Cottage Officials Battle Bed Cutting Plan

(Continued from Page 1) steps toward voicing their objections to CHPC's plan.

Mr. Wilgarde hopes that some will attend the public hearing CHPC will hold on the bed reduction plan Thursday, December 13, in the Book Building, downtown. That hearing will come before the CHPC's full board.

Actually, two hearings will be held that day, the first from 9 to 11 a.m., and the second from 5 to 7 p.m.

Other steps recommended by Mr. Wilgarde include signing a petition, available in the administration offices and the emergency room desk, and writing letters to local and state legislators.

Following approval of the plan by the full CHPC this month, (with possible modifications), it moves on to the Statewide Health Coordinating Council, which will in turn approve or modify it to be sent to the Michigan Department of Public Health, (MDHP).

MDHP not only has the ultimate power of revoking a hospital's license should it not comply with bed cut orders, it also can refuse to approve certificates of need for any capital expenditure over \$150,000.

Hospitals will be allowed a five-year period in which to comply. Under the plan, that period will be used to make attempts at consolidation with other facilities.

GPW Offers Support At meetings on Monday, December 3, two city councils considered resolutions in support of the hospital, and in opposition to bed reduction there.

The Woods Council, by a unanimous vote, approved the resolution, with Councilman Robert Novitke noting, "All of us in the Grosse Pointe area have a primary concern in maintaining Cottage Hospital."

But the Farms Council decided to take no action on the matter. Councilman Lloyd Semple pointed out it would be years before anything happens under the CHPC plan, and that it is bound to be fought over in court besides.

Councilman Jack Cudlip was concerned over what might become of the building if anything "drastic" were to happen to the hospital.

While the intent of the CHPC plan is to make those hospitals scoring lowest by the criteria go out of business or merge with other facilities, Cottage claims the criteria used did not accurately reflect either the cost or the quality of health care at the hospital.

Only Unit In fact, Cottage claims it has one of the lowest per day costs of area hospitals, attributing that fact to the lack of expensive specialized medical equipment there.

Other CHPC criteria designed to measure utilization of facilities also were objected to. Although Cottage generally scored low in this area, it claims to have had a 103 percent occupancy rate during the first 10 months of 1979.

And, while its 36-bed psychiatric unit is not rated by the CHPC plan, Cottage's literature states that facility would be "jeopardized" without the medical and surgical beds that "support ancillary and plant services." The psychiatric unit is the only one on the east side of the metropolitan area.

Unlike regular hospital beds, which are regulated by the MDHP, the psychiatric units is licensed by the Department of Mental Health. CHPC's role is limited to advising the MDHP.

Another service at Cottage unique to the east side is the provision of post partum sterilization on request, the literature said.

Others Fare Better Hospital Public Relations Director Madge Lawson said the literature is being sent to "everyone associated with the hospital," which includes staff, donors and auxiliaries, as well as councilmen of the Pointes and other area suburbs and Detroit, plus churches and schools.

The two other area hospitals, Saint John and Bon Secours, fared much better under the bed reduction plan. Saint John, a 573-bed facility, in fact scored the highest of any hospital in southeast Michigan, and no beds were recommended cut there.

Bon Secours would be asked to cut 21 beds from its 320 licensed bed capacity.

Gabby's Closes Doors

(Continued from Page 1) Catlin said he presumed it would be dispersed of by the sale of the business to a prospective purchaser, but this has to be approved by the LCC with the council offering no objection. However, the final decision rests with the LCC.

Another possibility, Mr. Catlin said, is in lieu of a prospective purchaser, the document could be put in escrow by the trustee until the business becomes operational.

With the loss of Gabby's, there was talk that The Woods lost its second highest taxpayer. However, City Comptroller-Assessor Frederick G. Hornfisher said Gabby's wasn't the second highest but fell "near the bottom of the top 10." Gabby's paid \$19,700 in a recent one-year tax, he pointed out.

The news of the bankruptcy petition startled many, with Mr. Bardy's son, Jim, saying, "It came as a shock to me. I knew there were some problems. We're all sorry about it."

One employee said she knew something was "going on" as "certain things seemed out of character," e.g., the bartender staying later than usual, the drinks not being up to snuff, and that supplies were dwindling.

"Didn't Do It" She also pointed out that the employees were all irritated at not being notified of the news, while expressing some concern over not getting all her pay.

Another employee stated she received a letter from the firm representing Mr. Bardy indicating that the corporation went bankrupt, not him personally. She said the document also assured that employees would be paid and she noted she got paid only 26 percent of \$1, adding that, while she was out \$132.30, others were out over \$300.

The doors were locked Sunday night and nobody was told, she said, while adding that it was a "terrible thing" to happen before Christmas as many were depending on their salaries.

Meanwhile, Richard Stevens of Sweeney's Flowers, 19271 Mack, Mr. Bardy's immediate neighbor, said, "I was totally shocked at the closing. It's like a death in the family. They're there and then not there."

In saying Mr. Bardy was very nice to him, Mr. Stevens stated apparently the overhead of running the business was too much and that he couldn't draw the people. "There was a lot of emphasis put upon the liquor license but it didn't do it for him," he said.

"I still find it hard to believe, Mr. Bardy lived in the place," he added.

Reopened in May After conducting a successful initiatory petition drive to get the liquor license question on the ballot, citizens voted favorably by a 3,037 to 1,830 margin on the question in last August's primary.

The council in October voted 4-3 not to issue the license but in early November voted 4-3 to schedule another hearing on the question. In late November, it then cited Gabby's as the most preferred occupant via a 6-1 vote.

With that, the restaurant closed for renovation this January 8 and reopened in mid-May.

After the council cited Gabby's, Mr. Bardy said, "I'll really enjoy Christmas this year. After all, I got my present early."

But this year won't be the same.

Slate Hearing On Simon Barn

After several months of court proceedings, The City was told last week it must repeat a hearing on condemnation of the Simon family garage at 17266 Mack avenue.

The hearing has been scheduled at a special council meeting Monday, December 10, at 7:30 p.m.

After repeated complaints from neighbors, the City Council in July moved to condemn the former barn, now used as a garage. The owner, Mrs. Mitchell Simon, took the matter to Wayne County Circuit Court and received a temporary restraining order to stop demolition.

Since July, the case has been transferred to three different circuit court judges. Finally, Judge Michael Stacey Wednesday, November 28, that The City Council must re-hear and record the condemnation proceedings.

The Simon family has requested they be allowed to renovate the garage rather than tear it down. They said the loss of the garage will bring economic hardship to their family real estate business which uses the garage for storage.

The council condemned the garage on the basis of a building report that listed 11 code violations. It called the structure "dangerous" and a "public nuisance."

Neighbors have complained for years about the garage and say it is rat infested.

SH Survey Goes National, Some Don't Like Results

National attention has been given to the spending habits of teenagers in Grosse Pointe due to a story released recently by the Associated Press. The story includes the results of a poll taken at South High School which indicated that the average student spends nearly \$5,000 a year.

The poll, taken by an advanced journalism class at South, was intended solely to be printed in the "Tower," the school newspaper, and the "Pointer." There, however, it was spotted by a "Detroit Free Press" editor, and Polk Laffoon, a "Free Press" writer, was assigned to write a follow-up story, which appeared on Friday, November 16, in the "Free Press."

This, in turn, was rewritten by AP writers and sent out on the wire to newspapers nationwide.

Robert Button, journalism teacher at South, received clippings of the story and letters commenting upon it from as far away as Los Angeles and San Diego, as well as Chicago, Boston and North Carolina.

The information on this far-reaching story was in the form of a poll conducted by four of Mr. Button's students: Lorri White, Lora Kasunic, Marianne Schultz and Lara Measelle.

These students surveyed 200 students, 50 from each of the four grades at South. The forms were delivered to classes which would have mostly one grade in them and represent a cross section of students in that grade. For example, 50 were given to Civics Classes, a course taken by freshmen.

When the forms were collected, the various categories, among them the amount spent per month on clothes, food, alcohol and drugs, were totaled and divided by the number of students who completed the survey.

Mr. Button said, "I haven't heard many complaints about most of the individual categories, just the final figure. But since the final figure is just the total of the sections,

they can't complain about the total if they agree with the individual sections."

He added that some students have said they think the totals for alcohol and drugs seem too high. A large number of South students did complain. Geta Lindvold said, "I'd like to know where they got their information. There is no way I spend \$5,000 a year."

About this common complaint, Mr. Button states, "What they don't take into consideration is the money received from parents on demand. They feel that just because they don't have \$5,000 there is no way they can spend that much."

Kasunic, who worked on the original story, doesn't believe the poll is entirely accurate. "A lot of them, (those polled), especially freshmen and sophomores, probably exaggerated the amount spent on pot and alcohol to be cool, or with absurd numbers just to screw up the results."

Perhaps the biggest complaint about the poll is the media emphasis on the consumption of alcohol and pot. The stories by AP, which appeared in the papers nationwide, were uniform in content.

Tim Keelan, a senior at South, said, "That story makes us out to be alcoholic drug addicts."

Two former South students wrote to Mr. Button, ridiculing the figures stated in the article. They wrote that if South students were to spend as much on cigarettes and pot as the article says, each student would smoke two full packs a day followed by a number of marijuana cigarettes.

Whether the information is true or not, Grosse Pointe has received national publicity for something which may be argued to be detrimental to the image of Grosse Pointe teenagers.

Thieves Hit Gas Station

A total of around \$695 was taken from the Mack Lawthorne Arco Service Station, 20805 Mack avenue, early Thursday evening, November 29, by three men who escaped in a car through the alley to Anita and from there unknown, reported Woods police.

After the car pulled in next to the gas pumps, one man went to the office with several \$20 bills in his hand, wanting change for one of them. An employe went to the cash register to make change and looked to discover the man holding a small revolver.

The suspect said, "Fine, I'll take the rest of the 20s," including the one he gave the employe, and went to the car, occupied by two other men, when they left the scene.

Police said the gunman was described as black, between 20 and 25 years of age, around 6' tall and about 225 pounds. He had a full black beard and a mustache, and his hair was worn in a short afro style. He wore a brown and white fur waist jacket, a light blue dress shirt with thin white stripes and light blue pants.

The men in the car also were black, with the driver being described as clean shaven and wearing a brown hat and white shirt.

Police said the car was described as black with a white vinyl top, possibly a 1978 or 1979 Cougar.

(Continued from Page 1) or for any other consideration, including the sale of food, mixers, ice or other fluids used with alcoholic drinks or the storage of alcoholic liquors.

A warrant request was temporarily suspended on Monday, December 3, by the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office, said Lt. Patterson, with a meeting between restaurant owners Edward Zambieri and his son, Edward Jr., their attorney and departmental officers scheduled for next week with prosecutor's office representatives. The law stipulates that any individual who shall do any act for which a license is required without first obtaining such a license could receive a maximum of one year in prison or a fine of not more than \$1,000 or both, in the court's discretion on a felony charge.

In his report, Det. Charles Hamel said prior to the incident on the 29th, it was brought to the department's attention that the restaurant was allegedly permitting the consumption of alcoholic beverages without a license.

Police said the owners were warned of such a practice, with indications being given that if such a practice was transpiring, it would be stopped.

Then on the 29th, Det. Hamel and a city employee visited the restaurant, bringing with them the previously marked bottle of wine. After being seated, he presented the bottle to a waitress and requested that it be chilled. A short time later, it was brought back with a cork screw and placed on the table.

The detective noted she also said the wine would have to be put in coffee cups because they weren't supposed to allow the consumption of wine on the premises.

Det. Hamel then poured the wine into the coffee cups, with some being consumed, and the signal was given at which time Lt. Patterson and Det. Thomas Podszwik entered and confiscated the

bottle, sample wine for analysis and the cups. Police said at the time Det. Hamel and the city employee entered, two other customers were inside and two others entered afterward.

Both Feel Badly
 Saying both he and his father felt badly over the incident, Edward Jr. stated such a practice was discouraged in the past.

Feeling he was a "victim of circumstances," he stressed that his restaurant needs a tavern license, (permitting the serving of beer and wine only), to operate. "We need to be able to serve a glass of wine. We're not asking for anything more."

When asked what effect the incident might have on his bid for a tavern license at the Woods Council's January 23 hearing regarding the possible issuance of such a document, he said, "I don't know that."

But Edward Jr. again emphasized the restaurant will definitely close its doors on Monday, December 31. "It's impossible to operate like this. It's humiliating," he added.

In March, a similar investigation occurred at Le Cafe Francais, 20311 Mack avenue, climaxing when an auxiliary officer and city employee were planted with a marked bottle of wine. An ensuing effort to obtain a warrant for allegedly violating the section of the Liquor Control Act and Rules was denied by the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office.

A meeting between the owners, their attorney, departmental officers and prosecutor's office representatives was held at that time with the owners, through their counsel, agreeing they would not allow the serving of wine in their business.

Public Safety Director John Dankel said a further check at Le Cafe indicated that the practice has, in fact, been stopped.

overwhelming vote with saving Armada teachers' jobs. "Without Local I and the unity that teachers showed, the Armada teachers would have been fired," Mr. Laughlin said. "Paid Our Price" The confrontation demonstrated that current bargaining laws are "woefully inadequate," he added, along with a warning. "Unless some form of impasse resolution is provided for teachers, we'll have more Armadas and a multi-district strike is inevitable." And that is just what has angered local school officials. The entire incident "detracts from the integrity of the collective bargaining process," said Dr. Coats. "We paid our price and even went to the brink of a strike to negotiate a contract with our teachers with a no-strike clause," Dr. Coats said. "We are disappointed with what appeared to be the intent to violate that contract because of a situation in another community over which we have no control." Local I would not release details of the Armada settlement until after a ratification vote on Wednesday, December 5. Mr. Laughlin said only that it is a two-year agreement that involved "considerable compromise" on the parts of both parties.

"Parcourse acts as a 'coach' for people who are inexperienced in pacing themselves in an exercise regimen." The Planning Commission recently delayed the equipment, but the council's initial concern was that the parcourse would be a free advertisement for Perrier. The council later agreed, however, that the Perrier name would be "acceptable" on the signs. The city manager recently visited a parcourse program, in Sterling Heights (not through Parcourse, Ltd.), and told the council that the course is well used with little or no problems. "The maintenance appears to be very minimal," he said. Residents can expect to use the parcourse at Three Mile sometime next spring.

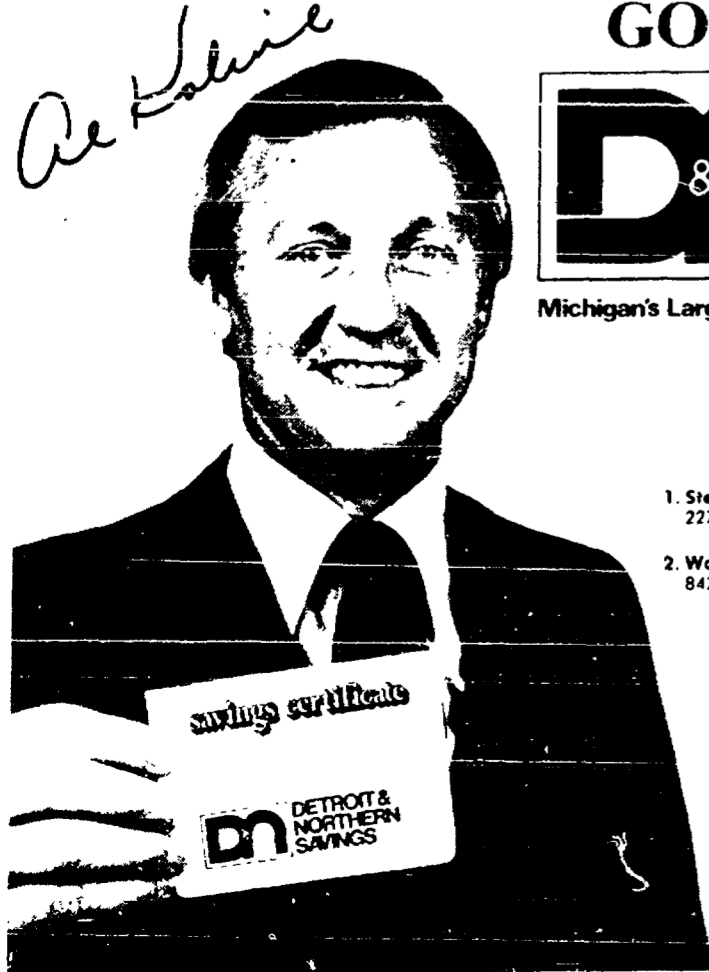

Park Citizens Win Battle To Close Up Nuisance Alley

The old saying, "You can't beat city hall," is not particularly true in the case of some Wayburn and Maryland residents, who have won a two-year battle to close up a 10-foot wide alley behind their homes that is littered and rat-infested.

Tired of watching the rats feeding off the litter in the alley, Mary Wehrwein of Wayburn recently complained to the Park Council that the city should at least pave the alley.

The council agreed with her at its Monday, November 26, meeting, but instead decided to fence off one end of the alley and to pour salt or some other "acceptable substance" over the weeds next spring.

City Manager John R. Crawford said it would have cost about \$3,600 to pave the alley.

Responses to letters sent to the 12 residents by the city indicated that 50 percent were in favor of vacating the alley, while 50 percent were opposed to the idea.

The alley, located between Wayburn and Maryland and Goethe and Charlevoix, can no longer accommodate city garbage trucks.

Officials placed the cost of the program at between \$55,000 to \$60,000 for a six-month period and between \$110,000 and \$120,000 for a year.

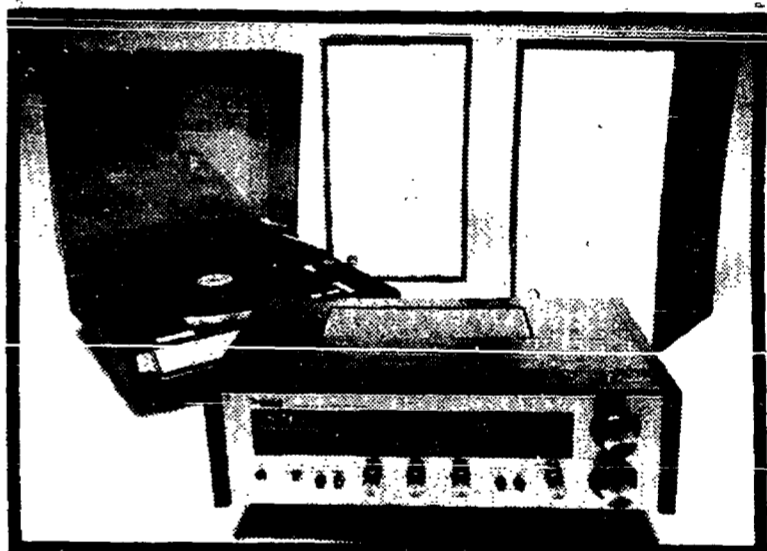

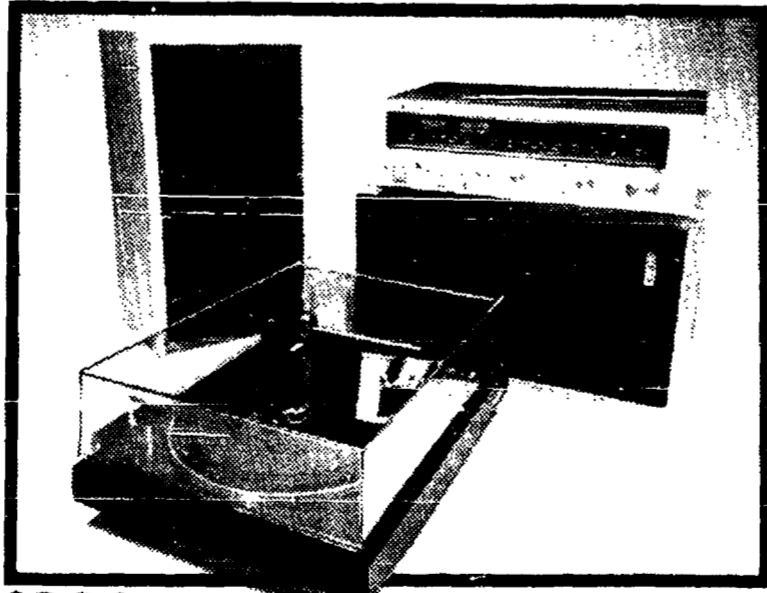

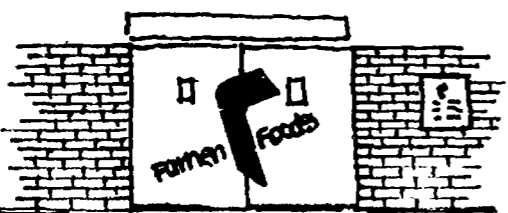

Expert Explains Ways to Be Assertive Consumer

What do you do when you discover that you've purchased defective merchandise? Return it, chalk it up to experience and never frequent the store again, or avoid buying that particular brand?

"Every time a consumer turns his or her back on the problem of defective merchandise or inadequate service, the probability increases that the problems will continue to occur," said Lou Thayer, a professor in the Department of Guidance and Counseling at Eastern Michigan University.

Mr. Thayer is the author of a booklet entitled "Consumer Behavior: Developing Skills for Assertiveness," which is available from The Michigan Consumer Education Center on the EMU campus.

Mr. Thayer believes there are many consumers who do not stand up for themselves in the marketplace. There are many possible reasons including a fear of being perceived as unfriendly or troublesome; a fear of confronting store owners, managers, or professionals; insecurity about handling consumer information appropriately; a fear of expressing feelings; and inability to say "no" without feeling guilty.

or a fear of embarrassing situations. "The assertive consumer places trust in his or her own ability to deal honestly and directly with sellers. Violating the basic rights of sellers, making hostile and negative remarks, and being inconsiderate of the sellers' feelings are examples of aggressive behavior. Failing to stand up for oneself, giving up the power to effect change, and not acting to protect one's own interests are examples of nonassertiveness," Mr. Thayer said.

"The assertive consumer is more self-directing, expresses feelings and opinions adequately, believes in himself or herself, seeks to continue growing as a person and is persistent when necessary."

Mr. Thayer believes that assertive consumer behavior can help buyers avoid problems. "The consumer needs to be aware of information on goods and services that are prepared for consumers. Some special groups serve as consumer advocates by preparing informative materials and by intervening in difficult situations on the behalf of consumers. Being informed and avoiding a problem is better than trying to solve a problem later," Mr. Thayer said.

Consumers who are contracting for services should be informed about the seller and have the type of work that is to be done well defined in advance. "It's a good idea to talk with the person or company

representative and prepare a written agreement for services. The written agreement will help define what is expected from the seller. Written agreements help to avoid future difficulties with services," he said.

"Work should be checked thoroughly before a bill for service is paid. If the consumer realizes that something is wrong, the problem should be corrected right at the time, Mr. Thayer said. "If the consumer recognizes a problem after the bill has been paid, the problem can still be solved. Be assertive!"

Besides researching general quality when buying goods, the consumer at the time of purchase should be careful of the item being bought. If the consumer discovers that the merchandise is defective he or she should act quickly. "Go to the business with a positive attitude. Don't assume that the store won't help. If a product is defective, the sellers will, more often than not, help," Mr. Thayer said.

It's also important to be able to describe precisely what is wrong with the product and how the problem should be resolved. "The consumer should be aware of alternative solutions that

would be acceptable. And the consumer should find out who exactly can handle the problem," Mr. Thayer said. "One of the most irritating parts of returning items is being passed from person to person."

It's important to be able to deal constructively with a situation. "The consumer needs to be able to express his or her feelings and thoughts as well as listen to the other person. Listening is a very important part of assertive behavior. Then, the consumer needs to state clearly and precisely what he or she wants," Mr. Thayer said.

"Often it's important to respond to the feelings of the salesperson. The consumer can show an understanding of the inconvenience while still expecting the problem to be solved. The consumer should try to talk to the salesperson on a more personal level," Mr. Thayer said.

"There's always a profit motive, but many businesses are training salespeople in human relations skills to provide better services for consumers," he added.

"Consumers should be willing to share both negative and positive feelings."

System Cuts SH Skipping

Since South adopted its new attendance policy this year, absenteeism has decreased slightly and controversy has risen over the computer handled system.

The average percentage of students absent so far this year is about 6.7 percent, which is about 1 percent lower than last year's average. Donald Messing, assistant principal, warned, "These readings may be misleading, since they are recorded at an earlier hour than last year's."

The new system differs from the old mainly in the area of reporting. A mandatory note is sent to Mr. Messing, the student's counselor, and the student's family as soon as five absences are accumulated. Also, school related absences are not recorded on the report card.

Curt Lange, president of the Grosse Pointe Education Association, like many of South's teachers is not satisfied with some aspects of the new system. A major point Mr. Lange made was, "School related activities require that a student miss classes, but the report card will not show this to the parents."

Charles Bishop, a chemistry teacher, expressed his dissatisfaction with the system in a more general way. "I feel if a student doesn't want to come to school, there definitely is a problem. All this paperwork just to report absence is a waste."

The paperwork Mr. Bishop mentions is much greater this year as a result of the new system, since attendance records are now kept for each individual class, rather than the one recording needed for last year's system.

Kids Get Close Look at Leaders

Many high school students in the metro Detroit area will have an opportunity to get on the inside of the U.S. government and meet the people who make it work through program Close Up.

Close Up, which provides "a forum for the involvement of youth in government," is sponsoring a trip to Washington, D.C. The South High School coordinator is Burl VonAllmen, a social studies teacher who took the trip last year. He recommends the trip highly to all tenth, eleventh and twelfth grade students who are interested in familiarizing themselves with Washington, the Pentagon, the White House, the Senate, the House of Representatives and the people who run them.

The trip starts April 27, when the students fly to Washington and begin their touring. It ends May 3 with a pizza party-dance. In between, the students can sit in on Supreme Court hearings and watch Congress work. The students tour practically non-stop and up to 17 hours a day. But in the end it's worth it.

Mr. VonAllmen said that last year every one felt the trip was worthwhile and everyone enjoyed themselves. Mr. VonAllmen also said, "The group has high contacts that nobody else could have. It, (the program), is very well constructed and well run. And everybody really felt they got their money's worth."

The students will visit Georgetown and Howard Universities, where they will be able to meet with law professors and will have the chance to sit in on classes and take part in the discussion of major issues.

The cost is \$485 total and a \$50 deposit is due by January 16. There is no limit to the number of people on the trip, and the knowledge the student gains outweighs the price of the trip.

As Mr. VonAllmen said, "It's very stimulating to meet people involved in government and to hear their opinion." Anyone wishing to sign up or wanting more information should contact Mr. VonAllmen at South High.

Edison Campaign Helps Customers Avoid Cut Offs

Detroit Edison will employ a variety of unusual communications techniques, including sign language for the hearing impaired in its television commercials, in an effort to inform its customers of the many channels available to them to avoid service shut-offs for non-payment of electric bills.

In addition to sign language, the company is planning to include in its 1979 "Help Us Help You" campaign a special booklet printed in Braille, for the blind, and will have additional information assistance for non-English speaking customers.

The utility also will have available personnel trained to discuss bill payment problems with customers in 11 foreign languages.

"Help Us Help You" is designed to encourage Edison customers to take advantage of the many long-established avenues open to them to avoid service shut-offs, according to Frances S. Procopio, the utility's manager of Customer Relations.

"The key to the program," she said, "is having our customer contact us early — before a bill becomes overdue or a shut-off notice is issued — so that we can help them by arranging special payment plans, by counseling them and directing them to agencies where energy assistance is available, and by providing them with information on using their electricity wisely."

Special communications techniques aimed at reaching the hearing impaired, the blind and foreign language speaking customers will be used by Edison in conjunction with daily and weekly newspapers, radio and television, according to Saul J. Waldman, the company's manager of Public Affairs.

The program also will include distribution of posters throughout Edison's service area.

"As far as we know," Mr. Waldman said, "no utility has ever done a television commercial with sign language. However, this message — informing people of ways to avoid service shut-offs — is so important that we don't want to risk missing anyone who might benefit from it."

In the television commercial, Mr. Waldman said, the message about special programs available to assist Edison customers is delivered simultaneously in sign language by Gloria Hynes, WDIV-TV Detroit sign language newscaster, appearing in an inset in the upper left portion of the TV screen.

The booklet in Braille will be available to agencies providing assistance to the blind and the foreign language information assistance will be available at Edison customer offices. Mr. Waldman added.

Edison's "Help Us Help You" campaign again will feature information about the company's Senior Citizen Rate and Double Notice Protection Plan — both initiated by the utility in 1978.

The Senior Citizen Rate, for customers who are at least 65 years of age and who are heads of their households, provides savings on electric bills ranging from \$4.50 a month for customers using 300 kilowatt-hours a month, to \$1.50 a month for the average customer using 500 kilowatt-hours per month.

About 100,000 are already on the special rate, according to Ms. Procopio, who encourages other customers, as they reach age 65, to stop in at any Edison customer office to apply for it.

The Double Notice Protection Plan makes it possible for the company's residential customers to have a duplicate collection shut-off notice sent to a designated third party, a system that provides backup to protect people who might possibly be injured or inconvenienced from disconnection of electric service as a result of oversight or unintentional neglect of a shut-off notice.

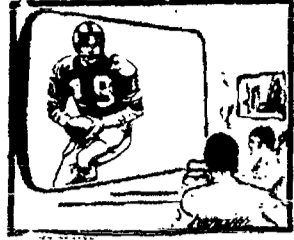
Detroit Edison serves about 1.6 million customers in Southeast Michigan.

In commenting on "Help Us Help You," Ms. Procopio emphasized Detroit Edison's awareness of its responsibility to protect the health and welfare of its residential customers, "people we care about," she said, noting that last year's campaign encouraged many customers to contact the company concerning bill payment problems, which helped to avert many electric service shut-offs.

"With the additional special communications being employed this year to reach the hearing impaired, the blind, and foreign language speaking customers," she said, "we hope to help even more customers and their families."

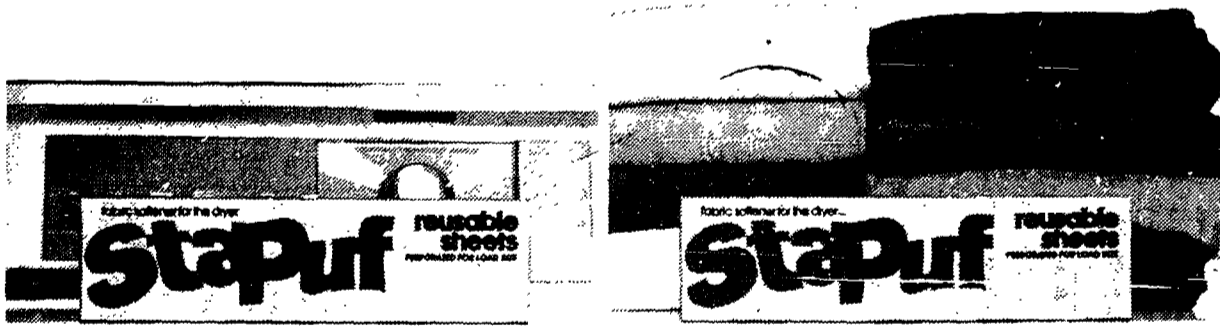

Lawyers Issue Peoples' Report

More than 80 percent of Michigan's 18,282 practicing lawyers attended legal education courses sponsored by the Institute of Continuing Legal Education, state law schools and state and local bar associations.

So says the past president of the State Bar of Michigan, Lansing attorney Leo A. Varhat, in the Bar's 1979 "Report to The People."

Mr. Varhat said in a news release registrations for specialized legal education during 1978-79 totaled more than 25,000 participants, including attorneys attending more than one specialized course.

He states the people of Michigan are represented by lawyers with a "very high" level of competency.

Among other details cited in the State Bar's annual report was the following:

- Sixty-six legal aid and defender offices and 11 referral agencies, all of which charge either token fees or no fees at all, handled more than 70,000 court cases for people otherwise unable to afford an attorney.
- More than 1,000 lawyers volunteered their time during the year to review several thousand bills or prospective law changes introduced in the state legislature.
- Eighty-three committees and sections of the State Bar participated in the analysis of legislation.
- Legal service plans provided by trade unions with assistance from the State Bar's Committee for the Delivery of Legal Services, reached approximately 4,500 people in the state. A unique feature of the Michigan legal plans is that members have the freedom to choose their own lawyer.
- Information programs provided to the public included the eighth year of the popular TV series "Ask the Lawyers," utilizing 135 lawyers and over 150 members of the Michigan Legal Secretaries Association.
- After two and a half years of study, a special State Bar Committee completed a proposed revision of the state's criminal code—the first revision in 122 years if adopted.
- The state's Attorney Discipline Board disciplined 41 lawyers, suspended 19, reprimanded 16 and disbarred six from legal practice in the past year.
- The report, (available to the public), also details the public service activities of Michigan lawyers and provides information about legal services available to the public either free or at minimal costs.
- It contains a list of lawyer referral agencies and free legal aid services available around the state. A free copy may be obtained by writing Philip O. Spelman, director of communications, 306 Townsend, Lansing, Mich. 48933.

Know Your Schools
By Dr. William Coats, Superintendent of Schools

In the previous two columns I have commented on components for good schools as developed by the Education Commission of the States, (ECS).

Last week's column summarized the component stating that schools must place a high value on the uniqueness of the individual and I reviewed programs and instructional techniques which address that component in our schools. In this week's column, I wish to comment on another ECS component—ACHIEVEMENT IS THE SCHOOL'S FOCUS.

Grosse Pointe youngsters have long been recognized as among the highest achieving in the state and country.

As examples, last year our fourth and seventh graders recorded the highest composite score in reading and mathematics tests conducted by the Michigan Department of Education and the current level of achievement in the basic skills for grades one to eight is equal to that reached by only the top one percent of public and private school systems in the nation.

Furthermore, our high school students continue to win state and national competitions in numerous areas.

While we are very proud of those accomplishments, we still have as one of our system-wide goals for the year the improvement of student learning. That goal is consistent with our philosophy of being dedicated to the importance of academic excellence and is established in the belief that we can't be satisfied with the status quo, but must always strive to improve.

Among this year's plan to help students achieve at even higher levels are the implementation of the newly adopted elementary science program, the kindergarten through 12th grade library skills program and the approved recommendations of the Music Program Study Committee.

In addition, several new and continuing curriculum studies have been planned and performance objectives for special education students are being developed.

Regardless of what improvements are made in the curriculum, if achievement levels are to remain high and continue to improve, instruction must be monitored and evaluated for quality.

Once again system-wide goals reflect this concern in that two of our goals are to improve evaluation systems and to improve the quality of supervision. By determining the effectiveness of various school programs and procedures, administrators and teachers can improve the quality of teaching and subsequently improve student achievement.

Another consideration in promoting achievement is the amount of instructional time available for students. In this year's negotiations with teachers, the Board obtained an additional instructional day. The high school final examination schedules also have been revised so that secondary students have one more day of instruction than the total of two years ago.

While this additional time may not have a great deal of impact on achievement levels, it is but one more example of our commitment to provide increased educational opportunities for our students and to help them achieve at the highest level possible.

SEMTA Gears for Winter

The Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority, (SEMTA), hopes to make heavy snowfalls less of a problem this winter for Detroit area commuters with a new Snow Emergency Plan.

A brochure illustrating details of the plan and snow emergency bus routes can be obtained by calling SEMTA schedule information at 962-5515 or, (toll-free), 1-800-462-5161.

Should it be necessary to put the plan into effect, commuters will be kept informed through service announcements on major radio and television stations and up to the minute information will be available from SEMTA's schedule information center.

The plan allows for a concentration of bus service along major routes in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties. Since the plan is organized according to county, it can be effected on a county-by-county basis.

In the event of a daytime snowfall which would affect the afternoon rush hour, passengers will be directed to specific pick-up points in the downtown area.

These pick-up points are keyed to the counties in which the outbound buses would be running. Each pick-up point will be manned by a SEMTA person with a loudspeaker for directing waiting passengers and radio access to SEMTA offices for minute-by-minute coordination of services.

Riders waiting for out-bound buses will be allowed to wait inside standing buses which will be used as temporary shelters. In this afternoon rush-hour situation, SEMTA will make every attempt to maintain regular out-bound routes.

In the event of an overnight snowfall which would affect the morning rush hour, commuters can learn via the media or through SEMTA information operators which major routes in a particular county are in service.

"We could handle a blizzard right now," said Bob Osborne, SEMTA's manager of operations administration, Mr. Osborne and Rachel

Buying by Mail Tips Offered

While holiday preparations are usually typified by frantic shoppers and crowded shops and malls, the Better Business Bureau of Metropolitan Detroit reminds area residents that thousands of purchases also are made by mail.

The great majority of mail order companies are legitimate and honest, although some are not. Surprisingly, many problems that do arise are a result of people forgetting to include their names and addresses on their orders. And some complain too soon. Generally, one should allow four to six weeks for delivery before making a complaint.

When you receive merchandise in the mail that you have not ordered, you may consider it as a gift. Nothing can be mailed to you without your consent unless clearly marked as merchandise from charitable organizations asking for a donation. Either way, the merchandise is a gift. You are not obligated to return or pay for the merchandise.

To assist prospective mail order shoppers the Better Business Bureau offers a tip sheet entitled "Buying by Mail." Some of the points mentioned are:

- Carefully read catalogues and always keep a copy of the ad or brochure.
- Pay by check or money order, never in cash, and include any shipping or handling charges.
- Keep a record of your order—the date, name and address of the company, cancelled check, number of money order or bank check.
- Finally, check your order promptly upon receipt to insure that it is the item you ordered and that it is intact and satisfactory. Notify the company at once if it is not.

Immanuel to Welcome Its Lucia

All are welcome at Immanuel to enjoy a tradition observed in homes throughout Sweden early on the morning of December 13. The eldest daughter wakes her parents and offers them coffee and the fancy currant buns known as Lussekatter. The daughter is robed in white. On her head is a

crown of seven lighted candles set in lingonberry leaves. It is Lucia Day, and on this day, in Sweden, the Christmas season has begun. Why December 13? And why Lucia? The tradition is centuries-old, dating back to a time when the Julian Calendar was in use and the 13th of December was the

day after the longest night of the year in Sweden. The return of light was cause for rejoicing among the Northmen, so they celebrated a Feast of Lights.

Lucia came to them from the south. She lived in sunny Sicily in the third century A.D., and there she would go, with her mother, to bring food and clothing to the poor. Lucia and her mother were Christians, and subject to persecution, so their visits were made at dark, in great secrecy.

To free her hands to carry gifts, Lucia wore a candle on her head to light her way. Eventually she was discovered, denounced as a Christian and sentenced to be burned. Legend has it that the wood surrounding her would not catch fire so she was killed by a sword thrust, on December 13, the very day the Northmen celebrated the return of light to their land.

The legend of the lovely Christian, Santa Lucia, was brought north by many travelers. Her moral integrity aroused the nobility of the Swedish people. Her tragedy captured their hearts.

Soon she belonged to them, and with Santa Lucia the Feast of Lights took on a new and deeper meaning. In the blending of the two traditions, Lucia now appears as Queen of Light throughout Sweden on December 13.

During Immanuel's pageant, the church's Lucia, (whose identity is not revealed until the time of the pageant), processes down the aisle, dressed in the traditional white robe, red-sashed, lighted crown upon her head. She carries a tray of coffee and rolls.

She is preceded by two Star Boys and her court of attendants, also dressed in white. "Santa Lucia" is sung as Lucia enters the room, and there will be other musical numbers, including old Swedish and favorite Christmas songs, sung by the guests and by the Scandia Women's Chorus.

After the program Lucia will serve coffee in Immanuel's Fellowship Hall, where delicious Christmas cookies and coffeebread will complete the refreshment table and there will be demonstra-

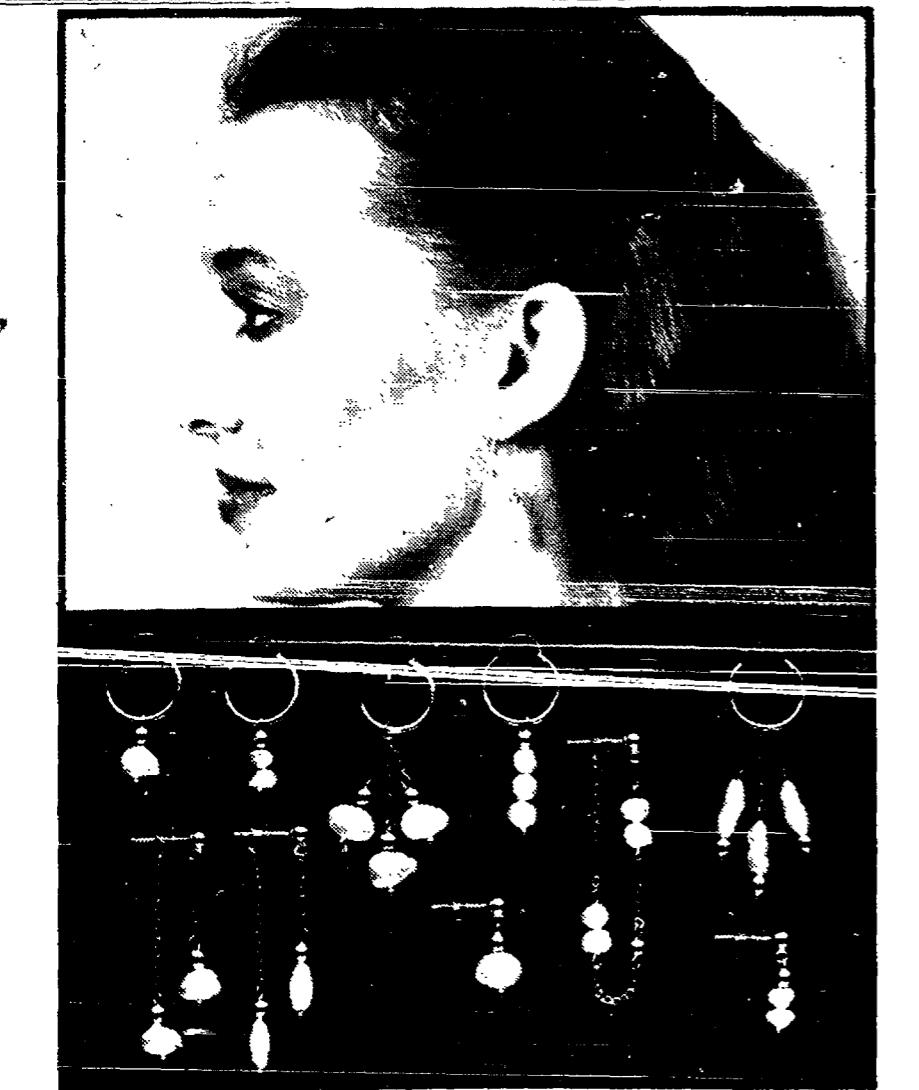

Learn Success from Failure

Many teachers encourage their students to work harder and do better by having them study profiles of successful men and women. Now two teachers in White Plains, N.Y., are taking a slightly different approach.

Paul Greene and George Cohen have found that students react better to success stories if they understand that many successful people have had their share of failures.

In a seminar entitled Getting It Together, Greene and Cohen remind students that Bobby Kennedy failed third grade and Albert Einstein was poor in math.

Putting a new twist on success stories, say the teachers, shows the students that failure is not a permanent condition. It encourages students to think about their own failures more positively and to keep trying for things they want, even when success seems doubtful.

The teachers say they started the seminar because they were convinced that many students were getting turned off by school and discouraged about their own potential.

Part of a student's discouragement, say Greene and Cohen, comes from hearing too often about all the things he/she cannot do, not what he/she can do.

In Getting It Together, students begin to identify activities and goals that are important to them. They then think about and begin to emphasize personal characteristics that are likely to help them succeed in their goals.

So far, the nine-hour seminar has been offered to over 200 students in the White Plains public school system. Students can take the seminar beginning in fourth grade. Greene and Cohen are convinced that students are never too young to start believing in themselves.

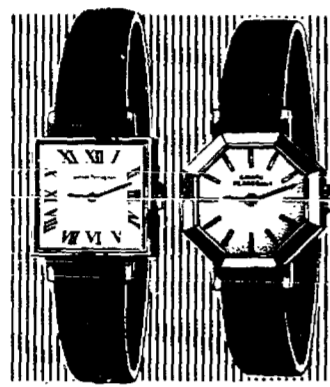

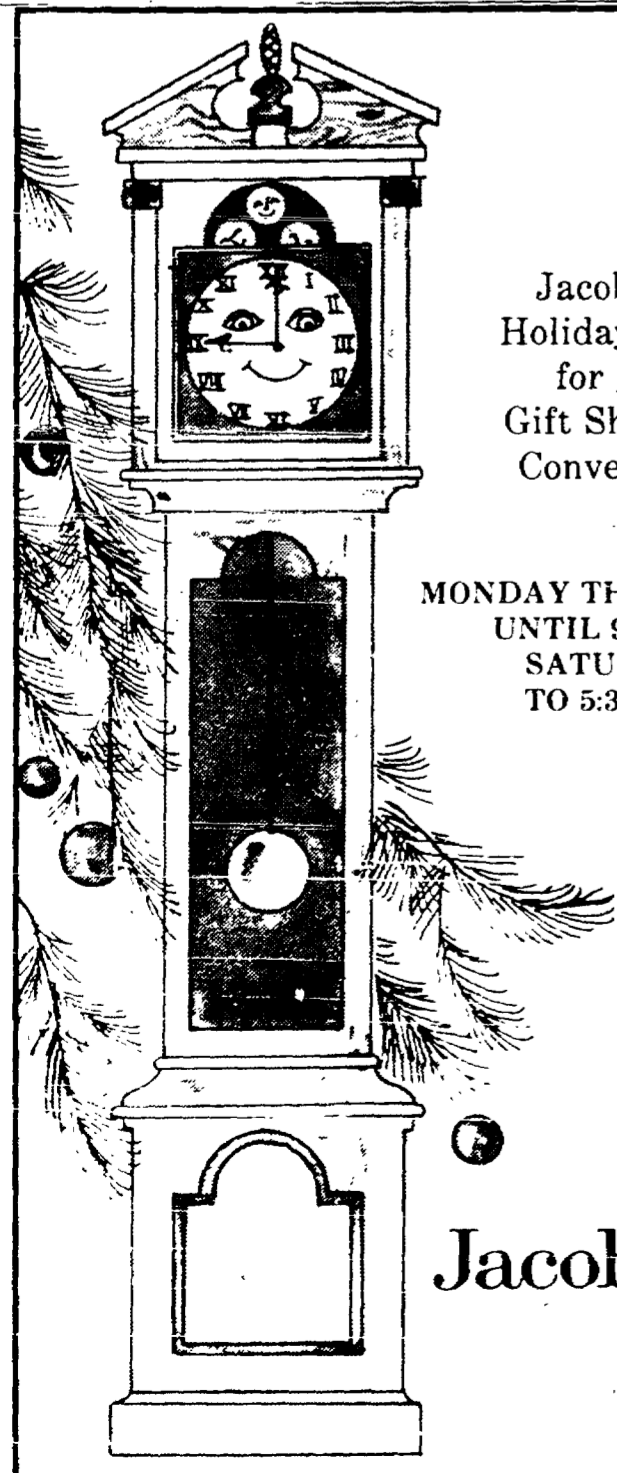

(Continued from Page 24) intrigued scientists, historians and theologians for hundreds of years because, other than descriptions in the New Testament, there are no other known accounts documenting this apparently short-term celestial phenomenon.

Much speculation exists over whether there really was such a star, according to Von Del Chamberlain, an astronomer at the Smithsonian Institution's National Air and Space Museum. In an annual public lecture, Chamberlain traces the various theories advanced to explain the Star of Bethlehem.

"Most of us assume that the Christmas star was an extraordinary sight to behold," he says. "It may not have been so spectacular. Actually, it may have been an event which only professional star gazers—such as the Magi—would even have noticed. And perhaps what the Wise Men saw was not really a single star at all."

One theory holds that the Christmas star was a comet. Early records kept by the Chinese mention a comet without a tail visible in the spring of 4 B.C., a date which fits the most recent estimates of the year in which Jesus was born. (Scholars now believe that Jesus was born between 8 and 4 B.C. Since our present calendar system was not instituted until the 6th century A.D., more than 500 years

after His birth, errors in calculation are possible.)

But comets move slowly from night to night through the starry sky. Moreover, comets were believed by the ancients to be omens of impending doom, not harbingers of glad tidings.

Another theory has it that the star might have been an unusually bright meteor, called a fireball. As fireballs flash through the atmosphere, they burn with an intense but fleeting light. But ancient records and modern knowledge indicate that fireballs are fairly commonplace occurrences lasting only a few seconds.

A third and more tenable explanation is that the Star of Bethlehem was a "nova," which means literally "new star." Actually, novas are not new but old stars that have reached the end of their evolution and have become unstable. These exploding stars abruptly rise to great brilliance, then lose their luminance slowly over a period of weeks.

"This theory has potential," Chamberlain says. "A nova could be bright enough and last long enough to lead the wise men on a long journey to Bethlehem."

"In addition," he continues, "a nova would certainly be the most dramatic explanation. What could be more exciting than to have a 'new star' appear on the night that Christ was born?"

One recent study of ancient Chinese and Korean records indicates that a nova may have appeared in 5 B.C., but there is no definitive account that such an event took place.

The theory most widely accepted by astronomers today was put forth in the 1600s by German astronomer Johannes Kepler. Kepler suggested that the Christmas star was really a "conjunction" of planets.

A conjunction occurs when two or more planets appear to pass by each other in the sky. Using ancient sky records, astronomers have verified that the planets Jupiter and Saturn appeared in conjunction not once but three

times between 7 and 6 B.C.—a relatively rare phenomenon.

A conjunction would explain the lack of other records, since it most likely would have gone unnoticed except by those, like the Magi, who were trained to watch the sky.

A conjunction takes on even more significance when viewed from an astrological standpoint.

The ancient astrologers would have considered conjunctions to be highly symbolic events. To them, conjunctions of Jupiter and Saturn held special significance—Jupiter, symbolic of the king of the gods, and Saturn, said to be the protector of the peoples of the eastern Mediterranean.

In 6 B.C., the planet Mars joined Jupiter and Saturn following the third conjunction, according to the records. All three planets appeared in the constellation of Pisces, (the Fishes), which signified to the astrologers the House of the Hebrews.

While the triple conjunction is the most widely accepted theory, it is unlikely that we will ever know for certain what produced the Christmas "star." But whether the star was supernatural or part of the natural order of things, the story of the Star of Bethlehem has endured as a symbol of Christmas.

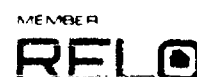

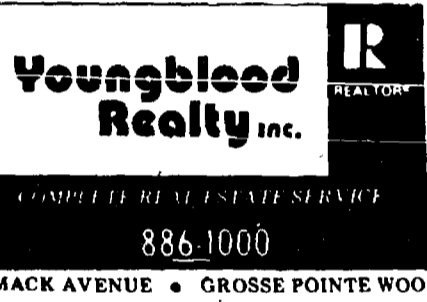

A DSO Hello from London Town



From the Sphinx atop the steps leading to the Royal Museum, Detroit Symphony Orchestra Concertmaster GORDON STAPLES, (right), and MR. and MRS. RALPH O. GUTHRIE wave a big DSO "Hello!" from London, England, during a stop on the DSO's triumphant European tour that ended last Friday in Switzerland. The swing through eight European countries, the Detroit Sym-

phony's premier tour of the continent, began in Barcelona, Spain, October 28. The DSO returned to Detroit last Saturday, and the Guthries are home again in Grosse Pointe. They came here from Raleigh, N.C., when Mr. Guthrie was named managing director of the DSO. He had previously served as general manager of the North Carolina Symphony Orchestra.

The European tour is not a first for Guthrie. He toured Europe with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in 1971, and would like the current tour to put lightning in a bottle for the DSO just as a similar "first tour" sent the CSO's hometown support soaring.

"When the late Richard Daley heard how wonderfully the Chicago Symphony Orchestra was doing in Europe," Guthrie recalls, "he telephoned the orchestra's management in Helsinki, Finland, and asked what he could do to help." The CSO's executive director, John S. Edwards, caught off guard, could only think of a parade.

So . . . when it came home, the CSO had its parade at high noon up State Street. "More importantly," notes

Guthrie, "financial support soared from \$1 million annually to more than \$3 million, and box office sales eventually skyrocketed to pre-season sales of 98 percent of capacity."

Detroit's a bit cold for parading in December, "but on the strength of this orchestra's performances and the attention it has given Detroit and the State of Michigan," says Guthrie, "the DSO should be a top attraction in the city during the second half of the concert season."

The Detroit Symphony went to Europe with the avowed intention of identifying itself as equal among equals in the First Rank American Orchestra firmament. In a recent edition of the London monthly "Records and Recording," DSO Music Director Antal Dorati

observed that the Detroit Symphony has its own characteristics:

"It is a very mighty-sounding orchestra with a fine, full, resonant sound; yet it is also very sweet and has good solo performances in every department."

Critics and audiences along the DSO's five-week European tour route confirmed Dorati's evaluation of his orchestra. Reviews in general have been favorable — and audience reaction has been an exciting phenomenon for orchestra members, who are not used to cadence hand-clapping and foot-stomping in Detroit.

"It's a fine orchestra," Managing Director Guthrie says. "It took a tour like this for the musicians to discover what a fine ensemble they are. Now it's Detroit's turn to make that discovery."

'Snow Train' Experiment Highlights Big Weekend

Gov. William G. Milliken announced that the state will assist in testing a "snow train" for skiers and snowmobilers between Cadillac and southeast Michigan in January.

Mr. Milliken said that state agencies will help organize an Owosso-Cadillac round-trip passenger excursion train the weekend of January 4 to 6 to test the feasibility of reviving such once-popular rail service for northbound tourists.

The Governor made the announcement while visiting Cadillac for the city's second annual October Fiesta breakfast. He also toured the city's 54-acre industrial park where more than 600 persons are employed. He welcomed another new industry—the sixth to locate on the site in the past two years.

Mr. Milliken said the January rail excursion to Cadillac will be promoted as the Michigan Snow Train and will feature a weekend of entertainment, including a band.

"Through initiatives such as this one, the state hopes to rekindle interest in resort passenger runs and to show people that riding trains can be a fun experience as well as an energy-saving one," he said.

Cadillac Winter Promotions, Inc., a nonprofit organization formed by Cadillac area business leaders, will be the official sponsor of the event, with assistance from the Michigan Travel Bureau, the Michigan Office of the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission, the Michigan Bureau of Urban and Public Transportation, the Cadillac Chamber of Commerce and others.

Five passenger coaches, a club car and a flat car to carry snowmobiles have been secured by Michigan Interstate Railway Company, the former Ann Arbor Railroad, which will operate the train. Ridership will be limited to the first 340 persons who buy tickets for the round-trip ride, according to sponsors of the event.

A package plan will include the round trip train ride, all ski lifts and snowmobile trail fees for the weekend, a Friday night fish fry, lodging for two nights, Saturday lunch, a Saturday morning lumberjack breakfast and other special events. It will be offered for \$189 per person.

Transportation to the Caberfae Ski Area also will be included. A number of snowmobile trail rides and a 50-mile snowmobile race have been planned for the weekend.

The train is scheduled to depart Owosso Friday, January 4, at 1 p.m. and return Sunday, January 6 by 9:30 p.m.

Owosso was selected as the staging area for the inaugural Michigan Snow Train because it has good track connections to Cadillac, is close to southeast Michigan and provides a relatively short, (five and one-half hour), train ride.

The train trip is approximately 130 miles long.

"With the move to a larger Detroit office and with the opening of a brand new office in Lansing, we will be able to serve up to 80 more children, or almost 200 during 1980," said Carl E. Thomas, LSSM's Executive Director.

In Detroit the agency moved Child and Family Services from agency headquarters at 484 East Grand Boulevard to 557 Philip at East Jefferson.

The Lansing Area Office, the first the Detroit-based agency has had in that city, also marks the first time a private agency offering foster family services has entered the Lansing scene in 31 years.

In Detroit it is expected that two social workers will be added to the staff of six. In Lansing the office has a director and two social workers.

Heading the Detroit office is Verlie Ruffin, Director of Child and Family Services. In Lansing, Margaret Pal-

miter is the Area Office director.

The agency also seeks foster homes for Vietnamese Chinese boys between the ages of 13 and 17. LSSM already has resettled more than 3,000 Indo-Chinese in four years through sponsorships of congregations and groups.

Established in 1934, LSSM also participates in a joint venture, Lutheran Adoption Services, with Lutheran Children's Friend Society.

As part of its services to families, the agency offers Life Enrichment programs for families and individuals which promote harmony in human relationships.

In addition LSSM operates three nursing homes, (Detroit, Grand Rapids, Saginaw), and a retirement center, (Grand Rapids). It runs a settlement house in Saginaw; a senior center in Detroit and manages a group home for retarded adults in Detroit.

It is an agency of the Michigan Synod, Lutheran Church in America and the Michigan District of the American Lutheran Church.

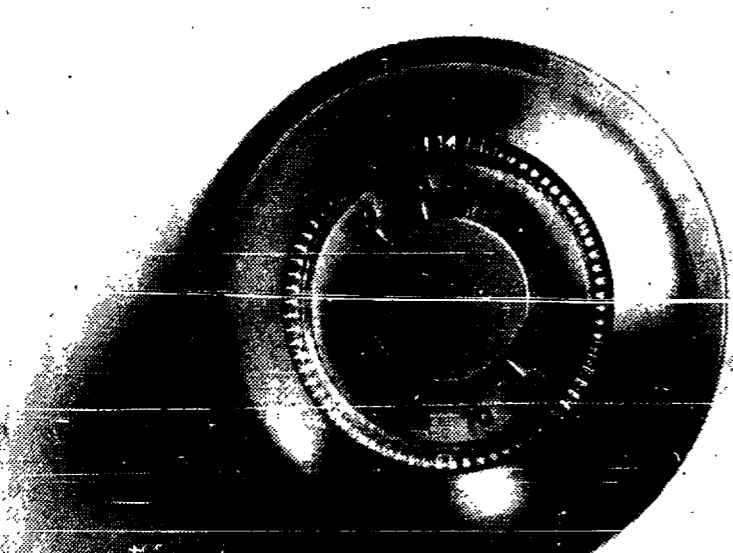

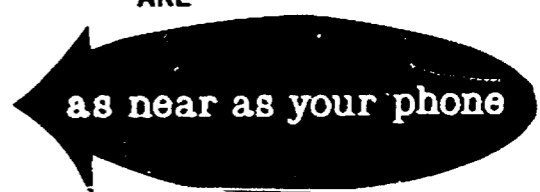

Satin Stomach Helps at ULS

Second graders are generally unsure about what the stomach looks like and what happens to food once it is eaten. With this in mind, University Liggett School, (ULS), seniors Lisa Hansen and Stacy Mizeres devised a project to teach Janet Hansen's Lower School class about the stomach.

The project was held in conjunction with a two and a half week unit on "Digestion And Nutrition" in physiology class.

"The hardest part," according to Stacy and Lisa, "was knowing where to go to find out how to approach the project and how to simplify it." Both physiology teacher Doris Ranke and art teacher Suzanne Raymo gave some direction, but primarily, the project was completed independently.

During their first meeting with the second graders, Lisa and Stacy administered a pre-test to determine the young-

sters' knowledge of the digestive system. The results enabled the girls to define their objectives and prepare appropriate lessons.

The next challenge was to create a model of the stomach — one which would describe the shape and help the children identify its different parts and functions.

To achieve this, Stacy and Lisa designed a hand sewn replica of the stomach in satin. Sort and squeeze, inviting to hold and appealing in its flesh, green and yellow colors, the model was a tremendous success, officials say.

Many faces eagerly turned to listen to the simple explanations about the physical and chemical reactions of the digestive system which Lisa and Stacy gave and illustrated through the satin model.

Following the presentation, the upper schoolers administered a post-test.

Local Groups Offer College Grants

Preparing for college is a complicated procedure and finance ranks high on the list of problems. Among the helpful scholarship programs available, people often overlook the many possibilities offered in the Grosse Pointe area.

A simple visit to South High School's Counseling Center will give students all the information needed to obtain a variety of grants, loans and scholarships from Grosse Pointe based clubs and organizations.

According to student counselor Dr. Robert Hanson, there are four levels of scholarships. "The first level grant comes from the U.S. government grant programs and then follow the state, local and private organizations."

Among the private organizations offering scholarships around Grosse Pointe is the South High Mother's Club, whose chairperson for financial aid is Marilyn Doyal. As a service to students, applications for this scholarship also are forwarded to many other local scholarship programs, with the deadline set for next March 31.

The participating programs are the Optimist Club, the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club, the Alice K. McKee Memorial Scholarship Fund, the

Women's Club Achievement Award, Delta Kappa Gamma, the Welcome Wagon, (medically related only), and the Lions Club.

The method used in selecting recipients of these awards and the amount of the grant is based on a variety of requirements and standards.

As Dr. Hanson explained, "Foremost in their consideration of the applicants' basic

financial needs, depending on the cost of their college and the total income of their parents. The other major consideration for all scholarships is a certain level of scholastic achievement, according to the requirements of that particular program."

The most important factor in receiving these benefits, though, is the awareness of the student of all the opportunities available to him through these types of grants.
