial arts complex ran into a big surprise last month while they were digging underground—a surprise that will add at least \$52,000 to project costs and delay it by almost a month.

Project architect Gene DiLaura of William Kessler and Associates presented the problem to the School Board on Monday, August 13, and requested that the trustees approve the first change order in the \$1.7 million job.

The problem involves the footings under the existing industrial arts wing of South High which was built in 1941. According to the original blueprints, signed by the now defunct architectural firm of Derrick and Gamler, the footings are about 34 feet deep.

To Move Elevator
What workers discovered last month is that the footings are actually half that depth and consequently will not bear the increased load from new construction.

The solution will be expensive, according to Mr. DiLaura. A specialized team of workers will have to prop up the existing building while they "underpin" those footings to strengthen them before construction can resume. That will cost about \$52,000.

In addition, a state-required elevator for the new facility will have to be moved because of the footing problem. That could cost another \$20,000, according to Mr. DiLaura.

School Board members, who have kept a close watch on the building project, were extremely upset with the news from architects.

"I'm very distressed about this," said Trustee William Fleming, "but we have no other alternative. We just have to spend this money."

More Changes Seen
Board member Ronald Dalby suggested that architects investigate the 1941 building project to determine who is to blame for the rather large mistake on the prints.

"I think we should look into this. Maybe we can find out who the contractor was back in 1941. Maybe they can be held responsible for not following the prints," Mr. Dalby said.

The trustees also were told Monday that they should expect a few more changes in the job in the coming months. The contractor also has run into problems with uncharted sewers on the site and with conduit and water supplies.

Cost increases associated with those problems could very well exceed the \$100,000 contingency fund set aside for emergencies on the project. Mr. DiLaura said.

Goals for Coming Year Okayed by School Board

The Board of Education this week gave its okay to a series of goals that indicate priority will be on improving school administration along with athletic programs, career education and opportunities for talented students in the coming year.

The goals are adopted at the beginning of each year to "give direction and focus to the efforts of all school employees," according to Superintendent Dr. William Coats. They are written by central office administrators with input from students, parents and teachers, then presented to the trustees for their approval.

Several of the 15 objectives focus on administration of the schools. Among them are goals to improve labor relations and settle all con-

tracts, improve evaluation systems and supervision and to boost efforts to conduct long-range planning.

In the area of curriculum, the administration plans to zero in on career education and programs for the talented and gifted.

In a general goal — to improve student learning — the document calls for work on the elementary science program, library skills, elementary English and special education. A review of the middle school program also is planned.

The latter area is one that several Board members said should get paramount attention next year.

Proceed with Plans
"A traffic consulting firm will be engaged to study the entire affected area of the three cities with the costs being shared by the communities. (The tentative appointment would be The Woods, 60 percent, and both Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores, 20 percent each. No total cost figure has been pinpointed.) It's hoped that such a study would produce a final, permanent solution. "I'm sure some of our residents are unhappy about the proposal," said Mr. Petersen, in relation to the strong citizen requests for barricades in both Roslyn and Brys. The training program for selected DPW employees, (numbering between six and 10 according to Administrative Aide Gerard E. McNamara), will cover such areas as spraying techniques for weed control and fertilization and as related to disease and insect control. 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Russell Reed's Departure Plays Sad Tune for South

The man who's been leading South High musicians to award-winning performances for the last 14 years, Russell Reed, director of bands and orchestra, has announced he'll begin a new job in the fall at Eastern Michigan University.

Mr. Reed's resignation was announced at the Board of Education's Monday, August 6, meeting. "I'm happy for him, but very, very sorry for us," commented trustee Dorothy Kennel.

In his new position, Mr. Reed will serve as head of the orchestra and as associate professor at the state university in Ypsilanti.

He's undoubtedly one of The Pointe's most popular teachers and is known throughout the state for the ambitious and innovative music programs he developed at South.

A talented musician in his own right, he holds Bachelor's and Master's degrees from University of Michigan in music literature and education.

Nathan Judson, his counterpart at North High, noted that Mr. Reed is one of the most widely respected orchestra directors in Michigan.

"Finding a replacement for Russ will be difficult. It'll be hard to match his expanse and his dedication," he said.

Dedication is a word used often to describe Mr. Reed by co-workers, parents and his students. He's poured incredible energy into South's music program during the last 14 years.

Last year, he conducted three bands, including a new wind ensemble, and a full orchestra and directed at least 80 after school activities, performances and fund raisers.

"He's the most dedicated person I've ever seen and I

think he's the hardest working teacher in the area," commented one of his former students, Chris Kaliardos.

"The band and orchestra group is something special at school. Kids just hang around the band room — it's like a second home almost. And it's all because of Mr. Reed," she said.

In addition to his duties at South, Mr. Reed has been an instructor at Interlochen, Blue Lake and Michigan State University's Youth Music Program. He was conductor of Sounds of '76, a youth music group that toured the state during the nation's bicentennial year.

Mr. Reed and his family, including his wife and four sons — all active musicians — will stay in The Pointe in Stanhope avenue for another year.

"It's going to be hard to leave," he said in a phone interview last week. "I have a lot of mixed emotions about this but I just feel it's an opportunity I can't turn down."

The school system is now evaluating applications for the orchestra directorship at South and hopes to make a selection before September.

But they're going to take some time looking. As one central office worker put it, "Those are going to be big shoes to fill."

Crossing Guard Workshop Held

Police from all the Grosse Pointes and the Wayne County sheriff's departments were among 105 law enforcement agencies attending a school crossing guard workshop Monday, August 13, sponsored by Automobile Club of Michigan and the Michigan Department of Education.

The half-day seminar, one of eight held throughout the state this month, was held at the Southfield Holiday Inn, 26555 Telegraph road.

The program was designed to help police comply with state requirements that all adult school crossing guards receive four hours of training and two hours of annual review from local officers in traffic control, first aid and other areas.

Persons attending also reviewed formulas to determine where guards are most needed and received new federally mandated reflectorized hand-held stop signs and highly visible orange and white-striped guard vests.

Christian Day Begins Year 51

Next month, one of the smallest private schools in the Detroit area, Grosse Pointe Christian Day, will begin its 51st year of providing individualized academic experiences within a Christian atmosphere for local children.

The 50-student school, (grades one through eight), is located in Maryland road in The Park and was founded in 1929 by members of the First Christian Reformed Church.

The school is owned and operated by an independent, non-profit educational corporation made up of parents and supporters who elect the school board.

President Jack Kalmink explains, "The basic goal of the school's founders remains our goal, namely, providing each student with the highest academic education within an atmosphere of sound Christian principles."

Although the doctrinal beliefs of the teachers are based upon a Reformed interpretation of the Bible, differing beliefs of children and parents are fully respected, Mr. Kalmink said.

In addition to the four, fully accredited, full-time teachers, part-time instructors and qualified parents supplement students' instruction.

(Continued from Page 1) tersen indicated the cost could be in the area of \$225,000, being paid by the federal government and 10 percent by the city.

Preliminary plans for the work have been completed by Pate, Hirn and Bogue, Inc., city engineers, and another step, as part of the necessary requirements, was taken Wednesday, August 1. This was a field or grade inspection of the area.

Mr. Petersen in a memo to the council reported that city officials met with representatives of the state highway department, the federal area engineer, the Wayne

County Road Commission and the city engineer toward resolving all outstanding problems prior to entering into the agreement phase of the project.

"Upon completion of the drawings and submission of a current estimate by our city engineer, the city will enter into an agreement with the state highway department. This agreement is to be executed prior to the bid phase which we can expect to occur in October of 1979," he said.

At the same time, John F. DeBusscher of Pate, Hirn and Bogue said assuming any changes to the plans and specifications would be minimal, "we would be able to make the Federal Aid Project deadline for complete submittal of August 21. This deadline is in conjunction with the Federal Aid Project letting date for October 10."

Councilman George S. Freeman requested that a "tight follow-up" of developments transpire, with Mr. Petersen stating as soon as funds are approved by the U.S. Congress, the city will put in an official request to the Michigan Department of Transportation to advertise for bids.

In relation to the project, a major concern of both officials and citizens alike at the intersection is the possibility that a vehicle, because traffic lanes aren't aligned, could go over the curb and sidewalk at the southeast corner of Mack and Vernier when youngsters leaving Parcels School are ready to cross, with death and/or injury resulting.

Playing a key role in the approval of the application was the fatal accident last May in which a 13-year-old Harper Woods boy was killed when his bike made contact with a city garbage truck as he attempted to cross the intersection.

Local, county and state officials have earlier indicated that they recognize that the intersection is a potentially hazardous one.

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
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
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Bus Riders Offer Litany Of Complaints at Hearing

Suburban bus riders who take the Jefferson avenue route presented a litany of complaints to transit officials last week at a public hearing at Saint Lucy's Church, St. Clair Shores.

Southeast Michigan Transportation Authority, (SEM-TA), officials scheduled the hearing after some of the riders expressed their displeasure with the service. It was the seventh in a series of hearings being held throughout the area.

About 40 regular riders, residents of communities from Mount Clemens to Grosse Pointe along the Jefferson route, attended the hearing on Thursday, August 9.

Among other points, they charged the following:

- Their buses are dirty. One woman told officials she and her co-riders bring paper towels every day to wipe the grime off bus seats.

- The buses are poorly maintained. Several riders agreed that broken windows and seats are commonplace

and there is especially a problem in the winter with windows that won't close. Another woman told of having buses break down four times in a single week along her route.

- The buses are often late and their destinations are poorly marked on the front of the bus — leading to a great deal of confusion and wasted time for riders.

SEM-TA was represented at the hearing by four spokesmen. They acknowledged that crowding and maintenance are problems, especially on the east side.

"Three of the four heaviest routes in the entire SEM-TA system are in your area, the Charlevoix, Kercheval and Jefferson routes," Dan Dirks of SEM-TA's public affairs office told the riders.

The east side, he said, has experienced a 40 percent increase in ridership so far this year—and the strain on SEM-TA's limited capacity is showing. Overall ridership has increased 20 percent throughout the SEM-TA system this year.

"We're doing everything we can to keep up with demand. We're taking buses that were headed for the junk yard, refurbishing them and putting them back on the road. That's why you're seeing the old buses on your routes," Mr. Dirks explained.

He said complaints about dirty or broken down buses should be reported immediately to SEM-TA officials at the toll free number 800-462-5161.

At least a small measure of relief may come to east side riders this fall when 45 new buses are added to the system, according to Mr. Dirks.

"We originally planned to create new routes with those buses, but because of our phenomenal increase in ridership, we're going to have to use them to reduce crowding on our regular routes instead," Mr. Dirks said.

"I hope that will do something to ease crowding, but to be honest, I have a feeling our ridership will continue to grow this fall."

The SEM-TA board of directors also announced last week that regular bus fares will be increased by five cents this fall when new service improvements are implemented. It will be the first across the board increase since 1974, according to SEM-TA.

Last year SEM-TA began a new fare structure that increased prices for about 28 percent of its riders and cut fares for about 50 percent. About \$500,000 will be generated by the latest increase, scheduled to take effect on Tuesday, September 4.

Woods Agrees to Rebid Job

Bids for the repair of the heating and air conditioning system at the Woods Municipal Building will go out again to the council at its regular meeting Monday, August 6, unanimously felt the council be some question over the original approach.

Three bids were received for the work including Temperature Engineer Corporation of Ferndale, \$22,400, Square D Environmental Corporation, \$23,845, and Rodco Heating and Cooling, Inc., of Detroit, \$24,405.

While Temperature Engineering was the low bid, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen suggested that the council may choose to give

consideration to the negotiated bid price of Square D in the amount of \$21,214.55. In a letter to Mr. Petersen, Square D offered to credit the city for work previously done which was encompassed within the bid specifications and for the preparation of such bid specifications.

Otherwise, he said, the city is obligated to pay an invoice in the amount of \$1,531.45 for work performed and \$854 for the preparation of the detailed specifications and inspection of the heating-air conditioning system.

But the council felt the best route to go was to rebid the job inasmuch as some members felt one bidder may have had an advantage over the other two.


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Calling Card Says Thanks

(Continued from Page 1) said improvements in the middle school program are "vital."

"When I was campaigning I heard more questions and criticism from parents about the middle school program than anything else," Mrs. Kennel said at the Board's Monday, August 6, meeting when the goals were first reviewed.

Trustee Joan Hanpeter agreed that junior high is a problem area. "It is the single most constant criticism that I hear," Mrs. Hanpeter said. "It's always seen as the weak point in our school system."

In response to the trustees, Dr. Coats said that middle schools are a "tough problem for all school districts."

"The fact is that it's a hard time for kids — they're going through a lot of changes. Complaints about middle school are not unique to Grosse Pointe, I assure you," the superintendent said.

Other goals approved by the Board this week include conducting a successful millage election this spring, improving services to the community at large, especially senior citizens, upgrading physical facilities, developing an energy conservation plan and implementing Title IX regulations which require equal opportunities for women in all aspects of the school operation.

Dr. Coats also issued on Monday a Report of Achievement covering last school year that details the extent to which he feels he and his staff succeeded in meeting 1978-79 Board goals.

It reports significant success in almost all areas, including student learning, career education, services to the community at large, supervision and administration, evaluation, long range planning and central office services.

All those goals also are included in this year's document.

The report also notes some efforts that were not quite so successful, such as improving employee relations — an area that was sometimes overshadowed by "other, more important goals," according to the report.

Local teachers' vote last spring to join the umbrella union, Local One of the Michigan Education Association, was called a "disappointment."

Another goal from last year, negotiating new contracts with employees, also was not met before the end of the school year. Contract talks are continuing and no significant progress has yet been reported.

The Report on Achievements notes that much remains to be done in development of a new testing program for the high schools, which was another 1978-79 Board goal.

Among the most outstanding achievements pointed out by Dr. Coats is improvement in student learning. He cited Grosse Pointe's top scores on the Michigan standardized reading and math tests, and students' successes in various state and national academic competition.

Builder's Plans Receive Okay in Woods







Woods Okays Jaycees' Bid

A Grosse Pointe Jaycees request to use the Ghesquire Park tennis courts for a Christmas Tree Sale December 9 to 24 met with some opposition on the part of the Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, August 6.

As a result, the solons, after much discussion, ultimately approved a motion, 6-1, permitting the organization to hold its sale on the grassy area on the north side of the municipal parking lot.

A main concern in this respect was potential damage to the surface of the courts.

At the same time, this matter was referred to the Citizens Recreation Commission for its review.

The Jaycees indicated they wanted a location wherein the trees could be locked up but due to the drift of the discussion, and the fact that trees would have to be ordered by today, August 16, organization representatives indicated the parking lot area would be okay.

Jaycee president Brian M. DeFour, in noting this is the first time the organization has sold Christmas trees, said anticipated hours would be from 3 to 9 p.m. on weekdays and from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. on weekends.

He also said he would be willing to provide the city with a certificate of insurance in relation to any potential damage to city property.

Councilman John Sabol cast the lone dissenting vote, questioning if it was a proper action on the council's part to permit an organization to conduct such an activity on public property. At the same time, he expressed a concern, due to the sale's length, of traffic going in and out of the area and possible damage to trees and shrubs.

In response, Mr. DeFour said monies from the sale would go back into the community. "We're not an organization that takes out of the community and gives somewhere else," he stressed.

Plans call for the proceeds to be donated to the Children's Hospital Reyes Syndrome Research Center, Muscular Dystrophy, the Ann Arbor Burn Center and for local programs of a charitable and civic nature.

May View Big Question

(Continued from Page 1) concern is that Park residents have a right to examine HUD-funded programs to see what "strings" may be attached to federal monies.

Retraction Asked
The fact that The Park is already receiving HUD funds has made it "the" election issue.

About a week before the election, Proud Of The Park (POP), and a group calling itself the Grosse Pointe Republican Club distributed flyers to area residents demanding that Park City Manager John R. Crawford be discharged from his post for accepting HUD monies into the city.

The flyers, critical of the present city administration, told voters to "throw these rascals out" and also warned residents that Mr. Crawford "was playing fast and loose with the future of The Park."

In a counter move, the city administration issued a letter to Mathew Connor, president of POP, asking him to retract the statements made by his group. In the meantime, the city administration also distributed its own flyers refuting POP's charges.

The letter to Mr. Connor was met with additional flyers again denouncing the city administration.

Change in View
The federal funding debate also is the prime issue dividing candidates seeking office in November.

Out of the some 3,100 total votes cast in the primary, two anti-HUD proponents, (Anthony Spada and Mr. Schaitberger), and four pro-HUD candidates, (council incumbents Clayton Alandt, Dr. Roger McNeill and Charles Tompkins and newcomer John Prost), now fill the slate of candidates for council.

However, at Monday's council meeting, Mr. Tompkins appeared to change his position on HUD.

He requested that the council stop "for the time being" any further work on the Demonstration House at 1094 Lakepointe avenue in addition to halting loans to homeowners who wish to improve their property.

"If people don't want the loans, why should we bother

with them," he said later. The councilman indicated that the city administration "should sit down and analyze HUD programs" before accepting them.

Have Opportunity Later
Mayor Matthew C. Patterson told the councilman that he will have an opportunity at some later date to express his opinion when bids on the house are submitted for council approval.

The council, however, voted down Mr. Tompkins' request on the home loans with the exception of Councilman George Verdonck, Mr. Patterson's opponent in November, who is opposed to HUD funding in The Park.

Mr. Patterson narrowly defeated Mr. Verdonck by 22 votes in the bid for the mayoral spot in the primary.

All three incumbents and Mr. Prost did well in their own precincts, but failed to make a showing in two western end precincts known as the "strategy area," an area where federal monies are basically being used in the community.

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SEMCOG Eyes State Funds for New Carpool Program

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, (SEMCOG), is seeking up to \$300,000 in state or federal funds to set up a computerized carpool matching program that would serve the seven-county southeast Michigan region.

SEMCOG also intends to continue to expand its role in promoting and developing employer-sponsored vanpooling programs, according to a news release.

Michael M. Glusac, SEMCOG's executive director, said that he has informed the Michigan Department of Transportation, (M-DOT), of SEMCOG's interest in developing a carpool program.

He said that M-DOT will oversee the expenditure of a special \$500,000 state appropriation recently earmarked for ridesharing activities throughout the state.

Mr. Glusac said he hoped a good share of that money will be directed at southeast Michigan which has about 50 percent of the state's population and a growing need for ridesharing programs.

"We can't submit a formal application at this time because M-DOT is still working on the program guidelines," he said. "But we did want to express our support and clear interest in being a part of the statewide program by submitting a letter of intent."

"SEMCOG is exploring all types of ridesharing possibilities in an effort to find ways to save gas, clean up our air and solve traffic congestion and parking problems," Mr. Glusac said.

"We want to develop regional ridesharing programs that meet everyone's needs, particularly those that can't be met by mass transit or vanpool programs."

"A well organized carpool matching program could fill that gap in many cases."

Mr. Glusac said that SEMCOG has been approached by several agencies and individuals to develop a regionwide multi-employer carpool serv-

ice. Among those agencies are the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority, (SEMATA), and the Southeast Michigan Vanpooling Task Force, (SEMVAN), which was created by SEMCOG last fall to develop and promote ridesharing alternatives.

In a recent letter to James Roach, manager of the Mass Transportation Planning Section of the Michigan Department of Transportation, (M-

DOT), Mr. Glusac wrote the following: "SEMCOG has received requests from SEMATA, which currently gets about 200 calls per week inquiring about ridesharing, SEMVAN and dozens of other organizations and individuals to develop a carpool matching service, and is prepared to do so immediately."

"This service would augment our existing employer-based efforts in vanpooling to create an integrated fam-

ily of ridesharing services involving the entire region."

Mr. Glusac said the project would involve planning by SEMCOG, the development of a marketing plan and promotional materials either by SEMCOG or a marketing consultant, and additional staff to do computer work, telephone work and other program coordination activities.

Pointe Locations Utilized In Filming Commercials

Several locations in The Pointe were utilized last month by McCann-Erickson, Inc., the advertising agency that handles the Buick account, in filming the television and print advertising for the 1980 Buick announcement campaign in Michigan.

Pointer Jack Frakes, senior vice-president, creative director at McCann, said two 60-second and three 30-second commercials were photographed almost totally in The Pointe between July 12 and 20 with two different crews.

"We shot mostly residences and mostly in Grosse Pointe Park," he said, while noting locations included Park lane, Trombley road and Windmill Pointe drive, along with Neff road, Maumee avenue and the Kimberly Korner area in The Woods.

Talent was brought in from both Los Angeles and New York, although a few Point-

ers, he said, were used as extras. These included his wife, Kathleen, and daughter, Elyse, 9, of Buckingham road, Mary Turcotte of Trombley road and Gene McKinney of Buckingham road.

Saying the entire line of Buicks was included, Mr. Frakes indicated the commercials will debut on ABC-TV's Monday Night Football at the end of September.

"We shot all over the country and we've never shot in a place in which there are so many nice locations or such nice people," he said.

Mr. Frakes, in pointing out that filming automotive commercials is a complicated business which requires a large number of people and good deal of equipment, said it also requires "a whole bunch of cooperation."

This, he continued, was found in abundance through The Pointe area.

"The homeowners, the neighbors, the shopkeepers, the police, the onlookers, were helpful and pleasant — even enthusiastic. And that sincerely impressed the script lady, the cameraman, the grips and the gaffers, the make-up lady, the stylist, the sound man, the actors and actresses."

Mr. Frakes added, "Along with being generally delighted, I was proud. Heck, I'm a resident."

Eyes Solutions On Stray Balls

Based upon a citizen complaint to the council, Woods Public Safety Director John Dankel was requested in June to look into the problem of golf balls striking cars along Grosse Pointe along Lochmoor Club property.

A letter exploring three solutions to the problem was briefly viewed by the council at its regular meeting Monday, August 6.

"I have spent some time considering this problem and have contacted some people who are known to me that are involved in golf course management where I formerly worked," he said.

He cited the solutions as follows:

"In some cases apparently the greens or tees can be relocated or redirected to change the trajectory of the ball. "I do not think this solution is feasible in the case of the Lochmoor Club," he said.

"It is possible to form a barrier with appropriate types of trees and plantings. "Such a barrier takes time to establish, however, and may not be desirable along Vernier road. Obviously, such a barrier has to be reasonably tall and quite dense," the director stated.

"The final option involves erecting a fence to meet appropriate height along the edge of the golf course. The height of the fence and fence locations would be determined by the location of the various tees and greens involved.

Director Dankel added he believed some sort of barrier would be desirable, but indicated he has no preference as to what form it might take.

The council unanimously directed this memo to its public relations committee for discussion with the club's board of directors.

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Law Enforcement Officers Give Opinions in Survey

Do you think the news media is fair and impartial in reporting the facts? That's one of 10 searching questions the National Association of Chiefs of Police asked 23,000 chiefs of police, sheriffs and line personnel in a special survey. And by a wide margin, the answer was an emphatic "no."

Of those command lawmen responding to the survey, 73.3 percent of the law enforcement officers concluded that the news media was not fair and impartial. Only 17.3 percent were satisfied that the news media were fair and impartial. A total of 9.4 percent had no opinion, either way.

"The figures speak for themselves," declared Robert Ferguson, NACOP president. "Almost three out of our replies said, 'No, the police are not getting fair coverage from the media.'"

While every police chief and sheriff was mailed the survey, no name or department was requested by the association on the return questionnaire.

Mr. Ferguson explained, "We felt that the individuals would be able to speak more freely, and express their true feelings, if the questionnaire required their title, and their name and department could be kept secret."

In some of the other areas the results show the following:

Police Strikes
"As a law enforcement supervisor, do you feel that any individual officer, (in violation of state law), who strikes, should be allowed to return to work?"
A total of 38.3 percent

would fire a striker, 6 percent would grant amnesty, 42.5 percent would impose a fine or penalty, 3.9 percent would take no action at all and 9.3 percent checked "no opinion" column.

Firearms Control
"Do you favor any form of control of the purchase of firearms by citizens of good character for sport or defense of their home, family or business?"
A total of 31.4 percent

want national registration of all firearms, 65.7 percent were opposed and 2.9 percent had no opinion.

Death Penalty for Police Killings
"If all states required the death penalty when an officer was killed in the line of duty, do you feel that this would help reduce the increase in police officers killed in the future?"
An overwhelming 91.6 percent said yes, this will deter

police officer deaths. Only 7.6 percent replied "no," and 0.8 percent had no opinion.

National Police Force
"Do you favor the organization of a national police force to replace that of state, county and local police?"
A loud and clear "no" came from 93.4 percent of the respondents, who oppose any national police force. Only 4.1 percent were in favor, and 2.5 percent had no opinion.

Reasons for Crime Increase
"With crime generally increasing, who do you blame for the increase?"
A total of 60.2 percent blamed the courts and judges for failure to impose strict enforcement of the law, 29.6 percent blamed the family for failures in raising their children, 9.2 percent felt society in general is too permissive and .06 percent blamed poor police work. The smallest percentage of all, .04 percent, felt the school system was to blame.

Training Private Security Officers
"It is estimated there are one million private security officers employed, at an average of 56. Some are armed. Do you feel that it is now time for police and sheriffs to assist in security officers training, require licensing to make these men and women part of a community security team?"
A total of 87 percent favor training standards and closer cooperation on all levels. Only 9.3 percent answered "no," and 3.7 percent had no opinion.

'Bike' Thieves Rob Park Man

A Park man was a victim of a robbery when two black youths approached him on 10-speed bicycles near Beaconsfield avenue and Charlevoix road early Saturday morning, August 11.

Paul Murphy of Bishop road told police that the two thugs, who were unarmed, wore stocking caps over their faces and were about 5'7" tall.

The thieves fled west on Charlevoix after taking Mr. Murphy's wallet, wrist watch and \$80.

There are no suspects in the incident, police added.

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Pointes Show Gains In Gas Tax Revenues

Gasoline consumption in the second quarter of 1979 declined in Michigan for the first time since the Arab oil embargo in 1974, reported the Michigan Department of Transportation, (MDOT), last week.

Gas tax revenues also went up, with the five Pointes showing gains during the second quarter this year over the same period last year.

The state collected taxes on 1,094,740,536 gallons of gas in the April-June period, down by 4.7 percent from the same three months of 1978. Declines were register-

ed in all three months, ending with a 6.3 percent drop in June.

Consumption was about the same as in the second quarter of 1973 when there were approximately 800,000 fewer autos registered in Michigan. The decline is attributed not only to reduced driving because of fuel shortages and steeply rising prices but also to improved engine performances and lighter-weight vehicles.

Gas tax revenues for the second quarter went up by \$8,574,330, or 18 percent, because of a two-cent increase in the nine-cent-a-gallon tax that went into effect last January 1. Collections totaled \$121,659,163.

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Woods Officers Receive Awards for Performance

Nineteen Woods public safety officers recently received a wide variety of honors for their performance on duty as a result of recommendations from the department's Honors Board of Review.

A total of 53 recommendations were made by department members with the board itself making the final decision on who should be cited, if any honor is felt deserved at all, based upon five different criteria.

The board, which consists of Exec. Lt. Jack Patterson, Lt. Peter Thomas and Det. Stephen Petrik, president of the Grosse Pointe Woods Police Officers Association, considered the following awards: Medal of Valor, Department Citation, Department Commendation, Director's Commendation Letter and Commander's Commendation Letter.

Because of the board's inactivity over the past several years, (two of the awards date back to incidents in 1973), there has been a lull in recognizing the officers, indicated Public Safety Director John Dankel.

But now there has been a new surge of activity, with the director stressing, "One of the best things we can do, and pay attention to, is remembering when the officers do a good job, and recognize that."

Officers Donald Schmaltz and John Harwood.

These are awarded for meritorious duty under dangerous circumstances, for outstanding initiative or good judgment under unusual pressure and for accomplishments which are exceptional in quality or degree.

Both Lt. Patterson and Sgt. Davidson were cited for their tireless efforts in disarming a potential suicide victim at his home in September 1977.

The sergeant talked with the man for around 12 hours, persuading him, after the man put the gun in his mouth or at his head on several occasions, from pulling the trigger.

Lt. Patterson ultimately relieved the sergeant and continued the established rapport for some four additional hours until the man was disarmed. (In this incident, Cpl. Kerving received a Director's Commendation for his aid in disarming the man.)

Sgt. Kane was honored for his efforts in disarming a man with two knives in November 1976. The man, who locked himself in his bathroom, had threatened responding officers and the sergeant kicked in the door and

subdued him.

Cpl. Kerving responded to a robbery armed in progress in April 1977, confronted the armed suspect and pursued him on foot before ultimately placing him under arrest without further incident.

Officer Schmaltz in June 1973 responded to a burglary call and found the suspect hiding in the home after other officers had missed him, while Officer Harwood saved the life of his partner, Officer Patrick DeVine, after a traffic stop in October 1975.

The subject pulled a handgun while Officer DeVine was writing a violation ticket at which time Officer Harwood subdued him.

Seven department commendations also were approved. Recipients included Cpl. Kerving, Officer Robert Kwiatkowski, (two), Officer Thomas Hunke, (two), and Officers Michael VanDeGins-te and Paul Shields.

Such honors are awarded for accomplishments involving above average alertness or initiative, for establishing a suspicious person as involved in criminal conduct and for above average industry and initiative in a difficult criminal investigation

leading to a successful conclusion, among other areas.

The corporal this summer placed under surveillance two subjects, who ultimately broke into a business. Through his alertness, both were subsequently apprehended.

Both Officers Kwiatkowski and VanDeGins-te were cited in the same incident last August. Through their follow-through, after stopping a vehicle with two subjects, they discovered one attempting to conceal a gun, while learning that the vehicle was reported stolen in Indianapolis, Ind. The two suspects were ultimately implicated in a robbery armed-kidnapping case in Indianapolis.

Meanwhile, Officers Hunke and Shields, through alert patrol work this summer, stopped, identified and arrested a robbery armed suspect around 24 hours after the incident was reported.

Officer Kwiatkowski also received a Department Commendation stemming from an incident in November 1973 when he investigated five juveniles in Vernier circle and ultimately released them.

Some 10 minutes later a breaking and entering in progress was reported in Vernier circle and officers were able to arrest the suspects, (the five youths), based upon information Officer Kwiatkowski supplied. As a result of the arrests, other break-ins also were cleared.

In December 1977, Officer Hunke took action which resulted in the apprehension of two subjects stealing articles from a merchant. His alert patrol work and extra investigative effort led to his second Department Commendation.

Cpl. Robert Setchell and Officer James DaDeppo received Director's Commendation Letters for their alertness while on patrol in September 1977. At around 3 a.m. they smelled the odor of smoke and were able to track it to its location — a burning home. This aided in the quick response of firefighters in fighting the blaze.

Such letters are awarded by the director for above average initiative and energy in carrying out department administrative and staff assignments or difficult criminal investigations, among other areas.

Officer Hunke and Officer Patrick Fagan received Commander's Commendation Letters, which are awarded for above average work reflecting energy, diligence, initiative or knowledge in performance of assigned duties considering how other officers might have performed in similar circumstances, or reflecting the same as an example of good public safety work.

Officer Hunke received a letter from Sgt. Lentz for his apprehension of a suspect fleeing from a jewelry store robbery armed this April. He was cited for his quick thinking and fast action and his above average attention to duty.

Meanwhile, Officer Fagan received a letter from Lt. Bernard Kelly citing his conduct in which a thief was apprehended and stolen property recovered last July. He was honored for acting with above average energy, diligence and initiative.

Positive Effects Grow From Elm Controversy

The recent controversy over the time lapse in removing seven diseased elm trees on the property of Woods Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos was apparently rectified to some extent when the mayor paid the removal bill of \$890 prior to the Monday, August 6, council meeting — with this item being a part of the agenda.

It primarily unfolded last summer when a concerned citizen, Gary Dettloff of Littlestone road, who lives in the immediate area of the mayor, became aggravated over what he felt was a lack of action on the parts of the mayor and the city in taking down the trees. They were reportedly suspected of having Dutch Elm Disease last June, were tagged on August 11 and came down on November 7 — after Mr. Dettloff swore out a complaint. (See front page story, August 2 edition.)

Mr. Dettloff then appeared at the July 16 meeting to find out why the mayor hadn't paid the removal bill. The mayor had indicated he felt the price was too high and he wanted a hearing, like any other citizen, before the council. (Further complicating the situation was the fact that the mayor's sprinkler system was damaged during removal, and it has since been repaired.)

What happened was that City Comptroller-Assessor Frederick G. Hornfisher interpreted a section of the Dutch Elm Disease ordinance governing "Costs of Removal" to mean he could assess the cost against the mayor's property and then report this to the council. However, City Attorney George Catlin interpreted the section to mean that a hearing must first be held before the council which must then authorize such action.

In a memo to the council on August 6, Mr. Hornfisher sought direction in asking, "Does the city council desire to adopt a resolution confirming my act of adding this item to the 1979 tax roll or, in the alternative, does the city council desire to adopt a resolution directing the addition of this item to the next tax roll?"

During the discussion, which included some exchanges and differences of opinion on the parts of Mr. Dettloff and the mayor, this question wasn't even touched upon by anyone. As a result, Mr. Hornfisher said until such time as the ordinance is amended, he'll go to the council for the time being.

While the NEWS feels that the mayor to some extent prolonged the agony of this situation last year, with Mr. Dettloff's move to swear out a complaint accelerating the removal action, the city, too, appeared lethargic in enforcing the measure. But just as important, if not more so, the controversy points to several weaknesses in the law — a point recognized by all officials.

The clarification sought by Mr. Hornfisher notwithstanding, the section on "Removal Required" is just about impossible to enforce. It says trees confirmed to have Dutch Elm Disease after laboratory analysis shall be removed and burned within 10 days following notification of the infection's discovery. It also says it's unlawful for any person "to possess or keep such a tree after the expiration of 10 days following notification of the discovery of said infection."

Officials have admitted that the entire process, including tagging, writing quotes, receiving quotes, accepting a quote and removing diseased trees, can take anywhere from 25 to 35 days, sometimes even longer.

While speed is important regarding the disease and ensuing tree removal, officials can do so much in facilitating action, with the 10-day stipulation being a worthy but impossible objective to attain. The fact that the city tries to lump several locations together to obtain a better quote with a larger job, plus the fact that a contractor's schedule may not facilitate swift removal in any given case, also has to be considered.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, in indicating he hopes the council will explore some potential revisions within the next 60 days, said the city usually doesn't take bids until after the 10 days notice. He felt bids should be immediately taken when the trees are tagged and after 10 days the property owner should be told the trees should come down. An objective also would be to have the awarding of a contract within the 10 days.

Another area of exploration would be to follow the same policy in all ordinances, wherein delinquent costs would go directly on the tax rolls. For water bills and sidewalks, for instance, this action occurs.

While the viewpoints of both Mr. Dettloff and the mayor remain unchanged, citizens should hope that the content of the Dutch Elm Disease ordinance will change for the betterment of all.

Know Your Schools

In this week's column, I am pleased to share information about two summer activities conducted by our Department of Special Education and a program for adjusted learning and learning disabled students conducted by the Department of Community Services.

For the 15th year, we offered a summer recreation program for trainable retarded children under the leadership of special education teachers Ann Eichhoff, Cynthia Kopp, Bernie Lemieux, Sue Mack and several hard-working aides and volunteers.

Through the program physical activities such as calisthenics, swimming, ball games, hikes, crafts and picnics were emphasized. On Mondays and Fridays, the students went to The Woods Lake Front Park for swimming and other recreational activities, while on Tuesdays and Thursdays they stayed at Barnes School to conduct community car washes and raised \$100 from those efforts.

In order to facilitate mainstreaming, the students were taken on field trips each Wednesday to such places as Cranbrook Institute, Children's Hospital, Metropolitan Airport, Hart Plaza, Metropolitan Beach and Bob-Lo Island.

The trip to Bob-Lo was funded by a donation from the Grosse Pointe Association for Retarded Citizens for which we are most appreciative. All of the students and staff really enjoyed that outing.

The second summer program conducted by the department was the Title I Summer School at the Children's Home of Detroit. Our school system uses Title I funds to contract with the staff of Academic Improvement and Development, Inc. to offer this program for emotionally impaired students.

For six weeks participants are provided opportunities to maintain and improve their skill levels in the subject

Office at IRS Helps Citizens

When taxpayers have complaints or problems that do not seem to get proper attention through normal channels at the Internal Revenue Service, (IRS), they can find assistance from the IRS Problem Resolution, (PRP), office.

In 1978, more than 2,400 taxpayers in Michigan were helped with problems by the PRP office when repeated calls and letters through normal IRS procedures brought unsatisfactory results.

Here's how the PRP system works, according to the IRS. First, a taxpayer brings the problem, such as a lost refund or incorrect billing, to normal IRS channels. If the problem is not solved, even after repeated efforts, the taxpayer can call PRP.

Usually PRP will handle a problem within five working days, and if the problem is not remedied by then, PRP will give the taxpayer a status report and a projected completion date.

PRP should not be considered a substitute for normal IRS channels or a cure for all types of problems, the IRS said. For example, decisions made during an audit, Freedom of Information requests, Privacy Act inquiries and complaints about IRS hiring practices are handled in other offices. A call to IRS will be referred to the proper office.

Taxpayers can reach PRP by calling the regular IRS Taxpayer Service number and asking for the Problem Resolution Office.

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

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
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

Summer Heart Health Hints

With the arrival of summer, many people change their habits considerably from those of winter.

"And it is wise to keep in mind how some of those habits can affect our hearts," notes Daniel T. Anbe, M.D., F.A.C.C., F.A.C.P., Henry Ford Hospital cardiologist who is president of the Michigan Heart Association.

"In a very short period of time — sometimes a matter of weeks or even days," Dr. Anbe says, "our winter-long eating and exercise habits are discarded."

"People are out of winter's heavy clothes and out of doors, enjoying summer activities, often abandoning winter foods for summer ones and sometimes skipping meals altogether.

"All of this can be either beneficial or harmful to your heart, depending on how you go about making the changes.

"First, it should be noted that hot weather itself can put an additional strain on the heart, which must work

harder to cool the body.

"At the same time, many people who may have exercised very little during the winter are now mowing the lawn, biking, hauling a boat in and out of the water or swimming. All of a sudden, then, the heart is called upon for a lot of extra work."

Dr. Anbe suggests the following guidelines for summer heart health:

Give your heart some "notice" that more is going to be required of it by beginning summer sports and other activities gradually.

Limit physical exertion during hot spells.

Stay (as much as possible), in one environment—either hot and humid or air-conditioned.

Be sure to eat a heart-healthy diet which includes sufficient potassium and sodium salts . . . but note that some people with high blood pressure or renal failure may be on low sodium or potassium diets and should check with their physician

Mid-September Seminar Views Nursing's Future

Fall European Tour for Symphony

The Detroit Symphony Orchestra departs Metropolitan Airport Sunday, October 28, for a 34-day tour of major European cities and music capitals. Twenty-four concerts will be given in eight countries, all under the direction of Antal Dorati, the orchestra's music director.

For Maestro Dorati, the visits to London and Stockholm will mark special homecomings. He currently holds the post of conductor laureate of the Royal Philharmonic in London and was, for many years, music director of the Stockholm Philharmonic.

Appearing as guest artist with the DSO in London, Paris and Berlin will be Yehudi Menuhin, a violinist who

has become a legend in his own lifetime.

Menuhin, born in New York City of Russian parents, made his concert stage debut at the age of seven. He recently won a German peace prize for using music "to bring closer people, races, cultures and civilizations." He will receive the award October 14 in Frankfurt.

Complete tour programs as well as details of corporate concert sponsorships and available DSO board and sponsor tour packages will be announced in the near future.

Although this trip represents the first international touring for the orchestra, the Detroit Symphony has earned an outstanding national reputation over the years for its domestic tours.

She explained that proceeds from the sale of cards will assist the MCF to continue its many screening and detection programs for the early signs of cancer and will support the foundation's scientific research activities.





Attorney General Views Freedom of Information Act

A 98-page opinion responding to 58 separate questions raised by state officials and agencies regarding the proper interpretation of the 1976 Freedom of Information Act was recently issued by Attorney General Frank J. Kelley.

The opinion—applying the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act to specific factual problems—is the longest and most asked for opinion in the history of the Attorney General's Office, according to a news release.

Highlights of Mr. Kelley's opinion include the following conclusions:

- Since the Presidents' Council of State Colleges and

Universities is wholly funded by state universities and colleges, it is a public body covered by the act.

- Because an act of Congress limits distribution of copyrighted material, the act does not give a person the right to receive copies of copyrighted material included in an agency's rules and records.
- A person who seeks only to inspect a public record and does not request a copy may not be charged for the costs of search, review and deletion of exempt information.
- A public body may re-

fuse to reveal to a third party that portion of an employee's personnel file which contains counseling and related memoranda if such disclosure would constitute an invasion of individual privacy in the absence of a public interest in such disclosure.

- Schools are required to give out names and addresses of students, although school personnel are prohibited from disclosing information regarding student behavior under Michigan law. The release of a student's name and address cannot be construed as relating to a student's behavior.

However, the student or parent of the student may inform the institution in writing that such information is not to be released.

Mr. Kelley's opinion re-emphasizes that denials for requests for information must include the reasons for their denial.

The attorney general says, however, that, pursuant to the terms of the act, a law enforcement agency responding to a request for an investigatory file may refuse the request by virtue of a statutory exemption.

If the effect of the response may inform the per-

son that an investigation is underway, the agency may state in its response that the refusal should not be interpreted to mean that such a file does exist.

Details of the charges leading to the suspension, discharge or criminal prosecution of any public employee are disclosable, the attorney general determined.

Before disclosing the information, however, the agency would have to determine which items in the investigatory files may be exempt from disclosure and to separate those from the material which will be disclosed.





Pointer of Interest



JOHN P. WORCESTER, OF KERBY COURT

"Most Grosse Pointers are very interested in maintaining and improving the beauty of the area in which they live. Our community centers, churches and roadways need the financial support of our homeowners, storekeepers and charitable foundations, because tax revenues are usually unavailable to preserve and improve the attractiveness of these important public places."

The speaker is John P. Worcester, chairman of the Grosse Pointe Garden Center's Vincent DePetris Fund which is seeking \$30,000, the income from which will be used to help maintain the Trial Garden located lake-side at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial.

For 27 years, the Trial Garden has been the focus of gardening activity in the Pointe, a beautiful backdrop for receptions and community activities, an award winning beauty spot that has enriched the lives of thousands.

Volunteers Do Work For all those years, it has been planted and maintained by volunteers from Grosse Pointe garden clubs, the major costs being born by the Garden Center.

And through those years, costs have risen. ("So what else," you say, home from the supermarket, back from an outfitting-the-kids-for-school shopping trip, "is new?") until there simply isn't enough money available from Garden Center funds to provide the kind of work, the weeding, spraying, trimming, et al., and the supplies to accomplish it all, necessary to maintain the Trial Garden as it should be maintained.

Consider: the Grosse Pointe Garden Center's only annual fund-raiser, the only Garden Center-sponsored event for which a fee is charged, is the Grosse Pointe House Tour.

Funds from the House Tour, and from membership fees, subsidize the Garden Center's extensive community service program which ranges from workshops to a Lending Library of Books on Horticulture to the annual, judged Grosse Pointe Horticulture and Bonsai Show.

Those funds can only go so far. Those Trial Garden planting/maintenance volunteers can only work so hard. So, last year, the Garden Center board of trustees voted to establish a special fund for the garden.

Named for DePetris They named it, most appropriately, after one of Grosse Pointe's most distinguished gardeners. Vincent R. DePetris, the greatest hybridizer of chrysanthemums of his time, was a tireless contributor to the beautification of the area.

When Mrs. Russell Alger gave her family home to the people of Grosse Pointe, stipulating that it be used as a living War Memorial, a community center, she also stipulated that a special room be set aside as headquarters for the community's gardeners.

Vincent DePetris was appointed first chairman of the War Memorial's Grounds and Garden committee, and presided at that committee's first

meeting September 22, 1949, in that special room, Mrs. Alger's own room. Representatives from nine Pointe garden clubs formed the committee.

A year later, the group split, amicably, in two. Grounds and Garden would maintain its own identity. Mr. DePetris appointed a committee to draw up a constitution and establish a new Grosse Pointe Garden Center board.

The Grosse Pointe Garden Center was officially born in November, 1950. The following month, Mrs. Neil McMullan became chairman of a Garden Center Horticulture committee consisting of Mrs. Julius Peter, Mrs. Howard Smith and Mrs. Richard Jackson. The idea for the Trial Garden, a "laboratory" and a gift of beauty to all Grosse Pointe, came from them.

Site Is Established The site of the garden was established the following June. That October Mrs. Wood Williams, now Horticulture chairman, asked representatives from each Garden Center member club to form a Trial Garden committee.

Eleanor Roche designed the garden as a wheel, with plots radiating like spokes from the original Windmill Pointe millstone. It was dedicated June 20, 1952. Its core design remains today as it was then, but the garden has grown to include adjacent hillside plantings, the perennial gardens and many flowering trees and hedges.

Vincent DePetris, the man primarily responsible for the Garden Center's founding, gave the original chrysanthemum planting. Through the years, he remained actively interested in the Trial Garden and a faithful friend and advisor to the Garden Center which, in turn, designated him as one of its Honorary Members.

When the Garden Center trustees recognized the necessity for a Trial Garden endowment and voted to establish a special fund for this purpose, they decided to honor their faithful friend and advisor. The fund was named, most appropriately, The Vincent DePetris Fund. To head it, they picked a man with fund-raising experience, a lifelong commitment to the community and a belief that esthetics are important.

An Enjoyable Task "I enjoy working to raise money to maintain the beauty of the Trial Garden at the War Memorial," says John Worcester. "Ten years ago, my family and I gave generously to provide badly needed tree plantings at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church. To

day, the church grounds are a real source of enjoyment." And not just to the Worcester, who of course take a proprietary interest in the plantings. The trees are there: a bit more beauty for all of us.

Mr. Worcester, Supervising Vice-President, Personal Trust Department, Detroit Bank and Trust Company, is a former United Community Services Budget committee member and a former chairman of United Foundation Advance Giving - Foundation Group.

He's a former president of the Williams College Alumni Association of Michigan and helped establish the Williams Michigan Scholarship Fund. And he's a former treasurer of the University Liggett Alumni Association, which figures: ULS runs in the family.

John Worcester's father and uncle, his sister and her three children all attended ULS, in its present or previous incarnations. The three Worcester children are all University Liggett graduates.

The Family Records Their father played on the Tennis Team at Detroit University School. (One of ULS' precursors). He was graduated from Hotchkiss, then from Williams College, where he majored in Economics, in 1949.

At Williams, John Worcester played on the Squash Team, which figures: the Worcester men tend to pick their sports and be good at them.

John P. Worcester, Jr., 25 now and living in Los Angeles, was a member of the ULS State Championship Tennis Team and, as goalie on the ULS Hockey Team, was voted that team's Most Valuable Player.

So, last year, was his brother, Peter J. Worcester, 18, who was graduated from ULS this June and will be off to Williams in the fall. Peter, too, played goalie on the Hockey Team.

And Peter was a member of the ULS Baseball Team that won the 1979 State Class D Baseball Championship, first in the school's history.

Their big sister, Katharine Worcester Getz, married and living in Grosse Pointe, holds a record of her own. She's the mother of Allison Getz, the Worcester's first grandchild, born last January - and undoubtedly destined for ULS a few years from now.

Wonderful Walloon Allison's grandmother, Nancy Worcester, did not attend ULS. She couldn't very well - she's from Columbus, O. But her family traveled north to vacation at Walloon Lake, and so did John Worcester's family, (he's about as native as you can get: born in Harper Hospital, a Grosse Pointe resident most of his life), and there, at Walloon Lake, they met, and there they were married.

And there they still vacation. "This is my 42nd year at Walloon Lake." The Worcester head north every

A Different Ethnic Experience

The Sword Dance, Highland Fling and Sean Truibhas will be the featured dances. There'll be individual bagpipe and drumming competitions and a special performance by the Saint Andrew's Pipe Band.

There'll be a dart throwing contest, sponsored by the Wolverine Dart Throwing Association. Tickets for the day are available at all Hudson's stores. Food, beverages and picnic tables are available on the island.

The traditional dances of the Scottish Highlands go back in time more than 2,000 years and were originally performed only by men—but of late the lassies have taken up the challenge. Today, some of the finest performers in the world are women.

The Highland Fling is said to have been inspired by the prancing and rearing of the wild stag in the forest. The Sword Dance was originated in 1054 by King Malcolm Canmore who, after slaying an enemy in battle, laid his sword on the ground, placed his enemy's blade across it and performed a wildly spirited victory dance over the crossed weapons.

The story behind the Sean Truibhas is great! Seems that, after the Highland uprising of 1745, the wearing of the kilt was forbidden by English law. Scotsmen were forced to don "trews" or "truibhas"—the hated trousers.

The kicking movements of the Sean Truibhas performer's feet and legs are said to represent the desire to throw off the trews and get back to the freedom of movement of the kilt.
