Thursday, August 16
ANDREW YOUNG, U. S. Ambassador to the United Nations, resigned from his post after a controversial meeting surfaced between Mr. Young and the Palestine Liberation Organization, (P.L.O.). The ambassador declared that he wasn't "a bit sorry" for his actions. A U. S. policy forbids meetings between government officials and PLO representatives. Israeli officials later stated that it appeared the U.S. was recognizing the PLO as a concession to Saudi Arabia for foreign oil. President Jimmy Carter accepted Mr. Young's resignation, praising him for exemplifying "the finest attributes of the American character."

Friday, August 17
ABOUT 450 PRESENT and former black employees of Detroit Edison will receive more than \$5 million in damages as part of a discrimination suit against the utility company. The eight-year-old damage suit marks the largest award ever won against a single company for discrimination. Back in 1971 the American Civil Liberties Union initiated the suit against Edison after three black employees reportedly suffered job discrimination. Presently, Edison's work force is made up of 18 percent black employees.

Saturday, August 18
JAPANESE AUTOMAKERS stated that they are on a "direct collision course" with American manufacturers of small cars to meet the demand for fuel-efficient vehicles. A spokesman for Nissan Motor Co., which markets Datsun cars, indicated that the Japanese are now looking at small car possibilities with gasohol, gas turbines and are even considering electric cars. The Japan Automobile Manufacturers Association pointed out that their fuel-saving compact cars are at a record low with less than a two and a half month supply left, and that efforts are being made to rush new shipments to the U.S. market.

Sunday, August 19
A FEDERAL STUDY has charged that tractor-trailer trucks are "the principal cause" of highway deterioration. The Government Accounting Office, (GAO), further cited that about one in four trucks is exceeding federal and state weight limits and, as a result, this country will be faced with road repairs of \$85 billion over the next 17 years. The trucking industry called the study "simplistic" and is currently battling an effort to hike up truck load restrictions. Meanwhile, truckers on Michigan roads are allowed to exceed federal gross vehicle weight limits.

Monday, August 20
WHILE CONSUMERS are tightening their belts in light of a 13 percent inflation rate, McDonald's Corporation decided to ease the pinch by cutting the prices of its hamburgers by five cents. The reduction is "to help young families fight inflation," according to McDonald's officials. The price cut will be in effect in about one-fourth of the 4,685 McDonald's restaurants in the U.S., with more than 100 outlets in Detroit participating. The White House praised McDonald's action.

Tuesday, August 21
ISRAELI JET fighters struck at Palestinian guerrilla bases in Lebanon Monday as American envoy Robert Strauss returned home empty-handed from his latest Mideast peace mission. "Not good" was Mr. Strauss' assessment of his just-concluded talks with Egypt and Israel on the Palestinian issue.

Ford Home Receives Big Honor

Mansion Is Entered into National Register of Historic Places Ear- lier This Month

One of Grosse Pointe's few remaining mansions, the 60-room Edsel and Eleanor Ford home in The Shores, was entered into the National Register of Historic Places earlier this month in recognition of its architectural and historical significance.

Historic designation will help ensure the home will be maintained and used by the community as was the wish of the late Mrs. Ford. But the designation does not mean the fabulous 65-acre estate will be opened for viewing by the public on a regular basis, according to the estate's executive director Paul Alandt.

Pace Picks Up

Long range plans for the house are to continue its use for charitable functions and benefits, cultural events and visiting dignitaries, said Mr. Alandt.

GP Woods, Farms Cited With Awards of Merit For Pedestrian Safety

Cities Honored for Their Records, Programs in 40th Annual Inventory; Sidewalk Restraining Line Plan to Help Youngsters Also Explored

Both The Woods and Farms won Awards of Merit for demonstrating achievement in pedestrian safety records and programs in the 40th annual Pedestrian Safety Inventory, reports the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Livonia earned the American Automobile Association's top honor, the Grand Award, among communities with populations of 50,000 to 500,000 for reducing its pedestrian injuries 26 percent between 1977 and 1978. Livonia also won an Award of Excellence as did Warren.

Both Woods and Farms officials attended an awards luncheon on Monday, August 20, at the Fairlane Manor, Dearborn, at which time the honors were presented.

"Did It Again"

The Woods, which has now gone 21 consecutive years without a pedestrian fatality, earned the Grand Award for the fifth time last year, while also receiving an Award of Excellence for the 12th consecutive year in 1978.

Meanwhile, The Farms also earned an Award of Merit last year and, with this year's honor, it was the community's fifth top pedestrian safety award in the last five years.

Praise Belanger

"All the guys here, including myself, appreciate the award and have worked very hard for it," said Officer Crook, who also cited the crossing guards for their loyal service, the safety patrol (Continued on Page 8)

LWV Views Juvenile Crime Unit

League Sets Meeting for September 18 to Pres- sure Cities, School System to Pro- duce Replace- ment for YSD

Grosse Pointe needs a juvenile crime fighting unit. At least that's the belief of the League of Women Voters, (LWV), and almost a dozen other local community service agencies.

Next month, those groups plan to do something about that need. They've scheduled a Community Forum for Tuesday, September 18, at the War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore road, at 8 p.m. Although plans are still incomplete, the league hopes to have speakers on hand from all five cities and the Board of Education to talk about juvenile crime in The Pointe.

Expected to Grow

Among the groups already committed to backing the effort are the Northeast Guidance Center and its Assistance League, Neighborhood Club, Grosse Pointe Lawyers' Wives, War Memorial, South High School Mothers Club, North High Parents Club and the PTO-PTA-Affiliated Groups Council. The list is expected to grow before next month.

"We want to pressure the cities and schools to produce a replacement for the Youth Service Division, (YSD)," explained LWV president Frances Schenberg. The YSD ceased its operation on June 30 because of a dispute between the city councils and School Board over financing and control. It had served as a Pointe-wide juvenile crime unit with bases in each of the public high schools for almost nine years.

The School Board voted to pull out of the division in June protesting a staff reduction that it said was implemented without its knowledge. The Board also had considered several times in the past (Continued on Page 4)

Varied Opinions Shared over Pending Transition from Salem Square Market to Perry; Store Executive Responds to Variety of Concerns

Almost everyone you ask seems to agree they would rather not see a Perry Drug Store located On-the-Hill. Likewise, almost everyone agrees there's not much that can be done to stop one.

Perry has signed a lease commencing in January for the building which presently houses Salem Square Foods, 107 Kercheval. While merchants on-the-Hill and nearby residents look to the Farms Council to do something, a Perry executive says he can't understand what all the fuss is about.

One very small group, however, is bound to be adversely affected by the planned store: the owners of the small drugstore operations in the immediate area. Significantly, the owners of the two drugstores nearest the coming Perry store both plan to stay.

Receives Support

"The first thing I'm going to do is to find out exactly what I'm up against," said Max Jacobs, owner of Kent Drug. "We're going to give them, (Perry), one hell of a run for their money."

Mr. Jacobs said he will give his customers good values and good service, noting there are things such as delivery service that Perry won't offer.

"People have made me a part of the community," he said. "I enjoy talking with people and that's why I have the small community store. I wouldn't like to be a guy who sits behind the counter and counts pills."

However, Mr. Jacobs did admit that he has "a David against Goliath kind of feeling."

Ed Holsinger, owner of Trail Apothecary, likewise says he will continue at his present location.

"I personally am not planning on going anywhere. I think we have a responsibility to the community, he said. "I'm going to give it by best" (Continued on Page 6)

Citizens in Woods Hit Proposal

Hopes for Joint Meeting Remain between Af- fected Cities As Plans Are Made to Erect Hamp- ton Road Bar- ricade

Hopes for a joint meeting remain between the Woods, St. Clair Shores and Harper Woods Councils in an effort to resolve what appears to be increasing problems for officials and citizens alike over traffic conditions in the northwest area of The Woods and its ensuing effects in the neighboring communities, particularly St. Clair Shores.

An estimated 100 residents living in Brys drive and Roslyn, Hampton and Ridgemoor roads attended the Monday, August 20, meeting in The Woods, with several expressing displeasure over a proposal which was mutually accepted by 11 officials who met Tuesday, August 7, in St. Clair Shores for presentation to the three councils.

Moot Question

Part of that proposal okayed by Woods, Harper Woods, St. Clair Shores, Michigan Department of Transportation and Macomb County Road Commission officials said no further streets would be closed for around 30 days while state and Macomb County traffic studies continue at the Baseline road exit ramp from I-94 and at the intersection of Harper and Old Eight Mile road.

It also stipulated that after the traffic studies were completed, all barricades would be removed from Woods streets, with both Brys and Old Eight Mile road being made one-way westbound from Mack to Harper.

In an effort to arbitrate the problem, the proposal also included the engaging of a traffic consulting firm to study the entire affected area of the three cities, with the communities agreeing to the final decision, according to Woods officials.

Woods officials Monday night felt that the St. Clair Shores Council had rejected the total proposal so that particular avenue was considered a moot question. (However, St. Clair Shores Assistant City Manager Bob Helmer indicated that the proposal had not, in fact, been rejected and that officials were pursuing all avenues. "We're not totally happy with some of it but it's still under consideration," he said.)

Set to Go Up

As a result, after much discussion, the Woods Council (Continued on Page 2)

Park Facing Insurance Hike

The Park Council delayed approval at its Monday, August 13, meeting, of an umbrella insurance premium that is nearly double last year's figure until further quotes could be received and studied.

The city's insurance agent Johnson and Higgins indicated that the renewal of the city's excess umbrella liability insurance is subject to increase from \$11,400 to \$24,500 annually, a quote received from Crum and Forster Insurance Company.

City Clerk Comptroller Nunzio J. Ortisi stated that in a letter from Crum and Forster, the insurance company said that one of the reasons for the large premium hike was The Park's recent award of \$1.14 million to a Detroit family whose 13-year-old son was killed after he was struck by a Park garbage truck along I-94 four years ago.

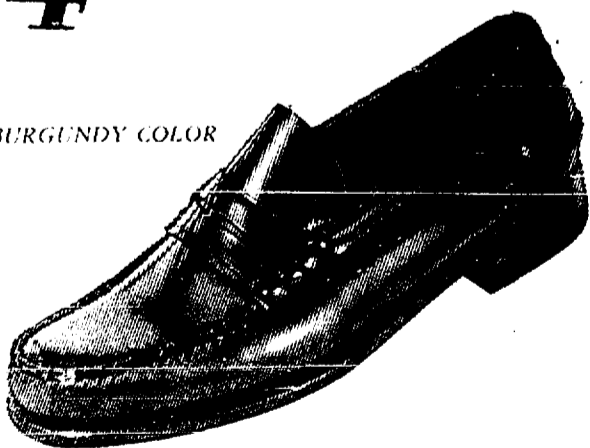

(Continued from Page 1) cil unanimously approved a motion toward arranging a joint meeting of the three bodies, with an invitation being extended to state and county officials to participate, while authorizing Public Safety Director John Dankel to erect a temporary barricade in Hampton road and then, if warranted after further study, to do the same in Ridgemoor.

Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, who offered the original proposal on the 7th to help resolve the situation, said, regarding the joint meeting, he'll see what St. Clair Shores does before taking any action in this direction.

On this, Mr. Helmer stated St. Clair Shores officials will try to arrange such a session as soon as possible.

Meanwhile, Director Dankel said the Hampton barricade is scheduled for erection either today, August 23, or tomorrow, August 24.

On Legal Action
The director stressed that the use of barricades is experimental and that it's the council's intention not to leave them there. However, he felt it was worth trying toward helping alleviate the traffic situation in the northwest area.

Gilmore Leads Judges' Group

Circuit Court Judge Horace W. Gilmore of The City was elected chairman of the American Bar Association's (ABA), National Conference of State Trial Judges of the Judicial Administration Division last week in Chicago, Ill.

Judge Gilmore will head a nationwide group of 1,578 state trial judges for a one-year term.

In the past year, Judge Gilmore has represented the association on the board of trustees of the Institute for Court Management. He also chaired the association's National Conference of State Trial Judges' committees on education, finance and budget last year.

Since 1968, Judge Gilmore has been a faculty member of the ABA's National Judicial College. He also served on the ABA's Automobile Accident Reparations Committee from 1968-69.

A Fellow of the American Bar Foundation, he is a member of the American Judicature Society and the American Law Institute.

"Michigan Civil Procedure Before Trial" is the title of a book Judge Gilmore authored.

The 61-year-old lawyer served as the deputy attorney general for the State of Michigan and as a member of the State Board of Tax Appeals before becoming a judge.

In 1942, he received a JD from the University of Michigan, where he also received a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science. He was admitted to practice law before the Michigan bar in 1946.

• The Board could appoint a past member to fill out the term. This was the approach taken in 1975, the last time a Board member resigned in mid-term, when former member Lee Allen was selected to replace Muir Snow.

• The Board also could choose a newcomer to fill the vacancy, according to Mr. Harwood.

Mrs. Ardussi won her seat on the Board by beating six candidates in an election in 1977. She received 2,600 votes.

plete the experiment," he told the solons and citizens, while adding Woods officials have been criticized by officials of both neighboring communities for the erection of the Roslyn barricade after the Brys barricade.

(In fact, a main reason for the meeting of officials on the 7th stemmed from objections of both Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores over what they feel is the transferring of the traffic problem into their communities.)

Meanwhile, St. Clair Shores residents in the affected area have been meeting to present recommendations to their council, according to Mr. Helmer.

On the 20th, he said the St. Clair Shores Council approved two of several recommendations offered, including the installation of a "no left turn" sign from 6 to 9 a.m. at northbound Greater Mack at Edmunton and a "no right turn" sign from 4 to 7 p.m. on southbound Greater Mack at Edmunton.

Mr. Helmer also pointed out, in relation to any legal action against The Woods, that officials have discussed the possibility of seeking an injunction to have the barricades removed but, at this time, officials feel it would be a long struggle, with any potential legal battle continuing for a year or two before a decision is reached.

In Good Faith

For his part, Harper Woods City Manager Ronald Bultman said his council hasn't as yet considered the proposal which was an outgrowth of the meeting on the 7th. He added, however, officials will be glad to study and review it.

At The Woods' meeting, Councilman George Cueter, citing the growing complexity of the problem, said Woods officials have been involved in it for over four years and now Macomb County and state officials appear concerned. "They've got expertise. Let them spend their money," he said, in relation to the current county and state studies.

Mr. Petersen, meanwhile, in citing efforts of his city, said officials in good faith tried to help arbitrate the matter in viewing the plan of having an outside traffic engineer explore the entire problem, while adding it was his understanding that St. Clair Shores turned it down.

Park Looking Forward to Its New Ambulance

There used to be a time in The Park that if you called for an ambulance, a police sedan would arrive on

the scene and attendants would open the trunk, fold down the back seat and slide the patient in through the trunk.

If anything, it was a pretty awkward way to go to the hospital.

But that was 30 years ago and "that was all we had back then," explained Fire Chief Phillip M. Costa.

Citizens don't have to worry about being slid through a trunk anymore, since The Park has been responding to calls in a more conventional manner over the years with the department's ambulance van.

The department, however, will soon be providing even better service to residents

when it acquires a second ambulance sometime next month.

The Park Council approved the purchase of a 1979 Prestige Ford Super van at a cost of \$20,025 at its meeting on Monday, August 13.

The van will be funded through city monies.

The fire department requested a second ambulance because its present vehicle is approaching seven-years-old. It will now be used as a backup ambulance.

Calling it a "sophisticated piece of equipment," Chief Costa pointed out that the new ambulance will afford his department the opportunity to respond to calls quickly, explaining that it will alleviate the situation when The Park is faced with responding to a call in The City only to receive a call in The Park a short time later.

The Park provides mutual aid service to The City.

Presently, if confronted with such a situation, The Park either requests mutual aid from The Farms or stabilizes the patient by responding to the scene with one of its other fire vehicles carry-

ing portable oxygen equipment.

"So far, we have been very fortunate that we haven't run into a life and death situation. It's going to make things a lot easier for us," Chief Costa said.

The new ambulance has many new features that will allow the department to treat patients efficiently.

Among other points, the van contains a reservoir suction tank for aspirating patients, a 110-volt inverter that allows patients with iron lungs to be immediately plugged in, conveniently located outlets and better lighting.

The new ambulance also protects the driver from sometimes violent patients with a partition.

The ambulance currently responds to, on the average, two calls a day, but there have been times when the department has made up to six calls a day.

"It will be a welcome sight in our fire station. My men are very pleased and excited," Chief Costa said.

"You know, a good piece of equipment always raises the morale of the men and that makes them want to do a good job."

GPW Studies Insurance Info

The question of liability insurance coverage for the use of a city bus for senior citizen activities in the tri-county area remains under study by Woods officials.

Last month City Attorney George Catlin was authorized by the council to investigate the reason for the refusal of additional coverage. He recently reported that he had been in contact with Donald Rasmussen, superintendent, commercial casualty department, National Ben Franklin Insurance Company of Michigan.

In response to Mr. Catlin, Mr. Rasmussen in a letter explained the company's reluctance to insure senior citizen bus charters.

"Our reason for concern in this matter is that Michigan No-Fault bus rates contemplate coverage for passengers under the passenger's own family auto policy," he said.

"To insure an operation transporting senior citizens would result in insuring the age group most susceptible to serious injury and also the age group most likely not to have the availability of fam-

ily auto coverage."

Without family auto coverage, the city's policy would provide unlimited lifetime medical coverage which would result in higher insurance premiums to the city, he noted.

As a result, Mr. Rasmussen suggested that a more feasible solution would be for the city to contract with an outside bus company that has its own insurance.

"It would be desirable for the city to be named as an additional insured on the bus company's policy," he said, while adding, "We will not exclude coverage for senior citizen trips from this policy, but we do strongly advise against it."

Based upon Mr. Rasmussen's letter, the council wanted to know what the quote would be for the additional premium before reaching a decision on whether to stay with the company in this instance or go the outside bus company route.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen is scheduled to find out what the quote would be and report back to the council.

The city pays premiums in excess of \$112,000 per year to National Ben Franklin for necessary coverage.

(Continued from Page 1) past that it was being asked to foot too large a share of the division's budget.

The YSD budget for 1979-80 totaled \$174,812. The School Board planned to pay about 25 percent of that figure and the rest was to be split among the cities on the basis of their total property valuation.

Mrs. Schonberg said that local political leaders should be made to understand that taxpayers "don't really care which pocket it comes out of" when it comes to paying for a youth division.

"As far as the budget goes, it's ridiculous to argue over who is going to pay for the service—it all comes out of our tax bills anyway," she said.

The league is not interested in "wasting time" by casting blame for the YSD's recent demise on any party.

Mrs. Schonberg added. The YSD was a unique service in Grosse Pointe in that it was the only community agency supported by each local unit of government on a cooperative effort. It was governed by a board of managers with one representative from each municipality and one from the schools.

Its four officers handled cases involving persons under 18-years-old referred to them by all five Grosse Pointe police departments. In addition, they regularly attended high school functions and investigated complaints on campus.

No specific provisions have been made replacing the service in the schools since the YSD was dropped in June, although several meetings on the subject have been held by local officials.

Ambulance Service Eyed

(Continued from Page 1) with sleeping quarters being provided in existing station buildings.

While some concern was initially expressed over where the additional monies would come from, officials told the director that more detailed information would be needed. Director Dankel said he is currently preparing a complete package on the four-men EMT concept, including cost and scheduling factors, for the council's review.

In stressing one of his highest priorities is increased street patrolling, Director Dankel said by replacing the 40 hour/week standby public safety officer with 56 hour/week EMTs, the department gains one additional street patrol officer every shift of every day.

"Said another way, by hiring four EMTs at \$14,000/year we gain the net effect of hiring five PSOs at \$22,000/year, or \$56,000 versus \$110,000," he stated in a recent memo which viewed salaries only.

"Unusual Opportunity" "For \$56,000/year we can increase the number of officers on the street by one third for the day shift, one third for the afternoon shift and one quarter for the mid-night shift. This is a very unusual opportunity," he noted.

At this time, the department has five officers who have EMT training and are preparing for their state licensed exam. Four more are scheduled to enroll for a 16-week EMT course today, August 23, at Macomb County Community College.

But the director pointed out the city could not afford the training effort required to license 47 employees as EMTs.

"Our current method of operation calls for all of our public safety officers to be licensed as ambulance attendants. As the standby duty in the station is rotated, each man takes his turn assigned to the ambulance. To continue operating in this manner would require all of our PSOs to become licensed EMTs," he said.

Because of the 16-week, 120-hour training course required for EMTs, plus extensive continuing education requirements for re-licensing every two years, he felt that course of action would be impractical. He also indicated that public safety unions are strongly opposed to training a large number of current PSOs as EMTs.

Eyes Alternatives While some officials are hoping that the city might receive an additional extension regarding compliance, Director Dankel feels its imperative that some planning begin immediately.

In relation to this process, he told the council that The Shores has expressed some interest in contracting with The Woods if nothing pans out on the legislative front on further extensions.

While The Woods averages around 425 ambulance runs a year, (with an estimated 325 involving the transport of a patient), The Shores has under 100 runs per year, having around 75 last year alone. If both communities can reach agreement, Woods officials indicated this would help defray the cost of hiring four EMTs, (if this route becomes a reality).

Shores Public Safety Director Joseph Vitale said if his municipality is unable to receive another extension, two alternatives would be to contract with The Woods or with a private ambulance company. But what transpires depends on the respective ad-

ministrators and councils.

While planning on seeking a one-year extension at the end of the year, Director Vitale stressed all his men will be kept licensed as ambulance attendants, who are thus able to render first aid. In this respect, he had high praise for Officer Dan Healy, who is a Red Cross instructor, in keeping his men trained.

Trenches Different If his department is unable to receive an extension, the Village won't be able to participate in an ambulance service. "We'll be knocked out of the ballpark as far as transportation goes," he said.

An extension notwithstanding, Director Vitale echoed the feelings of many local city, police and fire officials regarding an amendment to the legislation exempting municipalities from the requirement of having an EMT in the patient compartment during transport if the particular community is within five miles of a hospital.

Like other Pointe officials, Director Vitale also emphasized the benefits of local ambulance services in relation to quick responses and transportation to area hospitals.

Somewhat bemoaning the status of the situation, he added, in viewing the legislators, "The people in the tents don't know what it's like in the trenches."

Earlier this year, a position paper on ambulance service was approved by the Grosse Pointe-Harper Woods Mutual Aid Association. Director Dankel, who hosted a meeting of police, fire and state officials to explore the ramifications of EMT laws in March, prepared the first draft of the document, which was subsequently reviewed and edited by association representatives.

While the paper indicates that the officials feel the legislation requiring EMTs on all ambulances has some merit, they stated there should be provisions in the law that allow for exceptions under certain prescribed circumstances.

Seeking Relief For example, officials said, because of "our proximity to hospital emergency rooms, (e.g., Saint John, Bon Secours and Cottage Hospitals), and the prohibitive cost of conducting an EMT program, some relief should be granted from the strict requirements of the Public Health Code."

Citing the overtime costs alone in training personnel, the officials proposed that municipally operated ambulance services within a reasonable distance of an acceptable hospital emergency room should be exempted from the requirement of having an EMT in the patient compartment whenever a person is being transported. "We are proposing that our ambulance service(s) be allowed to continue operating as they are now with each vehicle staffed by two licensed attendants," they said.

However, with December 31 steadily approaching, Woods officials at the urging of Director Dankel are striving to come up with some alternative which will be feasible and maintain the quality of service to the citizenry.

In the other Pointes, The City is already contracting with The Park for its ambulance service, while The Farms plans to continue its service as long as the state will permit, said City Manager Andrew Bremer. Pending further developments, the possibility remains that The Farms could contract for the service at some point in time.

New Hill Drugstore Discussed

(Continued from Page 1) effort, I still believe service is my greatest asset." Mr. Holsinger, who has run the store since 1956, said he has already had quite a few of his customers assure him of their continued support.

He says he's concerned that the long range development plans for the Hill may be upset as a result of Salem Square leaving.

However, plans for a large medical-retail office building to be located on the corner of Muir and Kercheval continue, with Peter V. Bologna of 81 Investment Company showing the Farms Council at its Monday, August 20, meeting, architectural drawings of the proposal.

Mr. Bologna made no reference to the Perry Drug Store matter in his presentation.

Michael Burns, president of the Hill Association, says a big concern of the Hill merchants is that a greater percentage of people will now shop exclusively at that location, without patronizing the other shops. Customers at Salem Square presently tend to walk around to other shops as well.

Mr. Burns says merchants will be competing with more than they may have originally thought, as he found Perry stores carry a large toy section, paper products, greeting cards, books and magazines, as well as some basic foods such as milk and eggs, and possibly liquor.

He also fears the loss of local ownership will adversely affect the Hill.

A First Time
"Nine out of 10 businesses are now owned by Grosse Pointers," he said. "And most aren't chain stores. This sort of opens up the dam. Other businesses of their type will be looking at possibly locating here."

"I don't know why they picked the Hill," he continued. "All the Perrys we looked at were in a shopping center with a grocery store next door. I don't see any advantages created by that store."

There will be no new items brought in."

Mr. Burns cited parking problems as another problem that will be brought by the store.

But Bernie Thomas, an executive with Perry, doesn't feel a drugstore would create as much parking problems as are now present with the grocery store.

While acknowledging that most of the firm's 60 stores are located in shopping centers with a grocery store nearby, Mr. Thomas says such a setup "isn't a requisite for a new store," and Perry now has a few stores that are by themselves.

Mr. Thomas said this is the first time in the firm's 22 years that major objections have been raised to a new store location.

Objects to Reports
"We have watched the situation and have seen with some admiration the loyalty of that community to a merchant. We believe our store will also generate that kind of loyalty after the emotionalism dies down."

He objected to reports that his firm had anything to do with Salem Square's inability to renew its lease, calling that situation a matter strictly between them and the landlord, (A. Charles Manning).

Only four of the firm's 60 stores are 24-hour operations, he stated, and the Hill store wouldn't be another. The store is aiming to draw its business from a one mile radius of the store, he said, a claim which at least one Farms resident, Mrs. Muriel Charbonneau, disputes. Research she has done indicates that Perry aims to draw customers from a four-mile radius.

Mr. Thomas said the four-mile radius figure was an average industry-wide figure, and not applicable to the Hill store.

He said the structure would be extensively renovated, including some exterior changes.


"We spend a lot of money on industrial design," he said. "We don't run a backyard operation. This will be a typical neighborhood drugstore."

Farms Unconvinced
The Farms Council, however, apparently isn't convinced, as it continues to have its consultants and attorneys explore possible ways to limit hours of operation, and even control what types of businesses can locate in the area.

One of the possibilities they are researching is limiting the numbers of certain types of businesses in an area.

City Attorney Kathleen Lewis said further research needs to be done on the limitation proposal, but said that an ordinance restricting hours of operation would probably be valid as long as it was evenly applied to all businesses, and was not discriminatory.

The council, however, is approaching the subject matter very cautiously, partly because, as City Manager Andrew Bremer pointed out, a lot of discussion aimed against Perry Drug would hurt The Farms if it were ever brought to court in the matter.





New Directors to Boost School Sports Program

Two high school coaches were appointed to full-time athletic director positions by the Board of Education last week as part of an effort to beef up sports programs at all levels of the public schools.

South High School's Chuck Hollosy and North's Tom Gauerke were named to the new administrative positions on Monday, August 13. The two will give up all coaching and teaching duties to direct athletic and intramural programs from elementary through high school.

Both men had served as directors of athletics for their individual schools in the past. They were not classified as administrators, however, and were part of the teachers' bargaining unit, the Grosse Pointe Education Association, (GPEA).

Shortly after the appointments were made last week, the GPEA filed an unfair labor practice charge against the School Board with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission, (MERC).

The charge is based "on the fact that they have assigned responsibilities performed by members of our bargaining unit to administrators and that they did it unilaterally," according to union president Curt Lange. A hearing is scheduled for late September.

Mr. Lange said it was unfortunate that the appointments were made in the midst of last-minute contract

negotiations between the School Board and the GPEA. The teachers' contract expired on June 30 and both teams are meeting regularly in an attempt to hammer out a new pact before school begins next month.

"It's regrettable that this had to come up now," Mr. Lange said. "I hope it won't have an impact on negotiations. Besides this issue, we've been very pleased with the progress at the table."

The new administrative positions will only add four-tenths of a position to the school system payroll and will cost about \$11,600 a year, according to Superintendent Dr. William Coats.

A big part of the athletic directors' jobs will be administration of the burgeoning sports program at the high schools which last year in-

cluded 17 teams and more than 400 events for each school.

Mr. Hollosy said as director he also will be responsible for coping with the "serious problem" of recruiting qualified coaches for new athletic teams. He also will be responsible for evaluating personnel.

Mr. Gauerke said he'll miss coaching next year, but added that "there's just no way one person can do both coaching and directing jobs" at a school the size of North.

"Since our program for girls has been developed, the directors' responsibilities have expanded tremendously," he said. "Hiring officials, purchasing equipment, arranging transportation for all the meets and coordinating intramurals is enough of a job for any one person."

The School Board's goals for 1979-80, also approved this month, call for improvements in opportunities for girls in athletics as well as the overall middle school and high school intramural programs.

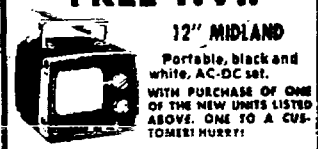

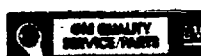

Wine Lines

Park Improvements Eyed By Beautification Group

A recent tour by the Park's Beautification Commission of the community's parks indicates that the parks are in need of some improvement in several areas.

At least that was the consensus of the commission at its Monday, August 20, meeting when members discussed the present condition of Windmill Pointe and Three Mile parks.

The commission touched up on litter, maintenance of the pools and landscaping, among other areas.

"One of the reasons for the tour of Windmill Pointe Park was to take an overview of the city and to look at things that need to be done so this commission may establish some priorities," Chairperson Ann M. MacDonald stated.

The overall feeling of commission members was that Windmill Pointe Park is in need of improvements in almost every area. However, members were

especially critical of the park's bathroom facilities.

Concern also was brought up over the condition of the roof on the pool house. The commission felt, too, that pool personnel might be trained to clean and maintain the pool area better.

About the only area that the commission felt satisfied with was the playground equipment.

Three Mile Park received somewhat higher marks from the commission, but the group also was dissatisfied with that park's bathroom facilities. Members noted the need for more benches, picnic tables and grills at the park.

Aside from the evaluation of the parks, the commission established a tree commission with Michael Krag as chairman.

Mr. Krag said that the number one priority of the tree commission is to develop a public awareness of Dutch Elm Disease, (DED). He further indicated possibilities of establishing an elm watch in neighborhoods where volunteers from each block would survey trees in surrounding areas to check for DED.

"We need to get people attuned to the problems of dutch elm disease," Mr. Krag said.

At its Monday, August 13, meeting, the Park Council approved three additional members to the Beautification Commission. They are Carolyn Dettmer of Lakeshore road, Frank Gildea of Barrington road and Clara Odell of Balfour road.

The next meeting of the commission is on Wednesday, September 5, at city hall, 15115 Jefferson avenue, at 7:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2.7a OF THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE AS ADOPTED BY THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:
Section 1.
Section 2.7a of the Uniform Traffic Code, as adopted by the City of Grosse Pointe Park, is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

Sec. 2.7a Storage Charges. Before the owner or person in charge of an impounded vehicle shall be permitted to remove the same from the custody of the Police Department, he shall furnish evidence of his identity and of his ownership or authority, he shall sign a receipt for the vehicle, and he shall pay charges to cover the cost of removing the vehicle from the street or highway, plus storage charges.

This Ordinance shall take effect on September 1, 1979.

in the limited hydroplane circuits.

When they make their presentation, the group will be armed with statistics from the Unlimited Hydroplane Commission showing a return of 20 to one on the investment of the advertising dollar.

AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE CODE NO. 12-03 ORDINANCE NO. 237

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ARTICLE 4 OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS BEING "AN ORDINANCE TO PROMOTE, PROTECT AND PROVIDE FOR, IN THE INTERESTS OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH IN THE CITY, ITS CHARACTER AS A RESIDENTIAL COMMUNITY, AND THE GENERAL TREND THEREIN OF BUILDING AND POPULATION DEVELOPMENTS; TO ESTABLISH DISTRICTS IN THE CITY; TO REGULATE THE USE OF LAND AND STRUCTURES THEREIN AND TO REGULATE AND RESTRICT THE LOCATION OF TRADES AND BUSINESSES, AND THE LOCATION OF STRUCTURES DESIGNATED FOR SPECIFIC USES; TO REGULATE AND DETERMINE THE AREA OF YARDS, AND OTHER OPEN SPACES; TO LIMIT AND RESTRICT THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF FAMILIES WHICH MAY BE HOUSED IN DWELLINGS; TO PROVIDE FOR MINIMUM OFF-STREET PARKING FACILITIES FOR MOTOR VEHICLES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE; TO PROVIDE FOR A BOARD OF APPEALS AND ITS POWERS AND DUTIES AND TO PRESCRIBE THE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE."

The City of Grosse Pointe Farms ordains:

[Section 1. Article 4 of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 192, enacted July 16, 1973, is hereby amended by adding Section 404 which will read as follows:]

In all residential districts in the City, refrigeration equipment used for central air conditioning purposes and installed outside a residential dwelling or its attached structures, shall be located in the rear or side yard, as defined in Article II, Section 201, 59 of the Zoning Ordinance. Provided, however, that such equipment shall be installed in the rear of the structure, between the extreme sides, and not less than three feet from either side of the structure. Refrigeration equipment installed outside a residential structure prior to the date of this amendment shall not constitute a nonconforming characteristic of that structure or make that residence a nonconforming structure.

[Section 2. In all other respects, Ordinance No. 192, as heretofore amended, shall remain in full force and effect, except as amended herein.]

[Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its enactment or upon its publication, whichever is later.]

GPT Helps Give Fries Auditorium A New Look

Grosse Pointe Theater, (GPT), members "took it all off" in the Fries Auditorium of the War Memorial the week of August 13.

A tough crew of around 25 stripped the existing rigging and lighting hardware from the stage, making it ready for the installation of the newly-purchased rigging, curtain and computerized lighting system.

("Rigging" is the ceiling-to-floor network of pipes, ropes, pulleys, et. al., by which scenery is raised and lowered.)

Berkey Colortran, Burbank, Cal., the principal contractor, began the renovation, which is expected to take three to four weeks, on Monday, August 20.

When the work is completed, "GPT will be functioning on a safe, efficient stage, with one of the most modern lighting systems of any theater of its size," according to Tom Gallagher of Hampton road, GPT president.

The installation was made possible by a joint purchase by GPT and the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association. Total cost is estimated at around \$86,000, shared equally by the two organizations.

GPT's share, which is a contribution to the association, is the result of many years of accumulated savings, which have been set aside in a special building fund.

John Lake, executive director of the War Memorial, said, "This cooperative investment is a major step in the long and very successful association between GPT and the War Memorial. We hope that it will continue for many more years."

GPT, which was founded in 1948, first moved into Fries Auditorium in 1963.

The purchase was approved by the GPT board of directors and board of trustees, and by the association's board of directors.

A GPT committee consisting of Dale Pegg of Fairholme road, 1978-79 president, Chuck Sortor of St.

Clair Shores, 1978-79 technical chairman, and Dean Erskine of St. Clair Shores have put together the project over the past two years, assessing requirements and reviewing competitive bids.

Berkey Colortran, the successful bidder, is highly experienced in the installation of professional production house rigging systems, officials say.

Improved safety was the main motivation for buying the new rigging. The all-new system, which will meet the extensive building code requirements, will include a steel frame arrangement, using the existing walls for support.

Besides the safety factor, the renovation greatly increases the flexibility and efficiency of the stage. For example, raising and lowering the rigging will be made faster and easier by a counterweight method, which replaces the old winch arrangement.

New heavy velour stage draperies and related hardware will replace the existing curtains, which are badly worn. The "grand drapes" will be a rich gold shade, complementing the grey-green color scheme of the theater.

The new lighting system will offer possibilities for much greater creativity and sensitivity in lighting a show. It includes the following:

- A Channel Track Control Center, with potential for 1,000 light cues, incorporating such features as a memory control, which can select and store scenes and lighting "fade times" in any order.
- A modern power center, with 30, 3,600-watt dimmers. (The old dimmers were 1,200-watt).
- A professional "patch panel" on stage, with a capacity of 105 circuits, (twice the current number).
- A Stage Control Center for small productions, e.g., Children's Theater, War Memorial movies and lectures, et. al., which can be used instead of the bigger master system.

In spite of the sophistication of the lighting system, it is designed so that anyone can operate it with a minimum of instruction.

The first "experts" on the full "package" — rigging, curtains and lighting — will be the crew of "Anything Goes," by Cole Porter, the first production of GPT's 1979-80 season, which opens October 24 and runs through November 3.

(Editor's Note: This letter, a copy of which was sent to the NEWS, is addressed "to World Adventure Series speakers, their agents, my fellow sponsors, friends" from President George F. Pierrot on his retirement from the series on Saturday, September 1.)

Reluctantly, I announce my retirement from the World Adventure Series, effective September 1. Our shows will continue as scheduled, but they will be wholly conducted by the Founders Society of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

I retire for reasons of health. My eyesight gets worse and at 81 there will be no improvement. After my mini-heart attack last November 1, my doctors cancelled my speaking engagements and all similar commitments. I had to miss more than half of my 1978-79 shows.

My long-time friend, Tom Freil, did a splendid job of pinch-hitting for me and was ably assisted by Mary Aceti, Dave Craig and others of our staff.

But Tom, public relations director of the Automobile Club of Michigan, America's largest state AAA, found this extra work considerably more than he had time for. He told me last winter that he would need to cut down.

So, after careful consideration of several top-quality options, our board decided that the Museum's Founders Society, our associates from the beginning, should be given first choice.

Subsequent conferences between the World Adventure Series board of directors and the executive committee of the Founders Society brought quick agreement in principle. Dr. Frederick J. Cummings, chief executive of both the Museum and the Founders Society, is especially enthusiastic.

This transaction represents an outright free gift of the World Adventure Series to the Founders Society. It includes our trademarked name and logo, our speakers' contracts, our confidential mailing list, and such other documents, records, promotional and other materials as are essential to the series operation.

Most important of all we pass on a record of 46 years of distinguished service to Michigan and the worldwide illustrated travel field.

History has repeated itself. Nearly 20 years ago the World Adventure Series organized the Birmingham and Grosse Pointe Travel courses, operated them four and five

years until each was safely in the black, then gave each, outright, gratis, to the Birmingham and Grosse Pointe Community Houses.

It is not easy for me to say goodbye to the World Adventure Series. It was back in 1931, when I was editor of the Detroit published "American Boy-Youth's Companion" magazine, that I first became a volunteer worker for the Museum.

The late Edsel B. Ford, head of the Arts Commission that ran the city-owned Museum, saw the urgent need for more helpers and income. The Great Depression was paralyzing everything.

So Edsel and his right-hand man, Fred L. Black, incorporated a new group of volunteers to supplement the Founders Society. They called it the Peoples' Museum Association. Fred Black, the association's first president, appointed me to the board.

The first job Fred gave me was publicity director for the Museum. Later, in 1933, he asked me to take over and build attendance at the Museum's free Sunday afternoon public performances, then operated by the Founders Society. Attendance averaged 150.

With six experimental shows, using professional talent, we found we could fill the auditorium. A most fortunate discovery!

Two months later the city, because of delinquent taxes, virtually deserted the Museum.

There was money to heat and guard the building, none for curators' salaries or educational programs. It was then that the Peoples' Museum Association saved the educational department. Dr. Edgar P. Richardson, then educational director, told me that he had received a \$4,000 offer from Cincinnati. He didn't want to leave, but there was no guarantee in Detroit.

At my request, dynamic Albert Kahn, world famous architect, called a meeting of fellow Arts Commissioners, Edsel B. Ford and Robert H. Tannahill, and myself. I explained we had to meet the Cincinnati offer immediately. Further, Dr. Richardson had told me that unless he were given an additional \$1,800 to continue free monthly exhibitions, gallery talks to school children and other visiting groups there'd be no point in his staying.

We agreed that each of the four of us should guarantee \$1,000, thus matching the Cincinnati offer. In addition, I agreed to raise the additional \$1,800. This was in May 1933. Thus I had time to organize and promote the World Adventure Series, using paid professional speakers and donating my own office and time and charging 25 to 35 cents for tickets.

We opened the following September, with four turn-away crowds. We have never in our history passed the tenth of the month without paying all bills. The World Adventure Series has been financed 100 percent by my own personal credit, my donations of time and otherwise entirely by ticket admissions. We have never passed the hat nor accepted gifts or donations.

We continued to make grants to the educational department as long as the emergency existed.

Commenting on these early years, Lowell Thomas says in his latest published memoirs — "So Long Until Tomorrow" — that the World Adventure Series Program soon became the best known in the world.

And Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, leader of the Gobi Desert Expedition, that discovered the dinosaur eggs, and later director of the American Museum of Natural History, called us "the most valuable educational lecture course in America."

Our Museum and Founders Society are excellently equipped to carry on our great tradition. They possess, among others, outstanding departments of Education and Performing Arts; they operate a ticket office serviced daily; they are fully staffed for promotion and publicity. The auditorium is being refurbished.

Soon, I'll be writing a thumbnail history of the World Adventure Series that will mention scores of people who've been in our program. ... Meanwhile, thanks to everybody.

Pancake Bake to Aid Scouts

With help from friends, Detroit area Boy Scouts are ready for a one-day effort Friday, August 24, to cook at least 10,000 buttermilk pancakes and 7,000 sausages and serve them to downtown shoppers and office workers with more than 600 quarts of coffee and milk.

The seventh annual Boy Scout Pancake Bake runs from 7:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on the Kern Block. Its sponsor is the Urban Advisory Committee, (UAC), of the Detroit Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America, with a \$2 ticket buying all you can eat.

Around eight troops from The Pointe area are scheduled to participate, officials report.

Since the first pancake bake, the Scouts have sold nearly 30,000 sausages, more than 4,000 quarts of coffee and milk and roughly 40,000 pancakes — enough for a stack as tall as the Detroit Plaza Hotel.

An estimated 100 Scouts from 10 troops will camp overnight on the Kern Block tonight, August 23, to get a jump on the next day's activities. They will mark off territory, stake their tents and plant troop flags beginning at about 5:30 p.m.

"The money we raise will be used to provide camp scholarships for central-city Scouts who lack financial means to go on their own," says Jim Thrower, manager of community relations for the Stroh Brewery Company and chairman of the 1979 Pancake Bake.

Mr. Thrower and Walter R. Greene, UAC chairman and vice-president of National Bank of Detroit, expect at least 4,000 Detroiters to buy pancake breakfasts or lunches. Many Detroit notables also will put in an appearance at the griddle to help promote sales.

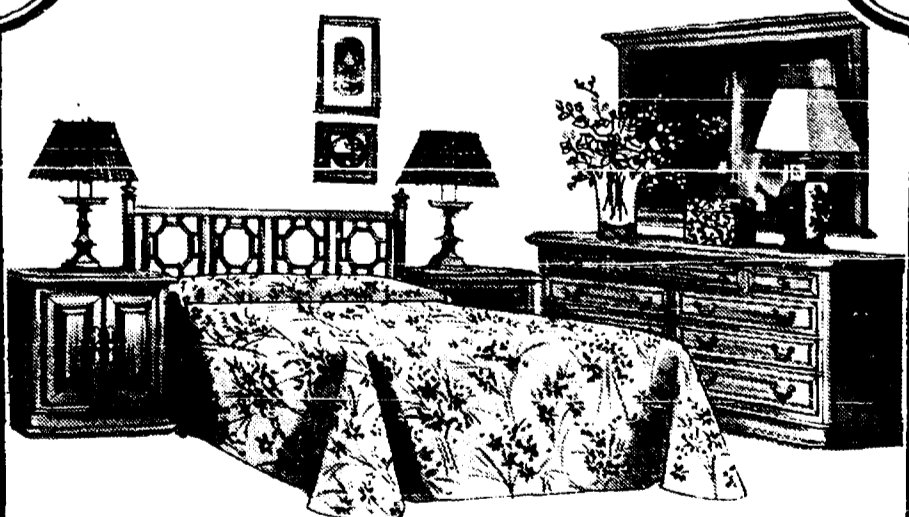

Extend Lives of Cut Roses

You can make cut roses last longer by recutting the stems before inserting them in water and by using a floral preservative.

The key to this procedure is to make the new cut under water. H. Paul Rasmussen, Michigan State University horticulturist, explains.

"When a rose is cut from the plant, the cells that carried water and soluble nutrients and other compounds to the flower trap a small bubble of air at the end of the stem.

"With the base of the stem blocked with air, water cannot get up the stem even if it's available."

The stem also may become blocked with sugars that were on their way from the foliage to the roots when the stem was cut. They may move across the cut surface and be drawn up into the water-conducting cells.

There they can crystallize and block those cells, espec-

ally if air has moved in first. Both air and sugar blockage occur in the first half-inch of cut rose stem, Rasmussen points out. Making a new cut will remove the blockage.

To avoid letting the stem gulf in another air bubble, make the new cut under water. Then move the rose immediately to its new water supply, before the end of the stem dries off.

Use a floral preservative according to label directions to supply the cut blossoms with nutrients, Rasmussen advises. This can increase the vase life of cut roses by 30 to 50 percent.

Roses that develop a weak stem just below the bud can be revived and replaced in the arrangement. Recut the stem about one inch from the base—underwater—then submerge the bloom, foliage and stem in warm water, (about 100 degrees F), for about 20 minutes.

Museum Takes Show on Road

Seven traveling exhibitions from the Detroit Institute of Arts have been viewed by 38,000 people in 86 Michigan communities, according to Christine Ruby, Statewide Services coordinator at the museum.

Twenty fine art lectures attracted another 1,000 art enthusiasts throughout the state, and 108,000 children enjoyed live Youthatre productions in 80 other cities.

These figures highlight the fourth year of the Art Institute's "Show on the Road" program which runs from September to August of each year.

"Since Show on the Road's modest beginning in 1975," Ruby says, "each year has seen an increase in the quality of the presentations and in overall community response."

The fourth season has included works owned by Detroit collectors: "African Art," "To the Indus with Alexander the Great," "John Brown the Abolitionist by Jacob Lawrence," "The Changing Face of the Sphinx," "The Parthenon: 2500 Years of Change," "African Art: A Photo-Essay" and "19th Century French Painting."

As of May, many of the exhibitions had completed their tours. But some of them—"The Parthenon: 2500 Years of Change" and "African Art: A Photo-Essay"—continue through August.

Because of its popularity, Ruby notes, "John Brown the Abolitionist by Jacob Lawrence" is booked around the state through next January.

Michael Farrell, popular Detroit Institute of Arts lecturer, continues as the principal lecturer of "Show on the Road."

His talks during this fourth season have provided insight, factual information and cultural enrichment for residents as far away from Detroit as Escanaba, Menominee and Traverse City.

Youthatre, meanwhile, has traveled 15 live productions, providing 201 performances in large and small Michigan communities.

The art institute also has offered school teaching packets, managed teacher workshops, provided professional advice and provided and provided help to smaller state museums through its conservation services laboratory.

The fifth season of "Show on the Road" will find seven exhibitions on tour for two to six weeks in more than 100 Michigan communities and school districts. To date, a dozen Farrell lectures are planned for 1979-80.

Big State Fair Opens Friday

The "biggest and best ever" Grand Opening Parade of the 1979 Michigan State Fair will roll down Fort Street in Downtown Detroit today, August 23. The fair, oldest in the nation, opens tomorrow, August 24, at 10 a.m. and runs through Labor Day, September 3.

More than 160 bands, floats, equestrian teams and other units — including some from Ohio and Canada — will comprise the parade, headed by weather experts from Detroit's three major television stations. Sonny Eliot of WDIV-TV, Jerry Hodak of WXYZ-TV and Barry ZeVan of WJBK-TV will serve as Grand Marshals.

The parade will begin at 11:30 a.m. at Fort and Third, moving east to Woodward, then south to Jefferson and finally west to Griswold.

Harold Arnoldi, State Fair director of special events, said this year's is the largest fair parade ever "by far" and

the units are the "highest quality ever."

Weathercasters have been parade grand marshals since 1978, after the infamous "Rain Fair" of 1975 saw nine of the Fair's 11 days washed out by record-breaking showers.

"Having the weather experts lead the parade has worked miracles," said State Fair manager William P. Upina. "Instead of record-breaking rains, we've had gorgeous late-summer Michigan weather and record-breaking gate revenues the past three years."

Mr. Upina foresees the streak continuing for this fair, the first under the direction of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. He noted fairgoers also will notice more than just cosmetic changes.

"We've torn down some unsightly old buildings, revamped and brightened the Coliseum and replaced the drab old benches and tables with attractive new ones in the entertainment and picnic areas," he said.

Decorations, he points out, will include candy-stripping of poles, bunting for buildings and "a mile of pennants," multicolored banners whose total length surpasses a mile.

The red, white and blue theme of the fair will include a star-spangled lineup of free entertainment, including Chic, the group with a top record in the nation, "Good Times."

Other top names include country-pop singers Eddie Rabbit and Crystal Gayle, rock-disco groups Sister Sledge, Styx and Tavares and country stars Crisly Lane, the Oak Ridge Boys and Crash Craddock.

Detroit ventriloquist Willie Tyler and Lester also will be featured. All those acts and more are free with the cost of fair admission — \$3, with children under 12 free when accompanied by an adult.

A special feature attraction of the Midway this year will be a steam ferris wheel, billed as "an old-fashioned ride at old-fashioned prices."

Fairgoers will be able to ride the wheel, powered by coal and wood, for 25 cents. The Fred Silber Co. and W.G. Wade Shows also will provide a 1930 Ford truck with a 1914 band organ and a calliope for continuous concerts next to the ferris wheel.

The Michigan State Fair was founded in 1849.

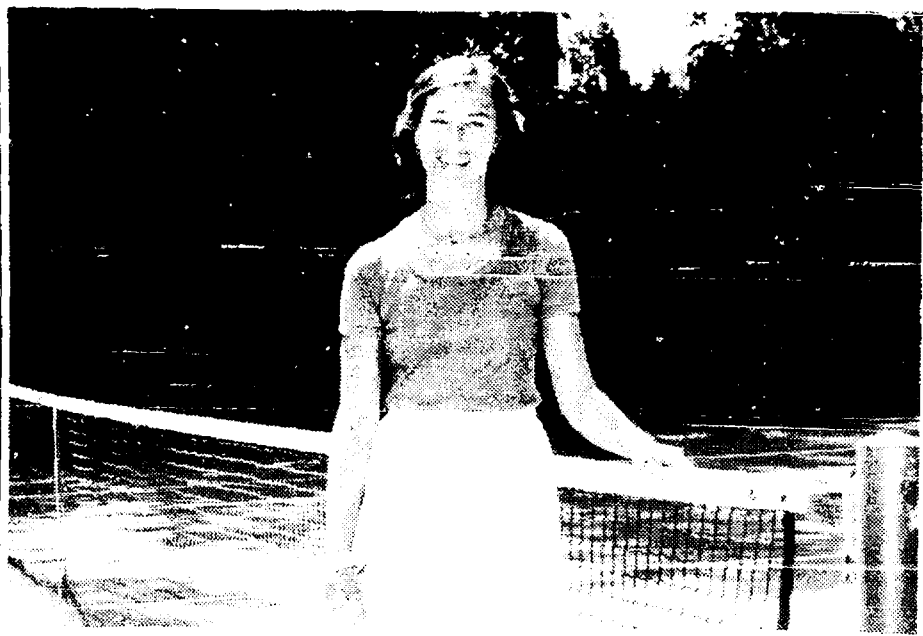

The funds are designated for the Psychiatry/Psychology Service at the hospital. Its director, Dr. Joseph Fischhoff, who made a presentation to T&C's board of directors along with several other department heads, shared his department's needs with the board, stressing the "psychology and social care aspects of family life and its importance in the well-being of children."

Year of The Child During this International Year of The Child, as designated by the United Nations General Assembly in November, 1959, underscoring children's rights to nutrition and medical care and the right to specialized care if handicapped, it is important to note that psychological problems not recognized before are now being treated.

"The Children's Hospital Psychiatry/Psychology Service, staffed by three medical doctors, five psychologists and two to three social workers, is one of the largest departments of its type in the country," says Mrs. McGann.

The service treats children affected by emotional, learning, developmental or psychosomatic disorders, problems which can be manifested as minor behavior disfunctions or even attempted suicide.
