**Thursday, August 23**  
**OVER A MILLION UAW** members from around the country took time out from their jobs to write President Jimmy Carter a postcard urging him to adopt a windfall profits tax on the oil companies. Earlier, the Big Three companies warned the workers that they would be penalized for joining the protest. However, workers in Framingham, Mass., ignored the warning and walked off their jobs after learning that management would dock their pay if they took time away from their jobs to write the White House. UAW President Douglas Fraser said the union proceeded with writing the President "because it dramatized the problem."

**Friday, August 24**  
**LT. GOV. JAMES H. Brickley** estimated that Wayne County's deficit for this year may run as high as \$38 million, a figure twice that predicted by county officials. Mr. Brickley indicated that Wayne County "is out of control of its own affairs" and that the state will step in and take over county services if the county runs out of money. It is not certain whether the state's Municipal Finance Commission will approve a request from the county to roll over this year's debt into 1980 and grant \$22 million in borrowed funds from anticipated tax receipts for next year.

**Saturday, August 25**  
**IF YOU THOUGHT** you could exceed the 55 mph limit by five miles and get away with it, don't be too sure any more. Michigan drivers going over 55 and up to 60 will be stopped by state police and given a verbal warning. Those drivers exceeding 60 mph, however, will receive a ticket. The crackdown on speeders is part of an effort to comply with federal funding guidelines that call for a 70 percent compliance with the 55 mph speed limit.

**Sunday, August 26**  
**A BLUE-JET REMAINDER** grounded at Kennedy Airport with U. S. officials waiting to question the wife of a defected Bolshoi Ballet star aboard the plane to see if she wants to return to the Soviet Union voluntarily. The State Department maintained that the Soviets are forcing Ludmila Vlasova, a Bolshoi ballerina, to return to the Soviet Union, ignoring an agreement between the U.S. that the ballerina could not leave this country until she was interviewed by the U.S. to see if she is returning to the Soviet Union of her own free will. She ultimately flew home to Moscow on Monday after saying she was not being taken home against her will.

**Monday, August 27**  
**POPE JOHN PAUL II** was greeted with a blizzard in his visit to northern Italy's Dolomite Alps where he commemorated the first anniversary of Pope John Paul I's election as Pontiff. John Paul I died of a heart attack after 34 days in office. Pope John Paul II later blessed a carved wood image of the former Pontiff. About 15,000 people filled the tiny village of Canale D'Agordo, the birthplace of Pope John Paul I, to hear the Pope eulogize his predecessor.

**Tuesday, August 28**  
**THE IRISH REPUBLICAN** Army (IRA), claimed responsibility for the bomb explosion that killed British soldier-statesman Lord Louis Mountbatten aboard his yacht near Northern Ireland. Some hours later, another bomb explosion killed at least 17 British soldiers, Lord Mountbatten, 79, was a cousin of Queen Elizabeth and his death marked the first attack against the British family.

## School to Open on Wednesday

**Agreement between Teachers' Union, Board Dictates Change from Past Practice**

In a letter sent to the parents of all public school students last week, Superintendent of Schools Dr. William Coats announced that agreement on the opening date of school had been reached by the bargaining teams for the teachers' association and the Board of Education. The agreement calls for teachers to report to their buildings on Tuesday, September 4, and for the students to start school with a full day of instruction on Wednesday, September 5.

**Dictates Necessity**  
This represents a change in the first day of school for students in that for the past several years the first student attendance day was the Thursday following Labor Day. Although the agreement on the opening schedule reached at the bargaining table last week is tentative, having to be submitted to the MEA/NEA Local 1 Bargaining Committee, Dr. Coats indicated that the rapidly approaching time for school to begin dictated the necessity for his letter announcing the schedule.

In his letter Dr. Coats also mentioned that the rest of the school calendar is still being negotiated and that when it is settled, the schedule will be publicized in (Continued on Page 6)

## Latest POP Flyer Draws Angry Response from GP Park Councilman

**Douglas G. Graham Attacks Content of Pamphlet Which Criticizes Acceptance of HUD Monies into Community; Solons Adopt Resolution to Clear the Air on Programs**

Reaction to the latest flyer put out by Proud Of The Park, (POP), resulted in a shouting match between Park Councilman Douglas G. Graham and POP president Mathew E. Connor at the Monday, August 21, council meeting.

The flyer is the latest in a series of pamphlets distributed by POP that attack City Manager John R. Crawford for his acceptance of HUD monies into the community. Mr. Graham charged that the flyer, titled "Grosse Pointe Park Set-Up for A Giant Rip-Off by HUD" was "bordering on libel" and that it was filled with "inferences and innuendos that suggest fraud and deceit."

**More on Way**  
The councilman strongly suggested and encouraged residents to come forward and ask the city administration for the answers and not depend on POP flyers. "There should be much light thrown on the matter to show that it's hogwash and nonsense. I am absolutely positive that this kind of material is being used in Grosse Pointe Park elections," Mr. Graham stated. Mr. Graham then questioned Mr. Connor on the validity of the material in the flyer. "I don't think I was asked to address this council. You know where I live. Come and see me," Mr. Connor told the councilman. Mr. Connor later indicated that his organization has checked out all the information in the flyer. "We have checked all that

we have said and are prepared and ready for a libel suit." The POP president said the flyers were distributed last weekend and that there will be many more to follow before the November election when Park voters will go to the polls to elect a mayor and three councilmen.

**Owes It to City**  
Mayor Matthew C. Patterson, who is seeking his 16th year in office, and council incumbents Clayton P. Alandt, Dr. Roger F. McNeill and Charles S. Tompkins have been targets of POP during the election for their support of HUD programs in The Park. Council candidate John Prost also has been referred to in POP flyers as a "HUD lover."

Mr. Patterson's opponent in the mayoral race, Councilman George J. Verdonck, is vehemently opposed to HUD funding as are two other council candidates, Daniel A. Schaitberger and Anthony J. Spada.

## Incinerator Gets Breath Of New Life

**State Air Pollution Control Commission to Allow Its Continued Operation until at Least September**

Grosse Pointe's garbage will continue to be burned for the time being, as the Michigan Air Pollution Control Commission will allow continued operation of the Clinton Township incinerator at least until its next meeting in September.

Grosse Pointe-Clinton Refuse Disposal Authority attorney Charles Towner said the commission, at its Monday, August 20, meeting in Escanaba, postponed a final decision on the matter until it had a chance to review the decision of a state hearing officer. His decision, according to Mr. Towner, recommends a variance be granted to allow operation of the incinerator until more extensive pollution control devices are installed, sometime in 1981.

**Another Concern**  
The commission, which in June voted not to grant any more pollution compliance extensions to the authority, meets only once a month. Its next meeting will be held in Lansing.

Another problem exists, however, with federal pollution standards, which became effective July 1. According to federal law, the Environmental Protection Agency, (EPA), can assess non-compliance penalties designed to make it non-economical to operate a pollution source. Those penalties are supposed to be mandatory, without requiring court action.

Mr. Towner said, however, that "the rules and regulations aren't out yet" on such penalties, and thus haven't been assessed against the authority.

He noted that "there is still a question about the reasonableness of the state compliance order." (The order was issued in August 1978, setting a deadline of July 1979.)

Mr. Towner said the authority is working toward gaining state approval of its compliance implementation plan. If that is accomplished, it is hoped that the EPA will not press a case against it, he said.

**New Stack Eyed**  
The authority originally was granted an extension by the Macomb County Circuit Court to continue operation until September 15. That action was designed to give the (Continued on Page 2)

## Woods' Storm Sewer Project Reviewed Again

**Some Uncertainty over Program for Northeast Area Appears As Council Instructs Its City Engineer to Study Different Approach; Officials Plan to Seek Further Citizen Input Via Survey**

The status of the northeast relief storm sewer project in The Woods, which some officials had hoped would begin around two years ago, appears to be enveloped in some uncertainty at this time, although some hope it will commence in some form next spring.

This project was explored by the council sitting as the Committee of the Whole, (C-W), on Tuesday, August 14, at an informational meeting with area citizens on Wednesday, August 15, and by the council again at its regular meeting Monday, August 20.

As an outgrowth of the session on the 15th, Councilman Thomas Fahrner told his colleagues on the 20th that he learned that around one-third of the water which goes into the system reportedly comes from University Liggett School property.

**Downspouts Eyed**  
Based upon this, if the water draining from Liggett was eliminated perhaps citizens in the immediate area wouldn't have much of a problem with flooded basements, he indicated.

As a result, Mr. Fahrner suggested that Fate, Hinn and Bogue, Inc., city engineers, investigate the possibility of going from the Milk River up to Wedgewood with the relief sewer, check any potential flooding conditions and then ask area citizens to disconnect their downspouts, (a main topic of discussion at the C-W meeting).

After some discussion, the council ultimately approved a motion requesting City Engineer Larry Pate to research the possibility of Mr. Fahrner's suggestion, including a cost estimate, with consideration also being given to extend the sewer at a later time if necessary.

In relation to this, officials will prepare a survey, which is scheduled to be taken by telephone, of citizens in order to pinpoint the overall (Continued on Page 8)

## Hospital Loan Closet Offered

A hospital loan closet is maintained at the War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore road, for the free loan of hospital equipment for up to three months to citizens of The Pointe.

Wheel chairs, walkers, crutches, commodes, bed pans, canes, hospital beds and other equipment are available in limited supply.

Free blood also is available to Pointers in case of emergency through the Center's community blood bank. It should be replaced by relatives or friends within one year, officials add.

## Renovation Plans for Hill Jelling

**Farms Council Views Parking Deck, New Site for Service Station, Office Building**

Plans for the development and renovation of the On-the-Hill business district are beginning to come together, as evidenced by the actions at the Farms Council's Monday, August 20, meeting.

At that session, the council approved in principle an operating agreement with a firm proposing to build a parking deck, approved site plans for the new location of the Standard On-the-Hill service station, (subject to certain conditions), and view some drawings of the medical and retail office building planned for the corner of Muir road and Kercheval avenue.

Richard C. Rich and Associates will now conduct a study to find out exactly if it is feasible to build a parking structure and how big a deck demand would allow.

**Seeks Resolution**  
Amoco Oil Company will proceed with the renovation of the former Sunoco station adjacent to the South High School playground, and 81 Investment Company will continue with its plans to construct a contemporary styled building.

It was revealed at the session that Rich will operate the parking deck as well as the remainder of the present municipal lot.

Providing the firm can reach a separate agreement with Cottage Hospital, a good portion of the deck would be built on land currently owned by the hospital in Muir road, and cover a portion of the present city lot.

Irving Keane, representing Rich, sought a resolution to the problem of competition that may be created by the construction of another lot on Richard School land. This problem remains to be worked (Continued on Page 6)

## Agreement Dissolved by Managers

**Farms Expresses Interest in Contracting with Woods for Juvenile Investigative Services**

The Youth Service Division, (YSD), which had been functioning on paper only since June 30 after the School Board voted to withdraw its support on June 18, is now officially no longer in existence.

Based upon a review of the interest of participating municipalities, the YSD's board of managers, (including all Pointe city managers), on Wednesday morning, August 22, unanimously approved Park City Manager John Crawford's motion to discontinue the communities' current contract with the YSD.

Part of the motion stipulated that the remaining governmental units desiring to contract with The Woods on an individual basis to provide juvenile investigative services be permitted to do so, or to seek another alternative.

**Petersen Cited**  
At this point, The Farms has expressed a strong interest in such an arrangement, with The City basically taking a "wait and see" approach. The School Board has already expressed its intention, while officials in both The Shores and Park indicated they will handle their own juvenile cases.

Based upon this expression, a "voluntary termination" stipulation in the YSD contract says, "Should the supporting membership of the Youth Service Division agreement be reduced to three or less municipalities by the withdrawal or non-participation of members, the Youth Service Division shall terminate."

Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, who received the praise of his colleagues for serving as YSD coordinator for the life of the division, (almost nine years), said he will explore The Farms' request to provide (Continued on Page 2)

## Palmer Resigns As GPS Trustee

For the last six years, once a month, Robert Palmer has taken his place at the round table in The Shores council chambers to hear, discuss and vote on Village matters.

Last week, however, Mr. Palmer of Lakeshore road submitted his resignation because of health problems, indicating that he is suffering from back disorders.

Village President Gerald C. Schroeder accepted Mr. Palmer's resignation with "real regret" and commended him for his faithful service to the community.

Mr. Palmer indicated that he was forced to resign after his doctor ordered him to "take it easy" and to slow things down.

"I have enjoyed working for the Village. They are a nice bunch of people. I'd be there yet if it wasn't for this problem," Mr. Palmer said. In addition to serving as councilman since 1973, Mr. Palmer also served on the tax review board and the Village Planning Commission.

At the Shores Council meeting Tuesday morning, August 21, Mr. Schroeder announced that Mr. Palmer's vacancy will be filled by Chester F. Ogden of Hawthorne road.

Mr. Ogden was a Shores councilman for 14 years before being defeated for his seat in 1977 by Councilwoman Elizabeth Kuhlman.

The returning councilman is a retired executive vice-president of the Detroit Edison Company. He presently keeps busy as chairman of the board of the Michigan Cancer Foundation. Mr. Ogden will serve the remainder of Mr. Palmer's term, until May 1980.

(Continued from Page 1) juvenile investigative services with his city.

He said he has requested Public Safety Director John Dankel and Exec. Lt. Jack Patterson to meet with Farms Chief Robert Ferber to discuss the type of service needed, plus other factors, including costs.

In a related area, Mr. Petersen pointed out that he would consider individual contracts with each city or the school system for a juvenile counseling program. (An integral part of the total YSD program was its part-time counseling service of offenders.)

**Paper Discussed**

Besides reviewing the status of the YSD, the managers also discussed a position paper prepared by Director Dankel on the concept of consolidated area-wide juvenile investigative services, based upon a meeting of local police chiefs on Wednesday, August 1, at the managers' request.

On July 17, they asked that the chiefs meet to conduct a study to give alternate solutions to the YSD and/or recommendations on whether or not this type of service is needed.

As it turned out, the report, some of the managers felt, strayed from the focus at hand and, while worth consideration, wasn't directly pertinent to the discussion.

(In this respect, the chiefs also shared their support for the concept of consolidated detective bureau services, a central records system, a central lock-up and centralized dispatching for police and, perhaps, fire services.)

Mr. Petersen, at the managers' meeting in July, shared his proposal of individually contracting with interested communities.

Both Mr. Crawford and Shores Village Superintendent Thomas K. Jefferis indicated on the 22nd their respective police departments can handle juvenile cases. However, Mr. Crawford said,

regarding counseling, that it will now be in the court's discretion or be the responsibility of parents as it was in the pre-YSD period.

**Monitor Situation**

City Manager Thomas Kressbach of Grosse Pointe City said his community has moved to handle its juvenile cases to the degree possible with its own forces.

However, he also told the NEWS that, while his municipality is holding its own at this time, the situation will be continually monitored as the school year begins. At the same time, Mr. Kressbach stated if The Farms and Woods work out an agreement, it will be closely viewed.

For his part, Farms City Manager Andrew Bremer said all local police departments can probably handle their juvenile cases, while questioning if such an approach would be as effective as some type of joint operation.

With South High School located in his community, Mr. Bremer said he is "vitaly concerned" when school opens, particularly over any problems which might arise via special events, e.g., a North-South football or basketball game, plus any other occurrences which could require police action.

The managers agreed, in the case of some unforeseen flair up, that the mutual aid agreement between all communities was a big plus factor.

In response to a question from Dr. Joseph Spagnoli, the former School Board representative on the board of managers, Mr. Petersen envisioned a separate pact with a community where in The Woods would handle all juvenile problems of that community on a referral basis, with Woods personnel being utilized via a specific financial arrangement, e.g., so much a case, a retainer fee, et al.

Such cases from the contracting community would

be handled like any other cases which come to The Woods' detective bureau, said Mr. Petersen.

At the same time, regarding referrals, it will have to be pinpointed the route to take, i.e., where the offender resides or where he commits an offense.

In responding to a question from Mr. Petersen on how the schools will now handle athletic events, dances, et al., Dr. Spagnoli said officials haven't explored this as yet, while acknowledging that some changes will have to be made.

He did say, in relation to some apparent rumors which have been circulating, that the school system will not have uniformed police with guns around. "This has never happened in the past and it will not happen in the future," he stressed, while noting that superintendents in school hallways will be present every hour of school days.

**Lawyers' Wives Cited**

In other action the managers received and placed on file the YSD financial report as of June 30. By applying a reserve of \$1,645.50 from the previous year, Mr. Petersen pointed out a balanced budget was attained sans \$2,500 cost of living wages for six months due to The Woods.

The latter, he said, will remain as a deficit owed to the city, which might be cleared in some form out of the disposition of equipment, with Mr. Kressbach and Mr. Petersen scheduled to meet and make a recommendation on this matter.

As part of the financial report, a \$1,000 donation to the YSD was refunded to the Grosse Pointe Lawyers' Wives, who have been a prime contributor to the division through the years.

All members of the board of managers expressed their appreciation to the group for its support.

Besides local officials, Nancy Duffy of the League of Women Voters of Grosse Pointe and Mary Krueger, president of the South High School Mothers Club, also attended the meeting.

Not only as interested citizens but also to report back to their respective groups.

The subject of the need of a juvenile crime fighting unit will be viewed at a Community Forum, sponsored by the LWV, on Tuesday, September 18, at the War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore road, at 8 p.m.

(Continued from Page 1) hearing officer time to report to the commission, and for the commission to reach a decision.

Part of the compliance problem will be solved as soon as the construction of the new stack is completed. That will eliminate the current problem to area residents known as "downwash" — smoke and odors pushed to the ground from the too-short existing stacks and creating a nuisance to citizens.

Mr. Towner said that construction, set for completion this month, is about 10 days behind schedule, and the stack should be operational within the next few weeks.

The other part of the pollution problem—high particulate matter from the emissions, is expected to be solved by the installation of devices known as electrostatic precipitators.

**One of Highest**

The authority has received bids for the devices, but was dissatisfied with them and will be rebidding shortly, Mr. Towner said.

The state hearing officer recommended that the authority be granted variances until September 1981, when the precipitators should be operational.

The precipitators are being financed by a \$4.5 million bond, issue passed last fall by the authority's member communities: the Pointes, Harper Woods, Mount Clemens and Clinton Township.

The stack, meanwhile, is being financed by an earlier \$1.2 million bond issue. The increased debt service retirement from the two combined to hike disposal costs by about 35 percent this fiscal year, making the per ton disposal cost one of the highest in the state.

(Continued from Page 1) MacDonald made a motion that the council adopt a resolution whereby the city would issue statements clearing the air on projects on which The Park is working.

"The city owes it to the community to send out a letter detailing the programs in which we are involved," she said.

The motion passed unanimously. Mr. Verdonck, however, was not at the meeting.

Mr. Crawford later said that The Park is now in the process of issuing a newsletter to residents but, at this point, he does not know if it will address itself to the POP charges.

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
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**Woods Police Union Hits EMT Idea for Department**

The idea of becoming  
Emergency Medical Technicians,  
(EMT), doesn't sit well  
with members of the Grosse  
Pointe Woods Police Officers  
Association, (GPWPOA),  
who went on record last  
week against the concept for  
departmental personnel.

At an association meeting  
Wednesday, August 22, members  
unanimously voted to  
oppose, through arbitration,  
the city forcing any member  
to become an EMT.

This was conveyed in a  
short letter from treasurer  
Carl Schuster to City Administrator  
Chester E. Petersen,  
Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos  
and the council.

Right now, there appears  
to be no push in this direction  
by city officials, who are  
reviewing three recommendations  
from Public Safety  
Director John Dankel in  
relation to emergency ambulance  
service and state-mandated  
requirements.

The city is operating its  
service under a provisional  
license from the state, with  
the document expiring this  
December 31. It cannot be  
renewed unless the city can  
provide a licensed EMT in  
the patient compartment  
whenever a patient is transported.

Faced with increased costs  
of compliance, the director,  
in seeking some policy direction  
from the council, made  
the trio of recommendations  
which were explored by the  
solons sitting as the Committee  
on Thursday, August 14.

Director Dankel's first  
choice is to hire four individuals  
trained only as EMTs,  
as against hiring four persons  
who would function as  
firefighter-EMTs or the organization  
of a "fire division"  
within the department's current  
personnel complement.

His first choice was  
accepted by a majority of the  
solons at the meeting, with  
the council instructing him to  
prepare a detailed report on  
the concept, including cost  
and scheduling factors, for  
review.

Director Dankel had made  
it clear it was important to  
create a group of specialists  
to handle ambulance services.  
While his first choice  
wouldn't involve GPWPOA  
personnel and while the council  
has made no specific decision  
as yet on any approach,  
union officials felt it was  
necessary to make their view  
point known.

"The members voted  
overwhelmingly to send a letter  
to the council on their feelings,"  
said Charles Philip  
Hamel, vice-president. "They  
don't want to be forced to go  
to school for it. It seems like  
all of them have their own  
concerns."

One main reason, he felt,

would be the additional  
strain placed upon each man  
with the long hours of schooling.  
(The city has five officers  
who have EMT training and  
are preparing for their state  
licensed exam. Four more  
enrolled on Thursday, August  
23, for a 16-week EMT course  
at Macomb County Community  
College.)

Officer Patrick Fagan,  
who's handling grievances for  
the GPWPOA at this time,  
said there's no provision in  
the association's contract  
for EMTs with the term not  
even being included. Hence,  
it's a negotiable issue, he  
stated, and shouldn't be  
approached without bargaining.

As for the four men currently  
undergoing training, he  
indicated provisions for this  
are included in the contract.  
"But performing the work  
function of an EMT is entirely  
another profession, a whole  
other issue," said Officer  
Fagan.

At the same time, he  
appreciated Director Dankel's  
forthrightness in exploring  
the status of the situation  
with the men. "He's not sure  
either, (where it all stands).  
We don't want to start a battle,

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**Turn Arrow Set at North**

A signalization change at the entrance to North High School was viewed by the Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, August 20, in an effort toward improving traffic flow at that location.

The solons approved a resolution authorizing the execution of an agreement between the city and the Wayne County Road Commission for modernization of the traffic signal at an estimated cost of \$1,920, which will be paid by the city.

As planned, a left turn arrow will be installed for westbound Vernier road traffic and controller modification.

**Thief Robs Bus Driver**

A Detroit bus driver was robbed of \$30 as he was waiting in his bus in back of the White Tower Restaurant, 15009 Jefferson avenue, early Wednesday morning, August 22.

David Belcher, 24, told Park police that he was waiting to begin his route when a black youth about 17-years-old approached him inside the bus with a revolver and demanded money.

The youth escaped north on Wayburn road by foot.

**Public Safety Director**

John Dankel, who hoped the work would be completed within a month, said the inside lane of Vernier road backs up in the westbound lane while people wait to make a left turn into the North entrance.

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Canadian Vessel Suffers 'Flat Tire'



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(Continued from Page 1) to develop an elm watch in neighborhoods.

Chairman Michael Krag said residents from each block would survey trees in their neighborhoods and be on the lookout for DED.

Other communities in The Pointe also are fighting the DED war with injection and spraying methods.

City Manager Thomas W. Kressbach of Grosse Pointe City said results with the injection program in his community have been "50-50."

"Our basic program consists of spraying the elms with methoxychlor each spring," he said.

Citizens in Lincoln road, however, recently held a block party to inject elms on their block at a cost of about \$60 per family.

Mr. Kressbach said The City so far this year has lost 85 elms on public property and 40 elms on private property. While admitting that the loss of elms is primarily due to DED, consideration also would have to be given to the severe ice storm in April and tree aging.

Farms Public Service Director John A. DeFoe also attributed the elm loss in The Farms to the ice storm.

"We had a greater elm tree loss this year than in 1978 because of the ice storm. So many elms were damaged and weakened that it made them more susceptible to DED," Mr. DeFoe said.

Mr. DeFoe indicated that The Farms only injects very few trees "that we feel will do some good and only those with minor incidents of DED." The Farms does spray its trees each spring and once DED is detected, removal is fast.

"The elm is usually removed within a week and we feel such prompt removal is the greatest factor in controlling the spread of the disease," Mr. DeFoe said. This year, 60 private trees

and 31 public trees have been condemned in The Farms.

Shores Village Superintendent Thomas K. Jefferis said his community sprays trees twice a year, once in the spring and in the fall.

"We have very few injections," he said.

Mr. Jefferis said 28 private trees and 23 Wayne County trees will have to come down along Lakeshore road.

The only Pointe not participating in tree spraying or injections at the moment is The Woods where Public Works Director Leonard Ocelnik said that until he can see "good results" with either method, his community will continue to only trim diseased trees and plant new ones.

Mr. Ocelnik said The Woods has lost about 69 public trees and 93 private trees, up about 13 trees since last year.

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
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
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
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## Parking Curfew Lifted At Anton's for 60 Days

A request to suspend the 11 p.m. curfew time at the municipal parking lot behind Anton's Restaurant, 20930 Mack avenue, was unanimously approved by the Woods Council beginning Saturday, September 1, for a 60-day trial period.  
The adjustment was made at the request of restaurant officials, who submitted a petition containing the signatures of 20 Hampton road residents asking the council to rescind the 11 p.m. curfew. It was instituted in the early 1970's when citizens complained over the noise, litter and disturbances coming from the then Lochmoor Lounge.  
William Bradley, restaurant manager, expressed a concern over the curfew potentially hurting the new business, with the restaurant opening in late July. He also felt that a lifted curfew would aid in removing customers from parking on the residential street.

## Woods Views Law on Brush

A complaint from a citizen over receiving a \$2 citation for placing a small tree stump in front of his home has resulted in the Woods Council taking another look at an ordinance governing the placement of brush.  
The council viewed this matter on Monday, August 20.  
Robert P. Feeser of Sunningdale drive said he presumed that the stump would be removed by DPW personnel as they had picked up a stump of a similar size in the past. However, although he and his wife and daughter disposed of it themselves, he was particularly irked over the citation being given without any advance warning.  
Indicating that many citizen complaints had been received in the past over placing brush out for pickup too early, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen said both brush and rubbish are now set out at the same time for pickup.  
Councilman Dan Grady felt there might be a problem for some citizens who do tree trimming, for instance, over a weekend and then have to cart and place the material in their back yard, and then carry it out to be picked up later.  
He then moved that Mr. Petersen review the ordinance, with the purpose of having City Attorney George Catlin amend the section affecting the brush provision so brush could be set out anytime and picked up on the citizen's regular collection day. His colleagues unanimously agreed.  
Mr. Petersen expressed a concern that in some areas of the city pickups ensue on a Friday, as a result, brush could remain visible all week.  
Councilman Robert E. Nowtke asked if it was possible that some type of limited brush pickup transpire on a Monday, for instance, but Mr. Petersen said this would be impractical from a monetary standpoint.

**WINS RACE**  
Paul DeFauw, 21, of Kerby road took a first in the third division of the eighth annual Stony Creek Distance Run, held on Tuesday, August 14, at Stony Creek Metro Park. DeFauw ran the two and a half mile course in 12:55, winning in the men's 20 to 29 year age group.

While Public Safety Director John Dankel indicated that there has been no reported problems since the restaurant opened and Bruce A. Price, president of the Grosse Pointe Merchants Association, Inc., said his group would support a rescinding action, some citizens remained concerned.  
One resident, who said she lived near the restaurant, said she wasn't even approached and questioned who exactly signed the petition, while others complained over noise at the time the restaurant closed.  
Still more complained over the parking along Hampton, including the double parking of autos as part of valet parking.

Owner William Anton felt his employees were not responsible for making any noise and agreed to cooperate in making sure his employees don't park in the street.  
One citizen said that those visiting the establishment around the 11 p.m. hour went to go to the bar and not necessarily to eat. In response, Mr. Anton said the kitchen is open to 1 a.m.  
A charge of a lack of enforcement in the immediate area was denied by Director Dankel, with Mr. Anton saying he had a bunch of tickets to prove it.

As it turned out, Councilman Dan Grady moved that the curfew be lifted for 60 days, while stipulating that City Administrator Chester E. Petersen review the entire parking situation.  
In this respect, Mr. Petersen said he will look at arranging for two valet loading spaces in Mack, obtain a cost estimate for the construction of a masonry wall on the east and south sides of the parking lot and some type of screening wall on the north side. The latter would have to be around 18 inches high at the most so pedestrians could readily be spotted.  
He also stated he will review the possibility of correcting curbs wherein all cars exiting the lot would have to turn left to Mack and not turn right to travel on Hampton.

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## Barricade Is Up in Hampton

The director said on Monday, August 27, that traffic counts are currently being taken along Ridgemont, with the possibility that the barricade could be installed by Thursday, September 6, depending on final results.  
This process is transpiring in an attempt to alleviate the heavy through traffic in the northwest area of The Woods. However, officials in St. Clair Shores and Harper Woods have expressed concern over this action and what some feel is the transferring of the problem to their communities.

The other changes to be made before the final signing are what Councilman Lloyd Semple termed as "tightening up" the language. Mr. Semple, a lawyer, said he would work with the city attorney to finish it up.

**Car Wash Concerns**  
Approval of Amoco Oil Company's site plans for the renovation of the old Sunoco station was granted unanimously by the council, but only under the condition that the company foot the bill for the construction of a wall behind the station if the council later determined it to be necessary.

**Standard On-the-Hill station operator Tom Pitlock** later said he didn't yet know when his business will be relocated, but that it may be as late as next spring. He said that renovation is awaiting the removal by 81 Investment of the old gasoline storage tanks at the new location.

Councilwoman Nancy Waugaman was concerned about the car wash to be located in one stall of the new location. Station plans call for cars to enter the stall from the rear and exit by the

front, with the stall closed during operation.

"I was stunned to find out about the car wash," she said. "I can envision buses backing up to a residential area."

But project engineer Don Madigan assured the council the primary objective of the station would be to sell gasoline, agreeing with Mr. Semple the car wash was a "gimmick" for marketing purposes.

**Recommendations Made**  
From the outside, the station will have a new brick skin, with a mansard roof. A new row of self-serve pumps will be added. Underground, the tank storage capacity will be substantially increased.

Police Chief Robert Ferber recommended not making the alley behind the station one way, despite the traffic increase brought by the station. He reasoned that a one-way alley would merely bring the increased traffic, with the intersections at each end being unable to handle the load.

The chief instead recommended that several stop signs be placed in the alley, and parking be removed in front of the station. For pedestrian safety, the chief recommended placing a six-foot chain link fence between the sidewalk and the alley from the Radnor circle walk through to Kercheval.

At the other end of the Hill, plans continue for the construction of a two-story building containing professional offices and retail shops. Planned for the building is a restaurant, an atrium running east-west from the parking lot to Kercheval and a pedestrian bridge between the building and the upper level of the proposed parking structure.

"Very Exciting"  
A large skylight is being contemplated for the roof, project architect James Cardoza explained, necessitating a height variance of six feet. Council members didn't raise any great objections to this plan, although no official action was taken at the

**Asphalt Work Eyed by GPW**

As part of the planned improvements at the Mack avenue-Vernier road intersection, which probably won't begin until next spring or summer, the Woods Council, based upon the recommendation of City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, is seeking to have the Mack portion of the intersection resurfaced.

After a visual inspection, Mr. Petersen felt the resurfacing of the intersection also should be accomplished at the same time, possibly utilizing the services of the successful contractor for the Federal Aid Safety grant project.

The council on Monday, August 20, agreed, and unanimously adopted a resolution to this effect, which will be sent to the Wayne County Road Commission.

Mr. Petersen advised the council, in order that The Woods may request the commission to participate in the cost of resurfacing the intersection, it was necessary that the council pass a resolution covering the following points:

- Payment for resurfacing is to be on a two-third county—one-third city basis.
- The work is to be included in the contract documents for the intersection improvements.
- The resurfacing is to be a non-participating part of the intersection grant project.
- The work is to be executed concurrently with the intersection improvements.

The resolution, which will be sent with an intersection sketch and cost estimate furnished by Pate, Hirn and Bogue, Inc., city engineers, will be forwarded to Robert Larson, director of transportation, of the road commission. It will then be presented to the commission for its disposition.

John F. DeBusscher of Pate, Hirn and Bogue prepared the sketch and indicated the construction cost estimate, along with engineering-inspection fees and a construction contingency, would be \$40,000.

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



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

stage for the entire project are estimates of between \$500,000 to \$600,000. The informational session on the 15th mainly focused upon the easement and downspout questions.

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

GPW Merchants Share Concern Over Ordinance

Concerns on the part of members of the Grosse Pointe Merchants Association, Inc., over the content of a Woods ordinance requiring an enclosure around dumpsters remain in spite of action taken by the council this month.

At the council's Monday, August 6, meeting, members of the association expressed some reservations over the law, while seeking clarification of its provisions.

As a result, the solons referred this matter to the public works committee of the council, under the chairmanship of Councilman Thomas Fahrner, and instructed the committee to meet with association members.

They also requested a report back at the Monday, August 20, meeting, while suspending the law regulating dumpster screening until the 20th.

Based upon Mr. Fahrner's report on the Thursday, August 16, meeting, the council unanimously voted to delay implementation of the ordinance relating to the dumpster screening portion for 60 days so the merchants could police themselves.

At the same time, Building Inspector Earl Wakely is scheduled to work with the merchants regarding their specific problems, while keeping the council abreast of such, e.g., any hardships.

The law in question stipulates that an outside storage

area must be enclosed by a durable screening wall or fence approved by the Department of Building Inspections. It must not be less than four feet or more than six feet high, and must enclose the area from public view.

It provides that a waiver of such screening may be obtained after a public hearing before the council regarding any undue hardship.

Bruce A. Price, association president, cited several concerns over the ordinance. For some businesses it would be impractical and/or impossible to build an enclosure and get a refuse truck in to empty the dumpster, he said. The narrowness of some alleys isn't a help in this case.

He also pointed out problems in maintaining the dumpster and an ensuing aggravation of individuals using merchants' dumpsters to leave their own garbage.

At the same time, Mr. Price also noted some of the merchants were unaware that the screening could be of a portable type.

Stressing the need for further communication and cooperation between city officials and association members, Mr. Price told the NEWS he was concerned over the implementation of

the ordinance and the possibility that some concerns might not be rectified.

He indicated that painting all the dumpsters one color and marking, with yellow paint, where the dumpsters would sit to aid merchants, city officials and DPW personnel alike would be acceptable to the business community.

Mr. Price also felt it was reasonable to enclose trash cans and garbage bags but felt there really was no practical way to enclose dumpsters.

One of the bills, (House Bill 4784), would allow Wayne County voters to split the county into two counties — Wayne, which would include the Pointes, Detroit, Highland Park and Hamtramck, and the county of Suburbia, which would consist of the rest of the county.

The other bill, (House Bill 4748), would revise state law on the establishment of charter counties, expanding the number of mandatory provisions for county charters and setting new requirements for the charter commissions and their members.

The public hearings will be Monday, September 10, in the Bailey Building Multipurpose Room, 36651 Ford road, Westland, at 7 p.m.; Tuesday, September 11, in the City-County Building 13th Floor Auditorium, Detroit, at 10 a.m.; and Wednesday, September 12, in the Woodhaven City Hall Council Chambers, 21869 West road, Woodhaven, at 10 a.m.

The two bills were sponsored by Rep. Brown.

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**Fishing Pier-Boat Basin  
Advisory Question Viewed**

The question of a fishing pier at the Lake Front Park is back in the hands of the Citizens Recreation Commission as the Woods Council sitting as the Committee of the Whole on Tuesday, August 14, unanimously recommended that the group prepare an advisory ballot question on this subject.

In May, the commission, after studying a report from the city engineers and a cost estimate for a combined pier and pleasure boat basin, recommended to the council the construction of a combined pier-basin, 325' by 155', with 38 boat slips at a cost of \$450,000.

Members also recommended that the council consider issuing general obligation municipal bonds to meet the cost of the pier.

However, at the committee meeting, an attempt was made to tap the council's feelings on the pier-basin question. Some indicated a preference for both, while Councilman George Cueter cited a fishing dock only and Councilman John Sabol preferred a boat basin.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen said the commission was interested more in an actual bonding proposal rather than an advisory question but it was too late for the former to be placed on the November ballot.

As a result, Councilman Robert E. Novitke moved that the entire matter be referred to the commission to formulate an advisory question on the pier-basin matter. He also stipulated that the question be forwarded to Mr. Petersen by Thursday, September 6, for referral to the council.

The commission had earlier compared the combined pier-basin plan with a \$275,000 estimate for a 350-foot long, 10-foot wide, pier with hand rails and wood deck.

A majority of the commissioners agreed that, if a fishing pier were to be built, it would be short-sighted not to include boat wells because of the shortage and high cost of commercial wells in the area, plus the income which could be realized from rental.

As a result, the group felt the combined approach was the best route to follow.

In another recreation-related matter, which was considered by the council at its Monday, August 20, meeting, James L. Carroll of Hawthorne road wrote, and

addressed, the solons on park guest privileges for boat owners who keep their craft at the Lake Front Park.

"Contrary to the policies of every other park in the Pointes, the park officials at The Woods park refuse to allow guests of boat owners to enter the park without having the resident's guest pass punched," he said. "Since boat owners are allowed only 10 punches for weekends and holidays, these passes are often used in total in one weekend."

In pointing out that The Woods, unlike the other Pointes, has its park in another community, (St. Clair Shores), Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos said officials have wrestled with this problem for years with no real solution forthcoming.

Councilman Dan Grady then moved that this matter be referred to the commission to consider providing each of the annually rented docks on an file pass with 20 extra punches, suggesting it might be worthwhile to see how such a concept works for a one-year trial period.

**What Goes On at Your Library**

The cowboy is the pre-dominant figure in American mythology. His virtues and his vices have become standard fare in motion picture theaters and on television. There is even a National Cowboy Hall of Fame to commemorate his exploits.

A long line of writers have made the cowboy into a romantic figure, a symbol of rugged individualism, whereas, in reality, the cowboy was no more than a hired hand, employed to tend cattle and his work was strenuous and dirty, his hours were long and his pay minimal.

Cowboying required no particular skills beyond the initial ability to sit a horse and pay attention.

The cowboy life was hardly the stuff of which legends are made, indeed, the cowboy is today less important for what he was than for what he is thought to have been.

Now that the 19th and early 20th century writers have created the myth, the mid-century authors are setting the record straight.

**COWBOY LIFE: RECONSTRUCTING AN AMERICAN MYTH**, (University of Oklahoma Press, 1975), is a col-

lection of photographic and prose portraits of the cowboy edited by William W. Savage. Included are accounts of cowboy life by Joseph G. McCoy, Richard Irving Dodge, Charles A. Siringo, W. S. James, Alfred Henry Lewis, Andy Adams and many others.

Focusing on the southern Great Plains — especially Texas, Indian Territory and Kansas—from the 1860's to around 1900, this book will interest anyone concerned with the historic or legendary dimensions of the cowboy, as well as students of the West and of American popular culture.

William Surface has written a vivid and realistic contemporary report on the cowboy in his book **ROUND-UP AT THE DOUBLE DIAMOND**, (Houghton Mifflin, 1974).

The author has presented this material in an almost fiction-like fashion. He employs a story line technique to explain the life of a typical working cowboy in the cattle country of mountainous West Texas.

The "Double Diamond" is not the real name of the ranch, with that exception the rest of the story is historically accurate.

Cowboys figure prominently in **THE AMERICAN WEST: AN INTERPRETIVE HISTORY**, (Little, Brown and Company, 1973), by Robert V. Hine. The author has written a highly readable, brilliantly interpretive history of the American frontier and its influence on the national character, beginning with the first discoveries of Columbus and extending to the incorporation of the West into the industrial-urban society of the early 20th century.

One chapter, "The Cowboy and The Cult of Masculinity" is particularly important in that it depicts the cowboy in a somewhat different fashion than one would expect from reading the works of other authors.

Many other books have been written about the American West and the role of the cowboy. We should all have some illusions, perhaps the cowboy hero should be one of them.
