

Serves Senior Citizens

Church Will Keep Food Center

The county-sponsored nutrition center that serves free meals daily to about 100 local senior citizens will be allowed to stay for one more year at its current home in Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church, the church announced this week.

The church's session voted on February 19 to continue providing free space for the daily lunch program on the condition that closer cooperation be achieved with the Out-Wayne County Office on Aging. The Office on Aging sponsors the food program.

The church was recently forced to, reconsider its relationship with the center because of crowding and scheduling problems at the building at 19950 Mack.

The committment to keep the center for one more year means that development of new church programs will have to be curtailed, according to Presbyterian Pastor Robert Linthicum

Barrier Free

The unanimous vote to keep the program came at the end of a twomonth study by a task force of the church. At the same time, Nutrition Center officials had started looking for new quarters with no success.

Nutrition Site Council President Adele C Ryder said she was "elated" to hear of the church's action.

"I'm very grateful and pleased," Mrs. Ryder said. "The church is an ideal environment for our program. It's centrally located for seniors and barrier-free.'

Shoppers Jeer at Nazi Display

"They're too young to remember," said a grim-faced

And he, like most other shoppers on the street, turned and walked away from the Caine doubts Congress will half dozen Nazi marchers Saturday, February 23.

They came in full uniform; swastikas and SS emblems. They waved American flags and handed out stacks of hate literature, depicting

lynch scenes and calls for a rise to "white power." "You're sick" was the most common response from shop-

pers on Kercheval avenue. They marched past the fashionable shops for half an hour, trailed by a string of young girls yelling taunts and ripping up literature as it fell to the ground.

Police quietly circled the yelling matches broke out, but there were no more direct confrontations.

The kids were curious and perplexed, "They're prejudiced. They want to lock all the black people up, right?" asked one, 12-year-old.

The group, calling itself the Security Services (SS) Action Group, was led by a young man who gave his name as Mike Kelverin of Blairmoor. No such name is listed in the telephone or police records, however.

The SS serves as bodyguards for the National Socialist Movement, according to "Mike." That group surfaced in the area two years ago when it opened a book-store on West Vernor. It was forced out after several violent confrontations with shopping district. A few neighbors and then moved on to Fenkel and Michigan avenue locations, he said.

The same group has been reported active in Ferndale in recent weeks. In fact, the SS plans to petition the Ferndale city council for a parade permit marking Hitler's birthday in April.

There are additional SS units in Toledo, Boston, Miami Beach and Indianapolis, according to members.



fields. Women also had a step is to determine the relative costs of the three alternatives in terms of what each, method will cost per day. (or other unit), of expected usage.

> If an item will be used only one day per year, for example, obviously the daily rental is the best bet. If it's to be used every day of the year, purchasing the item is the only answer. But what do you decide when usage is likely to fall somewhere in between?

> A CPA spokesman cites the hypothetical example of an electric typewriter that costs \$900, rents for \$7.50 a day and can be leased for \$50 a month.

To determine the full cost of ownership it is necessary to add to the \$900 purchase price the interest expenseeither interest paid on borrowed money or interest income lost-plus such other costs as insurance and maintenance, all of which might bring the total close to \$1, -200.

Amortized over a life expectancy of eight years, ownership cost is a modest \$150 a year, or \$12.50 a month, but it must be remembered that this cost would be incurred for the full eight years, regardless of how much the machine is used. If you use the typewriter no more than six days a year. therefore, your costs will be \$45 for daily rentals, which is less than either alternative. If you use it more than six days, but all within one month, the \$50 monthly rate is the best deal.

Cute Creatures Are Old Home Threats

Earlier this winter a Grosse Pointe woman was wakened by strange thumps and scratchings coming from her bedroom ceiling. She alarmed her husband by wak-ing him out of a sound sleep and they lay tensely in the dark listening to something or somebody busy at work in their house.

Several sleepness nights' and \$600 later, the couple rid their house of the noisy intruders-a family of squirrels who had built nests in their attic.

Squirrels. While some animal-lovers consider the bushy-tailed creatures cute and charming, many hardened homeowners find them worse than mischievous.

Find Fault

Squirrels have an uncanny ability to ferret out all the flaws you never even knew existed in your home.

Who knew that your roof slates were loose until those sharp-eyed rodents casually brushed them aside, gnawed through the damp roof board underneath and let themselves into your attic? Who knew that behind its facade, the facia board on your house was rotten to the core, until the squirrels with their chisel-like teeth discovered it? And who knew you had a damaged chimney screen until one night a friendly squirrel dropped into your fireplace to tell you?

Grosse Pointe gardens host a variety of Michigan squirrels: the gray, (black squirrels are included in this group), red and flying squirrels.

Protected by Law

The flying squirrels are nocturnal animais and most likely are the kind that dig into homes. They have a fold of skin that stretches from their front leg to their rear on each side of the body, which enables them to glide.

Once squirrels are in your house, the task is to figure out how they got in, expel them and plug up the hole immediately. Professional exterminators use a solvent to expel the squirrels. Ammonia or mothballs are also known to do the job. The squirrels can't breathe and are forced to flee for air.

It is against local laws to kill squirrels, but the Pointes do own traps, which are available on loan to community residents, Once the squirrel is caught it must be set free in a desirable location.

magazine printed an article about the squirrels of Central Park. The article, obviously written by a "squirrel person," noted that the "gray squirrel's tail is one of the most splendid and dramatically attached to any North American quadruped."

Old House Pest

This "New Yorker" article caused readers all over the country to respond with their favorite observations and anecdotes about squirrels.

Appreciating squirrels as part of the animal kingdom is fine, say the experts. But people who appreciate squirrels and can't resist feeding them are making a big mistake for three reasons, they warn.

First, "When they feed squirrels, people support a larger population than nature would normally support," explains Michi-gan wildlife biologist, Richard Elden, "And, the larger the population, the more the squirrels need to look for homes. Old houses, with their many nooks and crannies, are inviting places for squirrels."

Secondly, when people feed squirrels they are actually training them, according to Bill Smith, owner of Master Pest Control in Grosse Pointe Park Master tells the story of a woman who liked feeding the squirrels in her yard. When she became ill, they kept returning and finally got into her house through the chimney and down into her basement, where they did hundreds of dollars of damage.

Blame It on Ben

A third reason not to feed squirrels is the danger of getting bitten although, according to Dr. Jane Polkowski, medical director of the Wayne County Health Department, the danger of rabies is not as great as is popularly thought.

The experts advise squirrel lovers to admire them from afar. Yet, squirrels as pets were once extremely common both in America and abroad in the 18th and 19th centuries. In fact, Benjamin Franklin is credited with perhaps having introduced the first gray squirrels to England upon his arrival there in 1771. He gave the squirrel as a pet to Miss Georgiana Shipley, the young daughter of an Anglican bishop of pro-Colonial views.

File Taxes Too Some senior citizens find they have the time to travel; others enjoy meeting new friends or taking up new hobbies; then there are still others on the workforce. If you are age 65 or older, no matter what you do, you should be aware of certain tax benefits that apply to

ice For instance, anyone 65 or older is entitled to an extra exemption of \$1,000, up from last year's \$750. That means an automatic reduction to income of \$2,000 for single persons, and \$4,000 for a married couple, both 65 or older, who file a joint re-

Do senior citizens have to file at all? In some cases, yes, since filing a tax return has nothing to do with age; it's income that decides that question, says the LRS.

Single persons 65 or over do not have to file a Federal income tax return if their income was less than \$4,300. The limit for a married couple, filing a joint return, with only one spouse 65 or older, is \$6,400; \$7,400 if both spouses are 65 or over. For tax purposes, persons are considered to be 65 on the day before their 65th birthday. Also keep in mind that Social Security payments are not taxable.

Another special benefit is the "Credit for the Elderly," which can in some cases, but not all, reduce taxes owed by as much as \$375 for single persons and \$562.50 for married couples who file a joint return.



Lakeshore, Round 3 To the Editor:

I wish to repeat the personal thanks to you (Wayne County Commissioner Ervin A. Steiner), for your efforts on behalf of Grosse Pointe regarding the deplorable condition of Lakeshore that was expressed in my letter in the February 7 edition of the NEWS.

You were correct in your latest letter in the February 21 issue of the NEWS that you had written to me that you had been able to get an interest-free loan for four years. In my February 7 letter. I said that the loan had not been offered to the Farms or presented to the council.

Since the Wayne County Road Commission is autonomous from the Wayne County Board of Commissioners, I did not interpret your comment in a personal letter as a commitment to the Farms from the WCRC.

But enough of who said what to whom, Erv. We are both working toward the same goal-to have Lakeshore properly maintained. The only difference is that you are suggesting the Farms capitulate to the WCRC and I suggest that the sole responsibility belongs to the WCRC since it has already received tax monies for this purpose.

Let's talk about WCRC operations. Through the assistance of State Sen. John Kelly, I received a copy of the audited financial statements of the Road Fund for WCRC for the year ended November 30, 1977.

The Road Fund is divided into an Operating Fund for items such as maintenance of Lakeshore and a Motor Vehicle Highway Construction Fund. A review of these statements provides some enlightening items as follows:

• The Operating Fund in 1977 had total revenues of \$55.7 million and spent \$54.8 million, ending up with a surplus of \$927,542.

• The total Road Fund had cash and temporary investments of \$29.3 million.

• The Road Fund had interfund receivables of \$7.4 million from the Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport, an increase of \$216,847 from 1976. Of this amount \$2.3 million goes back to the period 1971-73 and is interest free. Total interfund receivables from all WCRC funds were \$9.3 million-all interest free.

I do not know if these receivables from other WCRC funds are still outstanding but if they were, at interest rates today, this would generate in-
