Seventy-eight teachers there have been on strike since October 22, keeping about 1700 child. about 1,700 children out of school. Early this week the Armada School Board voted to fire those teachers if they do not report to work by 12 noon Friday, November 30.

January 23 Date Okayed In Woods

Council to Consider Issuing Document after All Applicants Present Their Cases

Based upon voter approval of a Tuesday, November 6, referendary question governing the issuance of a tavern, (beer-wine), license, the Woods Council on Monday, November 19 unanimously scheduled a special meeting for Wednesday, January 23, at city hall, 20025 Mack avenue, at 7:30 p.m. to consider such issuance.

This question, approved by a 2,452 to 1,680 margin, was placed on the ballot after the successful initiatory petition drive of owners Charles
Moraco and Ronald Serba of
Le Cafe Francais, 20311
Mack avenue. They have stressed the need of being able to serve a glass of wine with their specially prepared French cuisine to avoid closing their establishment because their dinner business has diminished over many

months. With voter approval, the ordinance is amended, said City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, but it will be up to the council to decide if it will issue such a license. If the solons decline to do so, the authorization, however,

remains for a future time.





The building official also is called to issue a certificate to insure "that the proposed use is not in violation of or prohibited by the ordinance of the city." Such a certifi-cate applies only to businesses that involve the use of a structure or land.

The council, under the proposal, has the power to revoke the license for cause after a hearing before it. City Manager Andrew

Bremer advised council members to keep the portion concerning maximum businesses "in your files," saving. "there might come a time around such grants, while when you might need it."

But the council voted to table any action on the recommendation because of a lack of specifics on costs and specifications, while a hope for a joint meeting between both bodies was expressed in order to further explore this

question. The commission in August recommended that the question be put to the voters sans an advisory vote. But the council in September referred the matter back to the commission for proposed language and whether the city should consider going the revenue or general obligation

Commissioners felt that the actual question of construction of the pier-basin, including cost estimates and financing method, be presented to the voters at the earliest possible regularly scheduled election. However officials said it would be too late to have this matter on the Tuesday, November 6, ballot.

For the Commission's part it was against an advisory vote because an affirmative response would require a second vote and any delay could be costly.

In May, the commission, after studying a report from the city engineers and a cost estimate for a combined pierbasin, recommended to the council the construction of the pier-basin, 325' by 155'. with 38 boat slips at a cost of \$450,000.

Members also recommended that the council consider issuing general obligation bonds to meet the cost,

The commission had earlier compared the pier-basin with a \$275,000 estimate for a 350-foot long, 10-foot wide, pier with hand rails and wood deck

A majority of the commis sion felt it was best to go with the pier-basin because of the shortage and high cost of commercial wells in the area, plus the income which could be realized from rental.

Meanwhile, on the group's recommendation to increase the cost of downstream wells from \$220 to \$270 per season upstream wells from \$130 to \$165, the council decided to send the matter back to the commission.

Soot Captures Sunlight Power

Of all the ingenious new ways to generate energy, using soot to capture the power of sunlight is one of the most startling, says the American Lung Association of Southeastern Michigan in a news release.

Berkeley Laboratory, part of the University of California, developed a technique to use soot to attract enough heat from the sun to run large electric generators. The technique can result in solar heating that soars to emperatures and pressures corresponding to those in a jet engine.

Fine particles of carbon have black, nonreflective surfaces that absorb sunlight. The greater the surface area the more rapid the absorption rate. When suspended in air, the carbon particles are an ideal medium for heating sun-lit air.

In the laboratory, tiny specks of carbon, comparable to the finest soot, are pro-duced continuously from a carbon arc and then suspended in air passed through a solar focusing device.

The device uses mirrors to oncentrate and focus sunlight in a heating chamber where the carbon specks are suspended. The sunlight repidly heats the particles to a temperature at which they vaporize and transfer their heat to the air around

According to the researchers, a solar plant using carbon-particle heating would consume only 30 pounds of carbon an hour to power a generator producing enough electricity for a community of 10,000 people.

Applicants must be high school graduates, have no criminal convictions, a good driving record and be in a good physical condition as determined by the city phy-

Officials will give preference to applicants with experience in state licensed emergency ambulance service or its equivalent.

On the 19th, the council, after over 10 months of study on alternatives to take regarding the city's emergency ambulance service, decided to go the EMS division route. The city's current extension regarding state-mandated requirements expires this December 31.

As part of the motion authorizing the new division, a special meeting is scheduled to be called to discuss interim financing and to consider the possibility of charging residents and non-residents for the service, along with other potential revenue sources.

On the latter, contractural fees with other cities and transportation fees with other hospitals also are possibilities.

At the same time, the council stipulated that the program be continued for a one and a half-year trial period.

The city is operating its service under a provisional license from the state until the end of December. It cannot be renewed unless the city can provide a licensed EMT in the patient compartment whenever a patient is transported.

In relation to this, an opinion from Attorney General Frank Kelley surprised officials last week, with Director Dankel noting it mandates the presence of an EMT plus an attendant in the patient compartment so instead of two people, including the

driver, there would be three In any case, if such is the case, he indicated the five man EMT concept would

The possibility of an additional six-month extension from requirements, explored last week by officials, is now apparently a dead issue, according to the director, who noted the Southeastern Michigan Council on Emergency Medical Services indicated it would not support such an extension.
