Because the score for Beethoven's overture "Dedication of the House" had not arrived in time for the concert, he led the 90-piece orchestra in the national anthem instead.

The program then opened with Carl Maria Von Weber's overture to the opera "Oberon." A Detroit music critic waxed into the realms of exotic sublimity when he wrote the next day: "The 'Oberon' overture was done with the nicety that recalled the orchestra of the Paris Conservatory. For pure orchestral virtuosity, this was the loftiest height attained during the evening. ORDINANCE NO. 204

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING CABLE TELEVISION SYSTEMS WITHIN THE CITY: PROVIDING FOR CITY REGULATION OF THE USE THEREOP CON-SISTENT WITH FEDERAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION RULES AND REGULATIONS: SETTING FORTH CONDITIONS ACCOMPANYING THE GRANT-ING OF CABLE TELEVISION SYSTEM FRANCHISES: PROVIDING FOR OPERATIONAL STANDARDS: ESTABLISHING CONTITIONS FOR THE USE OF CITY STREETS, ALLEYS, SIDEWALKS, BRIDGES AND OTHER CITY-OWNED RIGHT OF WAY AND CITY-OWNED PROPERTY: ESTABLISHING RATES AND CHARGES: AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE ORDAINS:

Section 1, TITLE. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Grosse Pointe/Harper Woods Cable Communi-cations Regulatory Ordinance, and has been adopted based on a written proposal submitted by the franchisee, which is on file in the Office of the City Clerk and is hereby incorporated by reference.

Section 2, DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this Ordi-nance, the following terms, phrases, words and derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular num-ber, words in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.

a. "City" is the City of Grosse Pointe

"Cities" are the Cities of Harper Woods, Grosse Pointe Woods, Grosse Pointe, Grosse Pointe Farms and Grosse Pointe Park.

c. "Company" is Grosse Pointe Cable, Inc., a Michigan Corporation, maintaining its offices in the Grosse Pointes or Harper Noods, Michigan, the grantee of rights under this Regulatory Ordinance.

d. "Council" is the City Council of City of Grosse Pointe

e. "Person" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company, or organization of any kind.

f. "System" shall mean the lines, fixtures, equipment, attachments, and all appurtenances thereto which are used in the construction, operation and maintenance of the community antenná television system herein authorized.

g. "Federal Communications Commission or FCC" shall mean that Federal agency constituted by the Communications Act of 1934 as amended.

h. "Gross Subscriber Revenues" shall mean only those revenues derived from the monthly service charges paid by subscribers located within the City for regular cable television reception service, which service includes only the transmission of broadcast signals and the programming presented on the required access and originations channels, if any, plus that portion of revenues from programs for which a per channel or per program charge is made which is not remitted to the pay program provider. Gross Subscriber Revenues shall not include any reve-nues received (a) as reimbursement of expense in the operation of any access channels; (b) as advertising payments; (c) from the leasing of cable channels; (d) from furnishing other communications and non-broad-cast services either directly or as a carrier for another party, or any other income derived from the system. Gross Subscriber Revenues shall also not include revenues received as installation charges and fees for reconnections, inspection, repairs or modifications of any installations.

i. "Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association" is the Michigan non profit corporation which is the community center for the Grosse Pointes, located at 32 Lake Shore Road, Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan 48236.

located at 32 Lake Shore Road, Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan 48236. Section 3, QUALIFICATIONS OF GRANTEE AND GRANT OF AUTHORITY. This Regulatory Ordinance which grants to Grosse Pointe Cable, Inc. the non-exclusive right to construct, operate, and maintain a cable television system in the City, was passed and adopted by the City after a full, open and public proceeding. Said proceeding was held after public notice was given, and afforded all interested parties the opportunity to comment upon the legal, character, financial, technical and other qualifications of the Company. Having received at said proceeding all comments regarding the qualifications of the Company, the City hereby finds that the Company possesses the necessary legal, technical, character, financial and other qualifications, and that the Company's construction arrangements are "adjumpt, and steasible. Therefore, the City hereby grants to the Company a hon-exclusive franchise, right and privilege to construct, erect, operate; modify and maintain. in, upon, along, across, above and over and under the highways, streets, alleys, sidewalks, public ways and public places now laid out or dedicated and all extensions thereof, and additions thereto, in the City, poles, wirea, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other television conductors and fixtures necessary for the maintenance and operation in the City of a cable television system for the purpose of distributing television and radio programs, and various commun-ications and other electronic services to the public, provided, however, this Ordinance shall become effective upon the granting to the Company of a similar ordinance by at least 4 of the 5 other Cities. The right so granted includes the right to use and occupy said streets, alleys, public ways and public places and all manner of ease-ments for the purposes herein set forth provided the franchisee does not commit an act of trespass. does not commit an act of trespass.

f. The Company shall pay all premiums chargeable for the bond and shall keep the same in full force and effect at all times throughout the term of this Ordinance and during the removal of all poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes, and other conductors, converters, equipment and fixtures subsequent to the termination of this Ordinance. The bond shall contain a provision that it shall not be terminated or otherwise allowed to expire prior to sixty (60) days after written notice to that effect is given to the Clerk or similar official of the City.

g. RESIDENT COMPANY AND AGENT. All insurance policies and bonds as are required of the Company in this Regulatory Or-dinance shall be written by a Company or Companies authorized and qualified to do business in the State of Michigan. Certifi-cates of all coverage required shall be promptly filed by the Company with the City. RESIDENT COMPANY AND AGENT. All insurance policies Certifi-

h. APPLICATION FOR PERMIT. Within sixty (60) days after the effective date of this Ordinance, the Company shall file with the Federal Communications Commission such request, Petition, or other application as is then proper to secure from said Federal Communications Commission any and all necessary permits, licenses, waivers, or the like as may be necessary to be secured from said Federal Communications Commission to fully comply with the terms of this Ordinance. The Company shall there-after diligently pursue such application with the Federal Com-munications Commission and shall do all reasonable things neces-sus, and proper to secure any such permit, license, waiver, ap-proval or the like from it. The Company shall keep the City ad-vised, from time to time, of the progress of such application.

Section 7, SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE AND PROCEDURES

section 7, SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE AND PROCEDURES a. Upon grant of this Ordinance to construct and maintain a cable television system in the City, and in furtherance of the Company's execution of contracts with Public Utility Companies or any other owner or lessee of any poles located within or with-out the City to whatever extent such contract or contracts shall be expedient and of advantage to the Company for use of poles and posts necessary for proper installation of the System, the Company shall obtain right of way permits from appropriate State, County and Pederal officials necessary to cross highways or roads under their respective jurisdiction to supply main trunk lines from the Company's receiving antennas, obtain permission from the rederal Aviation Authority to erect and maintain antennas suit-able to the needs of the System and its subscribers, and obtain whatever other permits a City, County, State or Federal Agency material of good and durable quality and all work involved in the construction, installation, maintenance and repair of the cable system shall be performed in a safe, thorough and reliable manner. Any municipal property damaged or destroyed shall be promptly re-paired or replaced by the Company and restored to serviceable con-dition.

b. The Company's System, poles, wires and appurtenances shall be located, erected and maintained so that none of its facilities shall endanger or interfere with the lives of persons, or interfere with any improvements the City may deem proper to make, or unnecessarily hinder or obstruct the free use of the streets, alleys, bridges, easements, or public property.

c. However, in the event that the City shall annex fur-ther territor as authorized by law, then, subject to Section 9 hereof, the Company shall extend energized trunk cable to the remaining portions of the City so annexed within an acceptable time thereafter, unless additional time is granted by the City Council upon request of the Company for good cause shown. Extension of Service shall not be requirements set forth in Section 7 of this Ordinance. Exten-7 of this Ordinance.

d. All transmission and distribution structures, lines and equipment erected by the Company within the City shall be so located as to cause minimum interference with the proper use of streets, alleys or other public ways and places.

e. In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, drive-way or other surfacing, the Company shall, at its own cost and ex-pense and in a manner approved by the City, replace and restore all paving, sidewalk, driveway or surface of any street or alley disturbed, in as good condition as before said work was commenced.

I. In event that at any time during the period of this Ordinance the City shall lawfully elect to alter or change the grade of any street, alley or other public way, the Company upon reasonable notice by the City, shall remove, relay and relocate its poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other firsture at its own evenes. fixtures at its own expense.

g. The Company shall not place poles or other fixtures where the same will interfere with any gas, electric or telephone fixture, water hydrant or main, and all such poles or other.fix-tures placed in any street shall be placed at the outer edge of the sidewalk and inside the curb line, and those placed in alleys shall be placed close to the line of the lot abutting on said alley and then in such manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on said streets, alleys and public ways.

h. The Company shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit, issued by the City, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of buildings. The expense of such temporary removal, raising or lowering of wires shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and the Company shall have the authority to require such payment in advance. The Company shall be given not less than forty-eight (48) hours advance notice to arrange for such temporary wire changes.

as-they, in consortium, may at any time or from time to time elect. The Company will make its local organization, equipment and staff available without charge for production assistance.

c. Provide without charge equipment and facilities for public access use. Included shall be video cameras and equipment capable of storing programs for later showing. Public access studio facilities must be made available to all access users on a first come, first served basis. Company shall provide tech-nichal and production assistance without charge to access users as needed.

Section 16, MODIFICATION OF FCC RULES. Any modification of Rule 76 resulting from amendment thereto by the FCC shall be incorporated in this Ordinance.

Section 17, PUBLICATION COSTS. The Company shall assume the costs of the publication of this Ordinance as such publica-tion is required by law. A bill for publication costs shall be presented to the Company by the appropriate City officials and the said Publication costs shall be paid at that time by the Company.

Section 18, CITY RIGHTS.

a. CITY RULES. The right is hereby reserved to the City to adopt, in addition to the provisions herein contained and to adopt, in addition to the provisions herein contained and existing applicable ordinances, such additional regulations as it shall find necessary in the exercise of the police power, provided that such regulations, by ordinance or otherwise, shall be reasonable and not in conflict with the rights herein granted, and shall not be in conflict with the applicable laws of the County of Wayne, State of Michigan, or the United States.

b. USE OF SYSTEM BY CITY. The City shall have the right, during the life of this Ordinance, of maintaining upon the poles or in the underground conduits of the Company within the City limits wire and fixtures necessary 'or a traffic signal control system and/or a police and fire alarm system; such wires and fix-tures shall be installed and maintained at the sole expense of the City and shall at all times comply with all the reasonable rules and regulations of the Company so that there may be a mini-mum danger of contact or conflict between the wires and fixtures of the Company and wires and fixtures used by the City.

c. EMERGENCY OR DISASTER. In the case of any emergency or disaster, the Company shall, upon request of the City Manager, make available its facilities to the City for emergency use during the emergency or disaster period.

d. LIABILITY. The City shall not be liable for any damage occurring to the property of the Company caused by employees of the City in the performance of their duties, except for damage caused to the Company's facilities by the negligence of the City's employees. The City shall not be liable for the interruption of service by actions of City employees in the performance of their duties, nor shall the City be held liable for the failure of the Company_to be able to perform normal services due to acts of God or other factors beyond the control of the City.

e. NO PROPERTY RIGHT. Nothing in this Ordinance shall grant to the Company any right of property in the City owned property, nor shall the City be compelled to maintain any of it property any longer than, or in any fashion other than in the City's judgment its own business or needs may require. of its

f. CONSTRUCTION APPROYAL BY CITY. Except for individual service drops, the Company shall not erect any pole, install any underground lines or conduits, run any line, make any attach-ment nor shall any construction of any kind be commenced without the prior approval of the Director of Engineering or appropriate department of the City, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld, and the City shall have and maintain the right to inspect the construction, operation and maintenance of the system by the Company to insure the proper performance of the terms of this Regulatory Ordinance. CONSTRUCTION APPROVAL BY CITY. Except for individual Regulatory Ordinance.

Section 19, ACTIVITIES PROHIBITED.

a. The Company, any and all of its officers, agents, and a. The Company, any and all Of its officers, agents, and employees, are specifically prohibited from engaging in the sale, service, rental or leasing of television receivers, radio re-ceivers, or television or radio receiver related parts and acces-sories with any person, anywhere in the City Whether for a fee or charge or not. The Company shall prohibit any of its officers, agents, and employees from violating the terms of this section at all times, whether in the performance of duties of the Company or otherwise. otherwise.

b. The Company shall not allow its cable or other operations to interfere with television reception of persons not served by the Company, nor shall the System interfere with, obstruct or hinder in any manner, the operation of the various utilities serving the unreidente of the City residents of the City.

c. The Company shall not, as to rates, charges, service facilities, rules, regulations, or any other respect, make or grant any preference or advantage to any person nor subject any person to any prejudice or disadvantage, provided that nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to prohibit the establishment of a graduated scale of charges and classified rate schedules to ubic any customer opping within each schedules to which any customer coming within such classification would be entitled.

Company herein shall terminate 15 years from date of grant sub-ject to renewal for periods of reasonable duration on the same

ject to renewal for periods of reasonable duration on the same terms and conditions as contained herein, or on such different or additional terms and conditions as may be lawfully specified by the City and as are consistent with the requirements of Rule 76 of the FCC. The Company's application for franchise renewal may be granted provided (1) Company shows that its cable tele-vision service during the preceding franchise period has reflec-ted a good faith effort to serve the needs and interests of its ser-vice area and (2) Company has demonstrated a regard of the law and all pertinent regulations.

Section 5, COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS, REGULATIONS AND ORDINANCES. The Company shall, at all times during the life of this Regulatory Ordinance, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power by the City and to such reasonable regulation as the City shall hereafter by Resolution or Ordinance provide. The construction, operation and maintenance of the system by the Company shall be in full compliance with such portions of the National Building and Electric Code and National Electric Safety Code as may be ap-plicable and as the same may-be-amended-and revised-from time ... to time, and in full compliance with all other applicable rules, regulations and-ord pances now in effect or hereinafter adopted by the Federal Communications Commission, the City, or any other agency of Wayne County, the State of Michigan or the United States, or which may hereafter acquire jurisdiction of the operations of the Company authorized herein. the Company authorized herein.

Section 6, LIABILITY AND IDEMNIFICATION. The Company shall indemnify the City for, and hold it harmless from all liability, damage, cost or expense arising from claims of injury to persons or damage to property occasioned by reason of any conduct under-taken pursuant to this Ordinance, including libel and slander actions. The City shall notify the Company's representative with-in thirty (30) days after the presentation of any claim or demand to the City, either by suit, or otherwise, made against the City on account of any negligence or contract as aforesaid on the part of the Company. The Company further agrees as follows:

a. Company shall carry Worker's Compensation insurance, with statutory limits and Employer's Liability insurance with limits of no less than One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars, which shall cover all operations to be performed by Company as a result of this Ordinance.

b. Company shall carry Comprehensive General Liability and Comprehensive Automobile Liability insurance with bodily injury limits of not less than Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000.00) Dollars per person and One Million (\$1,000,000.00) Dollars per occurrence

c. Company's Normer's Compensation, Comprehensive General Liability and Comprehensive Automobile Liability insurance shall Liability and comprehensive Automobile DataFity insufance shall be written by an insurance company with a capital and/or surplus of not less than Three Million (\$3,000,000.00) Dollars, and Com-pany agrees to furnish City with certified copies of certificates of insurance of said policies, which shall provide that insurance shall not be cancelled unless ten (10) days prior written notice shall first be given to the City.

d. Company shall within thirty (30) days subsequent to the effective date of this Ordinance, post a performance bond with the City written by an approved corporation surety in the amount of\$100,000 and in a form satisfactory to the City guaran-teeing Company's continued operati a of the cable television sys-tem within the City, and Company shall well and truly observe, fulfill, and perform each term and condition of the bond; pro-vided, however, that if the Company had posted a bond pursuant to the requirements of the Ordinance heretofore granted and said bond is in effect when the term of this Ordinance begins and is in a form and amount satisfactory to the City, such bond shall constitute full compliance with the requirements of this Section. All damages which may be directly occasioned by the failure of the Company to perform under this Ordinance, up to the principal amount of the bond, shall be recoverable from the principals and surctices of said bond by the City. d. Company shall within thirty (30) days subsequent to sureties of said bond by the City.

e. If Company should commit a breach of this Ordinance and not remedy such breach within sixty (60) days after having received written notice from the City to do so, then the City, vt its discretion, may declare a portion of the bond equivalent to the amount of damages sus-tained by the municipality which are directly attributable to such breach forfeited and Company shall thereupon be required (1) to remedy the breach with reasonable dispatch and (2) within sixty (50) days of such forfeiture replace the forfeited portion of bond. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing contained in this paragraph shall serve to absolve Company of any of its obligations under this Ordinance or the rules and regulations of the Federal Communications Commission. Any questions concerning damages or any other issues concerning the within paragraph which cannot be settled by agreement between interested parties hereto, shall be submitted to arbitration in accordance with the rules and regulations. Association.

i. The Company shall have the authority to trip trace upon and overhanging streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the City so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coung in contact with the wires and cables of the Company, all trimming to be done under the supervision and direction of the City and at the expense of the Company.

j. The Company shall provide, upon request and without charge, service to any municipal buildings owned and operated by the City and to any public and particulal educational facili-ties. This shall mean only an energized cable to such building. The cost of any internal wiring shall be borne by the institution.

Section 8, CONSTRUCTION SCHEDULE. The Company shall make cable service available to all residents of the City, subject to the line extension provisions of Section 9(a), within 21 months after receiving all necessary approvals.

Section 9, LINE EXTENSIONS.

a. It shall be the obligation of the Company to serve all residents of the City. Company shall extend service to new subscribers at the normal installation charge and monthly rate for customers of that classification where there are an average of seventy (70) homes per each linear mile of new cable construction.

b. In the event that requirements of sub-section (a) are not met, extensions of service shall be required only on a basis which is reasonable and compensatory.

Section 10, COMPLIANCE WITH STANDARDS. All facilities and equipment of Company shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with the requirements and specifications of the National Electrical Safety Code and such applicable ordinances and regulations set forth by the City and/or any other local, state or federal agencies state or federal agencies.

Section 11, COMPANY RULES AND REGULATIONS. The Company shall have the authority to promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable the Company to exercise its rights and perform its obligations under this Ordinance, and to assure an uninterrupted service to each and all of its custom-ers. Provided, however, that such rules, regulations, terms and conditions shall not be in conflict with the provisions hereof or of Federal and State law: or of Federal and State laws.

Section 12, PROCEDURES. No renewal of this Ordinance shall be effective except pursuant to a public proceeding affording due notice to all interested parties including Company.

Section 13, APPROVAL OF TRANSFER. The Company shall not sell, assign, or transfer its System to another nor transfer any rights under this Ordinance to another except to a wholly owned subsidiary without written approval by the City, provided that such approval shall not be unreasonably withheld if the vendee, assignee or lessee has filed with the appropriate official of the City an instrument duly executed, reciting the fact of such sale, assignment or lease, accepting the terms of this Ordinance and agreeing to perform all conditions thereof.

Section 14, COMPLIANCE WITH FCC RULES AND REGULATIONS. Section 14, COMPLIANCE WITH FCC RULES AND REGULATIONS. The Company shall, at all times, comply with the rules and regulations governing CATV operations promulgated by the FCC, specifically those set out in Section 76 of the FCC Rules and Regulations, as amended. This shall include adherence by the Company to FCC rules regarding technical and engineering specifications involved in the construction of the CATV System and signal carriage therein.

Section 15, CHANNEL CAPACITY AND ACCESS. The cable television system to be installed shall:

a. Have a thirty-five (35) channel capability and the tech-nical capacity for return or two-way communications. Company will install and maintain a cable television system in keeping with latest state-of-the-art technology including the compability for satellite reception.

b. Provide one (1) channel without charge for exclusive use of the Cities. This channel may be shared with other services with the understanding that the Cities have first priority on its usage; in addition, provide one educational access channel without charge for the use of the public school systems of the Cities

Section 20, PAYMENTS TO THE CITY.

a. The Company shall during each year of operation under this Ordinance, pay to the City, three (3%) percent of the annual gross Subscriber Revenues received by the Company for regular mon-thly cable television services rendered to customers located within the City. At the time of the semi-annual payment, the Company shall furnish the City with an operating report showing the Com-pany's semi-annual Gross Subscriber Revenues during the preceding 6 months and such other information as the City shall reasonably require with respect to properties and expenses related to the Company's services within the City for such period.

Company's services within the City for such period. b. The Company shall offer to the City one share of non-voting, non-transferable, \$1.00 preferred stock, in consideration of \$1.00. Sain share shall provide that a City tax (or alterna-tively, assigment or return on equity, if requested by the City) of 24 of the Annual Gross Subscriber Revenues received by the Com-pany for regular monthly cable television services rendered to customers located within the City, less any applicable Michigan or Federal taxes, shall be paid to the City. In addition, the City shall participate with the other Cities in the System to the aggregate extent of one-half of the proceeds as a city tax (or alternat ively, assignment or return on equity if requested by the City), received by the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association on account of the common equity shares the Company issued to such Association, it being understood that such proceeds will be received by such As-sociation as a trustee for the benefit of the Cities (the City's relative portion of one-half of Gross Subscriber Revenues generated for the System within this City to Gross Subscriber Revenues gen-erated for the System by all Cities); provided further the City shall not participate in the management fee or equity share of any commercial technical management company operating or owning a part of the System. The common shares of the Company owned by the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association shall bear the legend "non-transferable and subject to the provisions of the Grosse Pointe/Harper Woods Cable Communications Regulatory Ordinance".

c. MANNER OF PAYMENT. All payments as required by the Company to the City shall be made semi-annually and shall be d ninety (90) days after the close of the six month period. be due

Section 21, RECORDS AND REPORTS. The Company shall keep full, true, accurate and current books of account, which books and records, and all other pertinent books, records, maps, plans financial statements and other like materials, shall be made available for inspection and copying by the City upon reasonable notice and during normal business hours.

Section 22, SUBSCRIBER RATES AND CHARGES. Except as other-wise provided in the Ordinance, the Company shall have the right, wise provided in the Ordinance, the Company shall have the right, privilege, and authority to charge and charge the rates and charges fixed in this section and invoiced to its subscribers for its ser-vices, however increases therein shall not exceed the rate of in-flation indicated by the Consumer Price Index as published by the United States Government, the denominator of which fraction shall be based on the date of adoption of this Ordinance, and the numer-ator of which fraction shall be based on the date of invoice, unless so authorized by the Council. so authorized by this Council.

C installation shall be charged to subscriber at Company cost. Custom

These rates shall not be increased for a period of two (2) years following adoption of this Ordinance, even if otherwise so permitted by the rate of inflation.

Multi-user rates and charges may be negotiated between the Company and the subscriber, but in no event shall the multi-user rates and charges for any subscriber exceed the aggregate rates and charges which would be charged to the multi-user if computed on the basis of single-user rates and charges. In addition to the specified monthly service rate, the Company may add to that rate taxes or fees imposed upon the Company's gross subscriber revenues by city, state or federal governmental or legislative bodies and fees or charges imposed upon the Company for the use and distribution of copyrighted program material.

c. Company may, at its own discretion, waive, reduce or suspend connection fees for specific or indeterminate periods and/or monthly service fees for promotional purposes.

Section 23, LOCAL OFFICE: COMPLAINT PROCEDURES.

a. During the term of this Ordinance, and any renewal thereof, the Company shall maintain within the Grosse Pointe/Harper Woods Community a local business office or agent for the purpose of re-ceiving and resolving all complaints regarding the quality of ser-vice, equipment malfunctions and similar matters. The provisions of this section shall be complied with if Company maintains a local of this section shall be complied with if Company maintains a local business headquarters office within five (5) miles of the principal co-ordinates of the Cities, which office may be reached by local, toll-free telephone call, and provides the City Manager's office with the name, address and phone number of a person who will act as the Company's agent to receive complaints regarding quality of service, equipment malfunctions and similar matters. The local office shall be open to receive inquiries or complaints from sub-scribers during normal business hours, and in no event less than 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Any complaints from subscribers shall be investigated and acted upon as soon as pos-sible, but at least within three (3) business days of their receipt. The company shall keep a maintenance service log which will indicate the nature of each service complaint, the date and time it was re-ceived, the disposition of said complaint and the time and date there-of. This log shall be made available for periodic inspection by the City.

Section 24, PROTECTION OF PRIVACY.

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a. Grantee shall not permit the transmission of any signal, aural, visual or digital, including "polling" the channel selection, from any subscriber's premises without first obtaining written per-mission of the subscriber. This provision is not intended to prohibit the use of transmission of signals useful only for the control or measurement of system performance.

b. Grantec shall not permit the installation of any specific termiral equipment in any subscriber's premises that will permit transmission from subscriber's premises of two-way services utilizing aural, visual or digital signals without first obtaining written permission of the subscriber.

c. It shall be a misdemeanor for any person to attach or affix or to cause to be attached or affixed any equipment or device which allows access or use of the cable television service without payment to the Company for same.

Section 75, ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS. The City reserves the right to adopt, in addition to the provisions contained in this Ordinance, such additional regulations as it shall find necessary

regulations are reasonable and not materially in conflict with the privileges granted in this Ordinance.

Section 26, RECEIVERSHIP, FORECLOSURE, OR ACT OF BANKRUPTCY.

a. The franchise herein granted hereunder shall at the option of the Council or its designee cease and terminate one hundred twenty (120) days after the appointment of a receiver or receivers. or trustee or trustees to take over and conduct the business of the franchisee whether in a receivership, reorganization, bankruptcy, or other action or proceeding unless such receivership or trusteeship shall have been vacated prior to the expiration of said one hundred twenty (120) days, or unless:

(1) Such receivers or trustees shall have, within one hun-dred twenty (120) days after their election or appointment fully complied with all the terms and provisions of this Ordinance and the franchise granted pursuant hereto, and the receivers or trustees within said one hundred twenty (120) days shall have remedied all defaults under the franchise; and

(2) Such receivers or trustees shall within said one hundred twenty (120) days, execute an agreement duly approved by the Court having jurisdiction in the premises, whereby such receivers or trustees assume and agree to be bound by each and every term, provision and limitation of the franchise herein granted.

b. In the case of a foreclosure or other judicial sale of the plant, property and equipment of the franchisee, or any part thereof, including or excluding this tranchise, the Council or its designee may serve notice of termination upon the franchisee and the successful bidder at such sale, in which event the franchise herein granted and all rights and privileges of the franchisee here-under shall cease and terminate thirty (30) days after service of such notice, unless:

(1) The Council shall have approved the transfer of this franchise, as and in the manner of this Ordinance provided; and

(2) Unless such successful bidder shall have covenanted and agreed with the City to assume and be bound by all the terms and conditions of this franchise.

Section 27, PROGRAM CONTENT RESTRICTIONS. In addition to providing basic cable television service consisting of broadcast, locally originated, access, and automated signals, the Company may offer subscribers optional services on a per-program or perchannel basis (pay cable). The Company shall not, however, pro-gram or in any way display pornographic material such as X-fated motion pictures either as part of its basic cable or pay cable services.

Section 28, EMPLOYMENT REQUIREMENT. The Company shall not sefuse to hire, not discharge from employment, nor discriminate against any person regarding compensation, terms; conditions, or privileges of employment because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin. The Company shall take affirmative action to insure that employees are treated, during employment, without regard to their sex, race, color, creed or national origin and shall give consideration to hiring employees from the Cities.

Section 29, SEPARABILITY. If any section, sub-section, Section 29, SEPARABILITY. II any Section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of any remaining portions hereof.

Section 30, ORDINANCES REPEALED. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.
