GPW Increases Attorney's Fees

Based upon a recommendation of its compensation evaluation committee, which met in executive session Thursday, October 11, the Woods Council voted to in-

crease the fee schedule of City Attorney George Cirlin. This action was taken by the council at its regular meeting Monday, October 15.

Councilman Dan Grady, committee chairman, recommended inasmuch as Mr. Cirlin hadn't had an adjustment since July 1, 1977, that his compensation should be increased from \$43 to \$47 per hour for legal services and from \$38 to \$42 per hour for court services.

The new schedule becomes effective on Thursday, November 1.

JAMES I. MCCLINTOCK

Services for Mr. McClintock, 83, of The Farms will be held today, October 25, in the Grosse Pointe Memorial (church) at 11:30 a.m. Arrangements are being handled by the William R. Hamilton Company.

He died on Monday, October 22, in his home.

Mr. McClintock was a former senior partner, and since 1978, of counsel in the Detroit law firm of McClintock, Donovan, Carson and Roach.

Born in Canon City, Colo., he was a 1919 graduate of

the University of Michigan, where he received his law degree in 1921.

While at U-M, he was editor of the Michigan Law Review and a member of the Order of the Coif and Phi Delta Phi fraternities.

As an undergraduate, he was a member of the Delta Upsilon fraternity and Michigan Senior Honor Society. He earned his letter as captain of the varsity basketball team.

Mr. McClintock served as an aviation pilot in the U.S. Navy in World War I. During World War II he acted as counsel to the wartime Board of Economic Warfare.

After admission to the Bar in 1921, he became an associate of the firm of Merriam, Yerkes and Simons in Detroit. In 1928 he became a partner in that firm.

Mr. McClintock specialized in corporate and banking law. He was one of the founders of Metropolitan Savings Association and served as its chairman.

He also was a founder and chairman of St. Clair Shores National Bank, chairman of the Bethlehem Corporation of Easton, Pa., chairman of the Detroit Mortgage and Realty Company and a member of the advisory board of Chicago Title Insurance Company.

He served for many years as a trustee of the American Mental Health Foundation. He served as secretary, vice-president and president of the Detroit Bar Association during the years 1943 to 1946.

Mr. McClintock was a member of the Country Club of Detroit, the Grosse Pointe Club, Detroit Club and Pointe Aux Barques.

He is survived by his wife, Nanette G.; a son, James I. Jr.; two daughters, Mrs. Martha Moody and Mrs. Merrill Ford; and four grandchildren.

The body was in state at the Barbour Chapel of the Memorial Church, Wednesday, October 24, from 6 to 8 p.m.

Woods Discusses Ambulance Service Again

(Continued from Page 1)
Recommended the hiring of four EMTs, (Emergency Medical Technicians), who would work 24-hour shifts, with a minimum of one EMT on duty at all times.

To Draft Letter
The city is operating its service under a provisional license from the state, with the document expiring on December 31. It cannot be renewed unless the city can provide a licensed EMT in the patient compartment whenever a patient is transported.

In concurring with the C-W's recommendation, the council directed City Attorney George Catlin to prepare a resolution requesting an extension of time to the existing EMS statute, with the measure being sent to Sens. John Hertel, Gilbert DiNello and John Kelly and Rep. William Bryant.

The motion directed City Administrator Chester E. Petersen to prepare a letter for all residents to pick up (with an eye on senior citizens in particular), with it focusing upon the amendment request. These letters, which will be addressed to the three senators and the representative, are scheduled to be available for pick up at city hall this week.

At the same time, Mr. Catlin was authorized to explore the possibility of court intervention as to the application of PA 315 to the city and/or seek possible reimbursement for any incurred expenses to the city for the implementation of the EMS program under such statute in accordance with provisions of the Headlee Amendment.

On this, Mr. Catlin said he didn't feel Headlee would be of help because the statutes requiring EMT services were adopted before Headlee. But he will explore this matter further.

Request for Quotes
In a further effort to put pressure on state officials, both Councilmen George Cueter and Dan Grady were authorized to explore the possibility of an extension with state officials, while checking on the possibility of implementing a regional service.

As part of the motion, a report on the aforementioned efforts is set for discussion at the Monday, November 13, meeting.

Mr. Cueter on the 15th said he had been in contact with officials at Saint John Hospital and Quick Ambulance Service, a private company, regarding any potential proposals for officials to consider, while Councilman John Sabol suggested that any interested company should submit a written commitment on costs and types of services provided.

On the latter, Director Dankel said, based upon seven specifications, a request for quotes has been sent to six private ambulance services. "This is a repeat of what we did in January, when we had no takers," he stated.

Altogether, three motions were offered by the council at the C-W meeting at which time the solons discussed potential approaches to take.

Must Do Something
In stressing the need to continue the city's own ambulance service, while pointing out all alternatives involved future contingencies, Mr. Novitke felt the city should control its own service, while questioning where it would obtain the money to pay EMTs.

Mr. Petersen said the contingency fund has around \$56,000 with some of the monies going toward the Grosse Pointe Volunteer Probation program and an estimated \$10,000 deficit in the public safety budget due to the Youth Service Division's demise. This would leave around \$40,000.

The possibility, depending on what route is finally taken, of a few public safety layoffs also was eyed.

Mr. Novitke moved that five licensed EMTs be hired, that residents be charged \$75 per unit, that the city attempt to contract its service with The Shores and that it contemplate forcing the state to pay added costs pending Mr. Catlin's opinion. He also said he was willing to amend his motion that the charge not include senior citizens but this never transpired.

Guidance Center Patients Set for Special Halloween

Halloween will be a "special world" experience for 75 special outpatients in the After-Care Services division of the Northeast Guidance Center—a comprehensive community mental health center.

The staff of the center and community volunteers will host a Halloween party Tuesday, October 30, for the patients at the center's main facility, 13340 East Warren, Detroit, from 2 to 4 p.m.

Traditional Halloween activities will include bobbing for apples, carving pumpkins and story-telling. Cider and other refreshments will be served. The patients are invited to wear costumes.

A special feature of the party will be a makeup demonstration by members of Grosse Pointe Theater, (GPT). The GPT team will instruct the patients in the art of makeup, illustrating with various "faces" — witches, witches, et al.

The 75 outpatients are all adults who have been discharged into the community after psychiatric hospitalization for periods varying from one week to 10 years. They are taking advantage of one of the "after-care" services offered by the center.

This service consists of a series of a variety of programs and experiences in which such patients, even before they were hospitalized.

"Some of them have never been out at night," according to G. J. Berman, supervisor of After-Care Services. "We try to ease them—gently—into daily life, and it's sometimes very frightening for them."

The program has included trips to a farm, a nature hike and tours of city streets.

Celebrating 10 years of this daily life orientation, the center's programs and activities are arranged during all major holidays, with community groups and interested individuals being invited to volunteer as participants.

Events such as the Halloween makeup demonstration help the patients in their adjustment to reality. "It helps them distinguish reality from fantasy."

Other after-care services offered by the center include therapy and counseling, medication and recommending appropriate community services of which the patients might avail themselves.

Besides these after-care services, the center provides day treatment for both adults and children, a 24-hour crisis intervention service, a number of outpatient services and consultation and education programs.

Austin Views License Fees

"When you open your prepared license plate application form and notice that your fee is different from last year, be assured that your monthly rate has not increased or decreased. It's just that you are likely paying for a different number of months."

Secretary of State Richard H. Austin said in a news release his offices had been receiving a number of inquiries about varying fees, made necessary by the smooth conversion to the state's new "birthday" or year-round licensing cycle. "Actually, there is no difference in the rate from last year," Mr. Austin explained. "The only variation is time the number of months vehicle owners are paying during the conversion period."

Quite simply, Mr. Austin said, fees for passenger vehicles are based on an owner's birthdate. These can range from seven months for persons born in November to 18 months for those whose birthday falls in October. Fees for individually owned pickup trucks and vans, also under the new "birthday"

system, can vary from eight to 19 months.

More than seven-million prepared license plate applications are being sent out this year. Already, 2.3-million were sent out to owners of trucks and trailers since sale of tags for these vehicles started Monday, October 1.

The vast majority of prepared license plate applications are now being sent to owners of passenger vehicles and motorcycles. Sale of these begins with the traditional date of Thursday, November 15.

Explanation of how the new system works is on the return-addressed envelope which is included with all prepared applications. Mr. Austin urged all vehicle owners to read and retain the envelope even if they plan to obtain tabs from branch offices rather than by mail.

"I still encourage the use of the mail," the Secretary of State said. "It's by far the easiest method of getting tabs and will save time and gasoline. Our mail system is an excellent energy saver. Everyone who can should use it."

Sticker tabs are being issued this year. But instead of the traditional one tab indicating the year, two tabs... the second for the month of expiration... will be issued.

Mr. Austin also stated it should mark the final year of the traditional rush at the end of March. As usual all tabs must be purchased by March 31 and he said he anticipated the "usual long, last-minute lines, but for the final time."

"When we are completely converted to our new 'birthdate' system, the long lines as we have known them through the year will disappear."

Detroit Area Colors Bloom

If you want to see the fall colors and save on gasoline, too, there are plenty of places for viewing in the Detroit area.

Best spots for enjoying the annual autumn splendors are along the Outer drives, the Rouge River area from West Warren north to West McNichols, (including Rouge and Howell Parks), and Belle Isle, according to city naturalists Carl Ackerman and Tom Molyneux.

The fall colors will peak in the city during the next 10 days to two weeks, a bit earlier than usual due to the relatively dry weather last month.

Along the Outer drives, which ring the city from Rouge Park on the west to Chandler Park on the east, the big oaks and maples will be ablaze with bright orange, yellow and deep red.

In Rouge and Howell Parks and the Rouge River watershed, there are countless hues of oranges, reds and purples to see as the oaks, maples, sumac and sassafras get ready to shed their summer coats.

On Belle Isle, there are four nature trails through the woods, including a short trail for the handicapped. The variety of color is abundant along these trails, with elms, maples, swamp oaks, ash, willows and cottonwoods dominating the sylvan scene.

These trails all lead out from the new Belle Isle Nature Interpretive Center which is across from the golf driving range at the east end of the island.

And, if seeing isn't enough, during the quieter week days when fewer people are on the island, it is possible to reach out and touch a white-tailed deer. More than a hundred deer still roam the island's interior and often come right up to Nature Center.

If the rain should dampen color viewing along the trails, a slide show of fall colors also is given daily in the Nature Center, open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday.

There's also a Fall Flower Show going on all month at the Belle Isle Conservatory which is open daily until 6 p.m. Admission to the Conservatory and the Nature Center is free.

City naturalists also recommend a canoe trip on the Belle Isle canals as a good way to see the fall colors, since the island's many channels wind through places the trails do not reach. Canoe rentals are available at the west end of the island.

Other places in the city which offer a varied view of fall colors include Oakman boulevard on the west side, Chandler Park drive on the east side, Palmer Park, and such neighborhoods as Rosedale Park in the Grand River-Southfield area, Indian Village and Berry Subdivision near East Jefferson and Van Dyke, and the Sherwood Forest and Palmer Woods neighborhoods, west of Seven Mile and Woodward.

For further information about fall colors, call the City's Nature Center at 824-6077 any day except Monday.

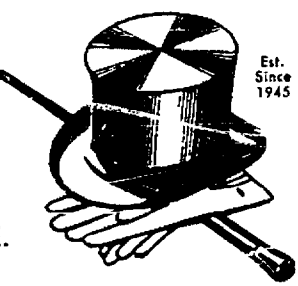

Asthmatic Foundation Sets Variety of Goals

An infant plays peacefully in her crib then suddenly begins grasping for each breath in a violent struggle for life that leads her to the intensive care unit of a local hospital.

"You can't imagine what it's like watching your baby bounce off the walls for days trying to catch her breath," said Mary Simon Williams, 25, mother of the child, Fredericka Williams, in an Asthmatic Relief Foundation, (ARF), release.

Fredericka suffers from asthma, a chronic disease that often strikes without warning, paralyzes the breathing apparatus in infants, children and adults. Fredericka was first hospitalized with asthma when she was eight-months-old. She was hospitalized with the disease 29 times in her first 26 months of life.

Today Fredericka is three-years-old and living on prescriptions of prednisone, alupent and vancril, some of the strongest medicines known to man. The drugs often cause severe side effects, including slow growth and damage to the liver and kidneys.

But for Fredericka and the

liams said she also hopes the organization will one day provide a hospital for asthmatics.

"There is a need for the education of the people about the disease, because many persons still believe asthma is a childhood illness that will be outgrown," said Mrs. Williams.

"The fact is that sometimes an individual may outgrow the illness, but not always and it is not just a childhood disease. Often, adults get asthma in later years and in those cases the illness is often severe," she noted.

"What most people don't know is that the nature of asthma has changed in the past 10 years. It is different than the childhood illness everybody thinks of and the fact is that medicine has just not kept up with the disease or its cure," said Mrs. Williams.

Mrs. Williams is busy full-time with the ARF. But, she once aspired to be a veterinarian. Her education was halted, however, because of the time and attention her asthmatic daughter needed.

"Most people just don't know what a parent of an asthmatic has to give up," said Mrs. Williams. "Most parents end up giving up their whole social life. I've talked to mothers and fathers of asthmatic children who experience terrible guilt feelings because somehow they

feel they may have caused the illness in their child.

"And it is because of that that I would like to provide some kind of counseling to those parents to show them that they are not alone and to show them ways in which to deal with their own feelings during those trying times."

In addition Mrs. Williams she hopes to seek legislation through the ARF to provide financial assistance to financially hard pressed families because she said medication for an asthmatic can run close to \$60 per week.

"I've had families call me requesting information for aid of some kind," said Mrs. Williams. "In many instances the family had more than one child. The husband and wife worked, but the medication for one asthmatic child was so expensive the family barely survived."

"Medicaid and social services rarely cover the cost of medication for an asthmatic," said Mrs. Williams.

In addition to the other aims of the ARF, Mrs. Williams dreams of a hospital in the midwest, one devoted exclusively to the care of asthmatics. "There are thought to be many causes of asthma," she said, and doctors do not have the time in conventional hospitals to discover what might be the cause in each patient," she said.

One View from the Capitol

Wayne County government and court reorganizations are desirable ends, but there are major disagreements about the means to those ends.

On the question of reorganizing the essentially bankrupt county operation, there are usually competing forces at work, both tending on this issue to block reorganization for their own selfish purposes.

Detroit commissioners and legislators distrust strengthening a county executive post, some because they feel the person elected to such a post would be an out-county person and others because it might be now-Sheriff Bill Lucas who would then, in effect, be over the top of Mayor Coleman Young or challenge Mr. Young for leadership among black citizens.

The other force tending to hold up reorganization is the desire of out-county, western Wayne, to wait until after the 1980 census to elect a charter commissioner or draft a charter. They want their due representation before any change in county organization is determined.

The Governor's Task Force, of which I was a member, recommended minor changes in the charter county enabling us to let the charter get rid of the drain and road commissioners.

Now, House Speaker Bobby Crim is quoted as saying that those changes can't be enacted because they challenge the lobbies for those interests. Isn't that obnoxious.

The alternative offered the Task Force by me and agreed to by the Governor was to allow a charter to stop electing the county clerk, sheriff, etc., and to allow a strong appointed or elected county executive. Only an elected one is possible now.

Well, the Governor has correctly refused aid to Wayne County unless real movement toward reorganization is shown. And there sit the Democrat commissioners and legislators sucking their thumbs while payless pay-days stare county employees in the face.

On the issue of court reorganization, similar forces are at work. Detroit politicians, some of them anyway, fear that loss of the Detroit Records Court will mean defeat for many, perhaps especially black, Detroit judges and, perhaps, Judge Justin Ravitz. So those people want some county judges elected only by Detroit vot-

ers, a plan I cannot support.

There are some judges of questionable caliber on Records Court. There are some on most urban courts, subject as they are to name-game candidates and lack of voter awareness of candidate qualification. As radical as Judge Ravitz is, I suspect he would win county-wide because he is a competent judge according to many trial attorneys.

Our municipal courts also come under scrutiny in the question of county court reorganization.

I do not support my Democrat colleague, Sen. John Kelly, in his proposal to force immediate switch to district courts, with four judges.

Neither part makes much sense to me. At the very least, I am certain the Pointes could have the switch made effective a year or more from now rather than immediately, and the Pointes may only need one, or at most two, full-time judges, certainly not four of them.

What does it all prove. Vested interests are tough when they are attacked but, in the process, prove their deficiency by their very defense.

GP Mother, Teacher Is Record Holder

Jeanne Bocci's premier event isn't the marathon, even though she's counted as one of the top runners in Michigan.

Jeanne, of Grayton road is one of four nominated by the United Foundation as Sportswoman of the Year.

She was the first woman from Michigan to run the Boston Marathon, the premier distance event in the first year it was opened to women, 1974.

Her most recent record was set in August, when she ran in the Men's National 50 kilometer qualifier in San Jose, Cal., for the World Cup.

A hip problem prevented her from running all out in the Free Press Marathon Sunday, October 14, but she finished the race anyhow.

But the time wasn't quite good enough to qualify her for the Boston Marathon next year.

Jeanne, a certified dental assistant, who is working on her Master's degree in education, is in her fifth year as an instructor at North High.

This year she also has been traveling to South High, teaching there.

A mother of two, Gerry, 9, and GERALYN, 8, she also coaches the track team at

North. In between all that, she somehow finds time to run about 12 miles a day.

"There's always a way to get a workout," she explains. "If you enjoy the sport you can adjust to the schedules."

For Jeanne, most of the time her schedule involves an early morning rise, a run from her home out to North, a distance of about six miles, and then a few laps in the school pool to stretch the

muscles. Then she puts in her day's work at North and South High, running back home from North when it's over.

Sometimes things don't work out quite so well, she admits, and she may end up running at 10 p.m. to get in her mileage.

"It becomes part of your lifestyle. I enjoy it; I love to run."

Jeanne's enthusiasm doesn't stop at running either. In talking to her, you feel there is hardly a thing she does that she doesn't put her whole heart into.

"I love to coach and work with the kids. I think I have excellent rapport with them," she said.

Originally from Calumet in the Upper Peninsula, Jeanne came to Detroit, met and married her husband and took up running at his urging.

Gerry has been running for 26 years now, and once held the Michigan high school mile record while at Denby.

Today he's racewalking chairman for Michigan, and while he sat out the Free Press Marathon as an official this year, he has hopes of qualifying for the Olympics in the 50-kilometer racewalk.

Gerry, acting as Jeanne's coach, encouraged her to

race. Her first event was a 220-yard dash in 1964. Running against high schoolers, she finished dead last.

For two years she ranked second in the state in those two events. Then she moved into the distances, and currently ranks with the top five women in the marathon, while gaining world records in the 30-, 35-, 40- and 50-kilometer race walk titles.

Running in the San Jose Race in August, she came within 30 seconds of her husband but a fellow male runner ribbed him about allowing his wife to catch up.

Jeanne has an interesting system for training to racewalk — she runs.

"Basically this summer I trained to run the marathon, averaging 30 to 90 miles a week," she said.

Jeanne would like to get women's racewalking events into the 1984 Olympics.

She says she sometimes gets "all choked up" when she sees 50 runners on Lakeshore road, since she encourages running, both with her students and with other people in general.

Jeanne has run right through both of her pregnancies, and only twice has she been hassled beyond a few catcalls from motorists.

"I think everybody in this country should do something physical every day," she said, whether it be running, walking, swimming or some other activity.

For the beginner, she recommends a gradual system of run-walk, and cautions against overdoing it too soon.

The next day the linksters met Sterling Heights Stevenson. The match resulted in a one stroke victory for South, 201-202. The win clinched a share of the league championship with Northern, as both boasted 9-1 records.

Schultz again led the way with a 37. Peabody and Mutschall both added 40's.

Post-season play did not prove as successful for the Blue Devils. The EML league meet saw Northern run away from the field, as South finished a disappointing second. The tournament medalist was Schultz with a 76. Mike Lynch broke the individual school record with a 35 on the front nine.

Being the sixth runner in South High's cross country history to record a time under 16 minutes, varsity runner Bill Peattie again paced the Devils to a victory over Port Huron on Wednesday, October 10, at their home course.

Adding a victory over Roseville on Tuesday, October 16 and a loss to North on Monday, October 15, at Three Mile Park, South's record stands at 6-4.

Dominating the varsity team are runners Peattie and John Platt. Platt recorded a 16:01 time, while Peattie followed with a 16:03 in the meet against Roseville. These times earned the Devils' first and second place overall. Moreover, South beat Roseville in a 17-46 decision.

Upsetting the Port Huron team by 15-48, Peattie ran an outstanding race, recording a 15:56 time. Platt crossed at 16:02, and received second place. Jeff Peterson followed with a 16:22 to take third.

The Devils lost a 15-50 decision to North, although Peattie recorded a personal best time of 15:54.

JV now displays a 7-3 record. Injured members of the team include captains Jason Pallas and Bill Schneider, while runner Andre Augier also is sidelined.

'Project BEAR' Aids Citizens

"Project BEAR," (Broad Emergency Assistance Radio), now one year old, has proved to be an effective, economical and reliable way of providing motorist assistance along Interstate 66 Freeway between Grand Rapids and Detroit, reports the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT), in a news release.

Project BEAR, a cooperative effort by the State Police, MDOT, the Federal Communications Commission and the Federal Highway Administration, uses the Citizens Band Radio Emergency Channel 9 to provide direct communication between motorists and the State Police.

It is the first of its kind in the nation and since last October, when it began, the system has averaged 12 calls per day, triggering some form of aid or response to more than 4,000 motorists or emergency situations.

The system consists of 10 CB relay towers along the 110-mile stretch. When a motorist anywhere on or nearby the freeway has a problem or sees another motorist in trouble, he or she uses Channel 9 to communicate directly with the State Police radio dispatcher. The dispatcher then contacts a local State Police post or other service agency to handle the emergency.

MDOT Director John P. Woodford said, "There was some concern at first that the system would not serve motorists who did not have CB radios in their vehicles. However, a survey indicates that nearly 50 percent of the calls received are from motorists who are reporting other motorists' needs.

"This correlates with another survey that shows nearly half the vehicles traveling I-96 are equipped with CB radios."

The majority of the calls received on Project BEAR are for motorist assists, but State Police also have responded to accidents, highway hazards and medical emergencies.

"We've found the system very helpful," said Lt. Bernard Schlehuber of the State Police. "It enables us to arrive on a scene a lot faster. In some cases, a CBer's call has cut our arrival time by 15 minutes and, in a crisis, arriving just a few minutes earlier can make a difference."

"It's not the most ideal system, because at times atmospheric noise and 'skip' on the CB frequency cause problems relaying information, but for the money it's the best. Motorists are more apt to use their CB than stop and use a roadside call box."

back to the rock dance. Most of our bands (rock), are now booked three months in advance."

Future plans for this year's senior dances, according to Miss Lintvedt, will include more of the same live rock and roll groups, which charge anywhere from \$200 to \$600 a night.

Money raised from the dances will go toward the Senior Prom and other benefits for the Class of '80.

Letters to The Editor of The NEWS

To the Editor:
I strongly object to the manner in which the Grosse Pointe city councils are going about awarding cable television franchises.

The awarding of these franchises should be accomplished by means of open competitive bidding. That has not been the case. It appears that the franchises are being awarded to the War Memorial — Teleprompter group as a result of private negotiations.

My understanding of the law is that local governments like the Grosse Pointes have the authority to permit the development, and by means of franchise agreements, to provide for the regulation of cable television systems within their communities.

However, a cable television system is considered a public utility. Cable television systems are considered monopolistic in character and effect the public interest. To award such franchises without open competitive bidding will, I feel, subject the Grosse Pointe communities to possible legal action.

Further, it appears that a cable television system may be considered "public improvements" and, therefore, should be subject to Michigan statutes requiring competitive bidding for public improvements projects. Obviously the purpose of competitive bidding for public favoritism, fraud and extravagance in awarding municipal contracts and franchises.

Federal law has dictated that the municipality consider in a public proceeding the system operators' legal, financial, technical and other qualifications as well as their character. The municipality is expected to publically invite applications. Application should be placed on public file, and notice of the filing should be publicized. Thereafter, a public hearing should be held and a report of those hearings should be published.

To this end it is customary that municipalities adopt a formal bidding package, (request for proposal), after adopting a general ordinance governing cable television.

I believe that both federal and Michigan law requires competitive bidding, and I urge the Grosse Pointe councils to reconsider their private negotiations with the War Memorial — Teleprompter group.

Standards of franchising

and standard request for proposals are readily available from the Federal Communications Commission and the Cable Television Information Center in Washington, D.C.

The request for proposal is designed to eliminate unnecessary boiler plate and to get to the substantive facts covering the viability of a cable system. The Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association — Teleprompter proposal is lacking this information.

Teleprompter would like nothing more than to be awarded a franchise without the usual effort involved, particularly since Teleprompter has fairly recently again become active in franchising after their past president and founder was convicted of bribing a local official.

Need more be said?

Section 22: Subscriber rates should be regulated by the city, and should be justified. The Consumer Price Index should not result in automatic increases as there is not necessarily a correlation between cable TV costs and the CPI.

(a): Rates for other services are not regulated. They should be regulated in the same way as subscriber rates. It would seem to me that our cities should have more of a say in rates than is presently provided for.

In reading over the proposed ordinance for cable TV before our city council I have certain questions and comments. My interest in cable TV is that the interests of the schools and the public be provided for.

Section 6 (d): Is \$50,000 an adequate amount for a performance bond? (Editor's Note: It has been changed to \$100,000.)

Section 7 (j): What has been the experience of other jurisdictions that have cable TV as to how much is provided by the cable operator in assisting educational facilities to hook up internally?

Section 13: Should not the city reserve the right to approve the sale or transfer of the franchise based on an investigation of the finances, expertise and business record of a proposed purchaser?

Section 14: At this time there is a movement to limit some of the FCC's regulatory powers. Communities cannot rely on current FCC regulations. It is necessary that important considerations be spelled out in the local ordinance.

Section 15 (b): One educational channel is provided for public schools, which I assume to mean that it is exclusively for public school use. Is this adequate, considering that the library will also be entitled to access? Certainly with the number of schools, the adult education programs in our community, and the library, one channel should be a minimum, with the provision that additional channel use shall be provided if the need is demonstrated.

(c): There is no provision for a public access channel — it should be clearly spelled out.

Section 20 (a): The ordinance only provides for payment to the city of three

percent of the gross subscriber revenues received by the company. The Code of Federal Regulations allows the franchise fee to apply to the franchisee's gross revenues per year from all cable service in the community.

Section 22: Subscriber rates should be regulated by the city, and should be justified. The Consumer Price Index should not result in automatic increases as there is not necessarily a correlation between cable TV costs and the CPI.

(a): Rates for other services are not regulated. They should be regulated in the same way as subscriber rates. It would seem to me that our cities should have more of a say in rates than is presently provided for.

After reading our paper for the Grosse Pointes for several years, it is apparent that as many of our citizens neglect to read the news as refrain from attending our city council meetings.

While "Letters to The Editor" is an important segment to this fine paper, if news on page one were read you would not have to devote three columns to citizens, such as H. W. Martin of Brys drive, ("Letter to The Editor," October 11 edition).

All of our citizens could be aware of the serious traffic/safety problem that exists in the northwest area of Grosse Pointe Woods if they read the news in our paper and would attend our council meetings.

There is no simple solution to this situation, but, after living with the tremendous traffic, I know we cannot expect those residents on Brys drive west of Mack avenue to "live with it" any longer.

I'm confident that our city council and the firm, Goodell-Grivas, Inc., will solve this serious problem.

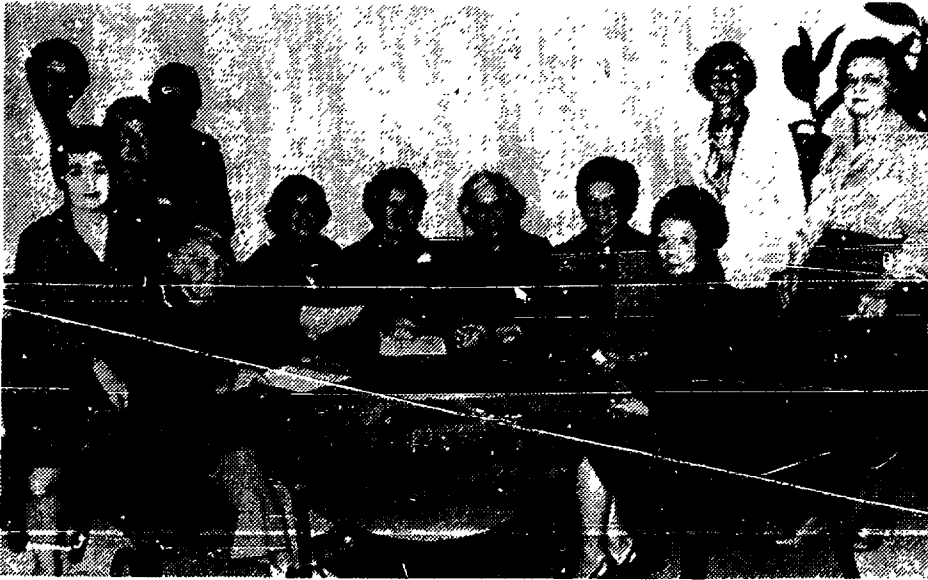

Youths Nabbed in B-E Incident

Merchants Seek Sunday Change

Fearing they will lose a substantial amount of Christmas business to Eastland Shopping Center, several Village merchants, represented by Book Village owner Gwen Samuel, last week asked the City Council to amend its ordinance prohibiting certain businesses to open on Sundays.

Mrs. Samuel told the council that this year, Sunday, December 23, "will be a big shopping day."

"It would be nice to keep that money in Grosse Pointe rather than see shoppers go over to Eastland," she said.

A City ordinance prohibits businesses that are over 2,500 square feet in size to operate on Sundays. Last year, when Christmas Eve fell on Sunday, the council amended the ordinance to allow Sunday openings only when Sunday is Christmas Eve.

Mrs. Samuel said 24 businesses stayed open last year, even though the largest, Walton Pierce and Jacobsons, closed.

"It was a very successful day last year," according to Mrs. Samuels.

Mayor David Robb said the council will study the question and make a decision next month. He noted that the ordinance is "carefully written" and may be difficult to amend again without risking an eventual challenge.

Smoking Costs Paid by All

The health costs of cigarette smoking in the U.S. have reached a staggering \$27 billion every year, says the 1979 Surgeon General's report.

During the last decade more than three million Americans died from cigarette caused diseases, reports the American Lung Association of Southeastern Michigan in a news release. There is no way to calculate the physical and emotional suffering involved. But there are ways to calculate the financial costs.

And those costs — in billions of taxpayers' dollars and private as well as non-profit health insurance premiums — are a crushing burden to everyone, whatever their smoking behavior.

Attempts have been made to shift some of the financial burden from the shoulders of those who choose a healthier lifestyle. At least 32 American insurance companies now offer significant discounts of up to 20 percent to nonsmokers — for health, accident, fire and life policies.

Concerned observers are proposing further shifts. Blake Cady, MD, of the Lahey Clinic Foundation in Boston, for example, suggests a "health tax" be added to each pack of cigarettes. The monies would go into a special fund for smoking-related medical expenses.

Insurance companies and Blue Cross/Blue Shield could apply to this fund to cover medical expenses caused by smoking. In turn, insurance companies and Blue Cross would be required to reduce their health insurance premiums for everyone — in proportion to the monies they received from the fund.

Devising ways to lighten the financial burden on nonsmokers of the health costs of smoking poses great complexities. But it is becoming an issue.

One way to eliminate the burden, says the association, is to convince smokers to value their own lungs and lives.
