Saint Paul Planning Big Event

Thursday, November 1
A WESTERN AIRLINES DC10 en route to Mexico City crashed, killing at least 74 persons after the pilot realized he was landing his aircraft on a closed runway. Capt. Charles Gilbert was not listed among the survivors of the crash. Officials say that the pilot probably realized a "split-second too late" that he was landing on the wrong runway. Hampered by dense fog, Capt. Gilbert tried to veer the airplane over to another runway, but failed to do so when the right side of the plane struck a truck and then crashed into a nearby building.

Friday, November 2
AILING CHRYSLER Corporation will receive up to \$1.5 billion in federal loan guarantees if the auto company can match the aid in non-federal money. If approved by Congress, the aid package will be the biggest in American corporate history. The package is considerably larger than what Chrysler officials had hoped for in August when treasury officials said the auto maker would have to settle for less than \$1 billion in assistance. Tight credit and increasing energy costs, however, indicated a greater need, said treasury officials.

Saturday, November 3
CALLING THE PROPOSAL "an option," Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young said that the motor city's contribution toward the financial recovery of Chrysler Corporation would be a \$100 million auto assembly plant. Mr. Young's aides were completely taken by surprise when the mayor said such a plant, built near the Jefferson avenue plant, would help Chrysler jobs in Detroit. The mayor said that if Chrysler chose to renovate the Jefferson avenue plant instead, "we would consider participating in that." The statement also took Chrysler officials by surprise.

Sunday, November 4
MORE THAN 120 cardinals arrived at the Vatican for an alleged talk on the wealth of the Roman Catholic Church, which some speculate might be in a financial pinch because of losses on bad investments. While the church does own considerable wealth in art, Vatican officials say they may call upon the dioceses for help. Other topics to be discussed will be men leaving the priesthood and the reorganization of Cura, the offices through which Pope John Paul leads Roman Catholics.

Monday, November 5
AS MANY as 100 American hostages were taken by Iranian students who stormed the American Embassy demanding that exiled Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi be returned to Iran for trial. The students fought with U.S. Marine guards for about three hours with students shouting that they would not give up the hostages unless the shah is returned. The U.S. State Department said that the Iranian government had "given assurances that our people being held are safe and well." Later reports indicated that only about 50 hostages were seized in the raid.

Tuesday, November 6
JAMES EARL RAY, convicted assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King, failed to escape from the Brushy State Prison in Tennessee for the second time. A guard spotted Ray, 51, crawling under a green blanket between the prison wall and a 12-foot high link fence. Ray's cellmate also was found hiding near some air conditioner units. In their attempt to escape, the two inmates left life-like stuffed dummies in their cells. Ray is serving 99 years for the slaying of Dr. King.

Wants Stand On District Court Bill

Sen. Kelly Asks Local
Officials to Share Views
on His Proposal; Only
Shores Has Spoken

The issue of Grosse Pointe's conversion to a district court system was thrown back into the laps of local city councils this week by the sponsor of a proposal to establish two full-time courts in the community.

In a letter to all Grosse Pointe mayors and councilmen, State Sen. John Kelly requested the officials to take a formal stand at their next council meeting on his controversial district court proposal.

Formally Speaks
The senator said he has proposed the conversion because he fears Grosse Pointe may be included in a plan in the state legislature to reorganize Detroit's courts. Inclusion in the Detroit system, "would not be in the best interests" of local residents, the senator said.

Grosse Pointe's small, expensive municipal courts are some of the few left in the state. According to a supreme court administrator, all municipal courts are to be converted to district courts by 1981.

So far, only one local unit has formally spoken to the issue. The Shores Council last month okayed a resolution approving the conversion to district courts. But

Woods Seeking Meeting Between HW, SCS Toward Solving Traffic Problem

Need for Cooperation Stressed As Solons Authorize City Administrator
Peterson to Arrange Session within 60 Days; Goodell-Grivas
Study, Recommendations Explored on November 5

Stressing the need for cooperation between Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores officials toward solving the traffic problem in the northwest area of The Woods, the Woods Council on Monday, November 5, after almost two hours of discussion on the Goodell-Grivas, Inc., study of the area, voted to meet with officials of the two communities toward alleviating the problem which has plagued The Woods for over four years and, most recently, the

neighboring communities. As part of Councilman John Sabol's motion, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen was authorized to arrange such a meeting within 60 days, allowing some flexibility because of the Tuesday, November 6, elections in all three communities and the upcoming holidays.

At the same time, officials in both cities will be provided with a copy of the traffic study, which presented 15 alternatives for consideration, some of which would be in conjunction with the neighboring communities and others via unilateral action.

By Woods officials only.
"Willing to Meet"
Reaction to the council's action on the parts of Harper Woods City Manager Ronald Bultman and St. Clair Shores City Manager Robert Jones was favorable, with both indicating they would await copies of the report.

"I'm sure that the City of Harper Woods will be glad to review the report and dis-

manager Marc Etter, what keeps it alive financially. It was only last December that the council considered passing a similar ordinance, but voted it down 5-1 after emotional pleas from supporters of the Punch and Judy jammed council chambers and were vociferous in their support of the theater.

That ordinance would have limited the hours of operation of all "places of entertainment." The latest ordinance is broader in its coverage. Specifically exempted are establishments licensed by the Liquor Control Commission, where state law takes precedence. discuss the situation with the elected and appointed officials in Grosse Pointe Woods," said Mr. Bultman. "We've met in the past and we're willing to meet in the future."

Saying he was glad The Woods voted to talk over the situation rather than act unilaterally, Mr. Bultman called it "a positive step."

For his part, Mr. Jones said, "As long as all three communities are invited to review and analyze it, (the report), that's the proper procedure to follow. All we can do is hope to find one alternative that's acceptable to all three cities."

Mr. Jones also pointed out that each city will try to protect its own residents and that a "do nothing" approach, (one of the 15 alternatives), would be acceptable to St. Clair Shores and the other alternatives would affect its citizens in some fashion.

Cites Conclusions
In reviewing conclusions and recommendations made in the study, which was conducted as an activity of the Community Development Block Grant program, Dennis A. Randolph, traffic and transportation engineer, Goodell-Grivas, said eight conclusions were drawn.

Some of these conclusions include the following:
• The inordinate amount of traffic on Brys drive is caused directly by the lack of a logical termination of Eight Mile road at Harper, and, secondly, by low levels of operation on Vernier road which causes drivers to "short cut" along Eight Mile.
• Reduction of traffic on Brys, while at the same time causing a minimum impact on other nearby streets, can only be achieved through cooperation of the various cities and agencies.
• Unilateral actions by The Woods to reduce Brys traffic, and at the same time minimize the impact on other Woods streets, can effectively reduce through traf-

fic but such attempts would severely impact neighboring communities.
• A large number of alternatives can be developed, but each affects such factors as pedestrian safety, emergency vehicle accessibility, traffic safety, traffic reductions and others in different amounts.
• The only alternative that could reduce through traffic with a minimum of impact on other streets would be the extension of Eight Mile from Brys to Mack.

Solutions Viewed
As a result of the recommendations were made. One says the reduction of traffic on Brys while minimizing impact on surrounding streets can only be achieved through implementation of a plan involving the cooperation of all affected communities.

The other notes that both short-term, (temporary, low-cost), and long-term, (permanent, higher cost), solutions are available.
With that, four alternatives were presented as a solution to the Brys traffic problem.

A long-range solution involving all communities is alternative nine — a combination of traffic diverters, one-way streets, operational

Patterson, Freeman Win Mayoral Races

Prost Tops List for Park Council, While Citizens Vote Down Trio of
Charter Amendments Governing Loans, Grants; Novitke Heads
List in Woods Council Race, Dingeman Leads Way in Farms
And Kazul Takes City Judgeship

The Tuesday, November 6, election in four Pointes is history with voters in The Park returning Mayor Matthew C. Patterson to office, while Woods voters gave their support to former Councilman George S. Freeman in the mayoral race.

Investigation Continues in Farms Murder

Police Say They Have No Concrete Leads As Yet
in Stabbing Death of Jeanne Carol Clyne
on Halloween Night; Chief Ferber
States There Are No Indications
of Mad Killer on Loose

Nearly one week of investigation has failed to turn up any concrete leads in the brutal Halloween night slaying of Farms woman Jeanne Carol Clyne on a normally busy street. And with each passing day, as police remain stymied, residents become more convinced the work was that of a random killer. Many are afraid, and have changed such habits as walking at night.

At press time Tuesday, November 6, Farms police had its three-man detective bureau, plus Cpl. Joseph Miller, the department's homicide specialist, working 18 to 18 hour days checking out the multitude of tips received.

Chief Robert Ferber and Lt. Ignatius Backman have joined the investigative force, while The Woods, City and Harper Woods have each loaned a man to the investigation.

"Defensive Wound"
Mrs. Clyne, 44, of McMillan road was found about 6:40 p.m. alongside the sidewalk on the north side of Kercheval avenue between Lothrop and Merriweather roads. Lying face down along a row of bushes, she had been stabbed 11 times in the left chest, side and neck with a thin-bladed instrument, possibly a pair of scissors.

In what Farms Det. Earl Field called a "defensive wound," Mrs. Clyne's left hand also was cut, indicating she had resisted her attacker.

A former food writer for "The Detroit News," Mrs. Clyne had left the office of psychiatrist Dr. Douglas Sargent in the Colonial Federal Savings Building, 63 Kercheval, at 6 p.m.

Shortly after that, a woman said she saw a woman matching Mrs. Clyne's description buy a newspaper from the stand in front of the NEWS' office.

So far as police know, that's the last time she was seen alive.

Mrs. Clyne was a frequent walker who exercised to relieve the symptoms of a back

Accident Injures Boy Seriously

Five-Year-Old Gets Entangled with Woods
Rubbish Truck; Department Cites
Lack of Eye
Witnesses

A five-year-old boy was seriously injured near his home at 455 Saddle lane after becoming entangled in a city rubbish truck with his bicycle early Wednesday afternoon, October 31.

In the incident, William Janci received internal injuries and a fractured pelvis. He was reported in good condition in the acute pediatric care unit at Saint John Hospital as of Monday morning, November 5.

Public Safety Director John Dankel said there were no witnesses who saw precisely what happened, while there was an estimated 15- to 20-minute delay before the department was notified of the accident.

No Criminal Intent
The facts of the case based upon the department's investigation were presented to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office on Monday to see if there were any chargeable offenses. Traffic Safety Officer Paul Crook said Jean Marson, assistant prosecuting attorney, said there was no

Area Residents Deeply Affected by Murder

The murder of Jeanne Carol Clyne, because it was so brutal and because it is still a mystery, has deeply frightened residents of the area and workers and patrons On-the-Hill, especially women.

Area merchants have felt the change, too, since the Halloween murder, the first homicide in The Farms since 1975 as those that stay open at night have had a drop in business.

"The thing that worries me is that there may be one of those 'slasher' lunatics around here," said Sue Jackson of The City, who works at a real estate office On-the-Hill.

A mother of seven children, Mrs. Jackson said the murder has forced her to change the rules around her house.

"I'm not letting my children out at night any more. I'm just putting a lid on that altogether," she said. "I was concerned before this happened about their safety — now I'm doubly concerned."

Because it is a mystery, it is haunting people's minds and surfaces in dozens of conversations daily among shoppers, workers and visitors On-the-Hill.

"They're all scared; it's terrible," said Augustine Mannino, manager of the Golden Coffee Pot Restaurant, about her patrons.

A waitress there, Kim

While The Park election, because of the federal funding issue, created the most interest in the eyes of many citizens, other important decisions were made in The Woods, Farms and City.

Results in The Park indicate that the majority of voters apparently supported the use of federal funds in the city despite a strong campaign on the part of Proud of The Park, (POP), against such usage.

Expresses Pleasure
In the mayoral race, Mr. Patterson, who will now begin his 16th year in office, defeated Councilman George Verdonck by a comfortable 2,389 to 1,594 margin. Despite the loss, Mr. Verdonck will retain his council seat.

"I am very pleased to be returned to office. It shows that people in this city have faith in me," Mr. Patterson said. "You can be assured that I will try to keep this city the best in the United States."

In the council race, challenger John Prost topped all candidates with 2,393 votes, while incumbent Councilman Dr. Roger McNeill with 1,873 and challenger Anthony Spada with 1,632 also were elected. Of all the candidates selected, only Mr. Spada has expressed opposition to the use of federal funds.

Meanwhile, two incumbent councilmen, Clayton Alandt with 1,990 votes and Charles Tompkins with 1,414, were defeated. Daniel Schaitberger, who also opposed the use of federal funds, received 1,486 votes.

Three amendments to the city charter, viewing the use of the city receiving certain federal, state and county loans or grants, with all stipulating that each must be approved by a three-fifths majority of voters in an election, were all defeated by around two to one margins.

Indicate Approval
In The Woods, Mr. Freeman, a councilman since 1970 and mayor pro-tem since 1973, defeated George Cueter, who had been on the council since 1975, by a 2,617 to 1,516 margin.

"I'm very pleased that I received the approval of my philosophy that The Woods should be a place for single family dwellings and that good communication should always be maintained between the council and the people."

Incumbent Councilman Robert E. Novitke led the council race with 2,809 votes. Other candidates included challengers Frederick Lovelace with 2,787 and William W. Wilson with 2,584. Meanwhile, Tim Muccianre received 1,462 votes and Arthur J. Kuehnle, 578.

Municipal Judge J. Patrick Denis, who was unopposed, captured 2,528 votes.

A referendary question governing the issuance of a tavern license, (permitting the serving of beer and wine only), was approved by a 2,452 to 1,680 count.

This question was placed on the ballot after a successful initiative petition drive was conducted by the owners of Le Cafe Francais, 20311 Mack avenue. It will now be up to the council to decide, who, if anyone, receives such a license.

Big Turnout in Park
An amendment to the city charter governing special elections also was approved by a 2,201 to 1,525 margin.

In The Farms, James Dingeman with 1,783 votes and Lloyd Semple with 1,500 were re-elected, along with challengers Harry Echlin

(Continued from Page 1) improvements beyond the study area and peak hour turn prohibition at Canton and Vernier.

For a short-range solution involving all communities, alternative six was recommended—a one-way street system and operational improvements beyond the study area.

As a long-range solution without other community involvement, alternative 15—prototype E was suggested. This would involve the looping of streets, eliminating access to Mack from Roslyn to Anita, (inclusive), via connecting the east ends of Roslyn with Hampton, Ridgmont with Hollywood and Hawthorne with Anita with closed loops. It also would involve installing a barricade on Brys at Eight Mile as an interim measure for a permanent cul-de-sac.

Learning Experience
Finally, a short-range solution without other community involvement would be alternative 12. This involves installing barricades on Brys, Roslyn, Hampton, Ridgmont, Hollywood, Hawthorne and Anita, west of Helen, with the eventual construction of cul-de-sacs.

Selection of the final four alternatives, the report says, is based upon the feasibility of practical implementation. "Final selection of an alternative requires a determination of the amount of cooperation existing between the communities, and the final determination of the seriousness of the Brys drive traffic problem by the Grosse Pointe Woods community."

During the discussion, Mr. Sabol reiterated his feelings against the use of cul-de-sacs, while expressing support for a further exploration of one-way street proposals.

Councilman Dan Grady felt officials had learned several points from past experience including signing wasn't a viable solution and that efforts to case a problem on one street, e.g., Brys,

only affects neighboring streets.

He urged Woods residents to "win over" their counterparts in Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores in viewing the need for cooperation between citizens and officials alike toward solving the traffic flow problem.

Best Avenue
Mr. Grady added there's nothing like a nice, easy solution for politicians to jump on but so far, in this case, there hasn't been a good solution.

In saying he agreed with Mr. Grady, Councilman George Cueter indicated, with The Woods installing the barricades, the attention of both Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores was captured. In saying other agencies, encompassing county and state officials, have been brought in, he cited the efforts of The Woods in sending resolutions to state lawmakers.

Mr. Cueter felt it would be a mistake for the council to reach a decision at the meeting, while requesting Public Safety Director John Dankei to find out the timetable for state highway department

improvements regarding traffic signal work and/or signing in the immediate expressway area.

For his part, Councilman George S. Freeman felt the avenue to take toward arriving at the best, possible solution was to meet with officials in Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores, suggesting that a state senator might act as a mediator in such a meeting.

Councilman Robert E. Novitke moved that alternative 15 be considered for implementation after a feasibility study was conducted, that Brys be closed again and that appropriate signing be installed to direct traffic down Helen avenue to Vernier. He also felt the need to have a long-range solution.

"Moral Commitment"
Both Mr. Cueter and Mr. Sabol spoke against the motion and the alternative, citing potential condemnation proceedings and the possible elimination of parking. The potential negative effect of such street looping also was hit by other citizens who eyed Mack businesses in the area.

However, Mr. Novitke re-

plied if the feasibility study indicated this he would be against the plan but he wanted to know this for sure. Then, Mr. Sabol subsequently offered his substitute motion, which was approved, 6-1, with Mr. Novitke voting "no."

Bruce E. Van Farowe of Brys drive, northwest area spokesman, told the council that a crossroads was reached on the 5th, stating that the council has a "moral commitment and a moral obligation to the residents on Brys drive to bring relief."

In saying it would be irresponsible for the council to leave the traffic along Brys for another week in viewing traffic safety factors, he proposed that the solons decide to permanently close Brys with a cul-de-sac.

He also felt it would be unwise to cul-de-sac every street in the northwest area because it might start a "cold war" between The Woods and Harper Woods. This, he said, was a change in his thinking.

Against Shifting
Besides the Brys cul-de-sac he suggested that officials consider signing along Helen on a temporary basis to direct traffic to Vernier road, while beginning talks with officials in the two neighboring communities.

Meanwhile Barbara Frazho of St. Clair Shores wrote a letter bearing nine signatures, including her own, of citizens in both Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores.

It cited their opposition to barricades or cul-de-sacs which result in "traffic shifting, (and compounding)," into their communities.

It also cited their opposition to the use of signing, one-way streets, et al., that may result in any such shifting.

(Continued from Page 1) the council also called for a radically different organization than that outlined by Sen. Kelly's proposal.

The Shores' resolution called for the establishment of only one Grosse Pointe district with just one or two judges assigned to it. Sen. Kelly's proposal includes two districts and four judges, until 1983, when the number will be reduced to two.

Wants Consensus
The Shores Council echoed concerns expressed informally by many city leaders in its trimmed down version of the court conversion. Budget-conscious city leaders think the two-court, four-judge system proposed by Sen. Kelly would be "too expensive," said Village President Gerald C. Schroeder.

While Sen. Kelly said he is aware of that concern, he also would like to see a formal consensus on his draft reached by local leaders before he introduces the legislation.

"I'll abide by whatever decision the councils make on this issue," Sen. Kelly said at a public meeting last month.

"But I'm not going to sit on my hands and watch Grosse Pointe be included in a Detroit court system just because other local elected officials chose not to act."

Two public meetings were held last month on the proposal and were attended by 60 residents. The senator also mailed 240 questionnaires on district courts to local attorneys. About 15 were returned, according to his aide, Bill Dahling.

Unlike the current municipal courts, which meet only a few times each month, District Courts are full-time courts of record. Judges will be paid a state salary of about \$30,000, which may be supplemented up to \$18,000

(Continued from Page 1) with 1,488 and Gail Kaess with 1,388. Incumbent Harry Fruehauf with 977 votes and challenger Joseph Mavcock with 1,000 were defeated.

Meanwhile, in The City, Municipal Judge Stan Kazul won re-election with 403 votes. Challengers George Cotichio had 321 and Reuben Waterman Jr., 87.

Mayor David Robb, who was unopposed, received 696 votes, while unopposed council members Lorenzo Brown, Jeanette Duffield and Arthur Fetters had 558, 550 and 490 votes, respectively.

Although James Hulme decided not to run for council, his name appeared on the ballot because his decision to withdraw came too late to remove his name. He received 306 votes.

The Park reported close to a 50 percent turnout of registered voters, while The Woods had around 30 percent. About 27 percent of citizens voted in The Farms and just over 18 percent in The City.

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
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
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Task Force Off To Slow Start

A task force organized to explore the need for improved services to juvenile law breakers in The Pointe held its first meeting last week, deciding only to break down into three sub-groups to discuss structure, funding and need.

Fourteen community leaders, including representatives of all the cities except The Woods, were present for the meeting Monday, October 29, according to task force member...

The task force grew out of a town meeting sponsored in September by the League of Women Voters to discuss the discontinuation of the Pointe-wide Youth Service Division, (YSD).

Many of the 200 citizens present at the September meeting argued that a replacement is needed for YSD. The division handled all juvenile crime in the community for almost a decade, working through the school system and all five municipalities.

At its first meeting the task force heard from two students Christopher Lynch, president of the North High Student Association, and John Gilfooy, president of South's Student Association.

Park Councilman Douglas G. Graham, another task force member, said he didn't think anyone came away from the first session "with any strong feelings about what the real need is."

"There seem to be elements in the community who think we are missing something since the YSD was disbanded. But what is it?" he asked.

The entire task force plans to meet again on Wednesday, November 14, according to School Board Vice-President Jon Gandelot, who organized the group.

GPW Group Makes Offer

The Woods Beautification Commission in cooperation with the Department of Public Works has made arrangements for residents, who like to winter over canna roots, to have the ones which were planted on the Veteran's Memorial Parkway this summer.

The roots were recently removed and taken to the DPW barns and residents are welcome to take some before they are disposed of. Interested Woods citizens should call 804-0800 and ask for the DPW to make plans to pick some up.

Devil's Night, Halloween Activity on Quiet Side

The Woods reported the activity on Devil's Night, the evening before Halloween, and on Halloween, Wednesday, October 31, with leaf fires and several incidents of vandalism causing the most problems.

While all the municipalities had their share of incidents, police, fire and school officials in most of the Pointes indicated activity both nights was on the quiet side.

In The Woods, around 18 leaf fires were reported on Devil's Night, with six more being reported on Halloween. Public Safety Director John Dankel said none were serious, with some being extinguished by citizens. In all, 52 leaf fires were reported between Thursday, October 25, and Halloween.

A combined total of around 20 vandalism, mischief and noisy youth incidents were reported on Devil's Night, with police confiscating three slingshots and four water extinguishers from various youths. Eight similar incidents were reported on Halloween including someone sticking a pin in some candy.

City public safety officers and the Citizens Band Auxiliary were kept busy Devil's Night with a variety of vandalism reports including at least seven leaf fires.

A resident in Washington road reported two B-B holes were shot in her garage windows on Devil's Night and another resident in Maumee avenue told police vandals had spray-painted the name "Bob" on her auto.

Calls also came in about an open fire hydrant, youths setting off firecrackers and a smoke bomb that a Washington road resident found in her mailbox.

In The Farms, Police Chief Robert Ferber said Devil's Night saw "probably the least amount of activity in 10 years. He attributed this to the fact that his department had the most help it had had in 10 years—a total of 25 law enforcement personnel working, including the police support unit.

A total of 28 calls were received by police. Of those, the greatest number, (six), were complaints about egg throwing youngsters.

Four leaf fires were reported, along with three each of soapings and open hydrants. Two reports of apples were received, and one each of vandalism to a home and a car. One complaint of

fireworks also was received. Eight men including the support unit worked on Halloween.

Park police reported Devil's Night and Halloween as "relatively quiet."

Chief Henry O. Coonce said vandals, however, caused an estimated \$650 damage to one car after stealing four hubcaps, cracking the windshield and rapping off the vinyl top.

The fire department was kept busy with 31 leaf fires on Devil's Night.

In The Shores, Public Safety Director Joseph Vitale said his community was very quiet outside of four runs for both nights. There were only two reported leaf fires, he added.

The schools had a "very successful" Halloween holiday with no noteworthy damage to any of the 17 buildings, according to Director of Support Services Ben Zenn.

"We had a good week and I attribute it to the excellent cooperation we had from all the police departments and parent groups," Mr. Zenn said.

Many of these purchases were made possible by funds from the annual Book Fair sponsored by the ULS Parent's Association and by gifts earmarked for the library.

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
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Boy Seriously Hurt in GPW Accident

(Continued from Page 1) evidence of criminal intent in noting there was some conflict in citizen reports around the accident scene, Director Dankel stated the department hasn't been able to establish an exact sequence of events. "At this point, we're not convinced we'll ever know what happened," he said.

The driver, Pietro Brancaloni, said the boy was picking up rubbish bags and he told him to move out of the way. He then entered the truck, checked his left mirror to make sure traffic was clear and started forward.

At this point, Director Dankel said the driver heard a scraping noise and stopped immediately. The driver indicated he looked out of the truck and saw the boy and the bike in front of the right front dual wheels.

The driver said he jumped from the truck and took the boy from under the bike, with a neighbor taking the boy from his arms. The neighbor ran to the boy's home and told his mother, who rushed him to the hospital. He then stated he backed up the truck to release the bike from under the wheel.

Views Possibilities
 Director Dankel said the driver ultimately called the DPW at a neighbor's house to report the accident, with the DPW notifying police.

Upon the arrival of officers, the boy was gone, and the bike was on the grass. "We would have had a better feel of what happened if the bike was left alone," he said, in relation to some of the evidence being moved.

Based upon the investigation, the director cited four possibilities as to what may have occurred including the following:

- The boy may have rolled his bike down the driveway approach and into the vehicle.

- The boy may have tried to reach for the vehicle as it slowly moved away and lost

"We must get the equipment understood that the equipment is dangerous," he stated. "Kids should not play around it but should watch from the front step of their house or from the sidewalk."

The mishap has affected many people and City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, who went to the hospital to be with the family the day of the accident, said, "We are putting into immediate effect that any youngsters playing around any equipment should be taken to their parents by the driver."

If the parents aren't around or if there's no cooperation, the city vehicle will not be moved until police arrive.

"As soon as possible we will get prices on mobile radio equipment. We will propose to the council on Monday, November 19, the emergency purchase of such radios for all heavy public works vehicles," he continued.

The objective is to have a direct line via a local government channel from DPW drivers to the Public Safety Department.

"We also will request our insurance carrier to send a safety engineer quickly to go over our operations and make any recommendations toward preventing any further accidents," he said.

Meanwhile, Thomas Pillar, principal of Our Lady Star of The Sea Grade School, said William's kindergarten classmates are adding their personal touch to get well cards which will be given to him at the hospital.

Brancaloni, who has been reassigned to non-driving duties, was involved in the accident last May in which a 13-year-old Harper Woods boy was killed when his bicycle made contact with a Woods garbage truck at the intersection of Mack avenue and Vernier road.

Director Dankel pointed out that the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office determined there was no chargeable criminal offense in that case.

However, a bill of complaint and demand for jury trial was filed last November in Wayne County Circuit Court by the family.

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
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Pointes Show Mixed Results

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
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
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Kenyon Singers Visit Pointe

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
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South High School Welcomes 12 New Staffers

(Continued from Page 1) ailment, police said. It was not known whether she met her killer while walking along Kercheval, or if she had been picked up by someone, knifed and dumped at the scene.

No Indication
 However, Chief Ferber said the victim frequently walked along the route she was found on after visits to her psychiatrist. On Saturday, November 3, police distributed news releases to residents along her walking route, asking for any information they might have.

Chief Ferber said the department had received about 80 tips so far, but is still looking for more.

"We are vitally interested in any unusual parked vehicle, particularly within three blocks of where she was found. We're also interested in any reports of strange people seen walking or running, even if the description is only minimal."

The chief said that while "the incident emphasizes the constant need for self-protection," there is nothing to indicate that a mad killer is on the loose.

He said the detectives were tired by Tuesday, the result of six 18-hour days in a row. He said that the six investigators got a total of eight hours sleep per night for the first three after the crime.

Rumors Abound
 One lead the investigators are continuing to check out carefully is the reported attempted abduction of a delivery boy in the rear parking lot of Cottage Hospital Tuesday, October 23. The youth claimed a middle aged man faked wanting directions and attempted to pull him into the front seat of his car while he brandished a knife.

However, the youth described the weapon as a large hunting type knife, police

said, when they brought in for questioning. Officers said the youth has consented to taking a polygraph test.

The man in that incident was described as in his 40s, fat, with brown wavy hair, somewhat frizzy, and balding in the back and top. He was driving a light blue Monte Carlo.

And while rumors fly back and forth among shoppers and workers and residents of the Pointes, police said that talks with neighbors and co-workers of Mrs. Clyne could shed no light as to why she was killed.

Mrs. Clyne and her husband, J. Michael, both worked at Michigan Blue Cross-Blue Shield at the time of her death. She was employed as a technical writer, he as a group planner.

A long-time neighbor of Mrs. Clyne's described her as a quiet and shy person.

Fully Clothed
 "They were just the kind of people who minded their own business," the neighbor said. "They were private people."

During Mrs. Clyne's frequent walks, she strode along "as if she had taken a self-defense class, with her shoulders back, looking straight ahead, as if she had a purpose and knew exactly where she was headed," the neighbor said.

Her body was fully clothed when found, and there were no signs of sexual attack, police said. Her purse was found nearby, intact, and a gold ring was on her hand.

When found, her fists were clenching leaves and twigs, as if she might have grabbed at the bushes as she fell. One of the knees of her red leotards was grass stained, as if she had stumbled, police said.

She was dressed in a three-quarter length olive drab raincoat with silver snaps for buttons and a hood. She had on a red burgundy print dress and brown leather Bass walking shoes. She was 5'6" tall and had blond hair.

Awaits Reports
 Preliminary results of the autopsy revealed that the woman could have walked up to 25 feet while wounded before collapsing, meaning she could have been pushed out of a car after being stabbed.

Her husband told police he dropped his wife off at Dr. Stronksi's office about 8 p.m. the day of the murder, and ran some errands before returning home. A neighbor told police he went with his children between 6:45 and 7 p.m. to the Clyne home, where Mr. Clyne passed out wandy.

The man who found the body, Howard Ballantyne, 20, said he was up in his room, less than 100 feet from the spot, from 6 to 6:20 p.m. He said he saw or heard nothing during that period.

Chief Ferber said he hoped the final results of the autopsy would reveal more about how the woman was killed. He said he didn't know when the results would be back from the coroner or from the state police crime lab, where other crime evidence was sent for analysis.

Mrs. Clyne's body was taken to her native Cleveland, O. for funeral services Monday, November 5. Married 10 years, the couple had no children.

"We are not getting as many kids as we used to," she said. "There are still families coming in, but we're not getting the kids at lunch or even after school."

The parlor is open until 10 p.m. on weeknights, but Ms. Mast said workers are ready to close the store at 9:30 p.m.

"We usually have large spurts of people toward closing time, but that has disappeared, too."

Max Jacob, manager of Kent Drug, said he has noticed that there are not as many people walking around at night.

"All of a sudden, after Halloween it got very quiet," Mr. Jacob said he is getting more business during the day and that there are fewer children in the store at night.

"It's frightening because none of it makes any sense," said Dave Clacy, manager at Salem Square Foods. "It seems incredible that someone, on Halloween night, the busiest night of the year, didn't see or hear something."

The alleged beating took place on Saturday, October 20, at Dr. Stronksi's Jefferson apartment. Police said Dr. Stronksi was hospitalized for almost a week after the incident and suffered at least five fractures of his face.

The Mount Clemens man, Jeffrey W. Zielinski, faced a pre-trial exam before Municipal Judge Star Kazul on Wednesday, November 7. He is charged with assault and malicious destruction of property over \$100.

Police were called to Dr. Stronksi's apartment on Saturday, October 20, at about 2 a.m. and apprehended Zielinski and a juvenile. According to the report, both appeared to have been in a fight and had blood on their hands.

Inside the apartment, the officers found Dr. Stronksi bleeding from wounds on his face, police said. The doctor told officers that earlier he had an argument with Zielinski's mother, Shirley Zielinski, a nurse at Saint John Hospital, which had turned into a physical fight.

The youths apparently went to Dr. Stronksi's apartment to "retaliate," according to police. Officers said they have filed a petition in Wayne County Juvenile Court on the other youth involved.

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RSVP Needs Volunteers

For many senior citizens, Telephone Reassurance is the only direct contact with the outside world. RSVP, Retired Senior Volunteer Program of Catholic Social Services, has just received a grant of \$41,288 from the Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging to provide such Telephone Reassurance.

RSVP represents an ideal combination, program officials say, Retired elderly who wish to remain active volunteer to telephone disabled, homebound, isolated elderly to check on their well-being.

At this time, RSVP is currently recruiting 500 additional volunteers to service Telephone Reassurance clients. Persons 60 years of age or older should contact RSVP at 883-2100, extension 358. This type of service has been credited with saving many lives by dispatching medical help in time, officials note.

Volunteers will make the calls from agencies which have telephones available for this purpose.

Recruitment for the program has just begun. A specialized training program for volunteers will begin in November so that volunteers are ready to contact some 2,500 elderly by January.

Telephone Reassurance volunteers will be given 20 hours of technical and theoretical training in counseling techniques to help cope with loneliness, family problems, fixed income consumer counseling, energy relief counseling, crisis intervention and identifying resources for information and referral.

Each RSVP volunteer is expected to work four hours a week. Upon completion of the training RSVP volunteers who successfully complete the course will receive a certificate of achievement and one institutional credit in Community Services through Wayne County Community College.

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Institute Says Citizens Undervalue Possessions

What are your home, your furniture and your personal possessions worth? Too many property owners give that question only casual thought until a windstorm, fire or other peril damages or destroys their homes, warns the Insurance Information Institute in a news release.

While practically all homeowners have insurance against such catastrophes, literally millions are underinsured. They are not valuing their dwellings properly or are overlooking the effects of inflation, now at a double-digit rate, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce.

For these reasons, the institute advises homeowners to do well to review their policies often and to check at least four phases of coverage.

First, the amount of insurance on a dwelling should be based on the cost of building it today. Neither the purchase price a few years ago nor the current market value should be used as a guide.

The institute suggests that the home owner consult with his or her insurance representative to determine how best to estimate the replacement cost of the home. By insuring to 100 percent of that value, home owners will be sure of having enough money to build a new home of the same quality should disaster strike.

If a home isn't insured to full value, it should be insured for at least 80 percent of replacement value. Even at that figure, a family whose \$40,000 house is destroyed will have to pay \$8,000 of the replacement cost because it will collect no more than the face amount of the policy—\$32,000.

On a \$50,000 house insured to 80 percent of replacement value, the family will have to come up with \$10,000 in addition to the insurance settlement to build a new dwelling equal to the old.

Home owners who carefully

review their policies learn — if they do not already know — another important reason for insuring to 80 percent or more of replacement value. If a dwelling with that coverage is damaged, the insurance company will pay the full replacement cost of any partial loss without figuring in depreciation, as is usually the case in settling any insurance claim.

When coverage is less than 80 percent, insurers pay the larger of two amounts: either the replacement cost less depreciation, or a portion of the current replacement value, determined by the ratio of the insurance coverage to the 80 percent figure.

A second important consideration for home owners is the value of their personal property. The home owner's policy automatically covers personal property for an additional amount equal to 50 percent of the insurance for the dwelling, but its value today may be considerably more. The only sure way to tell is to make an inventory. The coverage can then be increased if necessary.

As a third step in securing adequate insurance, home owners are advised by the institute to have an appraisal made of silverware, antiques, works of art and other valuables. Usually this property also needs added coverage. The appraisal record should be kept in the safe deposit box, along with the inventory of personal possessions.

Finally, home owners should weigh carefully the possibility that they need more personal liability coverage. All home owners policies provide \$25,000 of this insurance, to protect them and their families to that amount if a suit or claim is filed by someone for injuries, or for damage to his property.

Jury awards for hundreds of thousands of dollars, a rarity 20 years ago, have become common. Additional liability coverage is relatively inexpensive. It costs \$3 to \$5 to increase \$25,000 coverage to \$50,000, \$6 to \$10 to increase it to \$100,000, \$10 to \$15 for \$200,000 and \$15 to \$20 for \$300,000.


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

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Know Your Schools

For the past 11 years, George Gallup has been taking a poll on the public's attitudes toward public schools.

While this poll is necessarily general and can't always be applied to specific local situations, I think it is interesting to briefly review the results of questions determining what people throughout our country think about their schools.

Since 1974 there has been a downward trend in public confidence in the public schools, but this year's drop was the slightest, and the Gallup Organization suggests that the downward trend "... may have come to an end."

As in the past, parents with children in school give the schools the highest rating as do those who have had recent contact with the schools. The lowest ratings for the public schools came from parochial school parents and those with no children in school.

According to the survey the public views discipline, use of drugs, lack of financial support and poor curriculum and standards as the top four problems in the schools. This year is the first time that "teacher's strikes" were identified as the "biggest problem" in public schools by a substantial number of people. The approval of state teacher examinations is a concern that also appears to be gaining momentum.

Respondents to the survey gave the schools a rating of A, B, C, D, F or "don't know, no answer." Those who rated the schools less than an A were asked what the schools would have to do to earn an A rating.

The following responses were given in rank order of importance: improve quality of teachers (23 percent); increase discipline (20 percent); increase or set higher standards (17 percent); give students more individual attention (16 percent); and place more emphasis on the basics (12 percent).

In response to a question about whether schools are better today than when they went to school, adults taking the survey were about evenly divided.

About 41 percent replied that schools are better while 42 percent said they are worse as opposed to the 1973 results, the last time most

Jeannette Mirsky in her book, **HOUSES OF GOD**, (New York, Viking Press, 1965), is concerned neither about religion as religion, nor architecture as architecture, but rather "about the various attitudes with which men have approached their gods and how such attitudes have shaped their places of worship."

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Eye Spending of \$21,000

The residents of Littlestone, Broadstone, Severn, Newcastle, Prestwick and the north side of Bournemouthe road only will meet Thursday, November 15, at the city council chambers at 7:30 p.m. for the purpose of deciding how to spend \$21,000.

In 1939 an association was formed for the purpose of enforcing the building codes and site plans for new construction. The group became known as the County Club Woods Progressive Home Owners Association, Inc.

The organization actively functioned for approximately 20 years, but then participation began to wane until the group became totally inactive in the early 1970.

Robert Hite of Broadstone road was the last elected

treasurer. He states that the general operating funds of the group have been accruing interest each year, so that presently the accumulated earnings exceed \$21,000.

Since the group has ceased to operate, Mr. Hite believes a meeting of all residents for the designated streets must be held in order to decide how to disburse the funds and subsequently to dissolve the organization.

City officials and other interested citizens have suggested the funds be used for tree plantings in the area, additional equipment for Ghesquiere Park or beautification of the adjacent commercial district long Mack avenue, noted James P. Brennan of the group.

Teachers Cite North Writers

Megan Maloney and Kenneth Deman of North High School have been cited for outstanding performance in writing. The National Council of Teachers of English, (NCTE), has named them winners of a 1979 Achievement Award in Writing.

The NCTE writing contest is held annually beginning in January.

More than 7,000 students were nominated last February by their English teachers for the NCTE Achievement in Writing. Each nominee submitted a sample of his or her best writing and an impromptu essay. These compositions were evaluated by state judging teams of both high school and college English teachers.

The approximately 850 finalists selected each year represent high schools in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and American schools abroad. The number of possible winners for each state

is keyed to state population. The council recommends the award finalists, now seniors, for college scholarships in 1979, should they need such assistance. Names of the students are sent to admissions officers and English department chairs at U.S. two- and four-year colleges and universities.

Boy Hurts Eye In Accident

After the cutting, Officer DaDeppo said the rod came free from the boy's eye, which was then bandaged. He was then taken to Saint John Hospital.

Award Challenge Grant to Music Hall

Detroit's Music Hall Center for the Performing Arts has earned the strongest vote of confidence the federal government can bestow for the National Endowment for the Arts has selected Music Hall as a Challenge Grant recipient.

Announcement of the Challenge Grant was made last week by Harwood Rydholm, Music Hall board chairman.

The \$75,000 award places Music Hall among only 120 arts organizations across the nation to receive 1980 Challenge Grants. Other well-known recipients for the coming year include the Wolf Trap Foundation, the American Shakespeare Festival and the Opera Company of Boston.

The Challenge Grant concept requires a private match of \$3 or more in new or increased contributions over a three-year period for each federal dollar awarded. This means Music Hall must increase its own fund-raising efforts by a total of \$225,000 over the next three years.

"Challenge Grant awards are considered as much an honor as a challenge to non-profit organizations such as the Music Hall," said Ruth E. Glancy, former Music Hall board chairman, speaking at a contributors' reception following the opening performance of Music Hall's 1979-80 season.

"Grants are only made to organizations which have demonstrated their artistic vitality, sound financial structure and community commitment."

Music Hall will use its award to assist in building a Cash Flow Fund to maintain

the smooth level of fiscal stability needed for efficient operation.

Livingston L. Biddle, Jr., chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts, explains that the long-range, boot-strap approach of the Challenge Grant has worked. It has created leverage and incentive for greater support from the private sector for the arts.

Since its inception, the

Challenge Grant Program has generated more than \$225 million in new money for its grantees.

Music Hall will now embark on its 1979-80 fund-raising campaign under the leadership of Mr. Rydholm. A campaign chairman for corporations will be announced within several weeks.

The total operating campaign goal is \$375,000.

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
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

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Survey Gives Self-Serve Nod

Motorists who pump their own gasoline maintain vehicles better than those who patronize full-serve stations, according to a recent Automobile Club of Michigan survey.

The survey at a Detroit-area service station found 87 percent of the full-serve and

72 percent of self-serve motorists with vehicle deficiencies. Auto Club's Emergency Road Service employees checked under the hoods of 113 full-serve and 124 self-serve motorists' cars and found 79 percent of all those vehicles with at least one deficiency on a 12-point checklist. Some of the deficiencies that turned up in the 237-vehicle survey showed the following:

- Thirty-four percent one quart low on oil.
• Thirty-six percent low on radiator coolant.
• Twenty-eight percent weak antifreeze.
• Twenty-seven percent low on windshield washer solvent.
• Twenty-two percent with corroded or damaged battery cables.

"One possible explanation for the results of this survey is that a person who pumps his own gas is more likely to perform maintenance checks," said Robert M. Smith, Auto Club emergency road service manager.

With four of every five vehicles failing to meet all of the Auto Club checklist items and the hardest driving months ahead, many Michigan motorists could experience car trouble this winter, Mr. Smith warned.

Smokers Can Harm Kids, Too

Lots of children are trying to persuade their parents to become nonsmokers, says the American Lung Association of Southeastern Michigan. This fall the Christmas Seal people also are making a special effort to urge parents to kick the cigaret habit.

What's alarming, says the association, is the increasing evidence that parents who smoke not only damage their own lungs but also impair those of their children. A study published this summer, based on research with hundreds of Boston families, concludes that parental smoking has an adverse effect in the lungs of children.

The adverse effect was independent of any direct use of cigarets by the children themselves. However, when children do smoke, the impairment in lung capacity worsens.

The researchers, affiliated with Harvard Medical School, put nose clips on the children—aged five to nine—and used an instrument called a spirometer to measure the volume of air the children could inhale and the rate at which they exhaled that air forcibly.

Decreases in these lung functions can indicate developing disease. Emphysema

patients, for example, have great difficulty expelling air from their lungs.

The researchers found a decline in lung function among youngsters who had smoking parents, compared with those whose parents were nonsmokers. Further, if both parents smoked, the lung function of these children was worse than if only one parent smoked.

They are continuing the study to find out long-term effects and if the children might be more vulnerable to respiratory illness.

Youths Hit Park Homes

Park police suspect that two juveniles may be responsible for knocking out gaslights in front of several Whittier and Westchester road homes sometime Sunday, November 4.

Chief Henry O. Coonce said the two 14-year-old youths, residents of The Park, have admitted to at least one of the incidents.

At least three homes reported broken gaslights early Sunday morning.

Police are questioning the youths about the other incidents.

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
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


